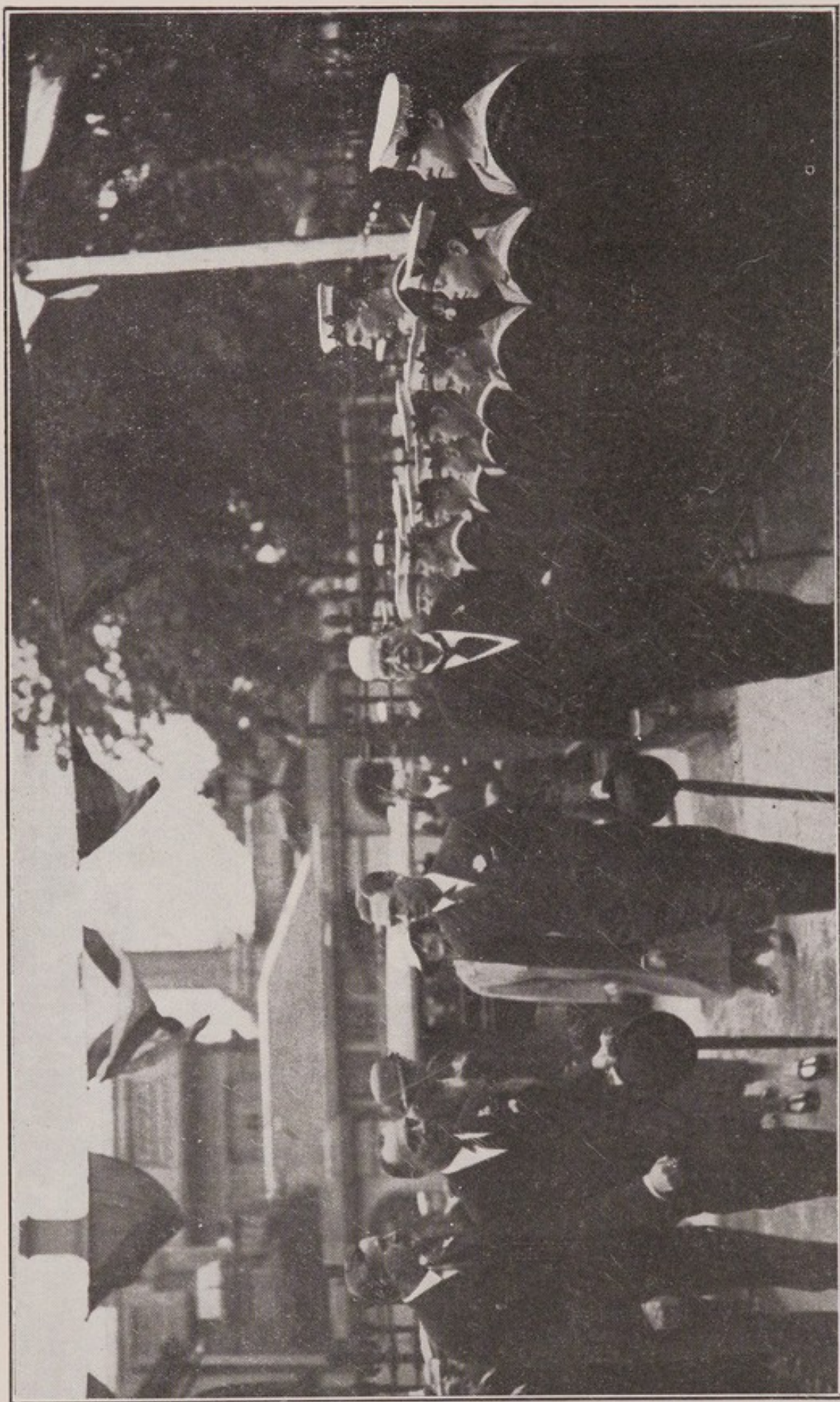

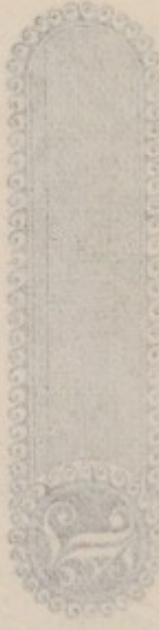

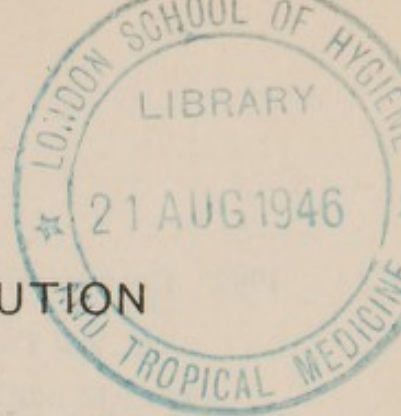

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1932.

THE Board of Management presents herewith the 112th Annual Report of the Society.

Most people said farewell to the year 1932 without regret and so far as the Seamen's Hospital Society is concerned no one connected with it will quarrel with that attitude of mind.

It was essential to cut down expenditure wherever that was feasible and the statement of accounts shows that this painful operation has been successfully performed. Economies have been effected in every possible direction and the ordinary expenditure has accordingly fallen from £104,415 7s. 8d. to £93,762 9s. 0d. This reduction has been arrived at firstly, by a saving of £2,800 by the closing of the Queen Alexandra Memorial Hospital; secondly, by a saving of £2,250 incurred on reconstruction and repainting at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases which fell to be paid in 1931; thirdly, by a diminution of £1,400 in Bank charges owing to the realisation of general securities, thus reducing the Bank overdraft; and fourthly, by cutting down to an absolute minimum the expenditure in respect of painting, repairs and maintenance.

As was to be anticipated, the ordinary income has also fallen to some extent, but taking all things into consideration the fall has not been so bad as might have been expected, the figures for 1931 being £85,740 9s. 10d., and for 1932 £84,188 14s. 0d.

There has been a big drop in the extraordinary income (*i.e.*, Legacies) which in 1931 amounted to £22,763 16s. 3d., and in 1932 only £3,018 4s. 7d. The Society was fortunate enough in 1931 to receive an exceptionally large bequest from the estate of the late Miss M. E. Kay amounting to £14,075 3s. 5d.

The result of the year's work, therefore, shows that there is still an excess of expenditure over income of some £9,500 in round figures. If legacies are taken into account the adverse balance is reduced to £6,500.

This of course is still far from satisfactory but it should be pointed out that the full effect of certain economies and steps taken for increasing income will not show themselves until the next accounting year. Thus a graded and small reduction has been made in salaries and wages, this, however, only took effect as from 1st November. In a full year this reduction will result in a saving of about £450.

Moreover, the hospital at Marseilles was still being carried on for seven months of the year under review and involved an excess of expenditure over income of £3,500. Nearly the whole of this will be saved in 1933.

There has been, too, a sad falling off in the number of paying patients at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases, due to the world depression, which kept away undoubtedly a certain number of patients, and also prevented others from paying full maintenance charges. There has also been a much smaller flow of persons home from the East than usual. Steps have, however, now been taken which will, it is hoped, bring the Hospital into touch with a larger number of tropical cases needing treatment in London than has hitherto been the case, and it is hoped that this branch of the Society will be able to show a better record in the coming year.

The Society has also suffered considerable loss of income by reason of having to sell the greater portion of its general purposes investments to pay for the alterations and extensions of the Dreadnought Hospital, and it is to be noted that there will in the future be a reduction of nearly £800 from Endowments owing to the reduced rate of interest payable on War Stock.

The Queen Alexandra Memorial Hospital, Marseilles, was closed in July. The Board were forced to this decision with much regret, but the Hospital had always been a costly one to administer and maintain and the percentage of beds occupied remained very low, and since the serious decline in the value of the pound sterling in France, the burden became intolerable.

The Board wish to thank all those who have supported the Marseilles Hospital.

They also owe a deep debt of gratitude to the local Advisory Committee with whom they have always worked in the greatest harmony during the $4\frac{1}{2}$ years that the Hospital was in the care of the Seamen's Hospital Society.

The members of the Honorary Medical Staff (all of them French Doctors) gave most loyal and whole-hearted service and the Hospital is particularly indebted to Dr. Hawthorn (French, despite his name) for his devoted work in the interests of the Institution.

It is with deep regret that the Board record the death of Major C. P. Gardner, I.A. (retd.) who had been Secretary of the Queen Alexandra Memorial Hospital since its opening. He died in the Hospital for Tropical Diseases, on the 2nd November.

The closing of the Dispensary at Southampton, was a further step in saving expense. It was felt that the number of patients attending there hardly justified the maintenance of the establishment.

The Society has suffered loss by the death of two Vice-Presidents during the year—the Earl of Inchcape and Dr. T. Irvine Rowell.

Lord Inchcape, who died on 22nd May last, was elected a Vice-President in 1921, in recognition of the great services he had rendered in founding King George's Sanatorium for

Sailors, at Bramshott. He also took a keen interest in the Society's branch Hospital at Tilbury.

Dr. T. Irvine Rowell, who died on the 18th July last, at the advanced age of 91, served as a member of the Board from 1900 to 1913 when he was elected a Vice-President. His interests were chiefly concerned with the Hospital for Tropical Diseases, and the London School of Tropical Medicine, and he rendered much assistance in connection with these Institutions.

With deep sorrow the Board record the death of their Consulting Surgeon—Mr. Lawrie Hugh McGavin. Mr. McGavin was elected to the honorary medical staff as Surgeon with charge of In-patients at the Albert Dock Hospital, in the year 1902. In 1905 he was appointed Surgeon on the Visiting Staff of the Dreadnought Hospital, and this office he held until 1921, when he resigned on account of ill health. The Board then elected him Consulting Surgeon. He died at Folkestone, on the 31st October, 1932, at the age of 63.

The Board also regret to announce the death of the Consulting Dental Surgeon at Tilbury Hospital—Mr. G. J. Lucas, which took place on 10th July. Mr. Lucas had been associated with that Hospital from the year 1896, long before it was taken over by the Seamen's Hospital Society.

The following ladies have honoured the Society by accepting the office of Vice-President: Mrs. Angas, Lady Houston, D.B.E., and the Countess of Inchcape.

Mrs. Angas is an old friend and a generous supporter of the Society and is the Founder of the Convalescent Home at Cudham, which she presented in 1918, and which bears her name. Lady Houston is known throughout the Empire as a great public benefactress and an enthusiastic supporter of all patriotic efforts. Lady Inchcape has shared the late Lord Inchcape's deep interest in the welfare of the sailor. Lord

Inchcape enabled the Society to open King George's Sanatorium for Sailors at Bramshott, and both he and Lady Inchcape have given generously to the Tilbury Hospital.

The Annual Court was held at the Dreadnought Hospital, on Wednesday, the 8th of June, H.R.H. The Duke of York presiding. The meeting took place in a marquee in the grounds on the north lawn of the Hospital.

After the Court His Royal Highness declared open the new Out-Patient Department, the new Operating Theatres, and the three new Surgical Wards—the "Viscountess Devonport Ward," the "Arthur Clarke Ward," and "King George's Fund for Sailors" Ward. About 600 to 700 governors and friends of the Society were present, including Admiral of the Fleet Sir Roger Keyes.

In April last a Ball was held at the Miramar Hotel, Cannes, on behalf of the Society. This was attended by Admiral Sir Ernle Chatfield, the Commander in Chief, and Officers of the Mediterranean Fleet, and many leading Society people. Lord Derby was kind enough to give the function his patronage and to be present, and Sir Albert Levy also attended and gave a most generous contribution to the Society, which is spread over a period of twenty-two years.

The Board wish to acknowledge publicly their gratitude to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty who, bearing in

mind the difficult times through which the Society is passing, have remitted during the next ten years the rent of £200 per annum payable for the Greenwich property.

The Board are glad to be able to announce that a sum of £1,000 has been contributed by the friends of the late Captain Sir Arthur Clarke for the endowment of a bed in his memory at the Dreadnought Hospital, for which he had done so much.

The Society has also received a generous gift of £5,000 from the Executors to the Will of the late Miss E. W. Allen, £2,000 of this to be devoted to the endowment of two beds in the Dreadnought Hospital, and £3,000 to be allocated to the Building Fund of that Hospital.

The Board gratefully acknowledge the endowment of a bed at Greenwich in memory of James Wootton, C.B., R.N., by a legacy of £1,000 bequeathed to the Hospital by his widow.

It is very gratifying to the Board to learn that an increasing number of patients are now members of the Hospital Saving Association. This means much to the Society in its present financial difficulties and it is hoped that the membership of that Association will continue to grow.

The Board take this opportunity to convey their sense of indebtedness to all those who have by their generosity enabled them to maintain the various establishments for the

care of the sailor, to the Honorary Medical Staff and the Nursing Staff for their devoted and loyal work on behalf of the patients, and to the Chaplains, Ministers and Pastors, who visit the wards of the Society's Hospitals.

The Board also tender their deep gratitude to the Seamen's Hospital Aid Committee, who are engaged in raising a fund for endowing another bed in memory of Sir Arthur Clarke ; to the Seamen's Hospital Entertainment Committee for their work for the Albert Dock Hospital ; to the Tilbury Hospital Committee at Grays and Tilbury, and to the Ladies' Linen Leagues associated with the various Hospitals.

Warm thanks are due to Miss Swanzy and her colleagues for their devoted work at the Dreadnought in taking charge of the Patients' Library and attending to the circulation of the books.

The Board also gratefully acknowledge a gift of £50 from Mr. Robert Imeson which he has given for investment so as to ensure an income equivalent to the annual subscription of £2 2s. 0d. which he has paid for many years to the Society.

The Society has also received, through Dr. Arthur Davies, an anonymous gift of £500, half to be expended for the benefit of the Pathological Department, and half for the Dreadnought Hospital. The Board tender their sincere thanks to this anonymous donor.

Thanks are also due to the Chamber of Shipping of the United Kingdom for so generously placing their Board Room at the disposal of the Society for its Monthly Board Meetings, and to the Orient Steam Navigation Company and the Tilbury Contracting and Dredging Company for the regular use of rooms for Sub-Committee Meetings.

Last, but by no means least, a word of appreciation and gratitude must be given to the British Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service and those many blood donors who have volun-

teered their services. The public at large surely does not know of the self-sacrificing work that is done in this connection for hospital patients.

T.R.H. the Duke and Duchess of York have graciously consented to be present on the occasion of the "Dreadnought" Ball, to be held at the Dorchester Hotel, on Tuesday, the 23rd of May, in aid of the funds of the Society.

It is hoped that all friends of the Charity will rally round their Admiral President on this occasion and so help the "Dreadnought" to weather the financial storm.

The Board are proud to report that Sir Leslie Wilson has been appointed Governor of Queensland. Though unable to take so active a part as formerly in the work of the Society he still takes the deepest interest in its work and hopes to resume his attendance at the Board Meetings on his return.

Mr. Charles E. H. Lloyd, the Assistant Secretary, resigned his appointment at the end of the year and is now working in connection with the British Hospitals Association. Mr. Lloyd's cheery presence and personality is much missed, and he has left behind a host of friends.

Mr. B. W. Greenup, B.A., Cantab., has been appointed Steward in the place of Mr. H. R. Rowe whose retirement was announced in last year's Report.

DREADNOUGHT HOSPITAL.

There have been but few changes on the Visiting Staff of the Dreadnought Hospital during the year. Dr. Dixon, the Assistant Radiologist, resigned his post owing to the many other calls upon his time, and he has been succeeded by Mr. G. T. Calthrop. Dr. de Caux has also resigned his appointment as Anæsthetist owing to pressure of work.

Dr. W. Ogilvy Reid has been elected Medical Superintendent in the place of Dr. J. Walker Wilson who held that office for three years.

On Wednesday, 27th April, Sir Malcolm Campbell kindly attended a ceremony at the Dreadnought Hospital when the fleet of two motor ambulances and a laundry van, the gift of the Seamen's Hospital Aid Committee, were formally handed over to the Society. Sir Malcolm Campbell named these Ambulances : "Grampus" and "Dreadnought."

A tablet in the Dreadnought Hospital Chapel, to the memory of the late Mr. Arthur Parsons, Radiographer from 1909—1928, was unveiled by the Rev. W. T. Money, the Rural Dean of Greenwich, on Wednesday, the 15th June. The Service was conducted by the Rev. O. Thomas, Vicar of Greenwich, and the Rev. R. H. V. Brougham, Chaplain to the Dreadnought.

The Annual Nurses' Prizegiving and Reunion took place on Wednesday, the 22nd June, when Captain Hughes presided and Lady Lloyd very kindly presented medals and prizes to the following nurses :—

The Ladies' Remembrance League held their Annual Meeting in the Devonport Nurses' Home, on Thursday, the 10th of November, under the presidency of the Mayor of Greenwich, Colonel H. A. Newington, D.S.O., Lady Clarke, the President of the League, was present and spoke, and there was a large attendance of members of the League and friends of the Society. A cheque for £61 8s. 8d. was handed over by Mrs. Manson Bahr, the Chairman of the League, making the total contribution for the year, £150.

The Australian Fruit Growers' Association have once again made a most generous gift of Christmas fruit. Lady Corry very kindly attended the Hospital on Friday, the 9th December, to "Stir the Christmas Pudding."

Dr. John Sainsbury has made a gift of a diathermy apparatus on behalf of a grateful patient, and has himself contributed towards a carbon arc lamp for the Massage Department of the Dreadnought Hospital.

ALBERT DOCK HOSPITAL.

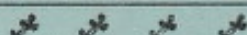

IX.) the Society is empowered to receive any Moneys, Messuages, Lands, Tenements, Rents, Annuities, &c., whatsoever, not exceeding the value of £12,000 per Annum, in addition to any sums of Money to any amount, and any Goods, Ships, &c., of whatever value, which may be given or bequeathed to it from time to time.

Colonel F. Percival Mackie, C.S.I., O.B.E., M.D., M.Sc., D.P.H., F.R.C.S., F.R.C.P., has joined this Hospital as Pathologist. The Society is fortunate to be able to add to its Staff a man of such distinction in his profession.

In connection with the centenary of the Ascent of the Niger by Macgregor Laird, a sum of £106 13s. 2d. has been presented to the Seamen's Hospital Society in aid of the Hospital for Tropical Diseases. A tablet is to be erected in the Hospital in memory of Macgregor Laird.

The Hospital also was largely responsible for the undertaking of a performance of "Androcles and the Lion," at the Rudolf Steiner Hall, on December 1st, in aid of the Seamen's Hospital Society which, due to the admirable Committee work under Lady Corry and with the help of Mrs. F. Sassoon and C. E. H. Lloyd, Esq., was attended with conspicuous success.

TILBURY HOSPITAL.

The Staff of the Hospital has been augmented by the appointment of Dr. Charles Sundell (Senior Physician at the Dreadnought Hospital) as Consulting Physician.

KING GEORGE'S SANATORIUM.

The Annual Sale and Tennis Party took place in the grounds of the Sanatorium on Saturday, the 25th June. The weather was particularly fine and the function was largely attended.

ANGAS HOME.

The Annual Fête was held at the Home on Saturday, 2nd July (the nearest Saturday to the anniversary of the date of the opening of the Home). Her Worship the Mayor of Greenwich, Mrs. Turner, J.P., declared the Fête open, and there was a large attendance of visitors and friends of the Home.

The Home owes a deep debt of gratitude to Messrs. Alfred Holt & Co. (the Blue Funnel Line), for their kindness in arranging for the Flag Staff to be re-painted and kept in proper repair.

THE "WILLIAM HOLLINS" FUND. 1865.

Mr. WILLIAM HOLLINS, of Over Wallop, Southampton, left £500 3 per cent Reduced Bank Annuities (now £350 17s. 6d. 3½ per cent War Stock), under the following proviso:—"That the sum should be invested in the Public Stocks or Funds of Great Britain, and 'kept apart as a fund to be called *William Hollins Fund*,' the dividends to be applied in carrying on and supporting the charitable designs of the Society." THE "GEORGE STURGE" FUND. 1884.

Mr. GEORGE STURGE, of Woodthorpe, Sydenham Hill Road, Kent, executed a Deed of Trust providing for the payment to the Seamen's Hospital Society of £694 L.N.E.R. 4 per cent First Preference Stock, representing £744 11s. 7d., under the following conditions, viz.:—

"In giving the sum of £744 11s. 7d. for a Samaritan Fund for the above Hospital, Mr. STURGE gives it on the conditions that this Fund shall be *kept entirely separate* from the general funds of the Hospital, and that the income shall be paid to or applied for such In-patients as may be necessitous, and within three months from their discharge from the Hospital, and for the purpose of their having necessary nourishment or change of air.

"Mr. STURGE hopes that this Fund may be made known, and that others may be induced to subscribe to it." Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds."

THE "JAMES DAVID DINSDALE" FUND. 1891.

Mr. DINSDALE, of Whitby, Yorks, bequeathed £100 to the Seamen's Hospital Society, with the following conditions:—"Upon trust to invest the same in any of the Public Stocks or Funds of Great Britain, or upon Government or Real Securities in England or Wales . . . and that the annual income of the last-mentioned sum of one hundred pounds . . . shall for ever hereafter be applied towards the general purposes of the above Society." THE "AMERICAN VICTORIA JUBILEE" FUND. 1897.

To commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, the American citizens in London contributed, by means of the AMERICAN VICTORIA JUBILEE FUND, a sum of £1,000 for the endowment of a bed, to be named the "Queen Victoria Bed," in the Society's Branch Hospital in the Royal Victoria and Albert Docks. Invested in the purchase of £894 17s. 0d. £2 15s. per cent (now 2½ per cent) Consolidated Stock (now £627 19s. 3d. 3½ per cent War Stock). Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds."

THE "ANNE DU BOIS" MEMORIAL FUND. 1902.

This Fund of £82 16s. 6d. was established in the year 1902 by Miss ESTHER DU BOIS, deceased, in "Fond Memory of Anne Du Bois." Invested in the purchase of £48 7s. 5d. £2 15s. per cent (now 2½ per cent) Consolidated Stock. A further sum of £40 invested in purchase of £49 16s. 6d. Consolidated Stock was received in 1910 (now £68 18s. 2d. 3½ per cent War Stock). Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds."

THE "ARGONAUT" BED. 1906.

This Fund of £1,000 was established by SIR HENRY LUNN, the Passengers and Officers of the Steam Yacht "Argonaut," 1902-1906, to endow in perpetuity a bed in the Branch Hospital of the Seamen's Hospital Society. Invested in the purchase of £1,152 14s. 9d. £2 10s. per cent Consolidated Stock (now £808 18s. 8d. 3½ per cent War Stock). Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds."

THE "BERTHA" FUND. 1907.

This Fund has been established by an anonymous donor towards the endowment of a cot in the Children's Ward of the Dreadnought Hospital, to be called "The Bertha Cot." £216 16s. Metropolitan Water Board 3 per cent Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds."

THE "WALTER ADAMS" MEMORIAL. 1907.

"To commemorate his service of thirty-five years in the Seamen's Hospital, his fellow-workers have raised a fund to bear his name and to augment the benefits of the Samaritan Fund, which he managed with so deep and thoughtful an interest in the cause of sick and needy seamen." THE "LADY HARRIETTE ANN McILWRAITH FUND." 1909.

This Fund was created by a gift of One Thousand Pounds from LADY McILWRAITH, of Welldoes, Harrow Weald, Middlesex, to endow in perpetuity a Medical Bed in the Dreadnought Hospital of the Seamen's Hospital Society, in memory of her husband, the Honourable SIR THOMAS McILWRAITH, K.C.M.G., LL.D., who was three times Premier of Queensland, and who died in 1900. £1,134 15s. New South Wales 3 per cent.

It is a condition of the Trust that a Scotsman shall always have priority of right to this bed.

Invested in the purchase of 3 per cent New South Wales Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds."

THE "ANNIE ZUNZ" FUND. 1910.

This Fund was created by a gift of £3,000 from the Trustees of the "Zunz Bequest" for the endowment in perpetuity of a Ward on the Somerset Floor of the Dreadnought Hospital, in memory of ANNIE ZUNZ. Invested in the purchase of £3,625 7s. 7d. India 3 per cent Stock.

THE "GEORGE BUSK" MEMORIAL FUND. 1911.

THE "LAW" MEMORIAL FUND. 1911.

Dr. JOHN LAW, late Brigade Surgeon in the Indian Medical Service, has created this Fund by a gift of £1,000, to name and endow a bed in perpetuity in the Dreadnought Hospital of the Seamen's Hospital Society. The Bed will be known as the "John Law" Bed, and is primarily intended for the use of natives of India. Invested in the purchase of £1,041 13s. 4d. India 3½ per cent Stock. THE "FRASER" FUND. 1911.

Mrs. FRASER, widow of the late T. H. £100 to provide a Medal to be awarded to the Nurse at the Albert Dock Hospital who comes out first in the annual examination in Tropical Medical Nursing.

THE "WILLIAM BEVAN" BED. 1915.

Named in the Dreadnought Hospital, Greenwich, in memory of the late WILLIAM BEVAN, Esq., who, subject to some life interests, bequeathed all his London County Council Stock in trust for the Seamen's Hospital, Greenwich.

THE "S. A. OXTOBY" BED. 1915.

The late Miss S. A. OXTOBY left a considerable sum at the discretion of her Executors for distribution to Charitable Institutions. The surviving Trustee, Mr. H. J. Jeffery, decided to devote £1,000 to the endowment of a bed in the Dreadnought Hospital, to be known in perpetuity as the S. A. OXTOBY BED. This fund was created, and the gift has been invested in £1,021 0s. 11d. Victoria Government 4½ per cent Inscribed Stock, 1940-60.

REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS AT ANNUAL COURT

HELD AT THE

DREADNOUGHT HOSPITAL, GREENWICH, S.E.10.

ON WEDNESDAY, 17TH MAY, 1933, AT 3.30 P.M.

IN THE CHAIR

ADMIRAL SIR ERNLE CHATFIELD, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., C.V.O.

(FIRST SEA LORD OF THE ADMIRALTY).

The RT. HON. LORD LLOYD OF DOLOBRAN, P.C., G.C.S.I., G.C.I.E., D.S.O. (*Chairman of the Committee of Management*): My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, it is a great pleasure to welcome at the "Dreadnought" to-day the First Sea Lord, Sir Ernle Chatfield, who must be gratified to see such a fine assembly here to meet him. As you know, Sir Ernle has had a very distinguished career, but he has also found time to be a good friend to the Seamen's Hospital Society.

I should like to add a word of welcome also to Sir Burton Chadwick, Deputy Master of the Honourable Company of Master Mariners, who has been kind enough to come here to speak to us.

This is the centenary year of the Incorporation, by Act of Parliament, of the Seamen's Hospital Society. The Society was actually founded in 1821, but it was incorporated in 1833. We have had a great many difficulties recently, and by severe retrenchment and economy we have reduced our expenditure by no less than £11,000 a year, but we have still an excess of expenditure over income of some £9,500, and that that disagreeable situation is not even worse is largely due to you, ladies and gentlemen, and to others who are unable to be with us to-day, who have done so much in the past to help us. You will realise the very specific duties which devolve upon the Seamen's Hospital Society as the main agency for dealing with seamen's ailments. We are anxious not to limit our activities any further, and therefore we have to go ahead and find the money.

Unfortunately, we have had to close down, to our very great regret, our hospital at Marseilles. We all remember the splendid devotion and energy of those ladies and gentlemen who helped to found that hospital towards the close of the War. But we have had an annual deficit at Marseilles of something like £6,000 a year and, with the additional trouble of a depreciated currency, we simply could not continue to face it. I think you will perhaps regret the step a little less when I tell you that, owing to the depression in shipping, for the last few years, we have only had an average of twenty beds occupied out of sixty.

We shall have to face a considerable expenditure shortly at the Albert Dock Hospital, which is situated in the very heart of this great port and treats a large number of accident and emergency cases. Unfortunately, it was built on piles, so that the central part of the hospital is rapidly falling down. There is no question but that we shall have to rebuild the whole of the central block, and where we are to find £12,000 for that purpose, I do not know, unless you, ladies and gentlemen, can help us. We have here to-day one or two members of the Port of London Authority, and as the Port of London is so much in their keeping I am sure they cannot possibly resent an original

suggestion on my part, and that is that that large and august corporation, who have already shown us so much sympathy and helped us in the past, might consider whether they could not advance us the sum required for re-building the Albert Dock Hospital, charging us a reasonable interest, which we would certainly be prepared to pay. These are hard times, but the Seamen's Hospital Society does honestly feel that it is fulfilling a very important public function in caring for the seamen, which should be one of our first cares in this country; we therefore beg and pray that that great Authority will listen to my words, however obliquely these may reach them to-day.

We have been honoured this year in a very special manner. We have taken a step in conformity with the times. That is to say, we used to confine our Vice-Presidents to one sex alone, and we have never had a lady as a Vice-President. But if we were to make a change in that direction I think you will consider that we started well. I need not say anything about Mrs. Angas, to whom we owe our Convalescent Home. (Loud applause.) She has been good enough to honour the Society by saying she will become one of the first lady Vice-Presidents. But the list does not end there. We have also persuaded a lady whose patriotism is very well known—I refer to Lady Houston, whose interest in anything that pertains to the welfare of her country is widely recognised and she did not hesitate for a moment when I asked her if she would become a Vice-President of this Society; she authorised me to say she would be glad and even proud to become one. (Applause.) Lady Houston has, unfortunately, been too ill to pay a visit to the hospital since she became a Vice-President, but I hope, as soon as she recovers, to be able to persuade her to come down here and see what it is she is presiding over. I should like to send a message from this Seamen's Hospital Society Annual Court to wish her a very speedy return to health. (Applause.) The third lady Vice-President—and this concludes the list—is Lady Inchcape; and there, again, I need say nothing about Lady Inchcape and the interest which both she and the late Lord Inchcape have shown in the welfare of this hospital. (Hear, hear.) I am sure we shall wish to send her a message of gratitude and thanks for the honour she has done us in accepting the office. (Applause.)

And now, ladies and gentlemen, I should like to refer to the event that is taking place on the eve of Empire Day—23rd May—at the Dorchester Hotel, where we are having a big Ball, called the "Dreadnought Ball," which our President, the Duke of York, and the Duchess of York are attending. I need not tell you that the purpose of the Ball is to raise funds, and I hope everybody here to-day will be present on that occasion. If they are prevented from attending, I hope it will not prevent them from taking a ticket. (Laughter.)

That is the whole of my story, except that I have to say this—we have an energetic Board who are doing their very best for the work of the hospital. We are sailing through these rather anxious and difficult times with great optimism, and I am sure that when we spread our net wider, as we are preparing to do by a new method of publicity, our financial requirements will be met. I should like to say here how grateful we are to the Press for the help it has given us all the time and particularly recently. Personally I feel that you could not have an easier thing to appeal for than the English sailor.

Finally, Sir Ernle, I should like to convey to you from this large audience to-day, our grateful thanks for the honour you have done us by coming down here in your official capacity as First Sea Lord, accompanied by Lady Chatfield. (Applause.)

I now have to move: "That the Right Hon. Lord Essendon be elected a Vice-President of the Society and that the following be elected Honorary Life Governors:—Miss G. E. Goodfellow, Mr. H. S. Clark, Mr. C. E. Hitchcock Mr. E. G. Spencer.

The resolution was unanimously agreed to.

THE CHAIRMAN: Lord Lloyd, my Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have to move the following resolution: "That the Report be adopted and circulated under the direction of the Committee of Management, together with the Balance Sheet and Accounts, as audited, and that the Officers of the Society as printed in the Report now presented to the Governors, be elected for the ensuing year."

I am very proud that I should have been asked to preside at this Annual Court to-day. I am glad, and I think every sailor is glad, to come home to Greenwich, for it has been our home so often. I have very early recollections of Greenwich, some of which are not very pleasant. I remember one incident when I was a lieutenant and I had to bring a cricket team in a destroyer from Sheerness to Greenwich, and being very proud of being put in command of a destroyer—which I had never been before—I came up at full speed. Fortunately, it was only 20 knots an hour in those days, but that was quite sufficient. I was quite delighted when I heard the barges shouting and cheering, as I thought, when I went past. Some little time afterwards my attention was called to a paragraph in an evening newspaper which was headed "Destroyer runs amok in the Thames" (laughter). Thanks very largely to that publicity I was brought to the notice of the higher powers and I have risen to the position I now occupy. (Laughter.) So I look back upon Greenwich as being a great help to me in my career.

I am here this afternoon both as an Admiralty Official and as a sailor, and I am very pleased to be here in either capacity. The Admiralty has always taken a great interest in this Society, and it is a very proper thing for it to do so.

It was the Admiralty that gave you your three hospital ships, the "Grampus," the "Dreadnought" and the "Caledonia," and lent you this building for a consideration in 1870. It is the "Caledonia," renamed "Dreadnought," which you have depicted on your posters and in your booklets. I feel certain that the artist little knew when he painted her how much good he was going to do, because the sight of that old three-decker is one of the things which stirs the minds of the British public more than anything else.

But I am sure you all feel that not only the Admiralty but the Naval Service as a whole will always take an interest in anything which is for the good and the well-being and the health of their brother sailors of the Mercantile Marine. (Applause.) The Mercantile Marine

and the Navy are, indeed, very closely knit together. If you walk round the modern wards which I have walked round this afternoon, and you look at all the modern advantages—comfort, airiness and everything else—you cannot help feeling sympathy for those old seamen who were put into what were for them conditions of luxury on the decks of those old ships. Nowadays there are a great many ships, both in the Mercantile Marine and the Royal Navy, which have not got doctors or medical assistance of any sort; they depend upon the amateur doctors who are the masters of the vessels or the captains of the destroyers. Many extraordinary things have happened under these circumstances. Perhaps you will not know the case, and I will not say whether it occurred in a man-of-war or a merchant ship, but a man fell and cut his head very badly, and there was the poor master, or captain, wondering what he was to do. He thought he must try to put in some stitches, and after some time succeeded in getting in six stitches. When they got to port they took the poor fellow to the hospital and when the bandages were removed they found that the wound was healed, but they could not find the stitches, and the conclusion they came to was that the master, or captain had forgotten to thread the needle. (Laughter.)

I am very glad to see around me here to-day a large number of naval officers taking a great interest in your Society. I know that many of my friends do so, and have always assisted you. One has only to look at the list of your Board and Management Committee to see that that is the case; and I am glad that it is so, because I think it is our duty to lend you a hand. I take some satisfaction as an official of the Admiralty in feeling that the Admiralty has been able to relieve you for the next ten years of the sum of money that is paid in rent for this building. (Applause.) And I am very glad that you were able to add the other day an artificial sunlight ward to your Sanatorium, which was very largely contributed to by the Sea Service.

But the Navy has also a great deal to thank you for. You took in our seamen in the War, and looked after them and cured them. There is another bond between us—the Navy has a first claim on the services of some of your nursing staff in war-time. You must remember too that the two sea services are complementary to each other. Without the Mercantile Marine in War the Navy would be unable to obtain its supplies of fuel and other requisite stores, and where should we find our mine-sweepers? And if there were no Navy, the Mercantile Marine would have no more security than the fishes in the sea, and I think we should have to alter the whole of our system. But even with an adequate Navy, there is only one way in which the security of the Mercantile Marine can be guaranteed in war, and that is by the indomitable seamanlike spirit of this country. (Applause.)

In commending to you the adoption of this report, I will conclude by reminding you that your Society had a small beginning. When in 1821 the old and maimed and injured seamen were patrolling the streets of London looking for help and receiving none, I have no doubt that the people who came to their rescue were exactly the same type of people as we have in this hall to-day. I am quite sure it was the same type of people who have kept the Society going for the 112 years since it was started, and it is only by the same spirit of self-sacrifice that it can be kept going in the future. Whatever you do, however hard you work for the succour of the seaman, you can anyhow have one feeling of satisfaction and that is that he is fully worthy of your efforts. (Loud applause.)

SIR BURTON CHADWICK (Deputy Master of the Honourable Company of Master Mariners), in seconding the resolution, said: "Mr. Chairman, my Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, looking back over a century of the devoted work of men and women in combating sickness and

disease amongst seamen, and particularly amongst merchant seamen, of whom I was one, I am with Sir Ernle Chatfield very happy to be taking part in the meeting of this great old seamen's institution. A survey of the work of the 'Dreadnought' Hospital must stir in the heart of any man the most profound admiration and gratitude for the fine and continuous record all down the years of a persistent attack against those two most dreaded enemies of the early days of which I am speaking and of the early days of your Society—I refer to scurvy and Yellow Jack. There are many of us still about to-day who, in our boyhood, remember those long, wearisome sailing-ship voyages, when there was nothing resembling fresh food and for many weeks at a time the small quantity of water we got was nearly putrid. We were therefore accustomed to take a drink of lime juice every day. That may not seem very exciting to you to-day, but lime juice was the cure or preventative provided in those ships against the dreaded disease of scurvy; and there are many in this room at this moment—I can see a few—who will recollect how strictly we used to go out every day at the change of the noon watch to get our ration of lime juice from the steward, which he had probably put in one of the wash-deck buckets. If you had to drink it to-day you would think it nasty, dirty, tepid stuff, but it was that that prevented scurvy, and it was owing to the efforts of this Society—it took the Society 30 years—that pressure was brought to bear on the Government and a law was brought in in 1867 that lime juice should be served on British merchant vessels as a regular thing. I believe it is correct to say that scurvy was almost unknown in the Royal Navy.

Some 20 years later we find this Society directing its attack to tropical diseases, amongst which is the dreaded fever of which I spoke—yellow fever—and similar things. For the work of the Society in regard to tropical diseases, not only seamen but the whole world is indebted to it and to other Societies of this kind with which were associated men like Sir Patrick Manson, Sir Ronald Ross, Sir Alfred Jones, and that great statesman, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, who, when he was at the Colonial Office, threw himself into this great work. (Applause.)

As I was reading through this report I was a little struck with the fact that the revenue of your Hospital for Tropical Diseases has fallen off this year; and in that connection I want to support every word that has fallen from Lord Lloyd in regard to the urgency of keeping up this hospital work for seamen. I am also going to call attention, with great respect, Mr. Bax, to the drafting of the particular clause on page 15 in regard to the Hospital for Tropical Diseases. It reads: "There has been, too, a sad falling off in the number of paying patients at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases." Well, at first sight that does not sound very saddening—I am only quoting it. The Clause itself when you read it is perfectly intelligible, because it points out that the falling off is owing to the strenuous times. It goes on to say: "There has also been a much smaller flow of persons home from the East than usual"—presumably persons suffering from tropical diseases—and at the end it says: "It is hoped that this branch of the Society will be able to show a better record in the coming year." (Laughter.) It is perfectly intelligible, but I think it is a misapplication of emphasis. They have inadvertently emphasised the financial side rather than the remedial side of the work. It reminds me of the small child who had to write down what were three articles which were most cheap and most useful in the daily work of the home, and amongst the articles she selected were ordinary pins. She was extremely anxious to write a good paper and after she had written all she could think of about pins, getting very sleepy she finished up like this: "Pins have also saved thousands of lives by people not swallowing them." (Laughter.) I hope Mr. Bax will forgive me for referring to this paragraph in the Report; I did so with very great respect in order to

give me an opportunity of hanging that little story upon it. (Laughter.)

It is now my duty to second the resolution. Sir Ernle Chatfield has made some interesting references to the "Dreadnought," I think I am right in saying that this "ship" at the present moment is the only one bearing that name, and she is very dear to the hearts of seamen all over the world. (Applause.)

The resolution was carried unanimously.

Mr. C. F. LEACH (Deputy Chairman of the Port of London Authority): Mr. Chairman, my Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, it is very fortunate that on this occasion the Society was able to prevail on Sir Ernle Chatfield to come and preside at this meeting on behalf of the Seamen's Hospital Society. We should like to thank him very sincerely for the extremely interesting address he has given us; I am sure it will inspire everybody and be most useful to the Society in future. No one can know better than Sir Ernle Chatfield the necessity for the provision of hospitals not only in this country but throughout the world. The needs of the sailor, wherever he goes, are immense. Many seamen have no home, they go to all sorts of strange places, and if they are ill it is a great satisfaction to them to know that there is a hospital to which they can be taken. We are very grateful to Sir Ernle because we know that he has the interests of the sailormen so much at heart. Secondly, he is the representative of the Admiralty, and the Society is extremely grateful for all the assistance the Admiralty has given to it. Only quite recently, as Sir Ernle has stated, the Admiralty has remitted for a period of ten years the rent of our premises, which is a very valuable present in these times when it is so difficult to collect subscriptions. Sir Ernle has referred to the very friendly relations that have always existed between the Admiralty and the Society, and I should like to say that that is very greatly appreciated. I should also like to refer to Lady Chatfield, because she has taken a very active part in promoting the Dreadnought Ball which is to be given at the Dorchester Hotel and which we hope will be a great success. Lord Lloyd has referred to the Port of London Authority and the Albert Dock Hospital. We know that the foundations are not very good, but whether anything can be done in the way Lord Lloyd indicated I do not quite know, and I prefer not to commit myself at the present time. Reference has been made to the very substantial economies which you have effected; I might mention that the Port of London Authority have also had to make economies, but we have not cut down the subscription of £500 we give to the Society, and I hope we shall not have to do so. (Applause.) I now have the pleasure in moving: "That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to Admiral Sir Ernle Chatfield for presiding."

Dr. C. E. SUNDELL (Senior Physician at the Dreadnought Hospital), in seconding the motion, said: My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen, it is a very great privilege to be allowed to second such a resolution as is now before you. But before doing so I want to take this opportunity—I might say this golden opportunity—which comes to us so rarely as members of the staff—and I represent my colleagues on the staff of this hospital and of the other hospitals supported by your Society—of coming into personal contact with the supporters to whom we owe so much. And lest you should be afraid that I am going to talk for a long time, I want to tell you a little story that is running in my mind of a junior barrister who was very ambitious and loquacious. He made a very long speech to the jury on one occasion, after which he sat down, pulled his robes around him and put on a smile of great satisfaction. His satisfaction, however, was short-lived, because the Judge on the Bench, in his genial way, looked down on him and said: "Mr. Chatterer, for a long time it has exercised my mind whether it is better

to say little and look a fool, or to say a lot and prove that you are a fool." (Laughter.) After that, I am quite sure you will not expect me to make a long speech.

Twelve months ago the man who was to make the speech which has devolved upon me to-day was unfortunately unable, through illness, to come, and that illness unfortunately went from bad to worse and in the course of a few months we lost him. I am referring, as you all know, to Mr. Lawrie McGavin. He was a surgeon to this Hospital and served it nobly for thirty years. I feel that a meeting like this ought not to take place without an expression of gratitude to him, remembering all that he did for the Hospital. I feel I ought also to pay tribute to another good friend, and this time there is not the same sad note about it. We have lost a friend, but she has not gone very far away. All of you who have had occasion to go to the Secretary's Office will have been struck by the smiling countenances of the ladies in blue. Those ladies were controlled quietly and unobtrusively by Miss Etherington. She served this Hospital as the Secretary's secretary, I believe, but to me she was the power behind the throne. She served the Hospital for forty years, and, as I say, she controlled these maidens in blue. I would not dare to say she controlled the Matron, but I know she controlled the staff sometimes, and I have a shrewd suspicion that there were occasions when she controlled Sir James Michelli. A few weeks ago Miss Etherington laid down her pencil and notebook, doffed her uniform and quietly slipped away. This is the first opportunity we have had of expressing to her our thanks and gratitude for the work she did for the Society, and of expressing the hope that she will have many years of happiness in her retirement. (Loud Applause.) Then I have another tribute to pay, and this is one that will come right home to all of you. It is a tribute from us, who represent the technical side of your work, to you and to those who have not been able to come to this meeting, who have put it into our power to do the work we do. We all know that the shipping world is going through a terribly trying time. There are men in the general wards of this hospital who have held masters' certificates for years. They have been unable to get a ship—some of them have shipped before the mast—anyhow, they have taken a very subordinate post in order to keep their families and dependants from absolute starvation. There are men of that type, I say, in the Hospital at the present moment, and it is only after they have been in for some time and one gets to know them, that the fact leaks out that they are really ship's officers, although they come in as members of the rank and file.

I was interested to hear the remarks of a previous speaker about scurvy. A few weeks ago I was called to the Hospital to see a man who had been admitted, desperately ill, but it was difficult to put a label to the disease. Of course it is our job to tie on the label, because we have had more experience. I came down and found a fine old boy in the last stages of starvation; his condition was one of scurvy. He was a sailor, but he had not got the scurvy at sea. He had been discharged from his ship in Liverpool and had tramped from there to Bristol, and from Bristol to London, and then he collapsed. He came to this Hospital very nearly a dying man. Well, you will be delighted to hear that he went out a sound man with a job to go to. (Applause.) That little incident gives me an opportunity of paying a tribute to our nursing staff, because the treatment that that old gentleman received in the hospital had nothing to do with the doctors, it was entirely a matter of nursing. His drug bill was something less than a halfpenny.

But we sometimes make heavy demands on your generosity. You all know the disease of pneumonia—a dreaded name. One of the leaders of our profession has called it the "captain of the men of death." There is a modern treatment of pneumonia which, given in suitable cases and in adequate amounts, will alter the chances of recovery from 2 to 1 against, to 3 to 4 in favour. That treatment has to be given in a concentrated form over a few days and it may easily cost £15 to £20. If that is a demand which we on the staff make, are we justified?

In these very difficult times there is one thing that counts, and that is character; Now, if there is one man of our race who has character, surely it is the sailor; and of the sailormen with character I like to think that the British sailorman has most of all. I have spoken long enough, but I would just like to say this in conclusion, that rarely has it been my privilege to listen to a more stimulating, more helpful and more encouraging address than that which was given to us by our Chairman this afternoon. (Applause.)

The vote of thanks was carried unanimously.

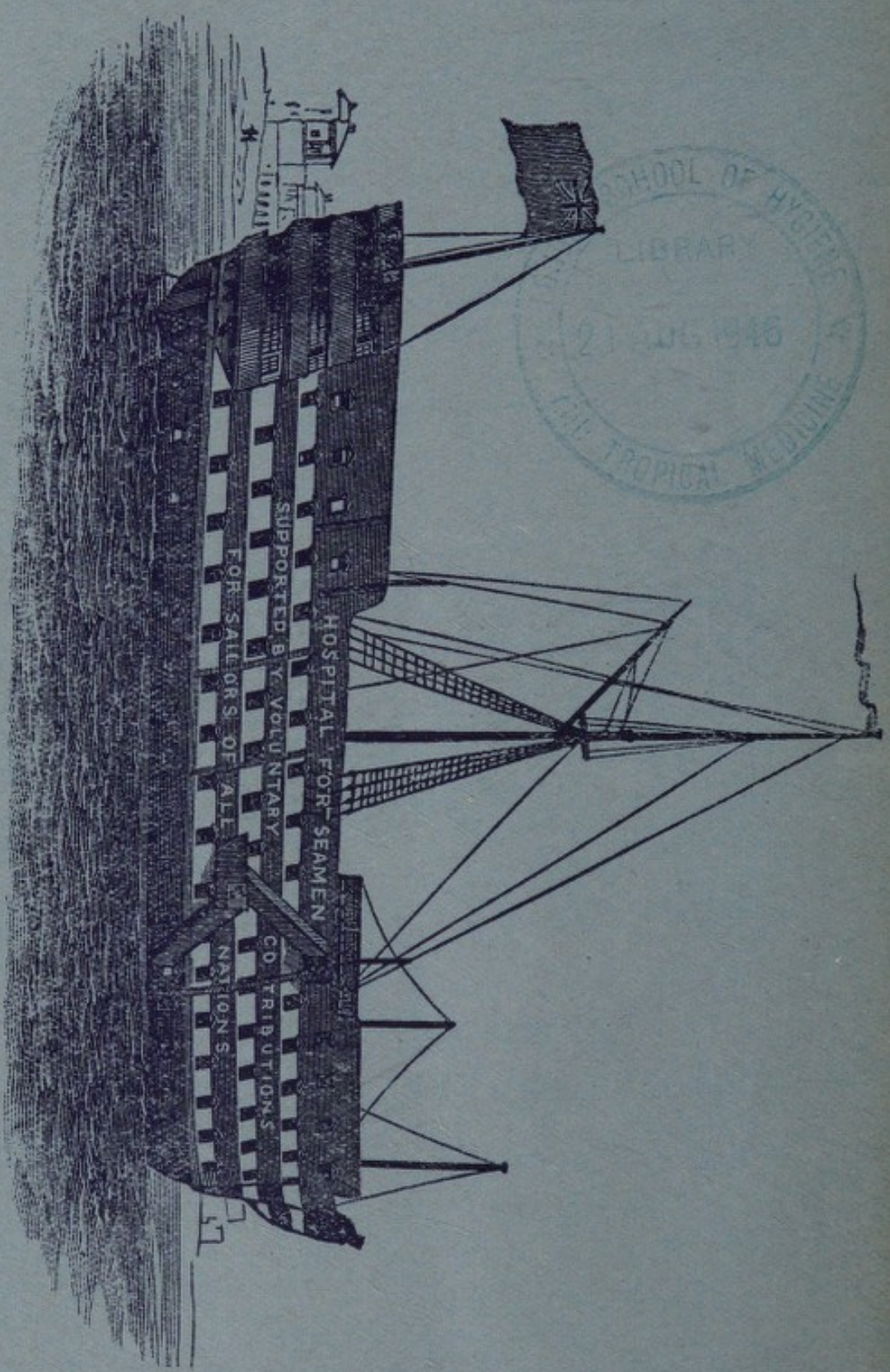
