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

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

THIS Hospital has been established for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, who are on that account excluded or discharged from General Hospitals. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period.

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief: indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the continuous care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them for an indefinite period, it will be obvious that changes are very slow and vacancies few and far between. The *average* length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is now over two years; while many of the children remain for much longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear *prima facie* eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission as vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers, (p. 5.) More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1.—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum, and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2.—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1.—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2.—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of the Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant: no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of two shillings being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1.—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2.—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Ricketts, Hydrocephalus, Mental Derangement or Deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible. Pauper Children (that is, Children to be paid for, either wholly or in part, by the Guardians, directly or indirectly) are also inadmissible.

3.—Children are admitted only between three and twelve years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4.—The payment of Four Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

5.—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary at the Hospital.

6.—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†

7.—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8.—Applicants for admission, unless the Doctor shall certify to the contrary, may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.


9.—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

10.—A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, *must* be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be *brought with the child*.

11.—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission should be at once notified to the Secretary.

* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a house holder (or the wife of a house holder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

METHODS OF HELP.

The following means of assisting the objects of this Institution are set down for the information, and in response to the enquiries, of friends who may be willing to give practical support to its work.

COT ENDOWMENT.

The sum of £1,000 endows a Free Cot in perpetuity, the Donor being entitled to name it and to nominate a child to it whenever a vacancy occurs, no payment being required on behalf of the patient.

The sum of £750 endows a Half-payment Cot in perpetuity, the Donor being entitled to name it and to nominate a child to it whenever a vacancy occurs; the payment of two shillings a week being required on behalf of the occupant.

The sum of £300 endows a Free Cot for the period of the Donor's life, and entitles the Donor to name it and to nominate a child to it as vacancies arise, no payment being required on behalf of the patient.

The sum of £250 endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the Donor's life, and entitles the Donor to name it, and to nominate a child to it as vacancies arise, the payment of two shillings a week being required on behalf of the patient so nominated.

These Life Cot Endowments can be converted into Permanent Endowments upon the death of the Donor, either by bequest or otherwise. (See p. 5.)

COT SUBSCRIPTION.

An Annual Subscription of £40 entitles the Subscriber (during its continuance) to name a Free Cot, and to nominate a child to it whenever a vacancy occurs, no payment being required on behalf of the patient.

An Annual Subscription of £30 entitles the Subscriber (during its continuance) to name a Half-payment Cot, and to nominate a child to it whenever a vacancy occurs, the payment of two shillings a week being required on behalf of the occupant.

ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTION.

An Annual Subscription of £10 10s. and upwards constitutes the Subscriber (during its continuance) a Governor of the Hospital; such Governor being entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee and Governors, and to nominate one case annually; such child having precedence of admission over those recommended by other Subscribers.

An Annual Subscription of £1 1s. and upwards entitles the Subscriber (during its continuance) to recommend one child annually; such case taking precedence of admission over those not so recommended.

ASSISTANCE FOR SPECIAL CASES.

Some friends prefer to concentrate their interest upon one particular Cot or case. A few methods of doing this are suggested:—

- (1) The maintenance payment for a child at the Hospital is £10 8s. per annum, the actual *cost* of its support being about £54 per annum. In the majority of cases the parents are able, and ought, to pay some part of this sum, but help to a greater or less extent is often needed. The Secretary can always furnish details of cases requiring such help.
- (2) Assistance in finding suitable Homes for children requiring care and attention after leaving the Hospital, is frequently wanted by the Committee.
- (3) Contributions towards the purchase of instruments, carriages, &c., for discharged patients, and towards their maintenance at Nursing or other Homes, are always welcomed.

DONATIONS.

A Donation of £52 10s. in one sum constitutes a Life Governor of Cheyne Hospital. (For privileges see under Annual Subscription.) Contributions of any amount are gratefully accepted and acknowledged; and these unexpected gifts come sometimes with particular gratification at a time of special and depressing need.

GIFTS IN KIND.

The following articles are specially needed:—

At Cheyne Hospital—Plain White Nightgowns, Red Turkey Twill Jackets, and Blue Shirting Jackets.

At St. Nicholas Hospital—Red Flannel Bed Jackets, Holland Overalls, Flannel Nightgowns, and Woollen Vests with long sleeves.

It remains to mention one method of help which is within the means of almost all, and which may prove as valuable as any.

While there are many who have real sympathy with such work as is here carried out, but who cannot afford direct support, there are many also who are strangers to Cheyne Hospital, but whose purses would be generously opened at a word of hearty *unofficial* pleading from a friend. In enlisting for our labours the interest of some of these, our present friends may be rendering the Institution a service which is none the less valuable because it is vicarious.

“GEORGE”

A CHEYNE HOSPITAL BOY'S STORY.

There passed away last week, at the Cheyne Hospital for Sick and Incurable Children, one, of whose short life it may be interesting to some of your readers to put a few facts on record.

George Horley was brought to Cheyne Hospital from his poor home in the East End at the age of nine, more than eleven years ago, suffering from tuberculous disease of the spine. He had already been for at least four years an in and out patient of the London Hospital, before he was discharged and sent to Chelsea as incurable. His mother was dead. His father had deserted the family; and George and one sister had found a refuge with two aunts. He did not remember or care to recall very much about his "home"; as a little chap, he told us, he had earned occasional coppers doing Friday housework for Jewish neighbours, but Cheyne Hospital was the only real home of his brief pain-stricken life. Unlike many of the other patients who, though admitted as "incurable," can be brought back to health, even if permanently crippled, by long continued treatment and nursing, George never gave up hope of ultimate recovery. Through all these eleven years he has lain on his back in his cot in the corner of the Rowland Baring Ward, fluctuating from time to time in his condition, but never well enough even to sit up, and far too ill to be discharged when he reached the normal age limit of the hospital. But through these long years of illness George was taught and befriended as well as nursed, and gradually became a very well-known personage to most of the regular hospital visitors. He learned to read and write and sew, he played chess and draughts, and took a very intelligent interest in all sorts of outside happenings. He was specially devoted to books of travel and adventure, and used to say, in his earlier days, that when he got well he would like to be the servant of a gentleman who would take him with him on travelling expeditions. He read the newspapers regularly, and followed all the fighting of the Boer War with his campaign map and little battle flags, keenly discussing with his special visitors all that went on in South Africa. Everyone, from Queen Alexandra downwards, who visited Cheyne Hospital, had a little chat with George; and many who passed regularly along Cheyne-walk knew his window overlooking the river, and waved him a greeting as they passed. Visitors used to write him letters telling of their doings when they went

away for holidays, and his circle of friends was quite a wide one. He became, as time went on, a real influence for good in the ward, of which—though many of the children remain for years under treatment in the hospital—he had long been the “father.” One of the boys, who had been a fellow inmate, recovered sufficiently, after a long convalescence at one of the hospital’s country homes, to be apprenticed to a tailor, where he is now earning an independent livelihood; and he made a point of coming to visit George whenever he could get up to London. It is wonderful how these bedridden children get to know and communicate with each other, and when one of them recovers sufficiently to be up on crutches, or in a wheel chair, he naturally becomes a sort of ward mercury, carrying messages hither and thither, swopping toys and books, and setting and solving puzzles between cot and cot.

George had a due sense of responsibility as head of his ward. He was sharp to rebuke any misbehaviour behind Sister’s back; he insisted on leading the singing of the dinner grace and the evening hymn, with results which were occasionally disconcerting, as he had no ear at all for music; and when kindly clergymen gave the children little homilies at Sunday services, he failed not of due response when a question was put. Thus it was that when a chaplain who had been trying to explain the Holy Spirit, pictured to the small patients a something which was in the air all about us, which we could not see nor touch, yet which seemed to be ever present with us, and asked what was this indefinable something? “Microbes” said George, promptly, and the answer, though unexpected, was incontestable.

George himself was a Roman Catholic, and was visited by the priests of the Church of the Holy Redeemer in Cheyne-row. The late Lady Ripon, who was for many years on the committee of the hospital, was one of George’s many friends; and when, some years ago, he was confirmed in the hospital, the late Lord Ripon came and stood as his godfather. Two or three weeks ago Father Skrimshire, who had often visited him, knowing that George was nearing the end of his long pilgrimage of pain, spoke tenderly and fully to the boy of what was before him, and administered the Sacrament to him. All that morning George had looked troubled and wearied; but Miss Elam told me that in the evening as he lay quietly there after the Father had gone, he seemed almost transfigured; “he had the face of an angel,” she said; “happy and at peace.”

People who didn’t know George were sometimes astonished to find in the corner of a hospital ward a boy of so fine a fibre, so courteous, so generous, so utterly uncomplaining; his first instinct with a new possession

was to share the pleasure of it with others. He had a delicate, natural consideration for others not common in youth. Last autumn, when his surgeon was himself lying ill at home, George must send him special newspaper cuttings which he thought would interest him; and, later, when Arthur Dyer, one of the chief officers of the London Fire Brigade, and a special friend of George's—was badly injured at a big fire, he posted special journals to his fellow patient at the London Hospital.

And so one might go on, did your space permit, telling more of this dear, beautiful-natured boy. But it is, I think, well that something at least should be recorded of a life so cruelly fated, as to our blindness it must seem, yet so finely, bravely steered to the very end. For George, to the last, was "captain of his soul." I saw him just for a few minutes two days before his release came. I had written to him, before, my last few words of thanks, and we just chatted of the everyday things; his eyes had the dark rings of pain, yet he talked cheerily and pluckily, and didn't forget to ask after my own boy, in whose aeroplane models he had always been interested, and then with a smile one remembers, he bade me good-bye. Happily, the end came for him without struggle near midnight. George had been offered a room to himself, with his devoted Sister Kate to nurse him there, but he would not hear of it. He liked to watch the daily doings of the ward, and the quiet play of the other children (they were very good and subdued those last days) right on to the end. When he passed away, most of them were asleep, and next morning when his bed was empty very little was said. Hospital children have a happy faculty of not noticing, or something hushes in them inquiry about the unintelligible things. Only George's nearest neighbour cried a little bit, and one boy, being asked by another where George was, said "He's gone upstairs."

General.

During the past year steady progress towards recovery has been made by many of the patients, and there has been generally a decided improvement in their condition. A larger number than usual have been discharged, whilst the deaths have not exceeded the average of past years.

Amongst those who have passed away was George Horley, who had been in the Hospital for several years, and in whom so many of the friends of the Hospital were greatly interested. The account, written by Mr. Reginald Blunt, which appeared in a local newspaper, and which will be found on page 9, will appeal to many who knew the lad well.

A few cases of whooping cough occurred early in the year, but these were removed to the Grove Hospital at Tooting, with the result that the spread of the infection was checked. They have all recovered and returned to the Hospital. Later on, an outbreak of chicken pox, which did not spread beyond the initial infection, occurred in the Upper Ward, but all the cases were of a mild description and the Hospital is now clear.

The Hospital at St. Nicholas has been quite free from any infectious complaint. The number of discharges there has been small, this being mainly due to the comparatively short time that the patients have been under treatment.

The Shelter, referred to in the last Report, has been completed, and proves to be most beneficial in cases of tuberculous disease.

An increase in the number of cots to 30 has been found to be possible without incurring any addition to the nursing or household staffs.

Mr. W. G. Sutcliffe, F.R.C.S., and Mr. Percy Webster of Margate have kindly consented to act as consulting surgeon and dental surgeon respectively.

The Committee tender their sincere thanks to the medical and nursing staffs of both Hospitals for their careful treatment of the cases under their charge.

Cottage Homes.

The tables given above show that a larger number of children have been sent for convalescence to Country Homes. This, of course, has been done at an increased cost, but careful treatment in fresh country air, after a long stay in the Hospital, has been found to be so beneficial, that the expense incurred cannot be grudged.

Finance.

RECEIPTS.

The Committee are very pleased to be able to report that during the year there has been an increase in the amount of Annual Subscriptions received, though there have been some losses through deaths and withdrawals.

They gratefully acknowledge a donation from H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, who sent a contribution of £5 with "his greetings to the little inmates, as well as to the staff in their sad but devoted work."

Donations have also increased and legacies for substantial amounts have been received. Amongst others the Committee specially acknowledge the following donations :—

the last being the proceeds of a Sale of Work held at their home, and organised by them.

The Committee are very grateful to the Executors of the late Mrs. Barnato for a grant of £100 from the funds left at their disposal for distribution amongst charitable institutions.

The Estate of the late Mr. Wickham Flower has now been closed and the proceeds handed over to the Hospital Trustees for the endowment of "The Founder's Gift."

EXPENDITURE.

It is gratifying to note that there has not been a great increase in the ordinary expenditure of the two Hospitals, notwithstanding the rise in cost of many articles and a rather heavy outlay in cleaning and decorating the interior of Cheyne Hospital. A larger number of patients have also been treated at St. Nicholas than in the previous year.

Cots.

The Committee sincerely thank the supporters of all Free and Half-pay Cots. These contributions are not only useful in helping cases where parents are unable to afford the weekly payment, but they enable a greater number of children to be received than could otherwise be done. Particulars as to the cost of endowment, or of subscriptions to named cots, are given on page 48.

St. Nicholas Hospital.

On the 13th July an Inaugural Garden Fête was held at St. Nicholas Hospital with a view to enlisting the sympathy of residents in, and visitors to the neighbourhood. A company of about 150 assembled, and many expressed their interest in, and approval of the arrangements of the Institution. By kind consent of Colonel A. H. Morris, C.M.G., D.S.O., the band of the Duke of York's School (recently moved from Chelsea to Guston, near Dover), performed an excellent programme of music

which was much appreciated. A charming selection of pastoral dances was also given by Miss Wortham and her pupils, which were warmly applauded by the visitors. The Committee tender them all very sincere thanks for their kindly help. It is most satisfactory to record that this entertainment has resulted, not only in obtaining financial help, but in securing the personal interest of many neighbours, who have since then frequently visited the children and taken an interest in their welfare. It has also greatly assisted in the enlargement of the "Working Guild," which now includes 47 members, who have already provided 167 garments for the use of the patients.

An attractive booklet, descriptive of the New Hospital, was kindly prepared by Mr. Reginald Blunt, and circulated amongst the visitors, and was much appreciated.

The Committee sincerely thank Mr. Leonard Harrison for providing a Flag Staff, which has been set up in the garden, and Dr. W. R. Brunton for a Flag for the same. A special effort has been made by Mrs. Brunton, Mrs. S. Champion, and Mrs. Hilton-Johnson to raise funds for the Hospital for which the Committee tender them their warmest thanks. They have taken much trouble in editing a Quotation Calendar for 1913 for sale on behalf of the Hospital Funds the cover having been kindly designed by Miss Margaret Kemp-Welch. This has resulted in raising a sum of £40.

General.

As it was considered to be desirable that there should be a Vice-Chairman to the Committee, Lieut.-Col. E. M. Wilson, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., was invited and kindly consented to accept the position.

The following have been appointed Governors of the Hospital:—Alphonse N. Abrahams, Esq., Miss M. M. E. Hubbard, Miss Amy C. Bell, and Horace C. Ambler, Esq.

Acknowledgments.

The staffs of St. Luke's Church at Chelsea and the Rev. H. E. Trimmer at St. Nicholas have again most kindly given their ministrations at the respective Hospitals, and the Committee tender them their best thanks for their valuable help.

The Committee are greatly indebted to Messrs. Hichens, Harrison & Co., who for some years have most kindly invested the monies of the Hospital, free of any charge for brokerage, and to Messrs. Prideaux & Sons for the remission of half of the charge for any legal work carried out through them, and to both these firms they offer their sincere thanks.

They also thank all those who have visited the patients, or who have provided entertainments, gifts, clothing, &c., for them. To witness the brightening of the children's faces when visitors enter the wards is enough to show what such visits mean to them.

The Committee earnestly appeal to all those who are interested in the welfare of children to help in the carrying on of the work of these Hospitals. Extra funds are needed to keep them both full, as it is not satisfactory to have to rely on the receipt of legacies to make good any annual deficiency. They also ask for gifts of clothing and other articles as enumerated on page 8.
