

# BLOOD TRANSFUSION IN DESERT WARFARE

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**Broadcast from the Front Line during the Battle of Alamein**  
**By Godfrey Talbot**  
(B.B.C. Observer with the 8th Army).

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“I’ve just come out of a dressing station. It’s partly dug in underground. There’s been a raid just now. The doctors are doing wonderful work in these places. In one tiny underground cave in the sandy rock there were four men having blood transfusions . . . it’s one of the many places where this is being done at various parts of the desert front.

“It’s no exaggeration to say that *blood transfusion on a big scale is one of the biggest and finest medical service developments in this war.* It’s a thoroughly well-organized business, and it’s saving very many lives *on the battlefield itself*, as well as at base hospitals—lives which would have been lost from loss of blood.

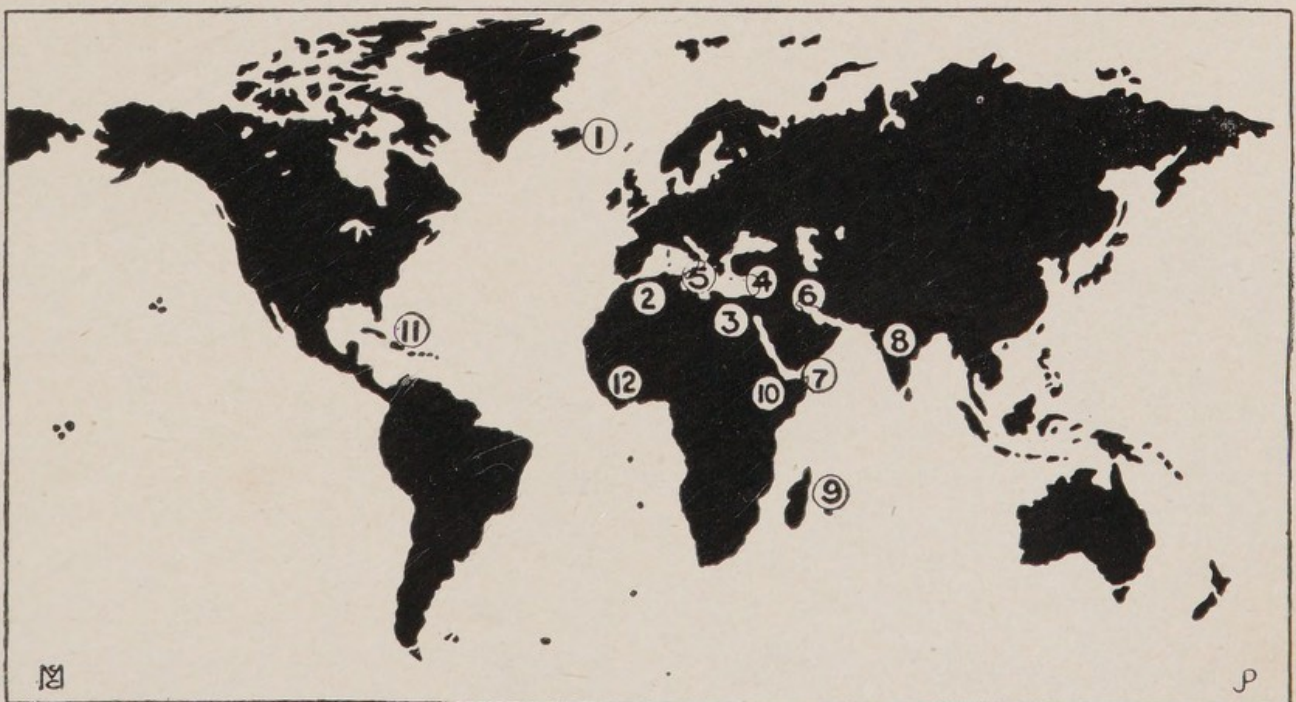

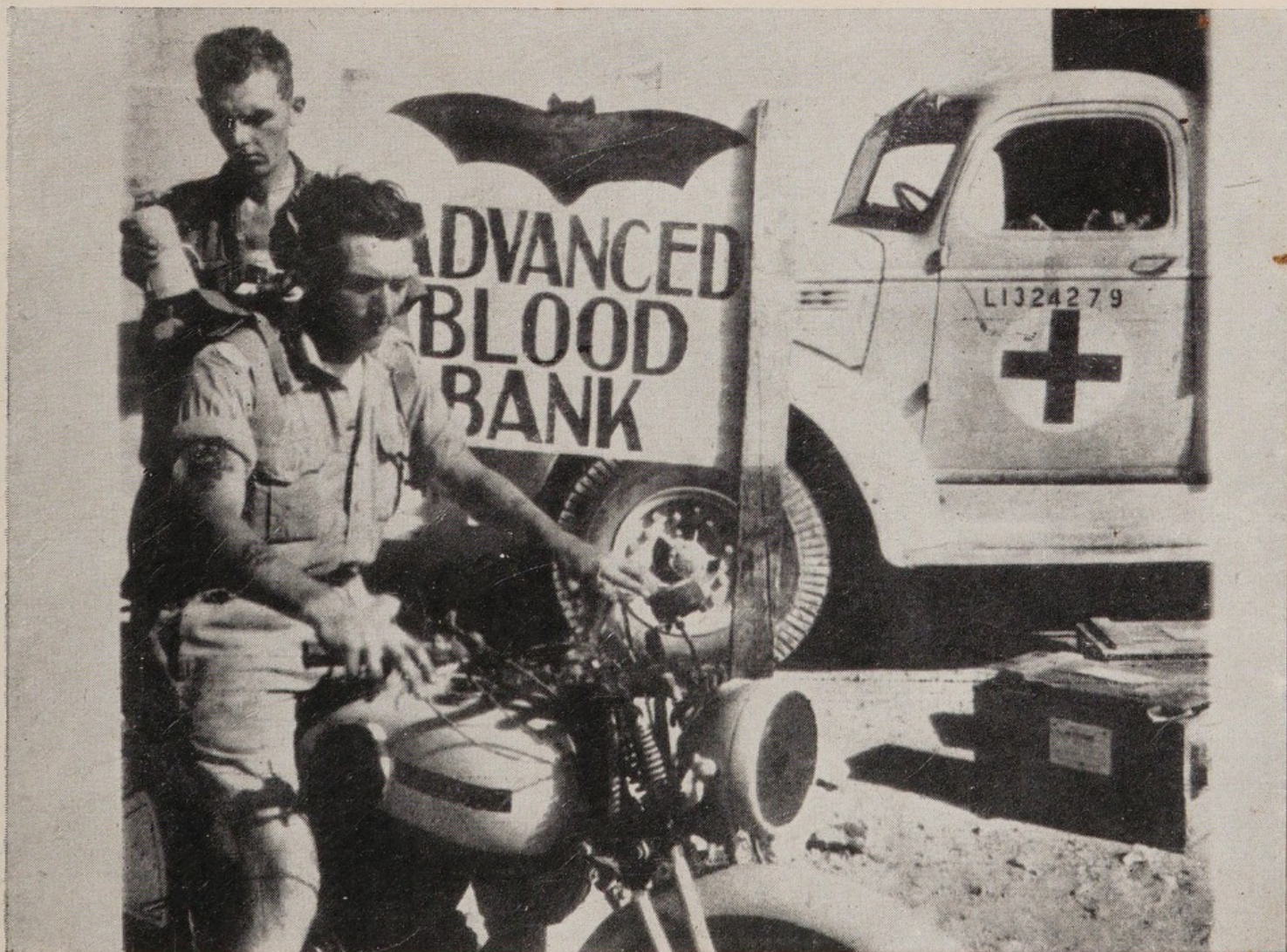

“That’s one of the reasons why the doctors are right up in the forward areas—skilled surgeons in khaki who give blood back quickly to the wounded man, so that right at this first stage of his journey back out of the line, he is able to stand up to the journey and is in better shape for the next stage of medical or surgical attention further back.

“There has been accumulated in the Middle East a good reserve of human blood, and the supply continues. The blood is bottled and stored . . . . some of it’s dried—to be drawn on as required, and now in this desert fighting there are advance stores in the desert. I saw one yesterday at the side of a track. It had a sign up—a board with a vampire bat painted on it—and below, it said ‘Advanced Blood Bank.’ Inside the lorry there they had refrigerators with large bottles of blood . . . . and bottles of the pale white plasma—most of it in dried form. Ambulance drivers kept coming into this blood bank with requisitions from dressing stations further forward, and each was off within two minutes with the precious life-saving bottles.

“Back again they went—back to the front-line areas, where in little tents and ambulances doctors give that blood to the wounded men who need it.



“Often a wounded man will get more of the blood further back, say at a casualty clearing station also. He’ll get it perhaps both before and after an operation. *I saw one man who’d had twelve pints. He was going to live—he never would have done, without such a service.*”
