

Groundslow Sanatorium.—The patients in residence at Groundslow during the year varied owing to matters connected with the extensions now proceeding and to the evacuation of patients on the outbreak of war, from 3 to 80, the number on the 31st March, 1940, being 56. On the outbreak of war the Sanatorium was evacuated under the Government's Emergency Hospital Scheme but was later suspended from the scheme and was re-opened for the treatment of tuberculous patients on the 14th November, 1939. The Ministry of Health agreed to the whole of the extensions works being proceeded with and although there has been some difficulty in obtaining materials good progress has been made. Such works necessitated the demolition of one of the wards, thus reducing the number of beds available for the time being. The Joint Board have approved arrangements for an adequate water supply being available for fire fighting purposes and have also decided to take advantage of the Stone Rural District Council's scheme for Sewering Tittensor.

It will not therefore be necessary to enlarge the Sewage Works at the Sanatorium but temporary arrangements will have to be made for dealing with the sewerage from the new buildings pending completion of the District Council's Scheme.

EDGE VIEW SANATORIUM, KINVER.—The number of patients in residence at this Sanatorium during the year varied from 23 to 38, the number on the 31st March, 1940, being 30.

PRESTWOOD SANATORIUM.—The number of patients in residence at Prestwood during the year varied owing to evacuation of patients on the outbreak of war from 6 to 198, the number on the 31st March, 1940, being 157. On the outbreak of war the Sanatorium was evacuated under the Government's Emergency Hospital Scheme but was later suspended from such Scheme and was

re-opened for the treatment of tuberculous patients on the 14th November, 1939. The erection of the new Recreation Block has been postponed owing to the war.

THE LIMES SANATORIUM, HIMLEY.—The number of patients in residence at this Sanatorium during the year varied from 40 to 59, the number in residence on the 31st March, 1940, being 54.

Wednesbury Sub-Dispensary.—In view of the war, the erection of a new Sub-Dispensary on the site in Camp Street, Wednesbury, has been deferred.

AFTER-CARE. The amount expended on this service for the financial year ended 31st March, 1940, was £568 as against £765 for the previous year.

STATISTICS.—The Medical Officer has not yet received sufficient data to enable him to prepare the usual Statistical Report. He has, however, made certain observations on the working of the Scheme (see Appendix A.).

Finance.—The Treasurer has prepared an Abstract of Accounts of the Joint Board for the year ended 31st March, 1940 (see Appendix B.).

Report of the Medical Officer for the Year ended 31st December, 1939.

Incidence of and Mortality from Tuberculosis.

At the end of 1939 there were 8,009 cases of tuberculosis on the Registers of the Medical Officers of Health of the various districts in the area of the Joint Board. Of these, 5,554 were suffering from pulmonary disease, and 2,455 were suffering from other forms of tuberculosis. Compared with 1938 these figures show a decrease in pulmonary cases of 231, and an increase of 53 in other forms of tuberculosis.

Every notified case of tuberculosis is registered by the Medical Officer of Health of the area in which the patient lives and the name can only be removed from the Register in the case of :—

- (1) Recovery from disease—that is, in pulmonary cases when there have been no signs or symptoms for 5 years and in other forms of tuberculosis for 3 years.
- (2) Death.
- (3) Removal from the district.

The names of patients who come under the care of the Tuberculosis Officers are placed on the Tuberculosis Dispensary Registers, and these are only removed under conditions similar to those outlined above.

The details of cases on the Registers of the Medical Officers of Health are as follows:-

In 1939, 509 persons died of pulmonary tuberculosis, the same number as in 1938. The death rate per 1,000 of the population is 0.52, compared with a rate for the previous year of 0.53. There were 89 deaths from other forms of tuberculosis, yielding a death rate of 0.09, whilst in 1938, 121 deaths occurred. On comparing the number of known cases of tuberculosis with the number of deaths that took place during the year, it was found that the proportion of deaths to cases was 1 to 13.

In Table 1, new cases and deaths, classified according to age and sex, are shown. In previous years I have drawn attention to the mortality from pulmonary tuberculosis in young girls aged 15 to 25. It has long been recognised that girls of this age group are more prone to develop a fatal type of tuberculosis than other age or sex groups. Of recent years it has been noted, however, that the number of deaths in this particular age group has been declining, though not at the same rate as the other age groups. This year's figures again shew a decline. It is hoped that with the facilities made available in the Joint Board's Area for the diagnosis and treatment of tuberculosis, and with the added co-operation of the patient—which is essential if we are to treat the disease in a sufficiently early stage to promise eventual arrest—that this particular age group will tend to grow less and less. The maximum mortality amongst men is reached by the age group 35—40, which shows a slight increase on last year's figures.

Table 2 has been prepared to show the number of notifications and deaths, together with the death rates, for each sanitary district in the area of the Joint Board. A similar Table will be found in each Annual Report for many years, and I would refer the reader who is specially interested in any district to these Reports, for it is only by comparing the death rates over a number of years that one can arrive at a just estimate of the incidence of disease in a sanitary district.

In Table 3, the death rates for the Administrative County, divided into Urban and Rural Districts, and Wolverhampton and Dudley County Boroughs, are shown separately for 26 years. Also in this Table are shown the death rates from phthis and other forms of tuberculosis in the area of the Joint Board as a whole since 1922.

It will be noted that the rate for the pulmonary disease for 1939 is lower than that of 1938 and is actually the lowest figure recorded in the area of the Board. Some fluctuation is bound to take place from year to year, but it will be observed that the figures of recent years are considerably lower than those of the earliest years for which records exist.

This Table also shows that the Urban Areas still have a higher death rate from phthisis than the Rural, which is, of course, to be expected. The death rates from non-pulmonary disease do not show the same contrast between the Urban and Rural areas, although there has been a very satisfactory drop since the early years, as the result of the operation of the general Public Health Acts.

Notifications. During 1939, 907 cases of tuberculosis were notified, compared with 1,026 in the previous year. Seven hundred and eight were cases of pulmonary disease and 199 of other forms of tuberculosis.

The attack rates per 1,000 of the population for the last 15 years are shown in Table 4. It will be noted that all the figures are the lowest recorded since 1925.

Tuberculosis Scheme of Treatment.

During the period under review no change took place in the general scheme of treatment provided by the Joint Board. The site for the new building to house the Sub-Dispensary at Wednesbury was purchased, but the outbreak of war postponed the erection of the building. The Board have agreed to the principle that X-Ray facilities should be provided when the new accommodation is available. This will be of great assistance to the Tuberculosis Officer, for it will mean that patients will not have to be sent to Dudley for X-Ray photographs to be taken, and diagnoses of doubtful cases and treatment by pneumothorax will thereby be facilitated.

New Cases.—In 1939, 3,132 persons attended for examination at the various Dispensaries for the first time. On referring to Table 5 the actual numbers sent by Medical Practitioners, School Medical Inspectors and Health Visitors are shown. As would be expected, Medical Practitioners sent the majority of the patients.

A satisfactory feature of the table is the large number of persons who were found not to be suffering from tuberculosis. Out of 3,132 persons who attended the Dispensaries, only 26.4 per cent. were found to be actually suffering from the disease. Because the onset is so insidious, tuberculosis is often very difficult to diagnose, yet early treatment gives a patient a much better prospect of recovery. Hence it is gratifying to note that the opinion of the Tuberculosis Officers is sought about so many doubtful cases. It shows the confidence placed in their skill and I hope that this side of the work will increase still further.

Of the 687 contacts who presented themselves at the Dispensaries for examination, 92 were found to be suffering from tuberculosis, 570 were classified non-tuberculous, and the diagnoses were not completed before the end of the year in 25 cases.

This year the number of contacts attending has decreased, and although there was a reduction in the total number of tuberculous cases notified, the decrease was much greater proportionately (from 901 to 687). It is difficult to secure the attendance of all contacts and often attendance is delayed until the disease has become too advanced for treatment to prove effective. Of the 86 cases of pulmonary disease found among contacts, 38 had no tubercle bacilli in their sputum, and presumably, therefore, the disease had not passed beyond the early stage.

Proportion of Notified Cases seen.—Table 6 shows the number of notified cases, classified under various forms of the disease, and the number of each seen by the Tuberculosis Officers. It will be noted that the latter saw 82.6 per cent. of the pulmonary cases notified, and 63.8 per cent. of non-pulmonary cases. From the pulmonary point of view, this is very satisfactory, but I think more cases of glandular tuberculosis might be referred to the Dispensaries. The cases labelled Meningitis are of acute disease and usually fatal, so that in most instances no examination by the Tuberculosis Officer is possible.

Health Visiting.—There has been no change in the scheme of Health Visiting of tuberculous cases during the year, which is undertaken by the whole-time staff in the populous areas and by district nurses in the rural portions of the County. This work is controlled from the Dispensaries by the Tuberculosis Officers, who hold periodic conferences with the Health Visitors as to their work.

Table 7, showing the bedroom accommodation of patients, has been drawn up from the reports made by the Health Visitors. In only 42.1 per cent. of cases was it possible to secure a separate bedroom for each patient. Out of 2,444 cases investigated as to domiciliary conditions, only 53.7 per cent. of patients were able to have a bed to themselves; 41.5 per cent. shared a bed with one other person, and in 4.8 per cent, cases a bed was shared with more than one person. Although the figures just quoted are still lamentably low, there has been a slow improvement in housing conditions during the last twelve years, for in 1928 only 25.1 per cent. patients had separate bedrooms, whilst in 1939 the figure was 42.1. I am glad to note this fact, for at one time the figures appeared to be stationary and, but for the tact and initiative of the Health Visitor in persuading householders to give up their spare living room as a bedroom for the patient, or otherwise re-arrange the accommodation in the house, I have no doubt that there would be an even smaller proportion of patients with separate bedrooms. This question of housing is bound up with all public health activities and the practice of preventive medicine, and with the amount of work that is undertaken by Local Authorities in housing.

Observation Cases.—As in former years, the Tuberculosis Officers sent difficult cases to the residential institutions for observation when the diagnosis could not be determined at the dispensaries. In this way 43 cases were dealt with in 1939, of which 24 proved to be suffering from tuberculosis, 14 non-tuberculous, whilst I remained undiagnosed at the end of the year, and 4 left the institutions before a diagnosis could be made.

X-Ray Examinations.—The installations provided by the Joint Board have been used to an increasing extent. This is probably accounted for by the large increase in the number of refills given during the year. Serial X-Ray examinations, both by screening and the taking of skiagrams, are essential to ensure the best results from pneumothorax treatment.

The service of Consultant Radiologists is available in each area and at the Sanatoria. In the search for signs of early disease, other conditions than tuberculosis are frequently found and it is here that the opinion of an independent Radiologist is valuable.

Artificial Pneumothorax.—The number of cases receiving this form of treatment shows a large increase this year, and is shewn in the following table. It will be noted that a number of inductions was carried out at two Dispensaries.

Home Visits and Consultations by Tuberculosis Officers.—533 consultations with the family doctor took place at the homes of patients or elsewhere, and 3,500 at the dispensaries, in connection with the diagnosis of difficult cases or the treatment of others. 1,511 home visits, including personal consultations, were paid by the Tuberculosis Officers.

Home Nursing.—The arrangements made previously continued during the year. Home nursing of cases recommended by the Tuberculosis Officers is undertaken by local Nursing Associations, at a charge of 50s. per case per annum. During the year, 85 patients received home nursing, of whom 64 were new cases.

Extra Nourishment.—In 1939, 48 cases received extra nourishment at a cost of £158. Such cases are recommended by the Tuberculosis Officer after investigation of the physical and financial conditions of the patient, and the recommendation of the Ministry of Health, in their Circular of March, 1927, is always borne in mind, i.e., food should be supplied only to patients who are likely to benefit materially thereby. The Ministry suggested that the classes of patients likely to benefit from the provision of extra nourishment were the following:—

- (a) Patients who have received an adequate course of sanatorium treatment, and whose medical condition is such that with the grant of extra nourishment they may be expected to maintain or recover full working capacity; and
- (b) Patients in whose cases ultimate arrest of the disease may be reasonably anticipated and who are waiting for admission to sanatorium.

It will thus be seen that extra nourishment is to be regarded as an ancillary to sanatorium treatment rather than a substitute for it.

Supply and Supervision of Shelters.—There are 60 shelters in use in the three areas of the Board, thus:—

The new type of shelter, of which twelve have been provided by the Joint Board to replace dilapidated old ones, continues to give satisfactory service. These shelters are bigger and more suited to the needs of domiciliary cases than the old variety, and thus it is hoped patients will be encouraged to use them all the year round instead of only in the summer. Except in the South, where the erection, repair and dismantling of the shelters is undertaken from Prestwood Sanatorium, this work is performed by the District Councils, who through their Officers render us much assistance in this way. In addition, the Inspectors of Health Visitors visit and report periodically on the use of the shelters.

Ministry of Health, Annual Returns.—These returns have been curtailed on account of the war conditions. Table A only is now required.

Care and After-Care.—No change has taken place during the year in the working of the Care and After-Care Scheme. The Board makes grants to the Voluntary Committees of an average of £3 per assisted case.

Quarterly Reports from each Committee are sent to the Joint Board giving details of their activities, and I gladly bear witness to the value of the work undertaken, without which it would be impossible for many persons to receive sanatorium treatment. Although the scope of their work is still somewhat hampered by lack of funds, the time and trouble taken by members of the Committees in individual cases is much appreciated by those responsible for the treatment scheme, as well as by the patients themselves, for the members of these Committees have undertaken voluntary work of the highest importance to patients, that could not be done so well by the Joint Board. As an example of the work carried out, I give below details supplied by the Tuberculosis Officers, showing the type of assistance afforded during the year, classified in main Dispensary areas, and the number of cases helped in this way.

The institutions provided by the Joint Board are for lung cases only. During 1939 there were 200 such beds for men, 118 for women, and 60 for children.

The treatment of cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis is undertaken at outside institutions. Ninety-five of the 114 available beds are provided at Standon Hall Hospital, by arrangement with the Staffordshire County Council.

Prestwood Sanatorium.—The outbreak of war has caused the postponement of the building of the extensions, which will be of such value to the Sanatorium. The trying conditions of the black-out and the possibility of air raids emphasise the need for full time occupation of the patient's mind and the facilities for this have now unavoidably been lessened. The repair of the old Recreation

Hut must suffice until happier times. If the incidence of tuberculosis follows the tendency shewn in the last war, the Sanatorium will be called upon to undertake more work, and the present accommodation for Radiology, Dentistry, Dispensing, and for the Nurses will be still more inadequate.

The Sanatorium is recognised as a training centre for nurses by the Tuberculosis Association, and it is hoped that the facilities available will, in the future, attract the type of nurse in the numbers we require.

GENERAL REMARKS :-

"Owing to the war, the normal year's work has been considerably interfered with. On the outbreak of hostilities the whole Sanatorium, with the exception of a few cases, was evacuated, and preparation made for the reception of Civilian Casualties. This necessitated some alterations which were carried out on the Ministry's advice. A large quantity of medical and surgical stores, hospital equipment etc., has also been received here and stored. The blacking-out of the Institution was a difficult and a long job. As time went on and it was realised that these hospital beds for casualties would not be immediately required, permission was given for the Sanatorium to revert temporarily to tis original use, and from that time tuberculous cases were re-admitted. It may be noted that nearly every case re-admitted showed considerable deterioration.

"Of necessity, when evacuation took place, such things as the Occupational Therapy Scheme which had been so successful had to be abandoned, and on account of the uncertainty of future developments the Committee considered it wise not to risk spending any more money on construction work in connection with it at present. However, such things as gardening and other light occupations have been resumed, and many of the patients have kept up scarf-making, knitting, etc.

"It has unfortunately also been found impossible to proceed with the erection of the new Recreation Block which is so very badly needed, but an attempt is being made to make part of the old hut more habitable so that it may serve for the time being.

"The work done by the various Consultants continues to be very helpful.

"Continual use is also made of the facilities provided by the County Laboratory, and the assistance given in pathological examinations is of the greatest value.

"During the year five nurses have gained the certificate of the Tuberculosis Association."

Groundslow Sanatorium.—It is anticipated that the extensions at Groundslow Sanatorium, noted in my Report for 1937, will shortly be finished. When the additional beds provided by these extensions are made available, it is hoped that no case requiring active treatment will have to wait a long time before admission to the Sanatorium.

With regard to the work carried out at Groundslow Sanatorium during the year, Dr. Parkinson, who acts as Medical Superintendent as well as Tuberculosis Officer in the Central Area, has supplied me with the following report:—

TUBERCULOSIS ASSOCIATION EXAMINATION: -

During the year, one probationer nurse entered for the Preliminary Examination and was successful.

GENERAL REMARKS :-

"The work at Groundslow Sanatorium was carried out on the usual lines until the outbreak of the war when it became necessary to send home as many patients as possible. During the last week of August, 76 beds were occupied by patients suffering from tuberculosis, on August 31st and September 1st, 72 of these were discharged home and 25 patients were received from the North Staffordshire Royal Infirmary. Men, women and children, chiefly suffering from surgical conditions were accommodated, together with two other patients from Stoke-on-Trent who could not be admitted to the Infirmary. A few of these patients were re-admitted to the North Staffordshire Royal Infirmary, but the majority were sent home as soon as they were fit. The last of these patients were discharged on October 7th.

[&]quot;During September when the Sanatorium was included in the Emergency Hospital Scheme, the additional beds provided by the Ministry of Health were set up, and on October 30th the total number available was 147. Later the Sanatorium was released from the scheme.

"Permission was accorded on November 10th to re-admit cases of Tuberculosis, and the first arrived on November 16th, but the beds available had been reduced by building operations on the new extensions. The demolition of the large hut (14 beds) and subsequent building operations made the use of 14 huts inadvisable. Further difficulties have arisen owing to the closing of the Recreation Hut and the Dining Room. At the end of December, the total number of beds that could be used was 50.

"The information given in the preceding tables cannot be compared with that furnished in previous years owing to the sudden evacuation that took place".

Edge View Sanatorium, Kinver.—The wisdom of the decision to re-open Edge View Sanatorium, Kinver, for the reception of female pulmonary cases is again confirmed by the use made of the Institution during 1939. Patients from the south of the Joint Board's Area are willing to go there, whereas previously they might have refused to go as far afield as Groundslow, and when they are at Edge View they stay for a fair length of time, though not, in all cases, as long as one could wish.

Dr. Stevenson, the Medical Superintendent of Prestwood Sanatorium, also looks after Edge View Sanatorium, and any special investigations that may be required, such as X-Ray examinations, are arranged by taking the patients to Prestwood by ambulance.

Dr. Stevenson has provided me with the following account of the work carried out at Edge View during 1939:—

Himley Sanatorium.—No change has taken place in policy at Himley Sanatorium, to which children are sent suffering from pulmonary disease, as well as glandular and abdominal tuberculosis.

I give below some details as to the patients admitted and discharged during the year, supplied by Dr. Stevenson, who acts as Medical Superintendent. It will be noted that of the 27 pulmonary cases admitted during the year, 10 were observation and 12 were placed in the class T.B.—. Many of the T.B.— cases were delicate or debilitated children suffering from old non-active disease of the lungs, and it is anticipated that when the County Council have completed the Open-Air School they are providing, the majority of this class of case from the County Elementary Education Area will prove suitable for admission there rather than to Himley.

[&]quot;Owing to the war, the number of patients willing to come for treatment has been somewhat reduced, but recently an improvement has been noticed. The cases have been on the whole fairly advanced, and many are obviously those who could not be properly looked after at home. Those earlier cases for whom much more can be done in the way of treatment have all done well.

[&]quot;Patients are conveyed as before to Prestwood for X-ray.

[&]quot;The Dentist who visits Prestwood also visits this Sanatorium. Much has been done to increase the patients' comfort, and credit is due to the Staff for organising recreation, games, etc., which does so much to relieve the monotony of Sanatorium life."

GENERAL REMARKS.

- "The benefits received by the children at Himley have again been striking. Several young children who were admitted in a very weak and poorly nourished condition have made wonderful progress.
- "As previously, the children are conveyed regularly to Prestwood by ambulance for X-ray examination, and great help has been given by the County Laboratory in the pathological work.
- "During the year we have had 10 cases of Chicken Pox, otherwise we have kept free of Infectious Diseases.
 - "Several structural improvements have been made to improve the comfort of the children.
- "School.—The attendance at school has been well maintained, there being an average attendance of 27.26. As this is in the open air, the children attending school do so under ideal conditions.
- "Dental Treatment.—Much good and important work has again been carried out by the Dental Officer, who visits the Institution weekly.
- "The Vicar of Himley visits the Institution regularly and takes a great interest in the children's welfare which is much appreciated."

Table 9 has been prepared as in former years to show the condition of children 6 months after their discharge from Himley Sanatorium. It indicates what good results have been obtained, and that, in the majority of cases, the return to often adverse home conditions has not had the bad effect that might have been predicted.

Treatment and Training.—As in previous years, the Joint Board have been responsible for the concurrent treatment and training of patients at various centres. Eight cases continued their training courses from the previous year and 5 of them were discharged during 1939. Of the latter, three were placed in employment by the Training College, one started his own boot business; the remaining Trainee was dismissed on disciplinary grounds. The other three patients continued their training. Three new cases were sent for training during the year, but only one has continued. One of the cases proved unsuitable for training and the other left at his own request. Thus at the end of 1939, four patients remained under training.

Institutional Treatment.—As mentioned previously, the usual tables giving details of the work of the residential institutions have been suspended owing to war time.

Surgical Appliances.—148 special surgical appliances were provided by the Joint Board for 69 patients who were treated at the Royal Cripples' Hospital, Birmingham. These were:—Special Boots, 41; Supports, 24; Calipers, 10; Phelps Soles, 10; Spicas, 11; Crutches, 5; Straps, 9; Pattens, 17; Plasters, 7; Irons, 2; various small appliances, 12. In addition, the Joint Board paid for repairs or alterations to 74 surgical appliances, boots, etc., for 45 patients, and for the cost of 97 X-Ray Films taken in respect of 50 cases.

Treatment at Residential Institutions of Ex-Service Men.—As in former years, the policy of offering preferential treatment to Ex-Service men suffering from tuberculosis, recognised by the Ministry of Pensions as being attributable to, or aggravated by, war service, has been continued. During the year, 7 cases were treated at Prestwood Sanatorium, compared with 11 last year.

Dental Treatment.—Mr. Jones, the County Dental Officer, reports as follows:—

"The arrangements for the dental treatment of patients for the Joint Board, outlined in previous Annual Reports, continued until September. The state of National Emergency then necessitated the evacuation of certain Sanatoria. As the scheme embraces patients attending the Dispensaries, it was possible to continue the dental treatment of patients thus evacuated at the Dispensaries, until the re-opening of the Sanatoria towards the end of the year enabled a resumption of the normal method.

"The Dental Officers in charge of the work at Groundslow and Prestwood Sanatoria were called for service with the Army Dental Corps early in the war and some re-arrangement was necessitated to take over their duties.

"In addition to the operations summarised in the preceding Table, 18 administrations of a general anæsthetic have to be recorded, for dental operations, at Standon. The administrations (of nitrous-oxide gas and oxygen) were given by the Resident Medical Officer.

"The Dispensary patients attended at the dental clinics at Stafford, Lichfield, Biddulph, Brierley Hill, Leek and Tamworth, and at the Dispensaries at Dudley, Cannock, Wednesbury, Wolverhampton, Newcastle, Biddulph, Cheadle, and at temporary clinics at Pelsall and Brownhills.

"Among the adults seen were patients already wearing artifical teeth and 29 of these required repairs to render them efficient. In addition, 96 new dentures were supplied during the year, the After-Care Committees making grants in deserving cases to meet the expense of providing same. The average number of visits per patient treated was 3.8, indicating that the conditions treated were less serious than in preceding years when the figure was 4.0. It is not possible, nor advisable, to carry out extensive operations at one visit for patients with tuberculosis.

"The fillings comprised 1 amalgam, 117 amalgam and cement, and 17 cement. The records kept of the operative measures undertaken reveal that 2,684 operations were completed during the year. Of the 457 patients inspected, 118 were found to require no further dental treatment, 18 desired to be attended by their own dentists, and 321 were treated under the Board's Scheme."

General Remarks.

The outbreak of war disturbed the work of the Joint Board considerably, and, owing to the suspension of a number of statistical tables, prevents the Report being completed as in former years. In September the Prestwood and Groundslow Sanatoria were asked to send home all those patients who were not gravely ill, to make room for air raid casualties. When it was realised that the war was not taking the expected course the sanatoria were released from the Emergency Hospital Scheme. Thus, the figures given for admissions and discharges, etc., in these sanatoria are not strictly comparable with those for former years.

In spite of the troubled conditions the work of the Board has been carried on with little or no reduction. There were fewer cases attending at the Dispensaries (3,132 against 3,425), which is due to a reduction in the number of contacts attending. Reference has been made previously to the difficulty in securing their attendance and possibly the black-out has been a further factor in reducing the number this year. However, the total number of attendances at the Dispensaries has not decreased, while the number of refills given was the enormous increase of 1,002; the use of the X-ray installations is similarly increased. These facts may be accounted for by the increased work thrown on the Dispensaries during the time the sanatoria were evacuated. The number of inductions and refills performed at the institutions show a reduction this year.

I am now able to give the figures relating to a full year's working of the scheme which provides for Surgical Consultants. These are shown on page 15. It will be noted that in 7 cases collapse of the lung was secured by operation, and in 19 other cases surgical intervention was needed to enable the effective collapse of the lung to be obtained. The facility for this form of treatment places another weapon in the hands of the medical staff in combating tuberculosis.


It is pleasant to record that both the attack rate and the death rate from pulmonary tuberculosis reached the lowest figure ever recorded by the Board, the previous best years were 1938, and 1936 and 1938 respectively. When compared with the death rate of 0.74 in 1922, this year's figure (0.52 per 1,000) is an indisputable index of the progress made by the Tuberculosis Service. An equally satisfactory figure can be quoted in respect of non-pulmonary disease. The death rate was 0.09 per 1,000, which is the lowest figure yet recorded in the area of the Board, and the same applies to the attack rate of 0.10 per 1,000. These figures are given in Tables 3 and 4 on pages 8 and 9 and it will be seen that while the general tendency is towards a reduction, variations are bound to occur from year to year.

During the last war there was a considerable increase in the incidence of tuberculosis and the same tendency is likely in this war. I wish to stress the importance of maintaining at the present high standard the treatment provided by the Board, and, if possible, of increasing this during wartime. The new factors of air raids, with the accompanying black-out, cause an unsettled state of mind of the patients, and this makes it more necessary than ever to provide interests in the sanatorium to occupy their minds and to encourage a sufficiently long stay.
