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
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1. ALBERTUS MAGNUS. Summa de quattuor coaequaevis et de homine. Two parts. Black letter. 69 lines. 198 leaves (folios 80 and 198 blank). Folio. Boards. Venice, Simon de Lucre for Andr. Torresanus, 1498. Frs. 650.—

Hain-Copinger 569. Gesamtkatalog d. Wiegendr. I, 779. Proctor 5621. Pellechet 384. Census, p. 8, only two copies in America. Brit. Mus. V,

p. 574.

The first and only edition printed in the 15th century of this highly interesting work of this great scholastic philosopher (the edition of 1494 erroneously described by Hain 570, does not exist, see Gesamtkatalog d. Wiegendr. I, 778a). The two parts, printed in different months, are difficult to be found together.

This book, usually called « Summa de creaturis » is one of the two systematic capital-works of Albertus Magnus and of great philosophical and especially medical interest. The first part deals with Albertus Magnus' well known Natural Philosophy. The second part treats entirely of medicine. We only mention: The first chapters deal with dietetics, « De auditu, quid sit olfactus, de compositione corporis », etc. etc.

Excellent copy.

2. ANTONINUS. Summae theologicae pars secunda. (Edited by Franciscus Moneliensis). Black letter. 56 lines. Two cols. 323 leaves. With large and small initial letters painted in red. Folio. Modern vellum. Venice, Nicolaus Jenson, 1480. Frs. 150.—

Brit. Mus. V, p. 181. Proctor 4126. Hain 1243 (2). Pellechet 878 (2).

This edition of Antoninus' famous Summa Theologica was published in four parts from 1477-80. « As the 4 vols. are so far apart in time (1477-80), it seems better to follow Proctor and not Hain and catalogue them separately » (Brit. Mus. V, p. 181). Not only Proctor, but also Peddie, Conspectus incunabulorum, quotes the single parts printed n different years separately.

The blank half of the first leaf cut out is substituted by other contemporary paper, upper inner margins of first ten leaves waterstained, exterior and upper margins of last leaves with large waterstains, otherwise good copy.

- 3. ANTONINUS. Summae theologicae pars quarta. (Edited by Franciscus Moneliensis). Black letter. 56 lines. 374 leaves. With many large and small initial letters painted in red. Folio. Vellum. (Back wormed). Venice, Nicolaus Jenson. 1480. Frs. 150.—
 - Brit. Mus. V, p. 181. Proctor 4124. Hain 1243 (4). Pellechet 878 (4). Census p. 16. This edition of Antoninus' famous Summa theologica was published in four parts from 1477-80. « As the 4 vols. are so far apart in time (1477-80), it seems better to follow Proctor and not Hain

and catalogue them separately ». (Brit. Mus. V, p. 181). Not only Proctor, but also Peddie, Conspectus Incunabulorum, quotes the single parts printed in different years separately. — A very little part of the last leaves with short margins, but not touching the head-line, small blank portion of the margin of one leaf repaired, margin of another leaf partly gone without touching the text, but a good copy.

4. ANTONINUS. Summa theologiae pars prima. Black letter. 2 columns. 59 lines. 226 leaves, (first blank). Modern vellum. Folio. Venice, Marinus Sarazenus, 1487.

Hain 1252. Pell. 886. Census p. 16: Only one copy in America. Unk-

nown to Proctor and no copy in the British Museum.

Of great rarity. Marinus Saracenus, who worked at Venice together with Hannibal Foxius, printed by himself from 1487-88; only five prints from this press in this time are known. Only described by Hain and Pellechet. This first part of the Summa theologiae is described by both bibliographers as single and undoubtly complete number, as really Saracenus has not printed but this Prima pars of the Summa. No copy to be found in the catalogues of the last ten years. Very clean and crisp copy.

5. ANTONINUS. Repertorium Joannis Molitoris sive inventarium totius summae Antonini. Black letter. 64 lines. 88 leaves. Folio. Modern vellum. (Strassburg, Johann Grüninger, about 1490).

Hain 1260. Gesamtkatalog der Wiegendr., Band II, nr. 2201 (not yet published). Only one copy in America (Sutro Library, San Francisco)

according to Census, p. 16.

No copy in the British Museum nor in the Bodleyan Library. Unknown to Proctor and Pellechet. By a kind information of the Wiegendruckkomission, Berlin, we know that Hain 1260 will be attributed to Grüninger, Strassburg, about 1490, as nr. 2201 of the second volume of the Gesamtkatalog not yet published. The Gesamtkatalog knowns only eight copies, of which seven in Europe and one in America.—On folio g 3 a very slight hole affecting a very few letters, blank portion of the first leaf mended, otherwise a very good copy of this rare book.

THE ONLY BOOK KNOWN FROM THIS PRESS.

6. ARISTOTELES. Auctoritates sive proportiones universales Aristotelis et philosophorum. Black letter. 40 lines. 70 leaves. 4to. Vellum. Bologna, Pasquinus de Fontanetis, Frs. 675.— 1488.

Hain 1931. Reichling IV, p. 125. Burger, index, p. 404.

Excessively rare. The only book known from this press.

No copy in America, according to Census. No copy in the French Public Libraries. No copy in the British Museum nor in the Bodleian Library. Only described by Hain and Reichling who quotes only the edition in the Biblioteca Nazionale Fiorentina. Unknown to all the other bibliographers. We cannot find any copy in the catalogues of the last years.

The only book printed by Pasquinus de Fontanetis, which Proctor mentions, without numbering it, as he hasn't seen it. He describes as follows, (II. vol. p. 440): « (See Hain 1931. He was probably succeeded by

Joh. Jac. de Fontanetis, press 30 (q. v.) ».

There is still another edition of the same work, of the same city and of the same year, printed by another printer, Ugo Rugerius. (Hain 1930).

- This compilation of selections from Aristoteles etc. and from commentaries is to a great extent devoted to natural sciences and medicine. Some of the contents: De coelo et mundo, metaphysica. Libri physicorum. De generatione et corruptione. De meteoris. De sensu et sensato. De memoria et reminescentia. De somno et vigilia. De respiratione et aspiratione. De motu cordis. De animalibus, etc. etc. The excerpts from Aristoteles are followed by a few sections, excerpts from Averroes, Seneca, Boethius, etc.—A few contemporary annotations.—Some leaves with short upper margins, touching in two cases hardly the head-line, a few very insignif. brownstains, otherwise a very good, complete copy of this extremely rare work.
- 7. AUGUSTINUS, Aurelius. De civitate Dei. Black letter. Two columns. 46 lines. 296 leaves. 1, 16 and 296 blank (first and last blank missing). With many large and small initial letters painted in red and blue. Folio. Modern half vellum. Venice, Gabriele di Pietro di Tarvisio, 1475. Frs. 700.—

Hain-Copinger 2052. Pellechet 1551. Proctor 4193. B. M. V, 201. Census 28.

Beautiful specimen from the first press of Gabriele di Pietro, who began printing in 1472 in partnership with Philippo di Pietro, presumably his brother, from whom he separated in 1473 and continued to print by himself. From his press issued but very few books.

The inner margins of some leaves with large, but faint waterstains, a few wormholes at the same places repaired, otherwise a really clean and

fresh copy with very wide margins. Very scarce.

8. AUGUSTINUS, Aurelius. De civitate Dei. (In Italian). Della città di Dio. Roman letter. Two columns. 47 lines. 323 leaves. With very pretty illuminated initial letter painted in colours and gold, showing the head of a lion (16th century). Folio. Original Venetian binding, wooden boards covered with richly stamped calf (binding damaged in places and slightly wormed, clasps wanting). (Florence, Antonio Miscomini, about 1480, not after 1483). Frs. 525.—

Hain-Copinger 2071. Proctor 6145. Voullième B. 2900. Census 29. The first Italian edition of St. Augustine's most important work. The different bibliographers have attributed this book to different presses: Proctor to Florence, Miscomini, about 1483, and Copinger to Venice, without mentioning the name of a typographer, about 1475. We would prefer to follow independently from typographical researches, the attribution of Copinger for several reasons, as we have found twice this book in original Venetian bindings and printed undoubtly on Venetian paper. Without the first blank leaf. A few slight waterstains in the first and last

Without the first blank leaf. A few slight waterstains in the first and last leaves, a slight wormhole through the inner upper margins of the first quarter of the book not touching the text, an insignifiant wormhole through the last leaves, but a very fine, complete copy with wide margins

of this interesting work.

9. BERGOMENSIS, Jac. Phil. (Forsti). Supplementum chronicarum. Black letter. 60 lines. 270 leaves. With splendid full-page woodcut on verso of the first leaf representing the six days of the creation, surrounded by a magnificent large border in the finest Italian Renaissance style, same border on the second leaf, three other beautiful half-page cuts:

Expulsion from Paradise, Death of Abel and the Tower of Babel; further numerous fine smaller woodcuts of views of cities (amongst them two views of Venice and Rome, this being the oldest view of Venice); initial letters and printer's device on black ground. Folio. Modern vellum. Venice, Bernardinus Rizus Novariensis, 1492. Frs. 500.

Hain-Copinger 2809. Pellechet 2068. Proctor 4962. Brit. Mus. Cat. V, p. 404. Essling 343. Census, p. 39. This 1492 edition of this beautifully illustrated work, first published 1486,

is preferable to the preceding, because as containing further new wood-cuts, a. o. the Tower of Babel, etc. etc.

In this copy the preface precedes the text. — Some leaves, especially in the first part of the book, dampstained in the upper parts of the leaves, slight wormholes in the lower blank margins of the first two leaves touching hardly the border, three very small wormholes on folio a3, some traces of use, but on the whole a well preserved, complete copy, not shaved as usually done. — See reproductions (p. 6, 7).

Hain 3165. B. M. V, 197. (Imperfect copy). Pellechet 2344. Proctor 4180. Burger p. 560. Voullième 3700. Copinger, Inc. Bibl. 58, 34. Census p. 46.

The third vol. of this famous Bible consisting of three vols. The British Museum quotes for the third vol. only 312 leaves (last blank) as our copy has, which would seem to be complete according to the description of the British Museum. The other bibliographers (Hain, Pellechet etc.) mention 460 leaves containing besides the «Additiones of Paul de Burgos», which are wanting as a rule in all copies. Our copy contains besides of the 311 leaves quoted by the British Museum, 28 leaves of the «Additiones» of Paulus of Burgos, so that the present vol. is a single but complete part. Usually all copies of this Bible are imperfect or only containing single parts.—The last blank leaf wanting. Good, tall copy.

With a great number of remarkable Venetian large and small woodcuts (one of them of full-page size). Folio. Modern vellum. Venice, Bonetus Locatellus, 1489. Frs. 150.—

Hain-Copinger 3168. Pellechet 2347. Copinger, Inc. Bibl. 81-82, 42. Essling I, 122. Census 46.

The first and third volume of the highly appreciated « Lyra-Bible » in four vols, which is unvariably imperfect and only to be found in single vols. Its greatest value consists in the fine and riche illustration, a marvelous sample of Venetian art. The woodcuts represent chapters of the construction of the Temple, the customs of the Hebrews, the visions

of the prophets etc. etc. This book being usually in bad condition, our copy is in fine and fresh state of preservation, only the third volume shows on several leaves margins with waterstains and one leaf repaired without affecting the text. On the first vol. there are three leaves carefully mended without any loss of text. In the first vol. wants the first blank leaf, in the third vol. four leaves (DD 5, 6 and LL 5, 6) wanting.

12. BIBLIA LATINA. Black letter. 51 lines. 528 leaves. With two large and 71 small fine Venetian woodcuts, all from blocks employed in the famous Mallermi-Bible of 1490, and numerous nice figural woodcut initials. 4to. Calf. Venice, Simon Bevilaqua, 1498.

Hain 3124. Pellechet 2340. Proctor 5406. Brit. Mus. V, p. 522. Essling 138. Copinger, Incun. Biblica, 113. Census, p. 45.

The third edition with the beautiful famous woodcuts of the « Mallermi-Bible », first published 1490. Certainly one of the finest illustrated Bibles, ever printed and a remarkable sample of Venetian fifteenth century illustration.

A portion of the blank part of the first leaf gone and badly repaired, without affecting the text, first three leaves soiled, the right-hand-corners of the next five leaves slightly waterstained, one leaf in the text mended, the upper margin of one woodcut slightly shaved, otherwise a good copy of this finely illustrated book. — See reproductions below—

Hain-Copinger 3467. Hain 3481 (without having seen it). Proctor 7033.

Pellechet 2621. Census, pp. 51 and 231.

As Hain as Pellechet give a wrong collation, only corrected by Copinger, as a complete copy ought to have 184 leaves, of which a 1 and the last leaf are blank. Our copy wants only the first leaf bearing a very few words, the first blank leaf a 1 is substituted by another blank leaf.—A few slight stains, but very good copy. Rare.

14. CALDERINUS, Domitius. Commentarii in Martialem et in Ibin Ovidii. Roman letter. 50 lines. 162 (instead of 186) leaves. Folio. Modern vellum. Venice, Jacobus Rubeus, 1474. Frs. 75.—

Hain-Copinger 4237. Pellechet 3159. Proctor 4235. Reichl. App. I, p. 118. Brit. Mus. V, 213. Census, 4237, only one copy in America. One of the earliest books from this press.—Unfortunately 24 leaves wanting.

15. CATHARINA, S. da Siena, Epistole devotissime raccolte da Bartholommeo da Alzano. Roman letter, 40 lines, 422 leaves. With a magnificent full-page woodcut representing the Saint, and very fine large and small woodcut initials. Folio. Half calf. Venice, Aldo Manutio, 1500. Frs. 750 .-

Hain-Copinger 4688. Pellechet 3388. Proctor 5575. Gamba 298.

Essling 1230. Census p. 64.

This magnificently printed book with its splendid woodcut is certainly one of the finest works produced from this famous press.

The inner margins of three leaves carefully repaired, a slight stain on three first leaves of the preface, very small wormholes on the inner margins of a very few leaves repaired and strengthened. The few copies known from this rare work have usually extremely wide margins, our copy in very fresh state of conservation, has the margins wide 30 × 55 mm. - See reproduction plate I.

16. CENSORINUS. De Die Natali. Tabula Cebetis. Dialogus Luciani. Enchiridion Epicteti. Basilii de liberalibus studiis et ingenuis moribus. Plutarchus de invidia et odio. Roman letter. 40 lines. With much Greek type. 38 leaves. With printer's device on black ground on last leaf. Folio. Modern half calf. Bologna, Benedictus Hectoris (Faelli). 1497.

Hain-Copinger 4847. Proctor 6633. Pellechet 3471. The first dated edition, preceded by dedicatory letter from the editor, Phil. Beroaldus, to Bartholomaeus Blanchinus. Censorinus' De Die Natali is the most interesting of the writings contained in this book, and was written A. D. 238. The contents are of varied character: the Natural history of man, the influence of the stars and genii, music, religious rites, astronomy, chronological and mathematical questions, etc. Our copy is not in irreprochable state of preservation; the lower parts of many leaves, especially towards the end, have suffered by damp, but without affecting the text, a few leaves with short margins, but complete copy.

A very few leaves browned, but good, fresh copy.

18. CORNELIUS NEPOS. Vita illustrium vivorum. Roman letter. 44 lines, 26 leaves (first blank). With one large and many small woodcut initials on black ground. Folio. Modern vellum, Brescia, Jacobus Britannicus, 1498. Frs. 180.—

Hain-Copinger 5736. Proctor 7005. Pellechet 3986. Census p. 77

(only one copy in America). Voullième, Berlin 2830.

Two corners of the extremely wide margins of the last two leaves slightly torn, but a fine and very large copy (60 × 60) mm. of this beautifully printed work. Several interesting contemporary marginal annotations.

19. DIODORUS SICULUS. Bibliothecae historicae libri VI. (Translated into Latin by Poggius). Corneli Taciti Germania. Roman letter. 38 lines, 122 leaves. With pretty illuminated initial and large border in red, blue and gold, composed by flowers and ornaments on the first page, border somewhat discoloured. Folio. Modern vellum. Venice, Thomas de Blavis, de Alexandria, 1481. Frs. 200.—

Hain 6190. Cop. I, 191. Proctor 4754. B. M. V, 316. Pel. 4268. Census 84. Only two copies in America. Reichling I, 316 (quotes by mistake only 120 leaves).

Diodorus Siculus, a famous historian in the time of Cesar and Augustus, was the author of a «Bibliotheca historica» in 40 vols. The present work is singularly interesting on account of a chapter contained in the sixth book: «De britania insula e de quae dicitur basilea ubi electrum oritur». Besides the sixth book deals entirely with geography. The inner margins of the two leaves of the index badly repaired affecting

several letters, last leaf mounted and repaired not touching the text;

besides good copy.

20. DIOGENES CYNICUS. Epistolae e graeco in latinum traductae a Francisco Accolti Aretino.—BRUTUS (MARCUS) et HIP-POCRATES. Epistolae a Rinuccio Aretino in latinum traductae. Roman letter. 26 lines. 54 leaves. 4to. Vellum. Florence, Antonius di Francesco, 1487.

Hain-Copinger 6194. Pellechet 4272. Proctor. Supp. II, 6329a, p. 17. Voullième, Berlin 2966. Only two copies in America according to Cen-

sus, p. 84.

- This work is of great medical interest, on account of the Epistolae Hippocratis, contained on the last 18 leaves. Several contemporary marginal annotations. Fine copy of this rare medical incunabulum.
- 21. FESTUS, Sextus Pompeius. De lingua latina. Roman letter. 37 lines. 54 leaves. With very fine illuminated initial letter painted in gold on blue ground, the upper half of the left margin decorated by a charming illuminated border of flowers in colours and gold, arms on the lower part with the device «Vive tibi », surrounded by two graceful amoretti and another border of flowers. Folio. Modern vellum. (Parma, Printer of Hieronymus, Epistolae, 1480). Frs. 300.—

Proctor 6857. Voullième, Berlin, 3228. Hain 11903 describes by mistake in one number together three absolutely different works (Varro, de lingua latina, Festus, de lingua latina, Nonius Marcellus, de proprietate latini sermonis) which only have been printed at the same press. He is corrected by Proctor and Voullième who quote the three books separately and with three single numbers. All the books printed of this press which produced only very few works (Proctor mentions only five books from this press), are of highest rarity, the Festus being a very early work printed at Parma.

The upper inner margins of several leaves with large waterstain which touchs only occasionnally the text, otherwise a very good, large copy with fine illumination, of this very uncommon printing. See also





Very rare and beautiful early Brescia-print with many highly interesting Greek types. « At Brescia Boninus de Boninis in his Macrobius of 1483 and again in 1485 (our work) used a thoroughly Jensonian Greek of the late seventies», (Proctor). We can not trace any copy of this edition in the catalogues of the last ten years.—A few insignif. tiny wormholes through three leaves, a very few leaves slightly browned, but an excellent, large copy. Several contemporary marginal annotations.

EXTREMELY RARE INCUNABULUM OF SMALLEST SIZE.

23. GREGORIUS MAGNUS. Dialogi liber secundus de vita Santi Benedicti. Black letter. 20 lines. 52 (instead of 56) leaves. With all the five magnificent full-page woodcuts. Small 16mo (10,7 × 7,7cm.). Fine brown morocco binding, gilt inside dentelles, gilt corner, bound by of the Officina Bodoni, conserved in its box. Venice, Bernardinus Benalius, 1490.

Hain 7979. Burger, p. 342. Essling, I, 503. Unknown to Proctor, Copinger and the other bibliographers. No copy in the Brithis Museum or Bodleyan Library. No copy in America according to Census. Of utmost rarity. The only edition to be printed in the 15th century. The only copy which we founded in the catalogues of the last twenty years, is quoted in a catalogue of 1903, for Swiss Francs 750.—The importance of this book consists firstly in its size, as incunabula of this small-

ness belong to the really greatest rarities in the book trade. In the second place this little work is a precious gem for any collection of incunabula on account of its excellent woodcuts. The cuts, measuring 43×63 mm., are of best Venetian style, partly signed V P, and of considerable beauty and interest: 1. S. Benedict with four monks and the Pope with two cardinals; 2. S. Benedict reading and three shepherds in the background a monastery; 3. S. Benedict building the monastery of Montecassino; 4. S. Benedict expels a demon; 5. S. Benedict receiving a King with his cortage in the inside of a church.

Unfortunately four leaves of the quire G (containing only text, the woodcuts being complete) are wanting, otherwise absolutely complete. Only the first cut slightly coloured by a contemporary hand, the others entirely free of colour and in very fresh impressions. One leaf with a slight stain, but a clean and sound copy with wide margins.—See re-

Without first and last blank leaves. First leaf oil-stained, outer margins of many leaves with large but faint waterstains, otherwise very large copy of this typographically remarkable book. Contemporary marginal annotations.

25. HIERONYMUS. Epistolae. Roman letter. 62 lines. 398 leaves. Two parts. Stout folio. Boards. Venice, Joannes Rubeus Vercellensis, 7 January, 12 July 1496. Frs. 260.—

Hain 8563. Proctor 5141. Brit. Mus. V, p. 419. Census, p. 115. A few large but faint waterstains in the upper parts of first leaves, two blank portions of the last two stained leaves repaired, margin of title strenghtened, but good copy.

26. S. HIERONYMUS. Epistolae. Three parts. Roman letter. with quotations in Greek type. 52 lines. 152 leaves (140 and 152 blank), 178 leaves, (164 and 178 blank), 202 leaves (190 and 202 blank) = 532 leaves. Woodcut calligraphied title. With excellent full-page woodcut at the back of the title-page, by Albrecht Dürer, the earliest which Dürer is known to have designed, representing the Saint in his cell; at the end Kessler's printer's device. Folio. Old vellum. Basel, Nicolaus Kessler, 1497. Frs. 575.—

Hain-Copinger 8565. Proctor 7692. Brit. Mus. V, p. 772. Schreiber V, 4228. Dodgson, Early German and Flemish Woodcuts, I, p. 264.

Census, p. 164 (Only three copies in America).

This work is of high importance and greatest interest bearing the earliest woodcut which Dürer is known to have designed. «This rude woodcut, the earliest which Dürer is known to have designed, first appeared in the edition of St. Jerome's Epistles printed by Nicolaus Kessler at Basle in 1492.... It was used again in 1497.... Basiliensi». The first four words are an inaccurate transcript of the authentic autograph of Dürer, «Albrecht Dürer von normergk», which is still preserved on the back of the block» (Dodgson).



One of the most beautifully printed books produced in Venice, perfect with the two leaves of Errata in gothic letter, which are usually missing. Editio princeps and the only edition printed in the 15th cent. Sabellico's official chronicle of the Venetian Republic is an important historical source for the history of Venice and full of interesting details especially on the authors own period, which coincides with the climax of power and riches of the «Queen of the Adriatic».

This book is also interesting from different points of view:

I: It contains a mention of the introduction of printing into Italy. The reference is on 13 recto and runs as follows.... « Ad hanc e alias illius principatus foelicitates accessit quod Librorum imprimendorum ratio tum primum est in Italia reperta: Commentum ipsum Germani hominis creditur, sed quum tota Italia procedente tempore divini operis officinae constitutae sint, sitque aperta aemulatione inter opifices diligentia et ingenio certatum: NICOLAUS JENSON quem Veneta civitas sortita est omnes alios in eo genere laudis post se procul reliquit ».

II: Important as mentionning the name of COLUMBUS (Dec. 4, liber 3): «Ad haec negocia de more exierant triremes quatuor.... Sed cum hae Ibericum navigant oceanum, Columbus junior, Columbi piratae illustris, ut aiunt, nepos, cum septem navibus ad pugnam instructis circa Sacrum promontorium.... sub noctem factus est Veneto obvius ». Hain gives 194 leaves to this book, but his transcript of the incipit (on 9a, which is blank in this edition) shows that his copy was made up from one of Jac. Rubeus's edition 1476. Reprinted from Rubeus's 1476 edition, in which is already found the reference to Pasqualinus as commissioning the printing ». (British Museum). The edition of Venice, Pasqualinus, 1480, is quite thoroughly different to our copy. Of greatest rarity.



Of the large woodcuts we mention: The six days of Creation, the Nativity, with the monogram L., Solomon fallen asleep. In the Old Testament 90 very fine vignettes, in the New Testament 23 vignettes and the picture of S. Hieronymus.

Of particular beauty are the numerous very spirited and graceful cuts in the text $(7.2 \times 4.2 \text{ cm.})$, mostly surrounded by pretty borders. Containing such a rich number of woodcuts of the best fifteenth century style, this work may be considered a most representative example.







Guido Guidi (Vidius Vidus) was born in Florence. He enjoyed the esteem and friendship of the famous Florentine goldsmith Benvenuto Cellini with whom he lived in Paris. « The woodcuts in this work show excellent workmanship and are very numerous. They may probably be attributed to Jollat who was working in Paris from 1502 to 1550 ». Many of these illustrations are extremely interesting and curious reminding one far more of the rack and the torture chamber than of

the implements of healing.

This work has a greatly increased interest due to its association with the famous Benvenuto Cellini. In his account of his life, Cellini remarks:

« Far back in my autobiography I ought to have recorded the friendship which I won with the most cultivated, the most affectionate, and the most companionable man of worth I ever knew in this world. He was Messer Guido Guidi, an able physician and doctor of medicine, and a Nobleman of Florence. We enjoyed our mutual friendship during all the years I stayed in Paris, and often did we exult together on being able to advance in art and knowledge at the cost of that so great and admirable prince, our patron, each in his own branch of industry.... » (life of Benvenuto Cellini, translated by A. Symonds).

It was anthology which created the new botany of the 18th century and the 19th; and the beginnings of the modern anthology are with Tragus » (Greene, p. 220 f.).

Many of the cuts, perhaps all, were executed by David Kandel. The woodcuts of trees in the third part are particularly remarkable and are often rendered interesting by the introduction of charming figures of men

Leonhart Fuchs, a Bavarian physician (1501-66), graduated at Ingolstadt in 1524 and held after many vicissitudes (he was also an adherent of Luther) the chair of medicine at Tubingen for thirty-one years, where he occupied his leisure in having artists figure plants which he afterwards described. His «De historia stirpium» created such an interest that it was followed, in 1544, by a new edition, and, after 1545, by many small-sized popular reprints. This was a very utilitarian work of an excellent practitioner who wished to improve the actual knowledge of the materia medica over and above advancing the science of botany. Grew, 1641-1712, was probably the first to consider the existence of sex in plants. He was probably inspired in his works on vegetable histology and physiology by Hooke's Micrographia (London, 1665). Haller called him «An industrious observer of nature in every direction».

This edition contains apart from the «Anatomy of flowers», the three following works: «The anatomy of vegetables, an idea of phytological history, the comparative anatomy of trunks». Very good, tall copy

of this rare book.

The woodcuts, being still crude, are nevertheless of a certain artistic and historical value as the earliest attempts to design plants. Copies of this rare work are unvariably uncomplete and in bad state, as they mainly have been used in their time. Guéroult. «Wheter its authorship can be traced to Aemilius Macer, whose herb-ore is mentionned by Ovid, or whether it is the product of Salernitan enterprise, its immense popularity from at least the tenth century on almost to our own times is attested by numerous reproductions in manuscript and print ».—There are some waterstains in places, several leaves browned with a few short margins, a few ancient annotions, but on the whole a very good copy of this very rare booklet.

Extremely rare edition of a chief work on alchemy of the founder of this science, the famous Geber (702-65?). Only one 15th century edition known. All printed editions of this work are uncommon and those

of the 16th century are exceedingly rare.

The places and dates of Geber's birth and death are uncertain as are likewise all particulars of his life. He was the discoverer of nitric acid and aqua regia and the describer of distillation, filtration, sublimation, wather, baths and other essentials of chemical procedure. The purpose of Geber's teachings was to demostrate the method of making the philosopher's stone; and this is described with such clearness and distinctness, that we are enabled to understand the substances, he employed, the processes which he followed, etc. His theory was that all the metals are compounds of mercury and sulphur, and believed, that all metals could be trasmuted into gold or silver by altering the

proportions of their constituents, mercury and sulphur. At the end after the colophon (Venice, Schoeffer, 1542), another one showing the printer's device and mentioning the name of J. Bapt. Pe-

derzanus, 1542. Wormhole through the lower right-hand-corners of 14 leaves at the beginning affecting hardly the text, slight wormhole through the last seven leaves, margins of first and last leaves waterstained, otherwise a well preserved copy.

This work gives us the really first estensive description of the natural history and the life of the natives in Brazil. Of greatest interest is the first part, De medicina brasiliensi, divided in I: De aere, aquis et locis, II: De morbis endemiis, III: De venenatis et antidotis, IV: De facultatibus simplicium. Piso, in this work, was the first to describe yaws (bubas), diseases of the indigenous and exotic remedies. Many American remedies are depicted and described for the first time by him, and especially remarkable are the illustrations accompanying the text. Of the single chapters we mention: « De oculorum vitiis, de obstructionibus viscerum naturalium, de morbis mulieribus et infantibus, de lue venerea », etc. The second part « Historia rerum naturalium Brasiliae » by G. Marcgrav de Liebstadt, is divided as follows: 1-8 plants, fishes, biros, quadrupeds and snakes, insects, country and inhabitants, illustrated by hundreds of most instructive woodcuts. Of ethnological interest are the many pictures of men, women, and children and their habits and customs. At the end a chapter on Chile by De Laet, containing a Chilian vocabularium.

A few wormholes through the inner margins of some leaves in the middle and the end of the book, without touching anywhere the text, a few leaves with insignifiant dampstains, the binding in bad condition, but a

splendid copy with extremely wide margins (75 \times 60 mm.).

Three very rare and highly interesting works of Lullus bound together. Lullus (1235-1315), a native of Majorca, was the prominent «early representative of the Arabist teachings of Montpellier. Having entered the order of the Minorites, he learned Arabic through his desire to convert the Moslems of North-Africa and, in this way, became acquainted its Arabian chemistry and brought some of its ideas into Europe. He sought, in addition to the philosopher's stone the aurum potabile or liquid gold, as a sovereign elixir against diseases » (Garrison). Besides of his alchemistical works, Lullus is well know on account of his knowledge in occultism and cabbalism, with which the three present works are dealing very extensively. Caillet mentions of the three works only two, without knowing the Articuli fidei. Editions of Lullus' works of the 16th century, especially several together, are very rarely to be found. We have found in the occultistic catalogues of the last ten years only one other copy of the three books together which was incomplete. Our copy is absolutely complete, wanting only a part from a (mounted) folding plate in the first book. Old owner's name on title. Very fine, spotless copy.

Guilmard p. 365, nr. 29 mentions as unique edition an edition of three parts, dated in the first part 1601, in the second and third 1631. The only two samples we can find in catalogues from before the war, are dated first part 1601, second and third 1631 and consist, the first part being of the same number of pages as our copy, in the second and third part of together 95 leaves, while our copy, printed thirty years earlier, contains in the second book only one part, but which consists of 114 leaves, including two blank, consequently we have 19 leaves more than the later edition. Besides the 1631 editions are printed by two different printers (Halb-mayer and Pfann), while the second part of our copy bears the colophon: « Gedruckt zu Nürmberg durch den Authorem selbsten, anno 1601, (printed by the author himself at Nuremberg, 1601).

In this way we have certainly an unknown and undescribed edition of this precious calligraphic book, finished by the author himself and with more leaves and illustrations than the later editions have.

A part of the double-page folding plate in the first part gone, a few leaves with insignifiant brownstains, but a fine, complete copy with the cuts and engravings in very fresh impressions.—See reproduction plate IV.

The borders, all drawed in a manner of pen writing and in a very pretty calligraphic style, are composed by men, very curious animals of every kind, graceful amoretti, etc. -The lower margins of some leaves stained and slightly soiled in places, but a very good copy with wide margins, what is rare, the calligra-phy—works of this time being usually with short margins. 



An early—and what is a great rarity—a complete edition of this famous work. «The publication of Ramusio's raccolta may be said to open an era in the literary history of voyages and navigation. Instead of accounts carelessly copied etc. we find in this valuable work original narrations judiciously selected, carefully printed, etc. ». Ramusio was born at Trevise, in 1485 and died at Padova in 1557.

The third volume contains the most important relations on America by Petrus Martyr, Oviedo, Fernando Cortez, Alvarado, Francesco d'Ulloa, Mendozza, Pizzarro, Carthier and others. « Only the two capital relations (of Carthier and Cortez) would entitle the Raccolta to a prominent place in any American Library ». The maps and cuts represent e.g.: Universale della parte del mondo nuovamente ritrovata (general map of the New World), la terra de Hochelaga nella Nova Francia, Taprobana, Brazil, La nuova Francia, Cuscho, città principale del Perù, Temistitam, città di Mexico, American plants and animals, etc.

This work is unvariably uncomplete and in bad state, having been used much in its time. Our complete copy has the following imperfectnesses: « First four leaves of the first vol. mounted, the first map in the same vol. mounted and repaired, partly affected by wormholes. Leaf 377 damaged with loss of a few words, margin of fols. 369 and 284 strenghtened, leaves 297-98 slightly worm-eaten in places with loss of a few letters, some leaves browned, otherwise a good copy, especially on account of the excessively good condition of the Maps of American interest in

the third vol.

First edition. Moufet, English physician of singular learning, bought the unfinished manuscripts of Sir Edward Wooton, Conrad Gesner and others on insects, which afterwards came into the possession of

Dr. Thomas Penny, an eminent physician and botanist in the reigne of Queen Elizabeth. Moufet purchased this manuscript at a considerable price and arranged, enlarged and completed the work with great labor and expense. After the death of Moufet it fell into the hands of Theodor Mayerne who gave it to the world in 1634.

All copies of this important entomological work are very scarce. The inner margins of first and last leaves with slight waterstains, but very fine

and sound copy.

This work is probably the rarest of all Italian poems, and may be regarded as the most interesting autobiography of this poet, who gives therein details of his various travels and condensed his vast knowledge of geography, natural sciences, ethnography, etc. This poem, from internal evidence, is supposed to have been written about the year 1350, and contains a description of the British Empire in which will be found mentioned a most remarkable fact that Ireland was then already famous for woollen manufactures.—Title and last leaves with some stains, inner margin of one leaf repaired, inner margins of several leaves slightly foxed, but good copy.

First edition of one of Father' Kircher' most important works, containing descriptions of a great number of ingenious inventions. On account of the multiplitude of the described material, we mention only: Photosophia sive de lucidis mundi corporibus, actinobolismus sympathicus et anthipaticus rerum medicinalium, de occuli structura et visione, magia lucis et umbrae, ut columba per aerem volitans horas demonstrat, magia catoptrica, cryptologia nova, etc. etc. Besides we quote the very large section on Dialling (about 200 pp.), one of the most extensive contemporary accounts. Kircher, in this work, is the first to mention fluorescence, and physiological colours. Of singular interest are the two following chapters: « In aere draconem volantem aliaque portentosa simulacra rerum exhibere Fabrica machinae volatilis». They contain an early and interesting allusion to aeronautics with a very curious figure representing a flying lizard.

Somewhat browned as usual, but very good, complete copy with the plate: « Horoscopium Catholicum Soc. Jesu », which wants very often.

This manuscript contains the pars aestivalis of the Breviarium diocese Mainz. The latter results from the calendarium which leads special feasts for the Saints Adelarius and Obanus and Severus (Saints, who are celebrated especially at Mainz). After the Breviarium which ends of leaf 155 verso, follows a calendarium to which is added the Latin Cisioianus.

Only two leaves wanting (one in the Officium of the 19th sunday after Whitsuntide, the other in the Officium of the Ascension-day):

For the first time there are compiled in this collection the most important works referring to occult philosophy, medicine and also alchemy. Caillet says about Jamblicus: «Précieux documents sur l'hermétisme et le magisme qui fleurissaient chez les grands peuples de l'antiquité et en particulier chez les Orientaux ». From the Hermes or Mercurius Trismegistos, Pimander sive de potestate et sapientia dei, ascribed to the famous patron of all alchemists « Hermes Trismegistos », originated the so called Hermetic philosophy. Besides we mention the "Aurea verba" of Pythagoras and Ficinus' De triplici vita libri tres (De vita sana, vita longa, de vita coelitus comparanda). The first of these three books deals with the standard of life of learned man; the second with prolongation of life; in the third he teaches mystical, astral medicine. Contains chapters on headaches, diseases of the sto-mach, circulation of the blood, dietetics, etc., besides astronomical and philosophical chapters.

The upper margins of the first eight and last ten leaves dampstained,

but good copy.

The present edition contains the following works: « Vita Pici, Heptaplus de opere sex dierum geneoseos, deprecatoria ad deum, apologia tredecim quaestionum, oratio elegantissima, epistolae plures, testimonia vitae Pici, Disputationum adversus astrologos libri duodecim (one of the author's most important and interesting works), etc. The Epistulae contain letters from Hermolaus Barbarus, Baptista Mantuanus, Philippus Beroaldus, Marsilius Ficinus.—Several leaves stained and with traces of use, small blank portion of first leaf gone not touching the text, last leaf repaired, a few leaves with short upper margins.
