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

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

THIS Hospital has been established for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, who are on that account excluded or discharged from General Hospitals. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period.

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the continuous care and treatment of cases of deepseated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them for an indefinite period, it will be obvious that changes are very slow and vacancies few and far between. The average length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is now over two years; while many of the children remain for much longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear prima facie eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission as vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers (p. 6). More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1--Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Hydrocephalus, Mental derangement or deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible.

3—Children are admitted only between three and thirteen years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4-The payment of Seven Shillings a week is required from the

Parents or Friends of the Patients."

5—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary of the Hospital.

6—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfac-

tion.†

7—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

- 8—Applicants for admission, unless the Doctor shall certify to the contrary, may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.
- 9—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.
- 10—A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, must be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be brought with the child.

11—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission should be at once notified to the Secretary.

*Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a householder (or the wife of a householder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit

the maintenance charge quarterly.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the

Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2-A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients

thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of a Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

- 1—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.
- 2—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of three shillings and sixpence being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.
- 3-A Donor of £250 in one sum is entitled to name a Cot in perpetuity, but without the right to nominate the occupants thereof.

METHODS OF HELP.

GIFTS IN MONEY.

£1,000 endows a named Free Cot in perpetuity.

£750 endows a half-payment Cot in perpetuity.

£300 endows a named Free Cot for the Donor's life.

£250 endows a half-payment Cot for the Donor's life.

£250, in one payment, entitles the Donor to name a Cot in perpetuity.

£52 10s. Donation constitutes a Life Governor.

£40 Annual Subscription supports a named Free Cot.

£30 Annual Subscription supports a half-payment Cot.

£10 10s. Annual Subscription gives a Governor's preferential nomination.

Smaller Subscriptions or Donations are much valued and gratefully acknowledged.

GIFTS IN KIND.

Fiftieth Annual Report The Committee of Management Cheyne Hospital for Children,

For the Year ending December 31st, 1925.

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in presenting their Report, together with the Audited Statement of Accounts, for the year ending December 31st, 1925—the Jubilee Year of the Hospital.

Death of the President, H.M. Queen Alexandra.

Before proceeding to a detailed review of the year's work, the Committee desire to record an expression of their sorrow and sincere regret occasioned by the death of their President, Her Majesty Oueen Alexandra.

Her Majesty had been President of Cheyne Hospital ever since, as Princess of Wales, she visited it first 35 years ago, and her keen interest in its work and welfare has been constantly manifested by her personal visits, letters and gifts since 1890 and until the time of her death.

To the members of the Royal Family the Committee desire respectfully to offer their deep sympathy and loyal affection for the memory of one whose name will always be associated with the Voluntary Hospitals and kindred charities in which her late Majesty evinced so deep and practical an interest, and whose well-being she ever held so closely at heart.

Whilst the above figures represent a very slight decrease in actual number of patients passing through the Hospital when compared with the previous twelve months, the past year has again embraced a period of useful activity, and considerable progress has been made in the development of the Hospital by the improvements and extensions which have been effected.

Mr. J. Prime Bartlett reports: -

"The improvement of the majority of the children in the Lower Ward has been rather slower than usual owing to the large number of choreas at present being treated.

Edith K——— was admitted with chorea, in a very serious condition both mentally and physically, and the choreaic movements were so marked that the child was unable to control herself in any way. After eight weeks she had responded to treatment so wonderfully that she was able to sit up, and had regained her speech. She is now, after three months, able to talk normally and to keep absolutely still, and is gaining weight.

Hannah D———, aged 5 years, was admitted with an S-shaped spine and weighing only 18 pounds. She is now up, running about, her spine being almost straight, and she has gained over 14 pounds."

Mr. Gwynne Williams reports:-

"The work of the Hospital during the past year has been very encouraging.

The new arc light installation has been used in cases of tuberculosis of the bones and joints and cases of osteomyelitis, and it has kept these cases from going backward during the dark winter months, and except for one case which we have had in the Hospital for some years and

which has been beyond the chance of recovery, all have improved, even cases which seemed at first sight too ill to benefit.

The other great group of cases is that of infantile paralysis and they are now coming to the Hospital at an earlier period in their illness and before deformities have occurred. With the aid of apparatus and the constant devotion of the nursing staff, they can be taught to walk under circumstances which cannot be obtained except in a Hospital such as ours, where they can be kept in a long time and where the nurses are expert in dealing with them."

The Jubilee Appeal.

As briefly indicated in the last Annual Report the Committee decided to commemorate the Fiftieth Anniversary of the establishment of Cheyne Hospital on June 16th, 1875, by inaugurating a Special Jubilee Appeal for £6,000 in order to provide the following much-needed alterations and additions:

- (a) Two Segregation Wards for the special accommodation of patients, who for various reasons, it may be desirable to move from the open Ward.
- (b) A new and adequately equipped Operation Theatre and Sterilizing Room.
- (c) A Small Roof Ward for the treatment of Ricket cases.
- (d) Extension of the Light Cure Room.
- (e) Two Bedrooms for Nurses; Linen Rooms, Cupboards, etc.
- (f) The laying out of a Garden Playground for such children as are nearing convalescence and where open-air education can be given.

The carrying out of these proposals involved the addition of two floors to the eastern wing of the Hospital and the Isolation Ward at its rear. Plans having been prepared, were examined on the spot by representatives of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, who approved the scheme, and subsequently allocated a grant of £250 towards the cost. The contract was placed with Messrs. Lole & Co. of Chelsea, who commenced building operations in May.

It was realised at the outset that the successful prosecution of the Jubilee Appeal would be a task of great difficulty in London, having regard to the keen competition in this respect, and to the ever-increasing calls upon the generosity of the philanthropic public, and whilst the Committee are pleased to announce that as the result of the many and varied efforts associated with the Appeal, the sum of nearly £4,000 had been raised by the end of the year, they desire most earnestly to call attention to the large balance still required, and to impress upon all who have at heart the welfare of the younger generation, the great and pressing need for further practical assistance in order that the desired amount may be forthcoming, and that no part of the cost of these structural improvements shall be a charge upon the General Funds of the Hospital.

Exhibition and Sale of Pictures.

In connection with the Jubilee Appeal, special mention must be made of the Exhibition and Sale of Pictures and Works of Art, generously given by many local and other artists and friends of the Hospital. The Exhibition and Sale of these gifts at No. 18 Carlton House Terrace (kindly lent by Major The Hon. John Astor, M.P., and Lady Violet Astor) realized the handsome sum of over £900, and the Committee desire to express their sincere thanks to all who were in any way associated with this most successful undertaking.

Finance.

Her late Majesty Queen Alexandra again graciously contributed £100 from funds placed at her disposal by the "Alexandra Day" Committee.

A gift of £5 was received from His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales as a Special Christmas Donation.

The Committee are much indebted to the several donors for these most valuable gifts.

Income and Expenditure.

It is a matter of regret to the Committee to report that in spite of very careful and economical administration, the Ordinary Income of the two Hospitals has again failed to meet the Ordinary Expenditure, and that a loss of £632 11s. 7d. was sustained on the year's working.

In two items, those of Annual Cleaning and Renewal and Repair of Furniture which always fluctuate from year to year, an increased Expenditure is specially noticeable. Considerable internal redecorative work has been carried out and the provision of 25 new ward lockers alone involved an outlay of over £80.

Alterations and Improvements.

In addition to the structural alterations already mentioned, two other much-needed improvements have been put in hand during the past year—the construction of a covered way on the Roof Ward at a cost of £120, and the renovation of four ward floors in concrete covered with linoleum, the latter work involving an expenditure of £323.

St. Nicholas Branch Hospital.

Much valuable curative work has again been carried out at this very useful Branch Hospital by the sea, and its patients continue to derive great benefit from its delightful health-giving and bracing situation.

Garden Fete and Sale of Work.

In July last a most successful Garden Fete, Rose Party and Sale of Work was held in the grounds of St. Nicholas Hospital, as the result of which the Hospital Appeal Funds benefited to the extent of £216 10s. 4d.

The Opening Ceremony was kindly performed by Lady Katharine Hardy, to whom, together with the Matron, Miss Money and her many helpers, our warmest thanks are tendered

for their invaluable assistance.

The Rev. H. E. Trimmer, who for the past fifteen years had acted as Honorary Chaplain, has resigned this office upon leaving the Parish, and his successor, the Rev. Sidney R. Griggs, has kindly consented to act in a similar capacity.

Education.

The education of the patients at both Hospitals has been continued to the satisfaction of the Board of Education.

Special tuition has again been given in handiwork in which it is found the children take a great interest. A Sale of Work organized by the Matron, Miss Angus, and the Staff, was held at Cheyne Hospital towards the end of the year and realised over £110.

Mr. Kemp Welch's Retirement.

In April last the Committee received with much regret the resignation of Mr. Henry Kemp Welch from the office of Secretary which he held for the past 23\frac{1}{4} years.

It is impossible to speak too highly of the very valuable services rendered to the Hospital by Mr. Kemp Welch, who, originally as a member of the Committee in 1876, and subsequently in the capacities at varying intervals of Honorary Treasurer, Trustee, Honorary Book-keeper, and finally as Secretary, had been actively associated with the management of the Hospital almost since its establishment 50 years ago.

To his great loyalty, tireless energy and whole-hearted devotion to its interests during this long and faithful service, Cheyne Hospital is deeply indebted; and the Committee desire to place on record their keen appreciation and their sincere and grateful thanks to Mr. Kemp Welch, who takes with him in his well-earned retirement the good wishes of all associated with the Hospital.

As his successor the Committee have appointed Mr. R. Wilfred Elliston, who was trained at the West London Hospital and for the past three years had been Secretary of the

Doncaster Royal Infirmary.

General.

The Committee are pleased to welcome Sir Albert Gray and the Rev. Canon C. S. Woodward, who have been appointed Vice-Presidents during the year.

Harvest Festivals were held as usual at both Hospitals, the Services being conducted at Cheyne Hospital by the Rev. D. Tudor Craig, Vicar of Earlsfield and Rural Dean of Wandsworth, and at St. Nicholas by the Rev. Sidney E. Griggs.

The "Godmother" idea—particulars of which are given on page 19—is making excellent progress and it is hoped that many will take advantage of this very interesting and practical method of helping the Hospital and its patients.

In conclusion the Committee desire cordially to thank all subscribers, friends, and the various staffs of the Hospital for help given, interest maintained, and work well done during the past year.

It must however again be pointed out that a considerable portion of the cost of the many recent improvements has still to be met, in addition to the ordinary maintenance expenditure of the Hospital. Accordingly, continued and increased support is essential, and the Committee particularly ask that all present contributors who can possibly do so, will endeavour to interest at least one other person in the welfare of the Hospital, and so ensure that its work for the children may be carried on unhampered by the nightmare of constant financial anxiety.
