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






The constantly increasing activities of the Hospital and its Thanet Branch (St. Nicholas) are again evidenced by these figures, which in regard to the number of patients admitted and discharged, surpass the record which was created during the previous year.

Massage Department.

A further development in the work of the Hospital has been occasioned by the introduction of Massage. Early in the year a part-time Masseuse was appointed so that the Surgical patients might receive this beneficial form of treatment, and in October a second part-time Masseuse was requisitioned for the Medical patients. The total number of Massage treatments given during the year exceeded 2,000.

Titanium Ray Installation.

During the winter months, treatment has again been afforded to the children by means of the Artificial Sunlight apparatus which was installed some years ago, when the Hospital was among the first in London to introduce it.

In accordance with this progressive policy, and the desire to investigate new or improved forms of treatment in order that its patients may benefit thereby, so far as the limited resources of the Hospital will allow, it was with particular appreciation that the Committee of Management accepted from an anonymous donor the generous offer of a set of Titanium Ray Lamps, which have now been in use for some months, Cheyne Hospital thus becoming the first Hospital in the country to be so equipped. Titanium Rays are made to emanate from an arc formed with five or more amperes which causes slow combustion of the electrodes containing the rare metal Titanium. They are claimed as an exceptionally effective method of deriving the most beneficial results possible from what is popularly known as "artificial sunlight" treatment, and have proved to be particularly efficacious in cases of arthritis, etc.

Finance.

H.R.H. The Prince of Wales has again evidenced his interest in the Hospital by sending a gift of $\pounds 5$ for the Children's Christmas Fund.

It is gratifying to note that the funds of the Hospital have been considerably augmented during the past year as the result of several dramatic productions which have been organised by friends of the Hospital, to all of whom your Committee is much indebted, and whose efforts are warmly appreciated.

Amongst such entertainments special mention must be made of the following :---

A successful Matinée at the Chelsea Palace Theatre, organised by Mr. Walter Payne, O.B.E., for the joint benefit of Cheyne and Victoria Hospitals for Children, each of which benefited to the handsome extent of over £300;

A welcome gift of $\pounds 200$ received from Mrs. Geoffrey Whitworth, as the result of an excellent Matinée performance by children of Barrie's "Quality Street," at the Savoy Theatre in January;

A delightful presentation of "A Masque of Old Chelsea," under the direction of the authoress, Mrs. Jacqueline Hope Nicholson, given in June in the charming grounds of Catherine Lodge, Chelsea (kindly lent for the occasion by Sir Albert and Lady Gray) which realised $\pounds 100$;

Miss Mabel Terry Lewis also very kindly raised for the Hospital the sum of $\pounds 44$ 5s. 9d., as the result of the admirable production under her direction of "The Bill of Divorcement," at the Rudolph Steiner Hall.

To all these friends the Committee desire to extend an expression of their grateful acknowledgement and hearty congratulations upon the success which attended their efforts and so materially benefited the Hospital.

Very cordial thanks are also due to Mrs. A. J. Webbe, of Chelsea, for a handsome donation of $\pounds 120$ 5s. as the result of a particularly successful Bridge Tournament arranged by her at 27 Grosvenor Square, kindly lent by Mrs. Robert Fleming.

A Carnival Dance organised by the Local Traders' Committee and held at Chelsea Town Hall in March realised the sum of $\pounds 35$ 6s. 11d. for the Hospital.

The Committee desire especially to acknowledge with much gratification a very welcome donation of $\pounds 200$ from Mr. Bernhard Baron who thus becomes a Governor of the Hospital.



"Pound Day."

During the past year it was decided to institute on June 16th—the anniversary of the foundation of the Hospital in 1875—a "Pound Day," and it is gratifying to be able to record that the venture proved to be a great success. Opportunity was also taken to invite the visitors to inspect the Hospital and its recent extensions and pleasantly laid-out garden. Favoured by the hottest and most brilliantly sunny day of an exceptionally dismal summer, a large company attended, and over 400 "pounds" of household commodities and nearly £40 in cash were received. The arrangements for "Pound Day" were admirably carried out by the members of the Ladies' Committee, and it is hoped that the very satisfactory results achieved on this first occasion will be maintained and even surpassed in future years.

Expenditure.

The financial aspect of the development of the Hospital's work, which is gradually increasing year by year, is reflected in a slight rise in the average weekly cost of each patient, which however is only £1 17s. 7d. for Cheyne and £1 9s. 24d. for St. Nicholas, both of which figures are very moderate, and can only be obtained by careful supervision of Expenditure, the total of which (Ordinary Expenditure) in the case of Cheyne Hospital only exceeded that of the previous year by £37 2s. 5d. despite the fact that the cost of the new Massage Department alone exceeded £130.

Education.

The education of the children at both Hospitals, by arrangement with the Ministry of Health and the Board of Education, has proceeded on the usual lines during the past year, special attention being given to the instruction of the little patients in varied forms of handcraft. Good examples of leather-work. needlework, hand-made toys, etc., are on exhibition at the Hospital and the Teaching Staff will be pleased to receive private commissions in this respect for execution by the the children. Miss E. Doran, who had been in charge of the Roof Ward Class for some years, has resigned and has been succeeded by Miss L. M. Smith.

The Head Teacher of St. Nicholas Hospital School, Miss K. L. Chadwick, also resigned during the year, and this vacancy has been filled by the appointment of Miss Winifred Elliott.

St. Nicholas Branch Hospital.

The past year has been one of progress and increased usefulness in regard to the Branch Hospital at St. Nicholasat-Wade, near Birchington, where the children derive much benefit from the invigorating Thanet air. It is satisfactory to note that the average cost per patient has been reduced from £75 14s. to £60 3s. This is especially noteworthy in view of an exceptionally large item of expenditure of nearly £100 which was occasioned by the necessity for the repainting of practically the whole of the exterior of the buildings.

The Annual Harvest Festival Service was held on the 19th October last and was conducted by the Chaplain, the Rev. S. R. Griggs.

A rocking horse for the use of the children has been graciously presented by Her Majesty The Queen.

St. Nicholas Garden Fete and Sale.

A very successful Garden Fete and Sale was held in the grounds of the Hospital on July 7th. Capably organised by the Matron, Miss Money, and a small Committee of local friends, and ably assisted by her Nursing Staff and many other helpers, the Fete, which was opened by Lady Frank, proved a very enjoyable and profitable undertaking, the proceeds realising over $\pounds 200$ for the Hospital funds, an altogether exceptional achievement when the uncertainty of the weather, the calls of several counter-attractions and the somewhat isolated position of the village are taken into consideration.

The Committee of Management extend their warmest congratulations and most hearty thanks to all the many friends who in various ways contributed to this very gratifying result.

St. Nicholas Cot League.

Grateful thanks are again due to the Committee and members of the St. Nicholas Cot League for their splendid assistance in continuing to support the "St. Augustine," "St. Nicholas," and "St. Thomas" Cots at an annual cost of $\pounds 120$, and thus contributing materially to the maintenance of the Branch Hospital. A report of the League appears on page 61.

Resignation of Dr. Brunton.

It was with much regret that the Committee received the resignation of Dr. W. R. Brunton as Medical Officer in charge of St. Nicholas Hospital towards the end of the year, owing to his retirement from practice. They take this opportunity of expressing their keen appreciation of his devoted services during the past 16 years and their grateful acknowledgment of his unfailing kindly and practical interest in the affairs of the Hospital, its Staff and Patients. As a mark of this esteem Dr. Brunton has been elected Honorary Consulting Surgeon to the Hospital.

Dr. William Boyle Norcott, of Birchington, has succeeded Dr. Brunton as Medical Officer at St. Nicholas.

Staff.

During the past year Mr. F. E. Chester Williams, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., has been appointed as Surgical Assistant to Mr. Whitchurch Howell, and Dr. Charles Hodgson has joined the Staff as an Anæsthetist.

Sister Phyllis Gregson resigned her appointment as Sister in charge of the Rowland Baring and Clementine (Medical) Wards in August, on the occasion of her marriage, and the Committee desire to place on record their great appreciation of the excellent services rendered by her as Probationer, Staff Nurse and Sister during the past 12 years.

Staff Nurse Betty McRobert has been promoted to Sister, to fill the vacancy thus arising.

Miss Mildred Heaney has been appointed as Sister in charge of the Roof Ward.

Chaplain.

The Annual Harvest Festival Service was held in the Wards on October 22nd, and was conducted by the Chaplain, the Rev. A. Walford Deakin, who, however, has resigned this office consequent upon his departure from Chelsea.

The Rev. J. H. T. Maude-Roxby, who has succeeded Mr. Deakin as Incumbent of Chelsea Old Church, has kindly undertaken the duties of Chaplain to the Hospital.

Committee.

The Committee are pleased to be able to welcome two valued friends of the Hospital, Mrs. F. H. Mellor and Mr. Henry A. Rauthmell, as new members during the past year.

It is with much regret that the death is recorded of Mrs. A. M. Geiger who had been a member of the Committee for the past 25 years and a subscriber for 37 years. During this long period Mrs. Geiger had maintained a very warm interest in the affairs of the Hospital and was ever ready to render generous assistance.

The following three members:—Mrs. H. Mostyn Pritchard, Mr. A. M. Turner and Mrs. Lionel Banon, retire at the Annual Meeting in order of seniority and are eligible for re-election.

METHODS OF HELP.

GIFTS IN MONEY.

- £1,000 endows a named Free Cot in perpetuity.
- £750 endows a half payment Cot in perpetuity.
- £300 endows a named Free Cot for the Donor's life.
- £250 endows a half-payment Cot for the Donor's life.
- $\pounds 250$, in one payment, entitles the Donor to name a Cot in perpetuity,
- £52 10s. Donation constitutes a Life Governor.
- £40 Annual Subscription supports a named Free Cot.
- £30 Annual Subscription supports a half-payment Cot.
- £10 10s. Annual Subscription gives a Governor's preferential nomination.
- Smaller Subscriptions or Donations are much valued and gratefully acknowledged.

GIFTS IN KIND.

The following articles are specially needed :--

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1-A Donation of One Thousand Pounds (£1,000) endows a Free Cot in perpetuity, and the Donor is entitled to name the Cot, and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£750) endows a Half-Payment Cot in perpetuity, and the Donor is entitled to name the Cot and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds ($\pounds 250$) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of a Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds) entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of three shillings and sixpence being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

3—A Donor of $\pounds 250$ in one sum is entitled to name a Cot in perpetuity, but without the right to nominate the occupants thereof.

GOVERNORS.

1—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards (during the continuance of such subscription) are thereby constituted Governors, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

"GODMOTHERS."

A plan, which many people seem to like, has been started primarily for the purpose of supplying garments for the children and which materially assists the management and funds of the hospital.

Ladies (or gentlemen) are asked to become "Godmother" (or "Godfather") to a particular child, and to make themselves responsible for the clothes for that child for a year; the expense approximates $\pounds 2$ 10s. to $\pounds 3$ per annum and it is hoped that the "Godmothers" will take a personal interest in their children and visit them frequently.

We have now over twenty "Godmothers" and shall be glad to increase the number to sixty.

Particulars as to clothes required, etc., can be had from the Matron.

OBJECTS OF THE HOSPITAL.

CHEYNE HOSPITAL was established in 1875 for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, and who are on that account ineligible for or discharged from General Hospitals.

In this respect it may be said that the work of Cheyne Hospital begins where that of the General Hospitals ceases, but so successful has this work become that the word "Incurable" has been deleted from the title of the Hospital where it once appeared. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period. Over 75 per cent. of the patients treated have been discharged in a cured or relieved condition.

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not found possible to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute to their Funds. Such Letters are practically futile, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are worse than useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake for lengthy periods the care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them more or less indefinitely, it will be obvious that changes are slow and vacancies fewer than in most Hospitals. The average length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is usually over six months; while many of the children remain for longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will at once, should it appear prima facie eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission when vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers (see pp. 14-15). More than this cannot in honesty be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1--Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2-Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Hydrocephalus, Mental derangement or deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible.

3—Children are admitted between three and thirteen years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4-The payment of Seven Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

5—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary of the Hospital.

6—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.[†]

7-No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one mouth's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8—Applicants for admission may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

9—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

10--A certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, *must* be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be *brought with the child*.

11—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission or in Hospital should be at once notified to the Secretary.

^{*} Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee have only a limited number of these Cots at their disposal.

⁺ The Guarantor should be a householder (or the wife of a householder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.


