



OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

THIS Hospital has been established for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, who are on that account excluded or discharged from General Hospitals. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period.

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the continuous care and treatment of cases of deepseated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them for an indefinite period, it will be obvious that changes are very slow and vacancies few and far between. The average length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is now over two years; while many of the children remain for much longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear prima facie eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission as vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers, (p. 5). More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

- 1.—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum, and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.
- 2.—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

- 1.—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.
- 2.—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of the Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

- 1.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.
- 2.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of two shillings being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

- 1.—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.
- 2.—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Ricketts, Hydrocephalus, Mental Derangement or Deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible. Pauper Children (that is, Children to be paid for, either wholly or in part, by the Guardians, directly or indirectly) are also inadmissible.
- 3.—Children are admitted only between three and twelve years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.
- 4.—The payment of Four Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*
- 5.—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary at the Hospital.
- 6.—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†
- 7.—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.
- 8.—Applicants for admission, unless the Doctor shall certify to the contrary, may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.
- 9.—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.
- 10.—A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, *must* be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be *brought with the child*.
- 11.—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission should be at once notified to the Secretary.

^{*} Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

[†] The Guarantor should be a house holder (or the wife of a house holder) rated at \$40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

METHODS OF HELP.

The establishment of a Branch Hospital at St. Nicholas-at-Wade, (which is a Hospital dealing with cases of exactly the same nature as those treated at Cheyne Hospital, and therefore is *not* a Convalescent Home) has considerably increased the expenses incurred.

An earnest appeal is therefore made to all supporters of this Institution, to do their utmost to enlist the sympathy and help of their friends.

While there are many who have real sympathy with such work as is here carried out, but who cannot afford direct support, there are many also who are strangers to Cheyne Hospital, but whose purses would be generously opened at a word of hearty unofficial pleading from a friend. In enlisting for our labours the interest of some of these, our present friends may be rendering the Institution a service which is none the less valuable because it is vicarious.

GIFTS IN KIND.

The following articles are specially needed:-

At Cheyne Hospital—Plain White Nightgowns, Red Turkey Twill Jackets, and Blue Shirting Jackets.

The matron of St. Nicholas Hospital will be most grateful to anyone who will be kind enough to devote a little time to visiting the children there, especially to those who can do so regularly, and who can help in giving some instruction to those patients who are well enough to receive it.

The year's work shows a most satisfactory result, as no fewer than 30 children have been discharged cured, and 7 relieved, figures, which together, considerably exceed those of some years past. There have been 12 deaths at the two institutions. The average stay in the Hospitals of those discharged has been 2 years 2\frac{1}{4} months, and that of those who have died, 1 year and 6 months.

The Hospitals have been almost entirely free from any outbreak of infection, the only exception being one case of Scarlet Fever at St. Nicholas. The patient was quickly isolated, and there was no spread of the disease. The child had been admitted only shortly before the illness began. Considering the number of Scarlet Fever cases which have occurred amongst the outside public, it is a matter of congratulation that the disease has not otherwise spread to these Hospitals. The Committee regret that the existence of the epidemic has necessitated the temporary closing of the Hospital to the visits of the parents and friends of the children, as this means so much disappointment to them. The out-of-door treatment of the Tuberculous cases at St. Nicholas has proved to be most beneficial and amply justifies the expenditure incurred in the erection of the Shelter there.

The Committee tender their sincere thanks to the Medical and Nursing Staffs of both Hospitals for their constant care of the cases placed under their charge.

Cottage Homes.

Fewer children than last year have been sent to Cottages in the country, with the object of recruiting their strength, before being finally discharged to their homes. Those who have been thus boarded out have greatly benefitted by their stay in the country air, together with the opportunity of regaining their walking powers under careful supervision.

Cots.

The Committee are glad to be able to report that the Subscriptions to all the Free and Half-pay Cots have been continued, whereby many most necessitous cases have been helped. Sincere thanks are tendered to all who have contributed to their up-keep.

The "Anne Fairfax" Free Cot has been endowed by the Misses Fairfax in memory of their mother, for which the Committee are extremely grateful. Such endowments are most welcome, as they help to place the Hospital on a sound Financial basis. They also thank the donors very warmly for the unremitting interest which they and the late Mrs. Fairfax have taken in the welfare of the Hospital and its inmates for many years past.

St. Nicholas Hospital.

The Committee have at last been able to make arrangements with the Postal Authorities for a Telephonic connection with the Hospital which will establish direct communication with Cheyne Hospital.

On the 21st August an "At Home" was held at the Hospital, at which over eighty visitors were present. This was most gratifying as it shows that an increasing interest is being taken in the Institution by the resident and visiting neighbours.

A motor bus service has been started, running daily between Margate and Canterbury, three times each way, and calling at St. Nicholas, which greatly adds to the facilities for the staff to get to the neighbouring towns.

A rather heavy expense has been incurred by the necessity for re-painting the whole of the outside woodwork, but it is not probable that such work will be again required for some time to come.

Finance.

The Subscriptions for the year, notwithstanding several losses, have been kept on a satisfactory level, but there has been a considerable falling off in Donations. A very welcome contribution of £60 from Miss Cardwell is most gratefully acknowledged.

On the other hand the Expenditure has been rather less than last year, so that the relative deficit exclusive of Legacies amounts to only about £130, as compared with that period.

The expenses of the two Hospitals has been over £700 in excess of the ordinary receipts, against which only a small amount has been received in Legacies available for General purposes.

The Committee therefore most earnestly appeal to all the friends of the Hospital to interest others in the work, as it is most desirable that the current expenses should be met year by year, without having to rely upon the uncertain receipt of Legacies.

Legacies.

Only one small legacy has been received during the year. For this the Committee have to thank the Executors of the late Mrs. Sarah Leitch, who, at the instance of Mrs. Gilbert Samuel, most kindly allotted to this Hospital the sum of £ 10 out of the funds placed at their disposal by the Testatrix.

General.

On the 18th March, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, accompanied by The Princess Victoria, visited the Hospital, and graciously expressed her approval of all she saw.

The Committee sincerely regret to record the death of Mr. Geo. Matthey, who was for many years a member of their body. They could always rely upon the soundness of his judgment in all cases of difficulty, and his loss will be much felt.

They also greatly regret to report the resignation of Miss Power and Miss Stainbank, both of whom have retired owing to pressure of work in other directions. The Committee tender them very sincere thanks for the belp given by them whilst they acted as members of the Committee.

They have much pleasure in reporting that the following have joined the Committee, viz.:—Sir Melville L. Macnaghten, C.B.; Miss L. Bullivant; and Mr. Hugh Mostyn Pritchard, all of whom have taken a great interest in the Hospital during past years.

During the year, part of the Cross Keys Yard property has been let on a building lease, and a Studio has been erected thereon. The site is a very retired and quiet one, and offers great attractions for the erection of similar buildings, and it is hoped that before long the whole of the available land may be disposed of.

Acknowledgments.

His Majesty The King and Her Majesty Queen Alexandra have each most graciously sent a Donation of £5, to provide Christmas entertainments for the children in the Hospital.

The Committee's warmest thanks are tendered to the Staff of St. Luke's Church, Chelsea, and to the Rev. H. E.

Trimmer at St. Nicholas, for their most kind help in conducting services and attending to the spiritual needs of the patients at the respective Hospitals.

They also sincerely thank all those who have given time to visit the children and to teach and amuse them.

Many gifts have been received during the year, which are recorded on pages 58—64. For these, as well as for the entertainments provided for the children of both Hospitals, the Committee are extremely grateful.

They wish specially to acknowledge the receipt from the Editor of "The Poultry World" of a large supply of Eggs, these being a portion of contributions sent to him from all over the country, for distribution amongst Charitable Institutions.
