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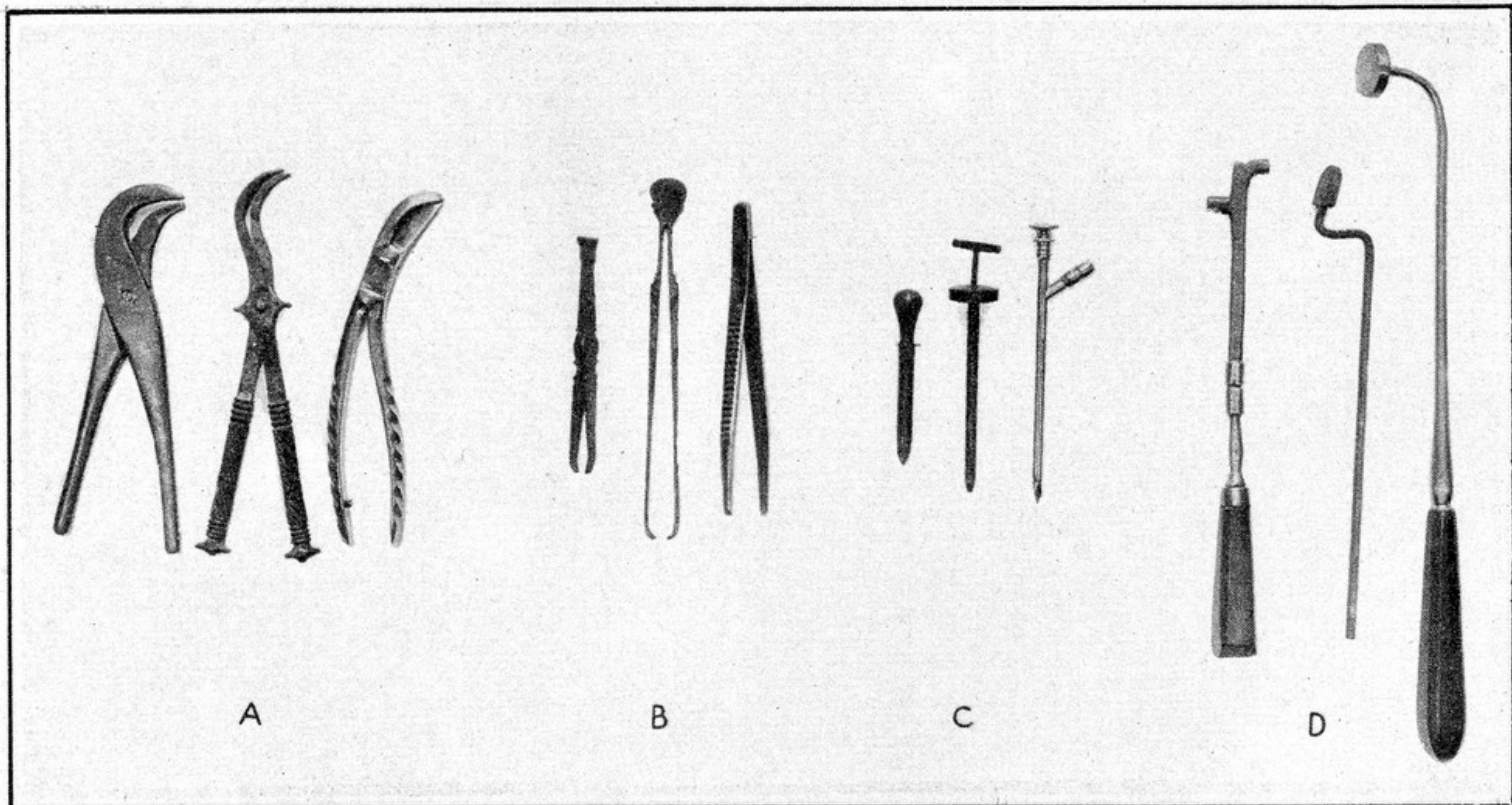

A are bone forceps ; *B* are long-toothed forceps ; *C* are trocars ; and *D* are cauteries. The Roman specimens were found during recent excavations in Pompeii.

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
