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EXPERIMENTS ON THE NATURE OF PERMUTATION. (V)
Experiments with milk in little glass tubes.
2. Milk was drawn from the cow after the dairymaid's hands and the cow's
teat had been washed, into the large end of two glass tubes connected
by a piece of rubber tubing, which was compressed. Experiment per-
formed in the open air in a distilling apparatus. Twelve test tubes were
filled from this glass tube by relieved pressure on rubber tube.
Result.
Contents of two tubes remained quite fresh, perfectly fluid and
sweet. In organisms discoverable under microscope.
Remainder in all portions fresh, but all contained organisms.
