TREPHINED SKULL OF A NATIVE OF NEW IRELAND
The man suffered from intense headaches with local tenderness and was successfully trepanned eight times in the region of the parietal bone. In New-Ireland trepanning was performed not only in cases of epilepsy but also as a cure for headache, epilepsy and other forms of insanity.



TREPHINED SKULL OF A MAN OF THE LUCMANI TRIBE, UGANDA
The man died in 1925 after a severe surgical fever had been put under control on the same night.



TREPHINED SKULLS OF NATIVES OF NEW IRELAND
In 1898 a native of New-Ireland who had been trepanned eight times was trepanned again. The operation was performed for relief of epilepsy. The patient died of a severe surgical fever on the same night.
