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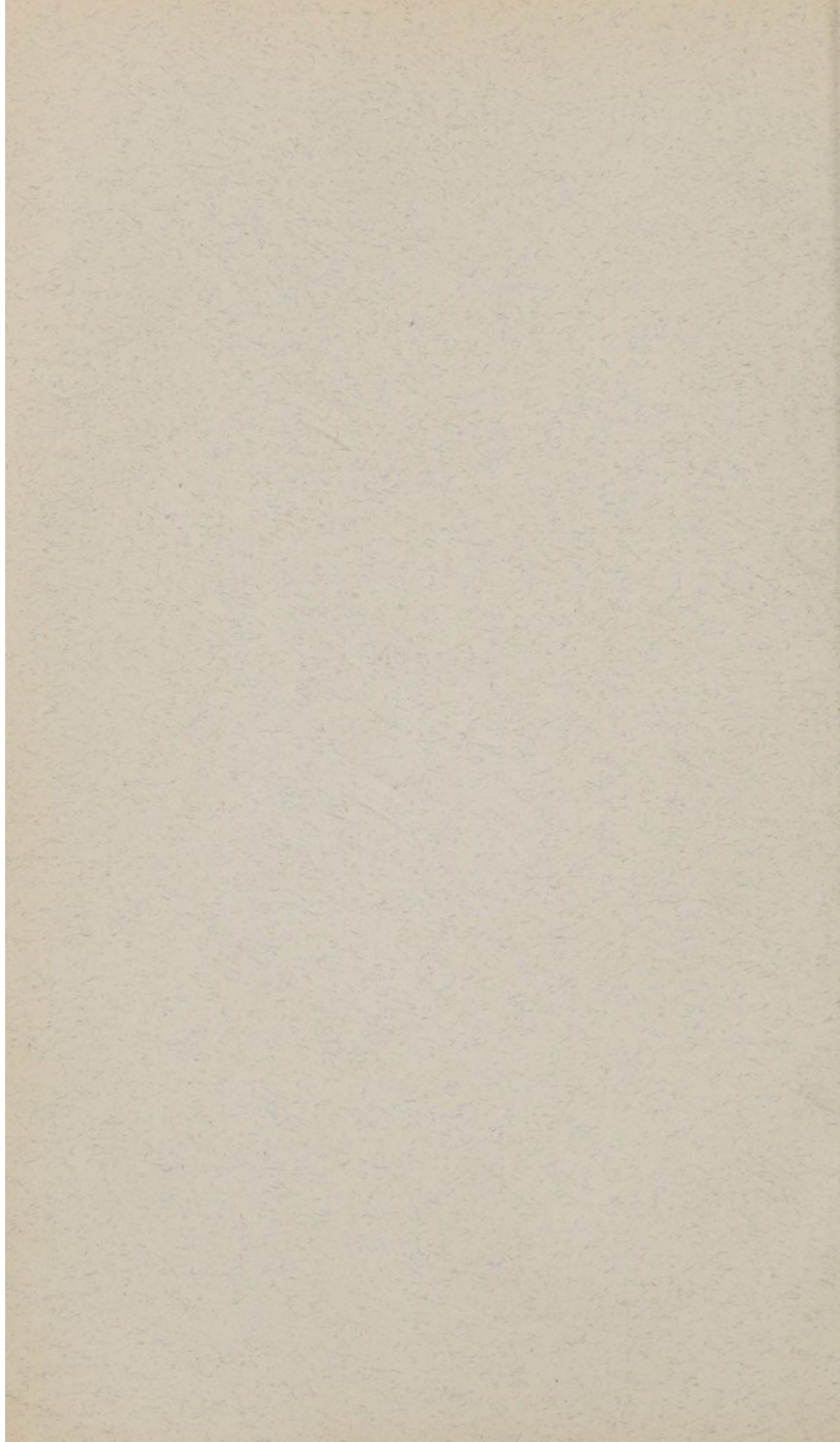

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

THIS Hospital has been established for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, who are on that account excluded or discharged from General Hospitals. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period.

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief: indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the continuous care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them for an indefinite period, it will be obvious that changes are very slow and vacancies few and far between. The *average* length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is now over two years; while many of the children remain for much longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear *prima facie* eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission as vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers, (p. 4.) More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1.—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum, and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2.—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1.—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2.—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of the Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant: no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of two shillings being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

THE Hospital is devoted to the Treatment of the Children of the deserving Poor, suffering from Disease which is incurable or which requires for its permanent relief or cure a longer time than can be spared to such cases in General Hospitals.

1.—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2.—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Ricketts, Hydrocephalus, Mental Derangement or Deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible. Pauper Children (that is, Children to be paid for, either wholly or in part, by the Guardians, directly or indirectly) are also inadmissible.

3.—Children are admitted only between three and twelve years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4.—The payment of Four Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

5.—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary at the Hospital.

6.—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†

7.—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8.—Applicants for admission, unless the Doctor shall certify to the contrary, may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

9.—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

10.—A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, *must* be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be *brought with the child*.

11.—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission should be at once notified to the Secretary.

* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a house holder (or the wife of a house holder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

ASSISTANCE FOR SPECIAL CASES.

Some friends prefer to concentrate their interest upon one particular Cot or case. The following method is suggested:—

- (1) The maintenance payment for a child at the Hospital is £10 8s. per annum, the actual *cost* of its support being about £54 per annum. In the majority of cases the parents are able, and ought, to pay some part of this sum, but help to a greater or less extent is often needed. The Secretary can always furnish details of cases requiring such help.

GIFTS IN KIND.

Amongst the gifts which are always specially welcome are:—

Cast Linen of any kind; also Children's Clothing, Counterpanes, Blankets, etc. Game, Fresh Fruit and Eggs, New (*unbroken*) Toys, Jellies, etc., from table are much appreciated.

The Lady Superintendent will forward patterns of red and blue jackets, flannel vests, night-gowns, and holland pinafores to any friends who may be willing to provide some of these constantly-needed articles of clothing for the children, the large majority of whom are always confined to bed. Miss Elam would also be most grateful for some parcels of old linen or calico of *any* kind, a supply of which is daily required.

ENLISTING FRIENDS.

It remains to mention one method of help which is within the means of almost all, and which may prove as valuable as any.

While there are many who have real sympathy with such work as is here carried out, but who cannot afford direct support, there are many also who are strangers to Cheyne Hospital, but whose purses would be generously opened at a word of hearty *unofficial* pleading from a friend. In enlisting for our labours the interest of some of these, our present friends may be rendering the Institution a service which is none the less valuable because it is vicarious.

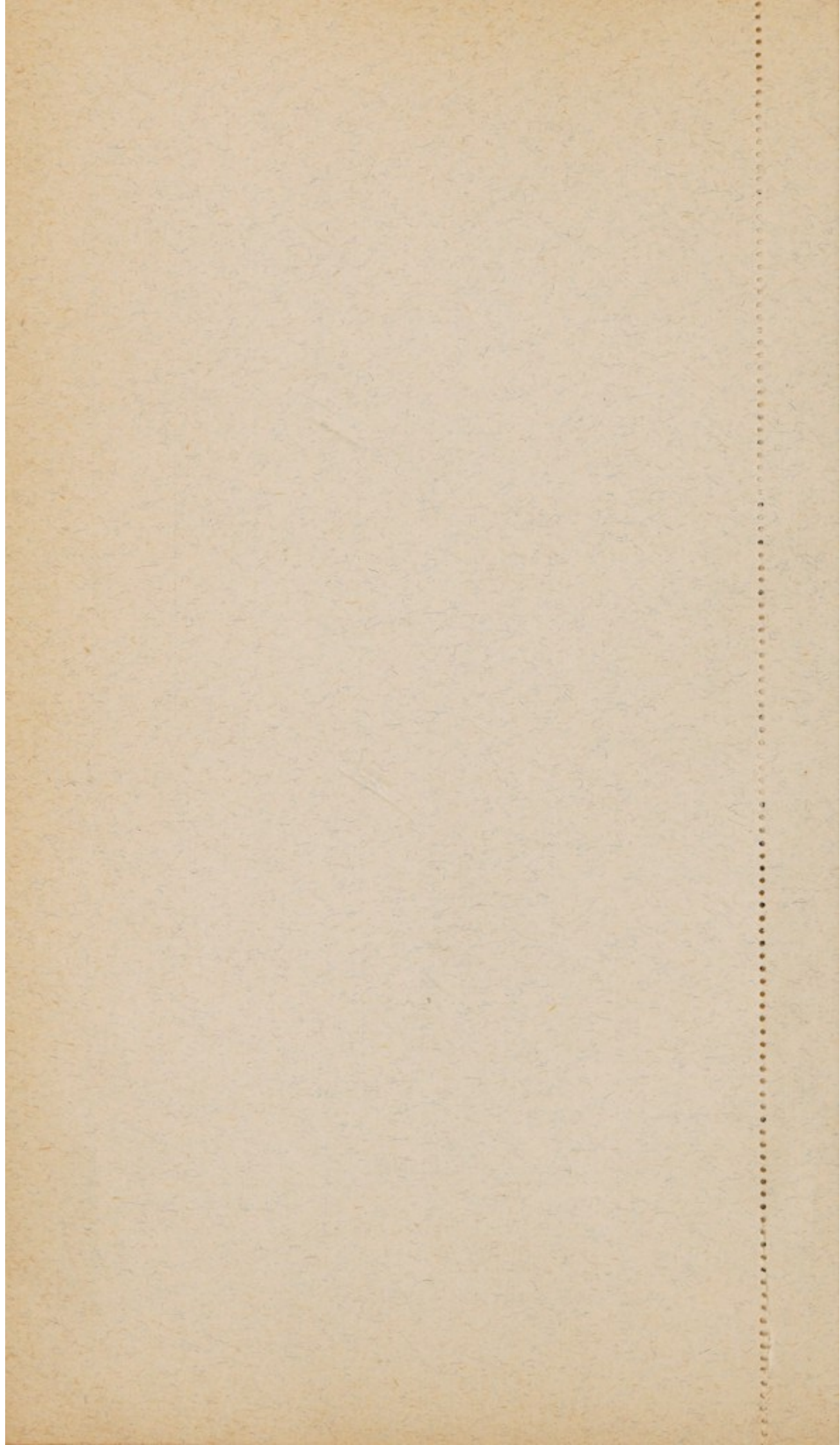

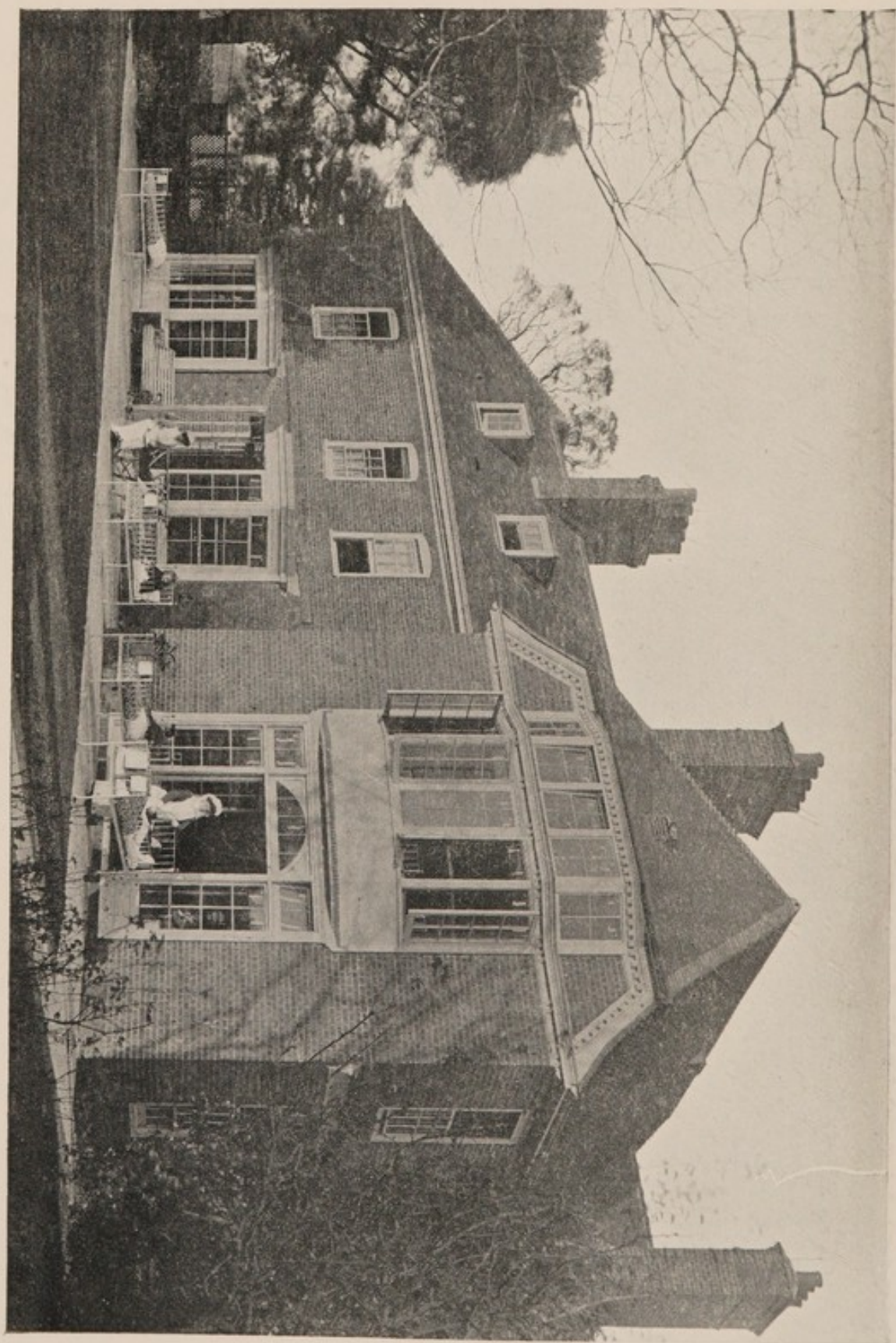

ST. NICHOLAS HOSPITAL.

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in presenting their Report for the year ending the 31st December, 1910.

The principal event of the year has been the opening of the Branch Hospital at St. Nicholas-at-Wade, Kent. On the 24th January, 12 Patients were sent there, and very shortly afterwards it was occupied to its full capacity of 26 children.

At Cheyne Hospital a few of the patients suffered from Whooping Cough, but fortunately the outbreak was confined to one ward, and was not at all serious. At St. Nicholas one child developed Diphtheria shortly after his arrival there. The disease must have been contracted before he was received at the Hospital, though there were then no symptoms of it. He was promptly isolated, and has since perfectly recovered.

With these exceptions, there has been nothing to be specially noted as regards the health of the patients, their progress having gone on in a normal manner.

The Committee have pleasure in referring to the case of a boy, who was admitted nine years ago suffering from Caries of the Spine, who is now being taught a trade, and beginning to earn his living, having been discharged during the past year to the Duchess of Sutherland's Cripples Home at Trentham. This is an illustration of what can be done towards effecting a cure when sufficient time is given.

The following extracts from letters received from the parents of discharged patients, illustrate how greatly the advantages offered by this Hospital are valued by them :—

' I hope you will not think me ungrateful for not writing on Sunday as I promised, but we have all been so overjoyed with our little girl that we don't know how to thank you enough, and I am sure I don't know what to say. it seems such a miracle to think that she can walk, and her back looks so straight, one would never think that she has had to lay so long as she did.'

"Just a line to let you know that we got home quite safe with Eliza, and how pleased all her friends were when they saw her, and they all said how well you must have looked after her to bring her round to herself again. I can tell you that I and the Wife and her elder sisters do not know how to thank you for the grand way in which you have treated our little daughter."

A larger number of children than usual have been discharged to their homes; and only three deaths have occurred during the year, a result which is most satisfactory.

The Committee tender their warmest thanks to the Medical and Nursing Staffs of both Hospitals for their careful treatment of the cases under their charge.

Finance.

The Subscription List has again been reduced by deaths and withdrawals, and it is most necessary, if the work of the Institution is to be carried on to its full capacity, that an effort should be made to secure fresh support. All those who are interested in its welfare, are therefore earnestly asked to enlist new Subscribers, even if only for small amounts.

On reference to the Income and Expenditure account it will be seen that the ordinary Income has not been sufficient to meet the outgoings for *both* Hospitals, and the fact that no debt has been incurred is due to the receipt of legacies. As this source of Revenue is entirely unreliable, it will be necessary to increase the regular sources of Income.

Expenditure has been kept as low as possible, and in most items compares favourably with previous years. Some increase has taken place in the Annual Cleaning, owing to the necessity for painting the outside of the buildings, as well as for cleaning the Wards.

The necessary alterations and additions to this Hospital were completed early in the year. There are now three excellent wards, capable of accomodating 26 patients, and fitted with all the necessary appliances.

A supply of pure water has been secured from the same source as that which supplies Margate, and a fire hydrant has been connected with the main.

An Isolation Ward with the necessary offices has been erected in the garden. This will be of great service in the event of any outbreak of infectious disease.

Lighting is obtained by means of a petrol Gas Plant, which is easily managed by the Staff, and works very efficiently. This gas also heats radiators in the wards, and does part of the cooking.

The garden produces a good supply of vegetables and has been found to be of great advantage to the patients, especially in the summer months.

During one of the severe thunder storms of last summer, one of the new chimneys was struck by lightning, but fortunately no one in the house was injured, though one man and several cattle in the neighbourhood were killed. The house is now well protected by lightning conductors.

The strong air of that part of the country, though probably too cold for certain cases, is certainly most beneficial for most of the patients treated there.

As stated above, several children were sent there from Cheyne Hospital, before being finally discharged. Most of these have now been sent to their homes, and their places have been taken by children requiring prolonged treatment. It has been decided not to send merely convalescent patients to St. Nicholas, but to place such cases, as heretofore, in country cottages or Homes.

The Rev. H. A. Trimmer, M.A., Vicar of St. Nicholas, has kindly accepted the Hon. Chaplaincy of the Hospital, and his ministrations are greatly appreciated by the patients and the staff.

The Committee offer their cordial thanks to all those living in or visiting the neighbourhood, who have so kindly taken an interest in the Hospital. They appeal to others who may not know of its existence to visit it, and if possible to spare a little time regularly in amusing and teaching the children. Such visits are greatly appreciated by the little patients who have to spend so long a time without much variation in their lives.

The Matron is desirous of establishing a Needlework Guild for the supply of clothing, bedjackets, &c., for the patients, and anyone who will kindly help in this way is requested to communicate with her when information will gladly be sent as to the way in which they can assist her most efficiently.

Acknowledgments.

The thanks of the Committee and of all in the Hospital are tendered to the Staff of St. Luke's Church, Chelsea, for their continued kindness in ministering to the spiritual wants of the patients during the past year.

The Committee also desire to thank all those who have so kindly visited and provided entertainments for the children, as well as those who have sent gifts, and especially any who by their financial help have enabled the work of the Hospital to be carried on.

The Lady Superintendent will be thankful for gifts of clothing which is always wanted for patients leaving the Hospital.

General.

The Committee greatly regret that Miss Forbes has resigned her membership of the Committee owing to her inability to attend its meetings.

They are, however, very glad to report that Miss Stainbank has kindly joined the Committee.
