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



The Trudeau Sanatorium was founded in 1884 by the late Dr. Edward L. Trudeau to help self-supporting people suffering from tuberculosis.

The institution was definitely intended for those who could only pay part of the cost. The deficit in maintenance is and always has been made up by annual gifts from the public and the income from endowment funds. The charges to patients average three-quarters of the cost, but from 15 to 20 per cent receive further assistance from the Free Bed Funds. Additional endowment for the general maintenance and for the Free Bed Funds is greatly needed, and legacies are desired to strengthen the now enlarged institution.

The following brief summary sets forth the objects and departments of the institution as now carried on:

- The Trudeau Sanatorium is for the treatment of favorable types of pulmonary tuberculosis and for patients of limited means. The full capacity is 185 beds.
- The D. Ogden Mills Training School for Nurses, established in 1912, is for the training of young women who have arrested tuberculosis as well as qualified healthy women who desire special training.
- 3. The Edward L. Trudeau Foundation is an endowment fund in memory of Dr. Trudeau, established in 1916, for the support of research and teaching in tuberculosis. The fund is devoted to the following purposes:
 - a. The Trudeau School of Tuberculosis for the instruction of physicians, gives a four and six weeks' postgraduate course covering the modern diagnosis and treatment of tuberculosis.
 - b. A system of Fellowships for study and research in the sanatorium and laboratories, which provide support for young physicians and scientists while undergoing treatment.

- c. The Research and Clinical Laboratory, located at the Sanatorium, containing facilities for the study of bacteriology, chemistry and pathology. It includes a large medical library.
- d. A department for Statistics, and for recording annual reports of patients.
- e. The Saranac Laboratory for the Study of Tuberculosis, located in the village of Saranac Lake, which was formerly the private research laboratory of Dr. Trudeau, and is now the headquarters of the Trudeau School and of pathological study.

Annexed to the Saranac Laboratory is the John Black Room and Medical Library, which serves the Trudeau School and Fellows as well as the village physicians and where lectures are given.

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The forty-eighth year of the Trudeau Sanatorium has been completed and the details of its activities are presented in the report of the Chairman of the Executive Committee.

In common with all other similar philanthropic enterprises, the Sanatorium has been affected by the general economic situation, indicated both by a diminution in the number of applicants for treatment and in the amount of financial support.

In spite of these conditions, the institution continues to maintain its high standards and the care of the patients is as effective as ever. Moreover, the skilful handling of our resources on the part of our Finance Committee and efficient management on the part of the executive staff, have enabled us to maintain these standards and at the same time balance our budget.

The Board of Trustees is deeply sensible of the debt which the institution owes to the splendid management of its administrative affairs under the direction of Mr. Armstrong and of its medical policies under the leadership of Dr. Heise.

The scientific work, also, has continued to progress under the guidance of Dr. Petroff and Dr. Gardner. We are particularly gratified by the recognition of the practical value in industry of some of these researches, evidenced by new financial support which has come to the Saranac Laboratory from industrial concerns interested in the relation of dusty occupations to disease. This support will enable the Saranac Laboratory to strengthen still further its position as a leader in this field of preventive medicine.

One of the most pressing problems is the constantly increasing demand for treatment on the part of those unable to meet even our moderate regular charges for sanatorium care. These demands fall upon our Free Bed Fund which is always overdrawn, a situation which necessitates the refusal of many urgent and often pathetic requests. We present this situation to our generous friends as offering an unusual opportunity effectively to aid the institution in its work.

We are planning no new projects or capital expenditures and fortunately our physical plant is in the best of condition, thus minimizing the necessity for replacements and repairs. Moreover, we are carrying on this year under a plan of as careful economy as is consistent with the preservation of our standards.

We need the continued financial support of our friends to make this possible and appeal for additional resources only to enable us to offer the benefits of the sanatorium to needy patients, either free or at a reduced cost.

The Sanatorium has lost an old and generous friend in the death of Mrs. E. H. Harriman. Mr. Harriman was one of Dr. Trudeau's original trustees and Mrs. Harriman had always continued the interest and support which he gave the institution. Her loss is a sad and serious one.

Also, in the death of Mrs. Charles R. Armstrong we have lost one of our oldest and most devoted friends. For many years she was active in the management of the institution and in later years devoted herself to the beautification of the grounds and the preservation of the older records and traditions with which she was so familiar. Her memory will always endure at Trudeau.

We are fortunate that other very important members of our organization who have been seriously ill are now restored to health.

Miss Sawtell, Mr. Sampson and Dr. Baldwin are all now back giving their accustomed devoted efforts to the interests of the Sanatorium.

Trudeau has always been peculiarly fortunate in the character of those who have served her. We can afford to lose none such, for their replacement would be well nigh impossible.

The Trustees commend this report to the careful attention of all of our friends. They appreciate your generous support in the past, and present this record of another year of service with confidence that it merits the continuation of your interest.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE AND VICE-PRESIDENT OF THE TRUDEAU SANATORIUM

For the Year Ending September 30, 1932

Although on account of the prolongation of the business depression both donations and the number of patients in the Sanatorium have suffered a marked decrease, nevertheless the forty-eighth year of the Trudeau Sanatorium ends in a better financial position than was anticipated. This satisfactory situation is due to the wisdom and skill with which our investment funds have been handled by our financial committee and also to the program of retrenchment and economy which has been carried on at the institution under the direction of the superintendent and staff in charge of operations. Gifts to the general fund were less than half those received in prosperous times. In consequence new projects were postponed and only such construction carried on as was incompleted.

Death has continued to remove old friends and employees of Trudeau. The well-known philanthropist of Cleveland, Mr. Samuel Mather, benefactor of the Trudeau School and a Trustee of the Sanatorium since 1918, passed away at the age of eighty. In the spring of 1932 Mrs. Charles R. Armstrong, wife of our superintendent, died after a short illness. She was prominently identified with the management for more than thirty years and was chiefly responsible for the work of planting and beautifying the grounds. She also devoted much time in recent years to collecting and arranging a complete history of the institution.

Dr. Frederick B. Jennings, donor of the animal house and a liberal contributor to the Research and Clinical Laboratory, died suddenly in March, 1932. A bronze tablet has been placed in the laboratory in commemoration of his generosity.

The recent death of Mrs. Edward H. Harriman marks the loss of another of the pioneer benefactors of the Sanatorium. She was one of the group of ladies, including the late Mrs. Stokes and Mrs. Reid, who assisted Dr. and Mrs. Trudeau during the eighties and early nineties in an annual fair at Paul Smith's. Her gifts to the General Fund, Free Bed Fund and to the Trudeau Foundation were liberal and sustained throughout the years.

Maintenance Cost: A still further drop in the per capita cost occurred last year. The saving amounted to \$1.05 per week per patient (\$23.37 as compared with \$24.42 in 1931). The raw food cost per meal fell from \$0.2226 to \$0.2109. Other savings, especially on fuel, made a substantial difference in the cost of operation.

Employed Patients: It is estimated that 92 ex-patients were given something to do by which, in the form of cash or board, they earned \$30,000.00. The Trudeau Foundation supported, in whole or in part, 9 fellowships and 21 other tuberculous workers. Ten nurses had part time duty while under treatment.

Donations and Legacies: For the General Fund, \$14,147.00 was received, and \$5,359.00 for special purposes. In a period of such strain on philanthropy the decrease in gifts was less than might have been anticipated.

The timely aid of these legacies was much appreciated. From them the sum of \$25,505.00 was added to the Endowment Fund.

Free Bed Fund: The receipts from donations were \$5781.65, from interest on endowment \$3623.81, making a total of \$9405.46. Thirty-three patients were aided at a cost of \$9463.00, which reveals the curtailed benefits due to smaller income. The Alunmi Free Bed Fund amounted to \$428.40. It is hoped that more bequests may be devoted to this fund so as to build up a substantial endowment.

Construction and Improvement: Two sleeping porches on the Ladd Cottage were made possible by the gift of \$1500.00 from Mr.

and Mrs. Walter G. Ladd. The kitchen improvements were completed and new equipment added. A new concrete sidewalk was continued along the main roadway, which enables pedestrians to avoid walking on the road. Automatic stokers were installed in the laundry and in Reid House. A total of \$11,951.95 was expended in the various alterations and improvements. Part of this was provided for by previous appropriations and gifts.

Medical Report: A further decrease in the number of patients treated last year will be noted, and more were discharged.

The above report reveals the fact that less favorable cases have been admitted during the year. This reflects the strain on patients due to economic conditions which postponed the applications for admission and markedly shortened the waiting list. Thus it has been possible to admit patients without the long delay customary in the past. On the other hand, bed care is urgently needed, for the diagnosis is usually made when symptoms become acute.

The average daily census was _____207

Medical and Dental Department: Besides Dr. Heise, Medical Director, and Dr. Steidl, first assistant, the resident medical staff consists of Dr. Kirby Howlett, Dr. W. K. Whitehead and Dr. J. W. Strieder. Voluntary assistance was given by medical students and physicians under treatment as usual. The mutual benefit of this service is much appreciated, as well as that of the visiting physicians, Dr. Trudeau, Dr. Packard, and Dr. Hayes, who continue their semiweekly visits.

No change occurred in the excellent personnel of the dental department. Dr. Carr made 385 examinations and 1652 restorations, giving the utmost satisfaction and being fully occupied with our work.

D. Ogden Mills School of Nursing: Miss Sawtell resumed full time duty as superintendent in February, and Miss Tibbetts resigned to return to Utica. Her place was taken temporarily by Miss V. T. Johnson of Boston. Later Miss F. Blanche Mann was made instructor after a postgraduate course, fulfilling seven years of service on our staff. Miss E. Louise Strock was appointed dietitian and teacher and has charge of the diet kitchens. It was decided to omit the postgraduate course owing to the unemployment situation among trained nurses. It is worthy of comment that many are now willing to nurse tuberculosis who formerly avoided this field.

The school now has 32 pupils at the sanatorium and ten affiliating at Yale and the Cornell Maternity Clinic, the latter replacing the Manhattan Maternity Hospital. The graduation exercises were omitted because so few pupils were ready this year. Twenty-four are expected to graduate in 1933.

The X-ray Department: It is pleasant to report Mr. Sampson quite restored to health by his rest, and fully occupied as always. The work decreased about 9 per cent due to fewer private patients, but 7,200 examinations were recorded and 21,600 films employed. The annual examination of Saranac Lake school children was carried out on approximately 1,600. This study promises much in answer to the question as to the significance of adolescent tuberculosis. There are ten ex-patients employed in the department.

Scholfield Memorial Workshop: The directress, Miss Pierce, reports fewer ambulant but more bed patients who received instruction in crafts. There were in all 373 and they were taught ten different arts and crafts. Her staff remains unchanged and was supplemented by volunteers, Miss M. MacDonald, Mr. V. Lawrence, Mr. R. Parlamento and Mr. W. Lundergan.

Chapel Services and Entertainments: The village clergymen, Rev. George Boys. Rev. F. W. Bevan, Rev. H. W. Lyon and the Rev. Otto Sieker continued their services at the Baker Chapel, and the Rev. Fathers C. A. Kitts and J. T. Lyng officiated at the Roman Catholic services. Acknowledgement is due to Mr. Brennecke, Miss Louise Leonard and Miss Constance Reaves who officiated at the organ and to Mrs. Samuel Kelly, who sang on several occasions. Mr. W. A. Hennigar continues as the regular organist.

The sixteenth annual service in memory of Doctor Trudeau was held and the address given by Mr. Lyon.

The Thursday Evening Club, usually the source of impromptu entertainment, was more or less suspended during the past year. The fewer ambulant patients explain this situation in large measure. However, some gatherings were enjoyed and musical talent drawn upon.

The customary concerts by the Lake Placid Club Boston Symphony group were provided and the Camp Riverdale Glee Club sang. An enjoyable lecture was given by Dr. James J. Walsh on his annual visit.

The Third Winter Olympic Games at Lake Placid were attended by many of the staff and some of the patients, the open highways making access much easier than usual.

A very interesting ceremony was held in connection with the 25th anniversary of the Christmas Seal sale through the suggestion of Mrs. Marie F. Kirwan of the New York State Tuberculosis Committee. Wreaths from various institutions and tuberculosis organizations were carried in the old Paul Smith stage coach, driven by Dr. Francis B. Trudeau, from the village to the Trudeau Memorial, and were laid about the statue as a tribute to the founder.

Medical Library: The librarian, Miss Margaret Hort, reports a marked increased use of the library during the past year. Over 5000 volumes are available, and 91 periodicals are received regularly.

making a unique assortment for reference and study. Assisting Miss Hort were Miss Rachel Smith and Miss Ann Varley. Volunteers were the Misses Gillespie and Sugarman.

Statistical Department: Annual notice to discharged patients has been restricted in recent years to those who left since 1915. After that date all records included the x-ray findings, which greatly changed the classification. Mr. W. A. Hennigar, the statistician, was assisted by Miss Julia Mollahan.

Mellon Library: The staff in charge of the Medical Library has carried on the Mellon Library, which contains about the same number of volumes. Many patients as well as members of the staff and outside friends have donated books. There are 23 periodicals regularly received. Miss Annie Burr Jennings and Miss Isobel Hopkins have continued their generous help. Among the gifts from another friend was a large panorama photograph of the mountains and a moving picture film of the landscape about Trudeau as seen from Mt. Baker.

Research and Clinical Laboratory: Changes in some of Dr. Petroff's plans for research were necessary by reason of decreased support. On the whole, however, he has succeeded in carrying on and completing the most important work in hand. The studies have been concentrated on chemotherapy, and up to the present have been concerned with complicating bacteria with tuberculous empyema. Some practical results have been obtained already in the treatment of patients. Avian tuberculosis in chickens has been another subject in which a detailed pathological study has been made by Dr. William A. Winn in conjunction with Dr. Petroff. Enlargement of the laboratory was not feasible according to the original plan which involved large expense, but by alterations in the adjoining Medical Pavilion, third floor, a very satisfactory space has been added, including room for library expansion, and at moderate cost. It is still unfinished. It is noteworthy that the degree of Doctor of Science was conferred on Dr. Petroff by Colgate University, in June, 1932.

The Saranac Laboratory: In spite of decreased income work has been sustained without interruption. The aid given by the new Saranac Lake Academy of Medicine amounted to \$2325.00, which partly offsets the loss of other support. The Finance Committee under

the energetic leadership of Dr. Kinghorn has been active in interesting donors, while Dr. Gardner has received encouragement from several large industrial organizations which have to deal with silicosis as a dust hazard. It is confidently believed that further support will be received after a business revival.

The new animal house contributed by several friends has been completed and put into use.

Dr. Gardner has been in demand for several important conferences relating to dusty trades and was a guest of the British Medica! Association at its meeting in London in July. Seven papers have been published from the Saranac Laboratory during the year. The staff remains unchanged except for Dr. Eliot Luther and Dr. Gerald R. Dowd, who resigned, the former to take a sanatorium position and the latter because of ill health.

Trudeau School of Tuberculosis; Eighteenth Session: It is gratifying to report a larger attendance than ever before, there being 27 physicians, 16 of whom remained six weeks. Our staff of instructors gave more time to bedside teaching, with praiseworthy interest and good effect. Seven scholarships were granted. The following evening lectures were delivered: "The History of Tuberculosis," by Dr. Lawrason Brown; "The Surgical Treatment of Tuberculosis," by Dr. Carl A. Hedblom, professor of surgery, University of Illinois College of Medicine, Chicago; "Positive Pressure Pneumothorax," by Dr. George Foster Herben, physician-in-chief, Loomis Sanatorium, Loomis, N. Y.; "The Development and Treatment of Cavities," by Dr. Karl Fischel, Medical Director, Jewish Consumptives and Ex-patients Relief Association, Duarte, Calif.; "Rest and Exercise," by Dr. Hugh M. Kinghorn; "Tuberculosis of the Skin," by Dr. Anthony Cipollaro, attending dermatologist and instructor in dermatology, New York Post-Graduate Medical School and Hospital, New York City.

Through the courtesy of Dr. Edgar Mayer, medical superintendent of the N. V. A. Sanatorium, the class was invited to attend a medical and surgical symposium held at the new institution.

Trudeau Foundation: Nine fellows were maintained while under treatment, and six third-year medical students during July and August: Twelve published studies appeared from the various departments. The only additions to endowment were securities with a market value of \$2,600.00, for the Saranac Laboratory.

The total Sanatorium operating income for the year 1932 was \$330,921 97, against total operating expenses of \$370,352 96. The Superintendent's revenue over the same period was \$270,865 01 as against running expenses of \$316,326 73; resulting in a deficit of \$45,461 72, which was offset by appropriations from the Bankers Trust Company amountting to \$43,221 90. The Superintendent's revenue equals \$5.6% of the running expenses. The average weekly per capita cost, or the cost of taking care of one patient one week was \$23.37. The average amount paid by each patient was \$20.59 and the average weekly deficit per patient was \$2.78.
