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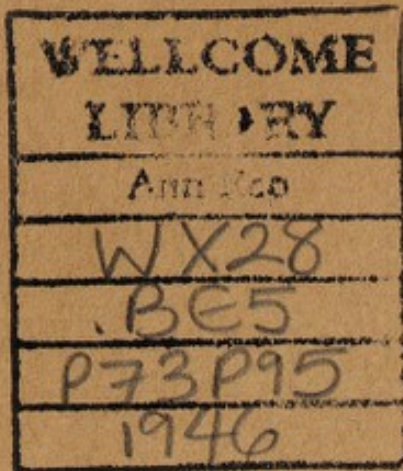

# REPORT

for Year ending December 31st, 1946

THE Board of Management have pleasure in submitting their Report on the work and finances of the Hospital for the year ending 31st December, 1946.

## FROM WAR TO PEACE.

The change over from war to peace has continued and former functions were taken on again. This was reflected in the further reduction from 150 to 30 of the number of beds required by the Government for its Emergency Medical Service, and, on the other hand, by the increase in the number of resident doctors.

Repairs long delayed were completed and war-time damage repaired. Urgently required and necessary equipment was bought though not without considerable expense at enhanced prices.

The Tonsils and Adenoids Ward for child patients, Gymnastic and remedial exercises room, and the extension of the Surgical Out-patients Department, to which reference was made in the last Annual Report, have now been completed.

The new equipment for the kitchens at Greenbank Road and Devonport, and the electric sterilisers for the Devonport Hospital Operating Theatre Suite were installed and have proved of great assistance in the efficient working of the Departments concerned.

Among the essential additions and improvements approved or put in hand were :

The provision of a building to house the Deep X-Ray Therapy Unit referred to in last year's Report.

The re-designing of the Children's Wards at Greenbank Road and Devonport so as to minimise the risk of cross infection and to provide play rooms.

The re-modelling of the X-Ray Diagnostic Departments at Greenbank Road and Devonport in such a way as to meet present-day minimum requirements.

A Recreation Room for Nurses.

A Pathological Laboratory adequate to meet the needs of the area served by the Hospital.

Additions to the Operating Theatre Suite at Devonport.

## CO-OPERATION.

Throughout the year the Board have maintained good relationships with Ministries, Associations, and other hospitals and committees whose aims and interests are similar.

The Joint Admission Bureau, established by the Plymouth Public Health Committee and the Hospital for the purpose of ensuring the immediate admission of all acute medical and surgical cases occurring in the City has simplified their admission with resultant benefit to patients, doctors and hospital staffs.

The Joint Cancer Committee, appointed under the provisions of the Cancer Act, 1939, to bring the cancer service of Devon and Cornwall up to a state of full efficiency, recognised the Hospital as the Administrative Centre for the two counties.

The Public Health Committee of Plymouth and the Board agreed that a very useful purpose would be served by formulating proposals which would indicate the lines on which the hospital services of Plymouth should be developed. Accordingly, a Joint Hospitals Planning Committee was appointed to survey the hospital resources of the City and advise as to their organisation and development as a single unit to serve Plymouth and the surrounding district, pending the establishment of an area hospital on the lines recommended in the Hospital Survey of the South Western area.

To obviate the long waiting periods in the Out-Patients Department, an Appointments System was organised. Patients are now required to book appointments and so be reasonably certain of receiving attention within a comparatively short time of their arrival at the Hospital. The co-operation of patients and doctors ensured the success of the Scheme which has already had far-reaching and beneficial effects.

In co-operation with Bristol University, full support has been given to the Government Scheme for providing post-graduate training facilities for practitioners who have been released from the Services. During the year trainees were given house or registrar appointments for periods of six months.

Consideration of the needs of Devon and Cornwall emphasise the desirability of developing new teaching centres and it would be clearly to the advantage of the South West if a Centre could be developed at or in conjunction with the University College of the South West.

The decisions of the National Joint Council for Hospital Staffs and the Joint Negotiating Committee (Hospital Staffs) were implemented and salary scales in other categories raised.

The Hospital's representation on the Devon County Area Committee of the British Hospitals Association kept the Board in touch with developments of hospital policy.

A highly satisfactory report on the cooking and feeding arrangements was received from the Ministry of Health after a visit by their representative to the Hospital.

### **NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE.**

The National Health Service Bill for England and Wales received the Royal Assent on the 6th November, 1946, and it is intended to bring the new service into operation on the 1st April, 1948.

The Bill was the subject of very careful study by the British Hospitals Association of which the Hospital is a member. The Association secured consideration of a number of constructive amendments resulting in many improvements.

If the Act is administered with the welfare of the patient always paramount, much benefit will accrue.

Although the State will meet all the costs of management, there will still be scope for charitably disposed persons to supplement the efforts of the State by helping to pay for extra comforts and amenities which will not be covered by the State payments.

Indeed, the Act makes provision for the continuance of voluntary service and gifts as aids to patients' comfort and welfare.

For years to come the State will be confronted by an enormous task in its endeavour to meet the needs of all the people. A very considerable number of additional beds will be required; many existing hospitals will have to be modernised or rebuilt; the medical, nursing, domestic and technical staffs will have to be greatly increased numerically; and there must be adequate accommodation for staffs, special departments, service units, nurse-training and administration.

The Act provides the framework and it will be the task of those who will be responsible for the administration to translate it into the flesh and blood of a comprehensive, efficient and humane service. Such an achievement will depend above all on the continued sympathetic approach to the problems of sickness, disease and accident.

The Prince of Wales's Hospital during its century of service has amassed material possessions in land, buildings, equipment and funds valued at over £330,000. In less than a year's time they will be handed over to the State. The Board will do so in the knowledge that the Hospital they pass on is the premier Hospital of the South West—a fitting tribute to the affection which succeeding generations in South Devon and East Cornwall have had for their Hospital.

They take this opportunity of thanking the many thousands of people who have taken a practical and personal interest in the welfare of the patients, and who by their voluntary activities and service to the community have played the part of Good Samaritans.

## FINANCE.

The total Ordinary Income amounted to £98,144.

It is gratifying to record that income from Voluntary Gifts was only £1,766 less than in 1945, if allowance is made for the fact that the 1945 figure included £1,244, the proceeds of Whist Drives held in 1944.

Congratulations are due to the Plymouth and South West Hospitals Contributory Scheme Committee, Officers, Group Secretaries and Collectors for their excellent contribution of £31,321.

In order to maintain the standard of service it was necessary to implement the recommendations of the Rushcliffe and other Committees and Councils with regard to the salaries and wages of practically all sections of the Hospital's staffs. This inevitably led to a big increase in Total Expenditure which amounted to £135,961, compared with £102,229 in the previous year.

It is certain that expenditure will continue to rise, that free legacies will have to be realised, and that the Treasury will have to give support if the Hospital is to be taken over by the State in its present high standard of efficiency.

Expenditure exceeded ordinary income by £37,817 and the deficit was reduced to £29,434 by a transfer from the Free Legacies Account of £8,383.

tion of library books to the patients ; and for their most generous gifts of bedding, linen, clothing, surgical dressings and other hospital equipment.

### **HONORARY MEDICAL AND SURGICAL STAFF.**

The demands made upon the services of members of the Honorary Medical Staff continue to grow and the manner in which these services have been most ungrudgingly given during 1946 is greatly appreciated.

During the year Mr. C. M. Kennedy retired from the post of Honorary Orthopaedic Surgeon. The Board placed on record their high appreciation of the invaluable services which Mr. Kennedy had rendered to the Hospital during his long term of service.

Two further vacancies occurred by the resignation of Dr. T. D. Gillies, Honorary Anaesthetist, and of Dr. Norah Goodbody, Honorary Anaesthetist. The Board also recorded their appreciation of the services rendered to the Hospital and its patients by Drs. Gillies and Goodbody during their period of office.

Members of the Visiting Medical and Surgical Staff were promoted and certain new appointments made during the year as follows :

- Dr. C. D. Lindsay, Emeritus Physician, to be Honorary Consulting Physician.
- Dr. T. A. A. Hunter, Honorary Medical Registrar, to be Honorary Assistant Physician for Diseases of Children.

### **OBITUARY.**

The Board desire to pay tribute to the memory of the following whose services in the capacities mentioned have been lost to the Hospital by death during the year :

Dr. P. Wilmot, Honorary Consulting Surgeon ; Chairman of the Lockyer Street House Committee since 1934 ; and Chairman of the Board of Management of the former Central Hospital, Lockyer Street. He had been connected with this Hospital for thirty-two years.

Mr. A. J. M. Venning, member of the Board since the amalgamation of the three Voluntary General Hospitals of Plymouth and Honorary Treasurer of the former Royal Albert Hospital, Devonport.

### **BOARD OF MANAGEMENT AND HOUSE COMMITTEES.**

The resignation of Mr. H. F. Vellacott in October last was received with regret and a deep sense of gratitude for his past services.

The Board welcomed Mr. L. W. Innes, a nominee of the Medical Committee, and Shpt. Lt.-Comdr. R. C. Ward, who was re-elected in July.

Lieut. T. C. Adams, R.N., was elected to the Devonport House Committee in place of Mr. Councillor A. E. Taylor, resigned.

Mr. W. J. Gilbert succeeded the late Dr. P. Wilmot as Chairman of the Lockyer Street Hospital House Committee.

### **CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.**

For the grant of £31,321 10s. 0d. from the Plymouth and South West Hospitals Contributory Scheme, the Board expresses its gratitude to the members of the Committee, Organisers, Group Secretaries and Collectors. It is gratitude not only for money received, but also for the proof of the affection in which our Hospital is still held.

### **NURSING.**

The Nursing Staff of the Hospital numbered 202, of whom 126 were in training.

Thanks are due to the Sister-Tutors and the Ward Sisters for the care and attention they gave to ensure that Student Nurses are well equipped with both theoretical and practical knowledge to qualify as State Registered Nurses. Twenty-nine Student Nurses so qualified in 1946.

Miss M. Dixon succeeded Miss U. Farfor as Assistant Matron, Greenbank Road, in September.

Sister M. M. Jackman returned to duty after four years on Military service.

After many years service, Miss L. Cotes, Sister-in-Charge of the Out-Patients Department, Greenbank Road, tendered her resignation. In accepting this, the Board recorded their appreciation of her loyal and devoted service to the Hospital and its patients.

The Councils representative of the Sisters and Nurses held regular meetings, thus affording opportunity for discussion of questions affecting the well-being of the Hospital from the point of view of the Nursing Staff.

## **PRIVATE PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT.**

Increased use was made of the wards for private patients. Many people of moderate means, who were not eligible financially for admission to the general wards of the Hospital, took advantage of this service during 1946.

835 patients were admitted, and the average number resident daily was 27.36.

## **STAFF CHANGES.**

Under the Government's post-graduate training scheme for demobilised medical officers, Mr. R. D. N. Bisset and Mr. W. B. Waterfall were appointed Surgical Registrars in July and November respectively.

It was with regret that the Board received the resignation of Mr. F. T. Ackland who for fifty years served the Hospital as Clerk of Works. As a tribute to his fine record of service the Gymnastic and Remedial Exercises Room was named after him. Mr. Ackland took with him the good wishes of the Board and the members of all the Hospital's staffs.

Mr. H. Ackland was appointed Clerk of Works in succession to his father in August.

The Rev. A. H. Marks was appointed Chaplain to the Hospital in February, in succession to the Rev. R. J. W. Morris, who left the City.

## **THANKS.**

The Board record their sincere thanks to all those who by their voluntary service or generous financial help contributed to the welfare of the patients during 1946.

Appreciation is expressed to every member of the Nursing, Technical, Administrative and other Staffs for the very competent manner in which they have carried out their duties and ensured a smooth running and efficient hospital service in difficult times.

They also wish to thank the Chaplains and all Clergymen and Ministers of Religion ; the Lockyer Street Ladies' Committee and the Devonport Entertainments Committee for their splendid work and gifts in kind ; the Committees and Staffs of the Crownhill and Pearn Convalescent Homes ; the members of the three Linen Leagues ; the Ministry of Health for the allocation of an Audiometer to the Hospital's Ear, Nose and Throat Department ; the Officers and Members of the National Council of Social Service ; the Cripples' Aid Association ; the St. John Ambulance Association ; the Liaison Officer of the British Red Cross Society and Order of St. John ; the City Police ; the W.V.S. ; the local Press for their

# GIFTS TO HOSPITALS

After the passing of the National Health Service Act, 1946.

Intending donors may still make gifts to the hospital with the assurance that their benefactions will be applied in accordance with their intentions and for the benefit of the hospital under the new service.

Donors are asked to make use of the forms of gift set out below.

## I. FOR USE BEFORE THE APPOINTED DAY (April, 1948)

- (1) FORM OF GIFT WHERE THE DONOR WISHES TO BENEFIT THE PRINCE OF WALES'S HOSPITAL, PLYMOUTH, BUT WITHOUT EARMARKING THE MONEY FOR ANY SPECIAL PURPOSE.

(a) In a Will :

*"I give and bequeath to the Prince of Wales's Hospital, Plymouth the sum of £..... free of duty for the purposes of that Hospital. And I direct that the said sum shall be administered by the Prince of Wales's Hospital, Plymouth, as a capital fund separate from the general funds of the Hospital. And as from the appointed day under the National Health Service Act shall be applicable by the Hospital Management Committee for any purpose other than the general maintenance of the Hospital at the Committee's discretion."*

(OR shall be applied for such special purposes as are indicated by the donor.)

- (b) Gift made during the lifetime of the donor. The gift should be accompanied by a written direction by the donor to the following effect :—

*"I direct that the said sum of £..... shall be applied by the Prince of Wales's Hospital, Plymouth, as a capital fund to be administered separately from the general funds of the Hospital."*

- (2) FORM OF GIFT FOR A SPECIAL PURPOSE OF A CAPITAL NATURE.

(a) In a Will :

*"I give and bequeath to the Prince of Wales's Hospital, Plymouth, the sum of £..... free of duty. And I direct that the said sum shall be applied by the Prince of Wales's Hospital, Plymouth, for the following specific purpose, namely ..... (set out the special purpose, and if the donor so wishes), and that a bed/ward/laboratory etc., in the Hospital shall be named in memory of ....."*

- (b) Gift made during the lifetime of the donor. The gift should be accompanied by a written direction by the donor to the following effect :—

*“I direct that the said sum of £.....  
shall be applied by the Prince of Wales's Hospital, Plymouth, for  
such specific object of a capital nature connected with the Hospital  
(but distinct from its general purposes) as the Prince of Wales's  
Hospital, Plymouth, shall determine.”*

NOTE.—It is not essential that the special capital purpose should be specified by the donor. It is sufficient and usually preferable to leave the precise capital purpose for which the money shall be used to the discretion and good sense of the Committee, because it is often difficult, and particularly so in these days of transition, to envisage the precise objects for which the money will be most urgently required.

The above forms of gift assume that the property given consists of money. It should be noted, however, that the new Management Committees will have power to hold land. In the case of gifts of land made before the appointed day it will normally be desirable to devise or grant it to the Governing Body of the Hospital or to trustees upon trust for sale and upon trust to hold the proceeds of sale and the income of the land until sale for some special purpose involving expenditure of a capital nature.

## II. FOR USE AFTER THE APPOINTED DAY

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- (a) In a Will :

*“I give and bequeath to the Prince of Wales's Hospital, Plymouth,  
the sum of £.....  
free of duty upon trust to apply the capital and income of the said  
sum for such purposes other than general maintenance connected with  
the said Hospital as the Committee shall in their discretion determine.”*

- (b) Gift made during the lifetime of the donor.

The gift should be made to the Prince of Wales's Hospital, Plymouth, upon trust to apply the fund or property for the special purpose which the donor may have in mind, or upon trust in the following form :—

*“In trust to apply the capital and income of the said sum (or  
property) for such purposes other than general maintenance connected  
with the said Hospital as the Committee shall in their discretion  
determine.”*
