GROUNDSTLOW SANATORIUM.—The patients in residence at Groundslow during the year varied from 44 to 108, the number on the 31st March, 1943, being 106. The full number of beds (110) provided for in the Extensions Scheme became available on the 13th July, 1942.

EDGE VIEW SANATORIUM, KINVER.—The number of patients in residence at this Sanatorium during the year varied from 29 to 38, the number on the 31st March, 1943, being 37.

PRESTWOOD SANATORIUM.—The number of patients at Prestwood during the year varied from 154 to 191, the number on the 31st March, 1943, being 191.

THE LIMES SANATORIUM, HIMLEY.—The number of patients in residence at this Sanatorium during the year varied from 47 to 60, the number at the 31st March, 1943, being 60.

AFTER-CARE.—The amount expended on this service for the financial year ended 31st March, 1943, was £255, as against £368 for the previous year.

STATISTICS.—The Medical Officer has prepared the usual Statistical Report for the year ended the 31st December, 1942, together with certain observations on the working of the Scheme (see Appendix).

APPENDIX.

Report of the Medical Officer for the Year ended 31st December, 1942.

Incidence of and Mortality from Tuberculosis.

On 31st December, 1942, there were 8,531 cases of tuberculosis on the Registers of the Medical Officers of Health of the various districts in the area of the Joint Board. Of these, 5,870 were suffering from pulmonary disease, and 2,661 were suffering from other forms of tuberculosis. Compared with 1941 these figures show an increase in pulmonary cases of 212 and 60 in other forms of tuberculosis.

Every notified case of tuberculosis is registered by the Medical Officer of Health of the area in which the patient lives and the name can only be removed from the Register in the case of :—

- (1) Recovery from disease—that is, in pulmonary cases when there have been no signs or symptoms for 5 years and in other forms of tuberculosis for 3 years.
- (2) Death.
- (3) Removal from the district.

The names of patients who come under the care of the Tuberculosis Officers are placed on the Tuberculosis Dispensary Registers, and these are only removed under conditions similar to those outlined above.

The details of cases on the Registers of the Medical Officers of Health are as follows :—

In 1942, 484 persons died of pulmonary tuberculosis compared with 534 in 1941. The death-rate per 1,000 of the population is 0.49, compared with a rate for the previous year of 0.54. There were 117 deaths from other forms of tuberculosis, yielding a death-rate of 0.12, whilst in 1941, 146 deaths occurred. On comparing the number of known cases of tuberculosis with the number of deaths that took place during the year, it was found that the proportion of deaths to cases was 1 to 14.2.

In Table I, new cases and deaths, classified according to age and sex, are shown.

In 1940 the Registrar-General altered the age groups of deaths, the former age groups ranging from 5 to 64 having been merged into three groups for ages 5—14, 15—44 and 45—64, and so an exact comparison with the figures for the groups before 1940 is impossible. In previous Reports I have mentioned a higher mortality rate of pulmonary tuberculosis of the 15—24 female group, which remains an important problem.

N.B.—The above figures of "New Cases" do not include cases coming to the knowledge of Medical Officers of Health otherwise than by formal notification.

Table 2 has been prepared to show the numbers of notifications and the death-rates, for each Sanitary District in the area of the Joint Board. A similar Table will be found in each Annual Report for many years, and I would refer the reader who is specially interested in any district to these Reports, for it is only by comparing the death-rates over a number of years that one can arrive at a just estimate of the incidence of disease in a Sanitary District.

In Table 3, the death-rates for the Administrative County, divided into Urban and Rural Districts, and Wolverhampton and Dudley County Boroughs, are shown separately for 29 years. Also in this Table are shown the death-rates from phthisis and other forms of tuberculosis in the area of the Joint Board as a whole since 1922.

It will be noted that the rate for pulmonary disease for 1942 is the lowest figure recorded in the area of the Board. Some fluctuation is bound to take place from year to year, and though it is extremely satisfactory to note this rate in the third year of war, it is to be expected that the rate will tend to rise.

This Table also shows that the Urban Areas still have a higher death-rate from phthisis than the Rural, which is, of course, to be expected. The death-rates from non-pulmonary disease do not show the same contrast between the Urban and Rural Areas.

Notifications. During 1942, 1,043 cases of tuberculosis were notified, compared with 1,036 in the previous year. Eight hundred and forty-six were cases of pulmonary disease and 197 of other forms of tuberculosis.

The attack rates per 1,000 of the population for the last 18 years are shown in Table 4. It will be noted that this year's figures are the highest since at least 1938.

Tuberculosis Scheme of Treatment.

During the period under review it has not been possible to proceed with the erection of the proposed new Dispensary at Wednesbury.

It has been clear for some time that the amount of work done by the Tuberculosis Officers had so increased that it was becoming difficult for them to give proper attention to each patient. This was partly due to the increase in population but largely to the change in the methods of diagnosis and treatment of tuberculosis. The Board therefore decided, as a temporary measure, probably for the duration of the war, to appoint an Assistant Tuberculosis Officer, an additional Tuberculosis Nurse and another Clerk to the Wolverhampton Area and to link the latter with the Wednesbury Dispensary Area.

New Cases.—In 1942, 4,194 persons attended for examination at the various Dispensaries for the first time. On referring to Table 5 the actual numbers sent by Medical Practitioners, School Medical Inspectors and Health Visitors are shown. As would be expected, Medical Practitioners sent the majority of the patients.

A satisfactory feature of the table is the large number of persons who were found not to be suffering from tuberculosis. Out of 4,194 persons who attended the Dispensaries, only 25.2 per cent. of the 4,127 cases diagnosed were found to be actually suffering from the disease. Because the onset is so insidious, tuberculosis is often very difficult to diagnose, yet early treatment gives a patient a much better prospect of recovery. Hence it is gratifying to note that the opinion of the Tuberculosis Officers is sought about so many doubtful cases. It shows the confidence placed in their skill and I hope that this side of the work will increase still further.

Of the 794 contacts who presented themselves at the Dispensaries for examination, 119 were found to be suffering from tuberculosis, 649 were classified non-tuberculous, and the diagnoses were not completed before the end of the year in 26 cases.

This year the number of contacts attending has increased slightly, but the ratio to the number of cases notified was not altered. It is difficult to secure the attendance of all contacts and often attendance is delayed until the disease has become too advanced for treatment to prove effective. Of the 108 cases of pulmonary disease found among contacts, 47 had no tubercle bacilli in their sputum, and presumably, therefore, the disease had not passed beyond the early stage.

National Service (Armed Forces) Act.

Arrangements were made by the Minister of Health in 1940 whereby the Chairman of any Civilian Medical Board for the examination of men called up for duty with the Services could obtain a specialist opinion in any case suspected of tuberculosis. In each area the Tuberculosis Authority was asked to make their facilities available, and during the year reports were made by the Tuberculosis Officers in the area served by the Board.

In May, 1942, the Minister of Health made Regulations requiring the supply of similar information regarding the tuberculous history of women called before medical boards for enlistment in the Women's Auxiliary Forces, and the procedure laid down was immediately put into effect.

Proportion of Notified Cases seen.—Table 6 shows the number of notified cases, classified under various forms of the disease, and the number of each seen by the Tuberculosis Officers. It will be noted that the latter saw 91.4 per cent. of the pulmonary cases notified, and 59.9 per cent. of non-pulmonary cases. From the pulmonary point of view, this is very satisfactory, but I think more cases of glandular tuberculosis might be referred to the Dispensaries. The cases labelled Meningitis are of acute disease and usually fatal, so that in most instances no examination by the Tuberculosis Officer is possible.

Nurses' Home Visits.—There has been no change in the scheme of Health Visiting of tuberculous cases during the year, which is undertaken by the whole-time staff in the populous districts and by District Nurses in the rural portions of the area. This work is controlled from the Dispensaries by the Tuberculosis Officers, who, in peacetime, held periodic conferences with the Health Visitors about their work. Under war conditions these conferences have been curtailed, but it was possible to hold one course of lectures in Wolverhampton, and as many nurses as were able attended.

Table 7, showing the bedroom accommodation of patients, has been drawn up from the reports made by the Health Visitors. In only 47.5 per cent. of cases was it possible to secure a

separate bedroom for each patient. Out of 2,383 cases investigated as to domiciliary conditions, only 56.8 per cent. of patients were able to have a bed to themselves ; 39.1 per cent. shared a bed with one other person, and in 4.1 per cent. cases a bed was shared with more than one person. Although the figures just quoted are still low, there was an improvement in housing conditions during the years before the war, for in 1928 only 25.1 per cent. patients had separate bedrooms, whilst in 1942 the figure was 47.5. I am glad to note this fact, for at one time the figures appeared to be stationary and, but for the tact and initiative of the Health Visitors in persuading householders to re-arrange the living accommodation, I have no doubt that there would be an even smaller proportion of patients with separate bedrooms. This question of housing as it affects tuberculous patients is bound up with all public health activities and the practice of preventive medicine, and with the amount of work that is undertaken by Local Authorities in housing generally.

Observation Cases.—As in former years, the Tuberculosis Officers sent difficult cases to the residential institutions for observation when the diagnosis could not be determined at the dispensaries. In this way 13 cases were dealt with in 1942, of which 5 proved to be suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis and 6 to be non-tuberculous, whilst 2 cases remained undiagnosed at the end of the year ; in addition, 7 cases of suspected non-pulmonary tuberculosis were admitted to Standon Hall. Six of these proved tuberculous, and the remaining case was still under observation at the end of the year.

X-Ray Examinations.—The Tuberculosis Officers have continued to make full use of the installations provided by the Joint Board. Serial X-Ray examinations, both by screening and the taking of skiagrams, are essential to ensure the best results from pneumothorax treatment.

Home Visits and Consultations by Tuberculosis Officers.—734 consultations with family doctors took place at the homes of patients or elsewhere, and 3,883 at the Dispensaries, in connection with the diagnoses of difficult cases or the treatment of others. Home visits totalled 1,202, including personal consultations paid by the Tuberculosis Officers.

Home Nursing.—The arrangements made previously continued during the year. Home nursing of cases recommended by the Tuberculosis Officers is undertaken by local Nursing Associations, at a charge of 50s. per case per annum. During the year, 59 patients received home nursing, of whom 41 were new cases.

Extra-Nourishment.—During the calendar year 1942, 37 cases received extra-nourishment at a cost of £99. Such cases are recommended by the Tuberculosis Officer after investigation of the physical and financial conditions of the patient, and the recommendation of the Ministry of Health, in their Circular of March, 1927, is always borne in mind, i.e., food should be supplied only to patients who are likely to benefit materially thereby. The Ministry suggested that the classes of patients likely to benefit from the provision of extra-nourishment were the following :—

- (a) Patients who have received an adequate course of sanatorium treatment, and whose medical condition is such that with the grant of extra-nourishment they may be expected to maintain or recover full working capacity; and
- (b) Patients in whose cases ultimate arrest of the disease may be reasonably anticipated and who are waiting for admission to sanatorium.

It will thus be seen that extra-nourishment is to be regarded as an ancillary to sanatorium treatment rather than a substitute for it.

Supply and Supervision of Shelters.—There are 44 shelters in use in the three areas of the Board, thus :—

The new type of shelter, of which twelve were provided by the Joint Board to replace dilapidated old ones, continues to give satisfactory service. These shelters are bigger and more suited to the needs of domiciliary cases than the old variety, and thus it is hoped patients will be encouraged to use them all the year round instead of only in the summer. Except in the South, where the erection, repair and dismantling of the shelters is undertaken from Prestwood Sanatorium, this work is performed by the District Councils, who through their Officers render us much assistance in this way. In addition, the Inspectors of Health Visitors visit and report periodically on the use of the shelters.

Care and After-Care Work.—No major change has taken place during the year in the working of the Care and After-Care Scheme. The Board's grant made to the Voluntary Committees of £3 per case assisted was increased during the year to £4. This was on account of the increased cost of the goods supplied to the patients and consideration is given by the Finance Committee to exceed this amount in special cases.

Quarterly reports from each Committee are sent to the Joint Board giving details of their activities, and I gladly bear witness to the value of the work undertaken, without which it would be impossible for many persons to receive sanatorium treatment. Although the scope of the work could always be wider by increasing the funds, in several areas considerable sums were raised by voluntary effort and subscription. In particular the Cannock Committee held a Seal Sale and the Newcastle Committee organised a Flag Day with great success. The time and trouble taken by the members of the Committees in individual cases is much appreciated by those responsible for the treatment scheme, as well as by the patients themselves. I give below details, supplied by the Tuberculosis Officers, showing the assistance afforded during the year, classified in the main Dispensary Areas.

The treatment of cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis is undertaken at outside institutions. Ninety-five of the 120 available beds are provided at Standon Hall Orthopædic Hospital, by arrangement with the Staffordshire County Council.

Prestwood Sanatorium.—The building of the proposed extensions has remained in abeyance on account of the war, but their need becomes no less urgent. Staff shortage, both on the nursing and domestic sides, necessitated a reduction in the occupancy of the Sanatorium, and the retaining of staff is bound up with the comfort or otherwise of their accommodation. The inadequate accommodation for Radiology, Dentistry, Dispensing and Recreation, remains unaltered. War conditions increase the need for full time occupation of the patients' minds and the facilities for this have unavoidably been lessened.

GENERAL REMARKS—

"During the year under review the number of beds occupied had to be reduced because of the shortage of staff. The number, however, never fell below 175, and it is hoped now that the main difficulty has been overcome, both as regards nurses and domestics.

RESULTS OF RATIONING OF FOOD.

"While it is now difficult to obtain sufficient variation of diet, on the whole the results of rationing do not seem to have had any very marked deleterious effect on the patients in general. We have been fortunate in always obtaining a reasonable milk supply which is very important. Every endeavour is made to compensate for the lack of meat, which is often below the pre-war standard both in quality as well as quantity.

"The help of our Consultants is much appreciated, and much good work is done by the visiting Dental Officer.

"Every effort is made to provide suitable recreation for the patients, though we are much handicapped by the lack of suitable facilities.

"During the summer a very successful Flower and Vegetable Show was again held.

"During the year 2 Nurses passed the Tuberculosis Association examination: 1 gained honours."

GENERAL REMARKS—

"During the year the number of available beds was gradually increased from 50 in January, to 70 in April, to 90 in June and in July the maximum number of 110 beds became available. Cavell ward was opened in February and Nightingale ward in June; both these 40 bedded wards are part of the new extensions. They are not quite complete yet as they are still short of some items of electrical equipment but this has not interefered with the proper treatment of the patients.

"The shortage of Nursing Staff noted in 1941 has been considerably alleviated by the employment of ex-tuberculosis nurses and members of the Civil Nursing Reserve. On the domestic side the National Service Office has kept in closer contact with the Sanatorium and the available supply in this connection has generally been much more satisfactory."

GENERAL REMARKS—

"A large proportion of the cases admitted for treatment were fairly advanced, but the majority improved.

"There still exists the handicap of having to transport cases for X-ray to Prestwood, which especially from the point of view of Artificial Pneumothorax treatment is a great disadvantage.

"The standard of diet has not had any marked serious effect on the patients, and as much variety of diet is provided as possible.

"Everything is done to make the patients as happy as possible, and the recreation facilities provided are utilised to the full."

Himley Sanatorium.—No change has taken place in policy at Himley Sanatorium, to which children are sent suffering from pulmonary disease, as well as glandular and abdominal tuberculosis.

GENERAL REMARKS—

"During the year the marked beneficial results of treatment at Himley have been well maintained.

"There have not been any marked ill effects of rationing apparent and most of the children have put on weight often in excess of normal.

"There were 5 mild cases of diphtheria during the year, and 2 of the younger members of the Staff were found to have the disease. There were also 2 cases of mumps.

"Average attendance at School—21.5. The Bed Cases are now receiving regular tuition.

"Religious Services are held regularly.

"Dental Treatment.

The Dental Surgeon attends weekly and this attention to the children's teeth is a most essential part of their treatment.

"During the year there were 99 attendances."

Table 9 has been prepared as in former years to show the condition of children 6 months after their discharge from Himley Sanatorium. It indicates what good results have been obtained, and that, in the majority of cases, the return to often adverse home conditions has not had the bad effect that might have been predicted.

Treatment and Training.—As in previous years, the Joint Board have been responsible for the concurrent treatment and training of patients at various centres. Three patients continued their training from last year.

APPENDIX—continued.

Institutional Treatment.—As mentioned previously, the usual tables giving details of the work of the residential institutions have been suspended owing to the war.

Surgical Appliances.—130 special surgical appliances were provided by the Joint Board for 69 patients who were treated at The Royal Cripples' Hospital, Birmingham. These were:—Spicas, 22 ; Supports, 15 ; Plasters, 15 ; Calipers, 13 ; Phelps Sole, 11 ; Boots, 10 ; Pattens, 8 ; Straps, 5 ; Irons, 3 ; Splints, 2 ; Crutches, 1 ; Frame, 1 ; Pylon, 1 ; Various small appliances, 23. In addition, the Joint Board paid for repairs or alterations to 96 Surgical Appliances, boots etc., for 56 patients, and for the cost of 89 X-ray films taken in respect of 46 cases.

Treatment at Residential Institutions of Ex-Service Men.—As in former years, the policy of offering preferential treatment to Ex-Service men and women suffering from tuberculosis, recognised by the Ministry of Pensions as being attributable to, or aggravated by, war service, has been continued. During the year, 57 cases were treated at Prestwood Sanatorium, compared with 38 last year, and in addition 5 cases were treated at the Robert Jones and Agnes Hunt Orthopaedic Hospital, Oswestry, 2 at Papworth Hall, 2 at the Royal Hospital, Wolverhampton, and 1 at the Woodlands Hospital, Northfield. Two ex-service women were also treated at Groundslow Sanatorium.

Dental Treatment.—This treatment is afforded by arrangement with the Staffordshire County Council, and the County Dental Officer reports as follows:—

“During the year, 19 cases of general anæsthetics were administered at Groundslow and 25 at Standon for dental operations.

“The arrangements for dental treatment during the year 1942 have remained unchanged.

“The number of visits to Institutions were :—Prestwood 25 ; Groundslow, 44 ; Himley, 36 ; Kinver, 8 and Standon, 12. At Prestwood the visits were whole-days, at other Institutions half-days.

“The Dispensary patients attended at the dental clinics at Leek, Lichfield, Wednesfield, Audley, Willenhall, Shelfield, Darlaston and Sedgley, at temporary clinics at Stone and Rugeley, and at the Dispensaries at Dudley, Cannock, Newcastle, Wolverhampton, Wednesbury and Cheadle.

“The average number of visits per patient treated was 4.

“The administrations of general anæsthetics at Groundslow and Standon were given by the Resident Medical Officers of those Institutions.

“The fillings comprised 90 amalgam and cement and 24 cement only and 7 amalgam only.

“The conditions found on inspection were charted, as in previous years, and careful records were made of all operative measures undertaken. From the records it is revealed that 3,432 operations were completed during the year.

“As anticipated, the amount of treatment needed at Groundslow Sanatorium tends to increase and this was specially marked during the latter part of the year. The provision of dentures has a marked effect in making the patients more contented and happier. At Prestwood the reduction of beds available has affected the amount of treatment required and this is further restricted until

the patients are allowed to be out of bed for four hours per diem. The lower age groups (20—30 years) are chiefly men who have been discharged from H.M. Forces and their dental condition is generally excellent owing to treatment of a high order received on active service. The older age groups (30—40 years) are in great need of dental treatment, while the majority of the 40—50 year old group were found to be wearing dentures. In this last connection the following figures are of interest :—

"It is found that the number of women patients wearing dentures does not reach such a high proportion, probably owing to the fact that women as a rule are not in receipt of dental benefit under the National Health Insurance Scheme. In these and other cases the grants from the After-Care and Public Assistance Committees are most useful and enable the most deserving cases to be completed. The dentures supplied were all made in the County Dental Laboratory, thus ensuring a high standard of craftsmanship and quality, combined with marked economy."

General Remarks.

The number of new cases of pulmonary disease showed an increase of 27, comprising all women but one, but the incidence of non-pulmonary disease has shown a reduction. It is a figure which could be reduced to nil.

The death-rate from pulmonary disease is the lowest recorded by the Board (49 v 54) and this could not have been anticipated according to experience in the last war. As it has been achieved in spite of overcrowding in most houses, it suggests that the more even distribution of the available food is the saving factor. These figures, which indicate the state of tuberculosis amongst the community served by the Board, reveal a healthy position which is most satisfactory for the third year of war.

The number of contacts with known cases who attended the Dispensaries was greater than last year, though a higher proportion (15 per cent.) were found to be suffering from tuberculosis of one form or another. Once again the importance of examining contacts is made clear, for if tuberculosis can be treated in the early stages the prospect of cure is much greater.

There has been no deterioration in the provision of separate bedrooms for Dispensary cases.

Apart from the figures given above, the most striking fact in the Report is the increase in work in all directions at the Dispensaries :—Numbers on the Books (3,826 v 3,667) ; Number of attendances (15,980 v 13,714) ; Number of skiagrams (4,281 v 3,416) ; Number of inductions (16 v 14) ; Number of refills (3,806 v 3,031) ; Number of sputum tests (2,640 v 1,695).

It is very gratifying to note that the services offered by the Board are being used to an increased extent, and to help to deal with it the Board decided during the year to appoint an Assistant Tuberculosis Officer, together with an additional Tuberculosis Nurse and a Clerk. These were appointed for duty in the Wolverhampton area, to which the Wednesbury Dispensary Area was attached. This relieved the Dudley area and, at the same time, gave a little help with the work in the old Wolverhampton area. The arrangement is very satisfactory as far as it goes, and is the

best that could be done during the war. As indicated in my Report on this subject, the whole question will require to be reviewed at the end of the war.

Although the year at the Sanatoria brought a similar increase in the work as to the Dispensaries, it has been a year of difficulties, largely due to the shortages of staff. This caused the number of beds available to be reduced from time to time and has hampered efficient running. It will be noticed that the number of cases admitted to Groundslow Sanatorium was double that of 1941 (162 v 80), due to the opening of the new pavilion. Amongst these admissions there was an unusually high proportion of sputum negative cases in young women in the 15—24 age group. Parallel with the increased admissions there was also the increase in the work done. During the year, the 8-bedded pavilion was converted to nurses' accommodation for the use of nurses who have suffered from tuberculosis.

The provision of a talking cinema has helped to entertain the patients at Prestwood Sanatorium, and a silent show has been given from time to time at Himley. This is an improvement, but the long hours of the average patient's stay could be made much pleasanter in all the sanatoria, and I look forward to including this need in the many improvements of the Board's services which will be necessary in future.
