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

Fifty-Seventh Annual Report The Committee of Management of

Cheyne Hospital for Children,

For the Year ended December 31st, 1932.

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in presenting their Report, together with the Audited Statement of Accounts, for the year ended December 31st, 1932.

Work of the Year.-Cheyne Hospital.

Whilst the number of patients treated at both Hospitals was approximately the same as in the previous year, the work at Cheyne Hospital was considerably hampered for some time by the continued prevalence of a mild form of Diphtheria, 17 cases occurring, and it was necessary for special steps to be taken with a view to eradicating the epidemic. Some scarcity of cases in the earlier months was almost balanced by an unusually large number of admissions during the last quarter of the year.

The work of the Massage Department continues to increase, the number of treatments given being now more than double those in 1927, when the Department was opened. The figures for 1932 were 5570, compared with 4828 in 1931—an increase of 742, or 15 per cent.

The Private Ward.

It is a matter of regret that the number of patients admitted to the Private Ward has not so far justified the considerable expense incurred by the Committee in providing this facility for children, who, whilst not financially eligible for admission to the General Wards, are not able to afford expensive Nursing Home fees. It may be, however, that the advantages of this well-equipped Ward, with its delightfully bright and sunny aspect overlooking the Thames, have not yet become sufficiently widely known, and it is hoped that greater publicity will be given to its existence by those acquainted with the Hospital's work.

A very moderate charge of from £3 3s. 0d. to £5 5s. 0d. per week is made by the Hospital, and the fee payable to the member of the Medical or Surgical Staff is subject to confirmation by the Assessment Committee. Further particulars can be obtained from the Secretary.

Medical Staff.

During the year your Committee have received the resignation of Dr. E. G. Brisco Owen, who had acted as Anæsthetist since 1919, and they place on record their appreciation of the services rendered by her during this period. The vacancy has been filled by the appointment of Dr. R. H. Taylor Rea.

Mr. John Nicholson has acted as Surgical Assistant

to Mr. B. Whitchurch Howell.

Expenditure.

Particular attention has been paid during the past year to the necessity of effecting every possible economy consistent with the efficient working of the Hospital, and it is gratifying to be able to shew that the total expenditure has been reduced from £7717 to £6757—a decrease of £960—and although some £700 of this reduction is accounted for by a single item of exceptional expenditure in the previous year (i.e., in respect of extensive repairs to the exterior of the Hospital) the comparative figures still shew a reduction of £260 on the year's working.

Costs were reduced in no fewer than six of the eight sections of account—Provisions, Surgery, Domestic, Salaries, Repairs and Miscellaneous—all being less than in 1931. An increase of £56 under the heading of Finance is accounted for by payment of increased Rates and Taxes, and of Interest charges—which rose from £18 to £46—in respect of the Bank Overdraft and the Loan of £1,000 with which the Hospital was burdened during

the greater part of the year.

In consequence, and despite the fact that the net number of patients treated to a conclusion was lower—126 against 136—the figures reveal that the average cost per week has fallen from £2 9s. 1d. to £2 5s. 5d. and the individual cost from £56 14s. 4d. to £53 12s. 6d.

It should also be noted that the actual Deficit on the year's working, after including as an item of Expenditure £429 10s. Od. in respect of the Branch Hospital, was only £93 18s. 9d., a not unsatisfactory state of affairs during one of the most difficult financial periods of recent times. It must however be borne in mind that this amount refers only to 1932, and that the activities of the Hospital are still seriously hampered by a deficit of over £1,000 brought forward from the previous year, and your Committee appeal most earnestly for increased help and special donations in order to lessen this burden of debt.

Income.

In last year's Report attention was drawn to the fact that Income had decreased by nearly £300.

It is therefore encouraging to be able to Report that receipts in 1932, rising from £6,888 to £7,099—an increase

of £211—shewed a welcome improvement, although it will be seen that all the lost ground has not yet been recovered.

It is greatly regretted that the already too small Annual Subscription List shewed a decline of £44 last year. Your Committee have constantly referred in recent years to the inadequate nature of this valuable means of support—the only sound foundation upon which the financial structure of the Voluntary Hospitals can be built—and they earnestly appeal for at least 100 new Subscribers of £1 1s. 0d. each in order to bring this source of Income to £500 a year, and to make it in greater degree an appropriate recognition of the Hospital's work on behalf of its many small patients.

Income Tax and Charitable Contributions.

It may not be generally known that Subscribers and Donors by completing a Form of Agreement for seven years (or life-time, whichever proves the shorter period) enable the Hospital to recover Income Tax on their contributions, and can themselves claim to deduct the amount of the gift from their Tax Return.

Your Committee are much indebted to the Trustees of Smith's (Kensington Estate) Charity for a generous Award of £200, which was of great assistance, and particularly welcome at a time when additional funds were specially needed in view of the Hospital's financial position.

Grateful acknowledgment is tendered to the Honble. Dorothy Pickford and Miss Lilias Playfair who organised The Cheyne Walk Bridge Tournament with great success, and realised the sum of £78 8s. 9d. towards the

reduction of the Hospital's debt of £1,000.

An Exhibition of Japanese Ceremonial and Festival Dolls, kindly arranged by the Japan Society, was held at the Arlington Galleries, in Bond Street, during November. The Exhibition was honoured by a visit from H.M. The Queen, President of the Hospital, and other members of the Royal Family, and the unique character of the exhibits attracted many visitors. The Hospital funds benefited to the extent of £53 3s. 2d. and your Committee express their indebtedness to His Excellency The Japanese Ambassador, The President, and members of the Japan Society for this welcome addition to the Hospital's exchequer.

A valuable Award of £100 was again made to the Hospital by the Trustees of the Bernhard Baron Charitable Trust, and thanks are also tendered to the Delmar

Charitable Trust for a Grant of £20.

Chelsea Rotary Club Cot.

Your Committee record with pleasure and appreciation a donation of £200 from the Rotary Club of Chelsea, as a first instalment towards the ultimate Endowment of "The Chelsea Rotary Club Cot." This gift was made possible as the result of a highly successful Garden Party organised by the Club in the grounds of Chelsea Rectory, on June 9th, and opened by The Dowager Countess of Antrim, when "A Masque of Old Chelsea" was produced by Mrs. Jaqueline Hope-Nicholson and Miss Katherine Acland, and contributed greatly to the enjoyment of the large company present.

A New Form of Endowment.

It is regretted that no complete Endowment was made during 1932.

Your Committee desire to draw special attention to the above method of providing for the Endowment of a Cot by instalments subscribed over a number of years, as it is felt that an arrangement of this nature may commend itself to intending Donors who, whilst unable to give the required sum in any one year, may be enabled to do so over an extended period, and thus provide both a lasting memorial and a valuable source of permanent income for the maintenance of the Hospital.

Particular attention is drawn to the fact that in certain circumstances, the Hospital is enabled to recover Income Tax on such instalments, and that Donors can themselves deduct the amounts of these gifts from their

Tax Return.

Legacies.

For the second successive year no direct Legacies were received by the Hospital, and further payments, amounting to £40 18s. 8d. from the Estate of the late Mr. Henry Peech, were the only items recorded under this heading. The awards received from this Estate during the past six years now total £1,020 0s. 2d.

Benefactors desirous of making bequests to Charity by Will are specially asked to bear in mind, at the

appropriate time, the needs of Cheyne Hospital.

"Pound Day."

The Annual "Pound Day," which has now become established as a welcome feature of the Hospital's year, was held on June 30th. The arrangements were, as usual, carried out by the members of the Ladies' Committee, and a most successful day resulted in gifts of £159 9s. 10d.—again a record sum—and over 350lbs. of household commodities being received at the Hospital.

Linen Guild.

The Linen Guild, which is ably administered by Mrs. H. A. Rauthmell, as Honorary Secretary, has continued to provide funds for the purchase of sheets and other Linen for the Hospital, and your Committee gratefully acknowledge a gift of £30 1s. 0d. for this purpose.

Membership of the Linen Guild involves a subscription of only 5/- per year (Associates 2/6) and should make a special appeal to ladies who may desire to help the Hospital in this way and at the same time effect a much needed increase in the Guild's membership. Ladies wishing to join the Guild should write to Mrs. Rauthmell, at the Hospital.

Thanks are also tendered to Miss Peirse-Duncombe for her kindness in providing 104 articles of clothing

from members of the Cheyne Guild.

A very welcome and useful gift of 69 Bed Jackets was received from Mrs. Ernest A. Ward, of Hampstead, who kindly allocated these garments from the large number collected by her for distribution to the London Hospitals at Christmas time, and your Committee express their appreciation of the helpful service rendered by her in this respect.

Acknowledgment is also made to the League of Remembrance for the continuance of valuable assistance freely given in cutting-out and making-up materials supplied by the Hospital for Bed Jackets and other

clothing needed by the children.

Ladies' Committee.

Mrs. D. P. Chapman and Miss Hare have joined the Ladies' Committee, which meets monthly to deal with the household affairs of the Hospital, and with certain special cases of "After-Care."

Education.

The Children in the Wards receive Education for short periods each day from trained Teachers, and their instruction in various forms of Handicraft enables them to produce artistic and useful articles of furniture, needlework, purses, etc. The Teaching Staff will be glad to receive orders from friends of the Hospital for Handwork to be carried out by the children.

Miss M. N. Holden has joined the Teaching Staff

(Roof Ward) during the year.

General.

Miss Jessie Williams, a valued member of the Domestic Staff, completed 30 years in the service of the Hospital in November last, and the occasion was marked by the presentation to her, on behalf of the members of the Committee, of a clock suitably inscribed.

Much enjoyment is afforded to the children by Wire-

less entertainments, and thanks are due to the Radio Circle of the B.B.C. for generous financial help in meeting the cost of reconstructing the set and effecting modern improvements.

ST. NICHOLAS (BRANCH) HOSPITAL.

Forty new patients, including 12 transferred from Cheyne, were admitted to St. Nicholas (Branch) Hospital during the year, and derived considerable benefit from their treatment, and the opportunity of recuperation amidst the invigorating sea breezes from the Thanet coast. The advantages of the alternative accommodation afforded by the provision of the New Ward have been greatly in evidence, and the facilities for nursing patients are now adequate in proportion to the size of the Hospital.

The average number of children resident daily

throughout the year was just over 32.

As in the case of the parent Hospital, expenditure at St. Nicholas showed a decrease—£2,508 against £2,559—and the average cost has been reduced from £1 11s. 0d. to £1 9s. 11d. per week.

For reasons of enforced economy it was decided to lessen the number of Massage and U.V.R. Treatments,

and these have fallen from 830 to 407.

The "Agnes Batt-Mills" Cot.

It is with much pleasure that your Committee are able to announce that the "Agnes Batt-Mills" Cot has been named at St. Nicholas by Mrs. Travers Rountree, who generously gave a donation of £250, in memory of her mother, for this purpose. The position of this Cot is next to the "Vaughan" Cot, which was named in 1910 by Mrs. Batt-Mills in memory of her son, G. Vaughan Batt-Mills, R.N., and tablets commemorating the two Cots have been placed in the Ward.

The "Laurie Ward."

Your Committee have frequently referred to the kindly interest and valuable help which has been so generously given to St. Nicholas during the past 16 years by The Misses Laurie, of Canterbury, in connection with The St. Nicholas Cot League and The Needlework Guild.

As a mark of appreciation, the Committee decided to commemorate this association by naming the New Ward "The Laurie Ward," and an interesting ceremony took place at St. Nicholas on July 30th, when a Service of Dedication was conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. E. Colles Robinson, and the tablet naming the Ward was unveiled by Lady Davidson of Lambeth. A large number of visitors attended, and general admiration was expressed upon the construction and equipment of the Ward.

St. Nicholas "Pound Day."

The first "Pound Day" at St. Nicholas was held on the same day, July 30th, and proved to be an unqualified success. In addition to the many gifts received at the Hospital, depots were kindly arranged at Canterbury, by The Misses Laurie, and at Birchington, by Mrs. W. Boyle Norcott.

Pound Day Gifts arrived from far and near, and the final reckoning showed that in addition to donations amounting to £43 15s. 0d., over 1,000lbs. of household groceries, vegetables, fruit, etc., were received—a truly

delightful result.

The Committee of Management express their appreciation of this splendid tribute to the esteem in which the Branch Hospital is held, and hearty thanks are tendered to all the friends and supporters for their interest and help which contributed so greatly to the success of the day.

General.

Grateful acknowledgment is made to Mrs. Norcott, who again ably organised the "Alexandra Day" Collection in Birchington, St. Nicholas, and District, as the result of which a very welcome grant of £36 was made to St. Nicholas.

The Harvest Festival Service was held at the Hospital

on October 5th, and conducted by the Vicar.

A little Play, "The Capture of Spring," was presented by the children at the Hospital on December 10th, under the direction of their teachers, Miss Elliott and Miss Gray, and the performance was much enjoyed by an appreciative audience.

As the village of St. Nicholas is now served by a main supply of gas, it was decided to dispense with the use of the Petrol Gas Plant (which has been sold), and to connect with the Gas Company's system. In addition to its own Electric Lighting Plant the Hospital has thus the advantage of a reliable alternative system for lighting and cooking.

It was found necessary to re-decorate the exterior of

the Hospital during the year.

Committee of Management.

Your Committee have been fortunate in securing acceptance by General Sir Walter Braithwaite, G.C.B., Governor of the Royal Hospital, Chelsea, of the office of Vice-Chairman, in succession to the late Sir Howard Frank, whose death in the early part of last year was so widely regretted, and to whom reference was made in last year's Report.

Mr. Edwin Fisher is also welcomed as a new member of the Committee of Management, and of the Finance

Committee.

Mr. R. T. Watkin Williams, who is now permanently residing in Devonshire, resigned his membership in December, and in accepting his resignation with much regret, your Committee express their appreciation of the helpful service and wise counsel given by him in connection with the affairs of the Hospital during the past nine years, for part of which period he acted as Chairman of the House Committee.

Your Committee regret to record the death of two very old friends of the Hospital, The Dowager Lady Monkswell, who had been a Vice-President since 1921, and Clementine, Lady Redesdale, from whom The

Clementine Ward derives its name.

In accordance with the Rules, three members—Mr. Reginald Blunt, C.B.E., Miss Macnamara, and Lady Hutchison of Montrose—retire from the Committee in the order of priority of their appointment, and are eligible for re-election at the Annual Meeting for a further period of three years.

"GODMOTHERS."

A plan, which many people seem to like, has been started primarily for the purpose of supplying garments for the children, and which materially assists the management and funds of the hospital.

Ladies (or gentlemen) are asked to become "Godmother" (or "Godfather") to a particular child, and

- (a) To take an interest in the child, and to keep in touch with it when it leaves the Hospital;
- (b) To help as far as possible by providing some clothing;

and/or

(c) To give a Donation to the Sister of the Ward for the latter purpose.

Donations given for the purchase of clothing to be allocated to the "Godmother" Clothing Fund for the Ward concerned, such Fund to be administered by the Sister-in-Charge as occasion may require.

Further particulars of the Scheme, and also as to Clothing required can be obtained upon application to the Hon. Sec., Mrs. W. S. C. Copeman, 26 Ferncroft Avenue, Hampstead, N.W. 3, or from The Matron at the Hospital.

OBJECTS OF THE HOSPITAL.

CHEYNE HOSPITAL was established in 1875 for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, and who are on that account ineligible for or discharged from General Hospitals.

In this respect it may be said that the work of Cheyne Hospital begins where that of the General Hospitals ceases, but so successful has this work become that the word "Incurable" has been deleted from the title of the Hospital

where it once appeared.

Although many of the patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, such as cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period. Over 84 per cent. of the patients treated have been discharged in a cured or relieved condition.

NOTE.

The Committee of the Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not considered advisable to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute. Such Letters are of little value, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which General Hospitals do not accept, and to keep them for lengthy periods, it will be obvious that changes are slow and vacancies fewer than in most Hospitals. The average length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is usually about six months, while many of the children remain for longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will, should it appear prima facie eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the Child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission when vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers (see pp. 18-19). More than this cannot satisfactorily be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear,

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1-Patients eligible for admission are those who have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or who are considered to be unfit for treatment in such Hospitals.

2-Cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, Epilepsy, Hydrocephalus, Mental derangement or deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible.

3-Children are admitted between three and thirteen years of age, those recommended by Governors and Subscribers taking precedence. Fatients are not retained after the age of sixteen, except by special sanction.

4-The payment of Seven Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

5-No case will be put upon the List for Admission till Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained of the Secretary) have been duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary of the Hospital.

6-The Guarantor will also be responsible for the cost of such Surgical Appliances or Splints as may be ordered for the patient

by the Medical Officer.

7-The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.;

8-No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

9-Applicants for admission may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted. 10-Any Child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian. The expenses of admission and removal must be in all cases defrayed by the parents or friends of the child.

11-A Certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection must be signed by a responsible person, cognisant of the facts, and be brought with the child, in addition to Negative Reports of the Bacteriological Examination of nose and throat swabs taken within five days of the date of admission.

12-Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission or in Hospital should be at once notified to the Secretary.

^{*} Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee have only a limited number of these Cots at their disposal.

[†] The Guarantor should be a householder (or the wife of a householder) rated at (40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive their contributions and remit he maintenance charge quarterly.



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
