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LETTER from The Very Reverend GEORGE BAIRD to the LORD
PROVOST of Edinburgh.

MY LORD,

Ramsay-Lodge, June 4. 1821.

I most willingly comply with your Lordship's desire to receive from me a Testimonial in respect to the character and merits of Dr HOME, as a Candidate for the vacant Chair of the Practice of Physic. Permit me, therefore, to state the impressions which his conduct, as a member of our Academical Body, and his success as a Professor of *Materia Medica*, have made on me.

I entertain, then, my Lord, the deepest and most conscientious conviction, that Dr HOME is not only *adequately*, but that he is *eminently* qualified to fill the vacant Chair, with high satisfaction and benefit to the Students, and consequently with signal advantage to the prosperity and honour of the Medical School.

He was appointed a Professor twenty-three years ago; and I remember well the flattering attestations of respectable talents, acquirements, and habits, which he then received. And it is my official duty to declare that, during the whole period of his incumbency, I have uniformly had complete reason to be perfectly satisfied with his conciliatory manners in the private intercourse of life, and with his judicious and upright principles in the public privileges of the Senatus, as well as with his ardent zeal for both the particular interests of his Class and the general interests of the University.

His travels in Germany, France and Italy, during four years of preparatory Medical Study, gave him ample opportunity of adding all the

stores of Continental discovery and skill to the professional knowledge he had previously acquired at home. He entered, therefore, on the duties of the Chair of Materia Medica with distinguished advantages; and every succeeding Session has been discovering the fruits of these, when conjoined with his unwearied assiduity and zeal. The result has been the progressively increasing popularity of his Prelections in both the College and the Royal Infirmary; and hence, in his branch, the sustained and growing attractions of the University, as a Seminary of Medical education.

But there is one particular circumstance relative to Dr HOME, which it gave me the highest pleasure to observe when it took place, and which it seems incumbent on me to bring before your Lordship and the Honourable Patrons. It was not the practice formerly for the Professor of Materia Medica to give, besides his Public Lectures, *hours of Private Examinations* for the Students. Dr HOME began the practice, and has now for several years continued it; and his pupils have often and gratefully reported to me that they were largely benefited by this gratuitous labour of their able and excellent Professor.

Having made this general statement, I beg leave, my Lord, to add, that your Lordship, and the Honourable Patrons, will be aware, that, in any thing I have said, I have not been presuming to offer my opinion as to the merits of Dr Home, in so far as these are strictly *medical*. I am entirely incompetent to judge on that subject; at the same time, it would be doing him injustice, if I did not affirm, that, by professional persons the best qualified to estimate them, I have uniformly heard him described as of the highest order.

Allow me, my Lord, just further to say that, while I give this Testimonial in favour of Dr HOME, I know that there are other Professors who have done their duties within the walls of the College under my inspection, and who are, as well as Dr Home, Candidates for the vacant Chair in question; and of them, had I been called on to speak, I am bound in honour to assure your Lordship, that I would have spoken in unqualified terms of personal esteem and respect, and of entire official approbation of their services in their respective departments, and during

the respective periods of their Academical appointments. Nor can I avoid subjoining, that, associated as the success and fame of the Teaching Chairs must ever be in the mind of the Patrons, with their sense of duty and their inmost wishes, it cannot but afford them pride and pleasure to find that so many Professors have been placed in their College, who are so conspicuously justifying, by their talents and fidelity, the past preference they have received, and are so richly meriting every future encouragement and promotion it may be possible to bestow on them.

LETTER of Mr RUSSELL, Professor of Clinical Surgery, to the Right Honourable the LORD PROVOST of the CITY of EDINBURGH.

MY LORD,

In a conversation which I had this morning with Dr HOPE, he informed me of an application from your Lordship to obtain the opinion of the Professors respecting the Qualification of Dr HOME to fill the Chair of Practical Medicine in the University, when I stated the circumstance which precludes me from taking an active share in the business. I have thought seriously on the subject since Dr HOPE and I parted: and, after the most mature deliberation, I do not feel myself at liberty to subscribe any testimonial, in consequence of having declared to one of the Candidates my determined resolution to decline giving my name to the Public on the present occasion. The appearance of a letter from me to Lord LAUDERDALE, in favour of Dr THOMSON's capacity to teach Surgery, is no violation of this declaration, since that letter was written many years ago, for a very different purpose, and does not bear directly upon the point now at issue. It was printed without my knowledge. I did not even know that the letter was in existence, till I saw it in print. Under these circumstances, it would be unjust to suspect me of an indirect attempt to promote the success of one of the Candidates by publishing a private letter, after it is known that the letter in question was not in my possession, and that my consent to the publication of it never was asked.

I should be truly sorry to do any thing, which could be construed to the disadvantage of Dr HOME, who is most deservedly respected by the Public, both on account of the correctness of his conduct in private life, and of his exertions in the University.

LETTER from Mr BRYCE, formerly President of the Royal College of Surgeons, to the Right Honourable the Lord PROVOST of Edinburgh.

MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN,

On the occasion of the present honourable contest for the Chair of the Practice of Physic, vacant by the lamented death of the late Dr GREGORY, I trust your Lordship, and the other Gentlemen Patrons of the University, will not deem me too officious in presuming shortly to state to you my knowledge of the ability of my friend Dr HOME, to fill that important situation.

My opinion of Dr HOME, as a man of general science, of a good moral character, and as a most worthy member of society, is very high indeed. And on those most important points, I am quite certain that all those who have the happiness of Dr HOME's acquaintance, will most cordially agree with me.

With regard to Dr HOME's abilities to perform the office of an Instructor of Youth, this must certainly be best judged of from the success which has already attended his labours in that capacity. Dr HOME has taught the class of Materia Medica in this University for at least twenty years, and during that period the yearly increasing number of his pupils has been so great, as to render his Class at present five times more numerous than it was when he first received his appointment from your hands; and there is every reason to conclude, that this extraordinary increase in the number of Dr HOME's pupils is entirely owing to the very great estimation in which his Lectures have been held by his hearers, and who, I can assure your Lordship, are no mean judges of their merits.
