The following is here, as it well be lestifyed upon oath by several wemens. One many Toll aged 23 has had 3 children. The is the wife of John Joff. a poor journyman Clother in the parish of Godliman being five weeks gon with child the 23 of ap. 1726 was weeding of wheat mor that lown with three other woman up leps a rabbil, this deponent and one of the weman run after it but could not each it. So they returned to there work again, about a quarter of an hour after they freel-up an other roubbit, then that deponent and two of the weman run after it a pretty white but it got away, after it was gon this deponent said of they had not been fools they might ago! et, one of the weman said to this deponent; I be lieve you long for or has a mind to one of the rabbils, but the said with concernent of the clid not, this reen in this deponent head all that day, if she had but caught one of the rabbets, she could cal it. When abed she dream! that she saw abeen dance of Palbels, and could not get them out of her head, the next morning about six oclock she got up, and went to the same field in hope's of finding a Pablit in the place where she put them of the put a bow as a mark to fend the place, with how haten her hand in hope's of covering the labbels but find ing none she was very much concerned all if day she could not get them out of her mind, one of the lost bit was gray and y other blackish with Black one was usal in her thoughts . The dreams of them for a quarter of a year the 27 of Jeft last I delivered her

of a black rabbit, full grown the lung's and hart grow's without the bady joining to the lower part of the neek, it had three cats feet, and one rabbits foot, bats geets, and out of one of the geth I cut out these Vertebres of an Eel, I have since delivered this woman of ten rabbit, they where all alive before they was delivered, the last beaft 23 hours before it died, as soon as one dyes an other leafit up, the lwelfthe labbell I believe I shall take from her about six oclock, I have eleven of them in shirets when its over I shall give the logget Society a feel account, I cannot tell how long before these rabbits will adone comoning away, of she had been with child she has but len days to go
