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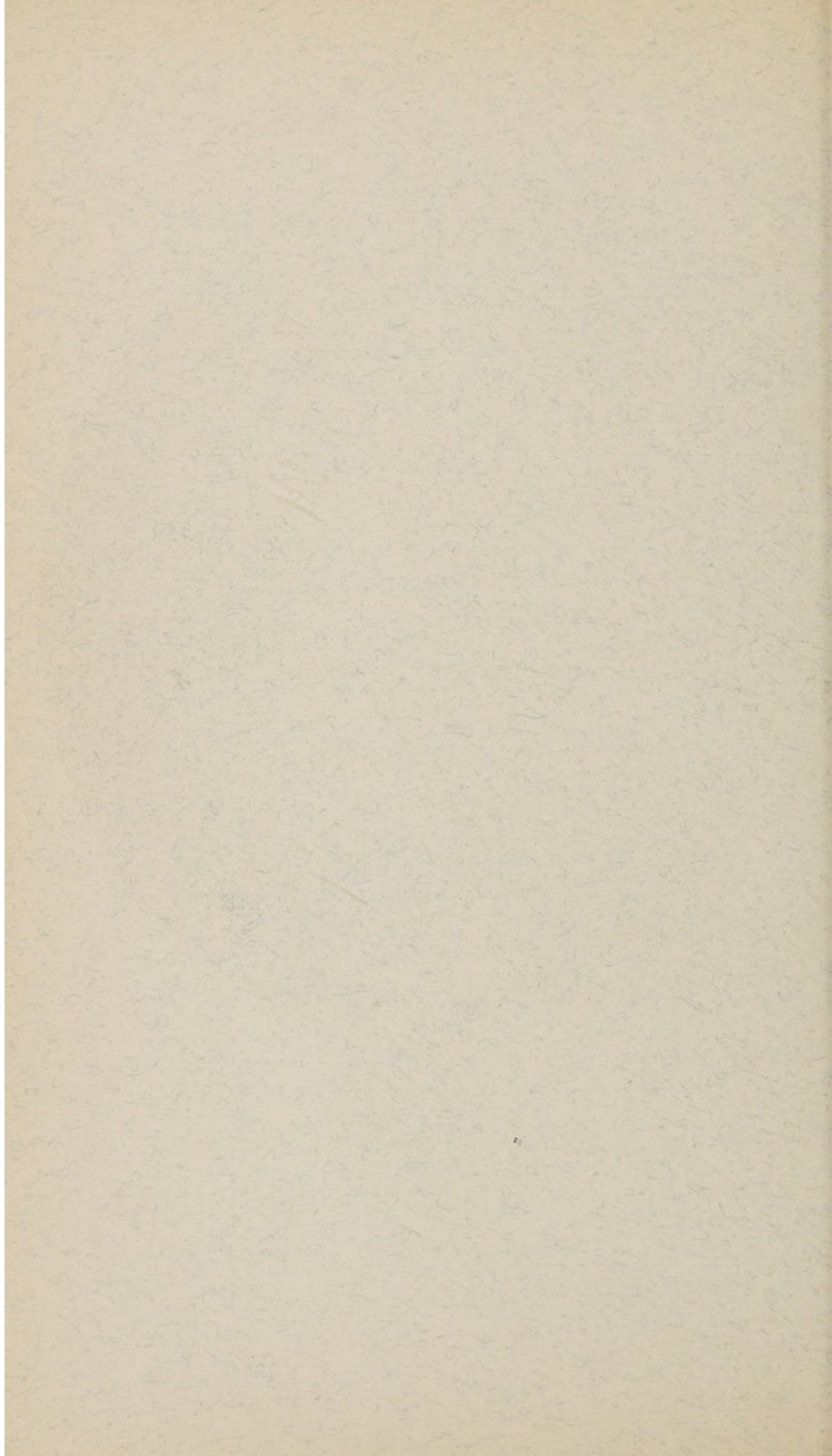

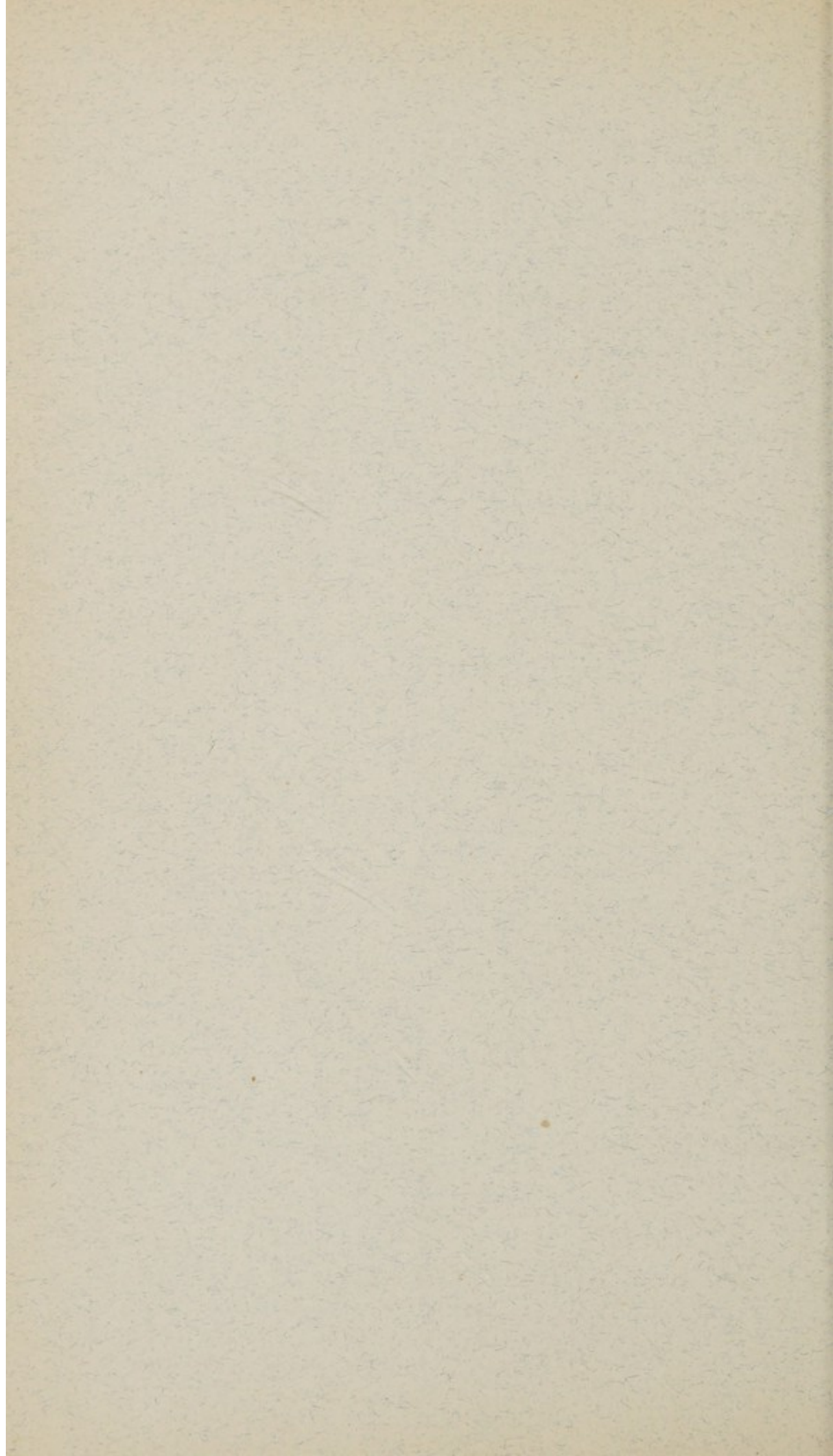

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

THIS Hospital has been established for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, who are on that account excluded or discharged from General Hospitals. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period.

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the continuous care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them for an indefinite period, it will be obvious that changes are very slow and vacancies few and far between. The *average* length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is now over two years; while many of the children remain for much longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear *prima facie* eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission as vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers, (p. 5). More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1.—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum, and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2.—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1.—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2.—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of the Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of two shillings being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1.—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2.—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Ricketts, Hydrocephalus, Mental Derangement or Deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible. Pauper Children (that is, Children to be paid for, either wholly or in part, by the Guardians, directly or indirectly) are also inadmissible.

3.—Children are admitted only between three and twelve years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4.—The payment of Four Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

5.—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary at the Hospital.

6.—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†

7.—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8.—Applicants for admission, unless the Doctor shall certify to the contrary, may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

9.—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

10.—A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, *must* be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be *brought with the child*.

11.—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission should be at once notified to the Secretary.

* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a house holder (or the wife of a house holder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

METHODS OF HELP.

The establishment of a Branch Hospital at St. Nicholas-at-Wade, (which is a Hospital dealing with cases of exactly the same nature as those treated at Cheyne Hospital, and therefore is *not* a Convalescent Home) has considerably increased the expenses incurred.

An earnest appeal is therefore made to all supporters of this Institution, to do their utmost to enlist the sympathy and help of their friends.

While there are many who have real sympathy with such work as is here carried out, but who cannot afford direct support, there are many also who are strangers to Cheyne Hospital, but whose purses would be generously opened at a word of hearty *unofficial* pleading from a friend. In enlisting for our labours the interest of some of these, our present friends may be rendering the Institution a service which is none the less valuable because it is vicarious.

GIFTS IN KIND.

The following articles are specially needed:—

At Cheyne Hospital—Plain White Nightgowns, Red Turkey Twill Jackets, and Blue Shirting Jackets.

The matron of St. Nicholas Hospital will be most grateful to anyone who will be kind enough to devote a little time to visiting the children there, especially to those who can do so regularly.

Reference to the table given on page 36 will shew that in the past year there have been a greater number of discharges and admissions than usual. Many of the patients remaining in the Hospital are progressing most satisfactorily.

Owing to difficulties caused by the war, it has been considered advisable to reduce the number of the inmates at St. Nicholas Hospital.

There has been no case of an infectious nature amongst the patients, but two light cases of German measles which fortunately did not spread, occurred in the nursing staff.

The Matron of St. Nicholas Hospital returned to her duties in March last after her long illness.

Owing to the great demand for Nurses for Military Hospitals, it becomes increasingly difficult to obtain the complement required by such Institutions as these, and the same may be stated in respect of the supply of Domestic Servants.

Education.

After careful consideration, it was decided to enter into arrangements for the systematic education of the children.

The Committee are glad to be able to report that the Board of Education have agreed to recognise both Hospitals as Schools for Physically Defective Children.

Efficient teachers having been appointed, the education of the patients has now begun on a regular system and it is hoped that this will be of great advantage to them.

It will be necessary for the classes to be held in the wards on most afternoons between 1.45 and 3.15 p.m., and it is feared that this may somewhat interfere with the visits of some of those ladies who have so kindly given their help in amusing and instructing the children. The Committee therefore ask their forbearance until after the hours stated, as they feel sure that everyone will recognise the necessity of the classes not being interrupted.

Cots.

By the death of Lady Kemball the subscription to the "Vere and Bel" Cot (instituted on February 18, 1880, by Sir Arnold and Lady Kemball, and made a Free Cot in 1889), and which has been generously continued by them ever since, has ceased.

The "Edward Vernon" Cot, endowed on the 1st July, 1880, by the late Mrs. C. Utterson for the period of her life, has also been determined by her death.

It is a great pleasure to record that a new Free Cot has been established at St. Nicholas Hospital. The annual subscription to this will be raised by friends at Canterbury and Birchington and in the neighbourhood of the Hospital, and it will be called the "St. Nicholas" Cot.

The Committee have specially to thank all those who have helped to raise the necessary funds, for their efforts in this matter, and they most gratefully recognise the increase of interest which is being taken in that district in this Branch Hospital.

The sum of Fifty Pounds has been received from the estate of the late Miss Woolley, as an addition to the "Cranstoun-Kerr" Cot Endowment Fund.

Cottage Homes.

A larger number of children have been sent to cottages in the country than in any previous year, greatly to their benefit.

At one of these, the Committee have been fortunate in being able to place patients under the care of a nurse who has been trained in this Hospital.

Finance.

His Majesty The King has again graciously sent a donation of £5 for Christmas entertainments.

Her Majesty the Queen of Norway has also most generously contributed £10 10s. to the funds of the Hospital.

It is with pleasure and gratitude that increased grants are acknowledged from the King Edward Hospital Fund, the Hospital Sunday Fund and the Hospital Saturday Fund, for which special thanks are tendered to the respective Councils and Distribution Committees.

The "Alexandra Day" Committee, through Miss Beeman, have made an increased Grant of £40 from the collection

made in London, and the Committee sincerely thank the Mayor of Chelsea and others for their help in this matter.

Friends at St. Nicholas have again most kindly exerted themselves on behalf of the Hospital in regard to the collections made in that neighbourhood on Alexandra Day, resulting in a satisfactory grant of £22 5s. 8d., for which grateful thanks are tendered.

Expenditure.

The past year has been one of constantly increasing cost of all articles in use, especially of those required for feeding the children, such as meat, milk, and bread, which cannot be reduced in quantity. Every effort has been made to regulate consumption as much as possible without impairing efficiency and the Committee again thank the Matrons and Staffs of both Hospitals for their continued efforts to economise.

Another large deficit, amounting to £973 has to be recorded. Towards meeting this, it has been necessary to realize a certain portion of the Securities held for "General Purposes," and unless the Revenue can be increased, or Legacies are received, it will be necessary, during the current year, to further reduce the reserves now held.

A heavy item of expenditure has been the renewal of the Drainage system at Cheyne Hospital, which is now reported to be in a perfect condition. The front doorsteps had also to be renewed, they having become badly worn and in a dangerous condition.

It has not been possible to do any painting or decoration owing to want of funds, scarcity of labour and high cost of materials, but some work of this nature will have to be carried out during the current year.

The increase in Income Tax deduction has temporarily locked up a considerable sum of money, but this will be recoverable in due course.

The Committee decided, in response to the invitation of the Government, under Scheme B, to loan to the Treasury their holdings in Canadian Pacific Rly. Deb. Stock and Dominion of Canada $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Stock, and this will increase the revenue derivable therefrom by one-half per cent. per annum.

Receipts.

It is greatly to be regretted that several subscriptions have been withdrawn, as in such times as the present, every contribution is of the greatest value. Some losses have also been incurred through the deaths of subscribers.

The Committee therefore are specially grateful to those who have continued their help and to those who have so kindly become new subscribers or who have given donations.

They earnestly ask all who are willing and able to do so, to take every opportunity of enlisting the interest of their friends in the work of these Hospitals, remembering that the fathers of many of the patients are giving themselves to the service of their country, thus earning a right to commit the care of their afflicted children to those who are living in safety and comfort in their homes.

Trustees and Committee.

The Committee sincerely regret to report the loss by death of their Chairman, Sir Colin Scott-Moncrieff, one of the Trustees of the Hospital.

In 1884 he contributed the sum of £750 for the endowment of the "Violet" Cot, in remembrance of his daughter, and in 1894 he joined the Committee of Management, and became a Trustee.

The Committee will always remember with gratitude his kindly help and sympathy, which was continued to the time of his death.

He has been succeeded as Chairman by Col. Wilson, and Mr. Leonard Harrison has been appointed Vice-Chairman.

Owing to Sir Colin's death and that of the late Marquis of Ripon, it became necessary to appoint New Trustees.

The Rt. Hon. Augustine Birrell having requested to be relieved from the position, three new Trustees had to be chosen and the Committee have been fortunate in securing the consent of Lord Justice Sir William Pickford, P.C., The Hon. Frank Trevor Bigham and Reginald Ward Poole, Esq. to act, and they have been duly appointed. To each of them the Committee tender their warmest thanks.

The Committee are very grateful to the Rt. Hon. A. Birrell for his help for so many years, and desire to express their great regret that he felt compelled by circumstances to resign his position as Trustee. They also wish most sincerely to thank Messrs. Hichens, Harrison & Co. for having carried out, free of charge, the considerable work of the transfer of the Stocks held by the Hospital.

They have also to report with great regret, that Sir Melville Macnaghten, C.B., has been compelled, through failing health, to retire from the Committee of Management, but it is satisfactory to know that he still takes a keen interest in the welfare of the Hospital.

General.

H.M. Queen Alexandra, accompanied by H.I.H. Marie Grand Duchess George of Russia and H.R.H. Princess Victoria, visited the Hospital on the 25th January.

On the 17th March the Bishop of Dover kindly attended at St. Nicholas Hospital and confirmed six candidates.

The Spiritual needs of the Hospitals have been again most kindly ministered to by the Staff of St. Luke's Church,

Chelsea, and the Rev. H. E. Trimmer, at St. Nicholas, to whom the thanks of the Committee, patients and staffs, are tendered.

Many gifts of clothing, &c., have been received and have been most welcome. There is always a great need of such help, as nearly all the patients remain so long with us, that, when they leave, their former clothes are no longer of any use.

Sincere thanks are tendered to all who have helped the Hospitals, whether by money contributions, clothing, food or entertainments, or in any other way.

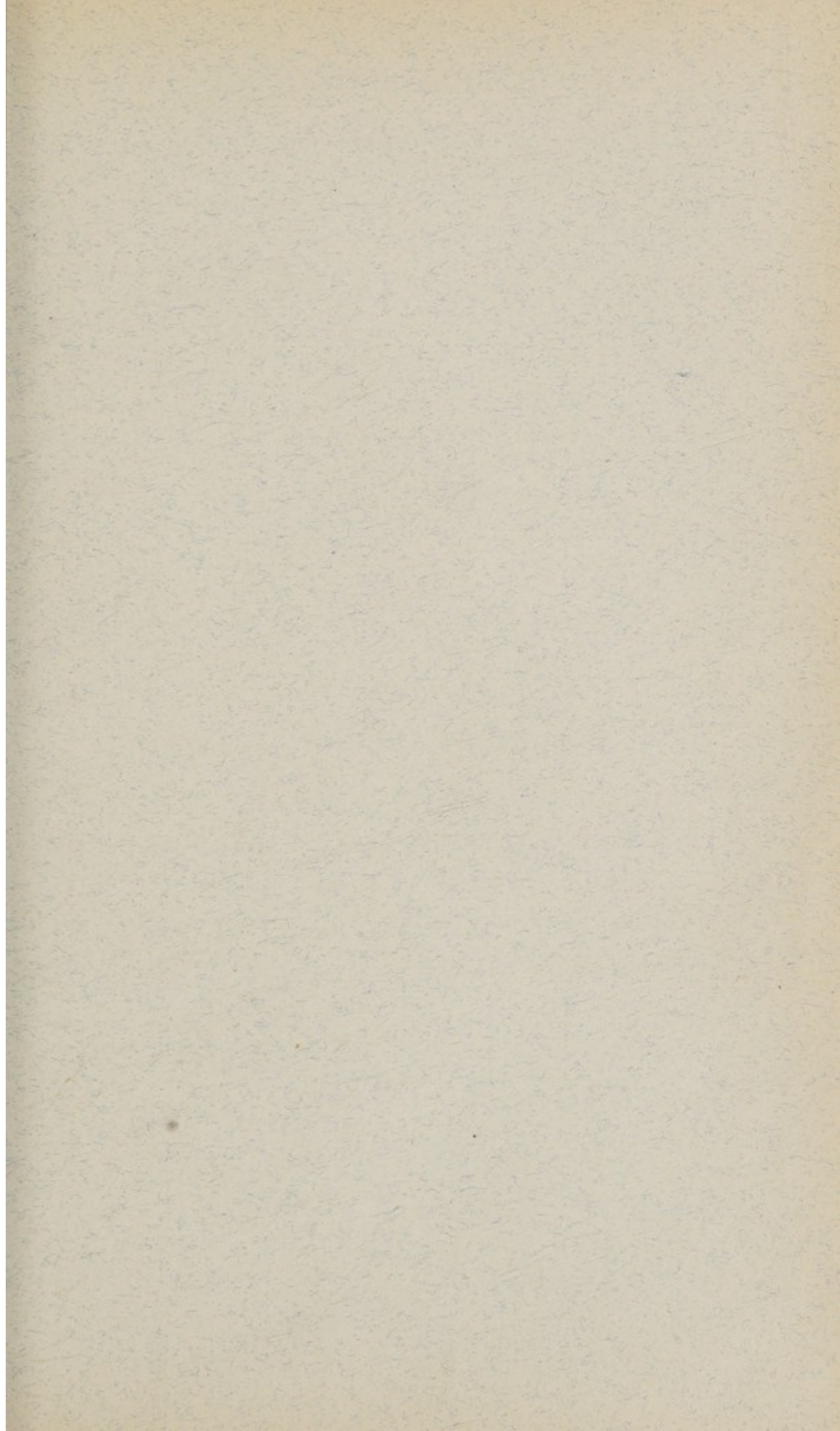

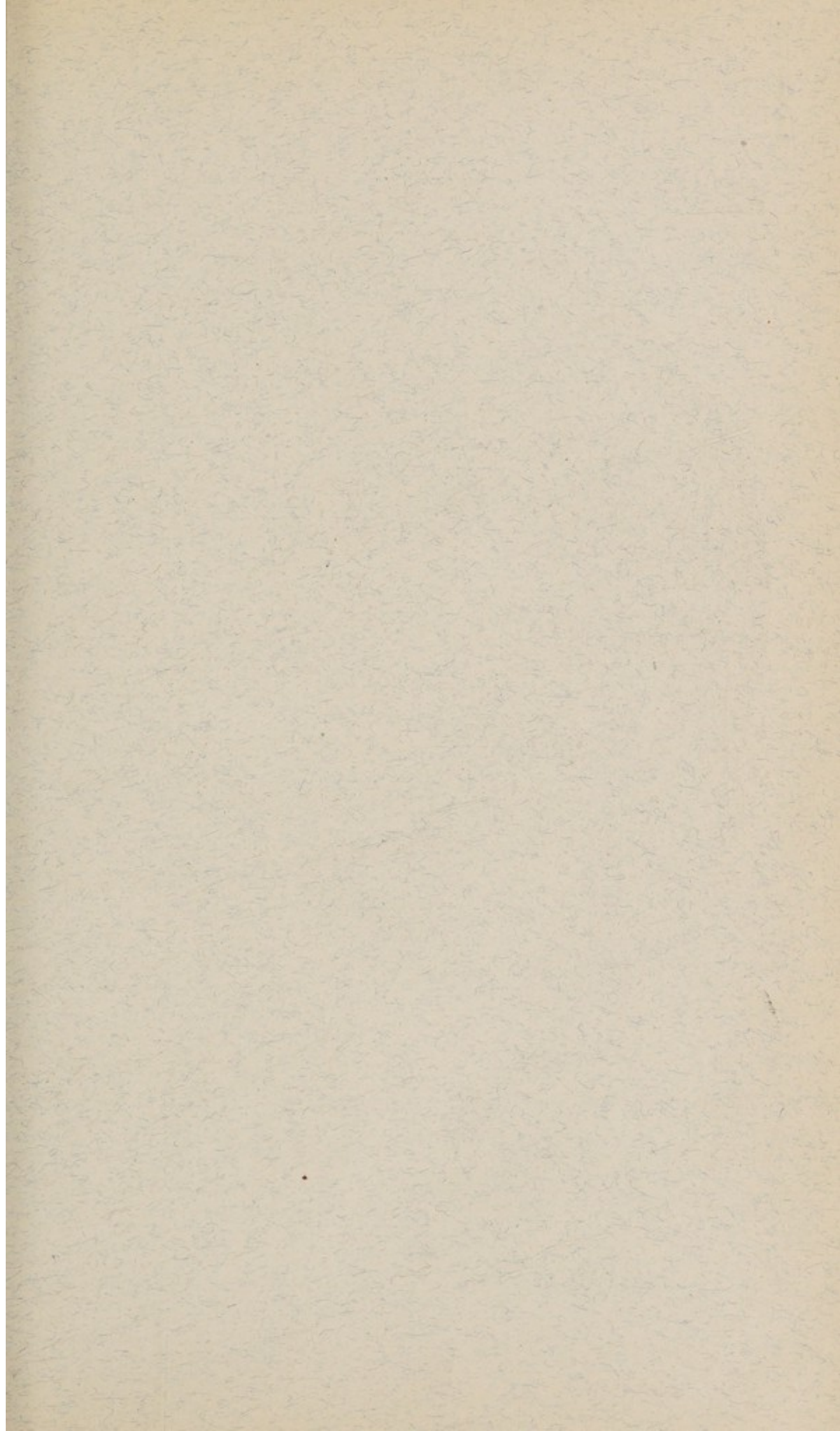

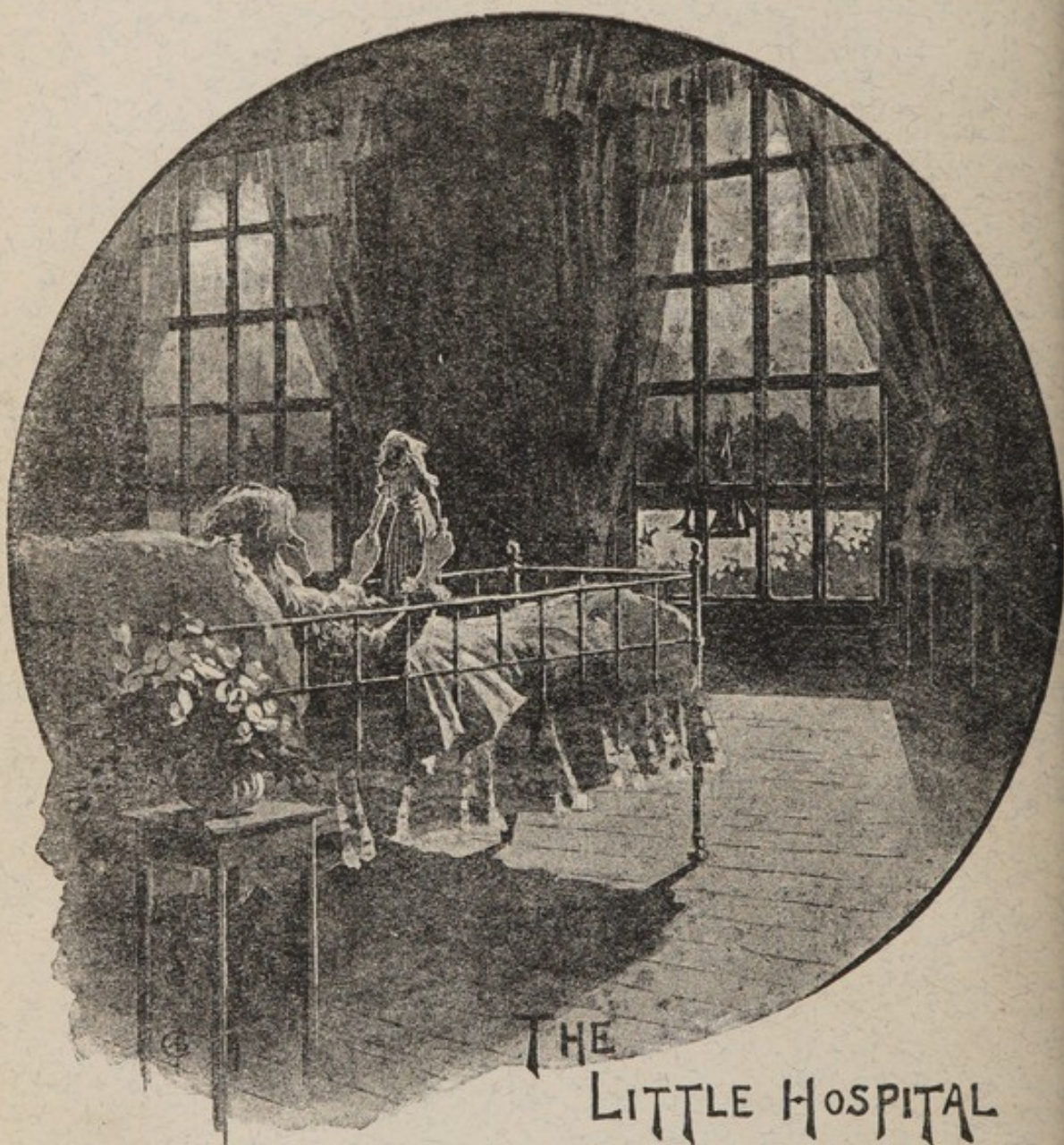
