The foregoing figures reflect another busy year of activity, particularly at Cheyne Hospital where the number of new patients admitted—127 compared with 103 and 89 in the two previous years—easily creates a new record, and is more than double the figures of 58 four years ago.

Sixty-six operations were performed, compared with 54 in 1928, and the number of Massage Treatments increased from 3446 to 4019.

Medical Staff.

Resignation of Dr. J. PRIME BARTLETT.

During the past year your Committee has received the resignation of the Senior Physician, Dr. J. Prime Bartlett, who had been a member of the Medical Staff since the Hospital was founded 54 years ago.

It is difficult to speak with adequate appreciation of the very valuable professional services which Dr. Bartlett has rendered during his long tenure of office to the many little patients with whom he was so deservedly popular, and of his great interest in the welfare and gradual development of the Hospital since it began with eight beds at No. 46 Cheyne Walk in 1875, and his assiduous devotion to duty forms a record of service which is very gratefully acknowledged by your Committee, who, as a mark of their esteem, has elected Dr. Bartlett to the post of Honorary Consulting Physician.

The vacancy thus arising upon the active Medical Staff has been filled by the appointment of Dr. W. S. C. Copeman, who is also a member of the Staff at St. Mary's and West London Hospitals.

Finance.—Expenditure.

Whilst the average total cost of each In-patient was reduced from £58 0s. 4d. to £53 5s. 3d., the average weekly cost has risen from £1 18s. 11½d. in 1928 to £2 2s. 2d. This is attributable partly to several exceptional items of expenditure which do not ordinarily and frequently recur, amongst which may be mentioned

the provision of a large modern gas cooking range and a small hot oven in the Main Kitchen at a cost of nearly £60. These replacements were long overdue, and have effected a reduction in the consumption of gas.

The amount of Spring Cleaning undertaken was also much more extensive than usual, as it was considered desirable to repaint portions of the Hospital which had not been decorated for many years, and this item alone involved an expenditure of over £250; a further sum of £55 was also spent in repainting the rather extensive fire escape stairs.

Income.

A Donation of £5 was received from His Majesty The King, and a similar amount was also sent by H.R.H. The Prince of Wales as a Christmas gift.

A very successful Staff Ball was organized by Mrs. Hugh Pritchard at the Park Lane Hotel, as a result of which £216 6s. 0d. was realised, and the Committee desire to offer to Mrs. Pritchard an expression of their warm appreciation for this valuable help.

By kind permission of the British Broadcasting Corporation, a Wireless Appeal was made from Savoy Hill by Sir Nigel Playfair, on Sunday, June 30th, and donations, varying from a few pence to £10, amounted to £136.

The Annual "Pound Day" was held on June 27th, and whilst the amount in gifts of groceries, etc., was not so large as in previous years, it is gratifying to report that gifts in money reached the record sum of £100 10s. 6d.

Linen Guild.

The Linen Guild which was formed a few years ago, and of which the Honorary Secretary is Mrs. H. A. Rauthmell, has again been of valuable assistance to the Hospital by arranging for the purchase and payment from the Guild's funds of linen for the Wards and Staff purposes, to the extent of £61 2s. 2d.

Annual Subscriptions.

Whilst the amount received from individual Annual Subscribers is slightly in excess of the total of the previous year, the Committee again desires to draw attention to the fact that under £500 a year, and less than one-twelfth of the Hospital's Annual Expenditure, is received from this source.

The demands of modern Medical and Surgical Science continue to make increasing inroads upon our financial resources, and it is hoped that those friends of the Hospital who are not at present numbered among the Annual Subscribers will make a special effort to give at least a small amount each year, and thus help to place this class of support—the very backbone of Hospital finance—upon a sound basis.

Legacies.

The "Extraordinary Income" consisting of Legacies and Awards from Charitable Bequests, from which fluctuating sources only £100 was received in 1928, rose last year to over £3500, and it is entirely due to the considerable increase of revenue in this respect that

your Committee is able to record a very satisfactory financial year.

Cots.

The Trustees of the Will of the late Mr. John Cory have very kindly awarded £1000 from his estate for the Endowment of "The John Cory Cot."

The sum of £750 from the amount received in connection with the bequest in the Will of the late Mr. Henry Peech has been allocated to the Endowment of the "Henry Peech Cot."

The Committee express their grateful thanks to Miss E. M. Young for a gift of £300 for the purpose of naming the "Winifred Margaret Young" Cot.

Notification has also been received that it is proposed that the Memorial to the late Lady Courtney of Penwith who was an old friend and subscriber to the Hospital, should, (in addition to placing of a comfortable wooden seat, possibly in the Embankment Garden near her house in Cheyne Walk) take the form of a gift of £250 for the naming, in perpetuity, of a Cot to be called "The Kate Courtney Cot", and it is expected that a commemorative plaque will be erected in the Hospital early in the New Year.

New Method of Endowment.

In connection with the Endowment of Cots, the Committee desires to make it known that arrangements have been made whereby it is now possible for the Endowment of a Cot to be subscribed by instalments over a specified number of years, and it is hoped that this method will commend itself to intending donors

who, whilst unable to subscribe the full amount (£1000 or £750) in one sum, might be able and willing to do so during a period of years.

St. Nicholas (Branch) Hospital.

Much useful work has again been carried on at the Branch Hospital of St. Nicholas, near Birchington-on-Sea, where 33 cots are available for children, most of the treatment of whom is carried on in the open air in this bracing Thanet climate.

The average weekly cost per patient at St. Nicholas Hospital has been reduced from £1 9s. 5½d. to £1 8s. 4d.

Electric Lighting Plant.

An important step in the development of this Branch Hospital has been taken during the past year by the installation of an Electric Lighting Plant, at a cost of £534 17s. 0d., the Electricity Commissioners having been unable to make any promise for the supply of current to St. Nicholas-at Wade which is within their South-Eastern area.

In addition to providing electric light in the Hospital buildings—a very great advantage in this rather isolated village—the current will also be available for the treatment of children by Ray Therapy during the Winter months, thus avoiding the necessity which had previously existed for the patients to travel to Birchington and back, a distance of seven miles, in order to receive this form of treatment by arrangement with St. Mary's Home there.

Your Committee gratefully acknowledges the valuable help and advice so kindly given by the Honorary Consulting Engineer, Mr. Douglas S. Young, who has also devoted much care and consideration to the carrying out of the work of installation.

St. Nicholas Cot League and St. Nicholas Needlework Guild.

These two valuable associations which are so efficiently organised by The Misses Laurie, of Canterbury, have

continued their beneficent work—the Cot League by supporting the “St. Nicholas”, “St. Augustine” and “St. Thomas” Cots at an annual cost of £120, and the Needlework Guild by supplying over 300 articles of clothing for the children.

The Committee again express their great appreciation of the activities of the Cot League and the Needlework Guild, to the existence of which St. Nicholas Hospital is so much indebted.

Education.

The tuition of the children at both Hospitals, for a period of four hours daily, by certificated teachers of the Board of Education, has again been carried on during the past year.

A visit of inspection to Cheyne Hospital was paid on February 26th by Dr. Bywaters, on behalf of the Board of Education and the Ministry of Health, who expressed her satisfaction with the work in the School.

Miss E. N. Green, Assistant Mistress at St. Nicholas Hospital, has resigned her appointment, and has been succeeded by Miss D. A. Gray.

In addition to the usual educational subjects, the children are instructed in various forms of handwork, and examples of leather work, table decorations, toys, needlework, etc., are on exhibition at the Hospitals, and the Teaching Staff will be pleased to receive commissions in this respect for execution by the children.

Committee.

A cordial welcome has been extended to Sir Howard Frank, Bart., who early in the year consented to accept the office of Vice-Chairman, and also to Lady Hutchison who has joined the Committee.

Mr. C. H. St. John Hornby has been elected as a Vice-President, and Mr. E. L. Ramsay, of Queensland, Australia, who has for some years generously maintained a Cot at St. Nicholas Hospital, has been appointed a Governor.

The following members of the General Committee—Mr. R. T. Watkin Williams, Miss Peirse-Duncombe and Mrs. Lyon Sidey—retire at the Annual Meeting in order of seniority.

Mrs. Lyon Sidey, who has been a member of the Committee since 1913, and who has resided out of London for some years, has, for this reason, intimated her decision not to seek re-election.

Accordingly, the next senior elected member, Mrs. F. H. Mellor, is, together with Mr. Watkin Williams and Miss Peirse-Duncombe eligible for re-election for a further period of three years.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

COT ENDOWMENTS IN PERPETUITY.

1—A Donation of One Thousand Pounds (£1,000) endows a Free Cot in perpetuity, and the Donor is entitled to name the Cot, and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£750) endows a Half-Payment (*i e.*, the Parents paying 3/6 a week instead of 7/-) Cot in perpetuity, and the Donor is entitled to name the Cot and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

1—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of a Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

SPECIAL NOTE *re* Donations for the purpose of Endowment of Cots:—

The Committee of Management will be pleased to make arrangements, in special cases, for Donations for the purpose of the Endowment of Cots to be subscribed by instalments during a specified number of years, or shorter period, and for the Cot to be named upon completion of the full payment.

Particulars of this method may be obtained from the Secretary at the Hospital.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds) entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of three shillings and sixpence being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

3—A Donor of £250 in one sum is entitled to *name* a Cot in perpetuity, but without the right to nominate the occupants thereof.

GOVERNORS.

1—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards are thereby constituted Governors during the continuance of such subscription, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

“GODMOTHERS.”

A plan, which many people seem to like, has been started primarily for the purpose of supplying garments for the children, and which materially assists the management and funds of the hospital.

Ladies (or gentlemen) are asked to become “Godmother” (or “Godfather”) to a particular child, and

(a) To take an interest in the child, and to keep in touch with it when it leaves the Hospital;

(b) To help as far as possible by providing some clothing;

and/or

(c) To give a Donation to the Sister of the Ward for the latter purpose.

Donations given for the purchase of clothing to be allocated to the “Godmother” Clothing Fund for the Ward concerned, such Fund to be administered by the Sister in Charge as occasion may require.

Further particulars of the Scheme, and also as to Clothing required can be obtained upon application to The Matron at the Hospital.

OBJECTS OF THE HOSPITAL.

CHEYNE HOSPITAL was established in 1875 for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, and who are on that account ineligible for or discharged from General Hospitals.

In this respect it may be said that the work of Cheyne Hospital begins where that of the General Hospitals ceases, but so successful has this work become that the word "Incurable" has been deleted from the title of the Hospital where it once appeared. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period. **Over 80 per cent. of the patients treated have been discharged in a cured or relieved condition.**

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not considered advisable to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute. Such Letters are of little value, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake for lengthy periods the care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which no General Hospital will accept, and to keep them more or less indefinitely, it will be obvious that changes are slow and vacancies fewer than in most Hospitals. The *average* length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is usually over six months; while many of the children remain for longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will should it appear *prima facie* eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission when vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers (see pp. 15-16). More than this cannot satisfactorily be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1—Such cases only are eligible for admission as have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Hydrocephalus, Mental derangement or deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible.

3—Children are admitted between three and thirteen years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.

4—The payment of Seven Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

5—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary of the Hospital.

6—The Guarantor will also be responsible for the cost of such Surgical Appliances or Splints as may be ordered for the patient by the Medical Officer.

7—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†

8—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

9—Applicants for admission may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

10—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

11—A Certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection must be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be brought with the child, in addition to Negative Reports of the Bacteriological Examination of nose and throat swabs taken within five days of the date of admission.

12—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission or in Hospital should be at once notified to the Secretary.

* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases, Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee have only a limited number of these Cots at their disposal.

† The Guarantor should be a householder (or the wife of a householder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

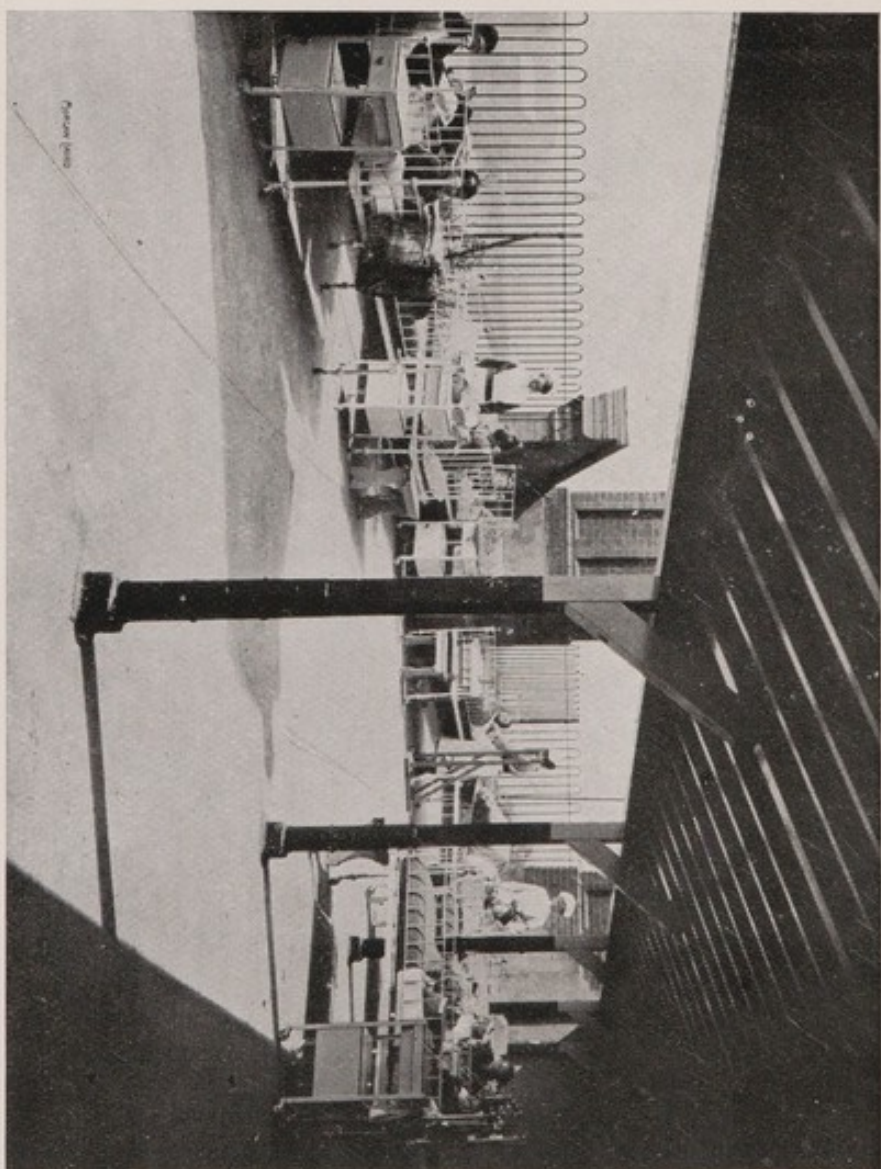
