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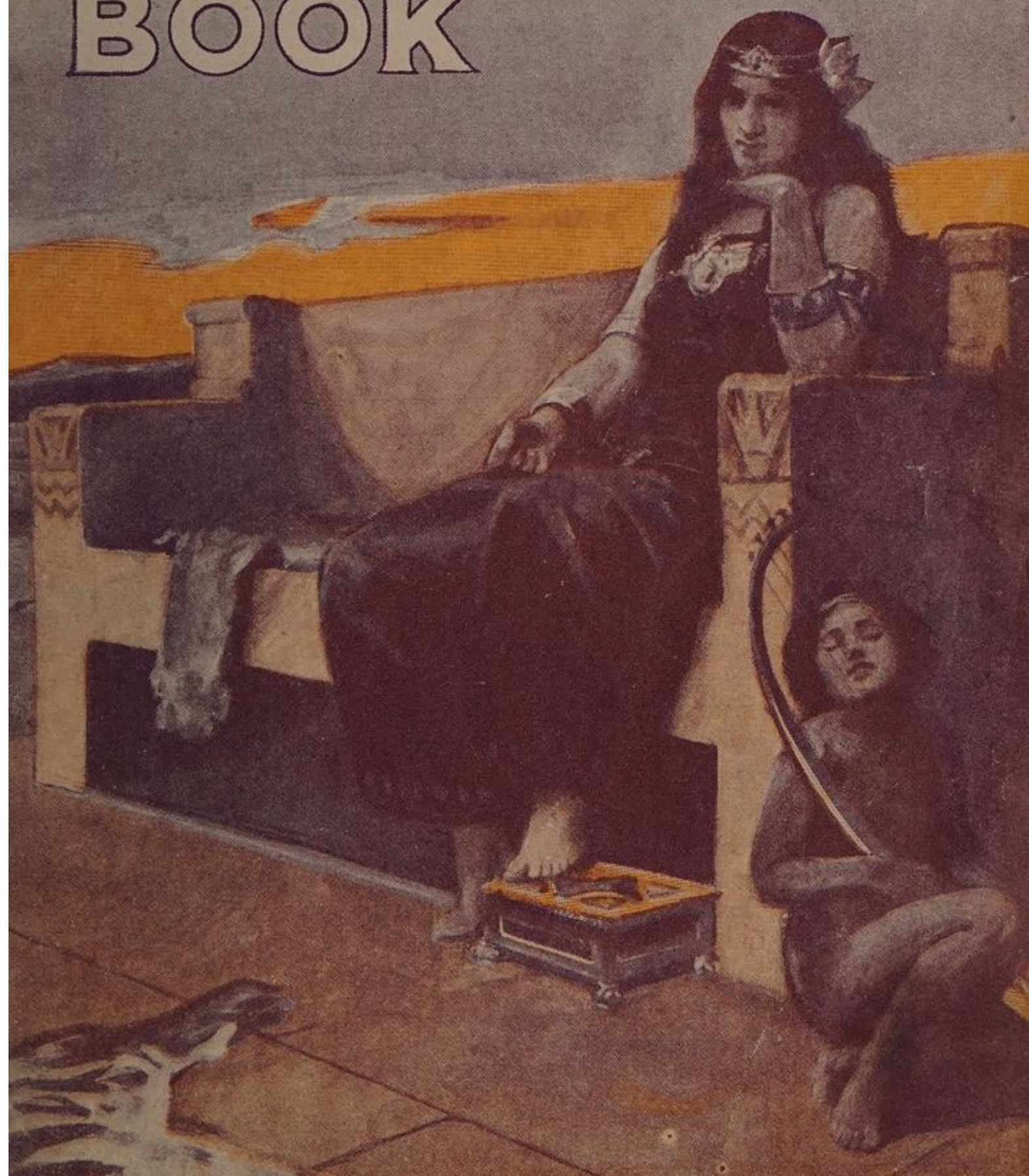
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DOAN'S DREAM BOOK





REAMLAND, the delight and fear of our childhood days, never entirely loses its sway. What man or woman has not, at some time or another, awakened with a start, vividly impressed by a visit to dreamland's realms?

In the very earliest days the ancients attached the greatest importance to dreams; wise men were appointed to the courts of kings and emperors to interpret them, and frequently the entire lives of men would be governed by these interpretations. The belief in the dream message was particularly rife in the great land of Egypt, and from the traditions of that historic country the present book has been compiled.

For ourselves, we do not profess to understand dreams, they are weird and mysterious, and reach too far into the unknown for science to deal with them. Claim has been frequently made that dreams have conveyed definite messages, but it seems certain that in many other instances they can have had no meaning at all. Perhaps some day the whole matter may be satisfactorily solved, but in the meantime, when asked to explain a dream, we usually do so in a practical manner by referring to "too heavy meals" or to "indigestible food." Whatever the truth may be, the fact remains that many do believe in dreams, and such people are as capable as ourselves of forming an opinion on the subject.

This book was first published in 1904, with no thought of reprinting it. Since that year, the compilers have received *many thousands of requests for copies* from all parts of the world, and it is felt that such a wide demand fully justifies this new edition of Doan's ever-popular Dream Book.

Arms. To dream they are cut off, sickness. To dream they are hairy and strong means good fortune and health.

Army. If victorious, good fortune; if defeated, calamities.

Ashes. Jealousy, misfortune, mourning.

Auction. Denotes obstacles in love and business. If you buy you will lose, if not you will succeed.

Awaking. To dream of waking up foretells a happy end to all sorrow.

Babe. To dream you have one is good; to nurse it, wealth and happiness.

Back. To dream you see your back denotes a fortune.

Bacon. Disappointment, or death of friends.

Baking. To a farmer's wife, good crops.

Ball. To play or see it played, you will receive some money.

Balloon. You are visionary, and cannot succeed.

Bank. A sign of deceit; be watchful.

Banquet. A warning against extravagance, pleasures.

Barn. If well stored, to single folk a rich and happy marriage.

Barrels. If full, prosperity; if empty, poverty.

Basin. If full, money; if empty, debts.

Basket. To a man means decay of business; to a maid, many lovers; to a widow, she will marry again.

Bath. If clean water, health; if muddy, sickness. To see people bathing, good luck and change of residence.

Bats. If black, an unsatisfactory journey; if white, happiness.

Battle. To engage in one, disasters, false lovers, quarrels.

Beam. You will become famous.

Beans. To eat, disputes; to pick, losses.

Bear. To see one, you have enemies; if it attacks you, you will conquer them.

Beard. To a man, to wear a long beard, he will thrive; a white beard, long life; a black one, trouble; a red one, disgrace. For a married woman, distress; single, she will marry.

Crown. To wear a gold or silver crown, success, honour, health.

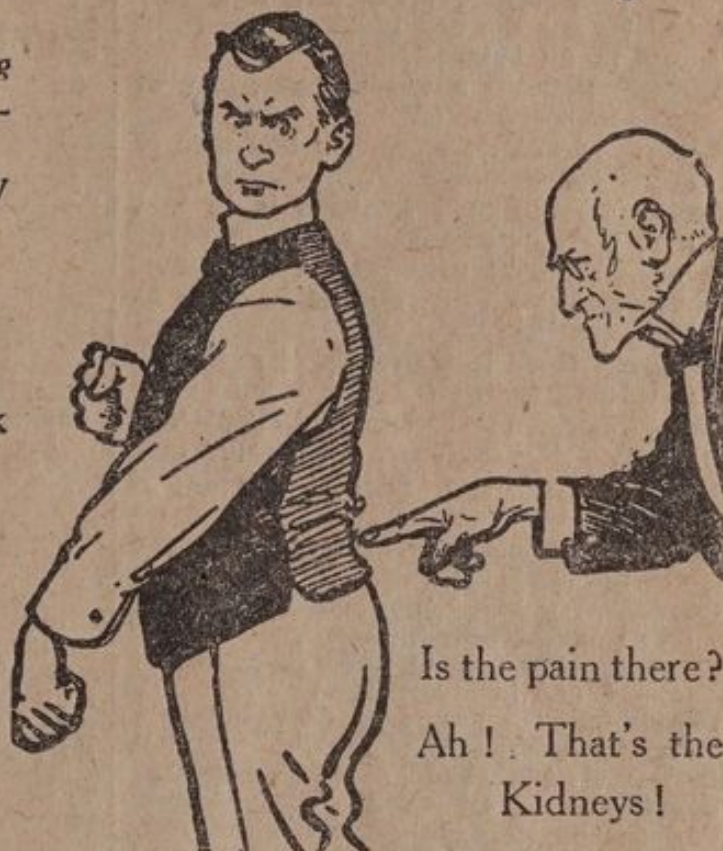
Crutches. To see them, infirmities; to break them, recovery.

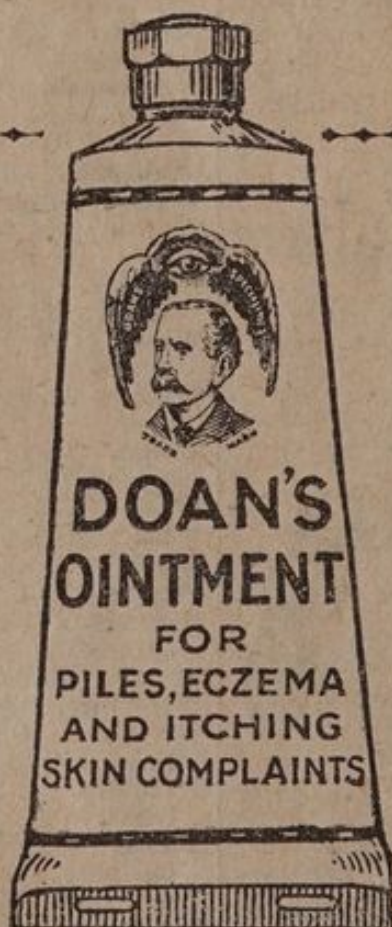
