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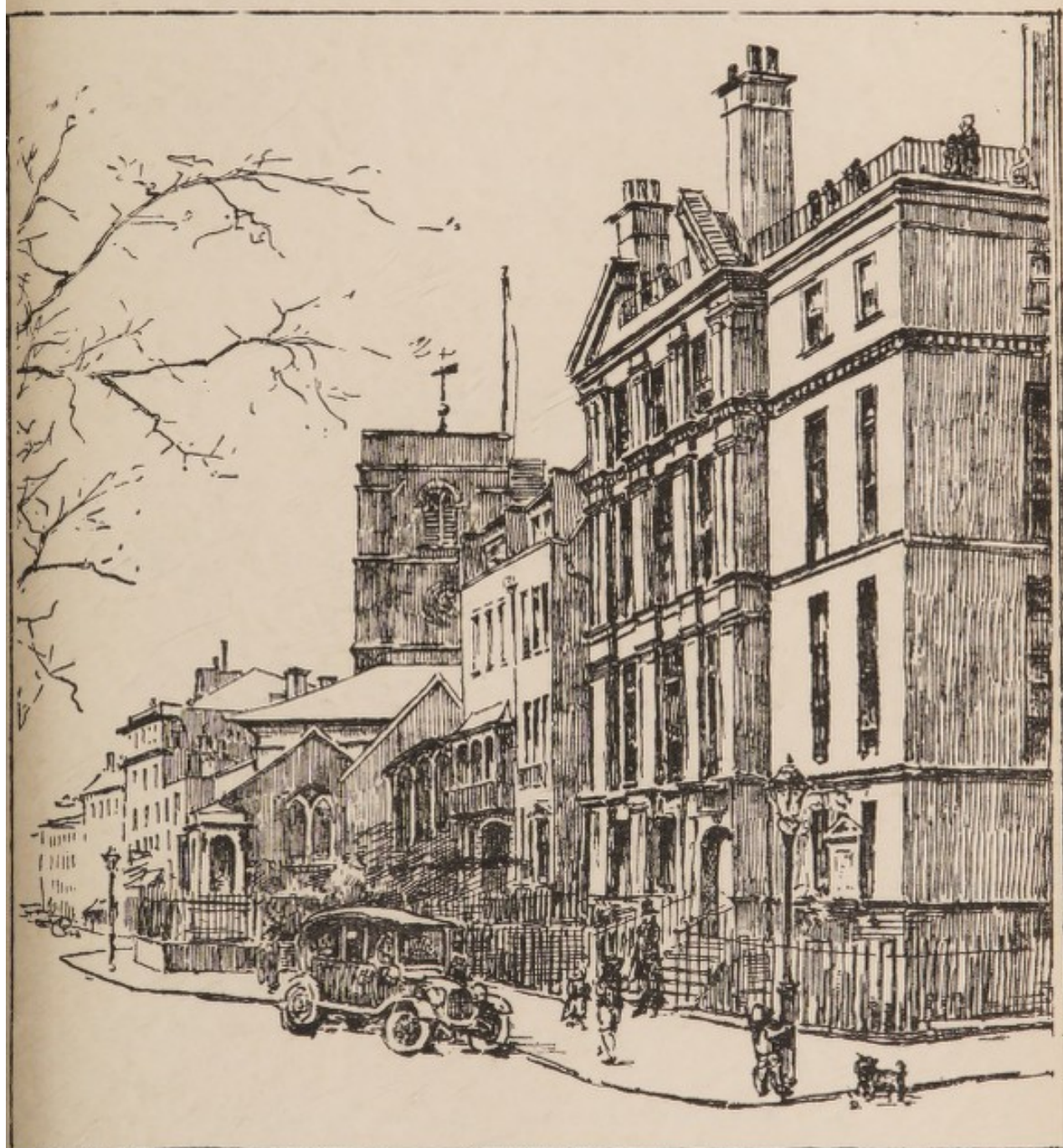

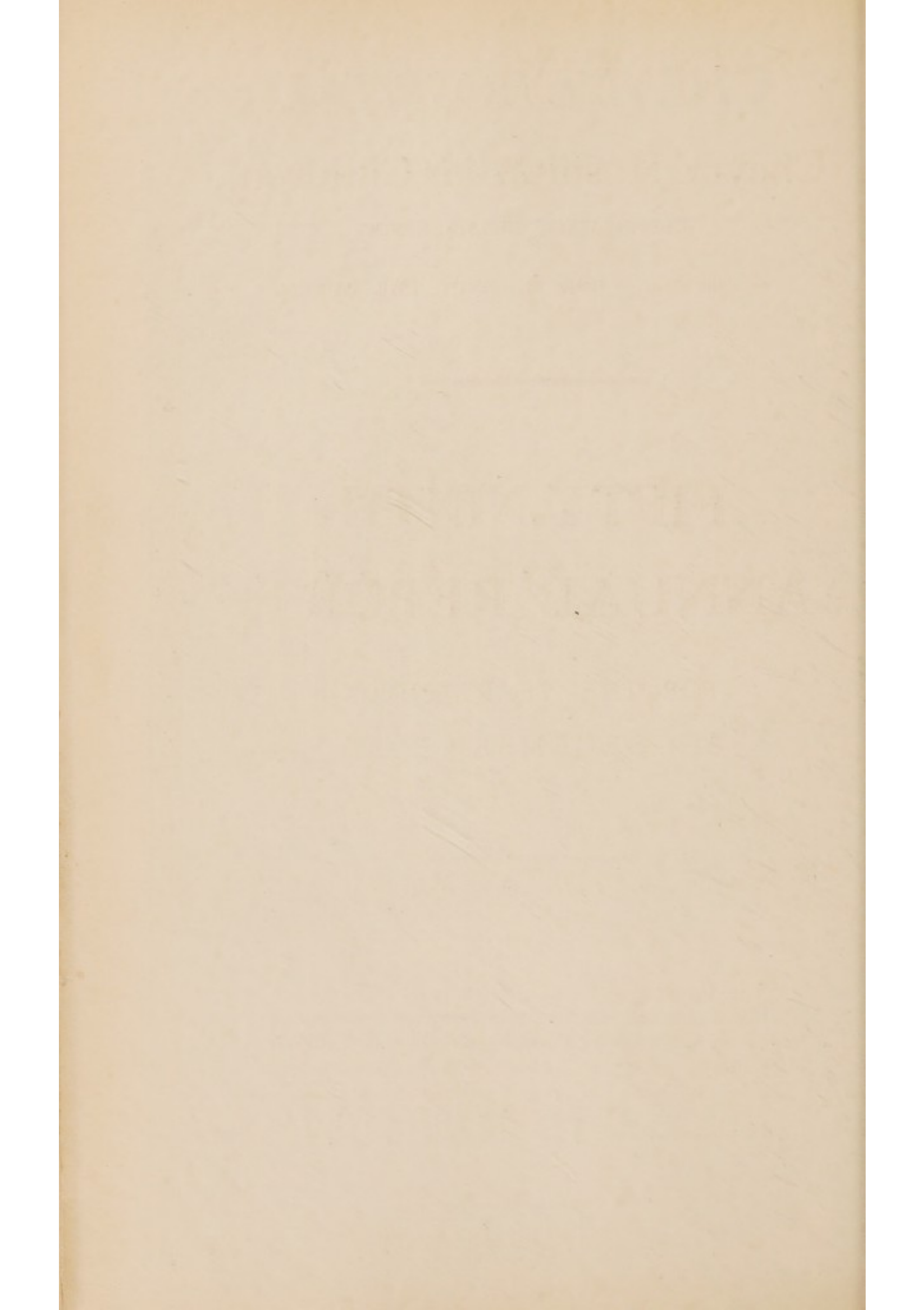

The foregoing figures shew little variation from those of the previous year, with the exception of Massage treatments, which decreased from 8,014 to 5,948. The number of new patients admitted was 138 compared with 129, and the average period of residence shortened from 170 to 157 days.

The Campaign against Rheumatism.

Cheyne Hospital Rheumatism Research Fund.

An important event in the history of the Hospital has occurred during the past year with the inauguration of the Cheyne Hospital Rheumatism Research Fund, which has been established for the purpose of investigating the causes of rheumatism in childhood. Research which has been carried out during the past few years has opened up fresh conceptions of the cause of this disease, and has indicated further lines which should be followed in attempting to unravel the factors underlying one of the most crippling ailments of childhood.

Cheyne Hospital offers unrivalled opportunities for tackling the problems of rheumatic heart disease, as for many years it has been possible to give lengthy and specialized treatment there for diseases of this type, and at the present time there are exceptional facilities at Cheyne, in co-operation with other London Hospitals, for continuing the carefully organized research work.

So convinced are your Committee of Management of the value of the investigations which have been already made, and of the advisability that they shall be continued, that they have established The Cheyne Hospital Rheumatism Research Fund by guaranteeing a sum of £500 for the purpose of meeting necessary expenditure in this connection during the next three years.

It is, however, estimated that additional funds will be required for the purchase of equipment, etc., and a special appeal is therefore made to all who are interested in the welfare of children and the science of preventive medicine to help forward this greatly needed work:—

- (a) By sending a donation, large or small, towards the consolidation of the Fund or
- (b) By promising a gift of money annually during the next three or five years for the same purpose.

Donations to the Fund (specially indicated as such) will be gratefully acknowledged by the Secretary.

Finance.

Your Committee are glad to report that the financial position of the Hospital is more satisfactory than during the past three or four years. This improvement is largely due to the very successful result of The Cheyne Ball, organized by the Countess of Cromer in 1933 and referred to in the Annual Report for that year, the proceeds of nearly £2,000, being included in the accounts for 1934.

It has accordingly been possible to pay off the long standing debt of £1,000, which had hampered the carrying out of several greatly needed improvements.

Endowments.

Your Committee express their very grateful thanks to their Treasurer, Mr. Leonard F. Harrison, who has generously endowed the "Elaine Mary Harrison Cot" in memory of his wife.

Acknowledgment is also made to the Rotary Club of Chelsea in respect of a further sum of £50 which has been added during the year to their fund, now amounting to £300, for the endowment of the Rotary Club of Chelsea Cot.

Your Committee desire to draw special attention to this method of endowment of a cot by instalments subscribed over a number of years. An arrangement of this nature enables intending donors, who may not be able to contribute in one amount the entire gift of £1,000 or £750 for endowment purposes, to subscribe the required sum by periodical payments during a specified number of years, and thus provide a permanent memorial and also a valuable source of regular income for the maintenance of the Hospital.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that in certain circumstances the Hospital is enabled to recover Income Tax on such instalments, and that donors can thus deduct the amount of these gifts from their Tax Return.

Legacies.

Ladies Committee.

Mrs. M. G. Harrison has joined the Ladies Committee which meets each month to deal with the household affairs of the Hospital, and also with special cases of after-care.

Pound Day.

The arrangements for the Annual Pound Day, on June 26th, were undertaken by members of the Ladies Committee, and the event was again a great success, gifts in kind amounting to 421lbs. Donations, which reached the splendid total of £324 0 7 were higher than on any previous occasion since the inception of Pound Day seven years ago, this record figure being due to a special collection of £221 12 0 made in the City by Mr. Leonard Harrison, to whom your Committee again express their grateful acknowledgment.

Thanks are also tendered to Miss Hare, Miss Kemsley and other friends who arranged a Sale of Garden Produce, Flowers, Eggs, Butter, etc. The proceeds of £32 8 0 from these Stalls were devoted to the Linen Guild, from which a grant of £55 was received at the end of the year, towards the cost of linen purchased for the Wards and other departments of the Hospital.

Ladies Association.

The development of the Ladies Association has been continued by its Chairman, Mrs. Lionel Hichens, who

will be very glad to enrol new members who are willing to subscribe 10/- yearly, take an interest in the welfare of the Hospital by widening the circle of its friends, paying occasional visits to the children in the wards, supporting the Linen Guild, etc.

Education.

The school at Cheyne Hospital was officially visited on July 30th, by H.M. Inspector, Dr. M. Bywaters, who expressed her satisfaction with the educational arrangements, and specially commended the progress made in handcraft undertaken by the children.

Further evidence of the children's skill in this work was forthcoming in October, when at the Exhibition of Handwork, at Bristol, organized by the Central Council for the Care of Cripples, 22 Diplomas, *i.e.*, three firsts, six seconds, and thirteen thirds were awarded in relation to 30 exhibits of handwork made by the Cheyne children.

Staff Changes—Matron.

In last year's Report your Committee referred to the retirement from the office of Matron of Miss Louise Angus, and to the appointment as her successor of her colleague, Miss G. A. Brimmell.

It is now with very great regret that your Committee have also to record the resignation, owing to ill-health of Miss Brimmell, who had intimated when accepting the appointment, that her continuance in office might be for a limited period only.

For over 20 years Miss Brimmell has given efficient and devoted service to this Hospital, and in wishing her many years of well-earned leisure, your Committee record their deep appreciation and thanks for her excellent work and her constant thought for the welfare of the Hospital.

Miss Brimmell's successor as Matron is Miss Evelyn M. Price Williams, lately Assistant Matron at Princess Elizabeth of York Hospital for Children, Shadwell, who received her Children's Hospital Training at Birmingham, and her General Hospital Training at King's College Hospital.

ST. NICHOLAS (BRANCH) HOSPITAL.

For the second year in succession the normal work of the Branch Hospital was hampered by a period of quarantine owing to several cases of diphtheria occurring during the summer, and incidentally causing the abandonment of a "Pound Day" which had been arranged for July.

All the affected children recovered after a period of treatment at the local Isolation Hospital.

New patients admitted were slightly fewer, viz., 27 against 35, but there was a marked increase in the number of children sent to St. Nicholas from Cheyne, 34 having been transferred as compared with 13 in 1933, thus emphasizing the advantages of the Branch Hospital and its bracing Thanet air as an ideal combination for building up the constitutions of the small people sent down from London.

The average cost of each patient at St. Nicholas last year was £1 10s. 8d. per week, and the average length of stay was six months.

During the year your Committee have carried out an improvement suggested some time ago by the King's Fund in London, but deferred owing to the lack of funds, by the provision of additional sanitary accommodation for the shelter-courtyard patients. It was found possible to convert a small disused building nearby to this purpose and thus save expense.

The Alexandra Day Collection in Birchington and district was again efficiently arranged by Mrs. W. Boyle Norcott, assisted by willing helpers, and grateful thanks are offered for the welcome grant of over £32 already voted.

Some of the patients, under the directions of Miss Elliott and Miss Gray, again gave a little Christmas Play, appropriately entitled "St. Nicholas," the presentation and the children's singing being appreciated by the company present.

Resignation of the Matron—Miss A. C. MacL. Money.

During the past year, your Committee have received the resignation of Miss A. C. MacL. Money, who had guided the affairs of St. Nicholas as Matron since the Hospital was first established in 1909.

It is fully realized that the very successful working of this valuable Branch Hospital during the past 25 years, especially in the earlier days when the neighbourhood was less developed than now, and also during the difficult period of the War, has been largely due to Miss Money's able and resourceful administration and her determination to maintain a high standard of conduct amongst the patients and nursing staff; and your Committee tender to her their sincere thanks for invaluable services rendered.

Miss Marion J. Bohannon has been appointed as the new Matron, and comes to St. Nicholas from a senior appointment at Birmingham Children's Hospital. She received her Children's Training at Birkenhead, and her Training in General Nursing at the Royal Infirmary, Liverpool.

Committee.

THE ANNUAL MEETING.

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Governors and Committee of Management of Cheyne Hospital for Children was held at the Hospital on Tuesday, April 9th, 1935, at 6 p.m.

CHEYNE HOSPITAL'S DIAMOND JUBILEE.

On June 16th, 1935, occurs the 60th anniversary of the opening of Cheyne Hospital in 1875.

In that year, the Hospital, established by Mr. and Mrs. Wickham Flower, was opened at No. 46, Cheyne Walk, with accommodation for eight patients.

For 60 years the special work of this Hospital for children requiring a long period of treatment, has been quietly continued and gradually extended until the present time, when there are 71 cots in Chelsea, and an additional 33 cots at its Branch Hospital of St. Nicholas, near the sea in Thanet.

During the first year 21 children were received, and the Expenditure was some £648.

In 1934 there were 300 Children under treatment and the Expenditure was over £8,000.

The practice of making frequent Appeals to the general public and of expensive propaganda advertisements, has not been adopted as a policy by the Committee of Management, who have preferred to rely upon the help and sustained interest which has been so generously given by many friends during this long period: to-day, however, times have changed: many of our old friends are no more, and the financial difficulties of the present time have necessarily caused other friends to reduce or discontinue their support.

Our Annual Subscriptions List has dropped to just over £400 a year—£1 per day, compared with an Expenditure of £22 per day.

- (a) The subscriber sends a cheque for £5 5s. 0d., with a certificate that he has paid income tax on the amount which, after deducting income tax, leaves £5 5s. 0d. (i.e., with income tax at 4/6 in the £, £6 15s. 6d.); the Hospital can supply form of certificate if desired;
- (b) Cheyne Hospital recovers the income tax from Somerset House;
- (c) The contributor appears as a subscriber of £6 15s. 6d.
- (d) The contributor can deduct £6 15s. 6d. from his Tax Return.

PRIVILEGES OF DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

COT ENDOWMENTS IN PERPETUITY.

1—A Donation of One Thousand Pounds (£1,000) endows a Free Cot in perpetuity, and the Donor is entitled to name the Cot, and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£750) endows a *Half-Payment Cot in perpetuity, and the Donor is entitled to name the Cot and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

COT NAMED IN PERPETUITY.

A Donor of £250 in one sum is entitled to *name* a Cot in perpetuity, but without the right to nominate the occupants thereof.

LIFE ENDOWMENTS.

1—A Donation in one sum of Three Hundred Pounds (£300) endows a Free Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

2—A Donation in one sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£250) endows a *Half-Payment Cot for the period of the life of the Donor, who is entitled to name it and to nominate eligible patients thereto as vacancies shall arise therein.

**i e.*, the Parents paying 3/6 a week instead of 7/.

NOTE.—**Life** Cot Endowments, ceasing upon the death of a Donor, may be converted into **Permanent** Cot Endowments by the payment within twelve months of the death of the Donor, either by Bequest or otherwise, of the further sum of £700 in the case of a Free Life Cot Endowment, or of £500 in the case of a Half-Payment Life Cot Endowment, free of Legacy Duty.

SPECIAL NOTE *re* Donations for the purpose of Endowment of Cots :—

The Committee of Management will be pleased to make arrangements, in special cases, for Donations for the purpose of the Endowment of Cots to be

subscribed by instalments during a specified number of years, or shorter period, and for the Cot to be named upon completion of the full payment.

Particulars of this method may be obtained from the Secretary at the Hospital.

COT SUBSCRIBERS.

1—An Annual Cot Subscription of Forty Pounds (£40), or a Donation in one sum of One Thousand Pounds (£1000), entitles the Subscriber to name a Free Cot, and to nominate an eligible patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; no further payment being required on behalf of the occupant.

2—An Annual Cot Subscription of Thirty Pounds (£30), or a Donation in one sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds (£750), entitles the Subscriber to name a Half-Payment Cot, and to nominate an eligible Patient as often as the Cot becomes vacant; the weekly payment of 3/6 (*i.e.*, half-rate) being required from the parents or friends of the occupant.

GOVERNORS.

1—Donors of not less than Fifty Guineas (£52 10s.) in one sum and Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas (£10 10s.) and upwards are thereby constituted Governors during the continuance of such subscription, and are entitled to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of the Committee of Management, and to nominate one suitable case for admission annually, such cases having precedence on the list over those recommended by other Subscribers.

2—All Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards are entitled to recommend one suitable case annually, during the continuance of such subscription; such cases taking precedence on the Admission List over those not so recommended.

EXECUTORS.

One of the Executors of every person from whose estate a Legacy of Fifty Guineas or upwards shall have been received by the Hospital, shall be entitled to the same privileges as a Donor of Fifty Guineas.

P.S.—As last year I shall collect toys for the children in the Hospital and deliver them in time for distribution at Xmas.

“GODMOTHERS.”

The “Godmother” plan was started some years ago, primarily for the purpose of supplying garments for the children, and also of assisting the funds of the Hospital.

Ladies (or gentlemen) are asked to become “Godmother” (or “Godfather”) to a particular child, and

(a) To take an interest in the child, and to keep in touch with it when it leaves the Hospital;

(b) To help as far as possible by providing some clothing;

and/or

(c) To give a Donation to the Sister of the Ward for the latter purpose.

Donations given for the purchase of clothing may be allocated to the “Godmother” Clothing Fund for the Ward concerned, and administered by the Sister-in-Charge for this purpose as occasion may require.

Further particulars of the Scheme, and also as to Clothing required can be obtained upon application to the Hon. Sec., Mrs. Arnold Thompson, 32, Rivermead Court, Putney, S.W. 15 (Tel.—Putney 1609) or to The Matron at the Hospital (Tel.—Flaxman 3589).

OBJECTS OF THE HOSPITAL.

CHEYNE HOSPITAL was established in 1875 for the reception of Children suffering from Chronic and Incurable Disease, and who are on that account ineligible for or discharged from General Hospitals.

In this respect it may be said that the work of Cheyne Hospital begins where that of the General Hospitals ceases, but so successful has this work become that the word "Incurable" was deleted in 1920 from the title of the Hospital where it once appeared.

Although many of the patients are beyond hope of ultimate recovery, it is found that medical skill and careful nursing, together with good food and ventilation, which often cannot be obtained in the homes of the poor, will always greatly alleviate suffering; while some cases can be successfully treated, which, requiring for their cure a longer time than can be spared to them in General Hospitals, receive here continuous care for an indefinite period. **Over 85 per cent. of the patients treated have been discharged in a cured or relieved condition.**

NOTE.

The Committee of Cheyne Hospital desire to state that, owing to the special character of this Institution, it is not considered advisable to give "Letters of Recommendation" to those who kindly contribute. Such Letters are of little value, unless they carry a reasonable probability of early admission or relief; indeed they are useless, because they would appear to give a promise which could not be fulfilled, and would thus lead to disappointment and misunderstanding. As the main object of Cheyne Hospital is to undertake the care and treatment of cases of deep-seated or incurable disease, which General Hospitals do not accept, and to keep them for lengthy periods, it will be obvious that changes are slow and vacancies fewer than in most Hospitals. The *average* length of Patients' stay in the Hospital is nearly six months, while many of the children remain for longer periods. Subscribers are invited to write in reference to any case in which they may be interested, to the Secretary, who will, should it appear *prima facie* eligible, forward a copy of Form of Medical Certificate, on return of which duly filled in, the child's name will be added to the list for examination and admission when vacancies arise, and in accordance with the privileges of Donors and Subscribers (see pp. 18-19). More than this cannot satisfactorily be promised, and the Committee feel it due to their many and generous friends to make their position in this matter clear.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1—Children eligible for admission are those who have been rejected or discharged from a General Hospital, or who are considered to be unsuitable for treatment in such Hospitals.

2—Cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, Epilepsy, Hydrocephalus, Mental derangement or deficiency, all infectious cases, and Cripples not requiring Surgical Treatment, are not eligible.

3—Age Limits.—Children eligible are those between 3 and 13 years of age (*i.e.*, up to the 14th birthday), those recommended by Governors or Subscribers taking precedence. Patients are not retained after the age of sixteen, except by special sanction.

4—The payment of Seven Shillings a week is required from the Parents or Friends of the Patients.*

The Guarantor will also be responsible for the cost of such Surgical Appliances or Splints as may be ordered for the patient by the Medical Officer.

5—Forms of Medical Certificate and Guarantee (to be obtained from the Secretary) must be duly filled in and signed by a qualified Medical Practitioner and responsible Guarantor respectively, and returned to the Secretary of the Hospital prior to admission.

The Guarantor should be a householder (or the wife of a householder) rated at £40 or more per annum. Unless the parents make regular weekly payments at the Hospital, the Guarantor is requested to arrange to receive the contributions and remit the maintenance charge quarterly.

6—The Committee reserve power to refuse the name of any Guarantor without reason assigned, or to require a Guarantor to furnish references for the necessary security to their satisfaction.

7—No Guarantee shall be withdrawn without one month's previous notice in writing to the Secretary of the Hospital.

8—Applicants for admission may be required to be brought to the Hospital for Medical examination before they can be admitted.

9—The expenses of admission and removal must be defrayed by the parents or friends of the child. Any child who has been admitted to the Hospital, but who subsequently proves unsuitable from any cause, may be discharged upon three days' notice, sent by post to the last furnished address of the parent or guardian.

10—A Medically Signed Report certifying the Negative Result of the examination of swabs taken from both the nose and the throat of the child within four days of admission, also a certificate that the patient has not been suffering from any infectious disease, nor been exposed to infection, must be signed by a responsible person cognisant of the facts, and brought with the child on admission.

11—Any alteration in the address of the patient while awaiting admission or in Hospital should be at once notified to the Secretary.

* Certain Free and Assisted Cots have been founded for specially necessitous cases. Applications for vacancies in these Cots must be accompanied by full particulars of the circumstances of the family; and it must be borne in mind that the Committee have only a limited number of these Cots at their disposal.

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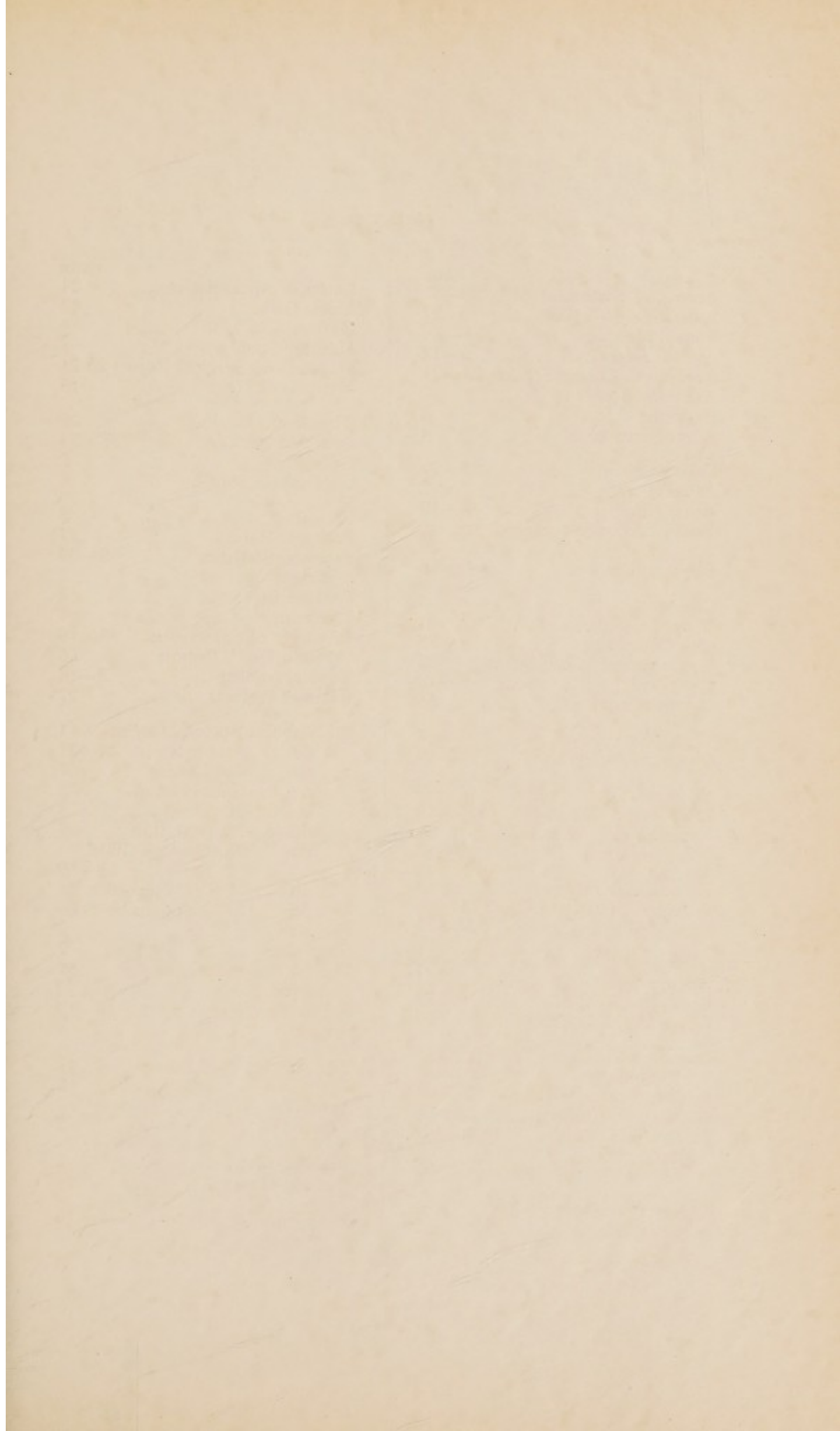
