POSTAL INFORMATION.—Inland Rates.

LETTERS:—Not exceeding 4oz. in weight, 1d.; and for every additional 2oz. $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

A letter posted unpaid is chargeable on delivery with double postage; and a letter posted insufficiently prepaid is chargeable with double the deficiency.

No letter may exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in width or depth.

POST CARDS:—There is no legal way of sending a written letter through the post for a postage of a halfpenny, except by means of a Post Card. They may not exceed $5\frac{1}{2}$ by $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches in size, or be less than $3\frac{1}{4}$ by $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches.

HALFPENNY PACKETS:—For a weight not exceeding 2 oz., $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

A Halfpenny Packet posted unpaid is charged on delivery with double postage.

No Halfpenny Packet may exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in width or depth.

Samples of goods, patterns of cloth, &c., cannot be sent at the halfpenny rate.

Packets exceeding 2oz. in weight pass as letters.

NEWSPAPERS:—For each Newspaper, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

No packet of Newspapers may exceed 5lb in weight, 2 feet in length, or 1 foot in width or depth.

A Newspaper must be so folded as to admit the title being readily seen, and may not contain any enclosure (except Supplements).

PARCELS:—Parcels not exceeding 1 lb in weight, 3d.; 1 lb to 2 lb, 4d.; 2 lb to 3 lb, 5d.; 3 lb to 5 lb, 6d.; 5 lb to 7 lb, 7d.; and 1d. per lb up to 11 lb.

No parcel can be sent exceeding 11 lb in weight.

The dimensions allowed for an Inland Postal Parcel are:—Greatest length, 3 ft. 6 in.; Greatest length and girth combined, 6 ft.

Every parcel must be presented at the counter of a Post Office for transmission as a parcel. It must on no account be deposited in a letter box.

REGISTRATION:—Fee for all classes of postal packets, 2d. (parcels included).

This fee, which, as well as the postage, must be prepaid, secures compensation in the event of loss or damage up to £5. Additional compensation up to a maximum of £120 can be obtained by paying higher fees, according to scale.

The person who sends one of these Orders must fill in the name of the person to whom it is sent, and, if he so wishes, he can also fill in the name of any particular Money Order Office, and the Order will be cashed at that office and no other. The insertion of the name of the paying office affords a safeguard against payment being made to a wrong person. No Postal Order will be paid, even though presented for payment by a Banker, unless the name of the payee be inserted in the body of the Order.

MONEY ORDERS:—At every Money Order Office Money Orders can be obtained between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. The commission for these Orders is:—

INLAND TELEGRAMS:—The charge is 6d. for the first 12 words, and $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for each additional word. Addresses are charged for.

The amount covers the cost of delivery at any address within three miles of the terminal office; and if that office is a Head Post Office the message is delivered free within the limits of the town postal delivery when such delivery extends beyond three miles. Telegrams are delivered free at all times within the Metropolitan Postal District.

LICENSES:—Dog and Gun Licenses can be obtained through all Money Order Offices in England and Scotland, as follows:—Dogs, 7s. 6d.; Guns, 10s.

Gun Licenses are also issued at certain Money Order Offices in districts in Ireland in which there is a demand for them.

Walking round the circle of boxes at the rate of 20 miles per day, a seven days' tramp would bring you to your starting point. Round the circle of pills, at the same speed, you would walk for nine weeks of six days each before your journey of 1,073 miles would be completed, and in this time you would have to pass the inconceivable number of 340,000,000 pills.

HINTS ON WILLS.

A will should be always written in ink. The testator must sign in the actual presence of two witnesses, at least. If more than one sheet of paper is required the testator and witnesses should sign each sheet. Witnesses cannot benefit under the will they sign. Witnesses should be told that they are witnessing a will. A will should contain a clause appointing one or more persons to act as executors. A will is revoked by the execution of a later one, by a codicil, by marriage of the testator, and by intentional destruction of a will by the testator. A solicitor should be employed to draft any will but such as is of the most simple description. The following may serve as a model for simple ordinary wills:—

FORM OF WILL.

This is the last will of me, John Jackson, of number one, High Street, Dorking, in the County of Surrey, draper. I give and devise the whole of my estate and effects, real and personal, of which I may be possessed and to which I may be entitled at my death unto.....absolutely, and I appoint.....executors to this my last will, and I hereby revoke all former wills and codicils.

Dated this first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and seven.

JOHN JACKSON.

Signed by the said John Jackson in the presence of us, present at the same time who thereupon signed our names hereto in his presence and in the presence of each other.

The Teeth.

DECAY.—Strange as it may seem the cause of the decay of the teeth was unknown till a few years ago. It is due entirely to the presence of lactic acid. Where does this come from? Is there a way to avoid it?

GERMS.—These are in the mouth, they cannot be eliminated, and will always be there.

They are probably useful in some way unknown; it may never be known.

REMEDY.—Keep the teeth clean.

DENTIFRICE.—The use of a good dentifrice is necessary to properly clean the teeth. Twice a day is often enough.

WHAT DENTIFRICE.—Whatever will clean the teeth and do no harm? Some pastes and powders contain acids or grit which destroy the enamel of the teeth.

Chalk is required as the polishing part, soap and water the washing part, an anti-septic to destroy the germs, an alkali to neutralise the acids of the mouth, glycerine to cut the tartar, a little flavour to make the duty agreeable.

IN THE CAUSE OF HEALTH.

General Rules.

THE DWELLING-HOUSE must be perfectly dry. Get rid of any source of dampness. Let in plenty of sunlight.

THE AIR must be kept fresh. Secure this by liberal ventilation. Sleep with top of bedroom window open where practicable. Ventilate often and thoroughly when large fires and gas are burning, or if several persons are gathered in one apartment.

THE DRAINAGE must never be allowed to get out of order without immediate attention. Flush with disinfectants frequently. Keep cisterns clean. Never allow rubbish to accumulate. Keep dust out of corners of rooms and cupboards.

Never re-paper a wall without stripping the old paper.

FOOD must be of good quality. Have fixed times for three daily meals, and do not eat between them. Eat slowly and masticate thoroughly.

DRINK.—Pure water is for all purposes absolutely the best drink possible. If alcohol be taken, use it sparingly and largely diluted. Good milk is, of course, invaluable.

THE CLOTHING must be warm and sufficient, but not heavy. Wear flannel garments next the skin. Always change boots and clothes when they get wet.

EXERCISE should be taken regularly, especially by those leading a sedentary life. Walking, swimming, tennis, cycling, etc., are all splendid aids to good health. Never overdo any physical exercise.

SLEEP.—From seven to nine hours sleep at night is a fair allowance; but much in this matter depends on constitution and the state of the health. The mind should be quite calm when bedtime arrives; cease to think or work on important matters in the evening. Take only the lightest of suppers, if any. A glass of hot milk is the best refreshment to close the day with.

Home Treatment of Simple Accidents and Injuries.

CUTS AND WOUNDS.—First stop or greatly check the bleeding by the application of cold water, alum, lifting the limb, pressure on the part, or on the artery leading thereto. See that the wound is thoroughly clean, and bind with clean, soft rag. Do not apply tobacco, cobwebs, etc., or blood-poisoning may ensue.

BRUISES.—Apply cold water. When the pain is relieved use frequently a lotion of 2oz. spirits of wine to 12oz. water.

BURNS AND SCALDS.—Paint with a mixture of one part castor oil to one part collodion, or apply a layer of cotton wool and loose bandage, or sprinkle the burn with starch or flour.

STINGS.—First remove the sting, then apply soda or ammonia to neutralise the poison left by the insect.

FAINTING.—Bend the head forward toward the toes. Give brandy or any stimulant.

FITS.—Never give any stimulants. In **EPILEPSY** hold or watch the patient until recovery. Then give 20 grains of potassium bromide at once, and thereafter three times daily for some time. In **APOPLEXY** the

treatment must be *immediate*, or death may result in a few minutes. Place the patient on his back, raise the head, loosen the clothes about the neck, apply warm mustard poultices to the feet and legs, and cold water with vinegar, or better still, ice-bags, to the head. Mix eight grains of calomel with two drops of castor oil, and put it far back on the tongue. Call the doctor.

CHOKING.—Try an emetic—a tablespoonful of salt in hot water. Hold a child up by the heels.

THE EYE.—To remove grit or foreign bodies from the eye pass a small camel-hair brush under the lid. Syringe the eye with luke-warm water or use an eye-cup. Never poultice the eye.

SPRAINS.—If slight apply arnica, lead lotion, or spirit lotion. If severe, hot fomentations and complete rest.

ANTIDOTES FOR POISONS.—The first object should be to get rid of the poison by an emetic, except when it is seen that the lips and mouth are stained or burned.

The emetic may be a dessert spoonful of mustard in a tumblerful of lukewarm water, or a table-spoonful of salt in a tumblerful of lukewarm water; for a young child a tea-spoonful of ipecacuanha wine, repeated twice at intervals of 15 minutes, may be given instead. The finger or a feather passed to the back of the throat and moved about may serve to unload the stomach.

When there are stains about the mouth give copious draughts of milk, or several spoonfuls of olive, salad, or linseed oil. Oil is not to be given when phosphorus is the cause of poisoning.

TEA.—Strong tea (a handful thrown into the kettle and boiled) acts as a neutralizer of many poisons and is always safe.

The doctor should be invariably sent for.

LEAD POISONING.—Lead-workers in Potteries, lead works, lead mines, &c., should take at frequent intervals a table-spoonful of sulphate of magnesia three times during the day, with a large dose of Beecham's Pills at night, for a day or two; this will eliminate noxious accumulations and lead poisoning will be prevented.

IMPORTANT FACTS.—When a person has swallowed a poison, and threatens to go to sleep, keep him awake.

When he seems going off into a fit, dash cold water on his head, face and neck.

When there are no stains about the mouth give an emetic, also milk, oils (except in phosphorus poisoning), and end up with strong tea.

When there are stains about the mouth, give milk and oils but no emetic.

In all cases any vomited matter and food, or other substance suspected of being the poison, should be preserved.

CAUTION IN VISITING THE SICK.

—Do not visit the sick when you are fatigued, or when in a state of perspiration, or with the stomach empty, for in such conditions you are liable to take the infection. When the disease is very contagious, place yourself at the side of the patient which is nearest the window. Do not enter the room the first thing in the morning before it has been aired; and when you come away, take some food, change your clothing immediately, and expose the latter to the air for some days. Tobacco smoke is a preventive of malaria.

THE WASTE OF DAYLIGHT.

NEW AND IMPORTANT MOVEMENT.

A Bill has been introduced into Parliament which should command the warm support of the people, without distinction of class or party. Its object is to secure by legal enactment more much needed leisure for everybody. This is to be effected by using some of those valuable hours of sunlight in Spring, Summer and Autumn, which are now so unwisely disregarded and thrown away. The additional leisure is to be gained for the nation by a very simple process, without any increase in the hours of work. The scheme has been evolved by Mr. William Willett, F.R.A.S., and is in a line with those inestimable reforms initiated by Sir John Lubbock (Lord Avebury), and the pioneers of the Early Closing movement.

Mr. Willett's proposals have received the unqualified approval of many of the most influential names in every department of work, and in order that these advantages may be more widely understood and appreciated by the million, they are now, in an abridged form, placed before the hundreds of thousands who read **Beecham's Family Almanack**. To this end we cannot do better than give some extracts from a pamphlet written by Mr. Willett in which his ideas are lucidly set forth:—

"Everyone appreciates the long light evenings.

"Now, if some of the hours of wasted sunlight in Spring, Summer, and Autumn could be withdrawn from the beginning and added to the end of the day, how many advantages would be gained by all.....after the duties of the day have been discharged!

"By a simple expedient these advantages can be secured if we will reduce the length of four Sundays by twenty minutes—a loss of which practically no one would be conscious—we shall have eighty minutes more daylight after six p.m. every day during May, June, July, and August, and an average of forty-five minutes more every day during April and September.

"I therefore venture to propose that at 2 a.m. on each of four Sundays in April, STANDARD TIME shall *advance* twenty minutes; and on each of four Sundays in September, shall *recede* twenty minutes; or in other words that for eight Sundays of twenty-four hours each, we shall substitute four Sundays, each twenty minutes *less* than twenty-four hours, and four Sundays, each twenty minutes *more* than twenty-four hours. This is the whole cost of the scheme. We lose nothing and gain substantially. Having made up our minds to be satisfied on four occasions, with a Sunday of twenty-four hours and forty minutes, the advantages aimed at follow automatically, without any trouble whatever; everything will go on just as it does now, except that as the later hours of the day come round, they will bring more light with them.

"If my proposal be adopted, the man who now leaves off work at 5 p.m. will take with him the light we now have at 3-40; he who leaves off at 6 o'clock, the light we now have at 4-40, and so on. Most striking is the advantage to be gained on Saturdays. Those whose half-holiday commences at 12, 1, or 2 o'clock will have at their disposal as much daylight as if it now commenced at 10-40, 11-40 or 12-40 respectively. By this yearly gain of 210 hours (equivalent to 21 days of 10 hours each) every year of life will be leavened with additional gaiety. Consider what this gain involves for succeeding generations. On reaching the age of twenty-eight (without counting anything for six years of childhood), a man will have gained a whole year of daylight; at fifty he will have gained two years; at seventy-two—three years! Can any words be comprehensive enough to represent the cumulative effect of these additional available hours of daylight (an average of one hour and ten minutes every day for six months) which are within our reach, to be had not only without price but accompanied by a large saving in current expenditure year after year? It is futile to say these can be secured by early rising. The exceptional exercise of this virtue usually calls forth more sarcasm than admiration or imitation. Leisure must follow, not precede work, and compulsory earlier business hours are quite unattainable.

The Waste of Daylight—Continued.

"These considerations bring into view the National financial aspect of the scheme. Assuming the cost of artificial light for each unit of the population, averages only one-tenth of a penny per head per hour, the figures.....show that 210 additional available hours of daylight can be gained, and at least £2,500,000 a year can be saved by the people of Great Britain and Ireland at the cost of moving the hands of the clock three or four times in Spring and Autumn."

So far, then, we have Mr. Willett's scheme in a nutshell. He is supported in these views by a large number of the members of both Houses of Parliament. There are, however, objectors who offer considerable opposition to the new "Daylight" proposals. Foremost among these is Sir David Gill, President of the British Association and formerly Astronomer Royal at the Cape of Good Hope, and whose opinion is entitled to every consideration and respect. He urges that the scheme is "unscientific"—that it would create difficulties with the railway time-tables—that much business confusion would result, and that "to play such tricks with time" would dislocate the international postal-service and international arrangements generally. He also points out that the English and American Stock Exchanges would be put out of touch with each other on the same day, greatly to the disadvantage of the English Market.

On the other hand that very popular Astronomer Sir Robert Ball is a warm advocate of Mr. Willett's proposal. He says—"Which is the better for our working hours, glorious sunshine which costs us nothing, or expensive and incomparably less efficient artificial light? Only perverted habits could make us hesitate as to the answer to this question. The admirable scheme of Mr. Willett will rescue 210 hours of our waking life from the gloom of man's puny efforts at illumination, and substitute for it—sunbeams! There are no difficulties connected with the scheme which could weigh for a moment against the advantages of its adoption."

Many scientists and men of note fully endorse these views, and on the whole, the weight of expert as well as of public opinion would seem to be in favour of Mr. Willett's scheme.

A Select Committee of the House of Commons, appointed to consider the Daylight Saving Bill, have reported in its favour, with a slight departure from Mr. Willett's scheme for the sake of further simplicity and public convenience. The Committee find that a simple alteration of *one hour* in April and a reverse alteration of *one hour* in September is better calculated to attain the object desired. They suggest that these changes should take place at two o'clock in the morning Greenwich mean time in the case of Great Britain, and Dublin mean time in the case of Ireland, on the third Sunday in April; and at two o'clock in the morning Greenwich mean time in the case of Great Britain, and Dublin mean time in the case of Ireland, on the third Sunday in September.

The Committee are of opinion that no practical difficulty will be found in adjusting clocks and watches to these two changes. The Committee suggest that the Bill should be called "The Local Time (Great Britain and Ireland) Bill," and that Greenwich time, as hitherto, should be maintained for purposes of astronomy, navigation, and scientific uses.

The Committee believe that the alterations proposed would have the effect of bringing the hours of work and leisure nearer to sunrise—of allowing more daylight for recreative purposes—of decreasing the use of public-house—of facilitating the training of Territorial Forces—of advancing the health and well-being of the community—and of reducing the expenditure of artificial light.

The reply of the Committee to various objections that have been urged is very conclusive. They say that the proposed objects cannot be attained without legislation—that a single Act establishing local time for the whole of the United Kingdom has the advantage of simplicity—that interference with European traffic is slight as compared with the benefit to the nation, and can be easily arranged—that the interference with American business can be obviated by the adherence to the present hours of those concerned—and that such other interests as may be exceptionally affected can, without difficulty, adapt themselves to the change.

At the time of going to press the Daylight Saving Bill has not become law, but if the business of Parliament permits, there is every hope of the Bill passing in a not distant future.
