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
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
COMMONWEALTH IMMIGRANTS IN THE CONURBATIONS

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Programme of Census Reports and other census information

The Census 1961, England and Wales, Preliminary Report, published in June, 1961, contains a general note on the taking of the census, some brief preliminary statistical commentary and provisional figures of the population, private households and private dwellings for all local authority areas (counties, boroughs, urban and rural districts) regions, conurbations and New Towns.

The present series of County Reports comprises the statistics of local interest which were collected on a 100 per cent basis. The subjects covered are population and acreages of local government areas; distribution of the local populations according to sex, age and marital condition; birthplace, citizenship and nationality; private households and their size distribution, the buildings, dwellings and rooms in which they live, the tenure of their accommodation and certain household arrangements possessed by them; institutions of different types, housing various categories of non-private population. This series does not contain any information which was collected on a 10 per cent sample basis and therefore does not include distributions of the population by terminal education age or by social class as were included in the corresponding series of the 1951 Census.

The Report on Scientific and Technological Qualifications gives statistics of persons with those qualifications and the occupations and industries in which they work. This report is on a 10 per cent sample basis and relates to Great Britain.

The Report on the Welsh Speaking Population gives statistics derived from the question about speaking the Welsh language addressed to those enumerated in Wales and Monmouthshire.

The Birthplace and Nationality tables comprise summaries of the information given in the County Reports on birthplace, citizenship and nationality.

The Usual Residence tables compare the enumerated census population in local areas with the population usually resident in those areas and also give the numbers enumerated who are usually resident outside England and Wales classified by country of usual residence and by age.

The Age, Marital Condition and General Tables mainly comprise summaries of the information given in the County Reports on local populations, age and marital condition, with the various categories of non-private population.

The Housing tables Parts I, II and III include summaries of the information on housing and private households given in the County Reports, together with more extensive tabulations for England and Wales. There are tables of buildings, dwellings and households, tables of tenure and household arrangements and summary housing indices.

The Household Composition tables will provide figures on the composition and the social and economic characteristics of households and families and the types of person included in these groups and will be on a 10 per cent sample basis.

The Migration tables will give statistics of the numbers and characteristics of people who changed their usual residence in the year before Census Day; details of their age, marital condition, socio-economic group, occupation and industry will be given together with similar information about the remainder of the population classified by the length of time they have lived at their present usual residence. Numbers of people moving will also be given for local areas with some details for larger areas. These tables will be on a 10 per cent sample basis.

The Workplace tables will show the population resident in one area and working in another, the units of area being boroughs, urban and rural districts and New Towns. This report will be on a 10 per cent sample basis.

The tables on Occupation will give statistics of the occupied population based on their personal occupation (classified according to the *Classification* of Occupations, 1960)* including statistics for usually resident populations of the larger areas, and with reference to age, marital condition, employment status (manager, employer, etc.) and socio-economic group. These tables will be on a 10 per cent sample basis.

The tables on Industry will give statistics of the occupied population based on the branch of economic activity to which their occupations contribute with identification of employment status categories, age-groups and married women, the branch of economic activity units being those of the Standard Industrial Classificationt. Statistics of local populations will be based on the area containing the place of work. These tables will also include an analysis of each important industry or group of industries showing the principal occupations which contribute to it. These tables will be on a 10 per cent sample basis.

The Education tables will give figures relating to the terminal education age of persons resident in local areas and, for England and Wales and the regions and conurbations, classifications by age and by occupation. These tables will be on a 10 per cent sample basis.

The Fertility tables will give statistics derived from the questions on date of marriage and number of children which were put to women who had ever been married.

The Index of Place Names will give the location and the census population of places with defined boundaries.

Commentaries. These will be compiled and published as soon as time permits. In addition there will be an administrative report on the Census as a whole and a statistical report on the quality of the figures. The latter report will include information on such topics as the post-enumeration survey, sampling errors, bias, and statistical methodology.

Note

With regard to census information not presented in the published reports and tables referred to above, Section 4(2) of the Census Act, 1920, empowers the Registrar General, if he so thinks fit, at the request and cost of any local authority or person, to cause abstracts to be prepared containing any such statistical information, being information which is not contained in the census reports made by him, and which in his opinion it is reasonable for that authority or person to require, as can be derived from the census returns.

General Explanatory Notes

General Note

This volume of tables contains demographic, social and economic information about people who gave as their birthplace Jamaica, other Commonwealth territories in the Caribbean, India, Pakistan, Commonwealth countries in Africa (excluding the Union of South Africa), Cyprus or Malta. For the sake of brevity they are described as 'Commonwealth immigrants'. The tables are confined to the Commonwealth immigrants who were resident in the six conurbations in England and Wales. For this limited section of the population they cover almost the full range of census information and these notes provide explanations of all the topics included.

The tables include everyone who gave one of the specified countries as their birthplace, whatever their race or citizenship; as a result the children born in India to former Indian army or civil service staff are included. Tables A1 to A12 exclude all the children of Commonwealth immigrants who were not born in the specified countries. Tables B1 to B5, however, include all the people who were enumerated in households of which the head or the wife of the head was born in one of the specified countries. Tables B1 to B5 therefore include all the children, wherever they were born, of people who were born in the specified countries, provided they spent census night in the same household as their parents; on the other hand Tables B1 to B5 exclude any people who were born in the specified countries but were in households where neither the head of the household nor the wife of the head of the household was born in the specified countries.

Population included in Tables A3 to A10

Tables dealing with Occupation give the distribution of the economically active population aged 15 and over, that is those who were in employment during the week before the census and those who though normally working were unemployed (including those who were unemployed because of sickness) at the time of the census. Those in employment include members of the Armed Forces and also people who worked for only a few hours a week (such as a housewife who helped in her husband's shop or did some office cleaning). People at school or university during term time are excluded even if they did paid work during the holidays.

Tables dealing with Industry are restricted to those in employment during the week before the census so that compared with Occupation Tables they exclude people who were "out of employment" at the time of the census. People temporarily laid off by their employer are included among those in employment. People who became unemployed during the week before Census day are included among those "out of employment".

It should be noted that the unemployed are those persons who returned themselves as "out of employment" on the Census schedule. This group consists of those who were not in employment but were looking for work, and those not in employment who were also sick or injured.

In the Industry tables presented in this volume, unlike the general Industry Tables for the whole population, people are allocated to the area where they live instead of the area where they work.

Industrial Status, Occupation and Socio-economic Group

These describe the economic activity of the individual - what he or she does at work, regardless of the nature of the business carried on at the place of work. The classifications used are fully set out in *Classification* of Occupations, 1960 (H.M.S.O. 1960).

Industry

This is a description of the nature of the business carried on at the individual's place of work, regardless of the occupation he or she performed there. The classification used is the revised edition of the Standard Industrial Classification (H.M.S.O. 1958).

Persons qualified in Science and Technology

These are people who in response to Question Q on the schedule returned a suitable qualification in science or technology. A copy of the schedule faces page xviii. In "Census 1961, Great Britain, Scientific and Technological Qualifications" (H.M.S.O. 1962), Appendix A lists the qualifications and the subjects in which those qualifications were attained by the people included in this table.

Terminal Education Age

The figures on terminal education age are derived from the replies to Question 0 on the schedule. A copy of the schedule faces page xviii.

Duration of residence

This is a classification of the people included in these tables into three groups:-

- (1) Those who did not change their address during the year before census date
- (11) Those who did change their address during the year before census date but were living in the United Kingdom on 23rd April, 1960
- (111) Those who did change their address during the year before census date and were living outside the United Kingdom on 23rd April, 1960.

Private Households

A private household was defined to the enumerator as follows:-

"A household comprises one person living alone or a group of persons living together, partaking of meals prepared together and benefiting from a common housekeeping.

A person or persons living but not boarding with a household in a house, flat, etc. should be treated as a separate household. But a person living with a household who usually has at least one main meal a day provided by that household while in residence is part of that household. (Breakfast counts as a meal for this purpose).

A household must have exclusive use of at least one room. If two people share one room and do not have exclusive use of at least one other room they should be treated as one household".

The rules for identifying a private household in a hotel, boarding house, hospital or other institution were in general the same as those given above except that a person or group was only treated as a private household if they were living in structurally separate quarters and were either -

a family group doing much of their catering separately from the institution or

a person or group who did not have any meals provided daily by the institution.

Households sharing dwellings

Households which did not occupy the whole of a dwelling have been divided into two groups; those which had exclusive use of both a kitchen stove or range and a kitchen sink, and those households which did not have exclusive use of both facilities. The information to make this division was obtained by verbal enquiry by the enumerator who then made entries 'E' (exclusive use) or 'N' (not exclusive use) in the appropriate panel on the schedule.

Population included in private households

These households include usually resident members who were absent on Census night, and exclude visitors who were present on Census night. Households where all members were absent on Census night are excluded.

Household Type

Within a household, a family is defined as a married couple and their

never-married child(ren) if any (see following section for definition of a child), or a lone parent with his or her never-married child(ren). "Lone parent" means a married parent whose spouse does not reside in the same house-hold, and any single, widowed or divorced parent. Note that a lone parent unaccompanied by children does not constitute a family, while a married couple without children does. Children are defined as persons (of any age) who have never been married and who live in the same household as their parent(s), grandparent(s) or great-grandparent(s). This definition includes step-children and adopted children, but not foster-children.

On these definitions, households may be classified into the following types:-

- 1. No family, one person (and any domestic servants).
- 2. One family comprising a married couple and no others.
- One family (married couple or lone parent) with children but with no others.
- 4. Other one family households.
- 5. Two or more families with or without others.
- 6. No family, two or more related persons, with or without others.
- No family, two or more unrelated persons, or domestic servants only.

The information by which households are allocated to a household type has been based on that provided by column B of the Census schedule.

Dependent Children

In Tables B4 and B5, the children are defined as children under 15, or students in full-time education (who may be married).

Rooms

The count of rooms was obtained by the enumerator by verbal enquiry from the household. A room was defined to the enumerator as follows:-

"A room is any covered space surrounded by walls, doors, or windows and used by the household for living, eating or sleeping. Rooms available for these purposes but not actually in use e.g. unfurnished spare bedrooms, should be included.

Landings, lobbies, recesses, closets and bathrooms should not be counted as rooms, nor should store rooms, offices, warehouses, shops or any other rooms used for non-domestic purposes.

A kitchen, kitchenette or scullery should be counted if meals are regularly eaten there, otherwise it should not".

Tenure of dwellings

The question on tenure was asked of each household. From this information a classification of dwellings by tenure has been derived. When only one household was present at Census the dwelling was assigned the tenure of that household. When there was more than one household present and their tenure categories differed, the dwelling was assigned to the highest ranking tenure category returned by a household present in the dwelling. For this purpose the tenure categories were ranked in the following order:-

- 1. Owner-occupied
- 2. Rented with a farm, shop or other business premises
- 3. Held by virtue of employment
- 4. Rented from a Local Authority or New Town Corporation
- 5. Rented from a private person or company; unfurnished
- 6. Rented from a private person or company; furnished.

Non-private Households

The term "Non-private households" covers people who were enumerated in

hotels, boarding houses, or institutions or were otherwise grouped in establishments with some functional purpose other than that of providing food or satisfying other domestic convenience. They also include people in defence establishments, ships at moorings or anchorage or on coastwise voyages, and a small miscellaneous element. A household classified by the enumerator as private was re-classified in the census office as non-private if the number of boarders or the number of inmates, patients or staff, etc., was five or more.

In some institutions, there are private households having separate accommodation and catering, e.g. the medical superintendent of a hospital with his family. These have been excluded from the institution and classified as private households.

For notes on the various types of non-private household see "Census 1961 - Age, Marital Condition and General Tables" (H.M.S.O. 1964) pages (viii) to (x) of the General Explanatory Notes.

QUALITY OF FIGURES

Sampling

The tables are all based on questionnaires distributed to one private household in ten and to one tenth of the people in hotels, institutions, defence establishments, etc. The procedure designed for selecting the sample of private households was as follows. England and Wales was divided into some 70 thousand enumeration districts. These enumeration districts were listed systematically and a random number between one and ten, taken serially from a table of random numbers, was allocated to each enumeration district. If this number was n then the enumerator was instructed to give a sample schedule to the nth, (10 + n)th, (20 + n)th, etc. households he contacted. The enumerator was issued with a pack of schedules in which the sample schedules were already placed in every tenth position and the random start was obtained by removing schedules from the top of the pack until the first sample schedule was in the nth position. The enumerator was instructed to deliver the schedules from the top of the pack to households in the order in which he contacted them. Unfortunately there is evidence that some enumerators did not follow these instructions so that the sample is biased (See notes on "Bias").

People in institutions, hotels, ships, etc. were not enumerated on the ordinary household schedule but on other special schedules. The size of these institutions varies too much for a sample of the institutions to give reliable figures, and the sample was of individuals. The sample questions were only asked of the person appearing on a specified line on each special schedule. The sample lines were also designated randomly and the person completing the schedule was told to maintain a strict routine when entering the names on the schedule and to avoid any pre-selection of the people for whom the additional sample details were required. Here too there is evidence that the instructions were not strictly followed so that the sample is biased.

The sample of people enumerated in defence establishments was selected at census headquarters; there was no sampling at the enumeration stage.

Sampling Errors

The possible error due to sampling (not due to bias) can be expressed as follows.

For any sample figure which is a small proportion (less than one quarter) of the total sample population the odds are approximately

2 to 1 that the error is less than the square root of the figure 20 to 1 that the error is less than twice the square root.

The following table shows for a few selected values the square root expressed as a percentage of the sample item.

For an example of how this information can be used there were 1,69 male carpenters and joiners (occupation 080) born in Jamaica in the sample. The odds are therefore 20 to 1 that the number in the whole population lies in the range $(169 \pm 2 \times 13) \times 10$ i.e. in the range of 1,430 to 1,950. It is important to remember that all such calculations should be made using the actual sample number and not the estimate obtained by grossing-up the sample.

These estimates of sampling error have been obtained by assuming that the sample is equivalent to a random sample of persons. It is assuming that the tendency for the sampling error to be increased by the effect of clustering with the use of a sample of households is offset by the high degree of stratification involved in a systematic sample which ensures that one in ten households has been selected evenly throughout the country.

Bias

After the 1961 Census, the 10% sample was checked for bias by comparing After the 1961 tensus, the 10% sample was checked for bias by comparing certain items of information common to the full census and the sample census. One such comparison showed clearly that the sample of households was biased. Although the total number of households in the sample is almost exactly one tenth of the total in the whole country, the distribution of households by number of persons and number of rooms occupied is distorted. The amount of bias is shown in the table below.

There is considerable under-representation of one person households and of large households. For any stated size of household there is a clear gradient from too few households occupying few rooms towards too many households with large numbers of rooms.

To allow for this bias, correcting factors have been calculated which users can apply to the 10% census data. It was not a practical proposition to calcu-late such factors for every entry in the tables. Instead they have been obtained for certain of the more important marginal totals. For example, a bias factor has been calculated for each of the 27 Occupation Orders defined in "Classification of Occupations, 1960" (H.M.S.O. 1960).

These bias factors are used by multiplying them into the appropriate Census figure to give a new figure corrected for bias. Thus a bias factor of 0.98000 denotes that the published Census estimate is too high by 2%.

A brief description of the method of calculation of these factors is as follows. The 100% Census count of private households and the 10% Census sample count of private households were each (separately) distributed over a four-way table whose axes were,

six categories of the number of persons in the household, (1) (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 or more)

(111) three categories of sharing status, namely, non-sharing, sharing with exclusive use of stove and sink, sharing without exclusive use of stove and sink. (iv) seven geographical areas, namely, the six conurbations, and all conurbations combined.

As an example of the calculation of one bias factor, consider the males in Occupation Order I. This group of males can be distributed over the fourway table of private households from the 10% sample. according to the households in which they were enumerated. Let y_{ijkl} be the number of males in this group who were enumerated in the x_{ijkl} households in any one cell of this table. Then the bias factor for males in Occupation Order I who live in the lth area is defined as

Similar bias factors are calculated in exactly the same manner for females in this Occupation Order, and for males and females in the remaining 26 Orders. The same method applied to all the other characteristics for which factors are. listed in the ensuing bias factor tables. The exception is the classification of households by number of persons, by number of rooms, by sharing status (as in Table Bi). The bias factors here are simply the raising factors $R_{t,jkl}$ divided by 10.

In fact, the second sharing category in Table Bi corresponds to all sharing households, and bias factors for this group have been obtained by combining sharing households both with and without exclusive use of stove and sink and calculating raising factors in the same fashion for this combined group.

The bias factors listed in this volume have been calculated only for the group of people who were born in Cyprus, Pakistan, Ceylon, and the Caribbean Commonwealth territories and who were resident in conurbations in England and Wales at the time of the Census. This group was originally selected as the result of an exercise aimed at identifying Commonwealth birthplaces which were associated with the highest degree of bias. They do not therefore exactly correspond with the people tabulated in this volume whose birthplaces also include India (but not Ceylon) and African Commonwealth territories. The only bias factors to which this does not apply are those for the households by persons by rooms by sharing classification, which are based on all residents in conurbations in England and Wales regardless of birthplace. This group of factors may possibly be of limited accuracy in relation to Table Bi.

It is important that these bias factors be correctly interpreted. They are only intended to remove that element of bias associated with the classification of households by numbers of persons by number of rooms by sharing status by area. They do not remove other elements of bias which may exist and may be fundamentally associated with some other characteristic such as occupation, socio-economic group, etc. Employment Status




