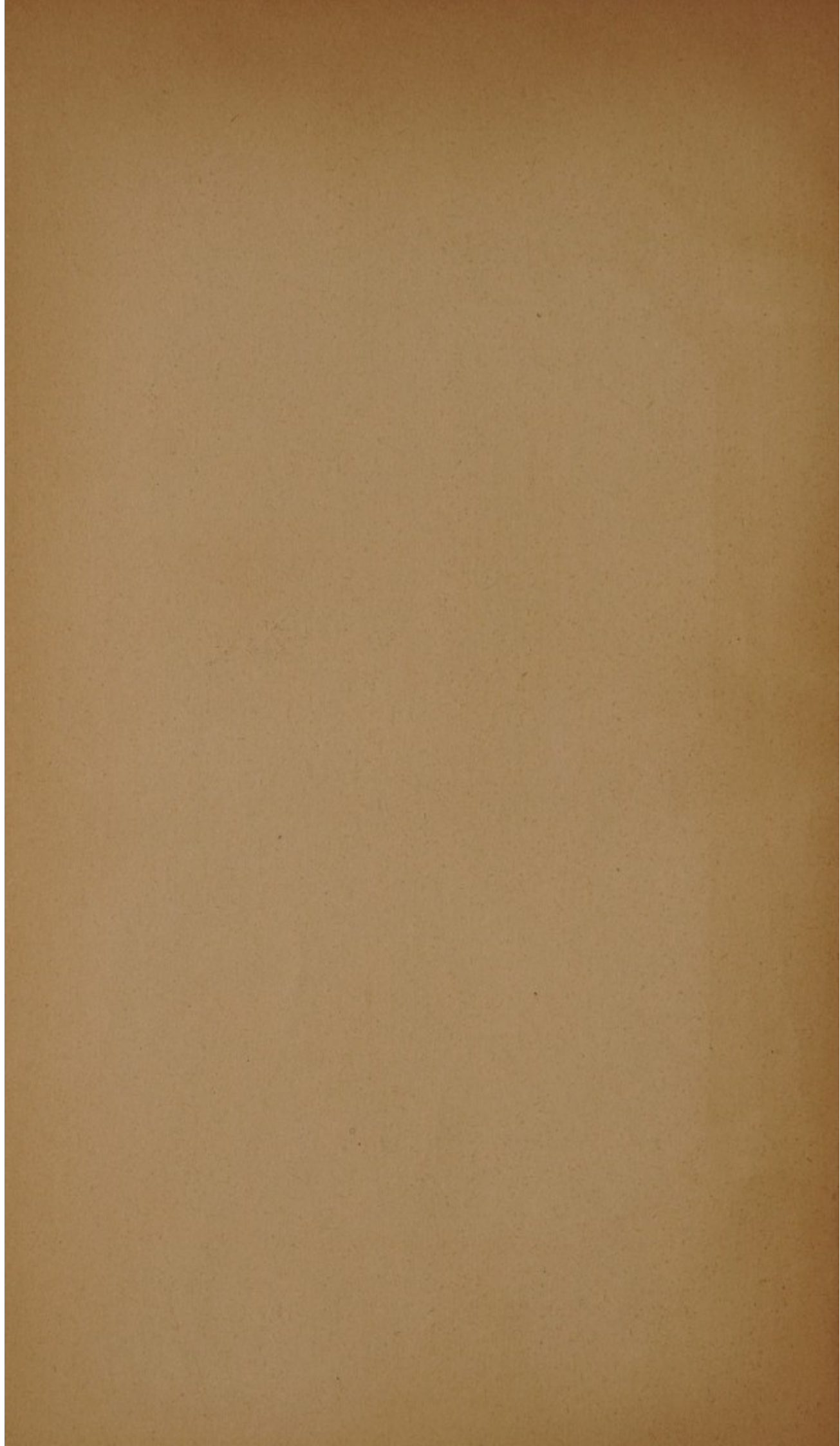

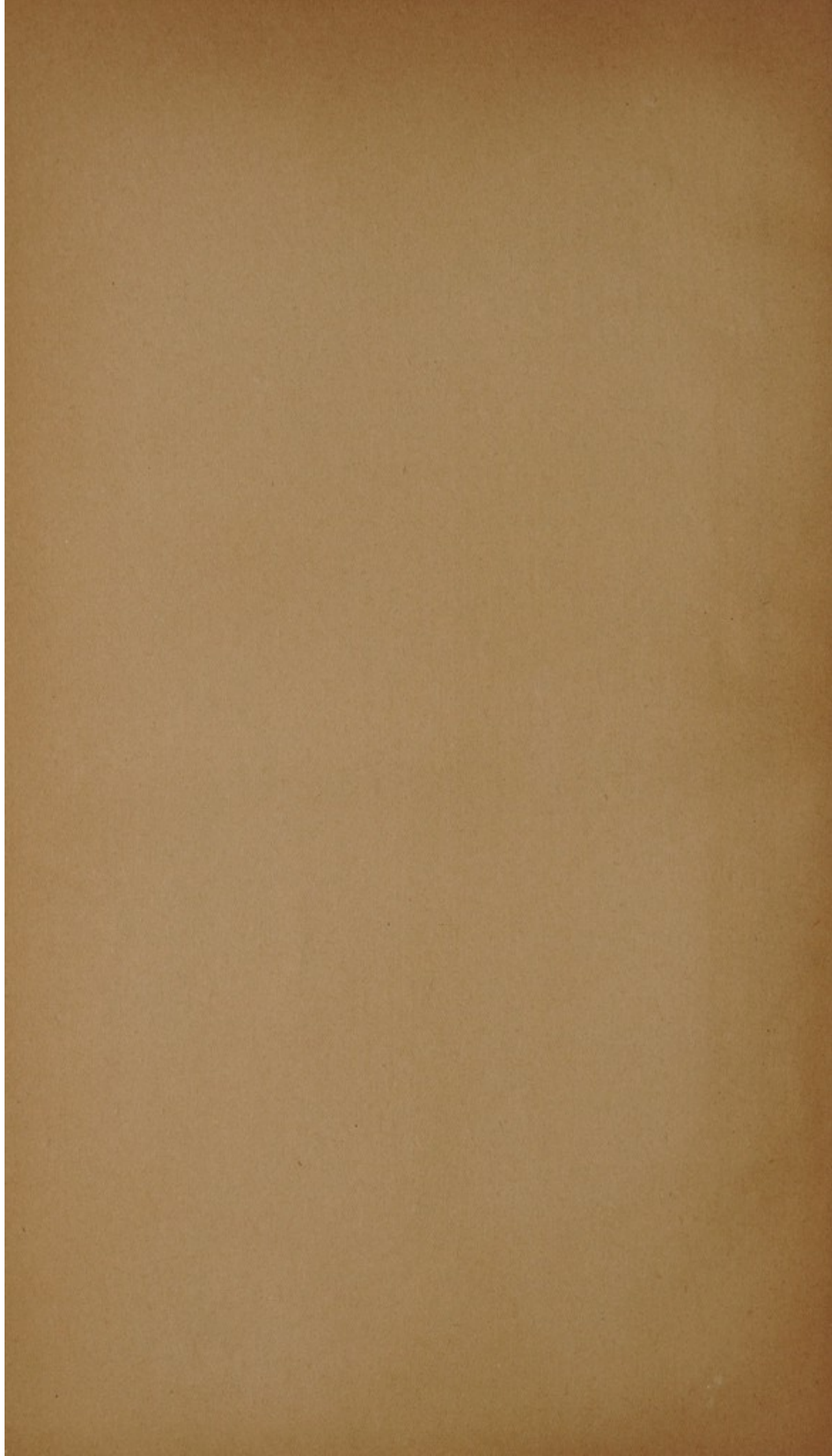

NOTE.

The first Classified List of Occupations was compiled for use at the Census of England and Wales in 1861. At each succeeding Census (with the exception of that of 1891) the List has been revised. In 1861 and 1871 it consisted mostly of terms taken from the directories of London and other large towns, but in 1881 an effort was made to improve it by adding information collected from leading manufacturers to whom circulars on the subject had been addressed ; this plan was also followed in 1901.

Considerable additions have again been made as the result of correspondence with representative employers of labour and others who in many cases willingly co-operated in the revision of the List by furnishing extensive and detailed lists of the terms used in their respective industries ; further additions have also been made by incorporating some of the terms which in the process of tabulation were found to be used by the employees themselves in describing their occupations on the census schedules.

The original object in view in the preparation of this List was to provide a guide for the use of Census clerks. It is believed, however, that the List, now published for the first time, will prove useful to students of the census statistics by enabling them to follow the principles of the classification adopted for the Report and to see the details combined under the several headings in the tables.

The instructions to the clerks who were employed in classifying occupations are printed on pages iii-xiii ; the "code numbers" referred to in these instructions are the respective numbers by which the several occupational headings were indicated on the cards used in the tabulation. The instructional memoranda issued to the enumerators employed in collecting the data are printed on pages 357-370 and the form of the schedule is given on pages 355 and 356.

It is hoped that the publication of this volume may lead to increased interest in the census classification of occupations and that it may elicit suggestions for its improvement. INSTRUCTIONS

TO

CLERKS EMPLOYED IN CLASSIFYING OCCUPATIONS.

1. Particulars to be coded.—The Schedules are to be coded in column 10 in regard to Personal Occupation, and if the code in that column does not show the Industry or Service with which the person is connected such additional information is to be coded in column 11. Persons engaged in occupations are also to be coded in columns 12 and 13 according to "Status" (*i.e.*, whether Employer, Worker, or Working on Own Account, and whether Working at Home).

All the particulars are to be coded in one process, and the code numbers are to be marked in green ink in the proper columns on the line on which the person's age is entered.

The occupational names under which persons are likely to be returned in the Schedules, are grouped on pages 14–201 under Headings which agree with those in the "Code for Occupations" sheet, except for the further sub-division for Industry or Service indicated on that sheet by means of italics. A List of the Headings classified under twenty-three Orders, with their Sub-orders, is given on pages 4–13, and the Orders and Sub-orders themselves appear on pages 1–3. The Coder should first learn the arrangement and full titles of the Orders, and then of the Sub-orders and Headings.

The Index on pages 202–354 contains a list of occupational names in alphabetical order, and shows the Order, Sub-order and Heading to which each belongs.

CODING OF COLUMN 10.

2. General Rule for Coding Column 10.—The following rule is to be observed :—

Find, by means either of the Alphabetical Index or the Classified List, the proper heading to which the person should be classed in regard to Personal Occupation, and enter in column 10 the code number for the heading.

OCCUPIED PERSONS.

3. Occupied Persons.—Persons engaged in Occupations will be classed to the various headings of Orders 1–22.

Many of these headings refer to the personal occupations of the individuals concerned, but the complexity of modern industry is such that especially in dealing with manufacturing processes it is impossible for the most part to classify by the nature of the work done by the individual. The headings covering the processes of production and manufacture will be found, therefore, to refer as a rule to the article made or material worked in rather than the process carried on by the individual worker. Instructions 5 and 6 refer mainly to personal occupation, while Instruction 7 deals with the headings which classify by the manufacture or trade with which workers are connected.

4. Makers and Dealers.—It is of the utmost importance that, so far as the nature of the returns will allow, Manufacturers, or persons engaged in or connected with Manufacture, should be distinguished from Dealers and their assistants.

Special headings are provided for Dealers in the various Orders, and care must be taken that a person who is evidently a Dealer only, or assisting in a dealing business, should not be classed to a heading relating to manufacture.

The following instruction appears on the Schedule :—

"DEALERS, SHOPKEEPERS OR SHOP ASSISTANTS as distinct from MAKERS, PRODUCERS OR REPAIRERS.—All such persons should be so described as to leave no doubt whether they are Dealers or Makers. In many cases 'Tailors,' 'Bootmakers,' 'Hatters,' 'Watchmakers,' 'Goldsmiths,' 'Silversmiths,' 'Jewellers,' 'Chemists,' 'Bakers,' 'Seedsman,' 'Florists,' &c., and their Assistants are not Makers or Producers; in such cases the word 'Dealer,' 'Shopkeeper' or 'Shop Assistant' should be added to the occupational name. A person who both makes and deals should be described as 'Maker,' if chiefly Maker, or 'Dealer,' if chiefly Dealer."

If the description given is not distinctive, the Coder must code it to the heading which appears to be best suited to the circumstances. In most cases he may regard

persons returned as Tailors, Bootmakers, Watchmakers, without further particulars, as "*Makers*"; Hatters, undefined, and Goldsmiths, Silversmiths, Jewellers, if Employers, Working on Own Account, or "*Assistants*," as "*Dealers*," except in districts where the manufactures are carried on; Chemists as "*Dealers*"; Bakers, if Employers or on own account, as "*Dealers*," if Workers, as "*Bread Makers*"; Seedsmen and Florists, if apparently engaged in production, as "*Nurserymen*, Seedsmen, Florists," in Order 7, but if in Warehouses or Shops, preparing for sale or selling, to headings for "*Dealers*." If the description of an occupation be such as to imply that the person is both a Maker or Manufacturer and also a Dealer, the Coder should assume him to be the former.

Merchants.—Merchants dealing in some stated commodity, *e.g.*, Tea Merchants, Coal Merchants, Rag Merchants, Chinaware Merchants, &c., are to be classed by the nature of the commodity in which they deal; but Merchants designated by the name of a country, as East India Merchants, Spanish Merchants, &c., &c., and other persons returned as Merchants without the specification of the commodity, are to be coded to the heading "*Merchant (commodity undefined)*," Order 5, Sub-order 1.

5. Agents, Brokers.—Agents and Brokers, as a rule, are to be coded to the heading "*Broker, Agent, Factor*" (Order 5, Sub-order 1), but the following are exceptions to be dealt with as indicated:—

6. Occupations common to many Industries, &c.—Special headings are provided in the classification for a number of occupations, such as Clerk, Messenger, Porter, Carman, Engine Driver, which are common to many Trades, Industries and Services. With the exceptions set out below, persons following these occupations are to be classed in Column 10 to the special headings.

Clerks.—Clerks in the employment of the Post Office are to be coded to "Post Office—Telegraphists, Telephone Operators" or "Other Post Office Officers and Clerks" (1: 1). Clerks in other Government Departments to "Other Civil Service Officers and Clerks" (1: 1).

Clerks in Poor Law Service or in Municipal or other Local Service to the headings for these Services in Order 1, Sub-order 2.

Clerks in the Army to "Soldiers and Non-commissioned Officers" (2: 1).

Clerks in the Navy to "Officers of the Navy" (2: 2).

Clerks in Hospital, Institution, and Benevolent Society Service to the heading in Order 4, Sub-order 3.

Law Clerks including Solicitors' and Barristers' Clerks to "Law Clerk" (3: 2).

Clerks in Banks to "Banker; Bank—Official, Clerk" (5: 3).

Clerks in Insurance Offices to "Life, House, Ship, &c., Insurance—Official, Clerk, &c." (5: 4).

Railway Clerks to "Railway—Official, Clerk" (6: 1).

Clerks engaged on Telegraph or Telephone instruments (other than in Government Offices and in Railway Working) to "Telegraph, Telephone—Service (not Government)" (6: 5).

Clerks of Works (Building) to "Builder" (12: 1).

Bookstall Clerks to "Book, Print—Publisher, Seller" (17: 2).

Clerks, other than those referred to, are as a general rule to be coded to the heading "Commercial or Business Clerk" (5: 2).

Messengers, Porters, Watchmen.—Messengers, Porters, Watchmen in the employment of the Post Office are to be referred to the heading "Post Office Messengers, &c." (1: 1); if in the employment of other Government Departments to "Other Civil Service Messengers, &c." (1: 1).

Porters, Messengers, &c., in Poor Law Service or in Municipal or other Local Service to the headings for these Services in Order 1, Sub-order 2.

Hospital and Institution (not Poor Law) Porters to "Hospital, Institution (not Poor Law), &c., Service" (4: 3).

Railway—Messengers, Porters, Watchmen to "Railway Porter" and other headings in Order 6, Sub-order 1.

Messengers, Porters and Watchmen in Tram, Omnibus, and Carriers' Service to the headings in Order 6, Sub-order 2.

Dock, Riverside, Waterside, Ship's—Porters, and Corn, Deal and other Porters if at Docks, &c. or if loading or unloading vessels, to "Dock Labourer, Wharf Labourer" (6: 4).

Deal Porters not at Docks, &c. and not loading or unloading vessels to "Other Workers in Wood" (13: 2).

Porters, if carriers of materials in processes of manufacture, and Watchmen, if overlookers, inspectors, &c. therein, to be coded to the heading for the manufacture.

Coal Porters, with the exceptions to be found under "Coal" in the Index, to "Coal-heaver; Coal—Porter, Labourer" (6: 5).

Market Porters to "General Labourer" (22: 5).

Watchmen in Mine and Quarry Service to headings of Order 9, Sub-order 1; in Harbour, Dock and Waterworks Services to the particular service.

Porters in Domestic Indoor Service to headings of Order 4, Sub-order 1, Porters in other Domestic Offices or Services to "Others engaged in Service" (4: 3). Porters, other than Domestic Indoor Servants, in Inn, Hotel and Eating House Service to "Others in Inn, Hotel, Eating House, etc.—Service" (20: 4).

See also under "Porter" in the Index.

Other Messengers, Porters and Watchmen should as a rule be classed to "Messenger, Porter, Watchman (not Railway or Government)," Order 6, Sub-order 5.

Note.—Frequently the term "Boy" is used to describe a Messenger or Porter, and in such cases the Occupation must be coded accordingly.

Carters, Wagoners.—Carters or Wagoners, if returned as engaged on farms or in agriculture, are to be coded to "Agricultural Labourer, Farm Servant—Distinguished as in charge of Horses," Order 7; if in Mines or Quarries, to the particular heading in Order 9, Sub-order 1. But Carters and Wagoners not so returned and other persons engaged in conveyance on roads, whose occupations are set out under the various headings of Order 6, Sub-order 2, are to be coded to the headings of that Sub-order. The Coder must, however, note that the terms "Carter," "Wagoner," &c., are sometimes employed to describe the occupations of persons shifting materials and products in factories, works, &c., and that such workers must be classed in column 10 according to the trade or manufacture in which they are engaged.

Engine—Drivers, Stokers, Firemen, &c.—Engine Drivers, Stokers, Firemen, Tenters, Cleaners, including Boiler Minders, Cleaners, Steam Cranemen, &c. if stated to be employed on railways are to be coded to "Railway Engine Driver," or other suitable heading in Order 6, Sub-order 1.

If seagoing, either to "Men of Navy" (2: 2) or to "Merchant Service" (6: 3).

If stated to be employed on Agricultural Machines, to "Agricultural Machine—Proprietor, Attendant" (7: 1).

If stated to be employed in connection with "Electricity Supply," to the particular heading in Order 21, Sub-order 1.

If combining with Engine-Driving, &c., other occupations which are classed to the particular manufacture, or if otherwise engaged in work extending beyond the ordinary duties of an Engine Driver, &c., or in work requiring special knowledge of manufacture, they are to be coded to the manufacture.

All others are to be coded to "Engine—Driver, Stoker, Fireman" (22: 5).

7. Persons to be classed to the manufacture, trade or service with which they are connected.—Persons other than those mentioned in Instruction 6, or Professional Men or Workmen (including labourers) following a distinct Trade, provided for by a special heading, are to be classed to the manufacture, trade or service with which they are connected. Thus, *Apprentices, Improvers, Journeymen* and *Assistants* are to be coded to the Occupation to which they are apprenticed or in which they assist. If the Occupation is not directly stated in the Schedule nor to be gathered indirectly, they must be coded to "Artisan, Mechanic, Apprentice (Undefined)" (22: 5). Similarly, *Contractors, Manufacturers, Managers, Inspectors, Overlookers, Overseers, Foremen, Gangers*, and the like are to be coded to the manufacture or trade in which they are engaged, and when this is not specified, to "Contractor, Manufacturer, Manager, Superintendent, Foreman (undefined)" (22: 4).

Note.—Apprentices to certain professions must be coded to "Students" (see under the heading "Student," Order 23), and in some cases, the term "Assistant" must be taken to refer to a Clerk, or to a Messenger or Porter, and must be coded accordingly.

In Order 3 for Professional Occupations and their Subordinate Services, some Assistants are to be classed to special headings for Subordinates.

Warehousemen. Warehousemen are to be dealt with as follows:—

- (a) When they appear to be employed in the warehouse department of some manufactory or house of business, they are to be coded to the heading relating to the manufacture to which they are attached, or to the heading for the dealers by whom they are employed.
- (b) When the term "Warehouseman" appears to be simply another name for dealer or shop-keeper, *e.g.*, "Woollen Warehouseman," "Manchester Warehouseman," "Italian Warehouseman," and the like, the code must also follow the special kinds of goods dealt in.

- (c) When, however, persons appear either to be keeping, or to be assisting in the management or work of, places which serve simply as store-housing establishments, they are to be coded to the heading "Warehouseman" (6:5).

Labourers.—Labourers are to be classed to the same headings as other workers in the same manufacture or trade except where special headings are provided for them as follows:—

General Labourers to Merchants are to be coded to "General Labourer" (22:5).

Labourers returned without any clue to the Trade, Manufacture, &c., are to be coded to "General Labourer" or to "Factory Labourer (undefined)" (22:5).

8. Persons on Farms.—Persons engaged in Agriculture—on Farms, Woods, and Gardens—are to be coded to the headings of Order 7.

A Farmer's Son or close *male* relative, aged 15 or upwards, living in the farmer's house and not described as of any specific Occupation, must be regarded as engaged in agriculture and coded to the heading for Farmers' Relatives. A *female* relative returned as "Farmer's Daughter," &c. should also be coded to this heading, but if returned without any description in Column 10 or as engaged in domestic duties she is not to be coded.

If a Farmer's Son or *male* relative is returned as following a specific agricultural occupation, he must be coded in Column 10 to the heading for that occupation and in Column 11 by the Occupation Code Number for "Farmer's, Grazier's—Son, &c."

- (a) All *persons* returned as *farming land*, whether the land be their own or hired, are to be coded to "Farmer."
- (b) Farmers' Wives assisting their husbands are not to be coded.
- (c) Cooks, Housemaids, General Servants, and others in farmhouses, whose duties are of a household character, must be regarded as Domestic Servants; but all other *Farm Servants*, including Dairymaids, are to be classed to the various headings of Order 7.

9. Indefinite Occupations.—Some occupational terms are common to several kinds of industry, and even to different departments of the same industry, while others have one meaning in one locality and a different meaning in another. Full and distinctive descriptions were asked for, but it will probably be found that in many cases the necessary particulars have been omitted. The Coder will often be able to connect the designation with one of the industries carried on in the district, and code accordingly. In the case of Textile Industries and Coal Mining, he must code to the heading for the Sub-division of the industry which appears to him to be correct having regard to his experience of properly returned occupations in the same locality. If he is unable to fix upon a satisfactory heading, he must, as directed in the Index, code the vaguely designated worker to the heading for "Undefined" or for "Others" in the Sub-order or Order concerned, or, if this cannot be determined, to one of the headings for undefined occupations in Order 22.

10. Occupations not in Index.—Some Occupational terms will be returned which are not to be found in the Index. When the term used apparently indicates an

Occupation or a branch of an Occupation which is in the Index, the Coder should use his judgment as to the correct heading, and should make an entry on his Recording Sheet giving the particulars and the code number he has selected.

In other cases the Coder will find terms which are neither themselves in the Index, nor readily referable to any to be found there. In such cases, and generally whenever he is in doubt or sees reason for deviating from the Index, he must enter the particulars on his Query Sheet for reference to his Superintendent.

CODING OF COLUMN 11.

11. Particulars to be coded in Column 11.—The Coder will see from the instructions at the head of the column and on the back of the Schedule what information was asked for as to Industry or Service with which the worker is connected, and how it might be given either in Column 10 or Column 11.

Much of the information given will be fully dealt with in the coding of Column 10, but in the following cases it will usually be necessary to code particulars as to Industry or Service in Column 11 by means of the Industry Code number :—

- (1) Persons following a distinct occupation not allied to any particular industry.
- (2) Persons engaged in an occupation connected with an industry other than that with which the occupation is usually connected.
- (3) Persons employed in an industry carried on as auxiliary to some other industry.
- (4) Persons in the employ of firms carrying on two or more industries of which none can be said to be auxiliary to another.
- (5) Persons engaged in the service of the Government or of Local Authorities.
- (6) Domestic Servants not in Private Employment.

Persons following a distinct occupation not allied to any particular industry.—Some occupations followed by persons not actually engaged in processes of production are common to nearly all organized industries. Such terms as Clerk, Bookkeeper, Storekeeper, Timekeeper, Carter, Carman, Van Guard, Warehouseman, Packer, Engine Driver, Messenger, Porter, Watchman, &c., do not usually imply any specific industry. The method of coding occupations such as these in Column 10 has been fully explained. In a large proportion of these cases the Occupation Code in Column 10 will give no indication of the industry with which the worker is connected; and where the Industry or Service is stated but is not clearly shown by the coding in that column, the Industry Code Number must be entered in Column 11.

Persons engaged in an occupation connected with an industry other than that with which the occupation is usually connected.—The principal occupations of this kind are those connected with the upkeep of premises and the maintenance of plant and rolling-stock, many firms having their own workmen for these purposes, but there are few occupations which are not at times carried on in connexion with industries other than those with which they are usually connected.

Carpenters, Bricklayers, Masons, Plasterers, Painters, Plumbers, Gas Fitters, and their Labourers, usually in the employment of Builders or other Masters in the Building Trades; Engineering Fitters, Metal Machinists, and other workers in occupations usually connected with Engineering Works; Wood Sawyers, Wood Machinists, and other Timber Trade workers may all be following their occupations in the direct employment of Manufacturers, Traders, Government Departments, Local Authorities, Railway and other Carrying Companies, etc.

In all such cases the Industry Code No. must be inserted in Column 11 to show the Industry or Service, such as Colliery, Alkali Works, Cotton Spinning, Government Shipbuilding, Local Authority Gas Works or Tramways, Railway Company's Waggon Works, Building Department of Shipping Company or Docks Company. If the worker is employed in the industry to which the occupation is usually allied, it will only be necessary to code in Column 10: thus, a Bricklayer working for a Builder will only need to be coded to "Bricklayer" in Column 10.

Persons employed in an industry carried on as auxiliary to some other industry.—In such cases it was pointed out to the Enumerator that the precise branch of the auxiliary Trade, Manufacture, etc. showing the particular kind of work done, and the Article made or Material worked in should be clearly indicated in Column 10 and the Industry or Service to which it is auxiliary in Column 11: thus, for persons engaged in Tin Box Making and Lithographing, Wooden Box Making, Wooden Packing Case Making, Basket

Making, Iron Hamper Making, Cardboard Box Making, Printing, Lithography, Book-binding, etc., carried on as auxiliary to some Trade or Manufacture, the full description of the personal occupation was to be given in Column 10 in accordance with the instructions at the head of that Column and the kind of business carried on by the employer in Column 11 as :—

Column 10.

Iron Hamper Maker, Machineman

...

Column 11.

... Alkali Works.

Other examples of auxiliary industries are :—

The making of Envelopes, Paper Cases, Leather Cases in Needle Factories, of Textile Machinery Fittings in Textile Factories, of Type in Printing Works, of Bolts, Nuts, and Rivets in Engineering and other Works, and of Cotton, Wool, Worsted, Hemp, &c., Yarn in Carpet Factories ; Saw Mills run as a Department of Engineering Works or Railway Waggon Works ; Clay Mining, &c. carried on by Earthenware Manufacturers and Cement Manufacturers, Brickmaking by Colliery Companies, Iron and Steel Manufacturers, &c. ; Malting by Brewers ; and so on.

In connexion with Railway Service, there are various undertakings such as Steamships, Harbours, Docks, Hotels, Catering, Engineering Works, Carriage and Waggon Works. Shipping Companies and Harbour, Dock, &c., Services also have various undertakings carried on in connexion with them.

In all cases except where provision has been made in the Code for Column 10 by the splitting of occupations according to Service, as denoted in italics on the "Code for Occupations" sheet (*see* Headings "Navigation Service (on Shore)" "Harbour, Dock, Wharf, Lighthouse—Officials and Servants," "Railway—Coach, Wagon Makers") the Coder will have to use Columns 10 and 11, and sometimes even the two columns will be insufficient for recording all the facts. If, for example, a person is a House Painter, in the Hotel of a Dock Company, he must be coded to "House Painter" in Column 10, but it must also be recorded that he is employed in Hotel Service, and that the Hotel Service is that of a Dock Company. In all cases the code number in Column 11 must relate to the Industry or Service to which the occupation coded in Column 10 is auxiliary, but when the Industry or Service coded in Column 11 is auxiliary to some other Industry or Service the code numbers entered in the two columns, together with the code for additional particulars, must be noted on the Recording Sheet.

Persons in the employ of firms carrying on two or more industries of which none can be said to be auxiliary to another.—For example :—Machinery and Shipbuilding : Small-arms and Cycles : Cycles and Motor Vehicles : Motor Vehicles and Horse-drawn Vehicles : Soap, Manure, and Candles.

The Enumerator was instructed that if in such cases, "the Manufactures or Industries are carried on in separate establishments or in separate departments thereof, the nature of the manufacture or industry carried on in the separate establishment or department in which the worker is employed should be stated in Column 11. When the Manufactures or Industries are not separated, or when the personal occupation is in connexion with two or more of them, there is no alternative but for the various Manufactures or Industries to be stated in Column 11 in the order of their importance."

The coder must generally enter the Industry Code No. in Column 11 on the assumption that the Schedule has been filled up in accordance with these instructions, but in cases of doubt he should enter the particulars on his Query Sheet for reference to his Superintendent.

If several *manufactures* are carried on, or several *different classes of goods* are sold in the business, and no indication is given as to the department in which the person is engaged, code to the *industry* heading "Several Manufactures (particular manufacture not stated)" (22 : 3) in Column 11 if engaged in a manufacturing business, or to "Multiple Shop, Multiple Store—Proprietor, Worker (general or undefined)" (22 : 4) if engaged in selling business.

Persons engaged in the service of the Government or of Local Authorities.—Care must be taken that all workers in Manufacturing and Storing Departments of the Government and in undertakings of Local Authorities such as Cemeteries, Public Libraries, Markets, Baths and Wash-houses, Working Class Dwellings, Municipal Lodging Houses, Milk Depôts, Waterworks, Gas Works, Electricity Supply, Telephones, Tramways, Harbours, Docks, Canals, Piers, Quays, Ferries, and in Works of Construction, are coded to show the kind of manufacture, industry, or undertaking in which they are engaged, and the Service with which they are connected. Where Columns 10 and 11 are not sufficient

for the full coding, the numbers coded in those columns and the code for the additional particulars should be entered on the Recording Sheet. In order to reduce the coding in Column 11, and to limit the cases where classification in both Columns 10 and 11 would be insufficient, separate code numbers have been provided in Column 10 to show separately for the following headings the Government employees :—

Harbour, Dock, Wharf, Lighthouse—Officials and Servants.

Other Electrical Apparatus Makers ; Electrical Fitters.

Gunsmiths, Gun Manufacturers.

Gunpowder, Guncotton, Explosive Substance—Manufacture.

Cartridge, Fireworks, Explosive Article—Manufacture.

and for the following headings the Local Authority employees :—

Sick Nurses, Invalid Attendants (in Institutions).

Schoolmasters, Teachers, Professors, Lecturers (in Schools, &c.).

Others connected with Education.

Others connected with Literature, &c. (including Library and Museum Service).

Hospital and Institution (not Poor Law) Service.

Bath and Wash-house Service.

Tramway Service :—

Drivers.

Conductors.

Others.

Harbour, Dock, Wharf, Lighthouse—Officials and Servants.

Paviours ; Road Labourers.

Gas Works Service :—

(a) Gas Makers.

(b) Others.

Waterworks Service.

Electricity Supply :—

(a) Generation and Distribution.

(b) Others.

Drainage and Sanitary Service.

Scavenging and Disposal of Refuse.

Where the coding in Column 10 shows all necessary particulars as to Personal Occupation, Industry and Service, it will not be necessary to make any code entry in Column 11.

Domestic Servants not in Private Employment include those working in connection with the provision of food and lodging for profit, and in some cases those engaged in connexion with shops and places of business. Domestic Indoor Servants are classed in Column 10 to the two headings, "Domestic Indoor Servants in Hotels, Lodging Houses, and Eating Houses," and "Other Domestic Indoor Servants," and full instructions are given on Pages 34 and 35 as to what cases should be included under each heading. All persons classed according to the instructions to the former heading must also be coded in Column 11 to show whether they are in :—

The heading "Other Domestic Indoor Servants" will include a number of persons employed in premises which are partly used as Shops or other places of business. If the assistants live in, or sleep in a lodging house belonging to the business, the question arises whether the Domestic Servant should be regarded as in Private Employment, or not. As it is, of course, impossible in many cases to know whether a servant would be employed were there no Assistants, it has been decided that in all cases where there are Domestic and Trade Assistants, and the Employer and his family are non-resident, or where the number of Trade Assistants is in excess of the number in the family, the Domestic Servants are to be regarded as *not* in private employment, and so to be coded in Column 11 according to the business of their employer. Domestic Servants in private employment are not to be coded in Column 11.

See also Note to "Lodging House, Boarding House—Keepers" on page 191.

STATUS CODE.

UNOCCUPIED PERSONS.

(a) Persons stated to have retired from any profession or trade or to have formerly followed any Occupation but to have now ceased to do so, must be coded to the heading "Retired from Business": with the exception of Officers in the Army and Navy, who must be coded to the headings provided in Order 2. Persons coded as "Retired" will also be coded in *Column 11* according to their former calling if stated. Inmates of Lunatic Asylums or Almshouses, whose Occupations before admission to

these institutions are stated, are to be considered as "Retired," and the same is to be the rule with inmates of Workhouse Institutions, if over 60 years of age or if described as insane. Inmates who are not described as "Retired," or whose occupations before admission are not stated, are not to be coded. Inmates of Workhouse Institutions, if under 60 and not described as insane, and all prisoners are to be coded to their stated Occupations.

The Coder will find Workhouse Institutions marked 0 and Lunatic Asylums (Public and Private) marked 1 in bold figures on the first page of the Schedule or Institution Book on which the names of the inmates are entered.

- (b) Unoccupied persons returned as living on or in receipt of Pensions other than Old Age Pensions, are to be coded to "Pensioner" in Column 10, and also to their former Occupation, if stated, in Column 11, as in the case of the "Retired."

Old Age Pensioners who are *returned as having ceased to follow an Occupation* are to be treated as "Retired" both in Column 10 and Column 11. Persons returned as "Old Age Pensioners" *without statement as to occupation* are to be coded to the heading "Old Age Pensioner" in Column 10.

- (c) Persons neither following nor having followed a profession or occupation, but deriving their income from property in land, houses, funds, &c., or returning themselves by any term that implies private means or allowances, are to be coded to "Private Means." Persons, however, who are returned as owners of property which they are presumably occupied in working, must be referred to the specific Occupation implied by the nature of the property, *e.g.* :—

In cases of doubt the Coder should apply to the Superintendent.

- (d) Students and Scholars *aged 10 years and upwards* not in employment are to be coded in Column 10 to the headings "Student" and "Scholar" respectively, and in Column 11 to the profession or industry for which they are training, if stated.

By the term "Scholar" is understood a person receiving elementary or intermediate education of a general nature in any school (even though the latter be described as a college) other than a "continuation" school.

The term "Student" comprises (1) persons receiving advanced general education in universities or colleges, (2) persons receiving professional or technical education, (3) persons attending continuation schools or classes only, and (4) persons being educated privately (not at school).

If a person is described as a "Student" and there is nothing in the Schedule to indicate that he or she is a Student as defined above, code to "Student" in Column 10 and to 999 in Column 11.

- (e) Other persons of any age without specified occupation, or unoccupied, and children under 10 years of age, even if engaged in occupations, are not to be coded.

NOTES.—Persons referred to in paragraphs (a) to (d) are to be coded to 0 as regards status.

If no occupation is specified in Column 10, but a description such as "Servant" or "Assistant" is given in Column 2, the Coder must regard the person as a domestic or trade servant, and code the occupation in Column 10 accordingly.

Wives, daughters, or other females, relatives of the head of the family, *wholly engaged in domestic duties at home*, although they may be described as "Housekeeper," "Domestic," &c., must be regarded as Unoccupied.

Not uncommonly persons return themselves in the Occupation column by letters, such as B.A. ; M.A. ; D.D. ; D.C.L. ; M.D. ; M.R.C.P., &c., &c. Some of these imply specific Occupations : thus D.D. belongs only to Clergymen, or Ministers ; M.R.C.P. and M.D. only to Medical Men, &c. In such cases the particulars must be coded to the Occupation implied. But B.A., M.A., D.C.L., and many other abbreviations imply no specific Occupations, and unless a definite occupation be also stated the code must accordingly be to "Others" in Order 23. The Clerk should acquaint himself with the more common of such abbreviations, but should he meet with any with which he is unacquainted, he should apply to his Superintendent for direction.

Officials of Foreign Governments, such as Ambassador, Attaché to Embassy, Consul, Foreign Officer, &c., are to be referred to "Others" in Order 23.

16. Occupations apparently inconsistent with age, sex, &c.—The Coder must consider whether the Code which he enters is correct having regard to the age, sex, and circumstances of the individual and the district in which he or she resides. This applies particularly to certain Headings, a list of which will be supplied to the Coder, but *after* coding certain cases, a list of which is given below, he must note the particulars on his Query Sheet for the Superintendent to mark the code number—

- (1) Females returned as following occupations believed to be invariably or almost invariably followed by males only.
- (2) Males returned as following occupations almost invariably followed by females only.
- (3) Children under 12 years of age engaged in occupations.
- (4) Young persons described as engaged in professions and occupations inconsistent with their age.
- (5) Persons apparently engaged in occupations localized in districts other than that in which they reside, or in agricultural pursuits in towns.
- (6) Young persons described as "Retired" or "Pensioned."
- (7) Young persons with private means.
- (8) Persons described as "Employer" in industries nearly always carried on by companies or local authorities.
- (9) Persons described as working on "Own Account" in businesses which could scarcely be carried on without employees.
- (10) Persons described as working "At Home" in industries which can rarely, if ever, be carried on in their homes.

The words in brackets in the list are in some cases prefixes to the occupational names, and in other cases they relate to the material worked, the kind of goods made, or to the special trade, industry or process in which the term is used.

It has been found necessary to include in the Classified and Alphabetical Lists many names which are purely local, and some which are scarcely more than nicknames.

This Schedule must be filled up and signed by, or on behalf of, the Head of the Family, or other person in occupation, or in charge, of the dwelling (house, tenement, apartment).

If a house be let or sub-let to two or more occupiers each occupier of a part of the house must fill up a Schedule for his part of the house. Boarders are not to be considered as separate occupiers.

In the case of Hotels, Boarding Houses, Clubs, and other similar establishments, the Keeper, Manager, or other person in charge must fill up a Schedule with respect to all the inmates.

The Schedule will be called for on MONDAY, APRIL 1, by the appointed Enumerator; in order that he may not be delayed it must be ready with the answers written the proper columns early on the morning of that day.

If the answers are incomplete or inaccurate, the Enumerator may ask any questions necessary to enable him to correct the Schedule.

If any person whose duty it is to give information refuses to do so, or wilfully gives false information as to any of the required particulars, he will be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding **FIVE POUNDS**.

If the Head of the Family or other person responsible is unable to deliver the schedule personally to the Enumerator, he may instruct another person to do so. If desired it may be put under cover.

MEMORANDUM TO ENUMERATORS ON THE SUBJECT OF OCCUPATIONS.

1. Study and Revision of Schedule.—The Enumerator is reminded of his duty to study the instructions and examples on the Schedule, and to acquaint himself with the manner in which it should be filled up, in order that he may be competent to answer questions that may be put to him, and to revise the Schedules at the time of collection.

The Enumerator must carefully examine every Schedule returned to him. In the case of defective Schedules, he must ask the Occupier to add any particulars that may be necessary, or to furnish such information as will enable him to complete the Schedule himself. Care in this respect will probably save the Enumerator trouble and loss of time, as in case of an incomplete Schedule he may be required by the Registrar to revisit the house and obtain the missing particulars.

Column 10.

PERSONAL OCCUPATION.

2. Nature of Information required in Column 10.—This Column corresponds with that relating to Occupations on previous occasions.

The following instructions appear at the head of this Column in the Schedule :—

"The reply should show the precise branch of Profession, Trade, Manufacture, etc."

"If engaged in any Trade or Manufacture, the particular kind of work done, and the Article made or Material worked or dealt in, should be clearly indicated."

These instructions, as well as those on the back of the Schedule, have been framed with a view to obtaining sufficient information to enable the Census Clerks to classify every entry in Column 10 of the Schedule under the proper occupational heading, and the Enumerator must, therefore, assure himself that all the replies are in conformity with the instructions.

3. Types of Unsatisfactory Information in Column 10.

- (a.) Vague terms are used which must either be replaced by entirely new descriptions of the Occupations, or must be made satisfactory by the addition of further information.
- (b.) Terms common to different industries are used without the addition of the necessary distinctive description. The full and distinctive description must in all cases be added.
- (c.) Descriptions are used which do not show whether the persons are connected with Producing businesses, Selling businesses, or Storing businesses. In such cases the reply must indicate the class of business and the department in which the person works.
- (d.) Descriptions are used which do not show both the article or kind of goods made and the material worked or dealt in. Where articles (*e.g.*, Bags, Boxes, Hats) are made of different materials, or when materials are made into different commodities, each kind of manufacture being a distinct trade (*e.g.*, Glass into Glass Bottles, Sheet and Plate Glass, Flint Glass Wares), *both* the material and the article or kind of goods made must be stated in Column 10.

4. 5. Engineering and Metal Trades.—In the Census it is desired to have statistics as to workers connected with:—

Pig Iron Manufacture (Blast Furnaces),
Puddling Furnaces and Rolling Mills,
Steel Smelting and Founding,
Iron Founding,
and various Iron Goods Manufactures.

In many cases the same occupational names are used in more than one of these industries, and such words as "at Blast Furnace," "at Rolling Mills," "at Puddling Furnace," "at Steel Foundry," "Steel Smelting," "at Iron Foundry," must therefore be added to the ordinary description: the Enumerator will understand that "Ironworker" is a useless expression unless the kind of iron works in which the person is employed is also stated.

The answer in Column 10 should in all cases indicate whether the person is engaged in the *manufacture of a metal, i.e.,* converting, smelting, refining, or rolling, or in *making goods from a metal* (e.g. it is necessary to distinguish the persons making tin plates from the persons making goods out of tin plates). When metal goods are made, both the metal and the kind of goods or metal trade should be stated.

Another point to which the Enumerator's attention is requested is the use of the words "Engineer," "Electrical Engineer," and "Electrician." It should be shown whether these persons belong to the engineering profession or are engaged in making engines and machinery, in using or driving them, or in fitting electrical apparatus, etc.

6. Coal Mining.—The Enumerator must see that sufficient information is given in Column 10 for Colliery Workers to be correctly classed as "Workers at Coal Face," "Other workers below ground," or "Workers above ground." So many terms are equally applicable to below-ground and above-ground workers, that it is necessary in the case of Colliery Horsekeepers, Horse-Drivers, Ostlers, Inclinenmen, Haulage Engine Tenters, Pumpmen, Belt Boys, Way Cleaners, Oilers, Greasers, etc. to add the words "below ground" or "above ground," so as to leave no doubt as to where the person is mainly employed. Such terms as Coal Miner and Collier must not be used without full description of kind of work done.

7. Farmers, Farm Servant.—Every Occupier of land whose principal occupation is that of a "Farmer" or "Grazier" should state this fact, employing one or other of these terms. Sons or other Relatives (male and female) of Farmers, *if assisting in the work of the farm*, should be returned as "Farmer's Son working on Farm," "Farmer's Brother working on Farm," "Farmer's Daughter, Dairy Work," etc. Agricultural Labourers, and Farm Servants (not being Domestic Servants) should state the nature of their work and indicate by such terms as "Carter on Farm," "Cattleman on Farm," whether their main employment is the working or tending of horses, or the tending or management of cattle, etc. Where the work on the farm is of a general character and does not permit of any distinction being made, the term "Farm Servant" or "Agricultural Labourer" should be used. The term "Labourer" must of course not be used alone.

The Enumerator must take care where specific names such as "Wagoner," "Carter," "Horse-keeper," "Teamster," "Cattleman," "Cowman" are employed for workers on farms that they are invariably followed by the words "on Farm," and that Hinds are described as "Hind—Farm Bailiff," "Hind—Farm Foreman," "Hind in charge of horses," "Spade Hind," "Hind—Ordinary Farm Servant," etc., according to nature of employment, as the meaning of the term "Hind" varies according to the district in which it is used.

8. Seagoing Workers.—If a person follows his occupation on the Sea, the fact should be clearly indicated on the Schedule, preferably by the addition of such words as "Seagoing," "Steamship," or "Merchant Service." The word "Ship" is frequently used with Occupational names in connexion with the construction of ships and boats, and is therefore not sufficiently descriptive.

Column 11.

INDUSTRY OR SERVICE WITH WHICH THE WORKER IS CONNECTED.

9. Object of the Inquiry.—The question in Column 11 appears in the Census Schedule for the first time. At this Census it is desired not only to obtain information with regard to personal Occupation but also as to the various industries in connexion with which these occupations are pursued.

10. Cases in which information is required in Column 11.—In many instances an adequate description of the occupation implies the industry, and no entry is then required in Column 11,

but in other cases special information is required as to industry. These cases may be arranged under the following headings :—

- (1.) Persons engaged in an occupation from which the industry cannot be inferred.
- (2.) Persons engaged in an occupation connected with an industry other than that with which the occupation is usually connected.
- (3.) Persons engaged in industries carried on as auxiliary to other industries.
- (4.) Persons in the employ of firms carrying on two or more industries of which none can be said to be auxiliary to another.
- (5.) Persons engaged in the service of the Government or of Local Authorities.

11. Persons engaged in an occupation from which the industry cannot be inferred.—Some occupations followed by persons not actually engaged in processes of production are common to nearly all organised industries. Such terms as Clerk, Book-keeper, Store-keeper, Time-keeper, Carter, Carman, Vanman, Warehouseman, Packer, Engine Driver, Messenger, Porter, Watchman, etc. do not usually imply any specific industry. In these cases an entry must be made in Column 11 unless the distinctive description added in Column 10 is a clear indication of the industry with which the worker is connected.

12. Persons engaged in an occupation connected with an industry other than that with which the occupation is usually connected.—The principal occupations are those connected with the upkeep of premises and the maintenance of plant and rolling-stock, many firms having their own workmen for these purposes, but there are few occupations which are not at times carried on in connexion with industries other than those with which they are usually connected.

Carpenters, Bricklayers, Masons, Plasterers, Painters, Plumbers, Gas Fitters, and their Labourers, usually in the employment of Builders or other Masters in the Building Trades; Engineering Fitters, Metal Machinists, and other workers in occupations usually connected with Engineering Works; Wood Sawyers, Wood Machinists, and other Timber Trade workers may all be following their occupations in the direct employment of Manufacturers, Traders, Government Departments, Local Authorities, Railway and other Carrying Companies, etc.

In all such cases information as to the precise nature of the industry or service with which the worker is connected is required for Column 11, such as Colliery, Alkali Works, Cotton Spinners or Spinning, Government Dockyard, Corporation Gas Works, Urban District Council Tramways, Railway Company's Wagon Works, Building Department of Shipping Company or Docks Company. The Enumerator must realise that it is essential that such descriptions should be inserted in addition to full details of the personal occupation, as otherwise only an erroneous deduction can be drawn from the particulars given.

13. Persons engaged in Industries carried on as auxiliary to other Industries.—In these cases the precise branch of the auxiliary Trade, Manufacture, etc., showing the particular kind of work done, and the Article made or Material worked in, should be clearly indicated in Column 10, and the Industry or Service to which it is auxiliary in Column 11: thus for persons engaged in Tin Box Making and Lithographing, Wooden Box Making, Wooden Packing Case Making, Basket Making, Iron Hamper Making, Cardboard Box Making, Printing, Lithography, Bookbinding, etc., carried on as auxiliary to some Trade or Manufacture, the full description of the personal occupation must be given in Column 10 in accordance with the instructions at the head of that Column and the kind of business carried on by the employer in Column 11 as :—

Other examples of auxiliary industries are :—

The making of Envelopes, Paper Cases, Leather Cases in Needle Factories, of Textile Machinery Fittings in Textile Factories, of Type in Printing Works, of Bolts, Nuts, and Rivets in Engineering and other Works, and of Cotton, Wool, Worsted, Hemp, etc. Yarn in Carpet Factories; Saw Mills run as Department of Engineering Works and Railway Wagon Works; Clay Mining, etc. carried on by Earthenware Manufacturers and Cement Manufacturers, Brickmaking by Colliery Companies, Iron and Steel Manufacturers, etc.; Malting by Brewers; and so on.

In connexion with Railway Service, there are various undertakings such as Steamships, Hotels, Catering, Engineering Works, Carriage and Wagon Works. Shipping Companies and Harbour, Dock, etc. Services also have various undertakings carried on in connexion with them. The Enumerator should be on the alert to make sure that all workers in the Services mentioned are duly stated in the Schedules as employed in such Services.

14. Persons in the employ of firms carrying on two or more industries of which none can be said to be auxiliary to another.—For example :—Machinery and Shipbuilding; Small-arms and Cycles; Cycles and Motor Vehicles; Motor Vehicles and Horse-drawn Vehicles; Soap, Manure, and Candles.

If in such cases the Manufactures or Industries are carried on in separate establishments or in separate departments thereof, the nature of the manufacture or industry carried on in the separate establishment or department in which the worker is employed should be stated in Column 11. When the Manufactures or Industries are not separated, or when the personal occupation is in connexion with two or more of them, there is no alternative but for the various Manufactures or Industries to be stated in Column 11 in the order of their importance.

15. Persons engaged in the Service of the Government or of Local Authorities.—In the case of all Workers in the Manufacturing and Storing Departments of the Government, the Enumerator must take care that to the description of Employment such particulars as "Post Office Telegraph Works," "Royal Gun Factory," "Royal Carriage Department," "Royal Laboratory," "Royal

Small-arms Factory," "Royal Gunpowder Factory," "Royal Army Clothing Factory," "Government Dockyard," "Government Victualling Yard" are added. In the case of Persons employed in the Post Office Telegraph and Telephone Services, Enumerators should see that the words "Post Office" always appear, so that such workers may be distinguished from those in private employment.

All Workers for Local Authorities should be clearly distinguished. The principal Local Authorities are :—

- (1.) County Councils ;
- (2.) Borough and District Councils ;
- (3.) Poor Law Authorities.

All County Councils and some Borough and District Councils are also Education Authorities. Some of the Authorities have undertakings such as Cemeteries, Public Libraries, Markets, Baths and Wash-houses, Working Class Dwellings, Municipal Lodging Houses, Milk Depôts, Waterworks, Gas Works, Electricity Supply, Telephones, Tramways, Harbours, Docks, Canals, Piers, Quays, Ferries, and in Works of Construction. The Enumerator must see that persons in the service of the Local Authorities, whatever may be their occupation, are entered in the Census Schedules as being in the employment of these Local Authorities, and that if they are engaged in any of their special undertakings, the nature of the undertaking is also duly recorded. Examples :—

The Registrar-General recognises that the requirements of the Census Schedule in regard to "Industry or Service with which Worker is connected" may be the cause of a certain amount of trouble to some Enumerators, but he trusts he may rely on the hearty co-operation of every Officer to make this new feature in the Census successful.

INSTRUCTIONS CONTAINED IN SUPPLEMENTARY MEMORANDA :

(A.) MINING AND QUARRYING.

Column 10.

Persons engaged in mining, quarrying, and related occupations will be grouped in the Census Report under the following headings :—

Coal and Shale Mine—Workers at the coal face.
 " " Other Workers below ground.
 " " Workers above ground.
 Coke Burners.
 Patent Fuel Makers.
 Iron Ore Miners.
 Copper Miners.
 Tin Miners.
 Lead Miners.
 Miners in other Minerals.
 Mine—Owners, Agents, Managers.
 Other Mine Service.
 Stone Quarriers.
 Stone—Cutters, Dressers.
 Slate Quarriers.
 Slate Workers.
 Limeburners.
 Clay, Sand, Gravel, Chalk—Labourers.
 Other Workers in Products of Quarries.

It is necessary, therefore, that the information written in Column 10 should clearly indicate in every instance to which of the above classes the worker belongs. All workers in or about mines or quarries must state the kind of mine or quarry worked in.

Attention is directed, moreover, to Instruction 8 on the back of the Schedule, which states that :—

"Vague or indefinite terms must not be used alone Care should be taken that no occupational name common to different industries is used without a full and distinctive description."

Such a description as "Miner" (frequently returned) or "Coal Miner" does not enable the Census Clerks to determine which of the headings in the above list the worker belongs to. Even the term "Collier" is not sufficiently precise, as it does not in all districts imply work at the coal face.

The occupational terms popularly used in connexion with mining, quarrying, and allied industries are numerous, and for the purposes of the Census many of them, if used alone, are quite inadequate. Some of them are not restricted to any particular branch of mining or quarrying; some of those relating to coal mining are applied both to workers below and workers above ground; while other terms again may refer to different occupations in different districts. The same term (*e.g.*, haulier) is sometimes even used in the same district to describe certain mine or quarry workers as well as other workers in no way connected with these industries.

The following examples of such vague or inadequate terms (which have all been used at previous Censuses by mine or quarry workers as the sole description of their occupations) are given as illustrating defective descriptions to be avoided except when supplemented by additional information on the lines indicated below :—

Column 11.

While Column 10 refers to the worker's personal occupation, Column 11 has reference to the industry in which or in connexion with which he is engaged. In many instances an adequate description of the occupation implies the industry, and no entry is then required in Column 11, but in other cases special information is required as to industry.

Many workers employed at mines and quarries are engaged in—

- (1) Occupations which are common to many industries; for example, clerks, carters, watchmen.

(In these cases no inference as to industry can be drawn from Column 10.)

- (2) Occupations usually associated with some industry other than mining or quarrying; for example, bricklayers, painters, shunters.

(In these cases only a misleading inference as to industry can be drawn from Column 10.)

In such cases there would be no means of associating the worker with mining or quarrying without the information asked for in Column 11.

A statement of the employer's business will nearly always convey the information sought in Column 11. If the employer carries on more than one branch of business, that branch, of course, should be returned with which the worker is connected. The nature of the entries required may be further gathered from the following examples:—

It is necessary, therefore, that the information written in Column 10 should clearly indicate in every instance to which of the above classes the worker belongs.

Attention is directed, moreover, to Instruction 8 on the back of the Schedule, which states that :—

“ Vague and indefinite terms must not be used alone Care should be taken that no occupational name common to different industries is used without a full and distinctive description.”

The occupational terms popularly used in connexion with textile and allied industries are numerous, and for the purposes of the Census many of them, if used alone, are quite inadequate. Some of them are not only common to several kinds of textile trades or manufactures and even to different departments in the same industry, but are also used in connexion with non-textile businesses, while others have one meaning in one locality and a different meaning in another.

It is essential, therefore, that the reply on the Census Schedule should show the precise branch of trade, manufacture, etc., the particular kind of work done, and the article made or material worked or dealt in. Where articles are made of different materials, and where materials are made into different commodities, *both* the article made and the material worked or dealt in should be indicated.

When a person follows an occupation, or is described by an occupational name, common to two or more departments, the nature of the department or room should be added; thus bobbin carriers, cloth carriers, creelers, doffers, winders, reelers, spoolers, for example, should always give a clear indication of the process or department or room with which they are connected.

Persons employed as boxers, bundlers, folders, makers-up, packers, etc., should state whether they are engaged in the warehouse departments of spinning, weaving, or other textile factories, or in bleaching, printing, dyeing, finishing, etc. works.

The following are examples of terms commonly occurring in descriptions of occupations, which require to be supplemented by additional particulars on the lines indicated in the complete descriptions set out against them :—

Column 11.

While Column 10 refers to the worker's personal occupation, Column 11 has reference to the industry in which or in connexion with which he is engaged. In many instances an adequate description of the occupation implies the industry, and no entry is then required in Column 11, but in other cases special information is required as to industry.

Many workers employed in textile factories and warehouses are engaged in—

- (1) Occupations which are common to many industries ; for example, clerks, carters, watchmen.
(In these cases no inference as to industry can be drawn from Column 10.)
- (2) Occupations usually associated with some industry other than textile ; for example, bricklayers, painters, engineer's fitters.
- (3) Occupations auxiliary to textile manufacture which may be carried on in textile factories or independently ; such are the preparation of textile machinery fittings, engraving for calico printers.
(In cases (2) and (3) only a misleading inference as to industry can be drawn from Column 10.)

In such cases there would be no means of associating the worker with textile manufacture without the information asked for in Column 11.

A statement of the employer's business will nearly always convey the information sought in Column 11. If the employer carries on more than one branch of business, that branch, of course, should be returned with which the worker is connected. The nature of the entries required may be further gathered from the following examples :—

It is necessary, therefore, that the information written in Column 10 should clearly indicate in every instance to which of the above classes the worker belongs.

Attention is directed, moreover, to Instruction 8 on the back of the Schedule, which states that :—

“ Vague and indefinite terms must not be used alone Care should be taken that no occupational name common to different industries is used without a full and distinctive description.”

The reply on the Census Schedule should show the precise branch of trade, manufacture, etc., and the particular kind of work done, the article made, or material worked or dealt in. Where articles are made of different metals, or where metals are made into different commodities, each kind of manufacture being a distinct trade, *both* the metal and the article or kind of goods made must be stated in Column 10.

The answer in Column 10 should, in all cases, indicate whether the person is engaged in the manufacture, *i.e.*, converting, smelting, refining, or rolling of a metal, or in making goods from a metal (*e.g.*, it is necessary to distinguish the persons making tin plates from those making goods out of tin plates).

In many cases similar occupational names are used by workers connected with :—

Pig Iron Manufacture (Blast Furnaces),
Puddling Furnaces and Rolling Mills,
Steel Smelting and Founding,
Iron Founding,
and various Iron Goods Manufactures.

For this reason, it is very desirable that such words as "at Blast Furnace," "at Rolling Mills," "at Puddling Furnace," "at Steel Foundry," "Steel Smelting," "at Iron Foundry," be added to the ordinary description if it does not unmistakably show in which industry the person works. Words such as "Ironworker," "Iron Works," and "Steel Works" are not sufficiently distinctive, and should not be used unless the kind of work is also stated.

When the words "Engineer," "Electrical Engineer," and "Electrician" are used in the Census Schedule they should always be supplemented by such information as will signify whether the person belongs to the engineering profession, or is engaged in making engines and machinery, in using or driving them, or in fitting electrical apparatus, etc.

In describing the occupations of Seagoing Engineers and Electricians, such terms as "Seagoing," "Steamship," or "Merchant Service" should in all cases be employed.

The following are examples of terms commonly occurring in descriptions of occupations, which require to be supplemented by additional particulars on the lines indicated in the complete descriptions set out against them:—

In many instances an adequate description of the occupation implies the industry, and no entry is then required in Column 11, but in other cases special information is required as to industry.

Many workers employed in factories, workshops, warehouses, etc., are engaged in :—

- (1) Occupations which are common to many industries, for example, clerks, carters, watchmen.

(In these cases no inference as to industry can be drawn from Column 10.)

- (2) Occupations usually associated with some industry other than the particular engineering, metal, or other trade in which they are employed ; for example, bricklayers, carpenters, house-painters.

- (3) Occupations auxiliary to engineering, metal, etc. trades, which may be carried on in connexion with such industries, but are usually carried on independently : such as brickmaking in connexion with iron and steel manufacture, wooden box making in connexion with tinplate manufacture, the making of wooden packing cases, leather cases, paper cases, etc., in connexion with several metal industries.

(In cases (2) and (3) only a misleading inference as to industry can be drawn from Column 10.)

In such cases there would be no means of associating the worker with the engineering, metal, or other trade, without the information asked for in Column 11.

Persons following engineering, metal, etc. trades, but employed in connexion with industries other than their own, or in government, local government, railway, dock, etc. service, should invariably state their personal occupation fully in Column 10, and the industry or service in which they are employed in Column 11.

A statement of the employer's business will nearly always convey the information sought in Column 11. If the employer carries on more than one branch of business, that branch, of course, should be returned with which the worker is connected.

When the personal occupation is in connexion with two or more of them, there is no alternative but for the various manufactures or industries to be stated in Column 11 in the order of their importance. The nature of the entries required may be further gathered from the following examples :—

SIR,

We have now the honour to submit the 11th volume of the Report on the Census of 1911, which deals with certain infirmities of the people. A column asking particulars of those suffering from infirmities was first introduced into the schedule at the Census of 1851, and the following statement shows the form in which the question has been put at each of the last seven Censuses.

It will be observed that this is the first occasion on which an attempt has been made to obtain any information regarding the deaf other than deaf mutes. This was felt to be desirable both because at previous censuses many persons were returned as deaf who were not stated to be dumb, though the information was not sought for; and because, in view of the progress made in phonetic training of deaf mutes, it was felt that reasonable exception might be taken to the description as deaf-mute of persons who, while remaining deaf, had acquired the art of intelligible speech. In view of the obvious worthlessness of returns of the partially deaf, if the public were left without guidance as to the degree of defect of which cognizance should be taken, and of the impossibility of securing general and intelligent application by householders of any standard prescribed for their guidance in the matter, it was decided to reduce the inquiry to the simplest possible terms, namely, whether there was total deafness. By this means it was hoped that the need for prescribing any test of the degree of deafness referred to might be avoided. The

similar difficulty as to degree of blindness referred to was dealt with in the same way and for the same reasons, it having been obvious at previous censuses that the term "blind" was differently interpreted in different cases. An attempt was also made to ascertain the duration of the infirmity in every case and not only, as at previous censuses, in those cases where the affliction dated from birth or from childhood. We regret to have to report, however, that these additions to the schedule have not led to the improvement in the statistics which might have been looked for. As regards the value of the figures for the totally deaf, it is impossible to speak definitely since the voluntary returns of deafness at previous censuses are obviously incomplete; as regards the blind, however, it seems probable that a number of persons have been returned as totally blind who possess some degree of sight, for it was apparent from discussion before the census with those interested in the welfare of the blind that the information desired in regard to this matter is rather that of the number of persons whose defect of vision is so serious as to forbid ordinary means of earning a livelihood. While in fullest sympathy with this desire, we have found ourselves unable to devise any means by which the ordinary mechanism of an English census could be adapted to its accomplishment; but the fact that what may be referred to as economic blindness is, much more than total blindness, the defect of which the presence or absence is of real interest and importance, has probably led to its mention in many cases, even where some slight amount of vision is retained. The attempt to ascertain the duration of the infirmity was made by asking at what age the person became afflicted, but this apparently simple question has been widely misunderstood, and in many cases the number of years the infirmity has lasted has obviously been returned. Knowing that this error was widespread, but not being able to distinguish, in many cases, whether it was the age or duration which had been returned, we have deemed it best to make no use of these figures in the accompanying tables.

While fully realising the great importance of attempting to ascertain the numbers of persons afflicted with certain infirmities, we must submit that statistics of this nature obtained through a general population census are most unsatisfactory, firstly, on account of the difficulty of framing a suitable form of inquiry defining the degree of disability which it is desired to include in the tabulation, and, secondly, because the definition has to be applied by householders with no technical knowledge, who will interpret it in different ways and many of whom have a natural reluctance to admit that they or their relatives suffer from any defect—at least to the degree referred to in the inquiry. This was put most strongly by the Census Commissioners of 1881, who stated in their report (C. 3797, page 71):—" . . . we felt bound to point out, as clearly as we could, how very incomplete are the returns which relate to these afflictions, and more especially those which relate to idiocy and imbecility. We have done the best we could with these unsatisfactory data. We cannot, however, but express our decided opinion that statements made by persons as to the deficiencies, mental or bodily, of their children or other relatives are not worth the cost and labour of collection and tabulation." They also quoted the results of an investigation into the admissions into a large idiot asylum during the year following the date of the census, which showed that in one-half of the cases of admissions as indisputable idiots between the ages of 5 and 15 no entry had been made on the census schedule which had been filled in a few weeks or months before.

The Report on the Census of 1891 characterised these statistics as "in all probability excessively inaccurate," while in the Report for 1901 it is stated:—"Concerning the above named infirmities it should be clearly understood that the machinery of an ordinary English Census is but imperfectly adapted to furnish the required particulars with that degree of accuracy which is essential for statistical purposes. It is because experience has impressed us with this conviction that we have abstained from entering into minute details which, had the data been more reliable, would have proved highly instructive and useful."

The Royal Commission on the Care and Control of the Feeble-minded report as follows on the unsuitability of the Census as an agency for ascertaining facts concerning mental defect:—" . . . the census, it appears to us, is not an agency suitable for the ascertainment and classification of facts the nature of which in very many instances can only be learned by the personal observation of men and women whose judgment has been trained and well practised in a special branch of medical work. Both for administrative and scientific purposes it would be better, we think, to ascertain the facts by special investigation such as that which has been made by our medical investigators, or by means of the cumulative records which we hope may be compiled as confidential documents, as soon as the importance of the subject is recognised." (Cd. 4202, page 198).

In this connexion it may be mentioned that the investigations of the Royal Commission in 1905 proved that the Census figures for the mentally defective had been much understated in 1901.

In foreign countries much the same impression prevails as to the unsatisfactory nature of the infirmity inquiry, and, therefore, in some cases a technical inquiry conducted by experts into the degree, cause, duration, etc., of the affliction follows the obtaining by the general census of the names and addresses of the infirm. In reply to a question on this point, the census authorities of the United States of America wrote as follows:—" . . . one of the reasons for not including inquiries regarding physical and mental defects on the population schedule of the 12th census (1900) of the United States was the realisation of the impossibility of getting accurate information on these points in a large number of cases, not only on account of the difficulty of defining the degree of impairment which would constitute a defect, but because of the sensitiveness of persons affected and their consequent concealment of such defects in themselves and members of their families. These questions, at the 11th Census, gave rise to much criticism and complaint, and the attempt to secure these data was therefore abandoned." It is observed, however, that at the 13th Census (1910) questions relating to blindness and deaf-mutism have been again introduced, with a view, we understand, to the subsequent professional inquiry referred to above.

The tables which accompany the present report give, *inter alia*, the sex, age, and condition as to marriage of the totally blind, totally deaf, deaf and dumb, lunatic, imbecile, and feeble-minded, and of those suffering from more than one of these infirmities in England and Wales and in each administrative county, inclusive of its associated county boroughs, but as our experience gives us no reason to hope that the figures are appreciably more accurate on this than on previous occasions, we have not felt justified in entering upon an elaborate analysis of the figures, and have therefore confined our comments within narrow limits.

THE BLIND.

The Report on the Census of 1901 recommended that expert opinion should be taken as to what constitutes "Blindness," but from the inquiries which we made prior to the Census of 1911, we found there were many diverse opinions as to how blindness should be defined. A definition which had met with a certain amount of international acceptance, and the employment of which might therefore have in some degree conduced to international comparability of the returns, was rejected by the English experts consulted as inadequate to their requirements. With a view, therefore, to making the question as definite as possible in order to obtain uniformity of results, the schedule asked only for particulars of the "totally blind," but, for the reasons previously stated it is extremely doubtful whether the figures obtained accurately represent their numbers. The numbers so returned were 26,336, of whom 13,257 were males and 13,079 were females—that is, one person in every 1,370 is blind, one in 1,316 males, and one in 1,424 females. Of the males, 5,434 were unmarried, 5,537 were married, and 2,286 widowed; of the females, 5,731 were unmarried, 2,899 were married, and 4,449 were widowed. The following table compares the number of "totally blind" in 1911 with the numbers returned as "blind" at previous censuses. It will be seen that the decrease in the proportion of blind per million of the population in the last decennium, while greater than in the previous decennium, was neither so great as between the censuses of 1871 and 1881 and 1881 and 1891, nor so great as might have been expected owing to the limitation of the inquiry. In fact, it would almost seem that the question as to blindness, however framed, is answered in much the same way. Probably a householder accustomed to think and speak of himself or one of his dependents as "blind" would in many cases return him so in the schedule, and if not so accustomed would not make the return in this form, however the question was framed and whatever definition of "blindness" was adopted.

Table II. shows the proportion of blind per million of each sex at twelve groups of ages for each of the last five censuses. It will be seen that the proportion of males exceeds that of females at every age period except the last two, and particularly in the working period of life, when the greater risk of accidents leading to blindness, involved by the occupations of males, would have most effect.

Comparing the figures for 1911 with those for 1901, it will be seen that improvement was recorded in each age-group except that of the females under 5 years, which shows a very slight increase. The improvement, as at previous censuses, was somewhat greater among males than among females. It was particularly marked in both sexes at the age 10-15, which, for some reason, had shown at the previous census a considerable increase in the proportion returned as blind in both sexes.

Table 5, page 71, gives the occupations followed by the blind; where an occupation is given inconsistent with the infirmity, it may generally be assumed that the former occupation of the afflicted person has been returned, or that he is an employer. The following table shows the chief occupations in which the blind are employed and the proportion per 1,000 blind persons of each sex engaged in each occupation. By far the greatest number of blind males are employed as willow, cane, rush workers, or as basket makers; the next highest number being musicians, music masters, singers; then follow costermongers, hawkers, street-sellers; musical instrument makers (including tuners); brokers, agents, factors; mat makers; and grocers. Willow, cane, rush working and basket making also employ the largest number of blind females, the only other occupation employing more than one per cent. of the blind females aged 10 years and upwards being hosiery manufacture.

THE DEAF (Other than Deaf-Mutes).

As previously stated, the Census of 1911 was the first occasion on which an attempt was made to ascertain the numbers of the deaf who were not also dumb. At previous enumerations, although no return was asked for, many persons were voluntarily returned as deaf, and in 1891 and 1901 these returns, though obviously incomplete, were tabulated. In 1891 they numbered 15,088, and in 1901 18,507, the numbers returned as totally deaf in 1911 being 26,649, of whom 10,640 were males and 16,009 females. Of the males 4,441 were unmarried, 4,661 were married, and 1,538 widowed; 6,344 of the females were unmarried, 5,174 were married, and 4,491 widowed. The following table shows that 610 in every million males were totally deaf and 860 per million females, and that this remarkable excess of females obtained at every age group after 15, previous to which the female rate of deafness did not differ very materially from the male rate.

THE DEAF AND DUMB.

In addition to the 26,649 persons returned simply as deaf there were 13,427 who were also dumb, and 1,695 who were stated to be dumb, but not stated to be deaf; for convenience the dumb have been included with the deaf and dumb. Of these 8,167 were males and 6,955 females, being in the proportion of 468 per million males and 373 per million females. Of the males 6,362 were unmarried, 1,603 were married, and 202 were widowed; of the females 5,256 were unmarried, 1,393 were married, and 306 widowed. The following table shows the proportions of the deaf and dumb per million of the population of each sex at different ages at each of the last five censuses:—

It will be seen that in 1911 the proportion of the deaf and dumb is lower than at any previous census shown in the Table, the improvement, which is considerably in excess of any previously recorded, being shown at nearly all the age-groups. Whether the last ten only or the whole forty years are considered, the improvement is, as might be expected, from the success of modern educative methods, much more marked in early than in later life. In marked contrast to the proportions for the deaf only, given in Table IV., it will be seen that among deaf-mutes the males outnumber the females, and that while the proportions of the deaf increase very rapidly with advancing years, no such increase, naturally, is observable in the proportion of deaf-mutes. The table on pages 71 to 78 shows the occupations followed by the deaf and dumb, from which it will be seen that those employing most persons are as follows:—

THE INSANE.

The Census of 1911 was the fifth occasion on which an attempt has been made to ascertain the number of persons suffering from mental infirmity, who for the sake of convenience will all be referred to as insane, whether lunatic, imbecile, or merely feeble-minded. Previous to 1901 a return was asked of persons who were "lunatic," "imbecile," or "idiot," but in 1901, since it had been represented that the term "idiot" was considered to be somewhat opprobrious and therefore liable to lead to concealment of the truth, it was omitted, the term imbecile being used to include all the major degrees of congenital mental defect. At the same time the term feeble-minded was introduced for the first time in order to cover the minor degrees of this condition, to which a considerable amount of public attention had been directed. On the present occasion the question as to mental unsoundness was asked in the same form as in 1901. Although the substitution referred to destroys the value of the later figures for purposes of comparison with those of the earlier censuses, the figures for all five censuses are brought together in the following table for convenience of reference.

It will be noticed that the increase in the proportions between 1901 and 1911 is higher than in either of the two periods previous to the change in classification, and the question naturally arises whether the figures represent a real or only an apparent increase in insanity. On this point we quote the opinion of the Commissioners in Lunacy, expressed in their 65th Annual Report, that for 1910 (pages 11 and 12).

"The increase in the number of the insane recorded year by year is no proof of an actual growth of insanity in the community, although it is often assumed to be such. There are, in point of fact, no sufficient data for a correct judgment on the latter head, and such facts as are available tend to the conclusion that if insanity is increasing at all it is doing so very slowly and by no means proportionately to the increasing numbers of insane persons under care. . . . It is probable that far more care is taken to segregate persons suffering from the milder forms of insanity than used to be the case, fitness for such detention being considered to imply the need for treatment of a disease quite as much as the fact that the insane person requires protection from himself or that the community has to be protected from him. . . . Hence it happens that, without any actual marked increase in the prevalence of mental disorder, many such defectives are now being notified who a generation or two ago would have been left outside the pale of official recognition."

As at each of the previous censuses, the proportion of the female insane was higher than the male proportion, but the excess was less than it had been at any census since 1881. In equal numbers living there were to 1,000 male insane 1,043 females in 1871; 1,065 in 1881; 1,077 in 1891; 1,065 in 1901; and 1,054 in 1911.

The following table brings up to date a table printed in the 1901 report, and shows the insanity rate per million living at various age-groups at the last five censuses, with the increase or decrease per cent. between the censuses.

If the figures for 1901 and 1911 are divided into the two categories "lunatic" and "imbecile or feeble-minded," as in the following table, it will be seen that while both forms of mental defect contribute to the large increase in the two age-groups under 15 and 15-25, the increase in the case of the lunatic is considerably in excess of that for the imbecile and feeble-minded, while beyond these age-groups the increase is wholly among the lunatic. The decrease in the number of imbecile and feeble-minded would seem to suggest that the term "feeble-minded" has been more restricted in its application than in 1901 to cases of congenital mental defect.

Of the 161,993 persons who were returned as suffering from mental infirmity 106,660 were returned as lunatic, 25,405 as imbecile, and 29,928 as feeble-minded. In 1901, 83,772 were returned as lunatic, and 48,882 as imbecile or feeble-minded; thus there was an increase of 22.1 per cent. in the insane taken as a whole, of 27.3 per cent. in the lunatic, and 13.2 per cent. in the imbecile or feeble-minded.

As is to be expected, the proportion of persons suffering from one or other form of mental unsoundness increases with age, the proportion of insane among those of 85 and upwards being, for instance, ten times as great as among those of from 10 to 15—earlier than age 10 the figures are more than usually unreliable, for until that age and possibly even after, parents refuse to admit, even to themselves, that their children will not grow into normally-minded adults. It will be seen that, though the proportion of lunatics is far in excess of that for the imbecile or feeble-minded, the preponderance does not commence until the age-group 20–25 is reached; the proportion then rises rapidly to the age-group 65–75, when, owing presumably to the greater mortality of lunatics, a slight fall is recorded. The proportion of the imbecile rises until the age-group 20– is reached, fluctuates between that and 65–, and is very high at 75– and 85–. Probably the term imbecile has not been restricted in later life to cases of congenital mental defect. The feeble-minded show a rising proportion in the first four age-periods, fall from 15– to 45–, and then rise continuously until they reach a proportion of 6 per 1,000 at 85 and upwards.

The following table shows how many of the various classes of the insane were enumerated in lunatic asylums (that is, in County, Borough, and State asylums, in registered hospitals and licensed houses, and in the imbecile asylums of the Metropolitan Asylums Board), workhouses, other institutions, and elsewhere; the figures for 1911 exclude the 1,965 insane persons who were also blind, deaf, or deaf and dumb.

It may be observed that most of the lunatics are being cared for in asylums only 795, or 0·8 per cent., being in the charge of private individuals, and that while the total number of the insane increased in the ten years by 27,374, or 20·6 per cent., the number of inmates in asylums increased by 23,590, or 26·1 per cent.

Owing to the fact that many institutions receive patients belonging to counties other than that in which they are situated, there is much room for fallacy in the comparison of the total numbers of the insane in the various counties. The figures for the insane under private care are also of doubtful value for purposes of comparison since they are subject to so many different factors in the different counties; they are doubtless affected not only by the accommodation available in institutions, but also by the varying accuracy in filling up the schedules. The following table may, however, prove of interest.

COMBINED INFIRMITIES.

There were 335 persons who were blind and lunatic, 333 dumb and imbecile, 228 deaf and lunatic, and 204 deaf and dumb and lunatic.

SIR,

The results of the Census inquiry as to the number of persons in Wales and the county of Monmouth who speak English only or Welsh only, or both English and Welsh, are embodied in the volume which we have the honour to submit herewith.

Scope of the Inquiry.—This information was required by the provisions of the Census (Great Britain) Act, 1910, in addition to the particulars as to sex, age, condition as to marriage, occupation, birthplace, etc., which were required to be furnished with respect to every person in England and Wales. The question as to language spoken related specifically to persons who abode on the night of the census (2nd April, 1911) in Wales and Monmouthshire; it excluded, therefore, persons of Welsh nationality who were enumerated in England (exclusive of Monmouthshire), while it included persons who were not of Welsh nationality, but were enumerated within the specified area. No return was required with respect to children under three years of age.

Returns of previous censuses.—Similar inquiries have been made at two previous censuses. In the Census Act of 1900 the terms are identical with those in the Act of 1910, but in 1890, children under three years of age were not excluded from this provision of the Act, and no direct reference was made to persons speaking English only. The census of 1891 being the first occasion on which the inquiry was made, some want of precision in the replies was perhaps inevitable, although the instruction printed on the schedule was apparently clear. In the column headed "Language spoken" the wording was "If only English, write 'English'; if only Welsh, write 'Welsh'; if English and Welsh, write 'Both'." In tabulating the replies, however, it was found that many persons who could speak both languages were returned as "Welsh," presumably on the ground that Welsh was the language habitually spoken, and that a similar statement had often been made in the case of infants who were only a few months, or even only a few days old. The published results of the tabulation in 1891, however, exclude all children under two years of age, and the statements with reference to infants below that age do not therefore affect the figures. It is unfortunate that the limit of age then adopted did not coincide with that which ten years later was prescribed by the Census Act, because it prevents exact comparisons with later censuses. Moreover, the area of tabulation in the 1891 Census Report was the Registration District and County, and no detail as to age in combination with the language spoken was given in the table, while the results of both the 1901 and 1911 censuses are shown by age-periods and for Administrative Areas, that is Administrative Counties, County Boroughs, Urban Districts, and Rural Districts.

Standard of proficiency in English or Welsh.—No definite rules for the guidance either of the persons who have had to make returns of the language spoken by the members of their families or of the local officers whose duty it was to collect and to revise the returns have been laid down as regards the degree of acquaintance with either language which would enable a person to claim or to disclaim ability to speak it. It may have been held by some that the habitual use of one or both of the languages was the subject of the inquiry; while others may have regarded the question from the literary or educational standpoint, and the replies, quite accurate according to the point of view, might mean entirely different things in the two cases. In fact it has to be determined whether the replies generally indicate only the language which is the mother tongue or is acquired

naturally by intercourse with neighbours; or whether they represent, in addition, a linguistic proficiency attained by study, either during the ordinary term of school-life or subsequently. The evidence of the tabulated results appears to favour the view that scholastic instruction in one or other language has as a rule been taken into account in the census schedules, for the proportion of bilinguals in the population increases very rapidly in the age period, 5-15, and then more slowly up to a maximum at 45-65 years of age; more than forty thousand children, however, between the ages of 5 and 15, are returned as able to speak "Welsh only." It is at least probable that some ability to speak both languages is in many cases not acknowledged in the census return when only one language is in common use, but it is not obvious from the figures whether the consequent exaggeration of the monoglot population is greater among persons returned as able to speak "English only," or among those returned as able to speak "Welsh only."

Method of Tabulation.—At the two previous censuses the tabulation has not been performed as on the present occasion directly from the entries made on the schedules, but from copies of these returns made by the local enumerators. At all three censuses it has been the duty of the enumerators, when collecting the schedules, to examine them and to make any necessary corrections and additions. The results show, however, that particulars as to the language spoken have been omitted more frequently at the present census than would appear to have been the case either in 1891 or in 1901. A very large number of the schedules contained the required information only as regards the head of the family, and the total population for whom no statement was made amounted to no less than 58,517 in 1911, while in 1901 the number for whom no particulars were entered in the enumerators' returns was only 2,757. It may be inferred, therefore, either that the schedules in 1911 were returned in a more defective condition than at the earlier census, or that many of the defects in the 1901 schedules were concealed in the process of copying, the assumption probably being made by the enumerator that all persons entered on the schedule would have the same linguistic status as the head of the family. This assumption appears from reference to the returns to be generally, but not universally, true; and therefore children for whom no statement as to language spoken has been made, but who were enumerated on schedules in which the head of the family was returned as speaking English only, Welsh only, or both English and Welsh, have been distinguished in columns 12 to 17 of Table 1, page 1. The first group (head of family speaking English only) amounted to 19,647, the second to 2,803, and the third to 11,798.

General results compared with previous Censuses.—The proportions per 1,000 of the population tabulated under the several headings at the three censuses are shown in the following table:—

In comparing 1901 with 1891 the most noticeable feature is the large increase in the proportion of bilinguals and the large decrease of the monoglot Welsh population. It may be assumed, however, that this remarkable change in the proportions resulted not so much from the diffusion of a knowledge of English among those who had formerly been ignorant of that language as from the tendency, already mentioned, to an overstatement of the number of monoglot Welsh in 1891. This assumption appears to be confirmed by the relative stability of the proportion of the bilinguals in 1901 and 1911. The large increase at the latter date in the proportion of cases in which no statement was made as

* The figures for 1891 relate to the registration area, which does not coincide with the administrative area to which the figures for 1901 and 1911 relate.

to the language spoken has been explained in a preceding paragraph as being due principally to the adoption of a different method of dealing with the returns, but after making all possible allowance for the disturbance thus caused in the proportions for each of the defined classes there appears to have been a very considerable diminution of the monoglot Welsh.

The total number of English-speaking persons (over 3 years of age) increased from 846 per 1,000 in 1901 to 887 per 1,000 in 1911, while the total Welsh-speaking decreased from 499 per 1,000 to 435 per 1,000; or comparing actual numbers instead of proportions there were 1,577,141 English-speaking persons at the former census against 1,995,356 at the latter, while the numbers of Welsh-speaking were 929,824 and 977,366 respectively. Thus the ratio of English-speakers to Welsh-speakers which had been 170 to 100 in 1901, rose in 1911 to 204 to 100. Persons returned as speaking English only comprised 59 per cent. of the total English-speaking in 1901, and 61 per cent. in 1911; while those returned as speaking Welsh only were 30 per cent. of the total Welsh-speaking in 1901, against only 19 per cent. in 1911.

Age-distribution of the several classes of the population.—The returns, which have been tabulated in seven groups of ages, show that in proportion to the total number living in any of the specified age-groups, English-speaking persons are most numerous at ages 15–25, bilinguals at 45–65, and Welsh-speaking persons at 65 and upwards. The proportion of monoglot English is highest in childhood, and diminishes steadily at each succeeding age-period; while the proportion of monoglot Welsh is high in infancy (3–5 years) and diminishes rapidly to a minimum at age 15–25, afterwards rising with advancing age until at 65 and upwards it is far higher than at any other period of life. These features are observable also in the returns of the 1901 census as far as they are comparable with those of 1911, but at the earlier census the numbers under 15 years were tabulated in one group only as against three on the present occasion; and it will be seen that the numbers of defective returns at the latter date have affected the comparisons most seriously at the earliest ages.

The proportions of monoglots in the total English-speaking population at the several groups of ages showed but little variation at the two censuses; there was a slight increase at the ages between 15 and 65 years, but in childhood and old age the percentage remained constant. The proportion of monoglots in the total Welsh-speaking population declined at each age-group, the decrease per cent. being greatest in childhood and least in old age.

Sex comparisons.—In proportion to the total numbers of the respective sexes, more females than males are returned as able to speak both English and Welsh, in the monoglot population there are more males in the English-speaking section, and more females in the Welsh-speaking section. The slight proportional excess of females in the bilingual population is not sufficient to counterbalance their deficiency among the monoglot English, and they are therefore proportionally less numerous than males in the total English-speaking population. The remainder of the population not classified by language spoken is divided evenly between the sexes, so that the above comparisons are probably not invalidated by the defective returns. Moreover, if the assumption is made that the statement as to language spoken by the head of the family may be accepted as applying also to the sons and daughters for whom no statement was made, the additions to the population

speaking English only, Welsh only, and both English and Welsh are in equal proportions for the two sexes. Of the small number returned as speaking "Other Languages" (3,762 persons in all), about two-thirds were males between 15 and 45 years of age, many of them being foreign seamen, and less than one-fifth (666) were females.

These figures show that while the proportion of males is higher than that of females among the monoglot English at all age-groups, and increases generally with advancing age, the sex-proportions among the monoglot Welsh vary very considerably at different periods of life. At each of the first four age-groups the males speaking Welsh only are proportionally more numerous than the females, but from 25 years upwards the latter become increasingly in excess. The proportion of bilinguals in 1,000 of each sex is greater for females than for males at each age-group except the last. The ratio of females to males in the whole population, however, differs very much at the age-group 65 and upwards from those at all the preceding age-groups; at the first three age-groups the numbers of each sex are approximately equal, but at the next three, males are largely in excess, there being respectively 937, 924, and 946 females to 1,000 males; at 65 and upwards, however, the ratio is 1,219 females to 1,000 males; and it may be noted that the proportional deficiency of females of advanced age among the bilingual and the monoglot English populations is compatible with a numerical excess, amounting in both cases to between two and three thousand, while the proportional excess of bilingual females at ages 15-65 represents a numerical deficiency amounting to upwards of ten thousand. The general excess of males in the whole of the registration division of Wales and Monmouthshire is due to the large net gain by excess of immigration over emigration; this has occurred entirely in Monmouthshire, Glamorganshire, Carmarthenshire, and, to a very slight extent, in Flintshire, and resulted during the last inter-censal period, in a net addition of 137,847 persons to the population of these four counties. In the other nine counties there was a net loss of population amounting to 42,532 persons, so that on the whole there was net gain to the population of Wales and Monmouthshire of 95,315 persons, the majority of whom were males. The birthplace returns show that of the 1,231,739 males enumerated in Wales and Monmouthshire, 261,803 were born elsewhere, while of the 1,189,182 females, only 208,804 were born elsewhere. These figures may help to explain why in the monoglot English population males are more numerous than females, while the reverse is the case in the monoglot Welsh population.

Local distribution of the several classes of the population.—We have so far referred to the population of Wales and Monmouthshire as a whole, but it is evident that the distribution of the several classes of the population, in its linguistic aspect, will show considerable variations according to the circumstances of the different parts of the country, and we shall therefore now proceed to compare the statistics of the various local divisions.

Persons speaking English only.—This section of the population is, as has already been shown, more numerous than any other, comprising 53·7 per cent. of the whole. Among the several counties, however, the proportions show some very wide variations, being as low as 7·7 per cent. in Merionethshire, 8·5 per cent. in Anglesey, and 8·7 per cent. in Cardiganshire, and as high as 65·3 per cent. in Pembrokeshire, 86·3 per cent. in Monmouthshire, and 93·4 per cent. in Radnorshire.

With the three exceptions of Monmouthshire, Pembrokeshire, and Radnorshire, all the counties show an increase since 1901 in the proportions of monoglot English, and in the three exceptions the decreases are insignificant and may be due entirely to the increased numbers "not stated." As regards the age-distribution, it may be observed that those counties with high proportions follow the general rule for the whole of Wales, namely, highest proportions in childhood (up to 15 years) and decreasing proportions at subsequent successive age-groups; Pembrokeshire, in which the maximum proportion is reached at age 15-25, is the only real exception. On the other hand, in counties with low proportions speaking English only the maxima occur generally at ages 15-45. The case of Anglesey appears somewhat anomalous, but examination of the returns shows that the peculiar rise in the proportion at age 10-15 is due to the inclusion in the county figures of a large number of English boys who were on board a training ship.

The above table shows that the counties fall into two well-defined groups, (1) Anglesey, Carnarvonshire, Merionethshire, Cardiganshire, and Carmarthenshire, in which the persons speaking English only form but a small minority; and (2) Flintshire, Montgomeryshire, Radnorshire, Brecknockshire, Monmouthshire, Glamorganshire, and Pembrokeshire, in which the persons speaking English only outnumber all the other classes of the population. Denbighshire occupies a position between the two groups, the monoglot English being only 41·7 per cent. of the total population. It will be seen that the predominantly Welsh-speaking counties comprise a continuous area extending along the whole of the western half of the Principality—Pembrokeshire being a detached member of the group of predominantly English-speaking counties.

The administrative counties are convenient units for comparison, but Table 3, on pages 47 to 51, which shows the proportions at the censuses of 1901 and 1911 of the various classes of population (without distinction of sex or age) in the several urban and rural districts, indicates how widely the conditions differ within the same county. Thus, Llanrwst Rural District on the western side of Denbighshire had only 55 monoglot English per 1,000, while Chirk Rural District, on the opposite side of the county, had 533; Machynlleth Rural District, on the western side of Montgomeryshire, had only 28 monoglot English per 1,000, while Forden Rural District, on the eastern side, had 895 per 1,000. There is, on the whole, a distinct tendency to greater frequency of monoglot English in urban than in rural districts, but there are many exceptions to the rule; geographical position and other conditions appear to be more important factors than mere aggregation in urban communities. In Monmouthshire, for example, Rhymney Urban District had only 387 per 1,000 monoglot English, and a lower figure than that recorded for any rural district in the county (viz., 831 per 1,000 in St. Mellons Rural District) was shown by four other urban districts. In some cases, as in Aberystwyth, Barmouth,

Colwyn Bay, and Llandudno the fact of their being holiday resorts accounts for an excess of monoglot English compared with that in the districts surrounding them; while in Pembrokeshire the two rural districts of Llanfyrnach and St. Dogmells are overwhelmingly Welsh-speaking in contrast to the rest of the county, and these two districts are more closely connected geographically with the Welsh-speaking county of Cardiganshire, in which, indeed, they are included for poor law purposes. The small county of Radnor is the only one in which the several districts do not show diversity, and in this case they are uniformly English-speaking.

Persons speaking Welsh only.—In this section of the population were included 92,737 males and 97,555 females in 1911, against 137,333 males and 143,572 females in 1901. Thus in the ten years there has been a decline amounting to 90,613 in the number of persons who have been returned as speaking Welsh only, and the proportion to the total population has fallen from 151 to 85 per 1,000. This decline has been shared, though very unequally, by all the thirteen counties, those in which the proportions of monoglot Welsh at both censuses were lowest having on the whole shown the greatest relative decrease.

As regards the distribution at the several age-groups, the consistent diminution from the first period (3-5 years) to the fourth (15-25 years), and the subsequent increase at each successive period observed for Wales and Monmouthshire as a whole, is found, practically without exception, in each county. In four of the counties over one-third of the population above 3 years of age is returned as speaking Welsh only, and in each of these cases the maximum proportion is at the youngest age-group; in all the remaining counties, except Montgomeryshire, the maximum proportions are at the other extreme of life.

In view of the large decrease in the proportion of monoglot Welsh at all ages, it is interesting to note to what extent the populations at the several ages have contributed to the decline. The ratio per cent. of the proportions in 1911 to those in 1901 are shown in the following statement for the whole area, and for the four most predominantly Welsh-speaking counties:—

The greatest proportional decrease, therefore, occurred in the age group 15-25, and a rather smaller decrease in the group 25-45; no separate comparisons can be made for the children between 3 and 5 years, 5 to 10, or 10 to 15, but the whole group from 3 to 15 showed less decrease than either of the two young adult groups in spite of the general instruction in the English language in the schools; among persons over 65 the decrease is, as might be expected, considerably less than at any of the younger ages.

Persons speaking both English and Welsh.—No general increase such as is shown by the monoglot English, and no general decrease, as in the case of the monoglot Welsh, is observable among the bilingual section of the population. The proportions were almost identical at the two censuses over the whole of Wales and Monmouthshire; but eight counties, including those with the highest proportions in 1901, showed increases, while five—Monmouthshire, Glamorganshire, Brecknockshire, Flintshire and Radnorshire—showed decreases. The largest relative increases in the bilingual populations of the several counties occurred in Anglesey, Cardiganshire, Carnarvonshire and Merionethshire—the four counties referred to above as containing the highest proportions of monoglot Welsh; and the largest relative decreases in the two counties, Monmouthshire and Radnorshire, containing the highest proportions of monoglot English.

As regards the age-distribution of persons speaking both English and Welsh, the maximum proportions are found at age 15-25 in those counties with high proportions at all ages—Anglesey, Cardiganshire, Carmarthenshire, Carnarvonshire and Merionethshire; but in those counties with low proportions at all ages, the maximum is found either at 45-65 or at 65 and upwards. In the former group the proportions at age 10-15 also are higher than at the ages above 45, and this fact may be taken to indicate that the comparatively high proportion of bilinguals in these counties is to some extent due to the teaching in the schools. Taking the four counties which showed the greatest relative increases during the last inter-censal period in the proportion of bilinguals, it will be found that among the several age-groups the maximum increase has occurred at age 65 and upwards; while in Monmouthshire, which showed the greatest decline, the numbers

in this age-group decreased relatively less than in any other. The ratios per cent. of the proportions in 1911 to those in 1901 are shown in the following statement :—

The exceptionally low ratio at 15-25 in Monmouthshire is apparently due to immigration—most active at these ages—of persons speaking English only; the next age-group (25-45) is probably affected also though to a smaller extent by the same cause; and the absence of such migration at ages over 65 would leave the ratio at that age-period comparatively high. It is possible that a converse process, namely, emigration of bilinguals from the other four counties (all of which suffered loss by migration) may have contributed to the high ratios at 65 and upwards in those counties.

Total English-speaking and total Welsh-speaking.—In order to compare the prevalence of English or Welsh in the several parts of the country, it is necessary to take into account the varying proportions speaking both languages. For example, the monoglot English in Brecknockshire amount to only 570 per 1,000, while in Pembrokeshire they are 653 per 1,000; but the total proportion speaking English in the former county is 929 per 1,000 against 900 per 1,000 in the latter. The following table, which is derived from Table 3, pages 47 to 51, shows the proportions of all English and of all Welsh speakers in 1901 and 1911, and the per-centage ratio of increase or decrease; the proportions of bilinguals are also shown separately in order to complete the comparison.

The counties of Monmouthshire and Radnorshire, which are both almost entirely English speaking, are the only ones in which the total proportion of English speakers has declined. Other counties having 90 per cent., or more, English speakers in their populations are Flintshire (94·2), Glamorganshire (93·9), Brecknockshire (92·9), and Pembroke-

shire (90·0); none of these counties shows more than 3 per cent. increase in the proportions of their total English-speaking populations. The counties which have shown the greatest increases, ranging from 18 to 30 per cent., in their total English speakers are the five—Anglesey, Cardiganshire, Carmarthenshire, Carnarvonshire and Merionethshire—in which Welsh is the predominant language, and in which that language has shown but little decline during the inter-censal period.

Language spoken in Wales, Scotland and Ireland.—We have shown that in the whole of Wales and Monmouthshire the proportion of the population over 3 years of age returned as speaking Welsh was 43·5 per cent., 35·0 per cent. speaking that language in addition to English, and 8·5 per cent. being returned as speaking Welsh only. From the census returns for Scotland and Ireland, collected and tabulated by the Registrars-General for those parts of the United Kingdom, it appears that in Scotland Gaelic is spoken by only 4·6 per cent. of the population over 3 years of age, and in Ireland, Irish by only 14·0 per cent. the proportions speaking the ancient language alone being as low as 0·4 per cent. in each case. Persons speaking Gaelic only are found almost exclusively in the counties of Argyll, Inverness, Ross and Cromarty, and Sutherland; and those speaking Irish only in the counties of Donegal, Clare, Cork, Galway, Kerry, Mayo, and Waterford. The figures for the counties in which the greatest prevalence of the ancient language is recorded are as follows:—

It appears, therefore, that not only is the Welsh language more generally used in Wales, as a whole, than is the Irish language in Ireland or the Gaelic in Scotland, but that in no part of the latter countries does the ancient language prevail to so great an extent as in the Welsh counties named above.

Conclusion.—The principal facts indicated by the returns appear to be:—

(1) A general increase since 1901 in the proportion of monoglot English, a corresponding decrease of monoglot Welsh, and a practically unchanged proportion of persons speaking both languages.

(2) A comparative excess of English-speaking persons at the young adult ages, and of Welsh-speaking persons at advanced ages; of monoglot Welsh both in infancy and in old age; and of bilinguals at ages 45–65.

(3) That comparing the two sexes, there is:—

(a) A greater proportion of the male population speaking English only.

(b) A greater proportion of the female population speaking Welsh only.

(c) A greater proportion of the female population speaking both languages.

(4) A proportional diminution of monoglot Welsh greater among persons aged 15–25 and less among those aged 65 and upwards than at any other age-periods.

(5) An increase in the proportion of bilinguals in the predominantly Welsh-speaking counties and a decrease in the predominantly English-speaking counties.

(6) A well marked geographical distribution of the Welsh-speaking population.

In conclusion, we would again refer briefly to the difficulty of defining the terms of the question as to the language spoken, and would express the hope that, if it is found desirable to continue this subject of inquiry, the returns may be made with fewer omissions than on the present occasion.

From the census returns for Scotland and Ireland, collected and tabulated by the Registrar-General for these parts of the United Kingdom, it appears that in Scotland Gaelic was spoken by only 4.6 per cent of the population over 3 years of age, and in Ireland Irish by only 14.6 per cent; the proportion speaking the ancient language being as low as 0.1 per cent in each case. Persons speaking Irish only are found almost exclusively in the counties of Argyll, Inverness, Ross and Cromarty, and Sutherland; and those speaking Irish also in the counties of Donegal, Fermanagh, Tyrone, Londonderry, and Waterford. The figures for the counties in which the greatest prevalence of the ancient languages is recorded are as follows:

ISLANDS IN THE BRITISH SEAS.

The accompanying Tables relate to the Isle of Man, and to the Islands of Jersey and Guernsey with the Adjacent Islands.

The Census in these Islands was taken on the same day as that in England and Wales, Scotland, and Ireland, and related to all persons alive at midnight on the 2nd April, 1911. The schedules and other necessary documents, and the instructions to the various local Officers, after consultation with the Local Authorities and approval by the Secretary of State for the Home Department, were supplied from the English Census Office, while the appointment of the local Enumerators and the distribution and collection of the schedules were left in the hands of the Authorities of the several Islands. The tabulation and analysis of the returns were carried out at the English Census Office, on the same principles as were followed in dealing with the English and Welsh returns.

NOTE.—In classifying the people by their Occupations the following rules have been observed:—Persons returned as "Pensioners" or as "Retired" from any specified profession or business (except Officers of the Army or Navy) appear in this Table as simply "Pensioners" or "Retired" (see Order XXIII.), but are classified in Table 11 according to their former occupations. Inmates of Institutions, when returned as Insane and yet described by their former occupations have—irrespective of age—been classed as "Retired"; so also have those Pauper Inmates aged 60 years and upwards whose former occupations were returned. Other inmates of Institutions and Prisoners of all ages have been classed under their stated occupations on the assumption that their ordinary work has been relinquished for a time only. The numbers given under the headings for manufactures include Apprentices, Assistants, Workmen and Labourers, as well as Masters, but exclude Messengers, Errand Boys, Porters (except if occupied in carrying materials in processes of manufacture), Watchmen, Engine Drivers and Stokers, Clerks, and Workmen following a trade for which a special heading is provided. Clerks not connected with manufacturing or dealing businesses are classified to the heading for the service in which they are engaged.

In some cases women and children, chiefly widows or orphans, carrying on the business of their husbands or fathers, are classed under Occupations commonly followed only by adult men.

In the list of Occupations the Male designations only are given for convenience, except where the occupations are exclusively followed by Females.

In Table 12 is given a condensed list of Occupations for the Town of Douglas, and for the Remainder of the Isle of Man, with the numbers of each sex at fourteen ages or groups of ages engaged in such Occupations.

NOTE.—In classifying the people by their Occupations the following rules have been observed:—Persons returned as "Pensioners" or as "Retired" from any specified profession or business (except Officers of the Army or Navy) appear in this Table as simply "Pensioners" or "Retired" (see Order XXIII.), but are classified in Table 12 according to their former occupations. Inmates of Institutions, when returned as Insane and yet described by their former occupations have—irrespective of age—been classed as "Retired"; so also have those Pauper Inmates aged 60 years and upwards whose former occupations were returned. Other inmates of Institutions and Prisoners of all ages have been classed under their stated occupations on the assumption that their ordinary work has been relinquished for a time only. The numbers given under the headings for manufactures include Apprentices, Assistants, Workmen and Labourers, as well as Masters, but exclude Messengers, Errand Boys, Porters (except if occupied in carrying materials in processes of manufacture), Watchmen, Engine Drivers and Stokers, Clerks, and Workmen following a trade for which a special heading is provided. Clerks not connected with manufacturing or dealing businesses are classified to the heading for the Service in which they are engaged.

In some cases women and children, chiefly widows or orphans, carrying on the business of their husbands or fathers, are classed under Occupations commonly followed only by adult men.

In the list of Occupations the Male designations only are given for convenience, except where the occupations are exclusively followed by Females.

In Table 11 is given a condensed list of Occupations for the Civil Parish of St. Helier, and for the Remainder of Jersey, with the numbers of each sex at fourteen ages or groups of ages engaged in such Occupations.

NOTE.—In classifying the people by their Occupations the following rules have been observed:—Persons returned as "Pensioners" or as "Retired" from any specified profession or business (except Officers of the Army or Navy) appear in this Table as simply "Pensioners" or "Retired" (see Order XXIII.), but are classified in Table 12 according to their former occupations. Inmates of Institutions, when returned as Insane and yet described by their former occupations have—irrespective of age—been classed as "Retired"; so also have those Pauper Inmates aged 60 years and upwards whose former occupations were returned. Other Inmates of Institutions and Prisoners of all ages have been classed under their stated occupations on the assumption that their ordinary work has been relinquished for a time only. The numbers given under the headings for manufactures include Apprentices, Assistants, Workmen and Labourers, as well as Masters, but exclude Messengers, Errand Boys, Porters (except if occupied in carrying materials in processes of manufacture), Watchmen, Engine Drivers and Stokers, Clerks, and Workmen following a trade for which a special heading is provided. Clerks not connected with manufacturing or dealing businesses are classified to the heading for the Service in which they are engaged.

In some cases women and children, chiefly widows or orphans, carrying on the business of their husbands or fathers, are classed under Occupations commonly followed only by adult men.

In the list of Occupations the Male designations only are given for convenience, except where the occupations are exclusively followed by Females.

In Table 11 is given a condensed list of Occupations for the Town of St. Peter Port, and for the Remainder of Guernsey and Adjacent Islands, with the numbers of each sex at fourteen ages or groups of ages engaged in such Occupations.
