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P R E F A C E.

The intent of the following pages, is to supply the collector of British Shells, at a moderate cost, and in a portable form, with a complete descriptive catalogue of all the marine species decidedly indigenous to this country.


The author has endeavoured to compile a work which might suffice for the arrangement of any cabinet of British Shells. For the Bivalves, the useful quarto of Turton has been carefully consulted. As no work similarly devoted to the elucidation of the Univalves, and based on the more scientific and natural arrangement of the modern systematists, had appeared; that section has demanded a stricter comparison of specimens, with the drawings and descriptions of the older writers of the Linnæan School. Much care has been bestowed upon a point neglected hitherto by our authors, the comparison of our native species with those described by the older naturalists, and those contained in the Faunæ of Europe and America.

The land and Freshwater shells of Great Britain, having been so ably illustrated in the recent edition of Turton's Manual, the author refraining altogether from that branch of his subject, has restricted his attention to the salt-water species alone.


By the scientific Conchologist the convenience of possessing in a small compass, the description of the species which from time to time, discovered since the days of Montagu, have been scattered through the various periodicals of England and Scotland, cannot fail to be appreciated. The exquisite figures, for whose fidelity the name of Sowerby is a sufficient guarantee, illustrating those species chiefly which have either been ill delineated or are altogether as yet unfigured, must cause this work, to be indispensable to every naturalist who may study this branch of Nature's handiworks.

As a preliminary for the arrangement of his cabinet, the reader should consult the SYSTEMATIC INDEX, which contains additional matter and emendations, together with a selection of *unpublished species*, from the MSS of some of our most scientific collectors. This portion has been contributed by Sylvanus Hanley, Esq. who has materially assisted the author in the course of his labours.

His gratitude is likewise due to W. Metcalfe, Esq. of Lincoln's Inn, and William Bean, Esq. of Scarborough as well for the use of their extensive collections, as for their willing communication of much valuable information.






(*a*) According to M. Deshayes, this and the succeeding shell form but one species. We shall not be surprised if this opinion prove correct with regard to the common Kentish specimens, (in abundance at Pegwell Bay) which *we* consider to be the *Entalis* of the majority of British cabinets.

(*b*) The British *Dentalia* are peculiarly obscure, few cabinets possessing more than one or two of the larger species. I believe the chief difference of the *Læve* from the *Entalis*, consists in its being snowy white, highly polished (like enamel), and perfectly free from those extremely minute longitudinal striulæ, which in perfect specimens will be always found, under the lens, in that species. It is also more attenuated and longer, but this latter character is of little avail for comparison, as this genus is rarely found alive and perfect. This species is chiefly found in the north of England, and the *Entalis* in the south.

(*c*) Subcylindrical, elongated, polished, pale horn coloured, perfectly smooth, moderately arcuated. Larger aperture contracted, perfectly round, smaller extremity with a minute round perforation, no fissure. Length one inch, breadth at the broadest part nearly a line, at the smaller end, one third of a line. This is the *Ditrupa Subulata* of Berkely in the *Zoological Journal*, and the *Dentalium Subulatum* of Deshayes' *Monograph*. The

specimen described came from the N.W. coast of Ireland, and was presented by its discoverer to Mr. Hanley, by whom it was transferred to the valuable collection of W. Metcalfe, Esq.

(*d*) I received from Mr. Bean an arcuated and much more tapering and slender variety, which perfectly agreed with Muller's figure (*Zool. Dan. t. 26, f. 2.*) of the sheath of his Amphitrite Auricoma.

(*e*) There are two curious varieties (?) of this shell, the first possessing the honeycomb appearance and parallel tubes of the type, but constructed of coarser materials, is usually termed *S. CRASSISSIMA*: The tubes of the other have no regular arrangement, and their mouths are devoid of the usual patulous rim. It forms large banks at Margate and Ramsgate, and is the *S. TUBULARIA* of Chenu's *Illustrations Conchiliologiques*.

I state this from the possession of a specimen authenticated by Turton. The variety Solitaria, were it not always flattened above and considerably smaller, might easily be confused with Tubularia.

(*h*) The variety *Tubularia* of Turton seems so very distinct, that it was only after continual observation that I assented to Mr. Berkely's synonyms in the Magazine of Natural History. The *Vermicularis* has a thin keel, (often with two additional smaller ones,) and the mouth seems armed above with an obtuse tooth-like projection, (the shell being cylindrical cannot be confused with *V. Triquetra*.) It is rarely found solitary, and the larger end scarcely if at all, projects above the surface. In this state it appears to be the *Rugosa* of the Conchological Dictionary, p. 154, and bears much resemblance to *Mulleri*, but that species (at least the *Vermicularis* of Montague, which is declared by Mr. B. to be the same) has a subquadrate look, for the top is somewhat flattened. When aged the carina and tooth totally disappear, the shell rises at a considerable angle from the surface to which the lower portion is attached, the margin of the aperture becomes circular and reflected, and finally the relics of the successively formed mouths produce the effect of one tube growing out of the other.

(*m*) A genus established by M. Recluz in the Revue Cuverienne of last year. Although nearly allied to *Kellia*, it is evidently a natural genus, and is most easily recognised by the broad ligamental plate. The characters are as follows:—"Ovate or roundish, transverse, equivalve inequilateral, closed. Two cardinal teeth in each valve, (but not as in *Kellia* on the same side of the umbo.) A ligamental pit running alongside of the single lateral tooth. Muscular impressions oval, equal. No palleal sinus.

(*n*) I received from Mr. Bean of Scarborough some shells thus named. They are so minute as almost to baffle microscopic observation. I perceive, however, two approximate cardinal teeth on the same side of the umbo, and a very indistinct anterior lateral one. These characters are those of *Kellia* proper. The ligament is very indistinct. The shell is elliptical, smooth, glossy, very inequilateral, pale olive with a purplish tinge at the beaks, pellucid,

(*s*) *M. Nigra* (Gray in Supplement to Parry's Voyage) appears to be the *Discrepans* of Montagu's Supplement, agreeing very well with the figure. The author's reference to the larger Newfoundland specimens must be expunged, for although extremely resembling them, the British shell may be easily distinguished by the proportionate shortness from the beaks to the ventral edge, (which by age also becomes much incurved,) and its decidedly stronger radiating *costellæ*. *Frith of Forth*.

We have thought it better to erase the descriptions at page 172 and give the following derived from the shells themselves, which not having seen, we had contented ourselves with copying from Fleming.

(*e*) A curious variety (if indeed no more than a variety) of this species has been figured, (*f.* 4,) from a specimen forwarded by Mr. Bean as *Rufilebris*? of Leach, which agrees perfectly with specimens collected by Mr. Sylvanus Hanley at Ryde. The shape, as in *Parva*, is oblong-conical, the 6 or 7 whorls moderately convex, and the lower ones longitudinally obtusely ribbed. Perfect specimens have very fine spiral striæ. 

opaque, glossy, smooth or marked with a few circular striæ or obscure annulations; white or yellowish white, with mostly a rufous tinge towards the smaller end.

D. DENTALIS, *Turt. D. p. 37—An Lin. et auctorum?*  
Slender, tapering to a fine point, slightly curved, opaque, regularly and closely striated the whole length, the striæ about 30 or more, with often a few faint annulations at the larger end; white or brownish, mostly rufous at the smaller end.  $\frac{1}{2}$  *W. coast, often found in the Gurnard.*

D. ALBUM.—*Turt. D. p. 256. and D. EBURNEUM. p. 37.*—A little tapering and slightly bent, semitransparent, ivory, white not glossy, often marked with obscure dark purple spots, disposed in longitudinal rows, with about 18 regular fine, raised, longitudinal ribs, and often a smaller intermediate one; lower end not pointed with a roundish oval aperture.  $\frac{7}{8}$  *W. coast, not rare; differs from the last in having the striæ equally strong throughout and in tapering but slightly.*

D. LABIATUM. *Turt. D. p. 38.*—Nearly cylindrical, very slightly tapering and curved, semi-transparent, ivory white, covered, when fresh, with a black glossy skin, most finely and minutely striated longitudinally; open at the larger extremity, the smaller end truncated, with the flattened surface somewhat undulated in a radiate manner, and finely striated circularly, from the centre of which projects an oval transparent process or lip, terminating in an oval aperture one side of which is cloven half-way down.  $1\frac{1}{2}$ . *Torbay. Breadth at the open end, one fifth.*

D. IMPERFORATUM. *Walker. f. 15.—Mont. p. 496. D. p. 1068.—Adams t. 14. f. 8—Turt. D. p. 39.—Lin. T. 8. p. 238—ORTHOCERA. T. F. p. 237.—*Slender, slightly curved, whitish, transversely striated, the larger end a little contracted at the margin, the smaller end closed and furnished with a small round protuberance.  $\frac{1}{8}$ . *Kent and Cornwall.*

D. CLAUSUM. *Turt. D. p. 39.—*Slender, slightly tapering, nearly straight, semi-transparent, horn colored or yellowish white, irregularly striated longitudinally, open at the larger end, with the opposite end closed and obtuse. 1. *at larger end*  $\frac{1}{8}$ . *Calves Island, W. Ireland.*

D. GLABRUM. *Mont. p. 497.—Turt. D. p. 40.—Lin. T. 8. p. 239.—D. MINUTUM. D. p. 1068.—An Lin 1264? CÆCUM. G. Flem, Edin. Ene. 7. p. 67. t. 204. f. 7.—ORTHOCERA. G. F. p. 237.—*Cylindric, arcuated, smooth, glossy, white, perfectly smooth; aperture orbicular, the other end closed, rounded, submarginated. 0,0833...0,0167. *Not uncommon at Biddeford Bay and Barnstaple, Devon.*

D. GADUS. *Mont.* p. 496 t. 14. f. 7.—*Turt. D.* p. 40.—*Lin. T.* 8. p. 238.—*D.* p. 1067.—*An D. COARC-TATUM.* *Desh in Z. I.* 4. p. 193.—Subpellucid, sub-arcuated, tapering to a small point, pervious, contracting a little towards the larger end, white, glossy, perfectly smooth.  $\frac{3}{8}$ . 0,0622. *British Channel, not rare.*

D. TRACHEA. *Mont.* p. 427. t. 14, f. 10.—*Turt. D.* p. 40.—*Lin. T.* 8. p. 239.—*D.* p. 1068.—*ORTHOCERA. T.* f. p. 237.—Subcylindric, arcuated, ferruginous brown becoming pale towards the smaller end, which is closed, truncated and furnished with a small round protuberance; marked with regular transverse striæ, or annulations, aperture round, the margin not contracted.  $\frac{1}{8}$ . 0,125 *Milton in Devonshire, rare, in sand.*

TRIBE.—AMPHITRITEANÆ.

GENUS.—PECTINARIA.

*Tube free, solitary, regular, conical, subcylindraceous, open at both extremities, membronaceous or papyraceous, covered externally with grains of sand or minute stones.*

*Tubes gregarious, forming one mass, resembling honeycombs on the upper surface, composed of sand, broken shell and small stones; apertures cup-shaped,*

S. ALVEOLATA. Lam. 1.—SABELLA A. Lin 1268.—*Mont. p. 540—Pen. t. 92. f. 162.—(Ellis Coral. t. 36.) Don. t. 139.*—With numerous tubes placed parallel to each other, contiguous but not interfering, apertures somewhat expanded. *Common, Margate, near Tenby, near Weymouth, &c.*

GENUS.—TEREBELLA.

*Tube solitary, elongated, cylindraceous, attenuated and pointed at its base, pervious only at the apex, composed of agglutinated sand or shells.*

T. CHRYSODON.—SABELLA. C. *Mont p. 546.—An Lin. 1269.—Mart. f. 29, 30.*—Tube free, cylindrical, about as large as a goose-quill, composed of sand, fragments of shell or small flat pieces of stone cemented on a tubular membrane which is smooth within: mouth furnished with numerous long fibres of the same texture.

T. LUMBRICALIS.—SABELLA. L. *Pult. Dorset.* p. 53.—*Mont.* p. 549.—Tube affixed in a serpentine manner upon stones, shells, &c., strong, composed of coarse sand, sometimes mixed with fragments of shells, firmly cemented together in a rough fashion. 2 or 3.  $\frac{1}{4}$ . *Common, often entwined with Serpula Vermicularis and Vermilia Triquetra.*

T. CIRRHATA. *Gmel.* 3112.—SABELLA. C. *Mont.* p. 550.—Tube free, thick, fragile, tapering a little, composed of sand mixed a little with clay, slightly agglutinated together, soft when moist, crumbly when dry. 6 or 7.  $\frac{1}{2}$ . *In a muddy bottom, in an inlet running up near Kingsbridge, between high and low water mark.*

T. ARENARIA.—SABELLA. A. *Mont. p. 532.*—Tube extremely fragile, free, cylindrical, not tapering, composed of pure sand, slightly cemented together, without an internal membrane. *Common on the Dorset coast, about the thickness of a Raven's quill.*

T. SUBCYLINDRICA.—SABELLA. S. *Mont. p. 552.*—Tube long, subcylindrical, slender, fragile, not attached, composed of fine sand and minute bits of broken shells, cemented together on a fine membrane, adhering by their flat sides. *Diam. 0,10. Salcomb bar.*

T. SETIFORMIS —SABELLA. S. *Mont. p. 553.*—Tube free, long, slender, gradually tapering to half its diameter, composed of very fine fragments of shells and minute flat bits of stone, agglutinated together at their edges, lying on each other subimbricately, and standing oblique towards the larger end. 3 or 4. diam. double that of a hog's bristle. *In sand, Salcomb Bar, Devon.*

T. CURTA.—SABELIA. C. *Mont. p. 554.*—Tube upright, affixed at the base to the shingles, near which it is merely membraneous and not covered as elsewhere, by sand and minute bits of flat stones or uniform fine sand on a tough membrane; diameter that of a crow quill, slightly tapering. 1. *Closely gregarious in the inlet near Kingsbridge.*

T. COMPRESSA.—SABELLA. C. *Mont. p. 555.*—Tube short, broad, and extremely flat, composed of large

fragments of bivalves (chiefly *Pectens*) which are irregularly disposed, often imbricated, but invariably with the concave side outwards, which leaves a narrow perforation. *Torcross, Devonshire, in deep water.*

TRIBE.—SERPULACEÆ.

*Tube solid and calcareous.*

GENUS.—SPIRORBIS.

*Tube testaceous, twisted into a spiral discoid orb; lower surface flat and affixed.*

D.* p. 151.—Strong, spiral, dull dirty white, with two or three reversed volutions placed laterally, furnished with longitudinal ridges, one along the back, and another on each side, rough, wrinkled transversely; base flat and somewhat spreading; aperture orbicular and invariably placed opposite the sun's apparent motion. 0,076. *Not uncommon, Kingsbridge bay, &c.*

S. CARINATA. SERPULA. C. *Mont.* p. 502.—*Lin. T.* 8. p. 242.—*D.* p. 1074.—*Turt. D.* p. 151.—Dull,

opaque, white, spiral, outer whorl rising into a carinated ridge on the top, the middle concave and somewhat pervious, inner volutions inconspicuous, base a little spreading; aperture round. 0,0625. *Salcomb Bay, on shells.*

S. CORRUGATA SERPULA. C. *Mont. p. 502.*—*Lin. t. 8. p. 242.*—*D. p. 151.*—*Turt. D. p. 151.*—Strong, spiral, white, roughened by transverse wrinkles, a small portion only of the second volution visible; centre umbilicated; aperture orbicular.  $\frac{1}{8}$ . *Not rare on slate rocks at Milton, stronger than Spirillum and never exposing so much of the interior volution.*

S. MINUTA.—SERPULA. M. *Mont p. 505.*—*Turt. D. p. 150.*—*Lin. T. 8. p. 241.*—*D. p. 1072.*—Very small, spiral, dirty white, with two or three lateral volutions, wrinkled transversely, sometimes with a slight longitudinal furrow on each side, forming a ridge or carina along the back. 0,02. *Heteroclite and not easily distinguished from Heterostropha except by its size, rounded base and habits. On Corallina Officinalis.*

S. LUCIDA.—SERPULA. L. *Mont. p. 507.*—*Lin. T. 8. p. 243.*—*D. p. 1075.*—*Turt. Dic.*—SERP. REFLEXA. *Adams in Lin. Tr. 5. p. 4. t. 1. f. 31. 2.*—Irregular, heterostrophe, pellucid, glossy, white, always more or less spiral, sometimes lateral, with two or three

whorls, sometimes the whorls turn upon each other, with the aperture projecting upwards and not unfrequently the spires are unconnected. *On Pertulariæ (especially Abrietina) W. and E. Coast.*

S. CORNEA.—SERPULA C. *Lin. Tr. 5. t. 1. f. 33, 4, 5*,—Regular, rounded, pellucid, brownish horn colored, with three whorls. *A doubtful species.*

*Shell either sessile or elevated on a flexible tendinous*

*pedicle; valves sometimes moveable and distant, sometimes soldered together, lined internally by the mantle.*

#### ORDER SESSILIA.

*Affixed and not pedunculated: aperture superior and anterior.*

#### GENUS CORONULA.

*Sessile, suborbicular, seemingly one entire piece, conoid or retuse conical, truncated at the extremities; substance thick, hollowed interiorly by radiating cells: operculum with four obtuse valves.*

L. CONCAMERATA. *F. p.* 233,—SERPULA C. *Mont. Sup. p.* 160. NAUTILUS. DISSIMILIS, *Turt. D. p.* 120 Suborbicular, compressed, flat beneath, slightly convex above, subpellucid, white, with three irregular volutions, the external having about nine glossy and tumid cells of unequal size but usually alternating large and small. *Diam.* 0,04....*Devon.* *Differs from the last by possessing infinitely more minute and numerous cells and in being devoid externally of that frosted appearance exhibited by it under the microscope.*

L. PULCHELLA.—DISCORBIS P. *Macg. Aberd. p.* 319. Orbicular, depressed, hyaline white, spiral, of numerous rather small, somewhat oblique regular cells in three and a half turns; lower surface rather convex, even, glossy; the margin thin but rounded and very slightly lobate; the upper surface convex, but with a

central depression in the middle of which is a roundish knob ; the turns distinctly visible on the lower disc, although neither they nor the cells are separated by sulci ; on the upper surface which is occupied, excepting the central part, by the last turn, the cells are a little convex with slight separating depressions. 0,04. *Aberdeen.*

GENUS.—TEXTULARIA. MACGILLIVRAY.

*Subpyramidal, compressed, with the summit pointed, the base rounded, having on each side an angular or sinuous groove extending from the summit to the base, and composed of two series of alternating cellules ; the aperture semi-lunar on the inner side of each cellule.*

T. OBLONGA. *Macg. Aber. p.* 38. Oblong lanceolate, somewhat compressed, of two alternate vertical series of horizontal, rather convex, depressed, glossy, somewhat tuberculated olivaceous cells. 0,04...0,02. *Aberdeen.*

T. OBTUSA *Macg. Aber. p.* 321. Rather broadly oblong, reddish white, subtruncated at the base, rounded at the apex, much compressed, sloping to the margins which are thin and subcarinated, ; of about sixteen alternating cellules, disposed in two series, and horizontal,

unless at the commencement or apex, where they are vertical or radiating; their surface convex, strongly granulated and glistening. *Aberdeen* 0,04....004.

GENUS.—ROTALIA.

*Orbicular, spiral, convex or conoid above, flattened, radiated, and tuberculated beneath, multilocular; aperture marginal, triangular.*

R. BECCARIA. *F. p.* 232.—*Macg. Aber. p.* 35.—NAUTILUS B. *Mont. p.* 186. *t.* 18. *f.* 4.—*Turt. D. p.* 119.—*Dor. Cat. t.* 19. *f.* 28.—*Walk. f.* 63.—*D. p.* 342.—Transparent, white or covered with a brown skin, convex on one side and flat on the other; spires four or five, twisted, with ten joints in the first which are deeply grooved; aperture oboval *Reversed var.* (NAUT. PERVERSUS. *Walk. f.* 64.—*Mont. p.* 187. *t.* 18. *f.* 6.) *Minute. Weymouth, Margate, &c. in sand.*

R. INFLATA. *F. p.* 232.—NAUTILUS I. *Mont. Sup p.* 81. *t.* 18. *f.* 3.—*Turt, D. p.* 120. Brown, opaque, with three volutions; in the first are three joints which are exceedingly tumid and rounded, and so deeply divided as to appear like lobes; the aperture somewhat globular. *Minute. In fine sand.*

## GENUS—POLYSTOMELLA.

*Sides equal, the last whorl embracing and concealing the previously formed one.*

P. CRISPA LAM.—*Macg. Aber. p. 33*—NAUTILUS C. *Lin 1162.*—*D. p. 341.*—*Gualt. t. 19. f. A. D.*—*Walk. f. 65.*—*Adams. t. 14. f. 30.*—*Mont. p. 187. & Sup. t. 18. f. 5.*—*F. p. 228*—*Turt. D. p. 119.*—With lateral spires, about twenty flexuous crenated joints in the exterior whorl, marked with elevated striæ outer edge carinated; interior volutions hidden; aperture clasping the body, semicordate, furnished with a small perforation or syphon. *Kent, Dorset Devon, &c. Not uncommon, minute.*

P. ROTATA.—NAUTILUS R. *Maton in Lin. T. 8. p. 114.*—*Turt. D. p. 118.*—*D. p. 340.*—AN NAUTILUS C. *Lin 1162. ?*—*Mart. f. 180*—*Mont. p. 189. t. 15. f. 4. & Sup. p. 76.*—*F. p. 228.*—Smooth. spiral, with six joints on the body whorl, marked by as many flexuous elevated striæ radiating from the centre but not extending quite to the margin; back strongly carinated, both sides equally convex, smooth and rather more elevated in the centre; inner volutions lost after entering the aperture, which is semicordate, clasping the

D. p. 118.*—*Walk. t. 3. f. 68.*—*Adams. t. 14. f. 63.*—*D. p. 341.*—*F. p. 228.* Depressed, exteriorly rounded, the chambers and partitions nearly even, about nine, the latter slightly curved and ending at the centre in a pellucid spot. *England and Scotland. minute.*

P. UMBILICATULA. *Macg. Aberd. p. 317.*—NAUTILUS U. *Mont. p. 191. & Sup. p. 78. t. 18. f. 1.*—*Turt. D. p. 119.*—*Walk. t. 3. f. 69.*—*F. p. 229.*—*D. p. 343.*—*Lin. t. 8. p. 115.*—Depressed, exteriorly

rounded, partitions sunken, flexuous, with a subtubercular pellucid elevation in the centre. *Minute. Diffused but not common.*

P. GUILIELMINÆ. *Macg. Aberd. p. 315.* Orbicular, disciform, greyish white, considerably compressed, the sides equally convex, bevelled to a thin subcarinate margin ; the cells of the last whorl about fifteen, elevated, narrow, convex, with the concave interstices transversely sulcated ; the centres elevated ; the end moderately raised, semilunar, convex, with its sides embracing the previous turn. 0,02. *Aberdeen.*

P. CRENULATA. *Macg. Aberd. p. 316.* Roundish, discoid, pale bluish grey, the sides somewhat convex, the margin rounded, the centres slightly depressed ; the rays formed by the cells about twenty, curved, convex,

and regularly crenato-sulcate, as are their interstices, being marked with concentric grooves and ridges : end of the last cell semilunar, narrow, convex. 0,02. *Aberdeen.*

P. NAUTILINA. *Macg. Some individuals are perfectly orbicular, others less so, some with a slight angle.*

The British *Dentalium Dentalis* is not that described by Linnæus but is the Tarentinum of Lamarck. This conclusion is made from a comparison of Turton's specimen with the Mediterranean species.

SPIRORBIS. CONICA.—HETORODISCA. C. *Flem. Edin. Enc. t. 205. f. 3.—Fl. Ed. Phil. j. vol. 12. p. 247.*—Sinistral, strong, hyaline, triangular.

When young the upper part of the whorl has a distinct groove with a low acute ridge on each side and a very small central cavity. In this state the whorls are two in number, the outer one lateral with a spreading base. The third whorl in its growth not only embraces

the others but ascends and forms the outline of the shell into a truncated cone, with the mouth at the top sub-lateral. The groove and central cavity are in this state less distinct, the latter generally obliterated. *Rare. In deep water.*

VERMILIA SERRULATA. *Flem. in Edin. Phil. J. vol. 12.*—SERPULA. *S. Fl. in Ed. Ency. 7. p. 67. t. 204. f. 8.* Translucent, triangular, with a serrated dorsal ridge; lid single, concave, with a smooth margin.

BALANUS CRANCHII. *Leach. Enc. Brit Sup.* Depressed, conical, very spreading at the base; valves darker or paler purple, crowded with coarse raised radiating striæ; aperture very small in proportion; walls at the base, cellular. *Diam. 1. Rare. Tenby.*

MACTRA ELLIPTICA. *Brown. Ill.—Forbes Mal. Mon. p. 48.*—*Macg. Aber. p. 289.* Subelliptical, very thin, yellowish white, smoothish, somewhat glossy, with faint and very delicate concentric striæ, rather conspicuous lines of growth and slight indications of radiating striulæ; umbones prominent, pointed, recurved and nearly central: posterior slope convex, the anterior less so and forming an obtuse angle with the arched

and ventral margin. 0,58...1. *Scotland. Isle of Man, &c. More delicate and more elongated than the young of M. Solida.*

ERVILIA. PELLUCIDA. *Macg. Aber. p. 341.*—  
TELLINA. P. *Brown. Ill. Conc. t. 16. f. 22.* Ovate-elliptical, compressed, very inequilateral, rounded at both ends, semitransparent, glossy, white, concentrically sulcated, dorsal line concave; hinge with two slender divaricate teeth separated by a triangular space. 0,04...0,06. *Aberdeen.*

MONTACUTA. GLABRA. *Macg. Ab. p. 303.*—  
TELLIMYA. G. *Brown Ill. Con. t. 14. f. 19.* Ovate-oblong, subelliptical, very thin, subpellucid, very inequilateral, nearly equally rounded at both ends, convex, white or tinged with brown, nearly smooth, slightly punctulate towards the margin; inside glossy, slightly granulated, somewhat iridescent; in the right valve an oblique deflexed, adherent concave tooth, and a white sinus with a conical tooth, the margins channelled for a short space; in the left valve a sinus with a concave tooth, the margins plain. 0,25.—0,416. *Aberdeen.*

SPHÆNIA COSTULATA. *Macg. Aberd. p. 301.*

Ovate-elliptical, equally rounded at both ends, posteriorly much shorter, umbones small and slightly prominent; convex very thin, semitransparent, glossy hyaline white, concentrically striolate, about 15 radiating little elevated ribs; tooth in the form of an elongated thin lamella of small extent. 0,0834...0,08  
*Aberdeen. Only a single valve as yet found.*

TELLINA. PROXIMA. *Smith in Wern. Mem. 8. p. 105. t. 1. f. 21.*—*Macg. Ab. p. 340.* Subovate, compressed, thin, dull brown, with irregular concentric striæ, the umbones very small and nearer the anterior end; hind slope little convex, posterior end rounded, dorsal slope rapidly declining and nearly straight, anterior end subangulated.  $\frac{3}{4}$ ...1. *Aberdeen, very rare*

CRASSINA ELLIPTICA. *Brown Ill. Conch. t. 18. f. 3.*—ASTARTE C. *Macg. Ab. p. 259.*—(*C. Ovata. Brown in Edinb. J. of Nat. Sc. 1 t. 12. f. 8. & C. Depressa of Ill. Conch. t. 18. f. 2. fide Macgillivray.*)  
 —C. SEMISULCATA of *Jeffreys M. S.* Ovate-elliptical compressed, posteriorly much shorter; dorsal line nearly straight, elongated, with a linear-lanceolate impression; posterior slope concave, the lunule narrow-lanceolate; valves not thick, about twenty two broad

scarcely elevated concentric ribs which become obsolete at the sides and are, as well as the interstices, concentrically striated; cuticle light yellowish-brown: margin entire.  $1 \dots 1\frac{1}{3}$ . *Scotland. I believe this shell is the C. Garensis of some writers. The C. Multicostata of Macgillivray is our Compressa.*

C. SULCATA. *Macg. Aberd. 229. (not his synonyms)*  
 Rounded-triangular, subangulated anteriorly, convex; posteriorly longer; umbones pointed and contiguous; dorsal slope convex, the impression lanceolate; posterior slope somewhat concave, lunule ovate-lanceolate; valves very thick, with twenty five or more concentric ridges of the same breadth as the interstices, which as well as they, are concentrically striated; cuticle olive brown, margin crenated. 0,8...1. *Aberdeen. Very like Danmoniensis, but in that shell the ridges are much narrower than the furrows.*

C. (*Astarte*) COMPRESSA. *Macgill p. 261. (not Turt.)*  
 Ovate-triangular, compressed, posteriorly shorter, umbones pointed; dorsal slope straight for half its length, then convex with a linear oblong impression; posterior slope nearly straight to the end of the oblong impression; valves moderately thick with irregular flattened concentric ridges and shallow sulci oblite-

rated toward the margins ; muscular impressions very large, margin entire ; cuticle yellowish brown.  $1\frac{1}{4}$ ...  $1\frac{1}{2}$ . *Scotland. According to Mr. Macgillivray this is the true Venus Compressa of Montagu and the Astarte C. of Fleming:*

NUCULA NITIDA *Sowerby Conch. Illus. Nucula f. 20.* Ovate-subtriangular, smooth, shining white with an olive colored cuticle ; anterior slope somewhat rounded, posterior nearly straight with a central elevation 0,05....0,4. *Common. North of England.*

MODIOLA FABIA *Gray—MYTILUS F. Chemnitz. f. 761.—CRENELLA DECUSSATA Macgil. Ab. p. 229.—MODIOLA GLANDULA. Totten in Sil. J. 26. p. 367. f. 3. ?—Gould Mas. p. 131. f. 87.?* Suborbicular, transverse, more extended anteriorly, convex, rather thin, pellucid, nacreous, radiatingly striated and marked with concentric striolæ as well as somewhat regularly spaced lines or ridges of growth, producing a decussated appearance ; umbones prominent, a little curved to one side at the point, contiguous and central ; hinge thin, with a sinus and thick angular fold in each valve under the umbo ; margin crenulated. *Scotland and England, rare.*

*M. RADIATA* of *Brown*, Is closely allied to *M. Modiolus*, but is smaller, more delicate, covered with a yellow epidermis under which the white shell is, more especially at the anterior end, rayed with more or less crooked, crimson red wavy markings. 1. *Tenby*.

*M. NIGRA*. Oblong, very short, rounded and narrow posteriorly, rather dilated anteriorly, margin nowhere angulated, ventral edge rather incurved; cuticle yellowish black, sides radiated with raised striæ which appear granular from the very fine concentric decussations, central area smooth; ligament scarcely visible externally. *A single small specimen not one inch broad was found at Scarborough by W. Bean, Esq. Foreign Shells, (Newfoundland) are triple this size.*

*OSTREA HIANIS* *Gmel.—L. TENERA* *Turt. in Z. J. 5.—*  
*PECTEN FRAGILIS* *Mont. Sup. p. 62.—*Thin, subcompressed, obliquely oval-elongated, smooth at the sides, minutely striated in the middle, very slightly gaping posteriorly, widely so anteriorly; anterior gape margined by a strong internal rib; anterior auricles acute; hinge area small. *Rare.*

*PECTEN ACULEATUS* *Jeffreys in Conch. Mag.—*

*Sow. Th. Pecten. f. 47.*—P. VITRÆUS. VAR *Chemnitz.*  
*f. 637. b.* Equivalve, suboval, thin, with radiating  
 striæ armed with elevated minutely prickly dots; ears  
 unequal, the anterior small; the posterior large and in  
 one valve strongly emarginated; pale yellow clouded  
 with red. 0,8...0,9. *Oban.*

P. NIVEPS *Macgillivray in Edin. Phil. J.*—*Sow. Th.*  
*Monog. Pect. f. 223, 4.*—Oval white, rather thin, the  
 left valve very slightly the larger; ears unequal, the  
 posterior rather large; ribs forty, smooth, quadrate  
 armed with distant erect acute spines; interstices flat.  
 1½...1,7. *Bears a strong resemblance to Varius.*  
*Scotland.*

P. ISABELLA *Macgil. Aber. p. 225.* Rounded-  
 ovate. subequivalve, little convex, with twenty four  
 slender compressed rounded ribs having very numerous  
 elevated thin edged lamellæ rising towards the margin  
 into triangular compressed pointed spines, the grooves  
 with transverse scalar lamellæ not extending over the  
 ridges; ears very unequal, with radiating sulci trans-  
 verse lamellæ and spines: margin of the upper valve  
 under the auricular sinus with four free curved conical  
 spinelets, of which a series is continued to the smooth  
 and glossy umbo; white, lower valve tinged with pink.

Conch.* Oblong, strongly keeled by a dorsal, striated rib; valves beaked, reniform, finely granulated at the sides, disunited at the extremities; margin smooth, hairy, fasciculated; inserted laminae broad; colour various.  $\frac{1}{2}$ ...1. *Not common.*

FISSURELLA NUBECULA: *Macg. Ab. p. 345.*—*PATELLA N. Turt. D. p. 142.*—Ovate oblong, conical, little elevated, brownish red rayed with reddish white, with about fifteen broad ribs alternating with smaller, and somewhat reticulated with concentric inconspicuous lines; interior purplish white with a ring of pale reddish purple around the thick whitish marginal rim. 0,30...0,16. *Aberdeen.*

BULALÆ CATENULIFERA *Macg. Ab. p. 187.* Oblong-cylindrical, very thin, transparent, brittle, pure white, truncate at the right extremity, wider and rounded at the other; aperture extending the whole length, narrow for a fourth only, then dilated into an oblong-truncate form: outer lip very thin, pillar exposed and gently waved: white with regular distinct divergent longitudinal striæ which are moniliformly marked, or

present the appearance of two undulated lines intersecting each other.  $\frac{1}{4} \dots \frac{1}{8}$  *Aberdeen*.

BULLA CANDIDA. *Macg. Ab. p.* 189.—DIAPHANA C. *Brown Ill. Con. t.* 38. *f.* 13, 4.—Broadly ovate, thin, semitransparent, glossy white; apex rather prominent, obtuse, two very small volutions being apparent, but with a slight scrobiculus; aperture wide, ovate-oblong, acute behind, the columellar margin a little thickened and reflexed, outer margin thin. *Aberdeen*  $\frac{1}{4} \dots 0, 14$ .

B. PUNCTURA *Johnston in Edin. Phil. J.* 19. Oblong-oval, opaque, white, thickish, marked with numerous close, transverse, punctured striæ; apex with a very narrow perforation 0,33. *Berwick. Shape of B. Ampulla of Montague.*

B. MINUTA. *Macg. Aber. p.* 334.—DIAPHANA M. *Brown. Ill. Con. t.* 38. *f.* 7, 8.—Ovate cylindrical, of two very thin transparent hyaline white glossy turns, nearly smooth; broadly truncate above, with a wide sutural groove, and a rounded mammillation which protudes a little; mouth oblong, anteriorly wide and rounded, moderately narrowed behind, extending the whole length of the shell: outer lip projecting conside-

rably behind in the form of a small lobe ; a false umbilicus. 0,09...0,06. *Aberdeen.*

B. PELLUCIDA.—BULLINA. P. *Macg. Ab. p.* 334.—VOLVARIA P. *Brown. Ill. Con. t.* 38. *f.* 45, 6 Subcylindrical, hyaline white, glossy, faintly striolate the whole length, a little wider anteriorly where it is rounded, apex truncate ; spire sunken, forming a wide and shallow umbilicus ; mouth very narrow but becoming oblong anteriorly, and at its hind part projecting a little in the form of a sinus beyond the extremity of the shell. 0,16....0,18. *Aberdeen.*

B. PRODUCTA. *Brown. Ill. Con. t.* 38. *f.* 15, 6.—*Macg. Ab. p.* 335.—Oblong cylindrical, thin, transparent, glossy, hyaline white with faint lines of growth, the apex slightly umbilicated ; aperture extremely narrow, the outer lip forming a narrow sinus projecting considerably beyond the apex. 0,23...0,11. *Aberdeen.*

NATICA RUTILA *Mac. Ab. p.* 126—Subglobose, rather broader than high, thick, glossy, dull greyish red, with a white band margining the suture at which the margin of the whorls is sharply inflexed, the base paler ; spire very short and convex ; suture channelled but narrow ; whorls four, very convex, longitudinally

striolate, the body ventricose ; aperture oblique, subovate, reddish white, inner lip nearly straight, thickened slightly reflected at the strongly sulcated umbilicus but not forming a prominence, operculum semicircular, horny spiral. *Aberdeen. Between Rufa and Monilifera.*

**TORNATELLA PELLUCIDA.** *Macg. Aber. p. 158.*  
 Ovate-conical, subfusiform, very thin, transparent, glossy ; the spire having a straight outline and tapering to a small point ; whorls little convex, transversely striated ; the body nearly twice as broad as the length of the spire, more deeply striated anteriorly and towards the suture where there are two punctulate impressed lines, the anterior striæ minutely crenulated : suture distinct, edge of the whorls simply incurved : aperture narrow oblong, much narrowed behind by the convexity of the last turn ; outer lip extremely thin, pillar with an obscure obtuse plait, colour hyaline white, with two very faint reddish bands on the first whorl. 0,20 -- 0,12

**SCALARIA TREVELIANA.** Turreted imperforate, thin, pellucid, glossy, of a uniform pale yellow ochre colour, with very indistinct, lighter bands ; whorls eight or nine, moderately rounded, about eighteen longitudinal

**TROCHUS CONULUS** *Lin. Gmel. p. 3579.*—*Chemnitz. 5. f. 1588.*—*Lam. 48.*—*Dilw. p. 798.* Conical, smooth, polished, imperforated, variable in colouring being uniform gold or bronze or bluish white with chesnut longitudinal linear undulations; whorls six to nine, flat, with a smooth elevated belt at the lower extremity; base of the last whorl angulated and most delicately striated concentrically: apex acute; aperture subquadrate, oblique, operculum corneous. *A single small but brilliant and live specimen was procured at Scarborough by W. Bean Esquire.*

**TROCHUS MONTAGUI.** *Wood. Sup. t. 6. f. 43.* Produced-conical, imperforated, rather dull, whitish tessellated with chesnut on the five or six rather distant little elevated spiral belts on each of the whorls; whorls rather convex, suture indistinct; interstices of the belts minutely and obliquely striated; base subangulated in colour and markings similar to the whorls; apex rather obtuse: aperture rather square.  $\frac{1}{2}$  *Rare. Ireland.*

**TURBO FULGIDUS** *Adams in Lin. Tr. 3. p. 354.*—

*Mont. p. 332.—Turt. D. p. 199.* Somewhat conic, smooth, glossy, transparent; whorls three, the body very large, variegated with white and bronze generally in bands, terminating in a small obtuse point; aperture somewhat orbicular, margin acute. *Minute. Whitsand Bay, very rare.*

By the advice of several distinguished Conchologists, I have determined on the adoption of the genus

LACUNA.—TURTON.

*Thin, conoid or somewhat globular clothed with an epidermis. Aperture entire, roundish or oval, with the lips disunited at the top. Pillar flattened, with a longitudinal groove which terminates at the upper end in an umbilicus. Operculum horny.*

To this genus then will belong our *Rufa* (L. *Puteolus*) (fide Turton) *Natica*. *Pallidula*, *Lacuna Turbo*, *Quadrifasciatus*, *Vinctus* and *Crassior*.

LACUNA FASCIATA *Macg. Ab. p. 145.—HELIX F Mont. p. 446.—(Adams in Lin. T. 5. t. 1. f. 20, 1.)—PHASIANELLA F Brown Ill. Conc. t. 46. f. 54.—Subglobose, broader than long, spire depressed, of three very thin transparent rapidly increasing volutions,*

which are glossy and nearly smooth, the suture deep ; body-whorl very large, with four white and three reddish brown bands, the central one being broader and sometimes separated into two by a pale line ; mouth roundish, peristome thin and whitish : a deep and wide groove from the umbilicus, margined by the slightly reflected columellar margin. *Aberdeen.*

L. CANALIS *Turton Zool. Jour.* 3. p. 192.—TURBO C *Mont.* p. 309. t. 12. f. 11.—L. VARIABILIS VAR. *Macg. Aber.* p. 145.—Conoid, opaque, pale coloured without markings ; outer lip hard and thickened. 0,37....0,25. *Southampton.*

#### LITTORINA—SOWERBY.

*Ovoidal, ovate-conical or subglobose ; the spire often short, often acuminate ; the whorls convex, spirally striated, the last very ventricose ; aperture elliptical, rather acute above ; pillar lip thickened rather flat and generally covering the umbilicus ; the outer lip thickened and bevelled to a thin edge ; operculum horny, spiral, consisting of few volutions, increasing rapidly in width.*

L. JUGOSA. *Macg. Ab.* p. 326.—TURBO C. *Mont.* t. 20. f. 2.—*Lin. Tr.* 8. t. 4. f. 7.—*Dor. Cat.* t. 19. f.

1.—*Turt. D. p.* 196. Somewhat oval, not much pointed; whorls four, the first occupying three-fourths of the shell, tumid in the middle, fulvous or dark purple with eleven spiral circular shape ridges (often white or greenish black) which reflect a little upwards (the middle are the stronger); aperture dark purple or chocolate brown; lip thin, pillar broad, polished chocolate. 0,37....0,25. *Common.* At the advice of an eminent Conchologist I have retained this shell as a species, although considered by Fleming, &c. as the young of *Rudis*, an opinion which I am inclined to assent to.

L. ANATINA. *Gray Turt. p.* 87.—PALUDINA A. *Drap. Alder in Mag. Z. & Bot. 2. p.* 116. Ovate, perforated, thin, transparent; whorls ventricose, rounded and the mouth ovate; operculum horny and brown. *Resembles Bithinia (Paludina) Ventricosa, but is smaller and shorter and has a spiral and horny operculum; the peristome is contiguous and the shell generally covered with green Algæ.*

L. SAXATILIS *Johnston in Berw. Tr. 3. p.* 268.—*Macg. Aberd, p.* 138. Subglobose-conical, as broad as long, moderately thick, banded or tessellated with dusky brown or green; whorls three, transversely

striolate, suture deeply impressed, body somewhat flattened above and angulated towards its lower part; spire scarcely occupying one third of the shell, the apex obtuse; mouth very large, roundish, lip united at right angles, throat chocolate brown. 0,33. *Aberdeen, Wexford, &c.* *Very like the young of Rudis.*

L. PATULA *Jeffreys.*—Semi-globose, rather solid, grey-chocolate colour with coarse and rather distant raised spiral striæ; whorls three; the aperture occupying three fourths the length of the shell, peritreme white, throat glossy chocolate. 0,40. *Eddystone Rock.\**

ODOSTOMIA SCALARIS *Macg. Ab. p. 154.*—Ovate-conical, hyaline white, whorls five, transparent, glossy, faintly striated, moderately convex; the suture spi-

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\* Those who may adopt this genus (not considering its type the common periwinkle to be a typical Turbo and consequently that if that genus must be again de-severed, the name at least should be retained for the present group) must add to these species our Turbo Littoreus (L. VULGARIS *Sow.*) Petræus, Rudis, Tenebrosus, Fabalis (*the note has erroneously been appended at page 167 to that species*) and Neritoides.

rato-conalliculate towards which the upper margin is suddenly inflexed ; mouth ovate, nearly half the whole length, peristome thin, columellar lip rather inflexed and terminating in a prominent plait on the columella ; no umbilicus. 0,06...0,02. *Aberdeen.*

O. MARIONÆ. *Macg. Ab. p. 156.* Ovate conical, hyaline white, thin, transparent, rather glossy : whorls five, finely plicated lengthways and delicately striated spirally, the upper margin of each in the form of a plaited rib ; mouth ovate, nearly half the whole length, peristome slightly thickened, not reflexed on the pillar but ending in a very slight plait behind the minute umbilicus. 0,04...0,02. *Aberdeen.*

O. ANNÆ. *Macg. Ab. p. 157.* Oblong-turreted, rather thick, opaque, glossy, destitute of markings, pure white ; suture slight, whorls five, the body convex and proportionably large, the rest flattened ; mouth ovate, nearly a third of the entire length, peristome thin, its columellar portion rather inflexed and terminating in a small plait on the pillar opposite the small umbilicus. 0,04...0,14. *Aberdeen.*

O. OBLONGA. *Macg. Ab. p. 157.*—Oblong, subcylindrical, very slightly tapering and ending in an obtuse

point; of five flattened whorls of which the upper three are smooth, the rest longitudinally marked with numerous fine ribs; suture deep, aperture a fourth of the whole length: ovate, the peritreme ending about the middle of the inner side in a prominent plait running into the interior 0,04...0,13. *Aberdeen.*

*CINGULA PULCHRA* *Johnston in Edin Phil. J.* 19. Conical, white, glossy, with two rows of oblong reddish brown spots on the whorls which are six in number, spirally striated, rounded and well defined: aperture roundish, narrowed above, with even margins and a slight perforation behind the pillar.  $\frac{1}{8}$ . *Rare.*

*C. (RISSEA) MURIATICA* *Macg. Ab. p.* 148.—*TURBO ULVÆ* *Pen.*—*CYCLOSTOMA ACUTUM* *Drap. t.* 1. *f.* 23.—*PALUDINA M.* *Lam.*—*P. ACUTA* *Fl. p.* 315. Oblong-turreted, rather thin, transparent, somewhat corneous, pale yellowish or greenish grey: spire elongated, tapering to a small but bluntish point: whorls six, slightly convex, obscurely striated lengthways; the body whorl rounded, without an angle; aperture ovate, acute behind, peristome thin, considerably reflected on the columellar side, leaving a slight fissure but concealing the umbilicus: 0,20...0,09. *Aberdeen.*

C. (RISSEO) GRACILIS *Maeg. Ab. p. 152.* Turreted, subcylindrical, of six thin pellucid glossy moderately convex whorls, the suture deep ; mouth about one fourth of the length, ovate, oblique, a little narrowed behind, the peristome complete, thickened externally on the outer lip, thinner and direct on the inner, leaving a very small cavity : hyaline white, brownish red around the mouth. *Aberdeen.* 0,102...0,025. *Very like Rubra but is less attenuated and the mouth rounder.*

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CHITON HANLEYI—*Bean*.—Shell oblong oval, narrow, carinated, brownish white, granulated, with the granulations larger towards the margin which is covered with minute spines; inside pale green; length 3 lines, breadth  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lines.

*Only two specimens of this beautiful shell have been met with at Scarborough attached to the under sides of rocks at the lowest spring tides. We have great pleasure in naming it after the author of "a Descriptive Catalogue of recent Shells."*

CHITON PICTUS—*Bean.*—Shell oblong, smooth, depressed, subcarinated, colour dark red with a few spots of white, margin smooth and the fringe distinct, inside crimson. *Length*  $\frac{1}{2}$  *inch, breadth*  $\frac{1}{4}$  *inch.*

*This shell is more depressed, not so broad, and the colour uniformly darker than C. Lævigatus. It is rare, only three specimens have been detected in company with C. Lævis.*

PATELLA ATHLETICA *Bean.*—Shell oval with about twenty large tuberculated ribs which project beyond the margin and three or four smaller ones filling up the interstices between each, apex obtuse and never central. colour dull white but young shells are black between the ribs which gives them a beautiful appearance; inside pearly. *Length* 2 *inches, breadth*  $1\frac{1}{2}$  *inch.*

*The animals in this species are very hard and tough, our Fishermen call them Kennocks and never use them with the common P. Vulgata in baiting their hooks.*

TROCHUS ELECTISSIMUS—*Bean.*—Shell conic, spires six, tapering to a fine point with numerous spiral striæ which are crossed by minute longitudinal lines of growth only visible with the aid of a good magnifier; color brown, with darker longitudinal oblique bands; aperture subquadrangular, inside pearly. *Length* 4

*lines, breadth 4 lines.*

*This rare shell differs from T Tumidus, in the striæ being stronger and less numerous; the volutions are not so much rounded, nor are they flattened at the top as in that species.*

SERPULA. SOLITARIA.—*Bean.*—Shell cylindrical, opaque, white, gradually tapering to a point and wrinkled transversely, fixed at the smaller end to *Dentularia abietina* or *Plumularia falcata*, round the stems of which it forms four or five volutions, and then projects forward in a straight, (or sometimes) undulating manner to the length of an inch. *Var.* With the volutions reversed. *Common on the coast of Scarborough.*

SERPULA. PLACENTULA.—*Bean.*—Shell strong, opaque, white, with three volutions, the outer one with a sharp keel-like ridge which is strongly wrinkled or serrated. *Diameter, 4 lines.* VAR With the volutions reversed. *Found on the same Zoophytes with S. Solitaria and equally common.*

NATICA LIVIDA —*Bean.*—Shell smooth, globular, of a livid greenish colour, volutions five, marked with very fine longitudinal striæ; aperture roundish-oval, outer lip thin, pillar lip white, a little spread and forming a small perforation behind it. *Diameter 6 lines.*

*Only five specimens have been met with on the Scarborough Coast, and four of them are very young shells.*

LITTORINA. ZONARIA.—*Bean.*—Shell very strong, oval, not much pointed, body whorl very large occupying nearly three parts of the shell, volutions five, finely striated transversely and longitudinally giving the shell a beautiful decussated appearance; colour yellow with two broad dark purple bands; outer lip thin, pillar lip spread, yellow and polished, inside purple. *Length 6 lines, Breadth 4 lines. Found in great abundance at Robin Hood Bay on the flat Lias scars at low water, in company with the common species.*

LITTORINA. NEGLECTA.—*Bean.*—Shell strong, smooth, glossy and nearly globular, volutions four, mostly ending in an obtuse point; body whorl large covered with numerous transverse dark interrupted bands; aperture orbicular, inside pale purple. *Diameter, not 2 lines. This small species is found in company with L. Petrœa and Fabalis on large blocks of oolite that have long braved the fury of the elements on the north shore of Scarborough.*

LITTORINA. RUDISSIMA.—*Bean.*—Shell strong, somewhat conic and pointed, with numerous raised

spiral lines which never become totally obliterated in the oldest specimens; volutions five or six, rounded and well defined by the suture; color reddish brown and dark purple, rarely white; outer lip thin, pillar lip broad, white and polished, inside purple. *Length 5 lines, breadth nearly 4 lines.*

*A very variable but distinct species found in the greatest abundance on our piers and rocks at high water mark at Scarborough. It differs from L. Rudis in its raised spiral striæ and the body whorl being more patulous.*

**TEREBRA SPECIOSA.**—*Bean.*—Shell slender, greenish white, tapering to a point; volutions seven, rounded, well defined by the separating line and marked with numerous very fine longitudinal beaded striæ, aperture roundish oval, with a very slight canal. *Length nearly 2 lines.*

*Only one specimen has been met with in the shelly sand of Scarborough.*
