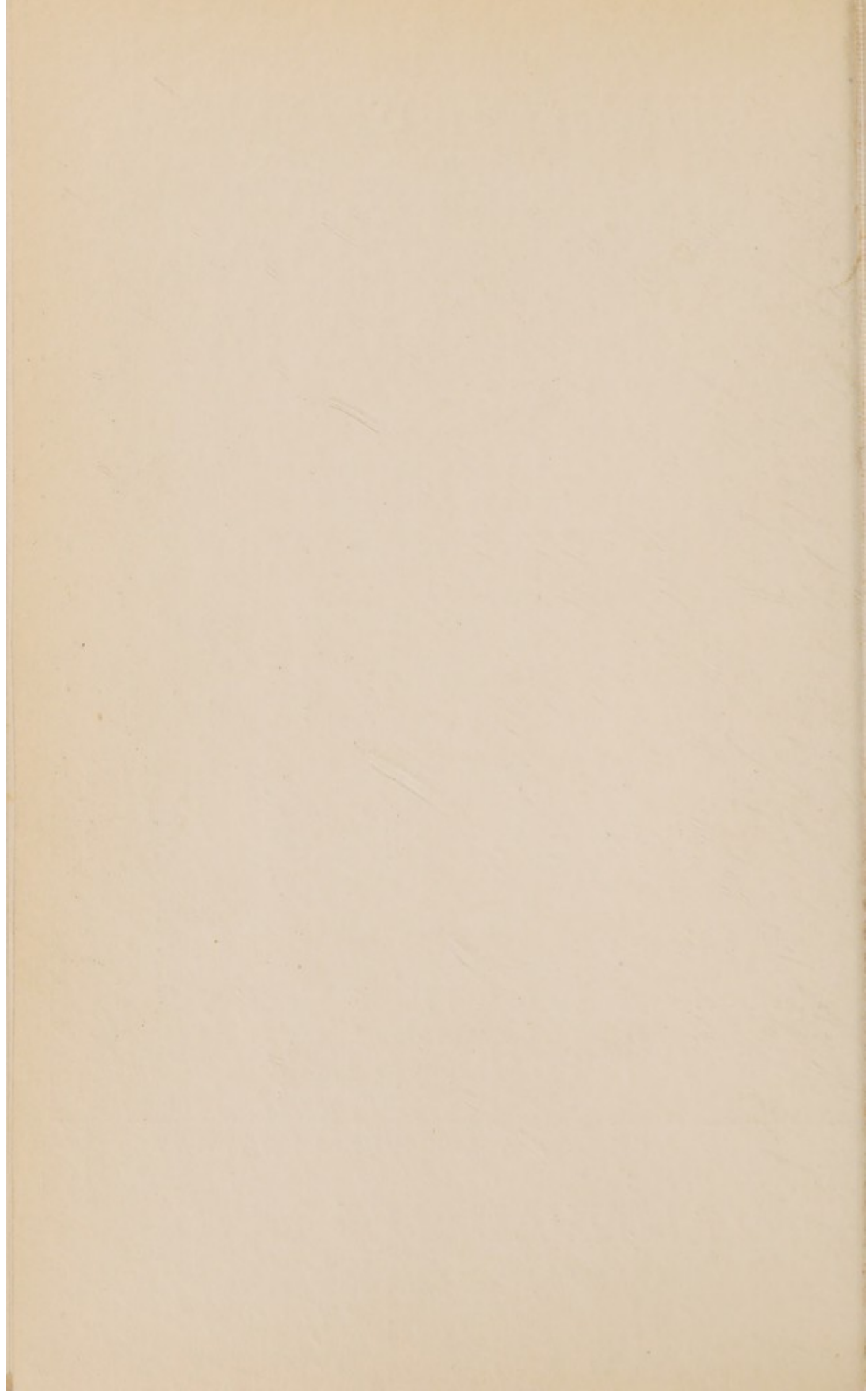

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in presenting their Report, together with the Audited Statement of Accounts, for the year ending December 31st, 1926.

The continued increase in the work of the Hospital is clearly reflected in the above figures, which in relation to the number of Admissions (119) and Discharges (115) are considerably in excess of the records of 92 and 81 respectively, created during 1924.

Additional Honorary Staff.

Early in the year the Senior Surgeon, Mr. J. Prime Bartlett, expressed to the Committee his desire to limit the number of beds under his charge to 25 in the Lower Ward. As a result of this change the Committee considered it advisable that the personnel of the Honorary Staff should be increased, and the following appointments were accordingly made:—

each of whom has considerable and specialised experience in the treatment of Diseases of Children.

Completion of Structural Alterations.

The extensive scheme of alterations and improvements which were commenced in May, 1925, and which have been previously referred to in detail, were completed in the Spring of 1926, and represent a most important stage in the development and history of the Hospital. The admiration of the new work, which was so generally expressed on the occasion of the Special Visiting Day on May 6th last, was a satisfactory endorsement of the policy of the Committee in sanctioning this expenditure of over £5,000.

Jubilee Appeal—£1,000 still required.

It will be remembered that in order to commemorate the Fiftieth Anniversary of the foundation of the Hospital in 1875, and to meet the cost of the above-mentioned improvements, a Special Jubilee Appeal for £6,000 was inaugurated by the Committee, and whilst it is pleasing to be able to record that as a result of much strenuous effort a considerable portion of this amount has been received, **the Fund is still about £1,000 short of the total required and an earnest appeal is made to friends and well-wishers of the Hospital for further practical support**, either by a gift towards the Deficit, or by making its existence known as widely as possible, or, preferably, by both of these methods.

Artificial Light Room.

Owing to the discovery of two hidden tie-beams, considerable deviation was necessary from the original plans for the New Light Room, and the eventual result was the provision of a much more spacious room—now one of the finest in the Hospital—than originally intended. It is now possible for the Light Treatment to be given to the children under much better conditions than previously, and additional accommodation is also available for Radiant Heat Treatment.

Expenditure.

It is again a matter of regret that the Ordinary Expenditure has exceeded Ordinary Income during the past year. This liability, added to the Building Fund Deficit already mentioned, represents a total indebtedness of £1022 18s. 9d., a position which is viewed with considerable anxiety by the Committee.

Renewals of furniture, bedding, linen, etc.,—in some cases the first for many years—have been considerable, and although much-needed redecoration has in part been again deferred owing to the acute financial position, it was found impossible entirely to eliminate a certain portion of expenditure in this respect.

Income.

His Majesty The King has graciously sent a Donation of £100 from a fund that Her late Majesty Queen Alexandra kept at her disposal for charitable purposes.

A gift of £5 has also again been received from H.R.H. the Prince of Wales for the Children's Christmas Fund.

Most grateful thanks are tendered to the Stock Exchange Operatic and Dramatic Society for a very handsome donation of £700.

A very successful Matinee Performance by children of "The Admirable Crichton," at the Savoy Theatre in January, was organised by Mrs. Geoffrey Whitworth to whom the Committee express their gratitude for the allocation to the Hospital of £224 5s. 4d., one-half of the proceeds.

A short appeal was broadcast by Wireless from the B.B.C. Headquarters, at Savoy Hill, on Christmas Evening, 1925, in aid of Cheyne Hospital and several other charities, as a result of which the Hospital received the sum of £169 4s. 4d.

The Committee are much indebted to the local Traders' Association for the organization of three Dances at Chelsea Town Hall whereby approximately £100 was raised for the Hospital.

Ladies' Committee.

The work of the House Committee has been considerably relieved during the year by the formation of a Ladies' Committee to which it was felt many matters of household management (*e.g.*, linen, bedding, children's clothing, school handcraft, laundry, domestic staff, etc.) could with advantage be referred.

The experiment has proved to be most successful, and very useful work has been accomplished by the Ladies' Committee, which, in addition to carrying out the duties outlined above, has secured many new friends for the Hospital by the establishment of a

Ladies' League of Help.

The League, of which the Countess of Cromer has kindly consented to be Chairman, was inaugurated at a well attended meeting held at the Hospital on October 29th.

Sub-Committees were formed to deal with various activities of the Hospital, including After-care, "Godmothers," Garden, etc., and much valuable assistance has already been rendered.

Further particulars of the "Godmothers" Scheme are given on page 21.

Education.

The education of the children at both Hospitals, by arrangement with the Board of Education and Ministry of Health, has been maintained on the usual lines. The following extracts are taken from the Board of Education official Reports :—

CHEYNE HOSPITAL.

"The Board are glad to learn that the children are interested in their school work in which they are making satisfactory progress and that excellent handwork is being done by them."

ST. NICHOLAS HOSPITAL.

“The work of this School was well carried out, with plenty of equipment and apparatus for the youngest children, and the children seemed keenly interested in the school work.

Many of the children were able to read well, . . . the reading and composition were very good and a number of well-finished specimens of handwork were seen.”

It is satisfactory to record that three children from Cheyne Hospital were successful in obtaining prizes for handwork in a competition open to pupils all over the country.

A new form of handwork—that of toy-making—has recently been undertaken by the children at St. Nicholas Hospital, and it is hoped materially to develop this industry during the ensuing year, as it is considered that a knowledge of a craft of this nature may be of special value in later life to some of the children, who, by reason of their physical condition, may not be fitted to engage in the more arduous forms of industrial pursuits.

Miss K. L. Chadwick has been appointed Head Teacher at St. Nicholas in succession to Miss Devonshire who resigned on account of ill-health.

St. Nicholas Branch Hospital.

Excellent work has again been accomplished at this delightful Branch Hospital, near Birchington, where the patients derive great benefit from careful nursing and the bracing Thanet air.

New Playroom.

Owing to the increasing number of children who are not entirely confined to bed, the need for a larger Playroom which would be available in wet and cold weather became a matter of considerable importance, and after very careful and prolonged consideration the Committee decided to sanction the erection of a spacious and well-lighted structure, 50ft. by 20ft., with a southern aspect, and also of three adjoining small rooms for use as clothes store, splint room, and waiting room for visitors, at a cost of £527. This work was completed in the autumn and forms a valuable and important addition to the Branch Hospital, and the advantage accruing to patients, staff and visitors as the result of this much-needed accommodation has already been abundantly evident.

The Committee acknowledge with very grateful thanks the continuance of a grant of £10 from the Playfair Trust Fund for the purpose of meeting the cost of conveyance of the children to the seashore.

The Annual Harvest Festival Service took place on October 8th, and was conducted by the Rev. Sydney E. Griggs.

Death of Mr. Henry Kemp-Welch.

It is with very deep regret that the Committee record the death on July 8th, of Mr. Henry Kemp-Welch, who had been intimately associated with the management of the Hospital for nearly fifty years, during which period he had held the office of Secretary for over twenty-three years.

Wireless.

Very sincere thanks are tendered to the Directors of *The Daily News* for the installation and connection all over the Hospital of a splendid five-valve Wireless set and sixty-four pairs of head-phones. This most useful and entertaining gift was formally handed over to the Hospital, on February 19th, by Sir Harry Lauder and has proved to be a source of great pleasure and enjoyment to the children and staff.

Memorial to Mr. and Mrs. Wickham Flower.

In connection with the commemoration of the Jubilee of the Hospital, opportunity was taken to give effect to a wish often expressed by friends of Mr. and Mrs. Wickham Flower that some memorial might be placed in the Hospital which was founded by them half-a-century ago and with which their interest was throughout their lives so closely associated.

A private subscription fund was opened and Mr. Allan G. Wyon was commissioned to execute in the form of a plaque a charming design suggested by Mr. Halsey Ricardo.

The memorial has been placed in the Entrance Hall of the Hospital, and was unveiled by the Countess of Cromer on May 6th, in the presence of a large company, which, it is interesting to note, included in the Senior Surgeon, Mr. J. Prime Bartlett and the late Secretary, Mr. Henry Kemp-Welch, two friends who had been connected with the Hospital practically since its inception in 1875.

General.

A Harvest Festival Service was held at Cheyne Hospital on October 1st and was conducted by the Rev. B. F. Simpson, M.A., Vicar of St. Peter's, Cranley Gardens.

The Rev. W. H. Stewart, of Chelsea Old Church, who for some years had kindly undertaken the duties of Honorary Chaplain, resigned this office in June on proceeding abroad.

Mr. Stewart has entrusted to the care of the Hospital a portable altar for use on the occasion of Special Services in the Wards. This altar has a not uninteresting history, having been made by the ship's carpenter on one of His Majesty's ships by the personal order of Admiral Sir John Swinburne, the father of Algernon Swinburne, and it is understood that the Admiral subsequently took it with him on any ship in which he flew his flag.

The Committee regret to report an outbreak of Diphtheria—the first for many years—during November and December. Eight cases in all were diagnosed and removed to Fever Hospitals. Happily none was attended with fatal results.

Committee.

A cordial welcome is extended to Miss D. M. Macnamara who has joined the General Committee during the past year.

Mrs. Percy Morris and Mr. H. Mostyn Pritchard, each of whom has been a member of the Committee for some years, have resigned.

The following three members,—R. T. Watkin Williams Esq., Miss Peirse-Duncombe and Mrs. Lyon Sidey,—retire at the Annual Meeting in order of seniority of their appointment and are eligible for re-election.

THE ANNUAL MEETING.

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Governors and Committee of Management of the Cheyne Hospital for Children was held at the Hospital on Wednesday, March 9th, 1927. There were present—The Right Hon. The Earl of Cromer (in the Chair), Mr. Reginald Blunt, Mrs. Banon, Miss Playfair, Mr. Leonard F. Harrison, Miss Peirse-Duncombe, Mrs. H. M. Pritchard and Mrs. H. A. Rauthmell.

Proposed by Mrs. Banon, and seconded by Miss Peirse-Duncombe—"That the Annual Report and Audited Statement of Accounts for the year ended December 31st, 1926, be, and hereby are, adopted."

Proposed by Mr. Leonard Harrison, and seconded by Mr. Reginald Blunt—"That the following Members of the Committee of Management who retire at this Meeting in the order of the seniority of their appointment be, and hereby are, re-elected, viz., R. T. Watkin Williams, Esq., Miss Peirse-Duncombe and Mrs. Lyon Sidey."

Proposed by Mrs. Banon, and seconded by Mrs. Pritchard—"That Mrs. F. H. Mellor and Henry A. Rauthmell, Esq., be elected as Members of the General Committee."

Proposed by Mr. Reginald Blunt, and seconded by Mrs. Banon—"That The Right Honourable The Earl of Cromer, G.C.I.E., G.C.V.O., be, and hereby is, elected as Chairman of the General Committee of Management for the ensuing year, and that Leonard F. Harrison, Esq., be, and hereby is, elected as Vice-Chairman."

Proposed by The Earl of Cromer, and seconded by Mrs. Banon—"That the following Members of the General Committee be appointed as a Finance Committee for the ensuing year: Messrs. R. Blunt, L. F. Harrison, A. M. Turner and R. T. Watkin Williams."

Proposed by The Earl of Cromer, and seconded by Mr. Reginald Blunt—"That the following ladies be appointed as Members of the Ladies' Committee for the ensuing year: Mrs. Banon, Miss Peirse-Duncombe, Miss Macnamara, Mrs. Mellor, Miss Playfair, Mrs. H. M. Pritchard, Miss M. A. Harrison and Mrs. Lawrence Harrison."

Proposed by The Earl of Cromer, and seconded by Mrs. H. M. Pritchard—"That a cordial vote of thanks be accorded to the Treasurer, the Medical Officers, the Honorary Chaplain (at St. Nicholas Hospital), and to the Nursing Staffs of both Hospitals for their services during the past year."

The Treasurer having briefly responded,

It was Agreed at the suggestion of Mr. Blunt, "That consideration should be given to the advisability of holding the Annual Meeting at a later date in future years, and that on such days the Hospital should be open for inspection by friends and subscribers."

In Memoriam.

HENRY KEMP-WELCH.

HENRY KEMP-WELCH did not long survive his retirement from the Secretaryship of Cheyne Hospital, which took place at the end of 1925, as recorded in the last Report. He had been an untiring worker all his life, and he remained in harness to within a few months of its end, which came after a short illness, on 8th July, 1926.

To his long and devoted service for Cheyne Hospital, of which he was successively a member of the first Committee, Honorary Treasurer and Book-keeper, Trustee, and Secretary during a period of nearly 50 years, the Committee paid their tribute of respect and high appreciation in the last Annual Report; and as a memento of this esteem, they and a few other old friends of Cheyne Hospital presented him, in January, 1926, with a silver teapot of Georgian design, and a tea table carrying a small inscribed silver plate, whilst the staff and children gave him an original drawing of horses' heads by his cousin, Miss Lucy Kemp-Welch, which he had greatly admired.

Though obviously unfit for any such exertion he could not be prevented from coming over from his home in Battersea to the Hospital for one or two little functions in the Spring. Its interests had always come before his own, and he never spared or even considered himself or his own well being, physical or financial, where its work was concerned. Such characters are not so common that their record should pass unnoticed.

Mr. Kemp-Welch's father was a shipowner, and one of the founders of the Commercial Union Assurance Company ; and in a memoir of our late Secretary, published in the magazine of the Marine Society, of which he was Vice-President and Chairman of the Accounts Committee, it is stated that, determining in early years to become thoroughly acquainted with seafaring conditions, he made a series of voyages to all parts of the world, travelling over 181,000 miles on these tours, including two visits to New Zealand, the latter of which was undertaken largely in respect of a property in which Cheyne Hospital was interested.

To this Hospital, and to the Marine Society and their *Warspite* training ship, the last forty years of Mr. Kemp-Welch's life were entirely devoted ; and both institutions have lost in him a personality not easy either to appraise or to replace. Extremely modest and self-effacing, he could yet fight doggedly for the views and aims to which he pinned his faith. He shunned the limelight, and hated publicity and speechmaking, but was indefatigable in spadework, and would often exhaust himself in energies which might have been relegated to much less competent hands. " His life's work was done quietly and unostentatiously," as the memoir above referred to testifies, " unknown to all but a few ; who, however, will unite in their tribute to his memory. As he had lived, so it was his desire to pass away, unobtrusively, when his work was over ; and his interment therefore took place privately, attended only by members of his family."

Mr. Kemp-Welch leaves a widow, to whom he became engaged on his above-mentioned second visit to New Zealand on behalf of Cheyne Hospital, and one son. Both are well-known at the Hospital, and to both are extended the sympathy and the good wishes of all associated with the Institution he so devotedly served.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of a Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds) entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of three shillings and sixpence being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

3—A Donor of £250 in one sum is entitled to name a Cot in perpetuity, but without the right to nominate the occupants thereof.

METHODS OF HELP.

GIFTS IN MONEY.

£1,000 endows a named Free Cot in perpetuity.

£750 endows a half-payment Cot in perpetuity.

£300 endows a named Free Cot for the Donor's life.

£250 endows a half-payment Cot for the Donor's life.

£250, in one payment, entitles the Donor to name a Cot in perpetuity.

£52 10s. Donation constitutes a Life Governor.

£40 Annual Subscription supports a named Free Cot.

£30 Annual Subscription supports a half-payment Cot.

£10 10s. Annual Subscription gives a Governor's preferential nomination.

Smaller Subscriptions or Donations are much valued and gratefully acknowledged.

GIFTS IN KIND.

The following articles are specially needed:—

At Cheyne Hospital—Vests (knitted by hand), Night-gowns (white flannelette or cotton), Frocks (3 to 14 years), Pinafores and Bed Socks, also Cast-off Clothing (all sizes), Boots and Shoes for those children who are not always in bed.

At St. Nicholas Hospital—Cast-off Clothing, Boys' Jerseys, Red Twill Jackets, Flannel or Cotton Night-gowns, Long Sleeved Vests, Holland Overalls, and Boots and Shoes for convalescent children.

Game, Rabbits, Fresh Fruit and Eggs, New (unbroken) Toys, Jellies, etc., are much appreciated.

Patterns of clothing will gladly be sent from either Hospital to anyone who will kindly supply the articles required.

ROYAL SURGICAL AID SOCIETY "LETTERS."

Gifts of Surgical Aid "Letters" are most useful, and will be gratefully acknowledged by the Secretary.

“GODMOTHERS.”

A plan, which many people seem to like, has been started primarily for the purpose of supplying garments for the children and which materially assists the management and funds of the hospital.

Ladies (or gentlemen) are asked to become “Godmother” (or “Godfather”) to a particular child, and to make themselves responsible for the clothes for that child for a year; the expense approximates 35/- to £2 per annum and it is hoped that the “Godmothers” will take a small personal interest in their children and visit them whenever they wish.

We have now over twenty “Godmothers” and shall be glad to increase the number to sixty.

Particulars as to clothes required, etc., can be had from the Matron.

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

THIS Hospital has been established for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, who are on that account excluded or discharged from General Hospitals. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period.

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the continuous care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them for an indefinite period, it will be obvious that changes are very slow and vacancies few. The *average* length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is usually over six months; while many of the children remain for much longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear *prima facie* eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission when vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers (see page 19). More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Hydrocephalus, Mental derangement or deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible.

3—Children are admitted only between three and thirteen years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4—The payment of Seven Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

5—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary of the Hospital.

6—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†

7—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8—Applicants for admission may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

9—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

10—A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, *must* be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be *brought with the child*.

11—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission or in Hospital should be at once notified to the Secretary.

* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee only occasionally have these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a householder (or the wife of a householder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.
