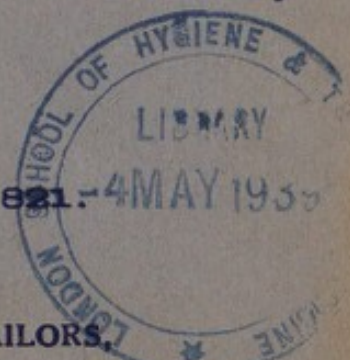

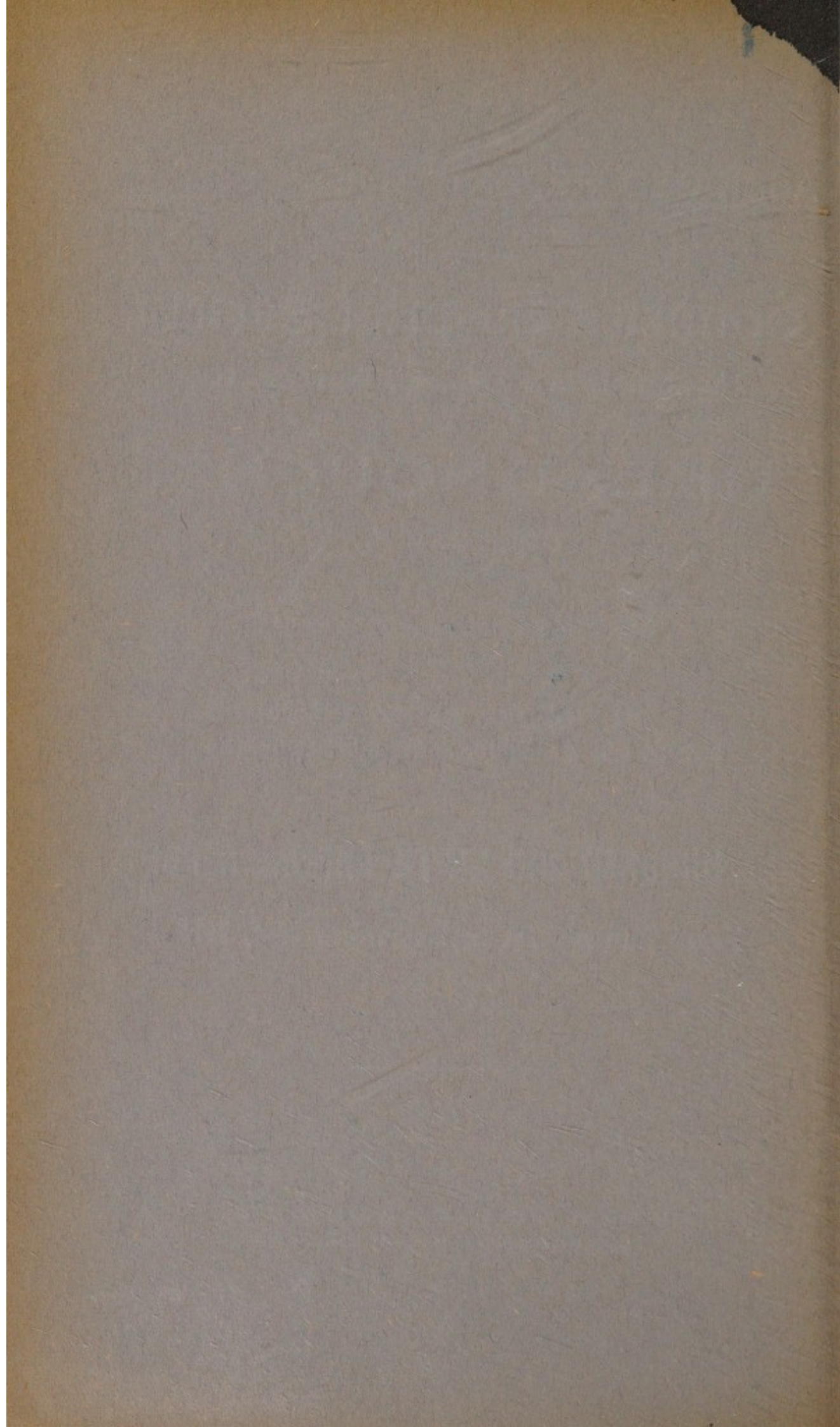

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1929.

THE Board of Management have pleasure in presenting herewith the 109TH ANNUAL REPORT of the Society.

The outstanding feature of the year was the completion of the Devonport Nurses' Home and the Pathological Laboratories, both built to the designs of Sir Edwin Cooper, F.R.I.B.A. The Pathologists moved into their new quarters in February, and the Nurses into their new Home in May. Both buildings were formally declared open by T.R.H. the Duke and Duchess of York on Monday, the 15th of July. The invitations which are usually issued for the Annual Court, were this year sent out to all friends and supporters of the charity on the occasion of this opening ceremony, and about 1,500 were present in the quadrangle to greet T.R.H. the President and the Duchess of York.

The erection and equipment of these two buildings are the first-fruits of the fund which Lord Devonport raised during the war for the improvement and extension of the Dreadnought Hospital, and as a memorial to the work of the men of the Merchant Service in war and peace.

In the evening a dinner at the Langham Hotel was given to Lord Devonport by the Honorary Medical Staff of the Hospital.

During the year the Committee have passed plans prepared by Sir Edwin Cooper for the provision of a new Out-Patient Department and of a complete theatre unit

at the Dreadnought Hospital. These urgently needed improvements will be effected by adding a storey to the present "Somerset" wing and by roofing in the quadrangle between north-east "Somerset" and "Ground West." The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have given their approval to this scheme, and it is proposed to make a start in the early spring. The cost will amount to about £35,000.

During the year the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine vacated the premises they had occupied in the Hospital for Tropical Diseases in Endsleigh Gardens, and entered into their magnificent new building in Keppel Street; an opportunity, therefore, occurred to effect the much-needed extension of accommodation for in-patients at that branch of the Society, and to carry out other improvements in the Hospital. In order to be ready for the leave season of 1930, the Board resolved to carry out the alterations immediately; by the end of April, 1930, therefore, the number of beds at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases will be increased to 80. The new Pathological Department will not only fulfil the requirements of the Hospital, but will act as a centre for consultation by members of the medical profession in cases of diseases peculiar to the tropics. The new clinical lecture theatre—to be known as the "Manson Memorial Theatre"—will be evidence of the continued close alliance between the Hospital and the School. The cost of these extensions and alterations is estimated at £20,000. To meet this capital expenditure, and in the hope of providing some endowment for the additional beds, the "Tropical Hospital Fund" has been opened, with the Rt. Hon. Sir Leslie Wilson as its Honorary Treasurer.

The Board have during 1929 vacated the East India Dock Dispensary. This Dispensary, which first started at Well Street, London Docks, in 1880, was transferred to East India Dock Road in 1891, but of late years the number of

patients attending has sunk to such a comparatively low figure that it was felt that the time had come to close this branch of the Corporation. At the same time there have been indications that a dispensary at Southampton would meet a need amongst the seafaring folk of that port, and steps were taken to acquire a suitable building and to open a new dispensary there. The old East India Dock Dispensary closed its doors on the 31st December, 1929, and the new institution at Southampton opened on 3rd December, 1929. Immediate first-aid treatment will be given there by the Society's Medical Officer, who may, if necessary, draft suitable cases for admission to one of the Society's hospitals. The Board hope that by the end of the year they will be able to submit a report which will justify the action taken in extending the work of the Society to that large and growing port.

The Board record with deep regret the death of two most distinguished Vice-Presidents, viz., Admiral of the Fleet the Rt. Hon. Sir Edward Seymour, and Admiral of the Fleet Sir Henry Jackson. Sir Edward Seymour joined the Board of Management in 1902, and was elected a Vice-President in 1913. Sir Henry Jackson joined the Board in 1916, and from that time until 1928, when ill-health compelled him to resign his seat, he took the keenest interest in the work of the Society, and was a regular attendant at the Board meetings. The Society is able to record that Sir Henry, one of the pioneers of wireless telegraphy, took real pleasure in personally superintending the installation of receiving sets at the Angas Home and at the Sanatorium.

The list of Vice-Presidents has been further depleted by the death of Mr. P. G. Singhanee, by whose munificent gift of a lakh of rupees was erected the "Singhanee" Ward in Tilbury Hospital for the treatment of Indian seamen.

In December Mr. Spencer Dickson, H.M. Consul-General in Marseilles, and the Chairman of the Advisory Committee, was recalled from Marseilles on his appointment as H.M. Minister to Colombia. In recognition of his signal services to the Society in connection with the Hospital at Marseilles, Mr. Dickson has been elected a Vice-President.

Sir Franke Notley resigned from the Board on giving up his appointment as Marine Superintendent of the P. & O. S. N. Company, and the following have been elected to seats on the Board during the course of the year:—Vice-Admiral W. H. D. Boyle, C.B. (President of Royal Naval College); Captain W. H. Sweny, C.B.E., R.D., R.N.R. (Marine Superintendent of P. & O. S. N. Company); and Lieut.-Col. the Rt. Hon. Sir Leslie Wilson, G.C.S.I., G.C.I.E., C.M.G., D.S.O.

The Board wish to acknowledge with gratitude the help extended to them by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, King George's Fund for Sailors, the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund, the Hospital Saturday Fund, the Hospitals Welfare Society and the Hospital Savings Association.

The Board owe a debt of gratitude also to the Seamen's Hospital Aid Committee for its work in connection with the Dreadnought Hospital, to the East Ham Palace Entertainment Committee for the help rendered to the Hospital at Connaught Road, to the Tilbury Hospital Committee at Grays and Tilbury in espousing the cause of that branch of the Society's work, and also to the Advisory Committee of the Queen Alexandra Memorial Hospital, Marseilles.

The Seamen's Hospital Aid Committee have endowed their tenth and eleventh beds in the course of the year, and have paid over £900 towards the twelfth bed, which will complete the endowment of a Ward—a task which they set out to accomplish in 1919. This is a magnificent achievement,

and eloquent testimony of the enterprise and enthusiasm animating all the members of that body.

The Ladies' Remembrance League have extended their activities considerably, and, together with the Ladies' Associations connected with the Sanatorium at Bramshott, the Hospital at Tilbury, and the Queen Alexandra Memorial Hospital in Marseilles, have again rendered inestimable service to each of the establishments concerned, help which is not only appreciated by the Matrons, but also by the Board of Management.

The Board also extend very sincere thanks to the many other friends of the sailor who have helped to maintain the Society.

EVENTS OF THE YEAR 1929.

The Annual Court for the year 1929 was held on Wednesday, the 13th of March, at the Chamber of Shipping. Bearing in mind the fact that later in the year T.R.H. the Duke and Duchess of York were to open the Nurses' Home and Pathological Laboratory, it had been decided not to make this a social function in the usual way, but to restrict it to a formal business meeting for the purpose of approving the Annual Report and the election of officers for the ensuing year.

On St. George's Day a matinee performance was given at Wyndham's Theatre, in the presence of H.R.H. the Princess Royal, in aid of the funds of the Seamen's Hospital Society, when the first performance of Mr. Howard Peacey's new play, "Warren Hastings," was presented by a distinguished cast. Thanks to a special Committee, under the chairmanship of the Marchioness of Cambridge, the funds of the Hospital benefited to the extent of £355. Sincere thanks are due to Mr. Leon M. Lion for the loan of his theatre, and to all the actors and actresses who, with that generosity habitual to the profession, gave their services.

Two gifts were generously allocated from the Naval Prize Fund by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, one of £750 for the Dreadnought Hospital, and the other of £1,850 for King George's Sanatorium. This latter sum is being expended in specific improvements at the Sanatorium, such as the enlargement of the verandah in front of the pavilion, the provision of a new heating system, X-ray transformer, etc.

The Board of Management is once again deeply indebted to Messrs. R. & H. Green, Silley, Weir & Co., for unfailing help and practical assistance given by their workshops at the Albert Dock and at Tilbury to the Society's Hospitals near by. Their aid was particularly welcome during the time when a new boiler was being installed at the Albert Dock Hospital.

The Christmas puddings in all of the Society's branches were made this year with fruit generously presented by the Commonwealth of Australia—all Australian grown. The ceremony of stirring the puddings was presided over by Lady Ryrie, wife of the High Commissioner for Australia, who was received at the Dreadnought Hospital by the Chairman.

DREADNOUGHT HOSPITAL.

In the course of the year two beds were endowed by the Seamen's Hospital Aid Committee. The tablet over the ninth bed was unveiled by Sir George Hume on Saturday, the 16th February, and that over the tenth bed by Sir Ion Hamilton Benn on Thursday, the 20th June.

The Annual Nurses' Reunion and Prize-giving was held in the grounds of the Dreadnought Hospital on Friday, the 21st June, when Lady Webb kindly presented the "Bernhard Baron" Medal to Nurse E. O. Dowse, and prizes to other Nurses who had been successful during the past year.

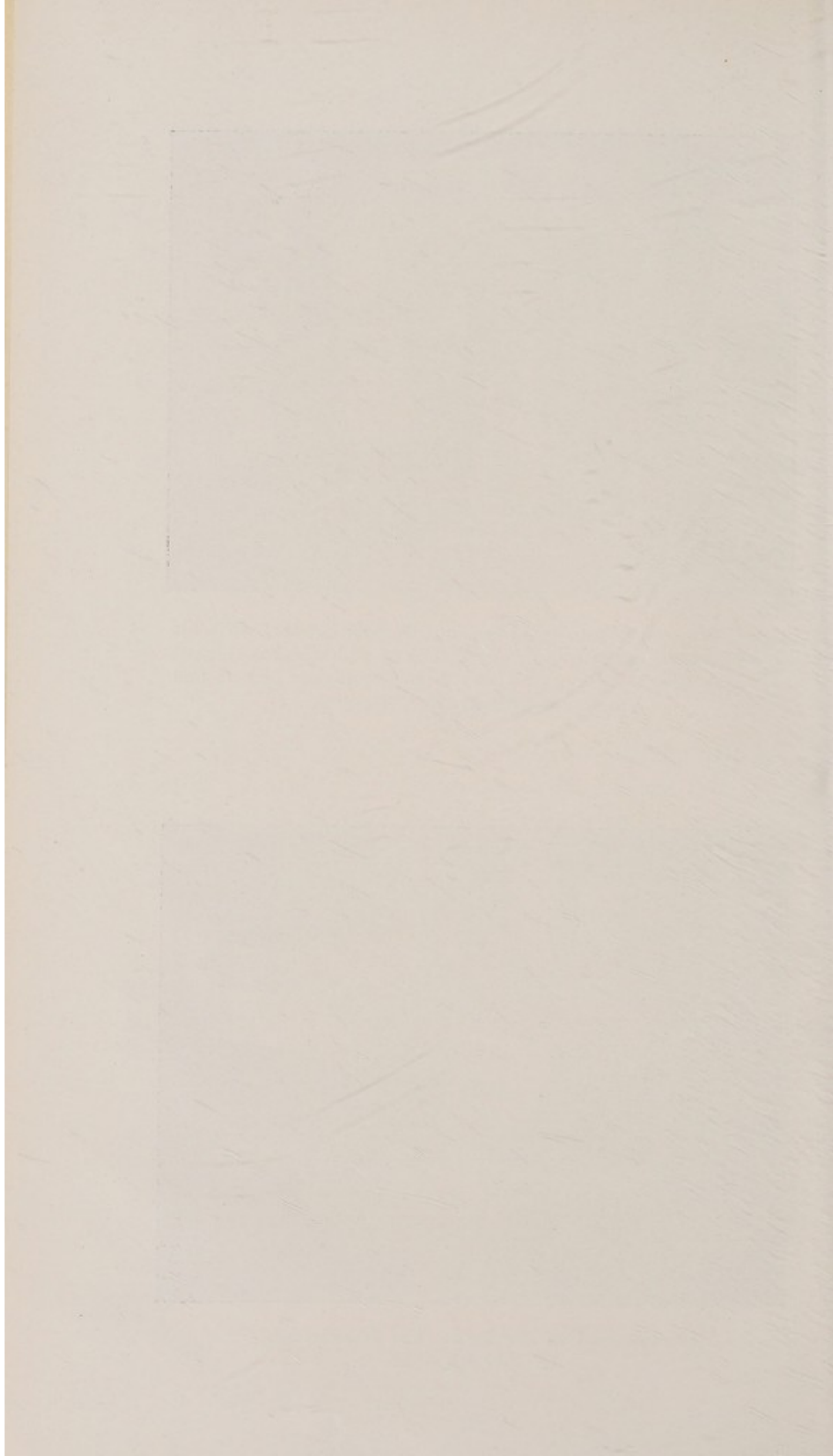

A gift of £100 has been received from Mr. R. N. Prior towards the cost of equipping a Bio-Chemical Laboratory in the new Pathological Department.

Thanks to the generosity of the Directors of the P. & O. S. N. Company, a most successful Thé Dansant was held on board the s.s. "Mooltan" under the auspices of the Ladies' Remembrance League.

A number of changes have occurred among the Honorary Medical Staff. Dr. A. C. Hampson, M.R.C.P., has been appointed Physician with charge of Out-patients; this brings the number of Physicians up to four, and equalises the staff of Physicians and Surgeons.

Dr. Denys B. Hallett, D.M.R.E., has been appointed Assistant Radiologist.

Dr. J. Walker Wilson has been appointed Medical Superintendent in succession to Col. John Illius, I.M.S., whose period of office expired at the end of the year.

Mr. J. P. Heming resigned from the post of Steward on being appointed Secretary to the Soho Hospital for Women. Mr. Heming, who came to the Dreadnought from the London Hospital in 1927, had made himself most popular with all the staff at the Hospital, and his resignation was much regretted. He carried away with him the best wishes and congratulations of all his colleagues at the Dreadnought on his promotion to this responsible position in the hospital world.

Mr. D. A. C. Price has been appointed to succeed Mr. Heming as Steward at the Dreadnought.

The Rev. E. A. Hamilton, who served as Chaplain at the Dreadnought under the Missions to Seamen for the last two years, was transferred to an appointment at Great Yarmouth, and the Rev. C. H. Hobart has been appointed by the Missions to Seamen to succeed him at the Dreadnought.

ALBERT DOCK HOSPITAL.

Mr. T. Pomfret Kilner has resigned his appointment as Surgeon (which he has held since 1921), and has been appointed Consulting Surgeon to this branch of the Seamen's Hospital Society. Mr. C. Hope Carlton, F.R.C.S., has been appointed to fill the vacancy thus created, while the staff has been augmented by the appointment of Mr. G. F. G. Batchelor, F.R.C.S., as Assistant Surgeon.

The Society is again indebted to the Rubber Growers' Association, who have made a generous gift of rubber flooring for the new X-ray Department.

Miss Haig Harrison, who was appointed Manageress of the Society's Laundry (attached to the Albert Dock Hospital) in the year 1899, resigned in May last. Miss D. Evans has been appointed to succeed her.

Throughout the year Captain L. H. Marten has continued his kind daily gift of newspapers to the Hospital.

HOSPITAL FOR TROPICAL DISEASES.

During the year the Hospital has been honoured by a visit from H.H. the Sultan of Zanzibar, who, accompanied by his son, Prince Sayyid Abdulla, and Sief Bin Soliman, made a tour of the wards. The Sultan was particularly impressed to see by the map the regions from whence the patients came.

Other notable visitors who may be mentioned are Professor Fulleborn, the eminent helminthologist of Hamburg, and Sir Umar Hayat Khan, Deputy Commissioner of the Punjab.

Thanks are due to those Commanders who have brought with such care in their vessels from India consignments of bael fruit; this fruit is beneficial in cases of sprue and allied maladies.

On Thursday, September 26th, Lady Manson presented the "Duncan" Gold Medal to Nurse L. M. Seavell, who came out first in the annual examination in Tropical Medical Nursing.

Congratulations are extended to Dr. G. Carmichael Low on being awarded the "Mary Kingsley" Medal by the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine ; to Sir Leonard Rogers on receiving the "Cameron" Prize for Therapeutics, awarded by the University of Edinburgh ; and to Dr. P. Manson Bahr on his appointment as Consulting Physician to H.M. Colonial Office and Crown Agents for the Colonies.

Dr. W. E. Cooke, the Medical Superintendent, is visiting Malaya and India to study various forms of tropical disease in those regions.

The Society is organising an exhibit at the forthcoming International Maritime Exhibition to be held in Antwerp, April to October, 1930. The Department of Overseas Trade has kindly granted the Society, free of charge, a stand in the British pavilion and free transport of exhibits.

TILBURY HOSPITAL.

Several changes have taken place in the Honorary Medical Staff of this branch during the past year. The Board regret to record the death of Mr. T. Openshaw, C.B., C.M.G., M.S., F.R.C.S., who had been associated with the Hospital, as Consulting Surgeon, since its inception in 1896. Two other members of the staff, Dr. L. G. Jacob and Mr. W. Allingham, have resigned their appointments.

Mr. E. S. Page, F.R.C.S., has been appointed Resident Medical Officer in succession to Mr. I. Price, whose period of office expired at the close of the year.

The Annual Fête, which was opened by Lady Leonora Cooper, was held on Wednesday, the 17th July.

The Board desire to express their gratitude to Mr. W. O. Watt, Mr. Hugh Watt, and Mr. D. Crawford, who have rendered much assistance by ploughing, and providing and sowing potato seed in land attached to the Hospital.

QUEEN ALEXANDRA MEMORIAL HOSPITAL, MARSEILLES.

The Board regret to record the death of Miss Higgs, the Matron, which occurred on the 17th March, after a few days illness.

Miss Wootton, a Sister at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases, was appointed to succeed Miss Higgs. Subsequently Miss Wootton was appointed Matron of King George's Sanatorium at Bramshott, and Miss C. Warner, a Sister at the Dreadnought Hospital, was appointed Matron of the Hospital at Marseilles.

Several changes have occurred during the year on the Advisory Committee of the Hospital. Reference has already been made in the Report to the departure of Mr. Spencer Dickson to Colombia, and his absence from the chair will be keenly felt. With much regret the Board record the death of Mr. George Carr, one of the founders of the Hospital and a member of the Committee.

Mr. P. L. Burnett, also a member of the Advisory Committee, has felt compelled to resign his seat in consequence of a personal bereavement. Mr. Burnett has been elected an Honorary Life Governor of the Society, and will continue to watch over the interests of the sick sailor in Marseilles with the same care as he has done during the many years he has

lived there. He also was one of the founders of the Hospital.

KING GEORGE'S SANATORIUM.

The generous grant made to this Sanatorium by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty from the Naval Prize Fund has enabled many much-needed improvements to be carried out as explained in the preceding report.

Miss Ruck, R.R.C., who had held the post of Matron during the past three years, has resigned on being appointed Matron of the Essex County Sanatorium at Black Notley, Miss Wootton, one of the Sisters at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases and Matron for a short time at the Marseilles Hospital, has succeeded Miss Ruck at Bramshott.

Dr. E. V. Cantor has been appointed Assistant Medical Officer in the place of Dr. Alexander Ross who had resigned.

The Annual "At Home" and Tennis Tournament were held on Wednesday, the 3rd of July.

In the month of May the Bishop of Portsmouth officiated at an open-air Confirmation Service for several patients who were unable to leave their beds.

Friends of the Society who have visited King George's Sanatorium at Bramshott will learn with regret that, during one of the recent gales, all the magnificent cedars which towered over the south lawn were blown down. In all no fewer than nineteen trees of various kinds were uprooted on the estate.

ANGAS HOME.

This Home, so generously provided by Mrs. Angas, continues to prove a haven of rest where the sailor can renew his health and strength before returning to his arduous calling afloat.

The Mayoress of Greenwich very kindly opened the Annual Fête on Saturday, the 6th July, the anniversary of the inauguration of the Home, and the occasion was attended with its usual success.

SOUTHAMPTON DOCKS DISPENSARY.

Dr. Bernard Bourke, who some years ago was a House Surgeon at the Dreadnought Hospital, and who is now in practice in Southampton, has been appointed Medical Officer to this new branch.

Trust Funds of the Seamen's Hospital Society.

THE "WILLIAM HOLLINS" FUND. 1865.

Mr. WILLIAM HOLLINS, of Over Wallop, Southampton, left £500 3 per cent Reduced Bank Annuities (now $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent Consols), under the following proviso:—"That the sum should be invested in the Public Stocks or Funds of Great Britain, and 'kept apart as a fund to be called *William Hollins Fund*,' the dividends to be applied in carrying on and supporting the charitable designs of the Society." Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £12 10s.

THE "GEORGE STURGE" FUND. 1884.

Mr. GEORGE STURGE, of Woodthorpe, Sydenham Hill Road, Kent, executed a Deed of Trust providing for the payment to the Seamen's Hospital Society of £694 L.N.E.R. 4 per cent First Preference Stock, representing £744 11s. 7d., under the following conditions, viz.:—

"In giving the sum of £744 11s. 7d for a Samaritan Fund for the above Hospital, Mr. STURGE gives it on the conditions that this Fund shall be *kept entirely separate* from the general funds of the Hospital, and that the income shall be paid to or applied for such In-patients as may be necessitous, and within three months from their discharge from the Hospital, and for the purpose of their having necessary nourishment or change of air.

"Mr. STURGE hopes that this Fund may be made known, and that others may be induced to subscribe to it." Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £27 15s.

THE "JAMES DAVID DINSDALE" FUND. 1891.

Mr. DINSDALE, of Whitby, Yorks, bequeathed £100 to the Seamen's Hospital Society, with the following conditions:—"Upon trust to invest the same in any of the Public Stocks or Funds of Great Britain, or upon Government or Real Securities in England or Wales . . . and that the annual income of the last-mentioned sum of one hundred pounds . . . shall for ever hereafter be applied towards the general purposes of the above Society." Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £2 10s.

THE "JOHN H. LUSCOMBE" MEMORIAL FUND. 1897.

This Fund of £100 was established in the year 1897 to benefit sick Seamen on leaving the Hospitals of the Seamen's Hospital Society, and to keep in remembrance the name of the late JOHN H. LUSCOMBE, Esq., the interest whereof to be for ever applied in the above-mentioned manner by the Committee of the Seamen's Hospital Society. Invested in the purchase of £62 10s. 3d. 5 per cent War Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £3 2s. 6d.

THE "AMERICAN VICTORIA JUBILEE" FUND. 1897.

To commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, the American citizens in London contributed, by means of the AMERICAN VICTORIA JUBILEE FUND, a sum of £1,000 for the endowment of a bed, to be named the "Queen Victoria Bed," in the Society's Branch Hospital in the Royal Victoria and Albert Docks. Invested in the purchase of £894 17s. £2 15s. per cent (now $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent) Consolidated Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £22 7s. 4d.

THE "ANNE DU BOIS" MEMORIAL FUND. 1902.

This Fund of £45 was established in the year 1902 by Miss ESTHER DU BOIS, deceased, in "Fond Memory of Anne Du Bois." Invested in the purchase of £48 7s. 5d. £2 15s. per cent (now $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent) Consolidated Stock. A further sum of £40 invested in purchase of £49 16s. 6d. Consolidated Stock was received in 1910. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £2 9s.

THE "ARGONAUT" BED. 1906.

This Fund of £1,000 was established by SIR HENRY LUNN, the Passengers and Officers of the Steam Yacht "Argonaut," 1902-1906, to endow in perpetuity a bed in the Branch Hospital of the Seamen's Hospital Society. Invested in the purchase of £1,152 14s. 9d. £2 10s. per cent Consolidated Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £28 16s. 4d.

THE "BERTHA" FUND. 1907.

This Fund has been established by an anonymous donor towards the endowment of a cot in the Children's Ward of the Dreadnought Hospital, to be called "The Bertha Cot." £216 16s. Metropolitan Water Board 3 per cent Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £6 10s. 2d.

THE "WALTER ADAMS" MEMORIAL. 1907.

"To commemorate his service of thirty-five years in the Seamen's Hospital, his fellow-workers have raised a fund to bear his name and to augment the benefits of the Samaritan Fund, which he managed with so deep and thoughtful an interest in the cause of sick and needy seamen." 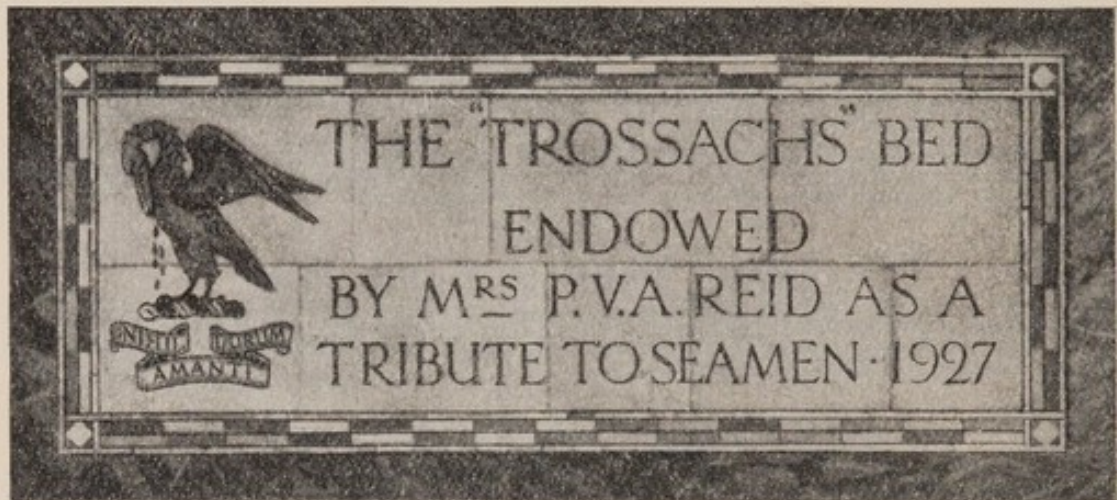

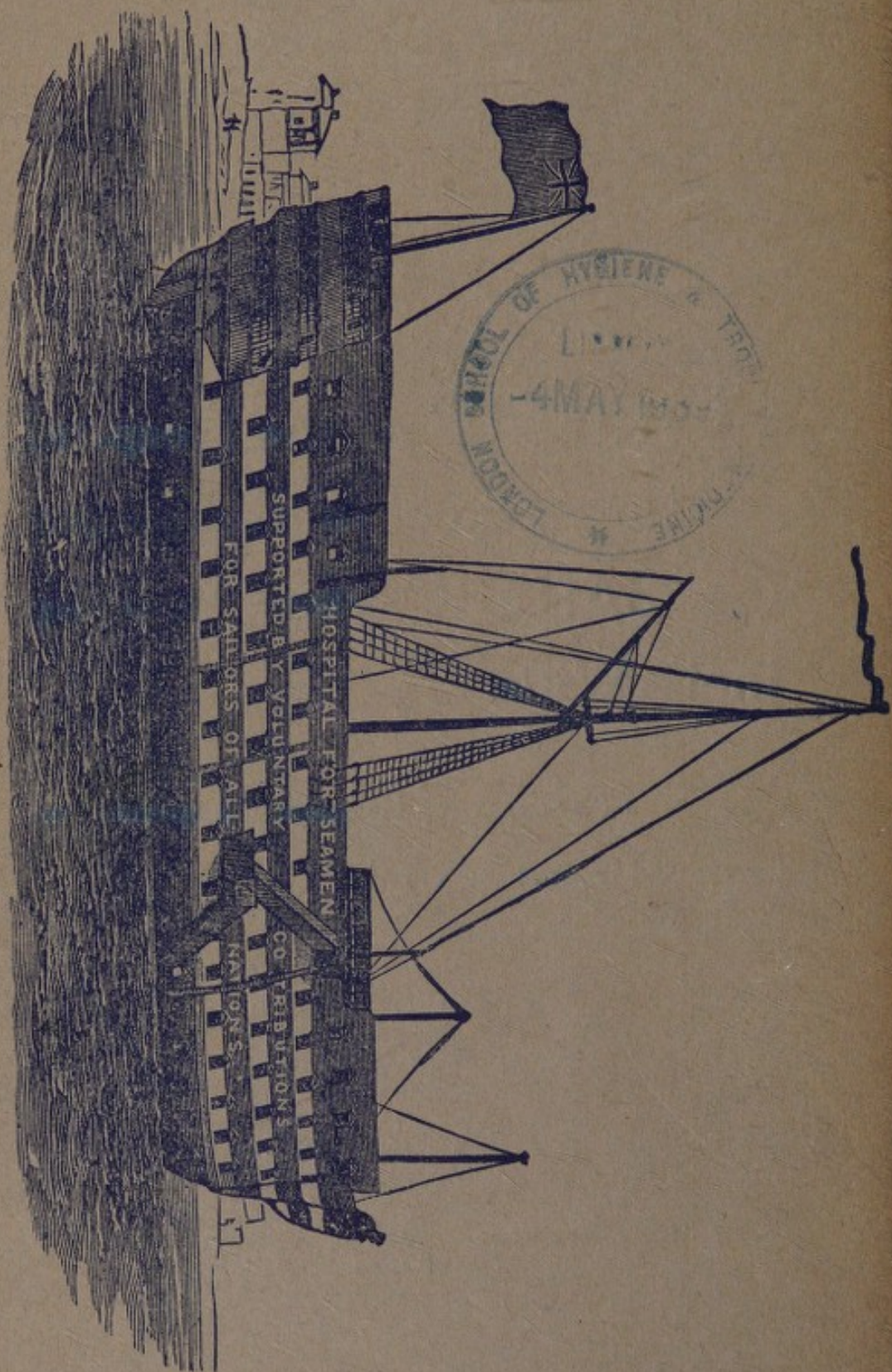
