Pritzel 13. First Italian edition. Acosta's principal work (*Trattato*) is still regarded as an important and authoritative work on the subject of medicine and drugs. The interesting woodcuts are reproduced from freehand drawings, executed by the author, and illustrate many Asiatic plants.

2. ALBERTI, S. *Historia plerarumque partium humani corporis.* 8 leaves, 121 pp., 1 leaf. *With three folding plates, four fullpage woodcuts and 23 smaller woodcuts, showing anatomical details.* 8vo. Modern half vellum. Wittenberg, 1585. Frs. 160. —

Choulant-Frank. p. 217. *Rare.* An uncommon anatomical work and an interesting Vesalianum. "Alberti's *Historia partium corporis humani* contains about 30 most peculiar illustrations, large and small, in rather crude woodcuts" (Choul.-Frank). — Nice copy.

3. ALBERTUS MAGNUS. *Secreta mulierum et virorum cum expositione Henrici de Saxonia.* 38 lines. Roman letter. 56 leaves. Small 4to. Vellum. Rome, unknown printer, 1499. Frs. 275. —

British Mus. Cat. IV, p. 145. Reichling 1439. Gesamtkatalog 766. This work which most probably has been written by Henricus de Saxonia, a pupil of Albertus Magnus, is an unique document in the history of *obstetrics*. It deals with generation, *foetus*, *birth*, *miscarriages*, *sterility*, and contains interesting *practical hints for midwives*. — A copy of this edition has been offered in a most recent German catalogue for Mark 525.— (about 650.— Swiss Francs). Our copy is complete, only a few leaves at the beginning have turned pale, having been washed too strongly.

4. ALBERTUS MAGNUS. *De secretis mulierum libellus. De virtutibus herbarum, lapidum et animalium. De mirabilibus mundi.* — **Aristoteles.** *Problemata.* — **Alexander Aphrodisaeus.** *Super quaestionibus nonnullis physicis.* 184 leaves. 8vo. Modern half vellum. Frankfurt, 1580. Frs. 65. —

I: The *De secretis mulierum* deals with generation, *foetus*, *birth*, *miscarriages*, etc. Important for the history of *obstetrics*. The *De virtutibus herbarum*, etc. deals with the magic virtues of plants, precious stones, and animals, with very definite references to astrology. — II: *Aristoteles' Problemata* are of great medical interest.

5. ARDOYNO, S. *Opus de venenis. Deinde Alexipharmacia.* — **Ponzetti.** *De venenis libri tres.* 8 leaves, 573 pp., 7 leaves. Folio. Old limp vellum. Basel, 1562. Frs. 65. —

Ardoyno studied drugs and their actions. The result of his work is embodied in "De vene-

nis", which, though throughout partaking of the character of a compilation, is nevertheless of a great historical interest. Both books are early contributions to the history of toxicology. — Somewhat browned, but good copy.

Hain-Copinger 1703. Pellechet 1208. Proctor 5341. Brit. Mus. Cat. V, p. 433. Gesamtkatalog 2353. Vouillème, Berlin 4259. "In his three great biological works, the 'History of animals', the 'Parts of animals', and the 'Generation of animals', Aristoteles discusses many biological problems current to this very day. He laid the basis of the doctrine of organic evolution in his teaching concerning the 'scala naturae', he developed coherent theories of generation and heredity, and he founded comparative anatomy" (Singer, Anatomy).

7. ASSALINI, P. Discorso sopra un nuovo strumento per l'estrazione della cataratta. 34 pp. *With plate* (ophthalmological instruments). 8vo. Not bound. Pavia, 1792. Frs. 16. —

Assalini describes in this work a new instrument for the operation of cataract.

8. AUENBRUGGER, L. — Rozière de la Chassagne. Manuel des pulmoniques. On y a joint: Auenbrugger. Nouvelle méthode de reconnoitre les maladies internes de la poitrine par la percussion de cette cavité, traduite du Latin d'Auenbrugger. Two parts. Collation: Rozière's Manuel: 12 and 319 pp. Auenbrugger's treatise with particular title and own collation: 1 leaf, 4 and 69 pp. 8vo. Calf. Paris, 1770. Frs. 380. —

Excessively rare. A monument in the history of medicine. This French edition of that monumental work which from its first edition in 1761 remained unappreciated and unobserved until its revival through Corvisart in 1808, is only mentioned by Neuburger in his study on Auenbrugger (1922) and unknown to the other bibliographers. Except the Vienna-Latin-edition of 1763 (copies of which are quite undiscoverable and equally rare as copies of the 1761 first edition) and a Latin reprint in Wasserberg's "Fasciculus", 1775, our present edition of 1770 is the only one of this fundamental work between 1761 and 1808. — Auenbrugger's little book is the first record of the use of immediate percussion of the chest in diagnosis, based upon observation verified by postmortem experiences and experiment.

Apparently first French edition of this eminent work. — A few short upper margins, first leaves with light waterstains, but good copy of this rare, early edition.

10. BAGELLARDUS, P. Opusculum recens natum de morbis puerorum, cum appendicibus Petri Toleti. — Oddo de Oddi. De prandii et coenae ratione. — Toleti de podagra. 8 leaves, 238 pp., 1 leaf. 8vo. Lyons, 1538. Frs. 265. —

Very rare. First octavo-edition of the first treatise on diseases of children. — Sudhoff, Paediatric XXI-II. Ruhraeh, Pediatrics of the Past, p. 576 (under Toletus). "The work is divided into two parts: the first is on the management of infants in the first months; the second is in twenty-two chapters. — Appended to the Bagellardus text will be found what may be regarded as the most important part of his book, his own consideration of diseases not mentioned by Bagellardus" (Ruhraeh).

Good work on pediatrics.

This edition presented a distinct improvement over the earlier ones because it contained the results of some of Bartholinus' own dissections, for example, *the discovery of a new muscle.*

14. **BAUHINUS, G. Theatrum anatomicum.** 8 leaves, 1314 pp., 23 leaves. *With frontispiece, portrait of Bauhinus, and 131 excellent anatomical full-page plates.* Stout, large 8vo. Old vellum. Frankfurt, 1605. Frs. 150. —

Choulant-Frank p. 229. *First edition.* "The Theatrum contains reduced copies from Vesalius, Valverde, Eustachi, Coiter, and other anatomists. The merits of Bauhin's work consists in the compiling and revising of subject matter already known. He did this in a scholarly fashion and with expert knowledge, and was thus able to produce a work that was both welcome and useful to his time" (Choul. Frank). — Very fine copy.

15. **BAUHINUS, G. Externarum humani corporis partium appellationes, liber primus.** 8 leaves, 151 pp. *With Bauhinus' portrait.* Small 8vo. Modern half vellum. Basel, 1591. Frs. 65. —

This edition of this valuable anatomical text-book which was often reprinted, contains some augmentations. — *Rare.*

16. **BELLINI, L. Gustus organum.** 8 leaves, 248 pp. 16mo. Original boards. Bologna, 1665. Frs. 34. —

First edition of Bellini's important work on the structure of the tongue. At the end a letter to Malpighi. — Fine copy.

17. **BERETTINI, P. Tabulae anatomicae, recensuit Fr. Petraglia.** 16 pp., 104 pp. *With large engraving on the title showing the transfusion of blood, and 27 excellent copper-plates.* Large folio. Original calf. Rome, 1788. Frs. 185. —

Choulant-Frank, p. 238. "In this (second) edition all the accessory figures on the first 19 plates are erased, so that the original figures stand out better. This edition, although it contains the later prints, is to be preferred to the first edition" (Choulant-Frank).

18. **BERTHOLON. De l'électricité du corps humain, dans l'état de santé et de maladie.** 2 vols. *With 6 folding plates.* 8vo. Original calf. Paris, 1786. Frs. 12. —

"Contains much about atmospheric electricity, also applications of positive and negative electricity to the cure of diseases, frictional machines, etc."

First edition. Copies of Bleuland's works with figures printed in colours — very early and fine attempts of coloured printing — are rare.

20. **BOERHAAVE, H. Elementa Chemiae.** Two vols. in one. *With 17 copperplates.* Quarto. Old vellum. Venice, 1749. Frs. 34. —

"It was undoubtedly the most learned and most luminous treatise on chemistry that the world had yet seen" (Thomson). — Blank portion of titles cut off.

Feyfer, D., nr. 9. *A rare work* by this German physician, based on Vesalius of whom he says in the preface: "Elucet labor, studium et industria singularis Andreae Vesalii, medici excellentissimi, cui in secundis corporibus me plurimum debere fateor". We mention the following headings: De ossibus, de musculis, de auditus organo, de chylo, de organis generationis, de formatione foetus, motu et situ, de partu, de pulmone, de corde, etc. — Very fine copy with a few unopened leaves.

23. **BRASAVOLA, A. Examen omnium simplicium medicamentorum.** 32 leaves, 629 pp. 8vo. Old vellum. Venice, 1545. Frs. 48. —

Pritzel 1093. *Unknown to Harris.* Important pharmaceutical work dealing mainly with the

healing of *syphilis* with Guaiac (lignum sanctum). The chapter: "De lignis, quorum apud pharmacopolas usus est" (pp. 420-28), deals entirely with the healing-power of the Lignum Sanctum imported from the *New World* against venereal diseases and on the history of syphilis, and contains several allusions to *America*. — Old owner's name on title. Somewhat waterstained.

Willems 1784. *Rare French translation.* — "The Religio Medici is a great book; it has a romantic and fascinating history" (Crummer). — Nice copy.

25. BRUNSCHWIG, H. (On pharmaceutics, in German). *Hauszapoteck zu yeden leibs gebresten.* 4 and 72 leaves. *With fine full-page woodcut and three nice woodcuts of half-page size showing a gardener with his flowers, a banquet, etc.* Small 4to. Modern half vellum. Augsburg, H. Stayner, 1539. Frs. 115. —

Rare. — A dispensatory for the poor people, but not identical with the fifth part of the "Grosses Destillierbuch". We mention: Diseases of the hair, sleeplessness, diseases of the eyes, teeth, heart, stomach, a chapter on diseases of children, on ulcers, several chapters of uroscopical interest, on fevers, etc. — A few light waterstains.

(text), containing five parts, in large 4to. *With portraits of the two editors on the title, engraved frontispiece and 264 beautiful full-page plates and 196 outline plates, altogether 460 plates.* Original half calf. Venice, 1801-1814. Frs. 425. —

Choulant-Frank p. 327-28 — A fine and complete copy of this splendid collection which comprises the very best anatomic engravings that had been published up to that date. *Complete copies like the above offered are rare.* — "The anatomic plates begin with a histologic plate, from original preparations and after Albinus, Monro, Scarpa, and Cruikshank. Then follow representations of the bones after Albinus, the female skeleton after Soemmering, the teeth after John Hunter, the ligaments after Floriano Caldani's work. The second volume contains representations of the muscles after Albinus, the skin from original preparations and after Ruysch. Ledermueller, Albinus, W. Hunter, Haase, Loder, the eye, the ear, the olfactory organ, the tongue, the viscera, the sexual organs and the fetus, etc. The third vol. comprises representations of the pregnant uterus and the embryos; the heart; arteries and veins; the portal vein; the thoracic duct. The fourth contains the lymphatic after Mascagni, the brain after Vicq d'Azyr, the nerves from original preparations and after Meckel, Lobstein, Scarpa, etc. All the original preparations were prepared anatomically by the younger Caldani and drawn from nature by Cajetano Bosa. *All the plates are beautifully finished in the size of the originals*". (Ch. - Frk). — *Fine copy of this monumental work.*

Choulant-Frank, p. 329. "*A very excellent and complete work*". The illustrations "comprise the best anatomic representations of past periods" (Ch.-Frk).

29. CANT, A. *Impetus primi anatomici ex lustratis cadaveribus nati.* 3 leaves, 28 pp. *With six excellent full-page plates, engraved by the author himself, representing the facial muscles, the brain, hearth, etc.* Imperial folio. Original boards. Leyden, 1721. Frs. 100. —

Nothing seems to be known on the author, who was apparently a contemporary of Frederik Ruysch. The plates which are of unusual size, are very well executed. Dedicated to Boerhaave. — *Scarce.*

Caillet 2025. *First edition* of one of Cardanus' most interesting works. The "De libris propriis" contains an interesting mention of *Vesalius*.

First edition of a rare work which is of importance for the history of medicine. Contains biographic and bibliographic chapters of a great number of physicians from the beginning up to the author's times. We only mention: Arnoldus Villanova, Jacopus Carpentis, Ficinus, Th. Linacrus, Leoniceus, J. Fernelius, *Vesalius* (6 pp.), Fuchs, Fallopius, Ingrassias, Joubert, Guenther of Andernach, etc. — A few tiny wormholes, but fine copy.

32. Celsus. *De arte medica libri octo.* Ed. by G. Pantinus. 6 leaves, 564 pp., 18 leaves. *Folio.* Original vellum. Basel, J. Oporinus, 1552. Frs. 55. —

Choulant, Handbuch p. 169. — "Celsus was the first important writer on medical history" (Garrison). Well printed by Oporinus' famous press. — First leaves waterstained. Oporinus' name on the title cancelled.

33. CESALPINO, A. *Portrait of Cesalpino.* Engraved by F. Ambrosi after G. Longhi, showing Cesalpino, bust to right. 17,5 x 11,5 cm. In good condition. Frs. 12. —

34. CHAMPIER, S. *Hortus Gallicus.* 6 leaves, 83 pp. — *Campus Elysus Galliae, in quo sunt medicinae compositae, herbae et plantae virentes.* 4 leaves, 135 pp. With Champier's arms, pretty woodcut initials, and printer's device. Two works. 8vo. Half vellum. Lyons, Trechsel, 1533. Frs. 55. —

Pritzel 1658, 1659. The *Hortus Gallicus* is one of the very first works on *French medical plants*. The *Campus Elysus Galliae* contains a full account of *French pharmacology* of this time. — Two independent works bound together. *Rare.*

35. CHIRURGIA. *De chirurgia scriptores optimi quique veteres et recentiores.* (Edited by Knr. Gesner). 10 leaves, 408 leaves, 2 leaves, 19 leaves. With many fine woodcuts, six of which are full-page. *Folio.* In the fine original binding of richly decorated half vellum showing three different borders. Zurich, A. and J. Gessner, 1555. Frs. 260. —

Choulant, Handbuch, p. 418. — *A standard work.* — Very esteemed collection, containing the following treatises: *Tagaultius*, *Institutiones chirurgicae*; *Hollerius*, *Institutiones chirurgiae*; *Marianus Sanctus*, *Compendium chirurgiae*; *Angelus Bologninus*, *De cura ulcerum exteriorum*; *Maggi*, *De vulneribus sclopetorum curatione*; *Ferri*, *De sclopetorum vulneribus*; *Galenus*, *De fasciis*; etc. Of special interest are the numerous woodcuts representing surgical instruments, operations etc. — At the end an extensive bio-bibliographical account of the most celebrated surgeons of all times, by Gessner. — Two insignificant repairs in the upper margins of the last two leaves of the index, but an exceptionally fine and tall copy in the same fresh and untouched condition as just issued from the press.

Rare. "Colombo (1516?-59), was assistant to Vesalius, and is mentioned by him with generosity. The attention that Columbus gives to the movements of the heart and lungs is important as showing the interest in these subjects at the Padovan School forty years before Harvey came there. *Columbus demonstrated experimentally that the blood passes from the lung into the pulmonary vein*" (Singer). — The right-hand margins (especially towards the end) show waterstains and a wormhole, except that a fresh copy with wide margins.

37. CORDUS, E. (On sweating sickness). *Ain Regiment: wie man sich vor der neuen Plage/ Der Englische Schwaisz genannt/ bewaren und so man damit ergriffen wirt/ darinn halten soll.* 8 leaves. 4to. Modern half vellum. Marburg, (1529). Frs. 90. —

Rare tract on sweating sickness. This terrible disease spread five times between 1486 and 1551, but only the epidemic of 1529 reached the European continent, while the other four were confined to England.

Collection of Descartes' principal works. — "The 'De homine' is usually regarded as the first European text-book on physiology" (Garrison).

The rare, second English edition, "corrected and augmented, with the addition of an index". This famous discourse caused quite a sensation at the time of its publication. "This sympathetic powder consisted of nothing more than green vitriol, dissolved in water and recrystallized or calcined in the sun". — Title slightly stained.

Brunet II, 738. Pritzel 2292. Choulant, Handbuch, 78. *Very rare. Second Greek edition of Dioscorides*, beautifully printed by Aldus' press in his famous Greek letters. — With Latin preface by Franciscus Asulanus, and notes. — First leaf carefully mounted, a very few insignificant traces of use, but a fine copy. Book-plate: John Hyde.

42. DIOSCORIDES. Della materia medicinale. 302 and 7 leaves. Printer's device. Small 8vo. Old vellum. Florence, Giunti, 1547. Frs. 46. —

Pritzel 2317. Choulant, Handbuch, p. 81. — *One of the earliest Italian editions*, finely printed in Italics by Giunti's famous press. — Margins of first leaves strengthened. First leaves badly bound, but complete.

Choulant, Handbuch, p. 37: "A work of lasting value, indispensable for the comprehension of Hippocrates' writings, and for etymological studies dealing with them". — First edition. — Browned as usual.
