1829-1832**

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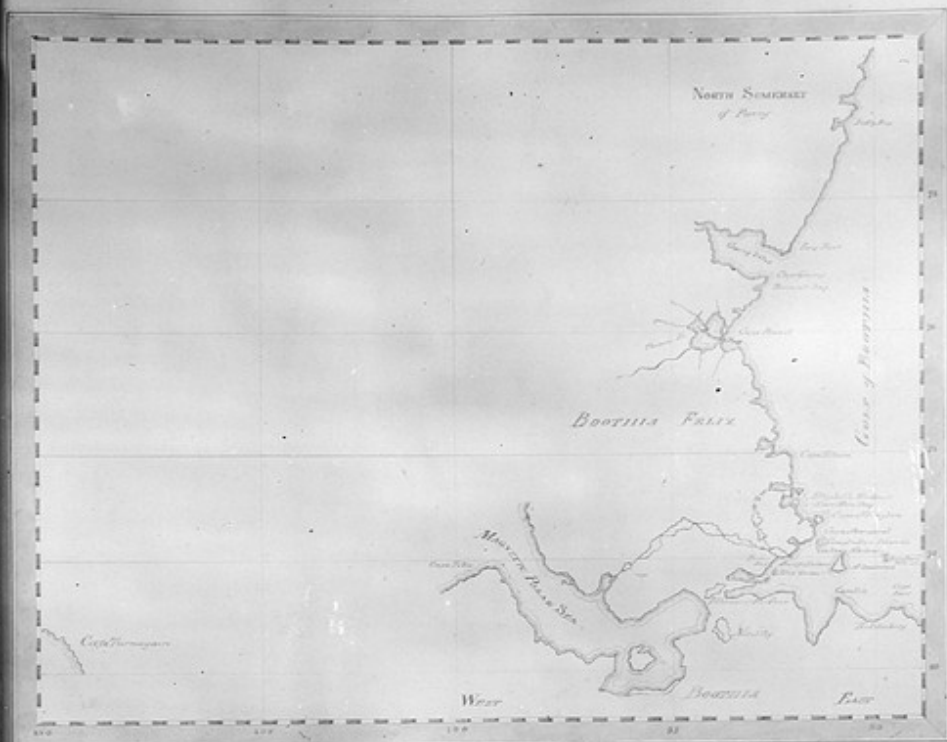
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CHART of Discovery made by the Victory 1829 to 1832.



Journal Kept at Journal 1<sup>st</sup> August 1832.

These few lines are left here to certify that Capt. Ross and the Crew of the Victory having left their Depot in Victory Harbour Lat 70° 11' N Long 99° 12' W after having surveyed the Coast and ascertained beyond a doubt that no passage existed between the Continent of America and Asia to the Southward of this Latitude, — That they discovered the Gulf the Land of Boothia E. & W. of the Settlement of Boothia and the Peninsula of Boothia south of it. — The Settlement which divides the Gulf from the Magnolia Bay Sea is only fifteen Miles long and the Westward Coast was surveyed to the 100° degree of West Longitude. — The Expedition having never travelled to the Northward along the Coast being frozen in 3 Years — left their Depots in the large boats on the 1<sup>st</sup> of August 1832
