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
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



OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

THIS Hospital has been established for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, who are on that account excluded or discharged from General Hospitals. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period.

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the continuous care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them for an indefinite period, it will be obvious that changes are very slow and vacancies few and far between. The *average* length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is now over two years; while many of the children remain for much longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear *prima facie* eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission as vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers, (p. 5). More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1.—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum, and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2.—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1.—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2.—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of the Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of two shillings being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1.—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2.—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Ricketts, Hydrocephalus, Mental Derangement or Deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible. Pauper Children (that is, Children to be paid for, either wholly or in part, by the Guardians, directly or indirectly) are also inadmissible.

3.—Children are admitted only between three and twelve years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4.—The payment of Four Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

5.—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary at the Hospital.

6.—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†

7.—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8.—Applicants for admission, unless the Doctor shall certify to the contrary, may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

9.—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

10.—A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, *must* be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be *brought with the child*.

11.—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission should be at once notified to the Secretary.

* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a house holder (or the wife of a house holder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

METHODS OF HELP.

The establishment of a Branch Hospital at St. Nicholas-at-Wade, (which is a Hospital dealing with cases of exactly the same nature as those treated at Cheyne Hospital, and therefore is *not* a Convalescent Home) has considerably increased the expenses incurred.

An earnest appeal is therefore made to all supporters of this Institution, to do their utmost to enlist the sympathy and help of their friends.

While there are many who have real sympathy with such work as is here carried out, but who cannot afford direct support, there are many also who are strangers to Cheyne Hospital, but whose purses would be generously opened at a word of hearty *unofficial* pleading from a friend. In enlisting for our labours the interest of some of these, our present friends may be rendering the Institution a service which is none the less valuable because it is vicarious.

GIFTS IN KIND.

The following articles are specially needed:—

At Cheyne Hospital—Plain White Nightgowns, Red Turkey Twill Jackets, and Blue Shirting Jackets.

At St. Nicholas Hospital—Red Flannel Bed Jackets, Holland Overalls, Flannel Nightgowns, and Woollen Vests with sleeves.

Game, Fresh Fruit and Eggs, New (unbroken) Toys, Jellies, etc., are much appreciated.

Patterns of clothing will gladly be sent from either Hospital to anyone who will kindly supply the articles required.

VISITORS.

The matron of St. Nicholas Hospital will be most grateful to anyone who will be kind enough to devote a little time to visiting the children there, especially to those who can do so regularly, and who can help in giving some instruction to those patients who are well enough to receive it.

The changes during the year have been somewhat in excess of the average, many patients having made good progress and been discharged. The value of the Branch Hospital at St. Nicholas has been further shown by the increased number of cases sent there from Cheyne Hospital to obtain the benefit of outdoor treatment.

At Cheyne Hospital an outbreak of Whooping Cough occurred which prevented the admission or discharge of patients for a considerable time, and but for this, the changes would have been more numerous and the average number of patients resident daily throughout the year would have been increased. There were also one or two cases of Chicken Pox. Fortunately these attacks were all of a mild character and did not have any serious effect.

St. Nicholas Hospital.

At St. Nicholas there was no outbreak of an infectious nature.

The Committee greatly regret that the Matron of St. Nicholas Hospital has been absent for a considerable time

owing to the effects of a serious attack of influenza, but they are glad to say that she is now making good progress and they hope that she will shortly be able to resume her duties.

Her work has been ably carried out, during her absence, by the Sister - in - Charge, who has been most loyally supported by the whole nursing staff.

The lessons given to the children have been much appreciated by them. By this means their minds are occupied and disciplined, and a start is made which will be of great value to them when they are well enough to be discharged.

The following extracts from letters taken from several that have been received during the year, speak for themselves:—

“Do you think it would be at all possible to let me have a photo. of the child —— whom you have had in your care for some considerable time. The truth is I want to show a certain eminent surgeon in London, who is a friend of mine, that you have performed what to him must be considered a *miracle*. It was quite beyond the merest glimmer of a hope that anything could be done for her.”

“I am writing to express my appreciation of the treatment accorded to my poor little son, who passed away last Monday. Had my boy belonged to them, Matron, Sister, or Nurses, they could not have been kinder to him, and the finest tribute that could be paid the Hospital was paid it by my son when I asked him if I should take him home, and his answer was—‘No, Dad, please leave me here’: and I don’t think a child in pain would answer in that way if they were not satisfied with their treatment.”

The Committee tender their sincere thanks to the Medical and Nursing Staffs of both Hospitals for their unremitting attention to and their skilful treatment of the patients under their charge.

Cottage Homes.

More cases than usual have been sent to Cottage Homes, and all who have been sent there have received great benefit before being finally discharged.

Cots.

The loss of support in respect of the "Watchers and Workers," the "Emily," and the "Herbert Cyril" Cots will be greatly felt, but the Committee sincerely thank those who have contributed to their maintenance in past years, and they are very grateful to all those who have maintained their Subscriptions to other Free and Half-payment Cots.

Finance.

Special Christmas Donations have been received from His Majesty The King, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra and H.R.H. The Prince of Wales.

H.R.H. Princess Victoria has most kindly become an Annual Subscriber.

Exclusive of Legacies received, the Expenses of the two Hospitals have exceeded the Receipts by about £850.

Several Subscribers have reduced or withdrawn their support, and the deaths of others have still further diminished the Subscription List. The Committee are therefore specially grateful to those who have become new Subscribers, or who have increased their contributions.

Substantial and most welcome help has again been received from the King Edward's Hospital Fund, The Hospital Sunday Fund, and the Hospital Saturday Fund, and in

The Committee look forward with some anxiety to the coming year, owing to the constantly increasing cost of everything. Whilst they will do their utmost to keep expenditure as low as possible, they earnestly appeal for increased support.

Considering the high prices which have ruled, it is somewhat surprising to find that the sums spent on *Provisions* have

been rather less than last year at Cheyne Hospital, and only slightly increased at St. Nicholas. This has been entirely due to extreme care in the use of the Stores, and the Committee most sincerely thank the Matrons and the Staffs generally of both Hospitals for their most successful efforts to help in this way.

Legacies.

The Committee most sincerely thank the Executors of the Will of the late Mrs. Mary Kelly Holdsworth (and especially Capt. Daintree, R.N., one of the Executors) for a grant of £250 out of the property put at their disposal for distribution amongst Charitable Institutions, in memory of the Testator's late husband. In consideration of this Grant, the "Col. John Kelly Holdsworth, R.A., Memorial Cot" has been so named in perpetuity, and a suitable tablet recording this gift will be hung on the walls.

The Committee wish to make it known that, for a similar sum, they will be pleased to follow the same course, as it may be that others will be glad of such an opportunity of perpetuating the memory of those whom they have lost.

General.

On the 25th January, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra and H.R.H. Princess Victoria visited the Hospital and distributed presents to the children.

The land in Cross Keys Yard, at the back of the Hospital, has been further developed by the erection of a building, containing accommodation for a porter on the ground floor and a Studio above, both of which are now occupied.

There is still space for at least two more Studios, and it is hoped that, in due course, the land will be taken up for this purpose.

At St. Nicholas it was found to be necessary to renew the floors of the ground floor rooms, and this has been carried out by using concrete instead of joists, which it is considered will be drier and more sanitary.

All the properties of the Hospital have been kept insured against Air-Craft risks.

Acknowledgments.

The Rev. M. S. Farmer and the Rev. H. E. Trimmer have again given their most welcome and devoted attention to the spiritual needs of the two Hospitals, for which the sincerest thanks of the Committee and of the patients and staffs are tendered.

Frequent Communion Services, held at Cheyne Hospital have been greatly appreciated by those participating in them.

On the 26th April, the Bishop of Kensington kindly attended at Cheyne Hospital and confirmed three of the boys.

The Nursing Staff are very grateful to Mrs. Platt for the gift of an excellent piano, which is in frequent use.

The Committee warmly thank all those who have given entertainments, and made gifts of clothing and other articles, for use or pleasure, and they especially thank the London County Council (per James Rogers, Esq., Superintendent of Battersea Park) for supplies of eggs, which, in these times of scarcity and dearness, are of special value.

It is a matter of regret that, owing to the great demands made by the War, the help received in the way of Clothing, etc.,

has greatly fallen off. At St. Nicholas, the Working Guild which had been formed has been too busily employed in finding clothing for wounded soldiers to be able to do much for the Hospital.

We, however, still need such help, and strongly appeal to everyone not to overlook our wants, as more particularly referred to on page 7.




