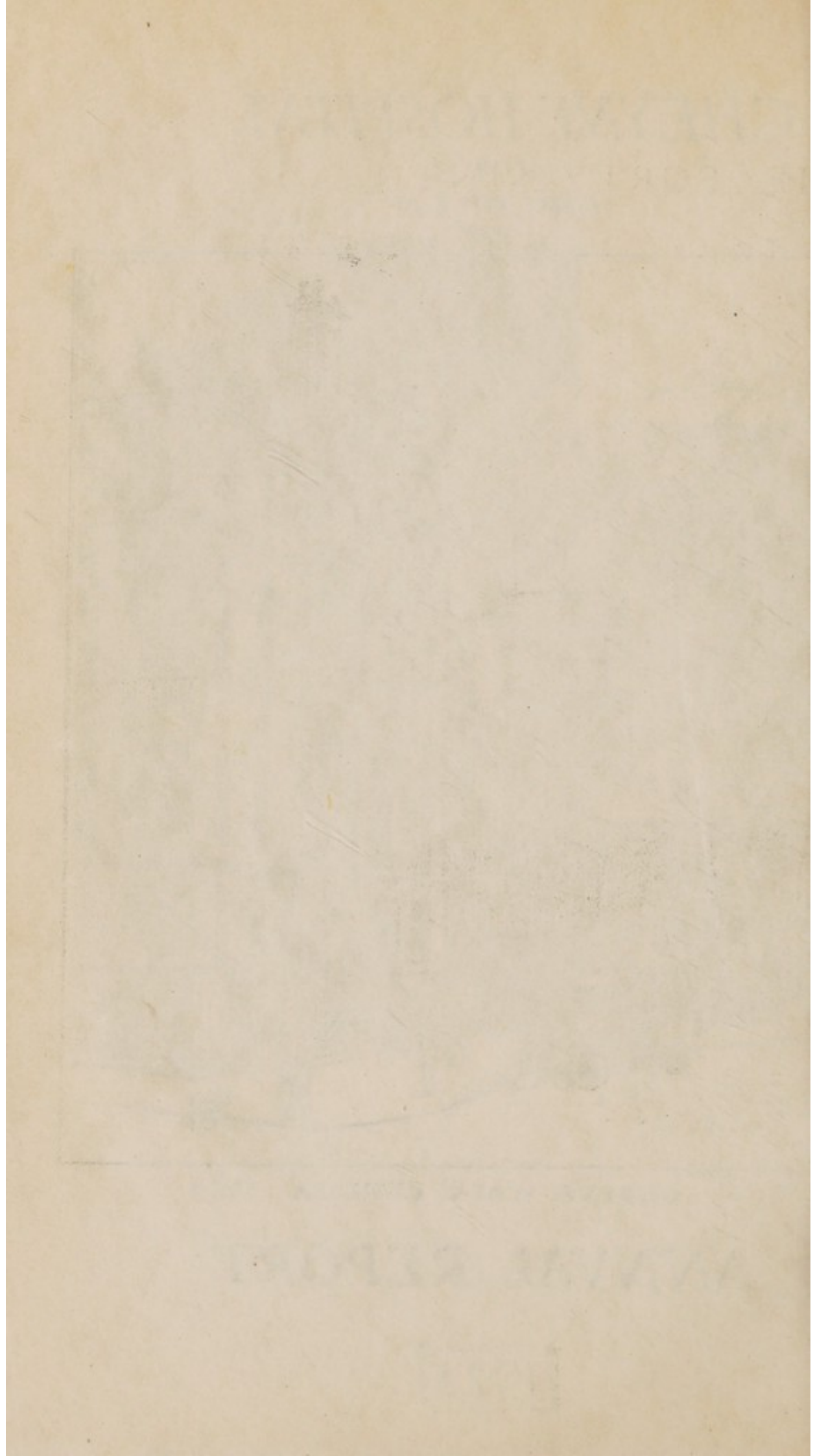

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

THIS Hospital has been established for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, who are on that account excluded or discharged from General Hospitals. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period.

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the continuous care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them for an indefinite period, it will be obvious that changes are very slow and vacancies few and far between. The *average* length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is now over two years; while many of the children remain for much longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear *prima facie* eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission as vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers (p. 6). More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Hydrocephalus, Mental derangement or deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible.

3—Children are admitted only between three and thirteen years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4—The payment of Seven Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

6—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary of the Hospital.

6—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†

7—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8—Applicants for admission, unless the Doctor shall certify to the contrary, may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

9—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

10—A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, *must* be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be *brought with the child*.

11—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission should be at once notified to the Secretary.

* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a householder (or the wife of a householder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of a Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of three shillings and sixpence being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

3—A Donor of £250 in one sum is entitled to *name* a Cot in perpetuity, but without the right to nominate the occupants thereof.

METHODS OF HELP.

GIFTS IN MONEY.

- £1,000 endows a named Free Cot in perpetuity.
- £750 endows a half-payment Cot in perpetuity.
- £300 endows a named Free Cot for the Donor's life.
- £250 endows a half-payment Cot for the Donor's life.
- £250, in one payment, entitles the Donor to name a Cot in perpetuity.
- £52 10s. Donation constitutes a Life Governor.
- £40 Annual Subscription supports a named Free Cot.
- £30 Annual Subscription supports a half-payment Cot.
- £10 10s. Annual Subscriptions gives a Governor's preferential nomination.

Smaller Subscriptions or Donations are much valued and gratefully acknowledged.

GIFTS IN KIND.

The following articles are specially needed :—

At Cheyne Hospital—Vests (knitted by hand), Night-gowns (white flannelette or cotton), Frocks (3 to 14 years), Pinafores and Bed Socks, also Cast-off Clothing (all sizes), Boots and Shoes for those children who are not always in bed.

At St. Nicholas Hospital—Cast-off Clothing, Boys' Jerseys, Red Twill Jackets, Flannel or Cotton Night-gowns, Long Sleeved Vests, Holland Overalls, and Boots and Shoes for convalescent children.

Game, Rabbits, Fresh Fruit and Eggs, New (unbroken) Toys, Jellies, etc., are much appreciated.

Patterns of clothing will gladly be sent from either Hospital to anyone who will kindly supply the articles required.

THE CHEYNE GUILD.

OBJECT.—To provide Clothes for the Children in the Cheyne Hospital. Ages 3 to 16.

THE GUILD consists of members who undertake to collect articles of Clothing (new and old) and send them to the Secretary of the Guild (Miss Peirse-Duncombe, 65, Evelyn Gardens, S.W.7, or at the Cheyne Hospital) each year by 1st June.

Gifts of one or more articles from those who cannot undertake to collect will be very welcome.

The articles most required are enumerated on page 7 under the heading "Gifts in Kind."

163 articles were sent in 1924, a smaller number, but larger and better.

Forty-ninth Annual Report
OF
The Committee of Management

Cheyne Hospital for Children,
For the Year ending December 31st, 1924.

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in presenting their Report, together with the Audited Accounts, for the year ending the 31st December, 1924.

The Committee wish to say that the present year (1925) is the Fiftieth Anniversary of the foundation of the Hospital, which it is proposed to commemorate by a special effort (particulars of which will be duly circulated a little later in the year) to provide further very necessary equipment for the Hospital.

Work of the Year.—Cheyne Hospital.

The figures given above shew that a larger number of children have passed through the Hospital than in any previous year, 92 new patients having been admitted, and 81 discharged to their homes.

Mr. J. Prime Barlett reports:—

“On the whole the Ward work has been heavy owing to the increase in number of acute cases of heart disease, of which the majority have done well, except old chronic cases of several years’ duration before admission here.

Winifred Sears—An early case of mitral disease following diphtheria, has done exceedingly well. She had four attacks of severe epistaxis which lasted for four or five hours, causing extreme collapse. This has been cured, and the child discharged on December 31st, 1924. Since then we have had a letter from the mother saying the child continues to improve and is doing well.

Dora Disspain—Endocarditis with brain symptoms. She has had five severe attacks with persistent vomiting and temperature 105 lasting from 10 to 14 days each time. She is now progressing well and has apparently made distinct improvement and has not gone for such a long period between the attacks and is gaining weight.

A child was admitted from the country, who was running a temperature of 102, acute abdominal symptoms, mesenteric glands, kidneys and bladder also affected, large quantity of pus and albumen. This condition persisted for some weeks. The child was very emaciated, not absorbing nourishment, She is now up, running about, having gained 4 lbs.”

Mr. Gwynne Williams reports:—

“The Installation of the Arc Light treatment has made a great difference in the general condition of the children. It is used only as a substitute for sunlight on the dark days, and whereas, before its installation all tuberculous cases lost ground in the winter, so far, during the present dark days, they all seem as well as ever, and have not lost weight; the number of tuberculous cases is rather large for the space at present at our disposal in the light treatment room and it is hoped that it will be possible to extend the accommodation.”

Extensions, etc.

The installation of Arc Lamps, referred to in last year's Report has been completed, and has proved to be of the greatest value, especially in view of the sunlessness of a great part of the year. The results have been so satisfactory that the Committee have decided to enlarge the room where this treatment is applied, the present one being too small for the number of patients who can be benefitted by the use of artificial light. The Committee acknowledges with sincere gratitude the contribution of £32 received from Mr. R. L. Poole towards the cost of this installation.

The Mortuary has been re-arranged and decorated under the superintendence of Miss Playfair and Miss Burlison, to both of whom the Committee tender their warm thanks for the help given, as well as to those who have kindly contributed the necessary furnishings.

At the St. Nicholas Branch Hospital, provision has been made for much-needed accommodation in the way of a nurses' sitting-room and three extra bedrooms, by the adaptation for those purposes of the Upper Ward, which is not now needed as such, as practically all the patients are now treated in the open-air shelter.

The alterations to the Shelter Yard, carried out last year, have greatly facilitated the carrying on of the work of the Hospital.

The Committee are now considering plans for some further extensions at Cheyne Hospital, as there is great need for the provision of rooms in which very serious cases, requiring quiet, can be segregated; also an operating theatre, linen airing rooms, extra bedrooms, and a shelter and open-air Ward for cases of Rickets and other requirements.

As it has been found that patients suffering from Rickets can be greatly benefitted by open-air and artificial light treatment, it has been decided to add such cases to those eligible for admission at this Hospital.

The cost of these improvements will be considerable, but as they will be of great service in completing the equipment of the Hospital for the work to be carried on, the Committee consider that they are justified in incurring the necessary expenditure, and they most earnestly and confidently appeal to their friends for financial support.

"Duchess of York Ward."

This Ward has proved to be a most valuable addition. The patients treated have greatly benefitted by exposure to sunshine and by being in the open air. There could be no better situation in London for this purpose, as there is always a good current of air on the riverside. Sincere thanks are tendered to the King Edward's Hospital Fund for London for a grant of £250 in reduction of the expenditure on this Ward.

On a separate page (19) an account is given of a most successful Exhibition of Chelsea China, organized by Mr. Reginald Blunt.

By this means, the balance of Expenditure has been reduced by the sum of £1,119 2s. 2d., and the Committee are most grateful to the said Exhibition Committee for such a splendid result.

St. Nicholas Branch Hospital.

This Branch has again proved to be of the utmost value not only in completing the cure of patients sent from Cheyne Hospital, but also in the successful treatment of those sent there direct.

Cots.

Sincere thanks are tendered to Mrs. Elizabeth Skinner for the endowment of the "Albert Jesse Skinner" Cot and also to all those who have continued to support their respective Cots by Annual Subscriptions.

It is a great pleasure to record, with sincere gratitude, a most generous gift of £1,000 4 per cent. Funding Loan Stock, received from Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Nelson, for the purpose of naming a Cot in perpetuity, in memory of their son, Horace Nelson.

Education.

The education of the patients has been carried on regularly and to the satisfaction of the Board of Education, from whom full grants have been received for both Hospitals.

Particular attention has been given to manual instruction and the girls have been specially trained in needlework, so that they may be useful in their homes after discharge from the Hospital.

The Committee sincerely thank all of the said Executors for their greatly valued help.

The Estate of the late Mr. R. Candelbert Collingdon having been wound up, a further sum of £488 7s. has been received from the Executors in final settlement of this Hospital's share in the Residue.

Receipts and Expenditure.

The ordinary expenditure of the two Hospitals has again exceeded the ordinary receipts by £877 17s. 2d. Generally, there has been a further rise in the cost of provisions and supplies, and it has been necessary to raise the scale of salaries and wages. Renewals of furniture and other household goods have been necessary and considerable expense has been incurred in painting, decorations, and general repairs. The increase in expenditure has been partly due to the larger number of patients treated. It is satisfactory to note that the total cost per patient has not materially increased, and is still very moderate, being for Cheyne Hospital £1 15s. 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. and for St. Nicholas Hospital £1 9s. 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per week.

THE CHELSEA CHINA AND POTTERY EXHIBITION.

An Exhibition of Chelsea China and Pottery was held at Chelsea Town Hall, June 2nd to 14th, in aid of the Open-Air Ward at Cheyne Hospital, and proved a great success. Besides a magnificent and representative selection of Chelsea China lent by leading collectors, the Exhibition included fine specimens of Elers Ware, Wedgwood decorated at Chelsea, De Morgan Pottery and the work of Miss Parnell, Mr. Reginald Wells, Mr. Charles Vyse, Mr. Harry Parr, Miss Raper, Miss Kitching, Misses Shuffrey and other Chelsea potters of to-day; whilst those who lent specimens of Chelsea China included Lord Bearsted, Lord Cromer, Lord Ernle, Lord and Lady Fisher, Mr. Trevor Galsworthy, Dr. and Mrs. Bellamy Gardner, Mr. L. A. and Mr. L. F. Harrison, Mr. Alfred Hutton, Mrs. Joshua, Mrs. Sebag-Montefiore, Mrs. Radford, the late Mrs. Salting, Lady Sassoon and Mrs. Meyer Sassoon, Mr. F. Sidney, Mr. P. Wilson Steer, Mrs. Stoner and several other well known connoisseurs.

De Morgan Ware was lent by H.R.H. Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, Mrs. Russell Barrington, Mrs. Brinton, The Chelsea Public Library, Mr. Howarth, Mr. Halsey Ricardo, Mrs. Stirling, Mr. Reginald Blunt and others. The Exhibition was opened on Monday, June 2nd by the Countess of Cromer, who expressed, in a charming little speech, her deep interest in the work and welfare of Cheyne Hospital and her best wishes for the success of this effort in its behalf.

Her Majesty the Queen visited the Exhibition on the following day, and spent an hour in examining the various cases, making several purchases of modern Chelsea Pottery. The Queen was attended by Lady Cynthia Colville and Mr. H. Lloyd Verney, C.V.O., and was received by the Earl and Countess of Cromer, who presented the Mayor of Chelsea and the members of the Organizing Committee.

"Informal Talks" on subjects relating to the Exhibition were given during its course by Mr. Bernard Rackham, Dr. Bellamy Gardner, Mr. William King, Mr. Frank Stoner, Mr. Charles Vyse, Mr. Halsey Ricardo and Mr. Reginald Blunt,

The Exhibition aroused the greatest interest, and was visited by about 3,200 persons during the fortnight it was open. A number of generous friends presented valuable pieces of Chelsea China, Pottery, &c., which were sold by auction for the benefit of the Hospital, and realised over £800. Sir Gerald du Maurier kindly acted as auctioneer.

The value of the exhibits, at a very moderate insurance estimate, was just over £50,000. After payment of all expenses for printing and advertising, insurance, carriage, hire, watchmen, &c., the Committee had the pleasure of handing to the Cheyne Hospital a sum of over £1,100.

During the course of the Exhibition, the feeling was widely expressed that a permanent record should be made of such an interesting and unique collection. The Organizing Committee, consisting of Mr. Gilbert Bryant, Dr. and Mrs. Bellamy Gardner, Mr. Leonard Harrison, Miss Gwendolen Parnell, Mr. Malcolm Stoner and Mr. Charles Vyse, with Mr. Reginald Blunt, *Hon. Sec.*, at once undertook this work. Practically the whole of the exhibits were photographed and described, and an admirable quarto volume, "The Cheyne Book of Chelsea China and Pottery" was published by Mr. Geoffrey Bles for the Committee, last December. It contains, besides a full account of the Exhibition and a detailed catalogue of exhibits, complete reports of the informal talks, and 56 full page illustrations of selected specimens, reproduced in collotype with a beautiful coloured frontispiece. The whole profits from this volume are to be given to the Hospital, where copies, price 25/- net, can be obtained from the Secretary.

The Committee of Cheyne Hospital wish to take this opportunity of expressing their thanks to the members of the Organizing Committee, to the lenders of the exhibits and the lecturers, to those who gave specimens for auction, to those who lent show cases, and to many other friends who contributed to the success of this interesting undertaking; and of recording their special gratitude to Mr. Malcolm Stoner and Dr. and Mrs. Bellamy Gardner, whose untiring personal efforts ensured its satisfactory accomplishment.

“GODMOTHERS.”

A plan has been started lately in connection primarily with the supply of garments for the children, which many people seem to like, and which materially assists the management and funds of the hospital. Ladies (or gentlemen) are asked to become godmother (or godfather) to a particular child, and to make themselves responsible for the clothes for that child for a year; the expense is approximately 35/- to £2, and it is hoped that the godmothers will take a personal interest in their children, and visit them whenever they wish.

We have now about twenty “Godmothers” and shall be glad to increase the number to sixty. Particulars as to clothes required, etc., can be had from the Matron.
