THEY KNOW THE SHAPE AND LOCATION OF THE PRINCIPAL ORGANS AND MANY TRIBES POSSESS A FAIRLY EXTENSIVE VOCABULARY OF ANATOMICAL TERMS.

THE COMPLETE SKELETON IS FAMILIAR TO PEOPLES WHO PRACTISE THE "DRY FUNERAL" OR "SECOND BURIAL" OF THE BONES AFTER NATURAL OR INDUCED DISINTEGRATION OF THE SOFT PARTS.
