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
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

## OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

**T**HIS Hospital has been established for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, who are on that account excluded or discharged from General Hospitals. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period.

#### NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the continuous care and treatment of cases of deepseated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept. and to keep them for an indefinite period, it will be obvious that changes are very slow and vacancies few and far between. The average length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is now over two years; while many of the children remain for much longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear prima facie eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission as vacancies arise. and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers. (p. 5). More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear,

## PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1.—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52–10s.) in one sum, and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10–10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2.—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

#### EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

#### LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1.—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2.—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds  $(\pounds 250)$  endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of the Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty,

#### COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2.—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of two shillings being required from the parents or friends of the occupant,

3.—A Donor of  $\pounds 250$  in one sum is entitled to *name* a Cot in perpetuity, but without the right to nominate the occupants thereof.

## RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1.—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2.—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Ricketts, Hydrocephalus, Mental Derangement or Deficiency. all infectious cases, and Crip; les not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible. Pauper Children (that is, Children to be paid for, either wholly or in part, by the Guardians, directly or indirectly) are also inadmissible.

3.—Children are admitted only between three and twelve years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4.—The payment of Four Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.\*

5.—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary at the Hospital.

6.—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.<sup>†</sup>

7.—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8.—Applicants for admission, unless the Doctor shall certify to the contrary, may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

9.—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

10.—A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, *must* be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be *brought with* the child.

11.—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission should be at once notified to the Secretary.

<sup>\*</sup> Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

 $<sup>\</sup>pm$  The Guarantor should be a house holder (or the wife of a house holder) rated at  $\pm$ 40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

# Work of the Year.-Chevne Hospital.

Work at both Hospitals has been carried on during the past year without interruption, notwithstanding difficulties caused by war conditions, and a fair average number of patients have been discharged, whilst the number of deaths has been lower than for some years past.

Many of the patients now in these Hospitals are children of parents who are serving in the Army or Navy.

The difficulty of obtaining nurses and servants increases year by year, and the Matrons will be very grateful if friends knowing of any suitable candidates will communicate with them.

The following Medical Report has been received, and the usual summaries of cases dealt with will be found on pages 16 and 17.

"In analysing the cases which have been treated during the past year, it will be seen that the great majority are cases of tuberculosis of the bones and joints. In order to judge of the results, it is essential to recognise that they are divisible into two groups—those which may be termed simple and those which are complicated by discharging sinuses or paralysis. Of the simple cases, there is not one which has not done well; while of the others, the majority are no better, and one has died. To a certain extent these latter cases do badly under any circumstances, but where continuous open air treatment is possible the results are better.

"One case of tuberculosis of the abdomen, whose life was at one time despaired of, as a result of careful nursing was sufficiently improved to enable an operation to be undertaken, which has practically cured him.

"The other large group of cases are those known as infantile paralysis. These cases come to us some time after the onset of the disease, and with arms, legs and trunk often considerably deformed through neglect of the proper treatment. We have to correct the deformity, and by means of metal supports enable them to walk. These cases take a very long time; for instance, there are two cases which have been in since 1913 and are now fit for discharge, both of them being able to walk with support.

"There is no doubt that the Hospital is almost ideal for this class of case, since such prolonged treatment is almost impossible in the general hospitals; and now that a system of education has been started, the disabilities from the mental point of view, which such prolonged hospital treatment carry with it, have largely disappeared.—GWYNNE WILLIAMS."

# Education.

School Classes have been regularly held at both Hospitals, and have proved most successful and helpful. The children delight in them, and are very pleased when the Classes are re-opened after the holidays.

Many of the patients are learning to do excellent manual work, which will be most useful to them after they are discharged.

The Committee are very well satisfied with the efficiency of the Teachers appointed and with the results achieved.

## Cots.

One new Free Cot has been endowed (named the Venetia Mexborough Cot) under the provision of the Will of the late Countess of Mexborough. The Committee are most grateful for the continued support given to all the Subscribed Cots. Special reference to the St. Nicholas Cot will be found on page 62.

## Cottage Homes.

Many patients have again benefited by being sent to Cottages at St. Nicholas and elsewhere before being discharged to their homes.

## Finance.

His Majesty The King has again graciously sent a gift of  $\pounds 5$  as a special Christmas donation.

Donations have also been received from H.R.H. The Prince of Wales and from H.R.H. The Princess Victoria.

# Expenditure.

The cost of all materials has again risen considerably, and there has also been great difficulty in obtaining necessary supplies. It is impossible greatly to reduce the quantity of food for the children or to find suitable substitutes, and therefore the cost of feeding them has very much increased. The Committee have, however, specially to thank the Matrons of both Hospitals for their successful efforts to economise, and also their nursing and domestic staffs for so cheerfully accommodating themselves to the necessities of the times, as otherwise the expenditure on provisions, &c., would have been very much higher. Prices in most cases are double or treble what they were in pre-war times. The Committee greatly fear that the cost of many articles will be still higher this year.

Expenses in connection with the Schools have entailed considerable outlay, but this will be recoverable from the Board of Education in due course. In fact, a Grant of £108 has already been received from them.

It has again been impossible to do much in the way of up-keep of buildings, but it was necessary to clean and distemper the wards of Cheyne Hospital. Probably a considerable sum will be required in the current year for such purposes.

## Receipts.

Annual Subscriptions have been about equal to those of the previous year, though many have been lost by death or withdrawal.

The Committee tender their sincerest thanks to Miss A. V. Hall and her co-trustee for a grant of  $\pounds 1,000$  out of the funds placed at their disposal under the Will of the late Mrs. Phillips.

In addition to the Cot Endowment referred to above, the sum of  $\pounds 800$  for General Purposes has been received under the Will of the late Countess of Mexborough.

Grateful thanks are also tendered to the Public Trustee and the Committee administering the Estate of the late Leopold Salomons, Esq., for the sum of  $\pounds 250$  allocated by them to this Hospital, as well as to the Executors of the late Miss Maude Ellen Gill and Miss Cardwell for legacies of  $\pounds 308$  10s. and  $\pounds 300$  respectively.

## Vice-President.

Mrs. Flower, the Founder of the Cheyne Hospital, expressed a wish to retire from the Committee of Management, which resignation has been most reluctantly accepted.

The Committee felt that all friends of the Hospital would most sincerely regret her name being altogether withdrawn from the Institution, though they knew that she would continue to take a keen interest in its welfare, and therefore requested her consent to be appointed a Vice-President of the Hospital; and they are glad to be able to report that she has consented to this.

## General.

The continuance of the War, with its many calls on the benevolent, has caused a considerable falling-off in gifts of clothing, &c., and therefore an earnest appeal is made for such articles as are needed, a list of which is given on page 7.

Increased funds are also required if both Hospitals are to be kept at full work, especially in view of rising prices.

The demand for the admission of patients and the continued need of the special work of this Hospital are as great as ever, and the Committee confidently hope that the necessary support will be forthcoming. Had it not been for the legacies fortunately received and for the increased grants made by the three large London Hospital Funds, there would have been a serious deficit in the year's accounts.

The Committee have had under consideration the question of the erection of balconies for the out-door treatment of patients at Cheyne Walk, but the difficulties attending any building operation and the heavy cost of work have compelled them to defer carrying out any such scheme. They feel, however, that some such open-air extension of the wards will be most desirable as soon as circumstances permit of its accomplishment.

A Confirmation Service was held at Cheyne Hospital on 15th March, 1917, by the Bishop of Kensington, when two nurses and one girl were confirmed.

The thanks of the Committee are offered to the staff of St. Luke's Church, Chelsea, and the Rev. H. E. Trimmer at St. Nicholas, for their ministrations during the year.

THE St. Nicholas Cot League was formed in 1916, with the object of endowing a Free Cot at St. Nicholas Hospital for the treatment of sick children taken from the neighbourhood, when the following ladies consented to act as a Committee :—

The sum of  $\pounds 40$ , the amount required for one year's subscription, was raised by the sale of a Quotation Almanac, and a realized surplus of  $\pounds 10$  17s. 8d. has been put aside in the hope that the Cot may eventually be permanently endowed.

In 1917, the members of the Committee decided, if possible, to raise  $\pounds 5$  each for the maintenance of the Cot during the second year. This amount has been been secured and there is a further balance to go to the Endowment Fund.


The Cot has been occupied, so far, by one patient, a boy from Barham. He has been sent to the Cheyne Hospital for special treatment and a good account of his progress has been received.
