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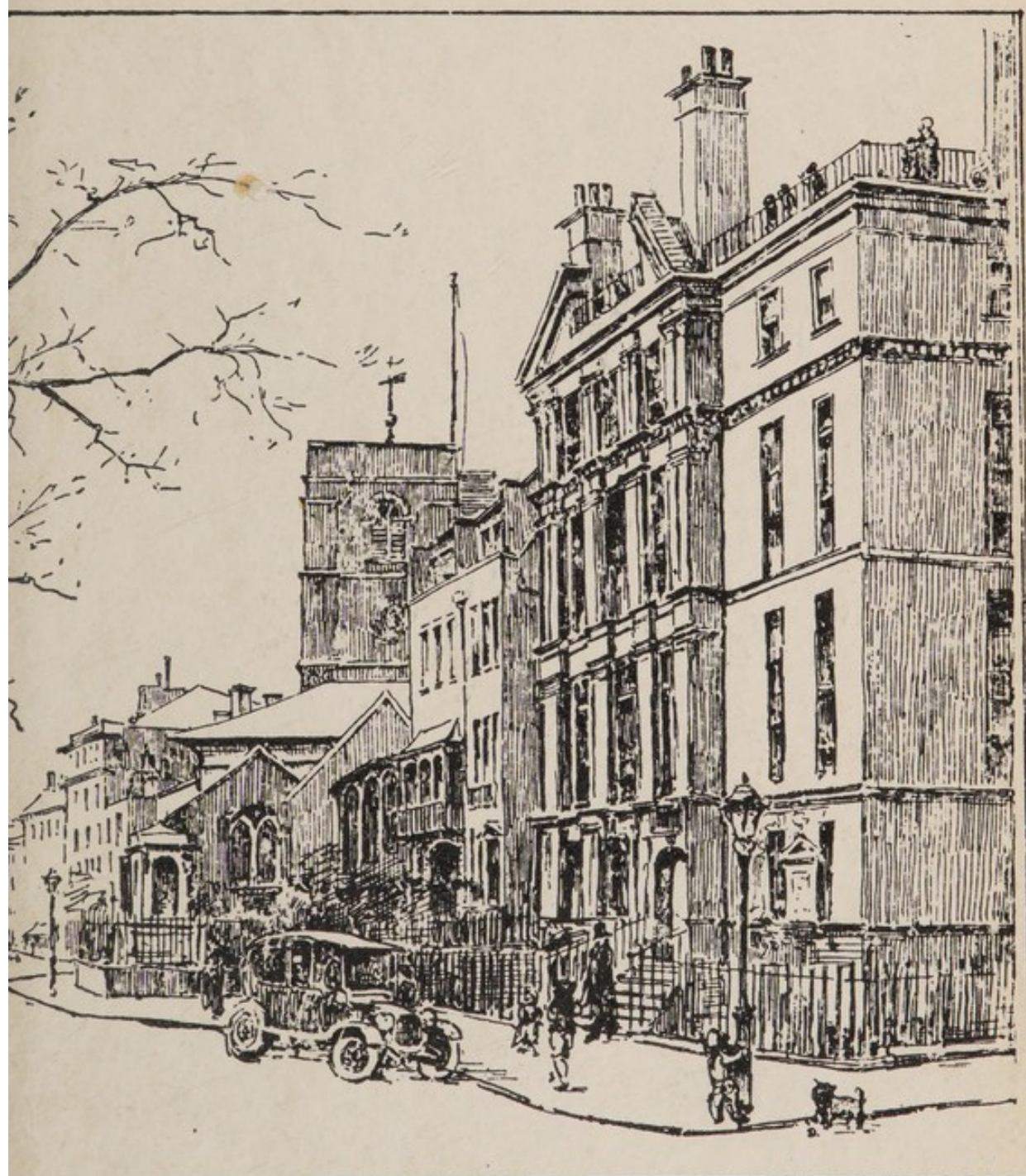

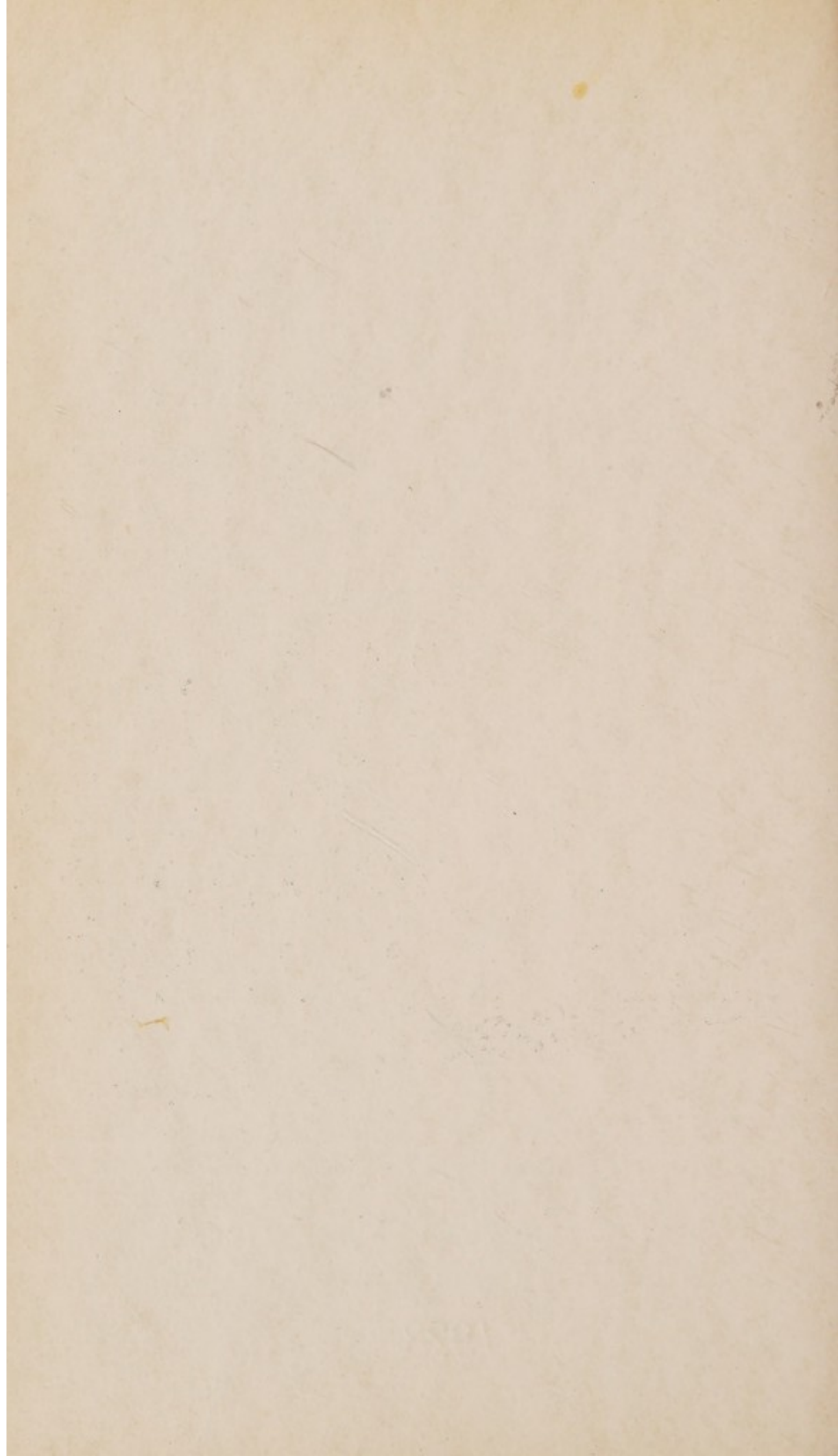

The work of the Hospital in general has proceeded upon the usual lines during the past year, but has been greatly hampered by persistent outbreaks amongst the children of Nasal Diphtheria which continued practically throughout the year.

Most of the 26 cases were of a mild nature and recovered after a stay of some weeks in the Fever Hospitals to which it was necessary to remove them, but their absence from the Hospital has naturally resulted in the average of occupied Cots being lower than usual.

No local cause for the continuance of the epidemic, other than contact, could be traced, in spite of careful investigation. It was, however, realised that this type of illness was very prevalent amongst children in London during the winter, and the fact that the admission of children is now more frequent than formerly may also have contributed to the cause.

The gradual increase in the activities of the Hospital is reflected in the work of the Massage Department which was established in 1927, the number of treatments given rising to 3446 compared with the previous total of 2277.

Medical Staff.

It was with much regret that your Committee received the resignation of Dr. Wilfred J. Pearson who relinquished his appointment as physician towards the end of the year owing to increasing demands upon his time and services.

The Committee have elected as his successor Dr. W. P. H. Sheldon, who is a member of the Staff of King's College Hospital and the Hospital for Sick Children, Great Ormond Street.

The vacancy for an Ophthalmic Surgeon has been filled by the appointment of Mr. Norman Fleming, M.B., Ch.B., D.O.M.S., R.C.P.S.

Mr. F. E. Chester Williams has resigned his post of Surgical Assistant to Mr. Whitchurch Howell, and Mr. F. A. Freeman, F.R.C.S., has been elected in his stead.

Finance.

H.R.H. The Prince of Wales has again evidenced his interest in the Hospital by sending a gift of £5 for the Children's Christmas Fund.

Both the Ordinary and Extraordinary Income shewed a considerable decrease during the past year, the total being over £2500 less than in 1927.

This decrease is chiefly noticeable in regard to Donations which diminished by £2095. Several large amounts received in 1927 were not repeated, and there was a marked reduction in proceeds from Entertainments, which were unusually numerous during the previous year.

Legacies.

Legacies—always an uncertain quantity—were £616 less than last year, the only receipt from this source being £100 bequeathed by the late Sir Harry Poland, K.C.

Annual Subscriptions.

The Committee regret to record a decrease in the amount of Annual Subscriptions.

The List has been reduced chiefly by the deaths of several generous subscribers, and by withdrawals, and when it is realised that the income from Annual Subscriptions is under £500—or less than 30/- per day—whilst the cost of carrying on the Hospital is more than £17 per day, it will be appreciated that it is most necessary if the work of the Hospital is to be efficiently maintained at its present high level and extended, that a special effort must be made to secure fresh regular support.

All those who are interested in its welfare are therefore earnestly asked to enlist new Subscribers, if only for small amounts.

The Committee wish to draw special attention to the kindness of Miss M. E. Hamilton who has for many years been a subscriber of £1 1s. to the Hospital, and who, in the course of a letter, wrote:—

“ . . . As I am getting old, I am trying to arrange for my subscription to continue after I die. I enclose a cheque for £21 which if invested in New South Wales Inscribed Stock, 1947-57, will bring you in an income of £1 1s. 8d. per annum.”

This generous and thoughtful action on the part of Miss Hamilton is deeply appreciated, and it is hoped that

her excellent example will be followed by many other Subscribers who have in mind the future welfare of the Hospital.

The Committee record their very grateful thanks to the Trustees of the Bernhard Baron Charitable Trust for an Award of £200—a most welcome gift.

Special acknowledgment is due to the Sister, Nurses and Children of the Duchess of York (Roof) Ward, who, acting upon the desire to be a self-supporting unit as far as possible, raised by means of a small Sale and other efforts, over £40 which was applied to the purchase of blankets, furniture, etc.

Linen Guild.

The Committee also express their appreciation of the valuable help received from the recently formed Linen Guild, of which Mrs. H. A. Rauthmell is the Hon. Secretary. Sheets, blankets, and other linen to the value of £40 3s. 4d. were purchased for the Hospital and paid for from the funds of the Guild.

"POUND DAY."

The great success of the second "Pound Day" which was held on June 14th last has amply justified the institution in the previous year of this annual feature. Over £80 in money and about 500 "pounds" of household commodities were

received from the numerous visitors, many of whom availed themselves of the opportunity of visiting the Wards which were open for inspection.

Cots.

The number of Cots which have been Endowed or Named in accordance with the particulars shewn in page 14 has not been increased during the past year. Whilst commending this very helpful form of commemoration to intending donors, the Committee express their grateful acknowledgment to the Carlyle School for Girls, Chelsea, and other valued subscribers, who so greatly assist the Hospital by maintaining Cots by generous annual gifts.

Expenditure.

Whilst the Total Expenditure for Cheyne Hospital decreased by about £14, that for St. Nicholas was £137 more than in the previous year. The latter figure was, however, entirely due to considerably increased expenditure on Renewals and Repairs, and particularly to an item of £156 for the replacement of the glass roof of the Open Air Shelter. The cost of Redecorations, etc., at Cheyne Hospital also was nearly double that of 1927.

Despite these facts, the average cost per patient has fallen considerably, from £72 to £58 at Cheyne, and from £60 to £45 at St. Nicholas.

Education.

The education of the children at both Hospitals, by arrangement with the Board of Education and the Ministry of Health, has been continued on the usual lines during the past year, special attention being given to the instruction of the little patients in various forms of Handcraft. Good examples of leatherwork, table decorations, toys, needlework, etc., are on exhibition at the Hospitals, and the Teaching Staff will be pleased to receive commissions in this respect for execution by the children.

The Hon. Dorothy Pickford has joined the School Committee and has kindly consented to act as its Chairman.

Miss R. Byrne, who had been Head Mistress of Cheyne Hospital School since 1921, resigned at the end of the

Summer Term in order to take another post, and has been succeeded by Miss Nellie Gelder, who, in addition to the usual teaching qualifications has considerable experience in Handcraft.

Arrangements have also been made for religious instruction to be given to the children for a short time on Sunday afternoons by three voluntary helpers, to whom the thanks of the Committee are due.

The Hospital Garden.

Special mention must be made of the progress of the Hospital Garden. This piece of ground which a few years ago was more or less derelict, has during the past three years been tastefully transformed into an old-world-garden, in the centre of which is a Badminton Court for the use of the Nurses, and also a small playground for the children.

Thanks to the enthusiastic interest and valuable help which is so freely rendered by Mrs. Laurence Harrison, the flower beds during the summer months present a most pleasing aspect, and the frequent expressions of admiration for the garden are perhaps the happiest form of acknowledgment for the time and trouble which she so generously gives to its care.

St. Nicholas Branch Hospital.

Full use has been made during the past year of the accommodation available at this delightful Branch Hospital which is situated in the pleasant Thanet village of St. Nicholas-at-Wade about a mile from the sea, and many patients have greatly benefited from the careful nursing by Miss Money and her Nursing Staff and the skilled attention of Dr. Norcott.

A new development in the work of the Hospital was established during the past year when a number of the children were enabled by artificial means to continue during the winter months the "Sunlight Treatment" afforded by Nature in the summer.

As the Hospital has at present no means of generating the necessary electricity, arrangements were made for "Artificial Sunlight Treatment" to be given at Birchington by the kind co-operation of St. Mary's Home.

This additional service, together with the cost of transport to and from Birchington, has naturally resulted in increased

expenditure, but it is felt that the beneficial results obtained have justified the cost.

In this respect an admirable opportunity occurs for the provision at St. Nicholas Hospital of an Electric Plant (which would also be available for lighting purposes), the offer of which by some generous donor would be of great usefulness, and very warmly welcomed by the Committee. The estimated cost is £400—£500.

Dr. Bywaters paid an official visit to the Hospital School at St. Nicholas on September 25th on behalf of the Board of Education and the Ministry of Health and expressed her satisfaction in regard to the working arrangements.

The Annual Harvest Festival Service was held on October 10th, and was conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. Sydney E. Griggs.

St. Nicholas Cot League.

St. Nicholas Needlework Guild.

The Committee have again to express their very cordial thanks to the members of the St. Nicholas Cot League, which is so capably organised by Miss Laurie, of Canterbury, whereby over £120 annually is subscribed for the purpose of maintaining the "St. Nicholas," "St. Augustine" and "St. Thomas" Cots; also to Miss Hilda Laurie and her Needlework Guild, which supplies over 200 articles of clothing.

It is difficult indeed adequately to acknowledge the very valuable help which is rendered to St. Nicholas Hospital by these two efficient organisations.

Committees.

The Committee regret to record the death of Sir Albert Gray, K.C., who had been a Vice-President of the Hospital and a member of the Committee for several years.

The Hon. Dorothy Pickford and Mrs. Lionel Hitchens have joined the General Committee during the past year. Mrs. Hitchens and Mrs. Rauthmell have joined the Ladies' Committee, and Mr. H. A. Rauthmell has been elected to the Finance Committee.

The following members of the General Committee—Miss Playfair, Mr. Reginald Blunt and Miss Macnamara—retire at the Annual Meeting in order of seniority, and are eligible for re-election.

THE ANNUAL MEETING.

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Governors and Committee of Management of the Cheyne Hospital for Children was held at the Hospital on Tuesday, March 12th, 1929. There were present—The Right Hon. The Earl of Cromer (in the Chair), Mr. Reginald Blunt, Mrs. Banon, Mr. Leonard F. Harrison, Mrs. Lionel Hitchens, Mr. Whitchurch Howell, Miss Macnamara, The Honble. Dorothy Pickford, Miss Peirse-Duncombe, Miss Playfair, Mr. H. A. Rauthmell and Mr. Douglas S. Young.

Proposed by The Chairman, and seconded by Mr. Whitchurch Howell—"That the Annual Report and Audited Statement of Accounts for the year ended December 31st, 1928, be, and hereby are, adopted."

Proposed by The Chairman, and seconded by Mrs. Banon—"That the following Members of the Committee of Management who retire at this Meeting in the order of the seniority of their appointment be, and hereby are, re-elected, viz., Miss Playfair, Mr. Reginald Blunt and Miss Macnamara."

Proposed by Mr. Reginald Blunt, and seconded by Mr. Leonard Harrison—"That The Right Honourable The Earl of Cromer, G.C.I.E., G.C.V.O., be, and hereby is, elected as Chairman of the General Committee of Management for the ensuing year."

It was Agreed—"That the appointment of a Vice-Chairman be referred to the General Committee."

Proposed by The Earl of Cromer, and seconded by Miss Peirse-Duncombe—"That the following Members of the General Committee be appointed as a Finance Committee for the ensuing year: Messrs. R. Blunt, L. F. Harrison, H. A. Rauthmell, A. M. Turner and R. T. Watkin Williams."

Proposed by Mrs. Banon, and seconded by The Honble. Dorothy Pickford—"That the following ladies be appointed as Members of the Ladies' Committee for the ensuing year: Mrs. Banon, Mrs. Laurence Harrison, Mrs. Hitchens, Mrs. Jebb, Miss Peirse-Duncombe, Miss Macnamara, Mrs. Mellor, Miss Playfair, Mrs. H. M. Pritchard and Mrs. Rauthmell."

The Chairman having proposed a vote of thanks to the members of the Hospital Staff for their services during the past year, the proceedings terminated.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

1—A Donation of One Thousand Pounds (£1,000) endows a Free Cot in perpetuity, and the Donor is entitled to name the Cot, and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£750) endows a Half-Payment (*i e.*, the Parents paying 3/6 a week instead of 7/-) **Cot in perpetuity**, and the Donor is entitled to name the Cot and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of a Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds) entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of three shillings and sixpence being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

3—A Donor of £250 in one sum is entitled to *name* a Cot in perpetuity, but without the right to nominate the occupants thereof.

GOVERNORS.

1—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards are thereby constituted Governors during the continuance of such subscription, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

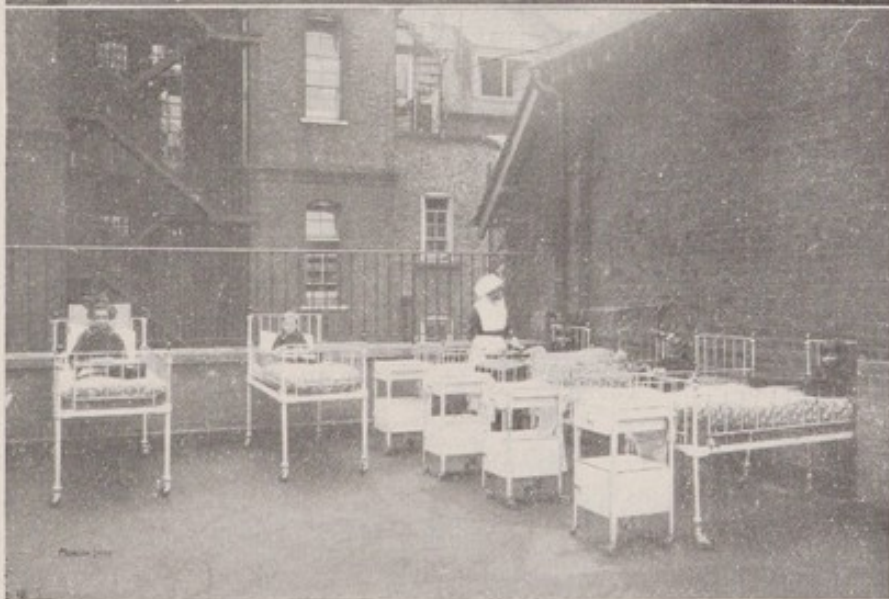

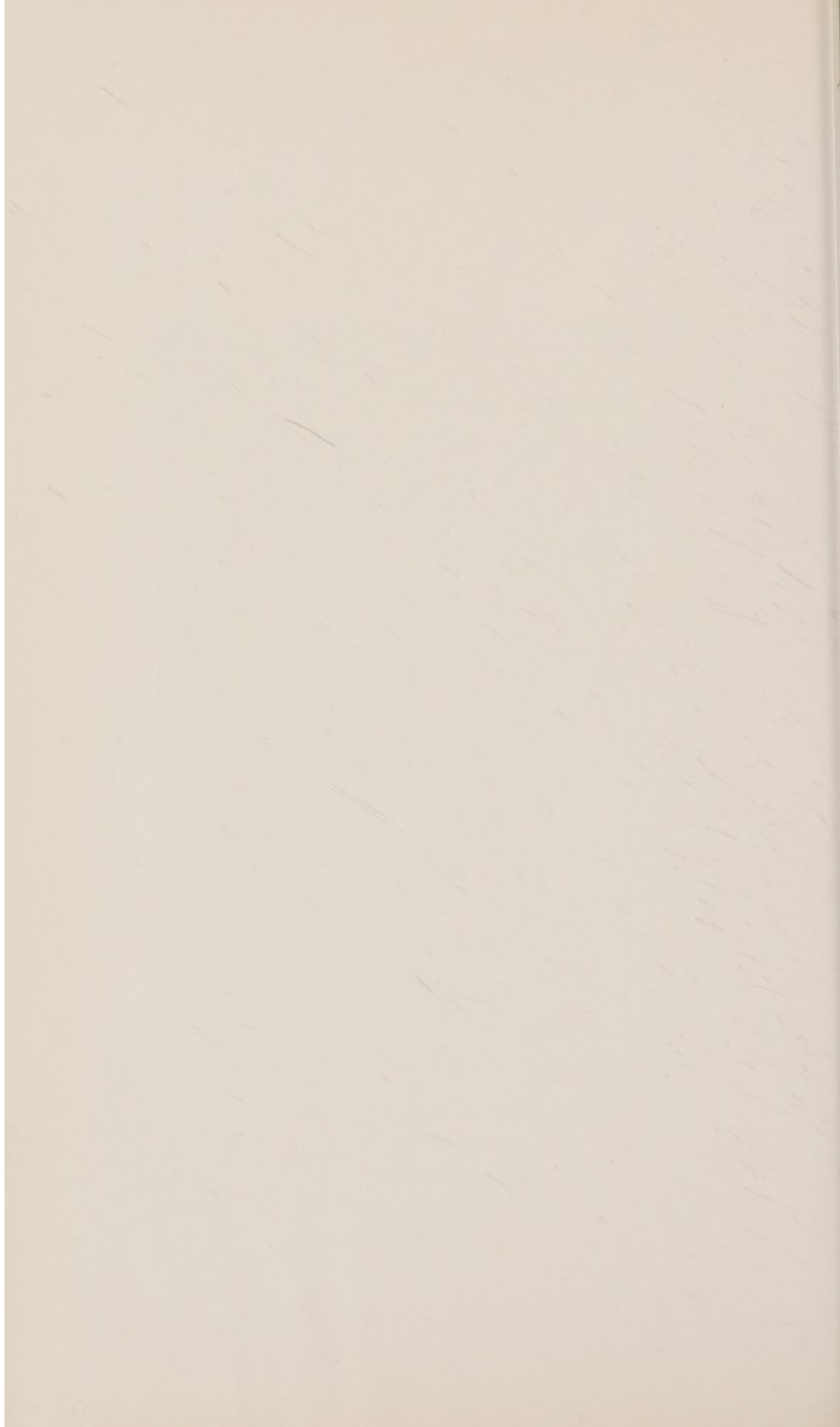


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CHEYNE HOSPITAL.

“GODMOTHERS.”

A plan, which many people seem to like, has been started primarily for the purpose of supplying garments for the children, and which materially assists the management and funds of the hospital.

Ladies (or gentlemen) are asked to become “Godmother” (or “Godfather”) to a particular child, and

(a) To take an interest in the child, and to keep in touch with it when it leaves the Hospital ;

(b) To help as far as possible by providing some clothing ;

and/or

(c) To give a Donation to the Sister of the Ward for the latter purpose.

Donations given for the purchase of clothing to be allocated to the “Godmother” Clothing Fund for the Ward concerned, such Fund to be administered by the Sister in Charge as occasion may require.

Further particulars of the Scheme, and also as to Clothing required can be obtained upon application to The Matron at the Hospital.

OBJECTS OF THE HOSPITAL.

CHEYNE HOSPITAL was established in 1875 for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, and who are on that account ineligible for or discharged from General Hospitals.

In this respect it may be said that the work of Cheyne Hospital begins where that of the General Hospitals ceases, but so successful has this work become that the word "Incurable" has been deleted from the title of the Hospital where it once appeared. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period. **Over 75 per cent. of the patients treated have been discharged in a cured or relieved condition.**

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not considered advisable to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute. Such Letters are of little value, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake for lengthy periods the care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them more or less indefinitely, it will be obvious that changes are slow and vacancies fewer than in most Hospitals. The *average* length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is usually over six months; while many of the children remain for longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will should it appear *prima facie* eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission when vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers (see pp. 14-15). More than this cannot satisfactorily be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Hydrocephalus, Mental derangement or deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible.

3—Children are admitted between three and thirteen years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4—The payment of Seven Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

5—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary of the Hospital.

6—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†

7—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8—Applicants for admission may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

9—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

10—A Certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection must be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be brought with the child, in addition to Negative Reports of the Bacteriological Examination of nose and throat swabs taken within five days of the date of admission.

11—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission or in Hospital should be at once notified to the Secretary.

* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee have only a limited number of these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a householder (or the wife of a householder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.
