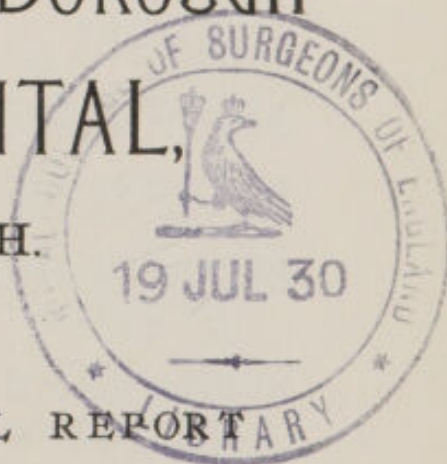

(Pursuant to Section 190 of the Lunacy Act, 1890),
BEING THE SEVENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT SINCE
THE FOUNDATION OF THE INSTITUTION.

To the Council of the County Borough of Brighton.

The Visiting Committee submit their Report for the past year.

The number of Patients on the books on the 31st December last, and on the corresponding date of the previous year was as follows :—

In addition to the above there are 6 female imbecile children placed under contract at Hellingly Mental Hospital.

The Committee record with deep regret the death in September last of Alderman Joseph Stringer, who had been a valued member of their body since 1903.

Mr. C. J. Callow, who had acted as Veterinary Surgeon to the Committee, died in December last, and Mr. H. Taylor, of Haywards Heath, has been appointed to succeed him.

The general health of the patients and staff has been satisfactory.

The weekly maintenance rate in respect of the four quarters was fixed as follows:—

Members of the Committee have regularly visited the patients and inspected the wards at each monthly meeting.

Two members of the Committee visited the Brighton imbecile children detained at Hellingly Mental Hospital, and reported that they appeared to be well cared for.

The Contract entered into with the East Sussex Visiting Committee for the reception of imbecile boys at Hellingly Mental Hospital was cancelled by the East Sussex Committee in April last. The patients were returned to this Mental Hospital where they were accommodated in a special ward, and their oversight is very costly.

A Commissioner of the Board of Control paid a visit of inspection on the 12th November last and left a satisfactory report. The Headquarters Inspector of the Ministry of Pensions has also visited the Service patients detained in the Hospital.

Deputations from Boards of Guardians have visited the patients in the Institution chargeable to their respective Unions and have testified as to the care and attention given to the patients.

The alterations and renovations of the buildings of Beechmont House to adapt them for the purpose of accommodating private patients have formed the subject of a special report to the Council.

With regard to the proposed Admission Hospital on the Beechmont Estate, some difference of opinion has arisen in the Committee as to the best site upon which to erect this building, and this has caused some delay, but the Committee hope to report with their recommendations at an early date.

With reference to the scheme of heating of the patients' wards referred to in their last report, the Committee have consulted Mr. A. H. Barker, of London, an expert in this class of work, who is preparing a suitable scheme for their consideration.

The erection of a new messroom and self-contained kitchen at the Nurses' Home is proceeding satisfactorily under the supervision of the Surveyor to the Committee.

A new cricket pitch has been formed in the Park on the Estate at a cost of £185.

Two of the padded rooms at the Institution are being lined with rubber and the flooring improved at a cost of £236 per room.

The Committee have accepted a tender for the installation of an Automatic Telephone System throughout the Mental Hospital Buildings at a cost of £1,275, to be paid for in two instalments out of Building and Repairs (Revenue) Account.

Superannuation allowances have been granted during the year to R. Booker, Male Nurse ; H. A. Betts, Engineer's Labourer ; R. Holder, Shoemaker ; R. Taylor, Garden Labourer ; Staff Nurse A. E. Sturgeon ; and A. G. Jackman, Engineer.

On the 1st June last the Committee reported to the Council with a synopsis of the accounts for the year ended 31st March last, and these accounts appeared in the Committee's Blue Book.

The prescribed increases of pension under the Pensions (Increase) Acts, 1920 and 1924, granted to pensioners of the Institution eligible to receive the same, have, with the concurrence of the Contributing Authorities, been further continued to 31st March, 1930.

Dr. Harper-Smith, his medical colleagues, and the Staff generally, continue to discharge their duties to the satisfaction of the Committee.

THE
MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Visiting Committee.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit the Twenty-sixth Annual Report of the Brighton County Borough Mental Hospital being the seventy-first report since the opening of the Institution.

The admissions during the year 1929 have been, males 82, females 132, Total 214.

The discharges and transfers during the year have been, males 50, females 95, Total 145.

The deaths during the year have been, Males 32, females 57, Total 89.

Compared with the year ending 31st December, 1928, the number of patients chargeable to Brighton has increased by 13.

The total number remaining in the Hospital has decreased by 20.

The average daily number resident during the year has been, males 347, females 529, Total 876.

The number of patients in the Hospital on December 31st was, males 346, females 529, Total 875.

The number of indirect admissions, that is patients transferred from other Mental Hospitals was, males 12, females 10, Total 22.

Thirty males and 51 females were discharged recovered during the year, giving a percentage of recoveries calculated on direct admissions, of 42.85 per cent. for males and 41.80 per cent, for females.

The following casualties occurred during the year :
 "J.F.B." Potts fracture right leg, slipped in garden whilst trying to cross sloping bank. "B.L.T." Fracture left femur, slipped in ward. "A.M.W." Dislocation left humerus, not known how caused. "H.A." Fracture of head of left humerus, fell out of bed. "M.L.J." Right colles fracture, slipped in ward. "G.M." Fracture both ankles, jumped from top of fire escape, attempted suicide. "J.A." Left colles fracture, fell in ward. "E.L.R." Impacted colles fracture, slipped and fell in ward.

Two inquests were held during the year. In the case of a male patient who committed suicide, the verdict was : "Suicide while not of sound mind. Death from shock due to injuries." The jury added a rider that no one in the institution was in any way to blame for the occurrence. In the other case the verdict was : "Died from natural causes—Lobar Pneumonia." He was admitted on the 4th January, 1929, and died on the 5th January, 1929.

The death rate for the year was 9.22 per cent. for males and 10.77 per cent. for females.

Dr. Forward, Headquarters Inspector, Ministry of Pensions visited on the 20th September, 1929, and a Commissioner of the Board of Control visited on the 12th November, 1929, and left favourable reports.

Deputations from the following Boards of Guardians visited the Hospital, and interviewed the patients chargeable to their several Unions. Eastbourne on the 10th February, 1929 and on the 30th July, 1929. Brighton on the 5th April, 1929 and on the 27th September, 1929. They left satisfactory reports.

Five patients suffering from General Paralysis were temporarily transferred to the East Sussex Mental Hospital, Hellingly, for Malarial treatment. Of these 4 have returned here and 1 is still at Hellingly receiving treatment. Of the 4 returned 1 has been discharged to the care of friends and 3 are still here.

The average number of male patients on full parole has been 18, and the average number of male patients on ground parole has been 53.

The average number of female patients on full parole has been 39.

On 131 occasions, 15 male patients have had week-end leave at home. On 24 occasions 7 female patients have had leave at home or with friends.

18 male patients on 55 occasions, and 32 female patients on 208 occasions have been out for the day with friends.

On 15 occasions parties of male patients have accompanied in chars-a-bancs the Football and Cricket teams to away matches.

Parties of patients have visited the Fêtes held in Victoria Park, Haywards Heath, and a party of 54 male patients visited the County Cricket Ground at Hove, to see the match between Sussex and Yorkshire.

The Out-Patients at Brighton. Miss Woodhead, the Secretary reports :—

(1) Since the Clinic opened on 4th January, 1926, 371 patients are recorded as attending. (2) The total number of new cases during 1929 was 90. (3) The number of patients certified from the Clinic was—
(a) insane 0, (b) mentally deficient 3.

I draw attention to the fact that no patient who had attended the Clinic in Brighton was certified. 60 new patients were treated at the Clinic during the year. 199 patients were admitted from Brighton and none of these had attended the Clinic. If patients would attend the Clinic when the first symptoms of mental illness arise the number of admissions would be further reduced.

The Annual Fête was held on July 11th in fine weather, and was greatly enjoyed by the patients and their friends. The Mayor and Mayoress of Brighton visited during the afternoon, and Mr. Brock, the Chairman of the Board of Control was also present.

The conduct of the Staff has been good.

I am indebted to my Medical Colleagues and the Officers for their loyal and willing help.

In conclusion, I wish to thank you, Mr. Chairman, and the Members of the Committee for the consideration and support extended to me.

THE REPORT OF THE CHAPLAIN.

THE VICARAGE,

HAYWARDS HEATH, SUSSEX.

January, 1930.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

In presenting to you my fifth Annual Report on the Chaplain's work in the Hospital, I have little in the way of changes to record.

The Chapel Services have been regularly performed. The Holy Communion was celebrated on the first Sunday of each month, and, in addition, on Easter Day, Whitsunday, and Christmas Day. There has been Morning Prayer with Sermon every Sunday at 10, and Evening Prayer, with the Litany on the First Sunday in each month, at 3. There was special music on the afternoons of Palm Sunday, Harvest Thanksgiving and the Sunday after Christmas. On Armistice Day I arranged with the Medical Superintendent that patients should listen in to the Service at the Cenotaph instead of attending a Service in the Chapel. I should like to place on record my appreciation of the efforts of Mr. Knight, the organist, and the members of the Choir.

There have been 35 funerals conducted in the Cemetery. Here again I should like to pay tribute to the reverence displayed by the bearers, which has

on several occasions caused approval to be expressed by the relatives or friends of the deceased.

Prayers have been held on every weekday morning during the year in the Male and Female Dining Halls : in addition to this, there have been prayers each Sunday morning in Male Ward 5, each Sunday afternoon in Female Ward 5, on Monday mornings in Male Ward 6, and on Friday mornings in Female Ward 6.

The Wards have been regularly visited every week, as well as the Laundry and Sanatorium. Six visits have been paid to the Recreation Hall on Wednesdays during visiting hours : and sick cases have been specially visited on receipt of notice.

The supply of books to the Library has been much appreciated by the patients. In addition to the grant voted by the Committee, a welcome present of books was received from the Red Cross and St. John's Hospital Library Association.

In conclusion, I should like to acknowledge the valuable assistance in the work rendered by the Rev. H. E. Ward, who has now left Haywards Heath, and also the services of the Rev. Dr. Litle and the Rev. F. G. Davies during the closing months of the year, as well as the friendly co-operation of all the staff, medical, nursing and administrative, which has contributed largely to the smooth working of the duties of the Chaplain's Office.

REPORT OF THE DENTAL SURGEON.

The Dental Surgeon has the honour to lay before the Committee his Annual Report.

The number of patients attended since January, 1929, has been 751 : Males, 316 ; Females, 435.

The number of teeth extracted has been 662, gas being administered in 112 cases, the remainder being extracted with local anæsthetic.

Five patients have had their teeth scaled and cleaned.

A number of patients have had their dentures fitted and repaired.

The Dental Surgeon wishes to thank the Medical Officers for their kind assistance in the administration of N₂O gas.

THE REPORT OF A COMMISSIONER OF THE
BOARD OF CONTROL.

BRIGHTON COUNTY BOROUGH MENTAL HOSPITAL

November 12th, 1929.

Among the alterations and improvements which have been carried out since this Hospital was visited in September, 1928, may be mentioned the completion of 16 houses for married nursing staff; the erection of new machinery in the laundry, including a vac-ironer, washing machine, hydro extractor, collar machine and two glad-irons, and the substitution of new sash frame windows for the old iron casements in female two and three storey dormitories and galleries. The addition of a dining room, kitchen, scullery, larder and eight bedrooms to the nurses home according to plans which have been approved by my Board are now in progress of being carried out, and should add considerably to the nurses comfort.

In addition to the above, other important improvements are about to be undertaken. An Admission Hospital, the plans of which are now being considered, will be erected on part of the land known as the Beechmont Estate recently purchased at a cost of £9,250, and the Beechmont House is to be converted into a residence for private patients. A new scheme for central heating, known as the Ray Rad system, is under contemplation, as are the further replacement of casement windows, the replacement of old baths on the female side and, by no means the least important, the conversion of a stable into a laboratory.

All these improvements and others which I have not mentioned shew that the Committee are doing all in their power to improve the hospital, and its medical facilities, and it is obvious that this is not the time to ask them to consider further improvements, which might entail a considerable further outlay of money. I therefore only mention a few matters which I discussed with Dr. Harper-Smith in the hope that they may receive attention at some future date. These are the great lack of day room accommodation, more particularly in female ward 5 (admission and sick ward) and male wards 9 (children ward) and 8 (phthisical ward), the absence of verandahs for open air treatment, and the shortage of w.c. accommodation. The first of these might possibly be remedied when the recent cases are moved to the new hospital.

The changes which have taken place amongst the patients leave on the books the names of 883 patients, 353 men and 530 women, and all were in residence and I believe were seen by me to-day. This number shews overcrowding by day to the extent of 82 males and 85 females, but vacancies by night for 3 men and 46 women.

Private patients number 44 men and 37 women, 27 of the former being service patients, and 165 patients, 54 men and 111 women, are chargeable to out-county Unions, 145 being chargeable to Eastbourne, 15 to Middlesex, and the remainder to various other Unions.

The maintenance charges are 25s. 1d. per week for home, and from 28s. to 63s. for private patients, the last ascertained weekly cost being 24s. 3½d.

I found the patients to be comfortable and very contented and I received no complaints from anyone as to their treatment, though everyone had the opportunity of speaking with me if they so desired. Their contentment is no doubt due to the care and interest

taken by all the staff in promoting entertainments, picnics, drives, and other forms of amusements, both out and indoors, in all of which both Dr. and Mrs. Harper-Smith maintain a personal touch.

In addition to the above a canteen is about to be arranged where staff, patients and their friends will be able to buy many kinds of small articles in addition to the tobacco and cigarettes which are now the only things sold.

The wards were well kept and were well supplied with books, and no fault could be found with the condition of the patients clothing and bedding.

I saw a good dinner being well served in the hall and wards. It consisted of fish followed by treacle pudding, and it was evidently enjoyed by the patients.

The health of the hospital appears to have been good and there has been no case of epidemic disease. The tubercular rate, however, is somewhat high, and there are 10 men and 13 women now known to be suffering from this disease in an active form. The female cases are nursed in the sanatorium, where I noticed that a small dormitory on the first floor has no second exit in case of fire, and the male cases in ward 8, a small ward with no day room accommodation. I do not consider this ward to be suitable for this purpose and would suggest that other quarters, perhaps of a temporary nature should be provided. This I believe can be done at little cost.

It has, so far, owing to absence of a laboratory, been impossible to treat cases of general paralysis by induced malaria, and such cases are sent to Hellingly, when it is thought that they are fit subjects for treatment. The results obtained have, I understand, been good, and it is to be hoped that the treatment may be commenced in the hospital itself at a no distant date.

Two inquests have been held by the Coroner, one concerning the death of a patient shortly after admission, and the other with regard to a death from a suicidal act, but all the remaining 87 deaths were due to natural causes, the cause being verified by post mortem examinations in 74 instances. The death from suicide was the result of a male patient jumping from the top of an outside fire escape stairs. Precautions are being taken to prevent any further risk of a similar occurrence.

The death rate for 1928 was 11.3 per cent. for men and 7.8 per cent. for women or a total of 9.85 per cent. both sexes.

One patient, who before admission was in service in Brighton, requested me to help her to obtain a transfer to a Mental Hospital in the district where her old home is situated, and I have no doubt similar cases must occur from time to time. I discussed this case with Dr. Harper-Smith, and was glad to hear that friendly consideration is given to all such requests, as it must be a distinct hardship for any patient to be detained in a hospital where it is almost impossible for her friends to visit.

The staff consists of 59 men and 70 women for day, and of 11 men and 13 women for night duty. The good proportion of 42 of the men and 38 of the women are registered or certificated as mental nurses, and 14 of the former and 28 of the latter have passed the preliminary examination. Thus practically the whole staff are trained or are in the course of being so. This is most satisfactory.

Dr. Harper-Smith, who may well be congratulated on the results of his administration, still has the assistance of Dr. Guppy and Dr. Humphry.

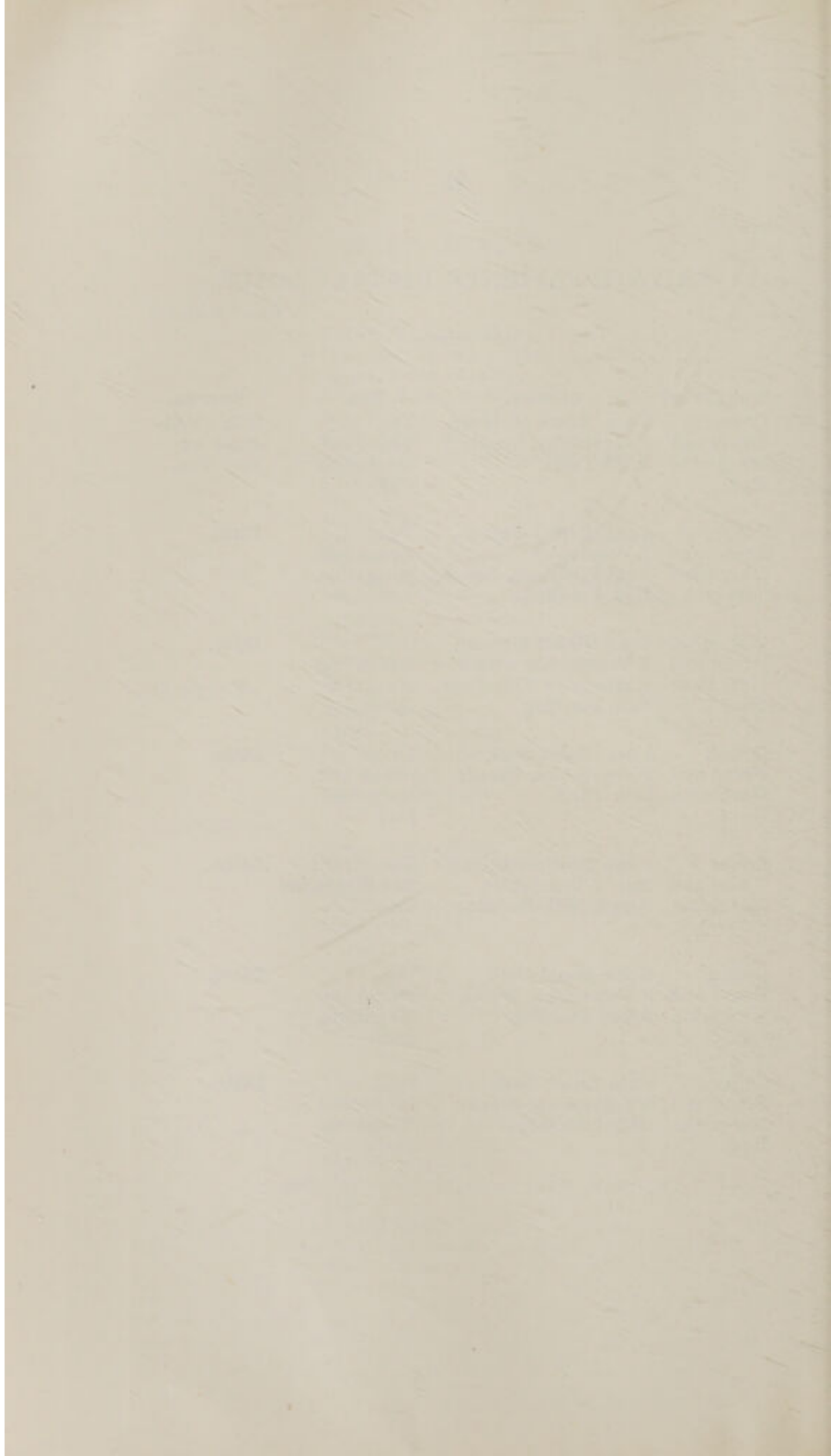

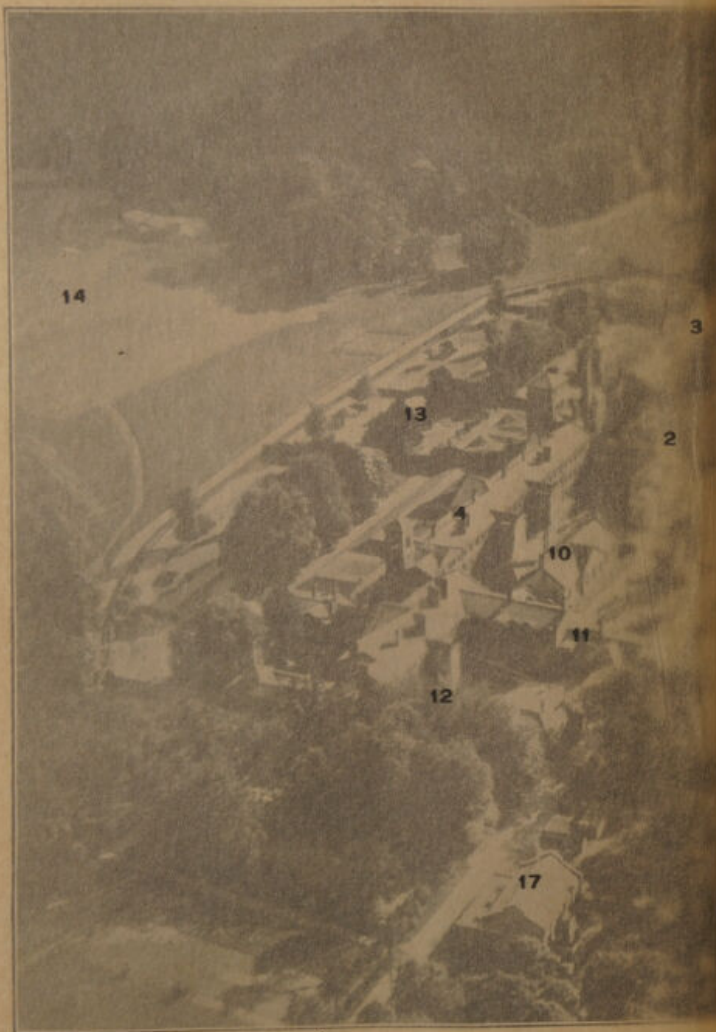

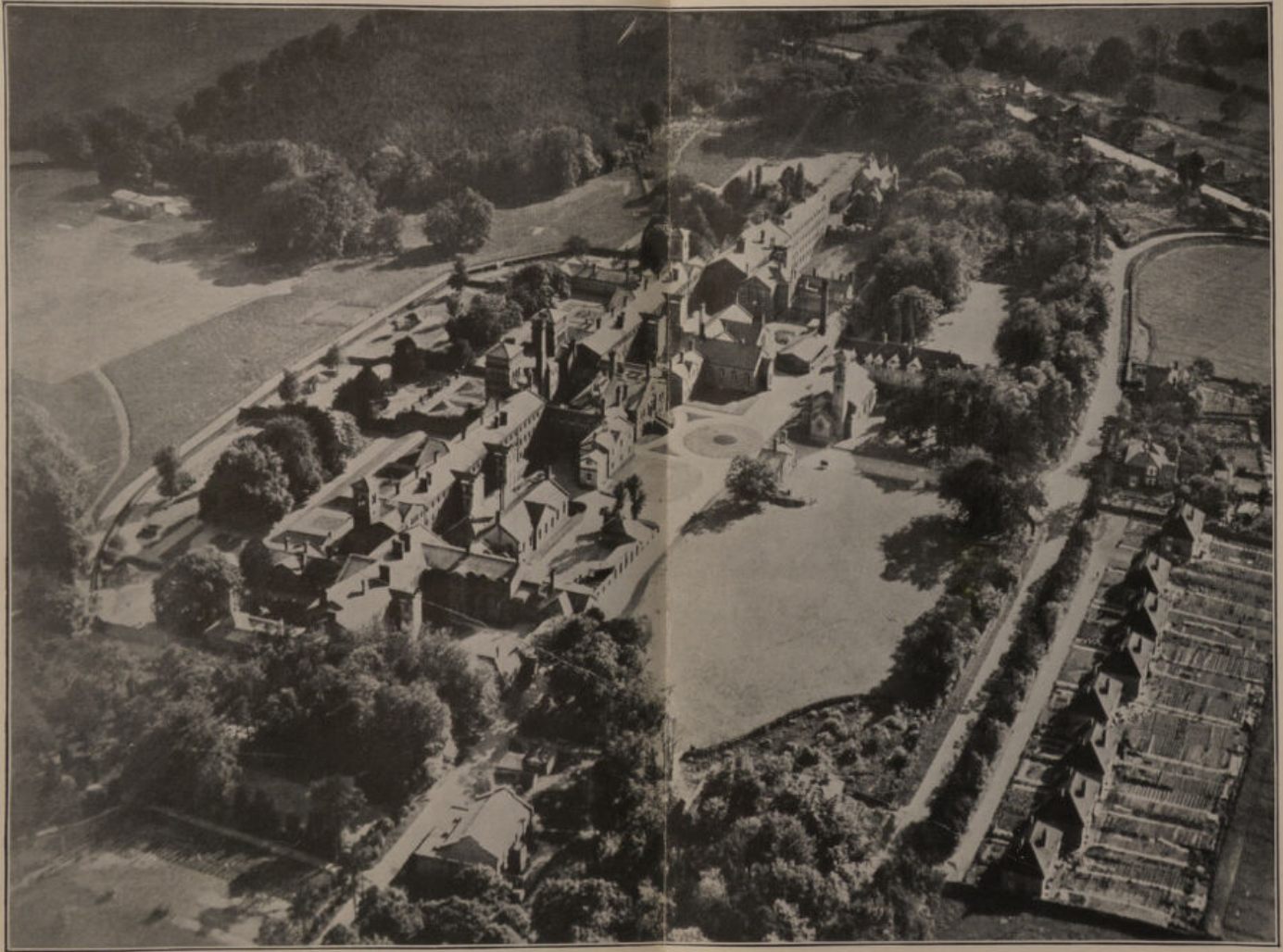
