B Fol. Symphit. Maj. Polygonat. Plantag. Pimpinel. a M. iv. Rad. Liquirit. 3 ij. Infundantur frigide per 2 Dies in Aq. Calcis Cong. ij.

# A Water against Spitting of Blood, from Dr. Christ. Bennet.

Take Leaves of Comfrey the Greater, Solomon's Seal, Plantane, and Pimpinel, each 4 Handsful, Liquorice-Root 2 Ounces; infule them cold for 12 Days in 2 Gallons of Lime-water.

This is very eafily made, and is much better than if it were to be diftilled. It is of excellent Ufe in fuch Confumptions as proceed from a fharp thin Blood, as particularly in an Hæmoptoe, or Spitting of Blood, or making bloody Water; it is ordered to be drank for fome Time together: wid. Dr. Chrift. Bennet, Theatr. Tabidor, who fays, that fix Ounces of this drank for The Hospital Dispensatory. 3 for 4 or 5 Mornings together, hardly fails of Success for Spitting of Blood.

# Aqua Liberans.

Raffur. Lig. Saffafr. fine Cortice Z ij. Lig. Guiac. cum Cortice Z j. Rad. Glycirrh. Z iij. Sem. Coriand. cont. Z vj. Infund. frigide in Aq. Calcis. Cong. j. per 2 aut 3 Dies.

Take of the Shavings of Saffafras without the Bark 2 Ounces, of Guiacum with the Bark 1 Ounce, Liquorice-Root 3 Ounces, Coriander-Seeds bruifed 6 Drams; infuse them cold in one Gallon of Lime-water for 2 or 3 Days.

This is yet more drying than the former, and is therefore good in all Cafes that require Abforbents and Sweetners, efpecially in all Venereal Affections, after Salivation. It will affift much likewife in the Itch, and all Foulneffes which lodge upon the Skin. This as well as the former is of Service in a Diabetes. It may be drank at Difcretion, and ought to be used for fome Time together.

Take Garden-Snails cleanfed and bruifee 6 Gallons, Earth-worms washed and bruifee 3 Gallons, of common Wormwood, Ground-Ivy, and Carduus, each one Pound and an half Penniroyal, Juniper-Berries, Fennel-feeds Anifeeds, each half a Pound, Cloves and Cubebs bruifed, each 3 Ounces, Spirit of Wine, and Spring-water, of each 8 Gallons digeft them together for the Space of 24 Hours, and then draw it off in a common Alembick.

This is admirably well contrived both for Cheapnels and Efficacy; and for Perfons whofe Circumftances and Manner of living have not habituated them to any Delicacies, it is as good a Snail-water as can be made; and with the two former, are the chief that are used in the Hospitals. And as they are mostly given in Confumptions contracted. from vicious Practices, and Venereal Contagions, this is the conftant Drink of those who are under the like Weakneffes and Decays from a malum stamen, and require principally Nourishment from fuch Substances as will, with the leaft Trouble poffible, be affimulated for that Purpole.

#### Aqua ad Strumas.

#### A Water for the Evil.

Take sharp-pointed Dock-Roots half a Pound, Monks Rhubarb 4 Ounces, Agaric 2

2 Ounces, Liquorice, Sweet-Fennel, am Coriander-feeds, each half an Ounce; box in a fufficient Quantity of Spring Water and to the ftrained Liquor add 2 Ounces (0 Diaphoretic Antimony.

This is much used in scrophulous Cafess as a Diet-Drink, and has been found of good Service; but at the first, sometimes the Diaphoretic Antimony being unwashed, 11 proves Emetick, tho' without any Inconve niency upon that Account; the Points 00 the Medicine being left groß enough the vellicate and draw the Stomach into fucil Contractions. This also avails confiderably in Venereal and Leprous Impurities. Itt Operation is principally expected from itt encreasing of natural Perspiration, and gem tly fcouring all the fecretory Paffages.

# Treacle Water.

Take of the Juice of green Walnuts 12 Pound, of Rue 9 Pound, of Carduus, Marigolds, and Balm, each 6 Pound, of Butter-Bur-Root fresh gathered 4 Pound and half, Burdock 3 Pound, Angelico and Mafterwort each I Pound and half, of Scordium 12 Hands-full, London Treacle 1 Pound and half, Philon. Perfic. 1 Pound, Spirit of Wine 30 Pints and 6 Ounces; mix and distil according to Art.

This is a very good Water, and warmer than the College Treacle-water. It is given as a Cordial in any Fainting or Gripes, efpecially in those which frequently happen in raifing a Salivation.

In the Lock, Kingsland Hospitals, they generally falivate by Unction, and it has been observed, that the Lues, and many Cafes which would not give way to a Salivation raifed by inward Means, have been overcome by this; Nay, it has been obferved, that fome Perfons have been fo emaciated by the Diftemper, that they have appeared to be nothing but Skin and Bone, yet

yet by Unction have had a kind Salivation, and have to a Wonder recover'd their Flefh, and grown perfectly fat; but obferve in fuch Habits to begin with very little Medicine, even to a Scruple of the *Mercury* is fufficient at a Time, and that to be rub'd in perhaps but every other Night; and again, it is fometimes very neceffary, before we use the Unction, to nourish the Perfon with a Milk Diet, and Broths: vid. Ung. Caruleum.

# Alcohol Chalybis.

# Powder of Steel.

Take of the fineft Steel 3 Ounces, red Sugar-candy 2 Ounces; let them be reduced together into a fine Powder.

This is a very plain, eafy, and moft natural Preparation of Steel, and is render'd fit thereby to be taken either in Substance, or to communicate its Virtues to any Liquor by Infusion. It comes nearest to the common Preparation of Steel with Tartar; and has the same Qualities of a Deobstruent. Its usual Dose is from  $\Im$  j. to  $\Im$  fs.

Populn; and for all Wounds of the nervous and tendinous Parts being applied hot it is excellent.

# The green Balfam.

This is of great Use in all contused and lacerated Wounds, and likewise in Gunshot

fhot Wounds, there is nothing that exceeds it; and this is what Mr. Mulleys the Surgeon us'd when he cut for the Stone. And the fame (I am inform'd) the late most expert and fuccessful Lythotomist Mr. Salter, did always use to such Patients, tho' he fometimes mixed with it Balf. Terebinth. or Linimentum Arcei.

#### Bolus Alexiter.

# An Alexiterial Bole.

This is frequently directed to be taken, in order to compose and breath a Person after Amputation, or any other Operation which is attended with extreme Pain, and threatens a Fever; and is repeated as often as Occasion requires, drinking after it proper Juleps.

This is as rough as the former, but is generally made Choice of in Venereal and Leprous Cafes, preparatory to Salivation; and is likewife fometimes directed where no fuch Courfe is intended, particularly in foul Ulcers of long ftanding; the cleanfing and lafting Cure of which its Operation does much forward: But this is too churlifh to be given but to athletick Conftitutions.

Take Camphire half a Dram, Gum Arabick one Scruple, Chio Turpentine 15 Grains, Syrup of Meconium a fufficient Quantity to make into a Bolus.

Of great Use for a Difury or Heat of Urine, especially if occasioned from the Application of Epispasticks.

An Hydropick Bole.

Take Gamboge 15 Grains, Cream of Tartar half a Scruple, Syrup of Buckthorn a fufficient Quantity to make them into a Bole.

In a Dropfie, or a flaccid moist Habit tending thereunto, this is a very common Purge, and a very good one. The Gamboge it felf is indeed very rough, and works fometimes with great Naufeoufnefs, Vomiting and Griping; but the Tartar much corrects it, by dividing its viscid Parts, and making them lefs fenfibly vellicate the Coats of the Stomach and Bowels, as all refinous Purges are apt to do. It has fometimes also mixed with it a Drop or two of Oil of Anifeed, or any other of the carminitive Oils, to render it lefs griping. This thoroughly purges off watry and viscous Humours, and greatly promotes the Discharge by Urine. But to render the Cure of a Dropfie lasting, there is a Neceffity afterwards of reftoring and ftrengthening the Tone of the Parts by proper Medicines for fuch Purposes, else they will foon fill again with as much Water as this has carried away.

# Bolus Mercurialis Purgat.

# A Purging Mercurial Bole.

Take of Lenitive Electuary half a Pound, Jallap Root powdered one Ounce and half, Scammony 6 Drams, Calomel half an Ounce, the folutive Syrup of Rofes a fufficient Quantity to make them into the Confiftence of a Bole. The Dofe is 3 Drams in a Morning.

This is a fure Purge, and will not fail working in the ftrongeft Conftitutions. It is advifable in all Cafes whatfoever as want fuch Evacuation. It muft be made pretty ftiff, elfe the Calomel will be apt to fall by its great Weight, whereby it will be unequally mixed; and in hot Weather alfo it will be apt to fret and fpoil, if made up too thin.

## Bolus ad Diarrheam.

Rhabarb. opt. pulv. 3 s. Confect. Fracastorii sine Melle, q. s. ut f. Bolus.

# A Bole against a Loosenes.

Take Powder of the fineft Rhubarb half a Dram, Diafcordium without Honey, a fufficient Quantity to make it into a Bole. This

This is to be given in any Fluxes of the Belly that require to be ftopped, as often as the Urgency of the Symptoms indicate; but it is generally directed only at Night going to Bed; for the Opiate confines the Rhubarb from immediate Operation, and what Effect that has, is only just to cleanse off so much Choler, or irritating Humours, as it finds already separated by the intestinal Glands; and it then fo aftringes them, as to prevent any further Flux of that kind upon them. This Bolus is also frequently given to compose and refettle the Bowels, after the Operation of fuch ftrong Catharticks as cannot well be born without fuch a Reftorative.

# Bolus Mercurialis cum Gambog.

B. Elect. Lenitiv. Hoj. Calomelan. Gambog. pul. ä Zij. 3j. Syr. e Spin. C. q. f. ad Boli confiftentiam; Addendo Ol. Anif. 3 j. fs. Dofis 3 j.

# A Mercurial Bole with Gamboge.

Take Lenitive Electuary 1 Pound, Calomel and Gamboge in fine Powder each 2 Ounces and 1 Dram, Syrup of Buckthorn a fufficient Quantity to make them into the 18 Pharmacopæia Pauperum; or, the Confiftence of a Bole; to which add Oil of Anifeeds 1 Dram and half. The Dofe is 2 Drams.

This is ftronger than the foregoing with the Jallap; and is directed accordingly where the most powerful Catharticks are required, and can be born without Inconveniency.

# Bolus Diureticus.

R Scille Z j. Hellenii pulv. Z fs. Ol. Anif. Chym. 3 fs. Dofis 3 j. bis in die.

# Diuretick Bole.

Take Squills 1 Ounce, Powder of Elicampane half an Ounce, Oil of Anifeed half a Dram. The Dofe is one Dram twice in a Day.

In Afthmatick and Dropfical Habits, this is an admirable Medicine; for it greatly foours away those Viscidities which stuff the Vessels, and hinder due Circulation, and detaches them off by the Kidnies. But its Use is to be comply'd with for some Time together; and if so continued, the

the most obstinate Obstructions of the fmall Vessels, that cause both Dropsies and Asthma's, will give Way to its Efficacy.

Take of the larger Onions, and of Garlick, each 3 Ounces, Powder of Spanish Flies 1 Dram, Mustard-feed powder'd, London Treacle, Mithridate, and Pigeons-Dung, each 1 Ounce, Oil of Scorpions a fufficient Quantity to make into a Poultus.

The Cafes this is intended for, happen not frequently in the Hofpitals: But when any Humours are critically difcharged in malignant Fevers, which are fometimes attended with very furprizing Symptoms, this is
is a good Medicine both to help on their Discharge, and defend the Part. against Mortifications and Gangrenes, which frequently happen in fuch Cafes. In confirm'd Dropfies likewife, where the lower Parts have received more Water than can be carried off by the common Evacuations, and the Legs are forced to be fcarrify'd, this is of good Service both to prevent a Mortification, and forward the Drain of fuch Humours; infomuch that the Tone of a Part is fometimes retrieved by this Means, which would otherwife, from a partial Mortification, induce a total one. But observe to foment the Part very well, otherwise a Mortification will enfue, tho' the Water is let out; and to prevent the Scarrification from healing too foon, apply over them a Stupe wrung out of the warm Fomentation.

## A Cataplasm for the Hip-Gout.

Take Muftard-feed powder'd half a Pound, white Pepper and Ginger each 1 Ounce; mix together in a fine Powder, and keep in a Glafs clofe ftopped, and juft at the Time of ufing, make into a Poultus, with a fufficient Quantity of Oxymel of Squils.

This is a very warm Application, and will therefore fometimes help to break away those Humours which fix upon the Joints, occasioning there intolerable Pains, and which will not give way to any other Means. It is to be applied as often as the Symptoms and Urgency of Pain require, and the Part can bear; for it is so hot as frequently to vesicate the Skin; but it then generally has the best Effect, the Pain most commonly abating upon drawing out by Perspiration such Humours, as will raise a Dew upon the Skin, and sometimes list it up into little Blisters; but in such Cases all the Harm is the Trouble.

## A Dyet-drink for a Dropfie.

Take of Broom-tops and Muftard-feed, each 1 Pound, of the Roots of English Orrice, and sharp-pointed Dock, each 12 Ounces, Winter's Bark, Elder-Bark, Seeds of wild Carrot, and Juniper-berries, each 1 Pound and half; put them all together into a Bag, to be steep'd in 12 Gallons of unhopp'd Ale, while it works; half a Pint to be drank 2 or 3 Times in a Day.

This is of good Ufe to abforb and dry up the remaining Moiftures and watry Humours which the ordinary Catharticks leave behind; and will make the Cure lafting, which otherwife would be but fhort. In all fcorbutick Habits likewife, efpecially where the Extreams tend towards too great a Fulnefs and Corpulency, this is of real Service, if the Patients are kept to it for fome Time together. In all Tendencies likewife towards a Palfie it does much good, both by drying away watery and floughy Humours, which deftroy due Senfation, and by giving Warmth and Brisknefs to the Juices.

#### Fracastorius's Confection.

This is the fame as the common Diafcordium of the College; only inftead of Honey there is used the Syrup of Diacodium.

This is given about a Dram in a Dofe in ordinary Fluxes of the Belly, and as an Opiate to compose the Bowels after strong Purging; or wherefoever Opiates are requisite, and nothing forbids aftringing at the same Time.

This is a very good Medicine for the Purpofe it is intended, and will frequently procure Eafe when no other Means will take Place. This is likewife order'd in Diftempers of the Breaft, that are not a true Pleurifie, wherein it will do great Service, as in a Peripneumony; and in an Afthma, the common pectoral Drinks are not to be compared to it.

These purge much, and carry off a great Quantity of watery Humours, wherever they are ordered, particularly in Dropsies, and such Cache & Habits as abound with those Humours. Their Dose is from 1 Scruple to half a Dram, made into 4 or 5 Pills,

These are firongly purgative, and calculated particularly to fcour the Genital Parts, and those Passages as are principally infected by Venereal Taints; infomuch that they will frequently cleanse away a Gonorrhæa, without the Affistance of Mercury; tho most commonly a Bole with that is given over Night.

## Pills against a Dropsie.

The whole Habit likewife is cleanfed by them, and a Cachexy may by their Ufe be converted into a found, hale Conffitution.

# The Salivating Powder.

Take red Precipitate of Mercury 1 Pound, put it into a glazed Veffel, and pour upon it rectify'd Spirit of Wine, fo as to ftand 2 Fingers above it, which fet on fire, and ftir it about all the while it is burning. Let this Operation be repeated 3 Times. The Dofe is 10 Grains.

The burning of the Precipitate in this manner breaks off the Points of those Salts which join to the Mercury in its Preparation, and makes it operate with a greater Mildnefs, it being hardly fafe in inward Use without such Correction. And with this, Salivations are frequently raifed by giving 10 Grains for a Dose, with Conferve of Roses, or any Thing of like Substance. This is the Powder mentioned in the foregoing Prefcription.

This is a very forceable Diuretick, and operates with great Quickness if given in a proper Quantity of Liquor, as Whitewine, Whey, or any fuch Diluter. For what is drank with it greatly helps its Operation, and makes it pass with much more Safety, because it is so sharp, as otherwife to rake the Membranes too much, which will fometimes straiten the Paffages, and increase the Obstruction. A Quantity of Fluid likewife much favours the Operation of ftimulating Diureticks, not only as a Vehicle, but because it presses the faster by its Weight thro' the depending Paffages. In all Sufpicions of the Stone and Gravel, this is given once or twice in a Day, and continued according to the Importance of the Symptoms; but in floughy and viscid Obstructions, it is the more particularly fitted to break thro'. For Oily Medicines are most fuitable to ftony Concretions, which ftop the Veffels, because they relax and render flippery the Paffages ; but in Collections of viscid Mat-

ter,

ter, they only increase the Stoppage; and then it is these pungent attenuating Salts are fittest to cut their way through, by dividing the obstructed Matter, and carrying it along with them.

This is an admirable Remedy, and of great Efficacy in all cutaneous Foulness; as Scabs, Itch, Leprofie, Herpes, and the like; and efpecially if the Eruptions be anointed with the Unguentum Psoricum, and the Patient be first bled, and purg'd with Calomel, drinking plentifully at the fame Time Aqua Liberans. This is Dr. C-de's Method of curing those Diseases in St. B----- w's Hofpital.

This is a most powerful Deobstruent in menstrual Obstructions, and will prevail many Times where Chalybeats are try'd in vain.It is good likewife in many nervousDiforders; but particularly in all those which come under the Appellation of Hypochondriacal Affections; and even in an obstinate Mania, it is frequently found to have Succefs. In Rheumatisms likewife, and the Gout, it will often give great Relief, it being easy, by proper ways of encouraging it, to raife by it a very great Diaphorefis, fo as to breath out much of the offending Humours. When it is directed only for the Green-Sickness, it is fometimes joined with Elixir Proprietatis; in which manner it is likewife prescribed against Worms; and with an equal Quantity of Mynficht's Elixir of Vitriol it is fometimes compounded, both in the Green-Sicknefs and the Hypo.

#### The Sacred Tincture.

Take 2 Ounces of Hiera Picra, and hall a Dram of Cochineel, and infuse them for a Week in 2 Pints of generous White-wine

This has twice the Strength of that which is made in the Shops, and is much the better; for after the common way on making with half this Quantity of Species it will hardly operate, unless given in fa large a Dofe as will affect the Head from the Quantity of the Wine. It is given as a Stomachick, and frequently as a Preparatory to Alterative Courses, because it cleanses the first Paffages, and enables the Stomach the better to digeft what it receives; which is as necessary to answer the Ends of a Medicine defigned for an Alterative, as its is to that of common Food to make it into good Nourishment. This is prescribed from 2 to 3 Ounces over Night, or early in the Morning, and repeated every other Day for 3 or 4 Times, if not oftner; because its Operation is too mild to expect any Matters of Moment from one or two Doles.

This is cooling and drying, and order'd in a Herpes, and tetterous Ouzings of a fharp Serum thro' the Skin. But in many Cafes fuch Things are to be used with great Caution, because they endanger sometimes Mortification, by cooling the Part too much.

#### The Calamine Unguent, or Cerate.

Take May Butter unfalted, and white Wax, of each 3 Pounds and an half, Oil of Olives 4 Pounds, Calamine cleanfed and levigated, E Ounces; melt the Butter 47 and Wax with the Oil, and ftir in the Ca- 907 lamine till it is too hard to let it fettle.

The Author highly extols this, and performs Things incredible, it being the only Tetraphamarcum for Burns, (efpecially

if melted down with Ung. Sambuc.) and Scalds, which may be us'd from the Beginning to the End.

It is Anodyne, digefts, incarns, and cicatrizes to Admiration; in a Word, in all cutancous Excoriations, Blifters, Frettings, Scaldings, there is none like it, it being far beyond *Lucatellus*'s Balfam, *Crc.* For more of its Vertues, I re'er you to the Author, in his Treatife *de morbis cutaneis*.

This is a warm Digeftive, and a good Detergent, and is used therefore to cleanse old foul Ulcers, and wear away fungous Fleih from green Wounds, especially if *Pracip. rubr.* be mixt with it.

#### The Palfy Ointment.

Take Hogs-Lard, and Oil of Bays, each 2 Ounces, Oil of Vitriol 1 Ounce, and mix together into an Unguent.

This is very fharp, infomuch as fometimes to veficate the Part it is rubbed into, which are foon healed with the Ung. Epuloticum. It is used to paralytick and numbed Limbs, which it helps to reftore to their due Sense and Feeling, and is of good Use in a Sciatica.

#### The Blue or Mercurial Ointment.

Take Quickfilver 4 Ounces, the beft Venice Turpentine 2 Ounces; mix them well together, then adding 1 Pound of Hogs-Lard melted, make up into an Unguent.

This is the fame that is in the London Difpensatory, and is used to raise a Salivation by Unction. The Quantity gene-rally made Use of is 4 Ounces, divided into 4 equal Parts: One of which is to be rubbed into the Hands, Arms, Legs, and Thighs, every Night over a good Fire ; then the Patient must lie between the Blankets and fweat, drinking burnt Wine. Sometimes three or 4 Unctions will raife a Spitting, and fometimes lefs, though in some Constitutions half a Pound of this Medicine, nay a Pound has been rub'd in, and yet no Salivation has been rais'd : Of fo great a Quantity as this Wiseman gives you two or three Instances; and the' the Perfons did not fpit, yet they were cur'd by it. And it is very proper if the

the Perfon has any Ulcers to drefs them with the fame Ointment, which corrects them, and keeps the Salivation up: If whilft you are anointing, the Perfon should " be thrown into a Dyfentery (which is common) or be troubled with a Tenefmus, violent Gripes, Vomitings, &c. desift from anointing, and give the Glyfter mentioned here, pag. 69. and a Grain or two of Laudan Londinens. or, which is as good, the Mixtura Cardiaca, fo by this Means and drinking of Broths, these Symptoms will abate; and it's observ'd, that if the Spitting does not rife kindly, that an Emetick of 7 or 8 Grains of Turpeth Mineral will often encourage it; and fometimes the Body being over-coffive, will prevent its rifing, in which Cafe à gentle laxative will promote it.

#### Ointment for the Itch.

Take Hogs-Lard 4 Pound, Flowers of Sulphur, and Sulphur Vive, each half a Pound, Cloves powder'd 4 Ounces; mix all together into an Ointment.

This is the common Ointment in the Itch, and all cutaneous Foulneffes. It hardly ever fails of anfwering its End, if continued long enough, by anointing every Night the Parts which break out, and wearing the fame Linen all the Time. Two or three Weeks is as little a Time as can be depended upon; but it makes the Patient fmell very ftrong of it; it would not be amifs, while you use this Ointment, to drink the Decostum Pforicum.

#### The Soldiers Ointment.

Take Rue, Marjoram, Rofemary, Thyme, Mint, Tancey, and Bays, each a fufficient Quantity; cut them finall, and mix together: then melt 10 Pound of Hogs-Lard, and put in as many as poffible of thofe Herbs, and boil till they become crifp; then prefsthem out hard, and to the ftrained Ointment add fresh Herbs, and boil and ftrain as before; then put to it 1 Pound and half of Oil of Turpentine, and 12 Ounces of Yellow Wax; which melt together for an Ointment. This

This pretty much differs from the Medicine under the fame Title in the College Diffensatory. This mixt with Ol. Petrol. Ol. Spice, or Ol. Terebinth, is excellent for Aches and Pains proceeding from Cold.

#### The Elder Ointment.

Take Green Elder Leaves, and Houfeleek, each 2 Parts, and of the inward Bark of Elder 1 Part; mix them together, and boil as much as poffible in 10 Pound of Hogs-lard to a Crifpneis; then prefs it out hard, and boil a fresher Quantity in the fame Lard, and prefs out again; to the last putting 10 Pound of Yellow Wax.

This is a good Cooler and Anodyne, and directed in Inflammations, and eryfipelatous Tumours; this, tho' more fimple, is fully as effectual as the Ung. Populneum, but it is to be ufed with Caution, for the Reafons given under the Epulotick Ointment.

This is likewife directed for the Itch and Leprofie, and all fuch obftinate Deformities of the Skin, and chiefly to the more nice Patients; but it is hardly fo certain as the common Itch Ointments, and is not fo fafe by much. It is fometimes liable to raife a Salivation where it is not expected.
