### OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

THIS Hospital has been established for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, who are on that account excluded or discharged from General Hospitals. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period.

### NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief: indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the continuous care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them for an indefinite period, it will be obvious that changes are very slow and vacancies few and far between. The average length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is now over two years; while many of the children remain for much longer periods, as will be seen from the Medical Report, the figures in which speak for themselves as to the rate of progress of the Hospital work. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear prima facie eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission as vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers, (p. 4). More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear

### PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

- 1.—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum, and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.
- 2.—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

### EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

### LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

- 1.—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.
- 2.—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of the Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

### COT SUBSCRIBERS.

- 1.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant: no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.
- 2.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of two shillings being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

### RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

THE Hospital is devoted to the Treatment of the Children of the deserving Poor, suffering from Disease which is incurable, or which requires for its permanent relief or cure a longer time than can be spared to such cases in General Hospitals.

- 1.—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.
- 2.—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Hydrocephalus, Mental Derangement or Deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible. Pauper Children (that is, Children to be paid for, either wholly or in part, by the Guardians, directly or indirectly) are also inadmissible.
- 3.—Children are admitted only between three and ten years of age; those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

[A List of Governors and Subscribers, and full particulars of their privi-

leges, will be found on pp. 45 and 4.]

- 4.—The payment of Four Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.\*
- 5.—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary at the Hospital.
- 6.—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†
- 7.—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.
- 8.—Applicants for admission, unless the Doctor shall certify to the contrary, may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.
- 9.—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.
- 10.—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission should be at once notified to the Secretary.

\* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a house holder (or the wife of a house holder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive

their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

### METHODS OF HELP.

The following means of assisting the objects of this Institution are set down for the information, and in response to the enquiries, of friends who may be willing to give practical support to its work.

### Cot Endowment.

The sum of £1,000 endows a Free Cot in perpetuity, the Donor being entitled to name it and to nominate a child to it whenever a vacancy occurs, no payment being required on behalf of the patient.

The sum of £750 endows a Half-payment Cot in perpetuity, the Donor being entitled to name it and to nominate a child to it whenever a vacancy occurs; the payment of two shillings a week being required on behalf of the occupant.

The sum of £300 endows a Free Cot for the period of the Donor's life, and entitles the Donor to name it and to nominate a child to it as vacancies arise, no payment being required on behalf of the patient.

The sum of £250 endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the Donor's life, and entitles the Donor to name it, and to nominate a child to it as vacancies arise, the payment of two shillings a week being required on behalf of the patient so nominated.

These Life Cot Endowments can be converted into Permanent Endowments upon the death of the Donor, either by bequest or otherwise. (See p. 4.)

### Cot Subscription.

An Annual Subscription of £40 entitles the Subscriber (during its continuance) to name a Free Cot, and to nominate a child to it whenever a vacancy occurs, no payment being required on behalf of the patient.

An Annual Subscription of £30 entitles the Subscriber (during its continuance) to name a Half-payment Cot, and to nominate a child to it whenever a vacancy occurs, the payment of two shillings a week being required on behalf of the occupant.

### Annual Subscription.

An Annual Subscription of £10 10s. and upwards constitutes the Subscriber (during its continuance) a Governor of the Hospital; such Governor being entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee and Governors, and to nominate one case annually; such child having precedence of admission over those recommended by other Subscribers.

An Annual Subscription of £1 1s. and upwards entitles the Subscriber (during its continuance) to recommend one child annually; such case taking precedence of admission over those not so recommended.



### Assistance for Special Cases.

Some friends prefer to concentrate their interest upon one particular Cot or case. A few methods of doing this are suggested:—

- (1) The maintenance payment for a child at the Hospital is £10 8s. per annum, the actual cost of its support being about £54 per annum. In the majority of cases the parents are able, and ought, to pay some part of this sum, but help to a greater or less extent is often needed. The Secretary can always furnish details of cases requiring such help.
- (2) Assistance in finding suitable Homes for children requiring care and attention after leaving the Hospital, is frequently wanted by the Committee.
- (3) Contributions towards the purchase of instruments, carriages, &c., for discharged patients, and towards their maintenance at Nursing or other Homes, are always welcomed.

### Donations.

A Donation of £52 10s, in one sum constitutes a Life Governor of Cheyne Hospital. (For privileges see under Annual Subscription.) Contributions of any amount are gratefully accepted and acknowledged; and these unexpected gifts come sometimes with particular gratification at a time of special and depressing need.

### Gifts in kind.

Amongst the gifts which are always specially welcome are :-

Cast Linen of any kind; also Children's Clothing, Counterpanes, Blankets, &c. Game, Fresh Fruit and Eggs, New (unbroken) Toys, Jellies, &c., from table are much appreciated.

The Lady Superintendent will forward patterns of red and blue jackets, flannel vests, night-gowns, and holland pinafores to any friends who may be willing to provide some of these constantly-needed articles of clothing for the children, the large majority of whom are always confined to bed. Miss Elam would also be most grateful for some parcels of old linen or calico of any kind, a supply of which is daily required.

### **Enlisting Friends.**

It remains to mention one method of help which is within the the means of almost all, and which may prove as valuable as any.

While there are many who have real sympathy with such work as is here carried out, but who cannot afford direct support, there are many also who are strangers to Cheyne Hospital, but whose purses would be generously opened at a word of hearty unofficial pleading from a friend. In enlisting for our labours the interest of some of these, our present friends may be rendering the Institution a service which some the less valuable because it is vicarious.

### MEMORANDA.

The Secretary will be very glad to receive from supporters of the Hospital the names and addresses of any friends to whom they would like a copy of this Report to be sent.

No Collectors are employed by this Hospital, nor is any commission deducted from contributions received.

The Hospital does not afford a complete course of training for Nurses nor admit Probationers.

There is no Out-Patient department,

The average length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is about twenty-seven and a half months.

The average cost of each occupied bed was last year about £54, or 20s. 9d, per week.

The average number of children ultimately discharged, relieved or cured is rather more than half of the number admitted.

To prevent misunderstanding, the Committee beg that Subscribers recommending Children for admission will explain to the Parents that this Hospital is for Incurable and Long Cases, such as cannot be retained in a General Hospital.

All that is possible will be done for the Patients, but if a rapid cure could be reasonably expected, the case would be eligible for a General Hospital, and therefore would not be received here.

It should also be borne in mind that the Hospital is usually full; and that there are often a certain number of eligible cases on the Admission List awaiting their turn to be admitted as vacancies arise.

Those interested in the work of this Hospital are invited to visit it any week-day afternoon between 2 and 4.30 o'clock; and if desirous of becoming regular weekly visitors, to communicate with the Lady Superintendent.

Visitors are reminded of the danger of coming to see the children in the Hospital after having been in contact with any infectious disease.

The parents, relations, and friends of the Patients are admitted on Sunday Afternoons between 3 and 5 o'clock, but children will only be admitted on the first Sunday in every month.

It would much facilitate the collection of contributions and would assist the completion of the list, if Subscribers, for whom such a method might be convenient, would kindly make use of the Banker's Form enclosed; and also if those whose subscriptions become due in June would be so good as to forward them before the 30th AT LATEST.

In view of the objectionable use made of Subscription Lists in compiling appeal directories, and for begging purposes, the Secretary wishes to say that, when desired, the addresses of contributors can be omitted from the list, or their contributions entered under initials or receipt numbers only.

Early advice of changes of address, or of any inaccuracies in the entries, s particularly requested.

### THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The Twenty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Committee and Governors of Cheyne Hospital took place at the Hospital on Wednesday, November 4th, 1903, at 5.30 o'clock.

The chair was taken by Sir Colin Scott-Moncrieff.

The minutes of the proceedings at the Twenty-seventh Annual Meeting on November 5th, 1902, were read and confirmed.

### THE REPORT.

The Report and Statements of Receipts and Expenditure for the twelve months ending June 30th, 1903, as submitted by the General Committee, were duly adopted.

RE-ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE.

The following members of the General Committee of Management who retired at this meeting in order of seniority of their appointment thereupon, were re-elected as members, viz. Lady Vere Hughes, Lady Monkswell, and the Marchioness of Ripon.

### ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

In response to the unanimous wish of those present, Sir Colin Scott-Moncrieff kindly consented to act as Chairman of Committee for the ensuing year.

### ELECTION OF HOUSE COMMITTEE.

The following Members of the General Committee were appointed to form the House Committee for the ensuing year. viz.—Sir Colin Scott-Moncrieff, Mr. J. Prime Bartlett, Mr. Blunt, Sir C. Cookson, Mr. W. Flower, Miss Forbes, Mrs. Geiger, Mr. L. Harrison, Lady Vere Hughes, Lady Monkswell, and the Marchioness of Ripon.

### VOTE OF THANKS.

A cordial vote of thanks was accorded to Mr. J. Prime Bartlett, Mr. J. Macready, Surgeons; to Mr. Leonard F. Harrison, Treasurer; and to the other Officers and the Staff of the Hospital for their services in its behalf during the past year.

The Meeting was then adjourned.

### TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT OF CHEYNE HOSPITAL FOR SICK AND INCURABLE CHILDREN,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30TH JUNE, 1903.

THE Committee have pleasure in submitting their report of the work carried on in this institution during the past year, of which the following is a summary:

### Medical.

The death rate during the year has been rather high, but, with the exception of one patient, who died soon after admission, all the cases had been in the Hospital for a considerable time, their average stay having been three years and six months.

On reference to the table on page 33 it will be seen that or some years past there has been a pretty regular fluctuation in the death rate in alternate years, On the other hand, the number of those discharged has been very satisfactory. Excluding one or two patients of past years, admitted temporarily, the average of their stay in the Hospital was two years one-and-a-half months.

The Medical Report given on pages 28—32 shows how large a number of those remaining in the Hospital have made encouraging progress.

### FINANCE.

### Receipts.

As regards contributions, it is satisfactory to note that the list of Annual Subscriptions, notwithstanding the loss of several valuable contributors by death and withdrawal, shews a steady increase, but, unfortunately, the receipts from Donations again shew a falling off.

The Committee much regret that the total receipts for the year have again fallen short of the expenditure.

There is urgent need of increased support to enable the yearly expenses to be fully met without entrenching upon past accumulations, as it is most undesirable to have to rely upon the chance receipt of legacies to cover any deficit.

### Expenditure.

The increase in the amount spent on provisions is largely due to the smaller quantity of game, &c., received as presents. It would be of great assistance if those who have a superabundance of vegetables in their country gardens, would occasionally think of the little patients and send them a nice supply of really fresh garden produce.

There has been an increase in the amount paid for Nurses' Wages, owing to the extra help required during the continuance of an outbreak of Whooping Cough.

### Fire Appliances.

During the past year the Committee have thought it desirable to supply a larger number of Fire Extinguishing Appliances, which, they hope, will ensure prompt measures being taken, and an avoidance of panic, in the event of an outbreak of Fire.

The total outlay for this purpose has been £63 12s.

### Appeal.

The Committee earnestly hope that all who are interested in the welfare of the Hospital will kindly bring its needs before their friends, and try to induce them also to become its regular supporters, if only for a small amount.

This is specially needed in view of the efforts that are being made to provide for the enlargement of the Hospital, so as to be able to accommodate those poor little sufferers who are constantly awaiting admission, often for a very long time.

### Cots.

The Committee have gratefully to acknowledge the receipt from the executors of the late Wilfrid Hans Loder, Esq., of the sum of  $\pounds_{1,000}$ , in payment of a bequest for the permanent endowment of the "Winifrid" Cot, which he had for many years supported by an annual subscription.

### Treasurer.

It is with the sincerest regret that the Committee have to record the loss, by death, of their Treasurer, Mr. Pullam M. Evans, who, during his long association with the Hospital, had always done his utmost to further its interests, and whose counsel and services had on many occasions proved of the greatest value.

Mr. Leonard F. Harrison has kindly consented to accept the unanimous invitation of the Committee to become Treasurer of the Hospital.

### GENERAL.

### Present from H.M. The Queen.

The enjoyment of the Christmas festivities was increased by the receipt of a large and handsome box of chocolates, graciously sent by Her Majesty the Queen, President of the Hospital, for the use of the children.

### Visit of H.R.H. Princess Louise.

On the 28th October, 1902, H.R.H. The Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, visited the Hospital to arrange for the future of one of the patients in whom she was interested, and expressed her satisfaction with the work carried on here.

This child was admitted in 1901, a bad case of infantile paralysis, but after 14½ months careful treatment was well enough to be sent to one of our Cottage Homes, and is now in an institution learning a trade.

### Infection.

Unfortunately an outbreak of Whooping Cough occurred in January, and lasted until the end of May.

The cases were not very severe, and proved fatal in only one instance, the poor little girl not having strength to withstand the strain of constant coughing.

### SPECIAL FUNDS.

The Wordsworth Cottage Homes Fund balance has been considerably reduced this year, owing to the large number of children who have been boarded out.

Most of these have been sent to their homes, greatly benefited by the fresh air of the country, and only two now remain on the Hospital books.

Contributions to this desirable fund are earnestly solicited.

The advantages of a change to a comfortable country home, with fresh air, good living and kindly treatment after a long confinement in a Hospital Cot cannot be over estimated. THE CHILDREN'S COT ENDOWMENT FUND has again received a substantial addition to its total, the Boys of Bengeo School having once more supported it most liberally.

### Extension.

The Extension Fund has been materially increased through the kind help of Mrs. Wordsworth.

A short account of the entertainment given by her on behalf of the fund will be found on pages 26—27.

The Committee again make an urgent appeal for contributions to this fund.

The need of an enlargement of the Hospital is amply proved by the list of patients who are always waiting for admission, and by the fact that many children are not entered as candidates owing to the certainty of their having to wait so long for their turn for admission.

### ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

The Committee again offer their sincerest thanks to all those, who, in many ways, have so kindly helped the Hospital during the past year, and they confidently appeal for the continuance of such help.

Their special thanks are due to the Staff of St. Luke's Church, who have so kindly conducted the Sunday afternoon services throughout the year, and also to the Right Rev. The Bishop of Kensington, who, accompanied by the Rev. Canon Chapman, visited the Hospital for the purpose of holding a Confirmation Service.

### Gifts.

The Lady Superintendent will be very grateful for any gifts of clothing, linen, night-dresses, old blankets, white counterpanes, &c.

So many children were discharged from the Hospital last year, that the supply of clothes being deficient, the item under the head of "Clothing" was materially increased. Sound toys, new or old, however inexpensive and simple in character, are always appreciated, and as the majority of those given are usually for girls, a special appeal is made for some suitable for boys.

In reviewing the work of the Hospital it will be seen that a certain number of the patients admitted are hopelessly incurable, but in such cases their sufferings are alleviated, and their lives are made as bright as circumstances will permit. A very large proportion of the cases have, however, yielded to the careful treatment and nursing obtainable in such an institution, which it is impossible for them to receive in crowded homes, and such a result is an ample justification for an appeal, not only for renewed, but for extended support.

### THE EXTENSION FUND.

On the 25th and 26th of June entertainments were kindly given at the Criterion Theatre by Mrs. Wordsworth and her pupils in aid of the Extension Fund of the Hospital.

The performance began with a "Romance of the Clock," a charming representation of the old courtly style of dancing. This was followed by three Danish dances, which were rendered very attractive by the picturesque costumes of the country which were worn by the performers.

Then came eight fancy dances, comprising a Court dance, Serpentine, Scarf, and Skirt Dances, a Hornpipe, Valse Enchantée, a Bacchante dance, and a Japanese dance, all of which were executed with great grace of movement and individual character.

These were followed by a Cycle of Dances—Whip Ballet, Trios and Bell Ballet—in which a large number of performers were engaged displaying perfect manœuvering and beautiful combinations of effects.

At intervals some songs were charmingly rendered by Miss Clare Dow, and the first part of the programme ended with a very skilful bout of fencing by Mons. Felix Gravé, Professor, and Mr. Windsor Fry, his pupil.

The second part consisted of representations, in dumb show, of scenes from "Alice in Wonderland." These were most cleverly performed and gave a very realistic idea of the events portrayed.

It is impossible in the limited space at command to refer to individual performers, but special mention may be made of the very charming representation of the "Spirit of Wonderland," by little Miss Ithamar Gobell.

All the dancers entered thoroughly into their parts and shewed the excellent training which they had received under Mrs. Wordsworth's admirable guidance.

Mrs. Wordsworth is to be sincerely congratulated upon the success of the entertainments in every respect. Only those who organised them know how much labour was entailed thereby, but they all must have felt that their efforts were well rewarded when they saw the house crowded on both

afternoons by enthusiastic audiences, and were able to hand over the very substantial proceeds of £140 to the Committee of the Hospital.

After the curtain was finally dropped, Mrs. Wordsworth was called upon for a speech, and she most kindly came forward and in a few words spoke of the benefits which the Hospital affords to the sick poor.


