

M0005151: Dr Edmund King: an account of the second trial of transfusion upon man, December 1667

we repeated the experiment of infusing blood into a humane vein, according to thefull method; and though we met with more trouble in the operation, & want of the great vessel about us; yet it was done with good success, as we could expect, (as to what belonged to us to do). ~~first~~ first we took from the veins of the man a small quantity of blood in a Lorringer, & were guess about 3ij fls. Then we let in the arteriall blood of a sheep, into the man's veins, which did run ~~in~~ with a nimble stream, which did continue; only when the sheep struggled, the ~~quantity~~ would spew out ^{some time} from the recipient Pipe, which might suffice & we could, and did profoulty put it on again & sticke a pulse in the man's arm beyond the pipe in the vein; but the pipe ^{in the arterie} was fixt all the while now did the arteriall blood ever stop running, unless I held it on purpose by the throat: now did the blood congeale in either of the pipes from first to last, so that ^{considering the man} have good sooner to believe the man received 14. ounces of blood from the sheep And when the Gentleman that offered the sum (soon the first running of arteriall blood) brought word y. morn ^{were} about ~~was~~ gone, was withdraw a ringing pipe which ran ~~and~~ freely ~~the~~ after it was taken out of the recipient

we have contrived of pipes so as to rigour you easily, quickly and safly into as small a vessel as we have had occasion yet to use them ⁱⁿ ~~back~~
