THE Committee of Management have pleasure in presenting their Report, together with the Audited Statement of Accounts, for the year ended December 31st, 1930.

Work of the Year.—Cheyne Hospital.

Whilst the number of new patients admitted did not equal the record figures of 1929, and the average length of residence of the children was consequently greater, the work of the Hospital in general has been maintained upon the usual lines.

The work of the Massage Department has continued to increase, 4943 treatments being given compared with

the previous total of 4019.

Your Committee are glad to report that the Wards have been entirely free from serious infection during the year, only one mild case of diphtheria having occurred.

The New Private Ward.

A further stage in the development of the Hospital has been reached by the establishment of a Private Ward.

During the last few years many of the Hospitals in London have recognized the need for providing beds for patients who, whilst not financially eligible for admission and treatment as "free" patients or (as in the case of Cheyne Hospital) upon payment of a nominal charge of a few shillings a week, are quite unable to afford expensive Nursing Home fees; and it is in furtherance of this Hospital policy, and in response to the request of its own Medical Staff, that your Committee are able to announce that a small, but complete, Private Ward unit of 4 beds is now available for boys and girls between 3 and 13 years of age, suffering from such ailments as rickets, rheumatoid arthritis, osteomyelitis, certain forms of infantile paralysis, chorea, heart disease, and such other ailments as the Committee may determine.

The Private Ward is a delightfully bright and sunny room, with a Southern aspect, overlooking the River

Thames and the Embankment in Cheyne Walk.

A weekly charge of from £3 3s. 0d. to £5 5s. 0d. is made by the Hospital, and the fee payable to the member of the Medical or Surgical Staff is subject to confirmation by the special Assessment Committee.

The Committee will be pleased to consider applications for admission, which, in the first instance should be

made to the Secretary.

New Anæsthetic Room.

An important addition to the Hospital has been made

by the construction of an Anæsthetic Room.

Since the provision of a new Operation Theatre some six years ago, the number of Surgical Operations has considerably increased, and it was felt that the previous practice of administering anæsthetics to the children in the Theatre was an unsatisfactory procedure, particularly with regard to its possible psychological effect upon them.

It was found possible to remedy this lack of accommodation by building an Anæsthetic Room in one of the bays on the South-West side of the Hospital,

close to the Operation Theatre.

The cost of this addition was about £400, and your Committee are satisfied that the advantages accruing as the result of this improvement have justified the rather heavy expenditure.

Expenditure.

The constant need for the renovation of the furniture and the equipment of the Hospital, and the desire to meet as far as possible the ever-increasing demand of medical and surgical science have been responsible for considerably depleting the funds of the Hospital during the past twelve months.

Early in the year it became necessary to replace the main boiler for the hot water supply by two wrought welded Savile No. 3 Boilers, at a cost of £200. This replacement has considerably improved the hot water supply and in addition to increasing the capacity by

60 per cent., allows for an ample reserve.

Extensive Spring Cleaning was also undertaken and

expenditure in this respect exceeded £275.

The efficient administration of the Hospital has been considerably facilitated by the installation of a modern

system of automatic internal telephone.

The surgical equipment has been improved by the purchase of a new Dental Chair of modern type, in replacement of one which had been in use for many years.

It will, therefore, be readily understood that the provision of these improvements is reflected in an increase in the average weekly cost of each patient from £2 2s. 2d. to £2 3s. 3d.

Income.

each of these contributions being a special Donation for the Christmas Entertainment of the children.

Miss Ruth Draper's Matinee.

A special Matinee Performance of original Character Sketches was kindly given by Miss Ruth Draper, at the Vaudeville Theatre, on July 8th, and resulted in the sum of £381 11s. 8d. (which includes a donation of £50 from Messrs. J. & R. Gatti, the Lessors of the Theatre) accruing to the funds of the Hospital.

The occasion was honoured by the gracious presence of Her Majesty The Queen, the President of the Hospital, and a letter was subsequently received expressing Her Majesty's appreciation of the performance.

£143 15s. 6d. was received as the result of the production by The Hon. Ethel Cadogan, of two Mediæval Miracle Plays at the Rudolf Steiner Hall in January, and the Committee desire to tender to The Hon. Marie Acton, and all who were associated with her in this successful effort, an expression of their grateful thanks for this very welcome assistance.

Ladies' Committee.—Ladies' League of Help.

Two events have been organized by these Associations on behalf of the funds of the Hospital.

An Exhibition and Sale of children's handicraft work was held on November 26th, at the Hospital. In addition to the handwork, stalls for the purchase of Christmas presents, garden produce, books, "white elephants," etc., were available, and a very successful day resulted in a profit of £130 19s. 6d., of which amount £75 was allocated to the Linen Guild for the purpose of meeting the cost of purchases of Hospital Linen.

"Pound Day."

The fourth annual "Pound Day" was held on Thursday, June 19th, when a large number of visitors took the opportunity of visiting the Hospital. The cash receipts of £135 16s. 0d. again constitutes a record, and over 500 pounds of household commodities were also received.

Since its inception in 1927, at the suggestion of Mrs. Hugh Pritchard, "Pound Day" has each year become a more and more valuable source of income to the Hospital. The monetary gifts have risen from £38 in 1927 to £135 in 1930, and your Committee express their grateful appreciation to the Ladies' Committee for the successful organization of this annual event.

The Linen Guild has again rendered valuable help in providing the sum of £83 10s. 7d. for the purchase of linen for the wards and staff.

Ladies desiring to become members of the Linen Guild should communicate with the Hon. Secretary, (Mrs. H. A. Rauthmell), at the Hospital.

Your Committee wish especially to tender their sincere thanks to the members of the Staff of the Kensington Telephone Exchange, who by means of a small sale and organised collections amongst their members, produced the splendid sum of £105 as a gift to the Hospital for the purpose of purchasing cots and other equipment for the wards.

A much appreciated award of £130 was received from the Trustees of the Fisher Bequest, this amount being specially allocated towards the cost of the new operation table, which was purchased in 1929. Thanks are also expressed to Lady Pinhey and her household staff for the sum of £11 12s. 6d. as the result of a small dance.

Annual Subscriptions.

The Committee regret to record that the amount of individual Annual Subscriptions is still much below that of many other Hospitals of comparable size. Whilst the combined expenditure of the two Hospitals exceeds £9,000 annually, receipts from annual subscribers are less than £500.

New Subscribers are particularly needed, and friends of the Hospital who are already contributors are specially asked to make the needs of the Hospital known to their friends and acquaintances.

Income Tax and Charitable Contributions.

It may not be generally known that Subscribers and Donors, by completing a Form of Agreement for seven years (or lifetime, whichever proves the shorter period) enable the Hospital to recover Income Tax on their contributions, and can themselves claim to deduct the amount of the gift from their tax return.

A Form of Agreement is enclosed with this Report, and the Secretary will be pleased to supply further

particulars upon request.

Legacies.

There was a marked diminution in the receipts from Legacies and Awards from Charitable Bequests, during 1930, for whereas in the previous year the income from these sources exceeded £3,500, the total for last year was £791 6s. 9d. received from the Executors of the late Mr. John Higgins. This amount represented the the balance of the bequest, £500 having been received in 1929.

Benefactors desirous of making Bequests to Charity by Will, are specially asked to bear in mind, at the appropriate time, the needs of Cheyne Hospital.

Cots.

The Committee gratefully acknowledge the sum of £250 which was allocated from a Memorial Subscription Fund, for the purpose of naming, in perpetuity, a Cot to be called the "Kate Courtney Cot" (referred to in the last Report) in memory of the late Lady Courtney of Penwith, who was a resident of Chelsea for many years.

The Carlyle School Cot has again been maintained by the scholars of that establishment. Miss A. D. Crosby, the Headmistress, has retired during the year, after many years service, and the Committee take this opportunity of expressing to her their appreciation for her unfailing and generous interest in the welfare of Cheyne Hospital and its little patients, and of expressing their thanks to her successor, Miss A. B. Douglas Finney, for her intention to maintain the association of Carlyle School with the Hospital.

New Method of Endowment.

The Committee desire to make it known that arrangements have been made whereby it is now possible for the Endowment of a Cot to be subscribed by instalments during a specified number of years, and it is hoped that this method will commend itself to intending donors, who, whilst unable to subscribe the full amount of £1000 or £750 in one sum, may be able and willing to do so over an extended period.

Particular attention is drawn to the fact that in certain circumstances, the Hospital is enabled to recover Income Tax on such instalments, and that Donors can themselves deduct the amounts of these gifts from their Tax returns. (see page 10).

General.

Miss E. B. Blundell, who had held the post of Dispenser at Cheyne Hospital for some years, has resigned owing to ill-health, and the vacancy has been filled by the temporary appointment of Miss C. James.

Great interest is taken by the children in their Roof Ward Garden. At the Chelsea Gardens Guild Spring Bulb Show, held in March, the Ward was successful in winning a Silver Cup for the best exhibit—a bowl of hyacinths.

A combined Electrical Floor Polisher and Vacuum Cleaner for use in the Wards has been introduced during

the year.

The raising of the assessment of the Hospital as the result of the Quinquennial Valuation, will involve an additional payment of £57 10s. 0d. annually by the Hospital on account of Rates.


St. Nicholas (Branch) Hospital.

Considerable developments have taken place in connection with the Branch Hospital at St. Nicholas-at-Wade, near Birchington.


New Ward.

Whilst the accommodation there is admirably suited for the open-air treatment of patients during the summer months, the need has arisen in recent years for additional accommodation in the nature of a warm ward in which some of the patients can be nursed during the winter season.

Careful consideration has been given to this need by your Committee, and it has been decided to build a new Ward adjoining the existing one. Plans have been prepared, and received the approval of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, and it is proposed that building operations shall be commenced during the Spring of 1931, so that the additional accommodation

will be available for the following winter. It is estimated that the cost of this extension will exceed £1000, and it is hoped that a generous response will be made to an Appeal which will be issued shortly.

Purchase of Additional Land.

The construction of a new coastal road close to the village of St. Nicholas may tend to the ultimate development of this hitherto rather isolated and healthy spot in Thanet. In these circumstances, and in order to safeguard the possibility of buildings encroaching too near to the Hospital, the Committee have considered it advisable to negotiate for the purchase of a strip of land half an acre in extent, immediately adjoining the Hospital premises, and it is proposed that, subject to the consent of the Ministry of Agriculture, this land shall be acquired by the Hospital on favourable terms in the near future.

The installation of an electric lighting plant at St. Nicholas Hospital—referred to in the last Report—has also provided the necessary current for treatment of the patients by ultra-violet ray ("artificial sunlight"), and during the past year 492 treatments of this nature have been given to the children, in addition to 228 Massage Treatments.

Death of Dr. W. R. Brunton.

It is with much regret that your Committee record the death on September 27th, of Dr. W. R. Brunton, who was for sixteen years the Medical Officer in charge of the Hospital, and subsequent to his retirement in 1927, was an Honorary Consulting Surgeon. It is difficult to speak with adequate appreciation of the services of Dr. Brunton to St. Nicholas, of his unremitting care of the children, and of his deep interest in the affairs of St. Nicholas Hospital in general. He will indeed be greatly missed.

St. Nicholas Cot League.

The St. Thomas and St. Nicholas Cots have again been maintained during the past year by The St. Nicholas

Cot League, which is so ably administered by the Honorary Secretary, Miss Laurie, to whom grateful thanks are tendered.

Mr. E. L. Ramsay's Gift.

In this connection the Committee record with much appreciation the very generous gift of Mr. E. L. Ramsay, of Queensland, Australia, who has annually supported the St. Augustine Cot since 1921.

Mr. Ramsay has now transferred to the Trustees of the Hospital the sum of £1250 5 per cent. War Stock for the permanent Endowment of this Cot at St. Nicholas.

This is the first fully-endowed Cot at the Branch Hospital, and it is earnestly hoped that the excellent lead which has been given by Mr. Ramsay will be followed by other gifts of a similar nature.

Needlework Guild.

The St. Nicholas Needlework Guild, under the efficient direction of Miss Hilda Laurie, has again provided nearly 400 articles of clothing for the patients, and the Committee express their gratitude to Miss Laurie for her activities in this respect.

The Local Committee of "Alexandra Day" kindly allocated a very welcome gift of £37 10s. 0d. to St. Nicholas Hospital, and special thanks are due to Mrs. W. Boyle Norcott for her very successful efforts in arranging the collection, and for her helpful interest in the welfare of St. Nicholas Hospital.

The Annual Harvest Festival Service at the Hospital on October 8th, was conducted by the Vicar, The Rev. S. E. Griggs, who resigned his office of Honorary Chaplain at the end of the year, upon preferment to another parish.

The new Vicar, The Rev. E. Colles Robinson, M.A., has kindly consented to continue to hold the Services for the children.

The Committee regret that the Matron, Miss A. C. MacL. Money, has been somewhat seriously ill during the year, necessitating her absence on sick leave for some weeks. They are glad to report, however, that Miss Money is now much better.

Education.

The instruction of the children at both Hospitals by arrangements with the Board of Education, has continued on the usual lines.

Visits were paid by Dr. M. Bywaters, H.M. Inspector of Special Schools, to Cheyne Hospital, on October 14th, and to St. Nicholas, on July 2nd, and on both occasions satisfaction was expressed with the conduct of the

Schools and the progress of the children.

Various forms of handcraft, including needlework, leatherwork, basketry, table decorations, etc., are made by the children, and the Teaching Staff will be pleased to receive orders for work of this nature for execution by the children.

The Exhibition and Sale of Handwork at Cheyne Hospital on November 26th is referred to elsewhere

in this Report.

Two short plays were performed by the children at St. Nicholas, "Jack and the Beanstalk," on March 1st, and "The Sleeping Beauty," on December 6th, and appreciative audiences on each occasion added to the enjoyment of the children, and rewarded their careful training by Miss Elliott and Miss Gray, of the Teaching Staff.

Committee.

Your Committee deeply regret to report the death, on October 26th, after only a few days illness, of an old and valued friend, Mr. Alfred M. Turner, who had been a member of the Committee for nearly 20 years. During this long period Mr. Turner was always keenly interested in the management of the Hospital, and was ever ready to give freely of his time and sound advice upon many important matters connected with its administration and development. He was a frequent subscriber to its funds, and in 1927 endowed The Eleanor Mary Turner Cot, in memory of his wife.

It was characteristic of his regard for the Hospital that, by his special request, friends were invited to send the equivalent of floral offerings as Donations to the Hospital, and it is indicative of the esteem in which he was held by his many friends, that £85 1s. 0d. was

received in this respect.

It was felt that it would be in accordance with Mr. Turner's wishes if this sum were devoted to the purpose of giving pleasure to the children at Cheyne, and also at St. Nicholas, (to which he paid a visit only a few days before his death), and these memorial gifts have accordingly formed the nucleus for the establishment of an Entertainment Fund Account for the benefit of both Hospitals.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

COT ENDOWMENTS IN PERPETUITY.

- 1—A Donation of One Thousand Pounds (£1,000) endows a Free Cot in perpetuity, and the Donor is entitled to name the Cot, and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.
- 2—A Donation of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£750) endows a Half-Payment (*i.e.*, the Parents paying 3/6 a week instead of 7/-) Cot in perpetuity, and the Donor is entitled to name the Cot and to nominate eligible patients. thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

COT NAMED IN PERPETUITY.

A Donor of £250 in one sum is entitled to name a Cot in perpetuity, but without the right to nominate the occupants thereof.

LIFE COT ENDOWMENTS.

- 1—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.
- 2—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

Life Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of a Donor, may be converted into Permanent Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of Seven Hundred Pounds in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of Five Hundred Pounds in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

SPECIAL NOTE re Donations for the purpose of Endowment of Cots:—

The Committee of Management will be pleased to make arrangements, in special cases, for Donations for the purpose of the Endowment of Cots to be subscribed by instalments during a specified number of years, or shorter period, and for the Cot to be named upon completion of the full payment.

Particulars of this method may be obtained from the Secretary at the Hospital.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

- 1—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.
- 2—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds) entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of three shillings and sixpence being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

GOVERNORS.

- 1—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards are thereby constituted Governors during the continuance of such subscription, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.
- 2—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

# "GODMOTHERS."

A plan, which many people seem to like, has been started primarily for the purpose of supplying garments for the children, and which materially assists the management and funds of the hospital.

Ladies (or gentlemen) are asked to become "Godmother" (or "Godfather") to a particular child, and

- (a) To take an interest in the child, and to keep in touch with it when it leaves the Hospital;
- (b) To help as far as possible by providing some clothing;

# and/or

(c) To give a Donation to the Sister of the Ward for the latter purpose.

Donations given for the purchase of clothing to be allocated to the "Godmother" Clothing Fund for the Ward concerned, such Fund to be administered by the Sister-in-Charge as occasion may require.

Further particulars of the Scheme, and also as to Clothing required can be obtained upon application to The Matron at the Hospital.

# OBJECTS OF THE HOSPITAL.

CHEYNE HOSPITAL was established in 1875 for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, and who are on that account ineligible for

or discharged from General Hospitals.

In this respect it may be said that the work of Cheyne Hospital begins where that of the General Hospitals ceases, but so successful has this work become that the word "Incurable" has been deleted from the title of the Hospital where it once appeared. Although many of these patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period. Over 80 per cent. of the patients treated have been discharged in a cured or relieved condition.

#### NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not considered advisable to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute. Such Letters are of little value, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of the Cheyne Hospital is to undertake for lengthy periods the care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which General Hospitals do not accept, and to keep them more or less indefinitely, it will be obvious that changes are slow and vacancies fewer than in most Hospitals. The average length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is usually over six months; while many of the children remain for longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will should it appear prima facie eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission when vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers (see pp. 19-20). More than this cannot satisfactorily be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

#### RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

- 1—Patients eligible for admission are those who have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or who can be shown to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.
- 2—Cases of Cancer, Consumption, Epilepsy, Hydrocephalus, Mental derangement or deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible.
- 3—Children are admitted between three and thirteen years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen.
- 4—The payment of Seven Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*
- 5—No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary of the Hospital.
- 6—The Guarantor will also be responsible for the cost of such Surgical Appliances or Splints as may be ordered for the patient by the Medical Officer.
- 7—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.†
- 8—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.
- 9—Applicants for admission may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted. 10—Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.
- 11—A Certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection must be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be brought with the child, in addition to Negative Reports of the Bacteriological Examination of nose and throat swabs taken within five days of the date of admission.
- 12—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission or in Hospital should be at once notified to the Secretary.

^{*}Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee have only a limited number of these Cots at their disposal.

[†] The Guarantor should be a householder (or the wife of a householder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.


