HAT whiche Galene in the syxth booke entitled de Sanitate tuenda saieth that he would have men for the diete and preferuacion of their bodies not to live like bruit beaftes, nothing regardinge what is good or ill for them, but rather diligentely to observe and marke what agreeth with them, and what not, and what ferueth for their helth, a what is hurtefull, the fame thong woulde I withe that all men should booe in all other poinctes also, concerning the state and habite of their hope to bee knowen. Whiche if it to wer, fome partones perchaunce in a luxacion or bukuittying of their owne lymes or of their childrens armes & legges thould leffe maruapl at the cale, & be better hable worth leffe coffe to helpe thefame, Ind not onely for luxacions and wrenches doe I this faie, but alfo

for the reducing of the bodye withinfoorth agrened, to a better temperature, which might the more eafely be boom. if every perfon, or at lefte wife fuche as wer moite apte, oid knowe all the membres and partes of \$ bodye, together with the placeng, the natures, the propretees, the ble, and the operations of the fame, for by knowinge the office of every parte and membre, in cafe there fould happen any impedimente, thei foulde eafely bee hable to knowe and to indice where the impediment late, how it grewe, a how thefame wer to bee remoued. And for fo muche as buto this purpofe no= thong is fo effectual, as the Anatomie of mannes bodye, that is to fage, the cuttying of everie parce and percel fewerally: a cannot but commende the fludious industrie a labour of suche, as either by descripcion of the partes of mannes bodye! and womans bodge with their penne, or els by the linely fertyng foorth of the fame to the pie by apte figures and portus ratures, have transilled to thewe but o all men, where energ membre and lymme and other parte of oure bodyes leth, where it taketh his beegennonge where it endeth, what the nature of it is, and what operation, what vertue what effecte or propretee is annexed buto it. Petther can I well betermine whether of bothe boocth more effectually helpe towarde the knowelage of the premiffes, he that by his high learning and profound frience of naturall thinges doorth fette it foorthe in writing or els he that by plant figures and pictures docein proportion out everye thing to the pie of the bulearned. For fome have we knowen, whiche beeping unlettred have been hable to fette in again any membre that by anye biolent inturie bath bene broken or lette out of tometerand beray fewe there bee, whiche by the deferipcion of the learned have been hable to efpre how to door the fame in mennes toincies or lynnes, except fuche as after longe practife and experience, have by Incilion and cuttying of beade mennes bodyes (whiche we calle Anatomie) gotten a perietet knowe= lage of the premiffes. And not but o many, nor but in fewe places, harh this knowelage or experience happened (wheras harmes are common in all places and to a greate nombre) but buto a beray fewe, chiefly fuvgeous, which have for their better knowelage been fain to begge dead mennes bodyes &them to cutte, and fome partes to biew and the reft to let alone till an other tyme, because of the putrefaction some commynge in matter to subject to corruption, as maunes felle is . If therfore any persone through the helpe, partely of bookes written by cumping men of experience, and partely by practife of incifion which they have been prefent at, a partely by imitacion of other expert artificers in this mifferie, hath employed his industrious studic and peincfull labour, not without great costes and charges, to teache enery man that is Disposed to ferche a marke it how he may knowe every Bone, Joincte, Meine, Arterie, Sineawe, Tendon, or Ligament of the bodye, where it lyeth, and how it standeth in the bodye: is worthie of immortall thankes, not onely of Surgeons for whole cale and profitable infiruccion this prefent wearke is lette foorth, but also of all others that mave in tyme of nede receive any benefite or commoditee thereby. Accepte therfore in good parte lentill reader this tracife of Anatomic

and thankefully take the ble therof jentily interpretying the labours of Thomas Geniui the workman. And in cafe any that by his cumping or experience fee where it maye be amended or better perfected: he that with his greate charge, watche a trauaill hath fo lively fette out this in fygure and portura ture, will (I doubte not) thewe hym felfe mofte willing, bothe to amende thefame his owne weathernanship, and also to honour and followe the partie by whom he shall bee admonished how this mave bee made more perfecte. Thus willing and wything cuery one manthakefully to take and entreprete an other
