It is easie enough to explain the action of these Remedies, fince being all fubtle and penetrating, they open the Ductus's of the Glands, and make way for the evacuation of the superfluous Serosity. I shall add to all this an observation which was communicated to me by Monfieur Pafferat, very famous in Phylick and Chyrurgery, concerning a young Lord betwixt eleven and twelve years of Age, to whom it often happen'd in the beginning of the Spring and Fall, that the Glands of the Paffage swell'd fo much that the Parts touch'd, and that it was impossible to get any thing in : at the beginning there was put into the Ear Oyl of freet Almonds to appeale the Pain, afterward Ule was made of a Decoction of Barley and of Agrimony, which is deterfive and deficcative, and by this means the Ear, after having caft forth, during three or four Months, a fort of purulent moisture, return'd to its natural state.

I come now to the Diseases of the film of the Drum, which are the Relaxation, the too great Tension, the Hardness, and the Rupture. The Relaxation comes from a superfluous moisture which imbues this Membrane, this Symptom usually accompanies that Obstruction of. the Passage which is produced by the swelling of the Glands, whereof it has been spoken before; and it contributes much to the hardness of the Hearing of Persons subject to catarrhous Fluxions; it's for the same reason that South Winds, Miss, and rainy Seasons diminish the Hearing, as we find by daily Experience.
