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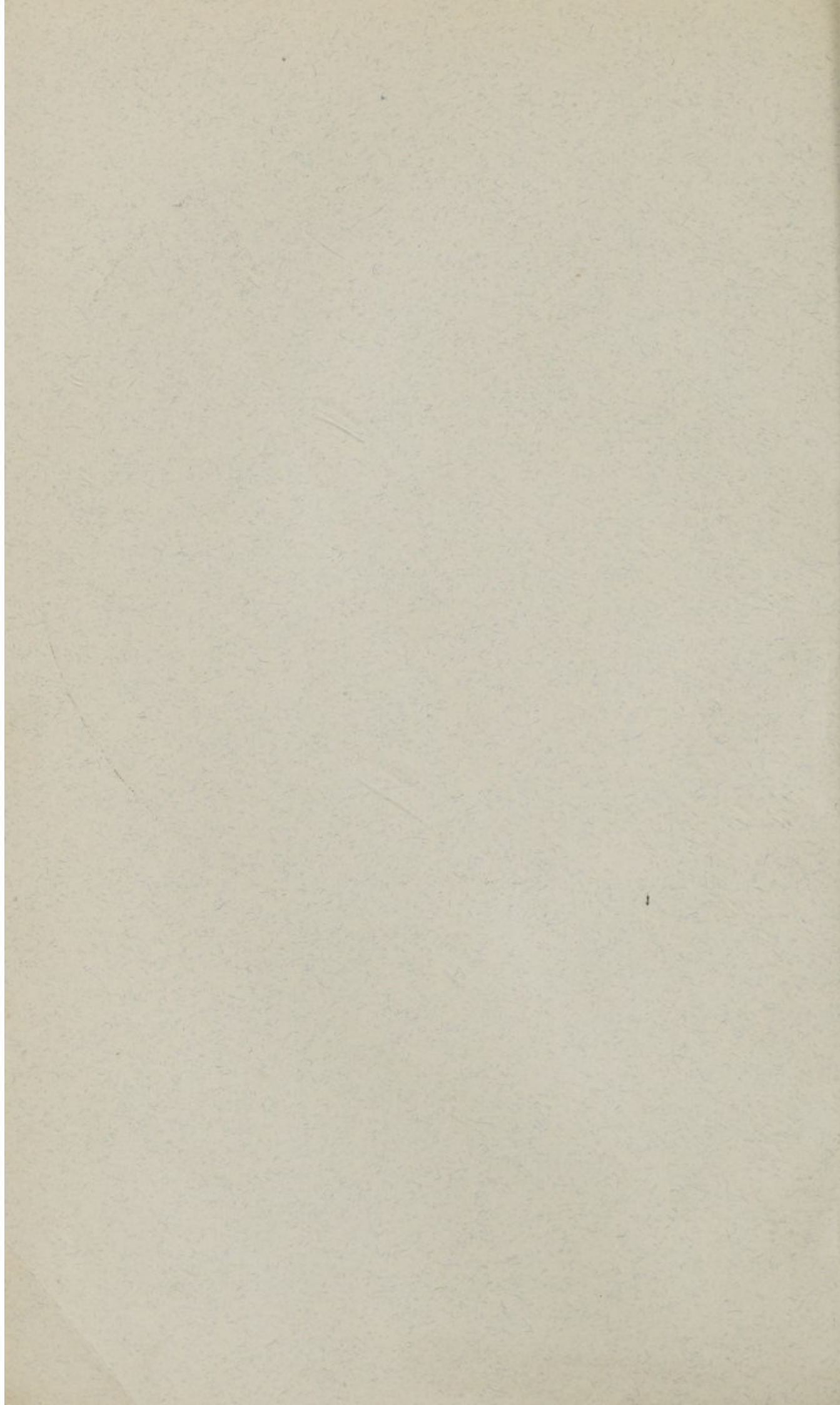

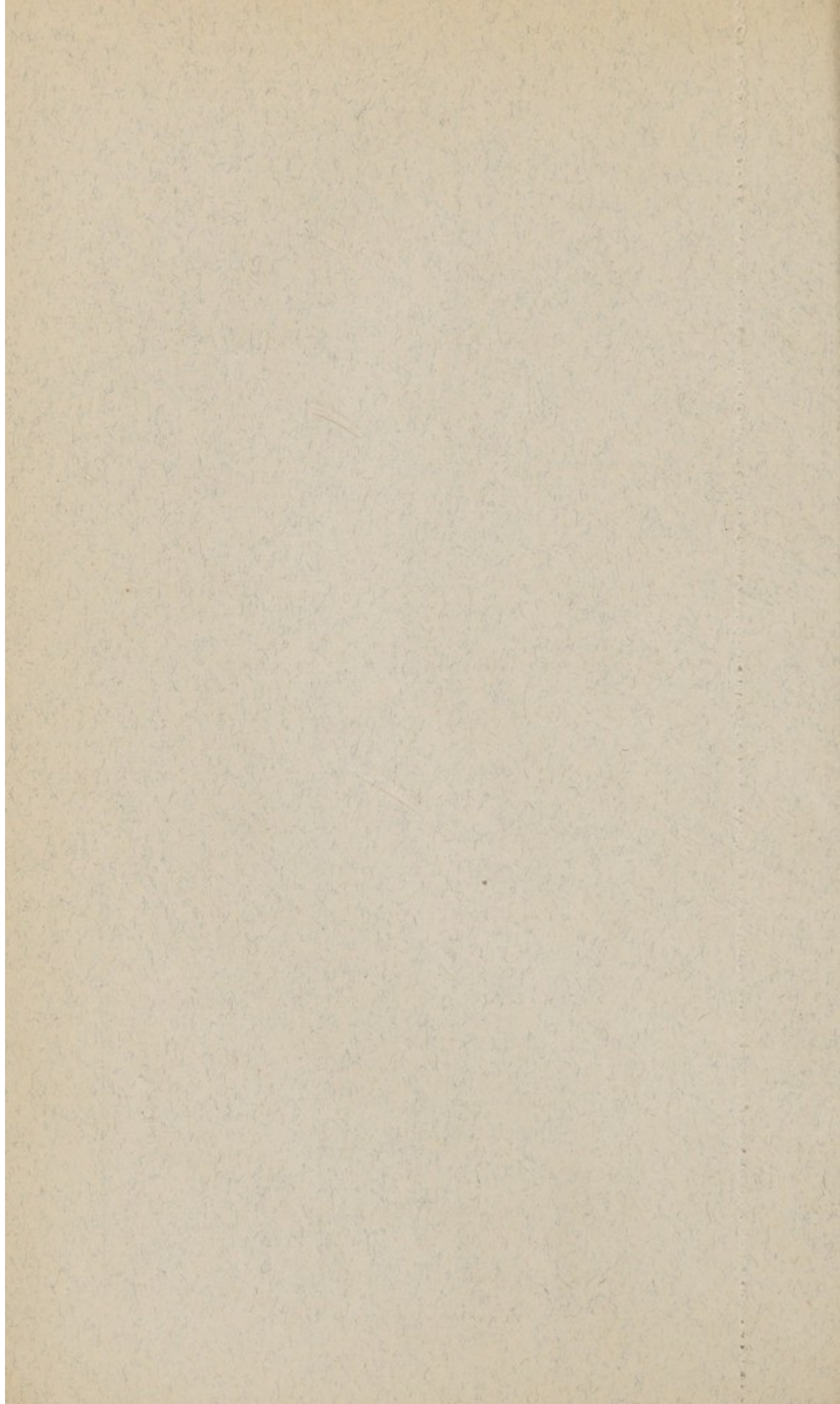

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum, and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of the Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the Payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Several Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of two shillings being required from the payments or friends of the occupant.

3—A Donor of £250 in one sum is entitled to *name* a Cot in perpetuity, but without the right to nominate the occupants thereof.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1.—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2.—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Ricketts, Hydrocephalus, Mental Derangement or Deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible. Pauper Children (that is, Children to be paid for, either wholly or in part, by the Guardians, directly or indirectly) are also inadmissible.

3.—Children are admitted only between three and twelve years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4.—The payment of Four Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

5.—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary at the Hospital.

6.—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†

7.—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8.—Applicants for admission, unless the Doctor shall certify to the contrary, may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

9.—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

10.—A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, *must* be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be *brought with the child*.

11.—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission should be at once notified to the Secretary.

* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a house holder (or the wife of a house holder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

METHODS OF HELP.

GIFTS IN MONEY.

- £1,000 endows a named Free Cot in perpetuity.
- £750 endows a half-payment Cot in perpetuity.
- £300 endows a named Free Cot for the Donor's life.
- £250 endows a half-payment Cot for the Donor's life.
- £250, in one payment, entitles the Donor to name a Cot in perpetuity.
- £52 10s. Donation constitutes a Life Governor.
- £40 Annual Subscription supports a named Free Cot.
- £30 Annual Subscription supports a half-payment Cot.
- £10 10s. Annual Subscription gives a Governor's preferential nomination.

Smaller Subscriptions or Donations are much valued and gratefully acknowledged.

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in presenting their Report, together with the Audited Accounts, for the year ending the 31st December, 1918.

Notwithstanding delays in the reception and discharge of patients, caused by outbreaks of Influenza, Measles, etc., the results of the year's work are about on an average of that of the previous five years.

Many difficult cases have been most successfully dealt with, proving the value of prolonged treatment.

One case of Scarlet Fever occurred, but the patient was at once removed, and fortunately no other child contracted the disease. Influenza was at one time general at both Hospitals amongst patients and staff, causing great nursing difficulties, owing to the impossibility of obtaining outside help.

The Committee gratefully acknowledge the valuable help rendered by members of the Voluntary Aid League.

Education.

School Classes, under the Regulations of the Board of Education, have been held throughout the year, with the most beneficial results. The occupation of the children's minds, which such teaching provides, re-acts with benefit on their physical condition, and at the same time helps to fit them for some career after discharge. The Board of Education Inspectors have reported satisfactorily on the progress made and on the efficiency of the Teachers employed.

Cots.

The Committee greatly regret to report the discontinuance of the support so long given to the "Constance" and the "Arthur Nigel" Cots, and tender their grateful thanks to those who have maintained them in the past. The death of the Rev. Canon Hawkins, who instituted the "Constance" Cot has caused a loss to the Hospital of a sincere sympathiser in its work.

The Committee again thank those who have renewed their support of various Cots. Special reference to the St. Nicholas Cot will be found on page 59.

Cottage Homes.

Fewer children than usual have been sent to Cottage Homes, but those who have been so placed have greatly benefitted by the change before being discharged to their homes.

Finance.

His Majesty The King has again graciously sent a gift of £5 as a Special Christmas Donation.

Expenditure.

As was anticipated, there has been a further increase in the cost of food and other articles, especially in that of Milk, which is the most important item of diet.

Salaries and Wages have also risen, owing to the large demand for Nurses and Domestic help at all the Military

Hospitals, where liberal pay has been offered to secure their requirements, compelling Charitable Institutions to follow their lead.

It has been necessary to carry out a certain amount of internal repairs, but this has been restricted as far as possible, owing to the high cost of all such work, the lack of funds, etc.

It will however be necessary to enter on a greater expenditure in such matters during the current year in order to keep the buildings in proper repair. A minor alteration was carried out at St. Nicholas Hospital to facilitate the bathing of the children who are treated under open air conditions.

The regulations and restrictions of the Food and other Controls have considerably increased the difficulties of supply.

Receipts.

It is very satisfactory to report that whilst Annual Subscriptions have not greatly increased, there has been no falling off in the total received.

The Grants received from the Hospital Sunday Fund and the Hospital Saturday Fund have been materially increased, for which the Committee sincerely thank the respective Councils.

The Committee are also grateful to the Council of the King Edward's Hospital Fund for London for a Grant on the same basis as that of last year, which was higher than any previous one.

As claims for return of Income Tax can now be sent in every half-year, the present account includes those for one-and-a-half, instead of one year as formerly, but this will not be repeated in the future.

General.

The Committee greatly regret to record the death of Mr. E. Keen, who so kindly gave his gratuitous services as Dental Surgeon for nearly seven years. Mr. T. Vernon, L.D.S., has been appointed as his successor.

They also greatly regret the loss by death of Mr. J. H. Crane, who faithfully carried out the duties of Dispenser for over twenty-two years. His work has been taken up by Mr. J. Jenkins.

It is a matter for thankfulness that, though bombs fell in the near neighbourhood of both Hospitals, none touched the premises occupied during any of the Air raids. St. Nicholas Hospital was specially exposed to such danger, but the staff there bravely continued their work without interruption till the end. This Hospital was one of the few Institutions in that neighbourhood which remained open throughout the war.

In this connection the Committee would like to record their grateful sense of the fine spirit evinced, and the good and devoted work consistently carried out by the Matrons, Sisters and Staffs of both Hospitals in the face of the serious obstacles and constant anxieties encountered throughout these difficult years, which imposed upon their ordinary duties an additional burden of grave responsibility and care.

The Committee most warmly thank the Commanding Officers of the regiments which were stationed at St. Nicholas (the Durham Light Infantry and the Northumberland Fusiliers) for their kindness in sending to the Hospital, during such raids, a squad of men to help move the children to places of greatest safety, and to remain by them during the continuance of the raids.

Special attention is called to the notices in respect of Working Guilds given on page 58 and also to those on page 6.

Sales of Work executed by the pupils in the Schools were held at both Hospitals and realised over £50. This sum will be devoted to a special fund for the benefit of the children in the way of toys and entertainments.

An Indian basket made by one of the Scholars was sent to Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, who graciously accepted it.

The Committee again offer their sincere thanks to The Staff of St. Luke's Church, Chelsea, and the Rev. H. E. Trimmer of St. Nicholas for their valued services during the year.

Committee.

The Committee are very pleased to report that Miss Peirse-Duncombe, who has for many years taken a great interest in the Hospital, has consented to join the Committee of Management.

The following members of the Committee of Management, viz.:—Mrs. C. Lyon Sidey; Lt.-Col. E. M. Wilson, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., and Mr. A. M. Turner, retire at the Annual Meeting, in order of the seniority of their appointment, and are eligible for re-election.

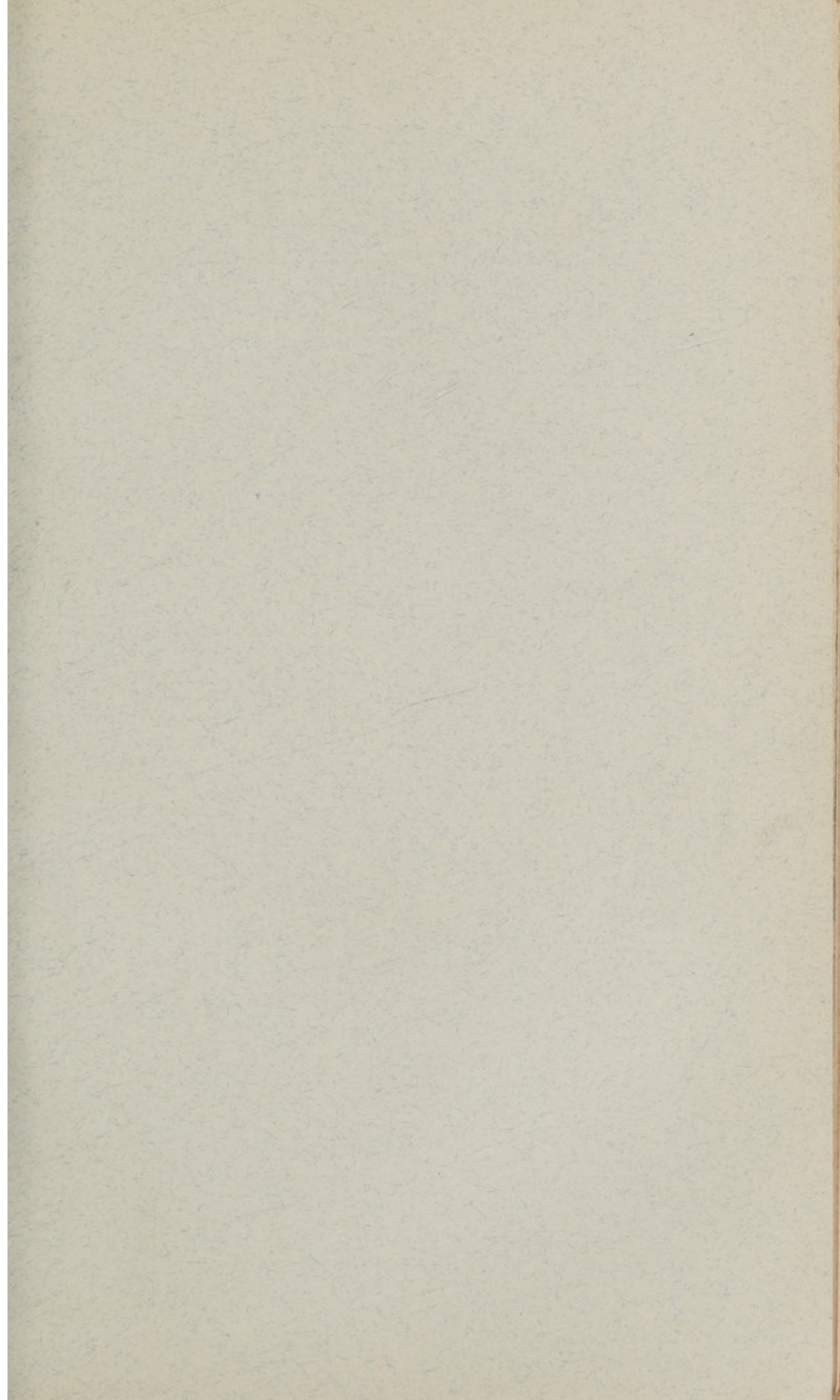
