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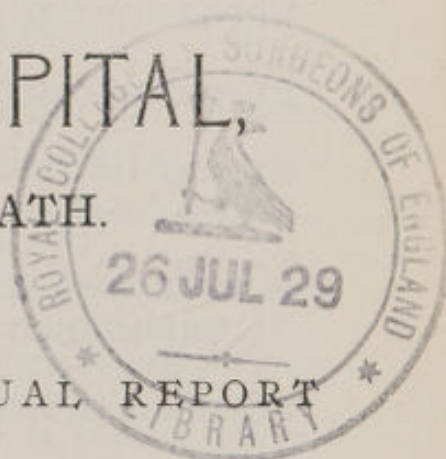

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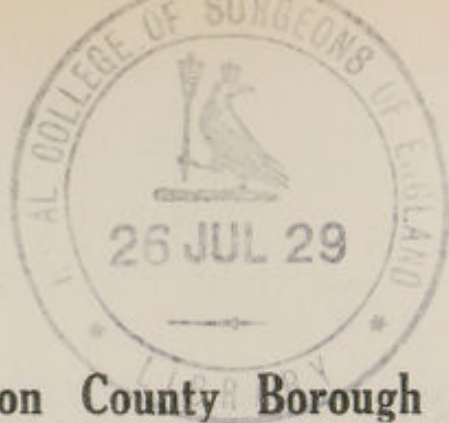

REPORT OF THE VISITING COMMITTEE
(Pursuant to Section 190 of the Lunacy Act, 1890),
BEING THE SEVENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT SINCE
THE FOUNDATION OF THE INSTITUTION.

To the Council of the County Borough of Brighton.

The Visiting Committee submit their Report for the past year :—

The number of patients on the books on the 31st December last, and on the corresponding date of the previous year, was as follows :—

In addition to the above, there are 6 male and 6 female children placed under contracts at Hellingly Mental Hospital. There is also a male patient at Hellingly Mental Hospital receiving malarial treatment.

The Committee record with regret the retirement during the year of Mr. F. T. Wilson, J.P., and Mr. John Mansfield, who, during their membership of the Committee of 16 and 12 years respectively, rendered valuable services to the Institution.

Miss Mary Darbyshire, the Housekeeper, who had been 35 years in the service, having retired on pension, it was decided to re-arrange the duties of the post, and to promote Miss L. Jones to be Working Cook Housekeeper, and Miss A. E. Marchant to be Working Laundry Mistress, both on 12 months' probation.

Mr. R. F. Jowers, having resigned the appointment of Consulting Surgeon to the Hospital, Mr. Geoffrey Bate was appointed to succeed him.

The general health of the patients and staff has been satisfactory.

The weekly maintenance rate in respect of the four Quarters of 1928 was fixed as follows:—

Members of the Committee have regularly visited the patients and inspected the Wards at each monthly meeting.

Members of the Committee visited the Brighton imbecile children at the Hellingly and Netherne Mental Hospitals respectively, and were satisfied with the care taken of them at both Institutions.

A Commissioner of the Board of Control paid a visit of inspection on the 17th September last and left a favourable report. The Headquarters Inspector of the Ministry of Pensions has also visited the Service patients detained in the Hospital.

Deputations from Boards of Guardians have visited the patients in the Institution chargeable to their respective Unions and in each instance reported favourably as to the care and attention given to the patients.

The Contract with the Surrey County Mental Hospital for the reception of Brighton male imbecile children at Netherne Mental Hospital has been determined and a new contract entered into with the East Sussex County Visiting Committee for their reception at Hellingly Mental Hospital.

The erection of 16 cottages on the estate for male members of the Staff has been satisfactorily completed. All the cottages are occupied, and it is a satisfaction to the Committee that the occupants now carry on their work under greatly improved housing conditions.

The purchase of the " Beechmont " Estate has been the subject of a separate report to the Council. The Committee's Architects are engaged upon the preparation of plans, etc., for the new Admission Hospital, which will be submitted to the Council for their approval in due course.

The construction of the main drain and the provision of Ejector Plant for the disposal of the drainage of the Institution into the Haywards Heath Sewerage System has been completed and is working satisfactorily.

The attention of the Committee having been drawn by the Visiting Commissioner of the Board of Control to the inadequate heating arrangements of the patients' wards, they have instructed Messrs. J. Jellreys & Co., Ltd., of London, to prepare a Scheme for the heating of the Institution, and this will be submitted to the Council for approval at a later date.

The Committee have to point out that owing to the age of the Buildings, Machinery, etc., substantial repairs and renewals have had to be undertaken during the past year of which the following have been the most important :—

The prescribed increases of pension under the Pensions (Increase) Acts, 1920 and 1924, granted to pensioners of the Institution eligible to receive the same, have, with the concurrence of the Contributing Authorities, been further continued until the 31st March, 1929.

The Committee record their satisfaction with the efficient manner in which Dr. Harper-Smith, his medical colleagues and the whole of the Staff carry on the administrative work of the Institution.

THE
MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Visiting Committee.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit the Twenty-fifth Annual Report of the Brighton County Borough Mental Hospital being the seventieth report since the opening of the Institution.

The admissions during the year 1928 have been, males 116, females 148, Total 264.

The discharges and transfers during the year have been males 52, females 85, Total 137.

The deaths during the year have been, males 37, females 42, total 79.

Compared with the year ending 31st December, 1927, the number of patients chargeable to Brighton has increased by 127. This increase is accounted for by the amalgamation of part of Steyning Union with Brighton Parish, due to the extension of the County Borough boundaries.

The total number remaining in the Hospital has increased by 48.

The average daily number resident during the year has been, males 327, females 536, total 863.

The number of patients in the Hospital, on December 31st was males 346, females 549 ; Total 895.

The number of indirect admissions, that is patients transferred from other Hospitals was, males, 29, females 15 ; Total 44.

35 males and 44 females were discharged recovered during the year, giving a percentage of recoveries calculated on direct admissions, of 40.23 per cent for males, and 33.08 per cent. for females.

This is not so high as last year, but during the year 45 patients were admitted over 60 years of age.

The following casualties occurred during the year :
 " C.J." Colls fracture of left wrist, slipped on stairs when leaving dormitory. " F.C." fracture right tibia and fibula, slipped on stairs, when leaving lavatory.
 " L.F." fracture right femur, pushed over by another patient. " M.K." fracture left tibia and fibula, slipped and fell in ward. " K.H." fracture right femur, slipped on stairs.

No inquest was held during the year. The general health of the patients during the year has been very good. Six male patients and 14 female patients are suffering from tuberculosis.

The death rate for the year was 11.31 per cent. for male patients, and 7.83 per cent. for female patients. An average of 9.15 per cent.

Dr. Forward, Headquarters Inspector, Ministry of Pensions visited on the 30th July, 1928, and a Commissioner of the Board of Control visited on the 17th September, 1928, and left a favourable report.

Deputations from the following Boards of Guardians visited the Hospital, and interviewed the patients chargeable to their several Unions. Eastbourne on 14th February, 1928, and on the 18th July, 1928. Brighton on the 26th March, 1928, and on the 5th October, 1928. Edmonton on the 28th September, 1928, and Steyning on the 13th November, 1928. They left satisfactory reports.

Eight patients suffering from General Paralysis were temporarily transferred to the East Sussex Mental Hospital, Hellingly, for Malarial treatment. Of these, 6 have returned here, 1 died at Hellingly, 1 is still at Hellingly receiving treatment. Of the 6 returned, 1 has been discharged recovered, 1 has died, and 4 are still here ; none of these have shown any improvement.

The average number of 30 females and 16 males have been well enough to be on full parole daily. Fifty-two male patients have parole within the grounds ; in no case has this privilege been abused.

The Out-patient Clinic at Brighton, Miss Woodhead, the Secretary, states (1) Since the Clinic was opened on the 4th January, 1926, 288 patients are recorded as attending. (2) The total number of new cases who attended during 1928 was 98. (3) The total number of attendances recorded during 1928 was 438. (4) The number of patients certified from the Clinic, during 1928 was (a) insane, 7 ; (b) mentally defective, 4.

It is gratifying to note that in every case the patient has benefitted, and a complete cure has been effected in many cases.

Several after-care patients have been saved from a relapse by attending the Clinic at regular intervals.

Artificial Sunlight treatment has been carried out in the Hospital, and has proved beneficial to recovering patients.

The Annual Fête was held on July 19th, in fine weather and was very much enjoyed by the patients and their friends. During the winter months a Cinema Entertainment is given three evenings a week, and on other evenings a wireless concert is given. Theatrical performances and concerts are given fortnightly during the winter months, and several concerts with community singing have been held in Male Ward 7.

For male and female patients several Whist drives have been held, and prizes were presented to the winning ladies and gentlemen.

Courses of lectures were given for the Medico-Psychological Nursing Examinations. Thirteen candidates were successful in the Preliminary and 4 in the Final.

I am very pleased to express my appreciation of the work of my Medical Colleagues and the heads of the various departments, which has been of the utmost assistance in the administration of the Hospital.

There is still difficulty in getting suitable applicants for the Female Staff, and the work of the Matron has been more difficult than usual.

I hope that the proposed improvements in messing and accommodation for the Nursing Staff will lessen the difficulties.

The Committee granted three years leave of absence to Sister Constance Thompson for General Nursing Training. She has now returned to the Staff. During her leave she has obtained the Certificate of General Nursing, and also the Certificate of the Central Midwives' Board.

While in the service of this Hospital she has obtained the following diplomas: The Royal Medico-Psychological Certificate, the Certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute, and the Certificate for School Nursing and Tuberculosis Officer. She is now a State registered Mental and General Nurse, and an Associate of the Royal Sanitary Institute.

Sister Grace Adelaide Lane, who is at present away doing three years general training at St. James's Hospital, London, has passed her preliminary Nursing Examination, and the Matron of St. James's reports very favourably on her nursing capabilities.

I consider the leave granted by the Committee to the Nursing Staff is proving very beneficial to the welfare of the Hospital.

Sister Thompson is now receiving administration training in the Matron's Office.

THE REPORT OF THE CHAPLAIN.

THE VICARAGE,

HAYWARDS HEATH, SUSSEX.

January, 1929.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

It is now my duty to present to you my fourth Annual Report, being that of the Chaplain's work during the year ending 31st December, 1928.

The work has been performed regularly: prayers have been said every week-day in the respective dining halls, with the addition of a hymn on Saints' Days: also on Mondays in Male Ward 6, and on Fridays in Female Ward 6: on Sunday mornings in Male Ward 5, and on Sunday afternoons, except on two occasions when for special reasons they were transferred to the morning in Female Ward 5.

The Holy Communion was celebrated in the Chapel on the first Sunday in each month at 9 a.m., and also on Easter Day, Whitsun Day, and Christmas Day. Morning Prayer was held in the Chapel each Sunday morning at 10, and in addition on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, Ascension Day, and Christmas Day. Evening Prayer with the Litany on the first Sunday in each month has been at 3. The Organist and Choir

have done excellent work : special mention should be made of the way in which they sang Stainer's " Crucifixion " on Palm Sunday. Visiting Preachers during the year have been the Rev. E. Cresswell Gee, Vicar of Pinchbeck, Lincolnshire, formerly Vicar of Haywards Heath, and the Rev. A. R. Harper-Smith, one of the Superintendents of the Missions to Seamen. It would seem to be desirable to extend the practice by inviting visiting preachers from outside on more occasions : the difficulty is that they are comparatively seldom able to leave their own work.

Thirty-eight funerals have been conducted during the year : in every case the work has been done by the members of the male nursing staff who have acted as bearers with care and reverence. Satisfaction with the arrangements has frequently been expressed by relatives and friends.

The Wards and Sanatorium have been visited every week. Many individual visits have been paid, particularly in " Sick Notice " cases, to which immediate attention is always given. The Recreation Hall has also been visited on nine occasions, during the time appointed for the visits of patients' friends.

The atmosphere of the Chapel has been improved by additional ventilation. The building itself has received further adornment in the shape of a new Altar Table, provided by the money contributed by those visiting the Chapel and the Superintendent's garden, and a few private donations : as well as of a new gradine and curtain, the gift of the members of the Nondescript Club.

The library work has been largely reorganised, and the present system seems to be giving satisfaction.

In conclusion, I should like to acknowledge the very

valuable assistance given me by the Rev. H. E. Ward,
and the friendliness manifested by all members of the
Staff.

THE REPORT OF THE DENTAL SURGEON.

The Dental Surgeon has the honour to lay before the Committee his Annual Report.

The number of patients attended since January, 1928, has been 685 : Males, 284 ; Females 401.

The number of teeth extracted has been 757, gas being administered in 44 cases, the remainder being extracted with local anaesthetic.

The number of fillings completed has been 2, and 21 patients have had their teeth scaled and cleaned.

A number of patients have had their dentures fitted and repaired.

The Dental Surgeon wishes to thank the Medical Officers for their kind assistance in the administration of N₂O gas.

THE REPORT OF A COMMISSIONER OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

BRIGHTON COUNTY BOROUGH MENTAL HOSPITAL

September 17th, 1928.

After having seen all the patients in residence, and inspected all parts and departments of this Institution I am glad to report that I am very favourably impressed with what I have seen.

Unfortunately I have missed meeting Dr. Harper-Smith who is away on his annual leave, but I have been accompanied on my visit by his deputy, Dr. Guppy, from whom I have received every assistance and information.

Since my colleague's visit nine months ago the following numerical changes have taken place amongst the patients :—

The above changes leave on the Statutory Books the names of 881 patients in the proportion of 337 men to

544 women, of these 47 men and 43 women are classified as of the private class, 29 of the former being "Service" or "Ex-service" patients. Out-County patients number 183 ; 59 men and 124 women. Forty-eight men and 95 women are received under contract from the Borough of Eastbourne, and 15 women from Napsbury Mental Hospital. Fifteen children, 9 boys and 6 girls, are boarded out under reception contracts at Hellingly and Netherne Mental Hospitals. There are now resident in the hospital 880 patients, 336 men and 544 women. One man is out on trial and two men are on week-end leave. All the remainder have been seen by me.

The average number resident during the year ended 31st December last was 837 ; 313 men and 524 women.

The accommodation as returned to me is for 286 men and 445 women by day and for 343 men and 576 women by night. There is therefore considerable discrepancy between the day and night accommodation and it would seem that the Hospital is considerably overcrowded by day on both sides. This is not apparent on a fine day, when several patients are out of doors, and at work, but in the winter evenings and on wet days some of the dayrooms must be overfull, and I reiterate the hope expressed by my colleague on his last visit that efforts will be made to rectify this discrepancy.

The question of the erection of an admission hospital is still under consideration, and the acquisition of a neighbouring estate, which has come into the market, on which such a hospital could be built, and the existing house utilized for private patients is engaging the attention of the Committee.

Since the beginning of the year a cinematograph operating room has been built on the porch of the Recreation Hall, and two new emergency exits made in the Hall. Some more plastering and redecorating

of dormitories on the female side have been carried out, and the male infirmary ward (No. 5) re-decorated throughout. A new Cowhouse with stalls on the tubular system has been erected and will be brought into use this week. Other improvements include the installation of an ejector plant in connection with the sewerage; a new sewer has been laid to the Haywards Heath Urban Council's sewer in Kents Road for the reception of the Hospital's sewage.

The main kitchen has been enlarged by the taking in of a passage, and the roof and walls are now being cleaned and redecorated. In progress is the erection of 16 houses for the Staff.

I found the dayrooms and galleries tidy and well kept, and presenting a comfortable and homelike appearance. There was a good supply of plants and flowers, and of books and papers.

One ward on each side is administered on the open-door principle, and a good deal of parole is allowed, 16 men and 24 women being granted parole beyond the estate, and 54 men in the grounds.

The weekly maintenance charge is 24s. 6d. per head for the Borough patients and from 28s. to 63s. for those of the private class. The average weekly cost as last ascertained was 24s. 4½d.

I found the patients generally very quiet, well behaved and contented, being free from complaints of any substance. One woman complained that she had seen another patient slapped this morning by a nurse. Dr. Guppy promised to investigate this matter.

The health of the patients is generally good. Of the 31 men and 102 women whom I saw in bed none were very seriously ill, and the majority were there on account of their mental state or for infirmity. There are no verandahs at this hospital, but advantage is taken of the fine weather to have a large number of the bed patients out in the ward gardens.

All the 67 deaths were from natural causes verified in 58 instances by post mortem examination. No inquest was held. The chief causes of death were heart disease in 14, organic brain disease in 13, tuberculosis and arterio sclerosis in 8 each and influenza in 5. Of the latter disease there was an outbreak in January, February and March, when one male and 14 female patients were attacked. In April 3 women contracted enteric fever, and in the same month one man dysentery. There are now suffering from tuberculosis 6 male and 13 female patients, and one woman from enteric fever.

There have been 5 serious casualties involving fractures of bones in the cases of 2 men and 3 women. With one exception they all occurred from accidental falls. The excepted case was where the woman was pushed over by another patient, and fractured her femur.

Ultra violet ray apparatus has been installed on both sides of the hospital but has not yet been much used owing to the large amount of natural sunlight this summer.

Dr. Harper-Smith has the assistance of Dr. Guppy and Dr. Humphry, and at present during his absence on leave Dr. Gallagher is acting in a temporary capacity.

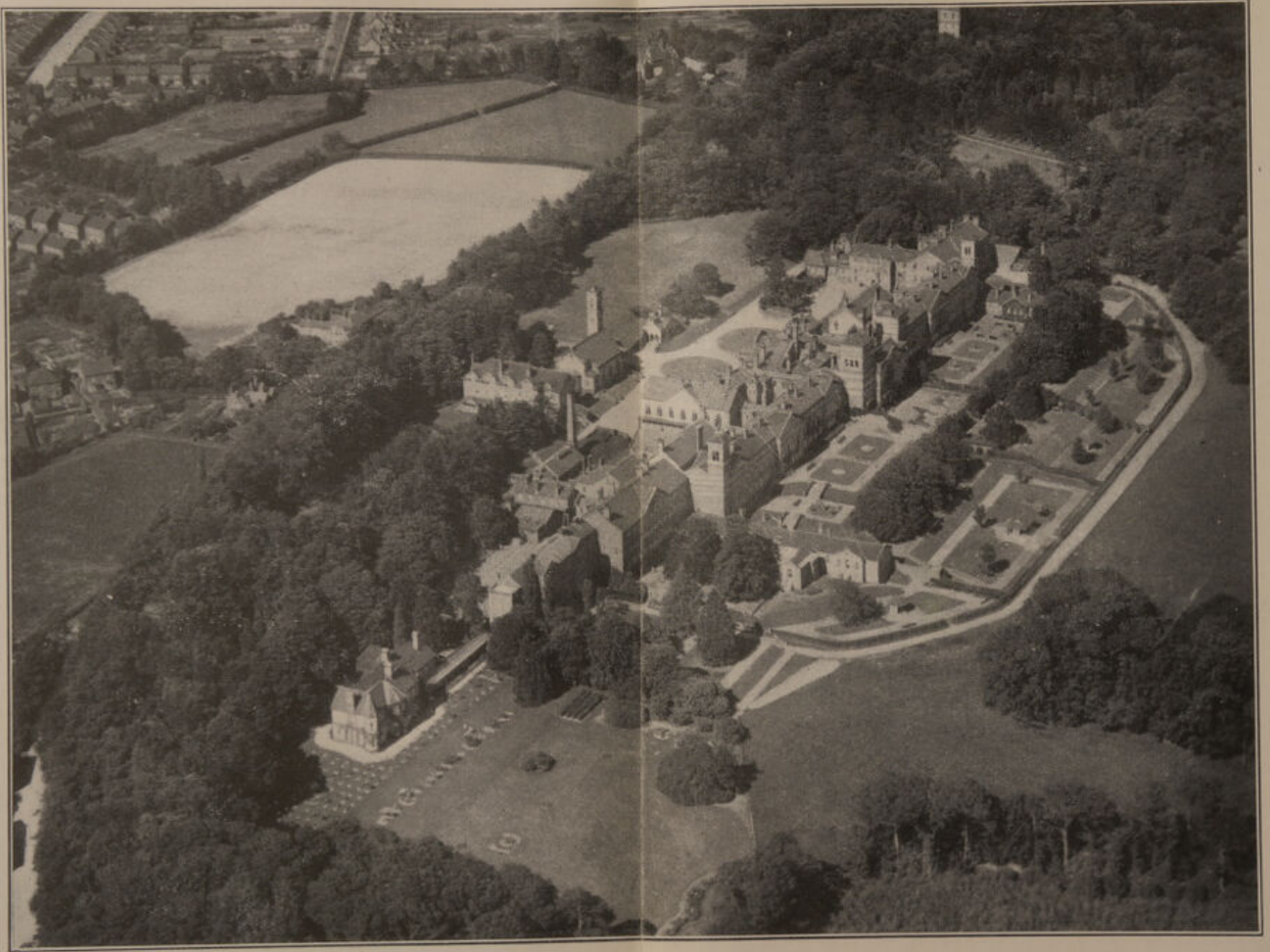
