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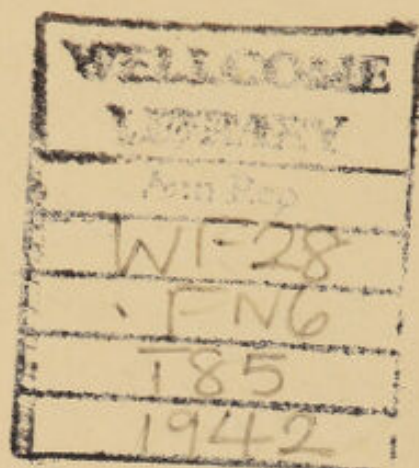
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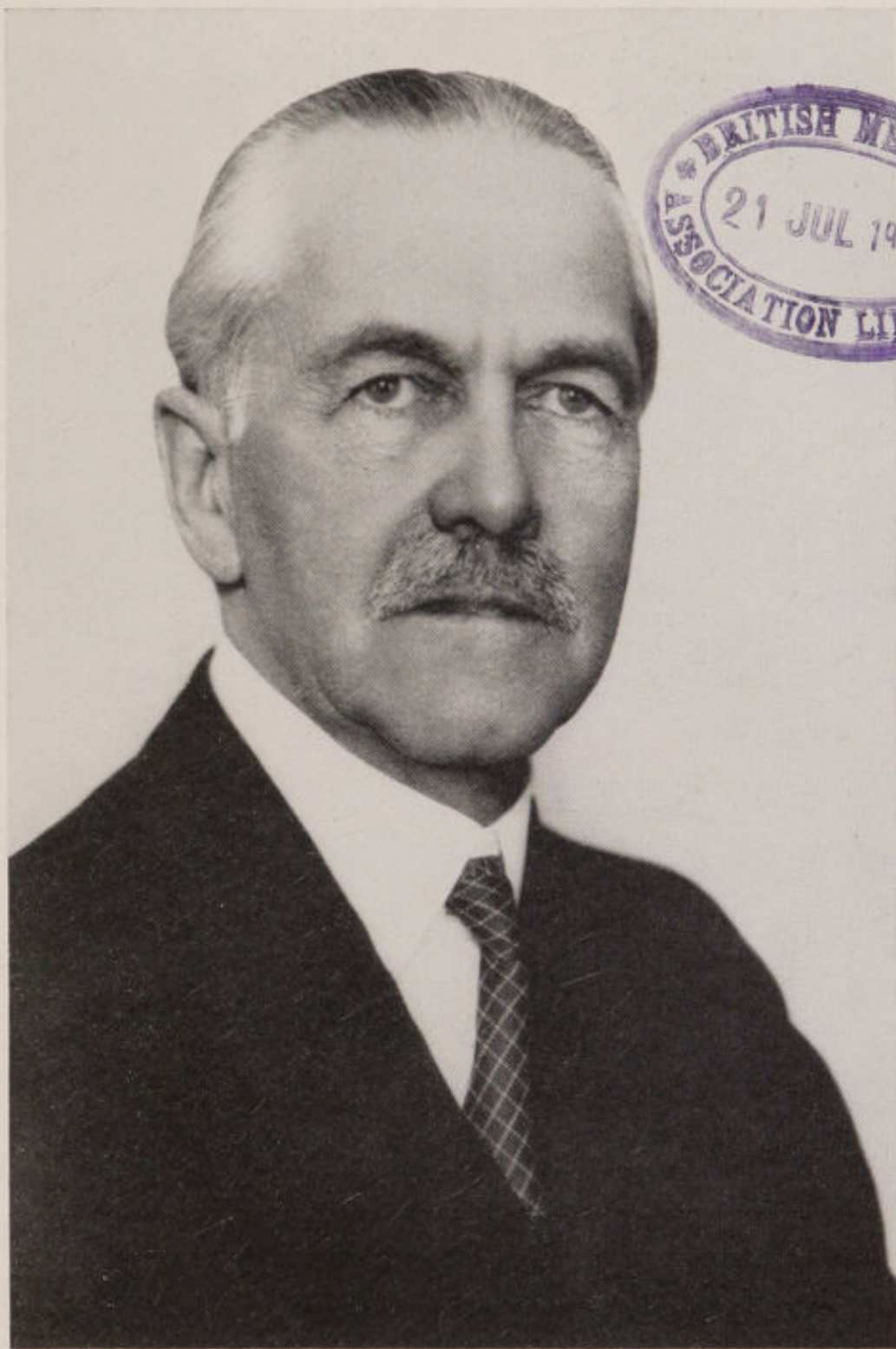

THE EDWARD L. TRUDEAU FOUNDATION

THE TRUDEAU SANATORIUM was founded in 1884 by the late Dr. Edward L. Trudeau to help self-supporting people suffering from tuberculosis.

The institution was definitely intended for those who could pay only part of the cost. The deficit in maintenance is and always has been made up by annual gifts from the public and income from endowment funds. The charges to patients average three-quarters of the cost, but from fifteen to twenty percent receive further assistance from the Free Bed Funds. Additional endowment for the general maintenance and for the Free Bed Funds is greatly needed and legacies are desired to strengthen the now enlarged institution.

The following brief summary sets forth the objects and departments of the institution as now carried on:

1. *The Trudeau Sanatorium* is for the treatment of favorable types of pulmonary tuberculosis and for patients of limited means. The full capacity is 200 beds.

2. *The Edward L. Trudeau Foundation* is an endowment fund in memory of Dr. Trudeau, established in 1916, for the support of research and teaching in tuberculosis. The fund is devoted to the following purposes:

a. *The Trudeau School of Tuberculosis* for the instruction of physicians, gives a four and six weeks' post-graduate course covering the modern diagnosis and treatment of tuberculosis.

b. A system of *Fellowships* for study and research in the Sanatorium and laboratories, which provide support for young physicians and scientists while undergoing treatment.

c. *The Research and Clinical Laboratory*, located at the Sanatorium, containing facilities for the study of bacteriology, chemistry and pathology. The same building houses the *Lawrason Brown Memorial Medical Library*. The *Physiological Laboratory* occupies the third floor of the Medical Pavilion.

d. A department for *Statistics*, and for recording the annual reports of patients.

e. *The Saranac Laboratory for the Study of Tuberculosis*, in the village of Saranac Lake, which was formerly the private research laboratory of Dr. Edward Livingston Trudeau and is now the headquarters of the *Trudeau School* and of pathological study and research.

Annexed to the Saranac Laboratory is the *John Black Room* and medical library, which serves the *Trudeau School* and *Fellows* as well as the village physicians as a lecture room.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

It is my privilege on behalf of the Trustees again to report upon the work of the Trudeau Sanatorium during the past year.

These are difficult times for all institutions which are supported by voluntary contributions. As was the case with many others this year, the annual contributions for the general work of the Sanatorium were less than previously but I am much pleased to be able to report that those to the Free Bed Fund, for which we made an especial appeal last year, were larger. This was most fortunate for the demands upon this fund were especially heavy, so that at the end of our fiscal year there is very little available balance left.

As oftentimes those patients, for whose benefit these Free Bed Funds are expended, are just the ones who need the Sanatorium most, it is always a great satisfaction to be able to help them when their need is great. We confidently hope that our friends will continue to make this possible by special contributions to this Fund.

In the general operation of the Sanatorium we closed the year with a small deficit, slightly over \$1,200. That this sum was not larger was due mainly to careful and economical management. With food and other costs higher and contributions smaller, this was not easy to accomplish. Another contributing factor was the increased income due to the continuously higher census of patients during the year. This does not appear to be due to an increase in tuberculosis in the community but probably reflects the better financial status of the economic group for which Trudeau is intended. In any event, it is a great satisfaction to know that, for whatever reason, the opportunities for treatment at Trudeau have been more fully utilized than for several past years.

In the death of Mr. Charles R. Armstrong after several trying years of illness, the Sanatorium has lost a devoted servant and friend. Fortunately, Mr. Wood who has acted for Mr. Armstrong during these years of his incapacity, has developed into a most efficient executive and in electing him as Mr. Armstrong's successor as Superintendent, the Trustees have every confidence that the affairs of the Sanatorium will be

managed in accordance with the high standards set by his predecessor.

In general, the Trustees are able to assure the friends of Trudeau that all goes well there. The medical and nursing care continues to be of the same high order and the physical and psychological comfort of the patients has been maintained. In fact, with the passing of the years, the Sanatorium continues to grow steadily in the estimation of patients, of physicians and of the public.

We, therefore, again do not hesitate to appeal to our many friends to continue to give their support in spite of the difficult times and many demands which confront everyone.

Health is one of the bulwarks of freedom. Trudeau is making a notable contribution toward that objective.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1942

THE PAST year will be remembered by the Sanatorium Staff as the time when x-ray diagnosis brought new patients in increasing numbers.

The increased average census was possibly aided by earlier diagnosis by x-ray since it reached 191.6 as compared with 187.2 last year. Forty-two were admitted on the x-ray findings, ten of whom were found on examination for military service. The problems due to the war have been hard to solve yet the nearly full occupancy of the beds has kept the deficit from operation relatively small (\$1215.85).

Employees have enlisted or been drafted or left to engage in war industries, making inroads especially into the housekeeping department. Compared with many hospitals we have been fortunate because our professional staff is mostly made up of former patients.

Death has removed two of the old friends of the institution who were regular supporters. Mr. Edwin W. Inslee of New York who gave the Inslee Cottage (1897) and was an annual contributor, died January 19, 1942, aged 93. Mr. Walter H. Cluett of Dobbs Ferry, N.Y., who resided in Saranac Lake many years and whose wife was an invalid, died May 3rd, leaving a name for generosity to the many community interests.

SUMMARY OF THE FINANCIAL REPORT

Although a further decrease in contributions to the General Fund occurred and an increase of expenses due to the war was inevitable, the anticipated deficit was less than we had feared.

The demand for assistance has been met to a large extent by a larger income from donations and interest on the Free Bed endowment fund. The requisitions have averaged \$1,300.00 a month, and more patients have been assisted and relieved of financial worry, especially those who required nursing. The substantial donation by the Davella Mills Foundation has been especially helpful. The provisional appropriation from the General Fund voted at the summer meeting was not requisitioned.

Employed Ex-Patients: The number of employed ex-patients varies from year to year but averages 30, whose earnings amount to \$32,000. In addition there were 23 employed by the Trudeau Foundation, mostly professional people, who earned approximately \$40,000.00.

Construction, Improvements and New Equipment: New construction was comparatively limited in extent. The establishment of a ceramics department was made possible in the workshop by a bequest in memory of the late Robert H. Becker. This was built on the second floor and equipped with the tools and plumbing for the purpose. Two consulting rooms were built in the Medical Building.

Extensive repairs were made to the Scholfield Workshop foundation and the stone wall behind the laboratory building. The following were the new items:

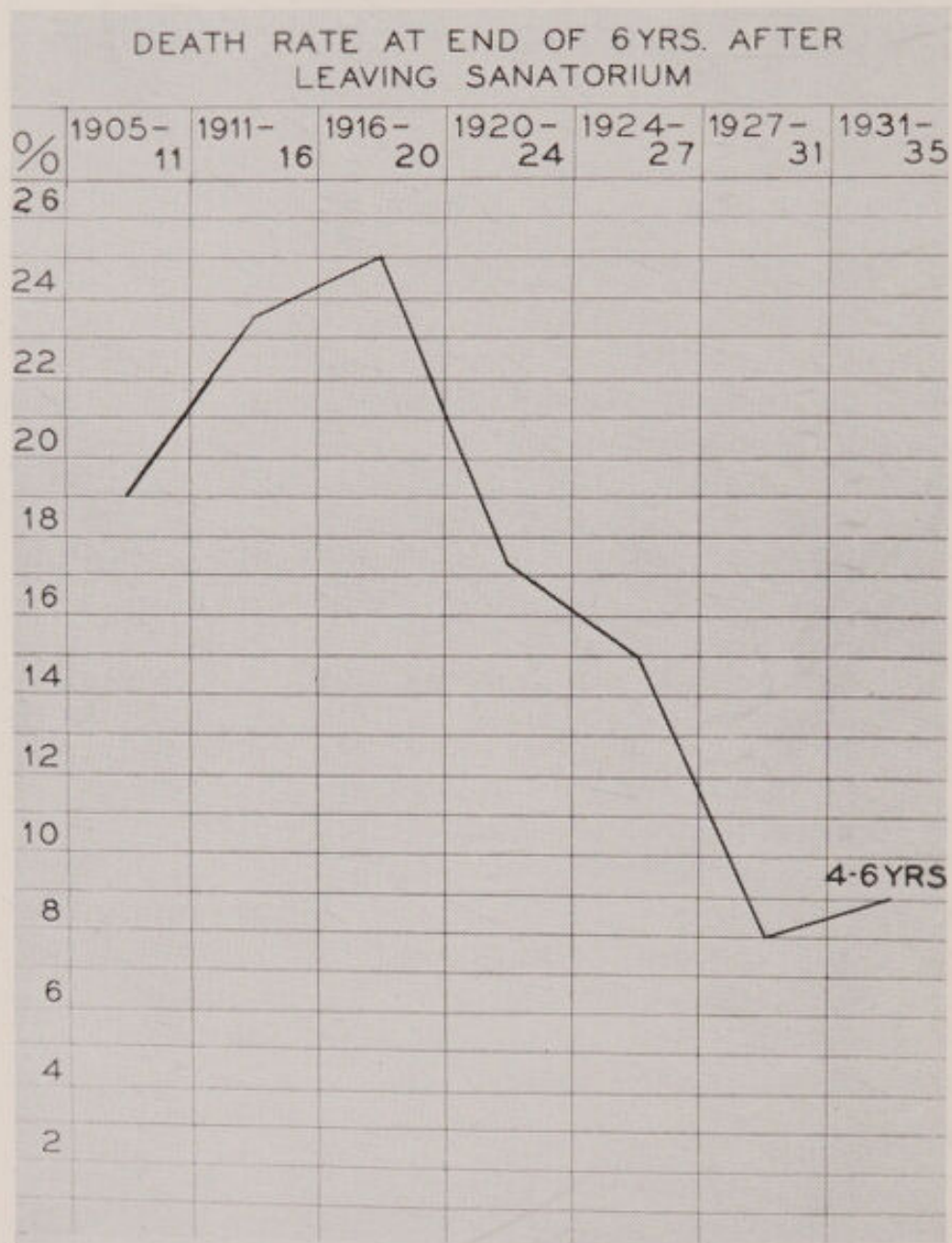

A total of 53 patients were from the medical and nursing professions, practically 25 percent. Further details are to be found in the Medical Director's report.

The large percentage of former patients reporting annually has been very gratifying.

Mr. George D. Bisset has succeeded Mr. Frank Bucci as statistician.

THE DEPARTMENTS

Administration: The continued incapacitation of Mr. Armstrong* has placed the full responsibility of management upon Mr. Wood who with the capable help of Miss Duggan has successfully born the difficult tasks during the war years. Especial credit is due our Steward, Mr. Hutchins, who has made wise purchases in the face of rising prices and scarcity of food supplies. A bonus of about 10 percent was given to employees living outside the Sanatorium to meet the rising cost of living. Some men have enlisted in military service and a few were drafted, so that many duties were performed by the remaining men in addition to their usual labors. All have shown a readiness to help in the emergency.

Medical Staff: The report of Dr. Heise, Medical Director, gives

evidence of the excellent service rendered by the regular Staff and the voluntary help given by physicians under treatment. We regret the departure of our second assistant, Dr. Robert Yeager, who became Superintendent of the Rockland County Sanatorium. He was well qualified for this advancement in position and we feel the loss of an able and reliable man who made himself very useful. During last year Dr. Ellanor Lockhart, Dr. H. Frazer Parry and Dr. Charles McGoeys completed their internships and were succeeded by Dr. Emanuel Wolinsky, Dr. Ronald Smith and Dr. William W. Richardson, Jr. The volunteer services of Dr. Jerome Hartz and Dr. John Flynn were very welcome and appreciated.

D. Ogden Mills School of Nursing: The Sanatorium has been in a more fortunate position than many hospitals, having lost only three of our nurses to the Army, Navy or Defense services. With the scarcity of graduate nurses, an increasing number of affiliating students rendered valuable service. There were 96 affiliates but due to the war only two post-graduates received special instruction in tuberculosis.

It is a pleasure to acknowledge the success of this department under the direction of Miss Mann and Miss Mundie, whose devotion and inspiration mean much to our institution.

X-Ray Department: The total number of x-ray examinations for 1942 was 5,380, of which 2,552 were for Sanatorium patients, an increase of 156 over 1941. In addition to the usual routine, Dr. Sampson has interpreted about 16,000 roentgenograms of men employed in various industries. Several physicians on the staff of the Du Pont de Nemours and subsidiary companies during the past year have received instruction in x-ray interpretation.

The records of 600 Trudeau cases have been studied by the U. S. Public Health Service under Dr. H. E. Hilleboe, who is concerned with the rehabilitation problem in tuberculosis. Recently he has invited the co-operation of the X-Ray Laboratory in the training of selected ex-patients in the technique of x-ray methods, under the direction of the Saranac Lake Study and Craft Guild. This project is one to which our facilities should make a definite contribution.

Saranac Lake Study and Craft Guild: The advantages of instruction given by the Guild have been enjoyed by 92 patients of the Sana-

torium, an increase of 30 over the preceding year. The subjects taught have definitely aided in the restoration of earning power as well as in the cultural improvement of the patients able to do serious study. The following list of subjects taught indicates the scope of the studies: languages: English, Spanish, French; commercial: bookkeeping, typewriting, shorthand; vocabulary building; principles of design; weaving; radio announcing; Shakespeare; airplane modelling; x-ray technique.

Lawrason Brown Memorial Medical Library: The librarian, Miss Marjorie G. Smith, reports a steady increase in the use of the facilities for reference. Among those consulting the library were several Latin-American physicians who came either as patients or students. Miss Smith has been occupied in indexing the additional 436 books donated to the memorial collection by Mrs. Lawrason Brown. The library now contains 6,656 bound volumes.

During the session of the Trudeau School important and rare books were exhibited together with other objects from the museum shelves.

The Mellon Library: There are 8,398 volumes in this library at present, an increase of 350. Purchases for the rental library amounted to \$202.91, out of \$219 collected. In addition, Miss Eleanor Mellon contributed \$50.00 and Mrs. Walter B. James continued the subscriptions to many journals.

The late Mrs. R. H. Becker, a former patient, bequeathed her library including many travel books which are of great value. Space does not permit acknowledgment of all contributions from patients and others who have favored the library. Over 100 books have been bound by patients under the leadership of Miss Mary O'Meara and Mrs. Myrtle Kraft. Others who have given service are Miss Louise Shattuck and Miss Alice Blikken. Mr. Adolph Bergman has been a helpful assistant librarian.

The Chapel: Regular Roman Catholic services were held as usual and the following priests officiated: Rev. Monsignor Kitts, and the Fathers Argy, deGroot, Harvey and O'Connor.

Protestant services were conducted by the Rev. E. B. Mounsey, Canon Glyn A. Thomas, formerly of the Cathedral at Hamilton, Bermuda; and Rev. Henry Ebelke, Lutheran missionary. Rev. A. B.

Gurley gave the Christmas Eve service and there were visitations by him and Rev. T. R. Bundy. We acknowledge the value of these services and visits to the patients.

Entertainment: The usual illustrated address on the life of Dr. Trudeau was given at the anniversary of his birth by Dr. Francis B. Trudeau. The occasion was made to do honor to one of the employees, Miss Nellie Ryan, who rounded out fifty years of unbroken service. Bouquets were also presented to Mr. Armstrong and your Chairman, who celebrated their fiftieth years as former patients.

Lectures were given by Mrs. William Roy Smith, on "The Present Theatre of War in the Pacific as it Looked in Times of Peace"; by Canon Glyn A. Thomas on "The Relationship between Religion and Medicine"; and a joint address by Professor and Mrs. James M. Benade on "The Background of the Present Crisis in India."

Motion pictures were shown by Mr. Hyman Weiner of Saranac Lake on "Red Cross First Aid," and by Miss Thea Stephan of New York.

Dr. William Perl, formerly of Vienna, gave an illustrated talk on "Graphology."

Several croquet tournaments were instigated by the gift of a new set of balls and mallets by Mrs. W. J. Kramer.

The Workshop: Miss Alma Pierce, the Director, reports 259 persons were instructed in 14 different crafts. Ninety patients were taught at the bedside under the direction of Mrs. Blanchet. Silver work was the most popular of the crafts but has been interrupted by government order for the present.

An important addition to the facilities was the building and equipment of a ceramics department. This was made possible by a legacy of \$2,000.00 "In Memory of Robert H. Becker" from a former patient and instructor, who was greatly interested in the work. The teaching staff includes Miss Schiefer, Mrs. Blanchet and Mr. Laurence. The serious relapse of Mr. Laurence is much regretted as his teaching has been greatly appreciated. Death has removed two former instructors: Miss Olive F. Rhinelanders of New York was a volunteer teacher of the beautiful art of manuscript illuminations, of which she was an outstanding expert; and Mr. Kirke M. Smith, a former patient who became

highly successful in silver work and was in fact able to earn his own living by it. Mr. Smith left his collection of samples to the Workshop. Others who made gifts were the late Mr. Lewis A. Knott, a typewriter; the Estate of Mrs. Kathryn Phelps Becker, a motion picture camera and kodak; Mr. Albert Schulman, copper stock; Mr. Frank A. Mahoney, stainless steel; Mrs. Pitt Petri, a large collection of souvenirs to be sold for the benefit of the Workshop and also money for flower boxes; Mr. Hyman Arem (through Saul Grossman) smocks and aprons.

The report would not be complete without mention of the support given by Mrs. Meredith Hare who is unfailing in her generosity.

The Trudeau School of Tuberculosis: The regular session was held in September with thirteen enrolled students. Due to military service twelve others who had applied were unable to attend. The class was very satisfactory. Four scholarships were awarded by the School and four by various other organizations. The class made a contribution toward a lectureship for 1943. There were four students from Latin-American countries and three ex-tuberculous physicians.

The Trudeau Foundation: A summary of the year's activities in research and teaching includes laboratory and field studies on dust diseases, together with the support of two clinical internships during the summer at the Sanatorium. One fellowship for pathological study was granted. One research fellowship was contributed by the Lawrason Brown Memorial Fund.

Publications: Eight publications were made from the results of studies.

On December 15, 1942, the tragic death of Mr. Donald E. Cummings, Field Director of the Saranac Laboratory, occurred in an airplane crash in Utah. He was on his way to inspect a manganese mine. His loss is a serious blow as he was an unusually gifted man.

The joint research in physiology supported by the University of Rochester and the Trudeau Foundation has been continued by Dr. Wright. With co-operation of the Republic Steel Corporation the experiment on the prevention and treatment of silicosis in iron miners is in progress at Mineville, N.Y.

There were 27 persons employed in the laboratory and field work.
