YOUR Baby is Life's most precious gift to you; his health the most valuable possession he can have; his happiness your chief delight. Baby's Digestive Organs and Powers.

THE majority of Baby's troubles are attributable in the first case to stomach and bowel disorders,—generally produced by improper feeding, though sometimes due to constitutional weakness of the digestive organs.

If you give your Baby such food before he is old enough to digest it, you can do him incalculable harm, for unless measures be taken to remove it, the undigested portion will simply remain and ferment in the bowels, causing colic and wind, and, eventually, if the food be persisted in, chronic dyspepsia.

Beneficent Nature provides in the intestines a certain natural lubricant to assist in the easy expulsion of undigested and waste matter. When her child is

costive, however, many a mother doses it with purgatives so harmful and drastic in action that this natural lubricant is driven out of the system, and the child made more or less permanently constipated. Castor oil, which is popularly, but erroneously, supposed to be harmless, is one of the drugs responsible for this condition. One medical authority says, "I know of no drug which is responsible for more chronic constipation than castor oil." Calomel, which is the basis of most "teething powders," is also a real offender.

When Baby's digestive organs are working properly he is practically always well and happy. Is "Carmex" Nasty to Take ?

When should "Carmex" be Given?

TO obtain the best results from "CARMEX" it should be given methodically, at least once daily.

Minor Ailments and their Remedies

"CARMEX" is not a "cure-all." It does, however, relieve and banish digestive disturbances, and brings the organs of digestion into good condition. As practically every baby ailment has its beginning in, or is aggravated by, some stomach or bowel disorder, a dose of "CARMEX" is the first step towards recovery.

It is better, however, to give a small dose of "CARMEX" regularly as a precaution against serious illness, particularly during the warmer months of the year when the dangerous "summer diarrhoea" is so prevalent.

TEETHING.—If Baby is in thoroughly good health his teeth should occasion him scarcely any trouble. Easy teething, however, is not dependent on any one thing, but on several, the chief of which are good health, regular movement of the bowels, and regular habits. The order in which the teeth appear is shown below—

At one year old a baby should have six teeth, six months later another half-dozen should have appeared, and the set of twenty ought to be complete at two and a half years. Often the first two come quite unnoticed, but, as a rule, Baby will be a little restless for a day or two before a new tooth appears. One of the greatest troubles met is indigestion or some irregularity in the action of the bowels. This can be circumvented in practically every case by giving "CARMEX" regularly as soon as baby shows the slightest sign of fretfulness. At

teething time Baby often loses his appetite, and it is harmful to try to force him to finish a bottle when he feels he has had enough. Just keep on with "CARMEX" regularly, and you will find it will help Baby tide over the teething time happily and without undue distress. "CARMEX" is infinitely superior to the common "teething powders," which often consist of poisonous mercurial or antimonial compounds.

SLEEPLESSNESS.—If there is a marked reduction in the amount of sleep it usually indicates an ailment of some kind, and should be carefully looked into. Sometimes mothers unconsciously encourage sleeplessness by not insisting that Baby from the first be taught to sleep in his cot. If he knows that as soon as he cries he will be taken up in someone's arms and rocked to sleep, it is a habit he will very quickly form, and you must remember that a baby trained from the first in good habits will reap the benefit of self-control in later life. Do not let baby have any excitement for a full hour before bedtime.

RESTLESSNESS.—Restlessness may be due to irregular feeding, constipation or diarrhoea, or any other outside cause, such as ear-ache, thirst, cold, heat, etc., and all of these conditions should be investigated and corrected if present. If, as is generally the case, the restlessness is due to some error in diet or digestive disturbance, Baby should be given "CARMEX," and in a day or so you will find his restlessness disappear, and he will sleep calmly and soundly.

SICKNESS.—Here again, the general cause of the trouble is improper feeding. Baby has usually had some food which does not agree with him, and lies heavily in his stomach, so that, either at the time, or when other food is given to him, he cannot retain it. "CARMEX" is the obvious remedy because the pure oil which it contains coats and softens the resistant curd and carries it away without pain, leaving Baby's system quite clear, and soothed. If Baby is habitually sick it is a very evident proof that the food you are giving him does not suit him, and you must try some other.

COLIC, HICCOUGH AND WIND.—All these ailments are due to digestive disturbances. *Hiccough* is not dangerous, but merely a troublesome disorder due to weakness of the nerves controlling the digestive functions. "CARMEX" quickly relieves it.

"*Wind*" or Flatulence is a distension of the stomach or bowels due to gas of any kind. It may, for instance, be caused by Baby swallowing air from his feeding bottle when the teat is empty, or by sucking a "dummy" or "comforter." Unsuitable and infected food

or imperfect digestion are, however, the chief causes of the trouble, because in such cases the food ferments in the stomach or bowels, producing noxious gases. Obstruction of the bowels through chronic constipation or hard masses of curdled milk or undigested food brings about the serious form of flatulence known as *Colic*, which may also be produced by any kind of irritation in the bowels.

The symptoms of the common kind of "wind" are well known. If they are not relieved by holding Baby against one's shoulder and patting his back, a dose of "CARMEX" will soon make him happy again.

Should baby have Colic—which may be recognised by his sharp spasms of screaming, and by his cold hands and feet, which are closely drawn up to his swollen abdomen—at once give a good dose of "CARMEX," put hot flannels or a hot water bag to the abdomen, and wrap him in warm flannel for at least half an hour. When relief is obtained continue "CARMEX" regularly between feeds. If colic lasts longer than three or four hours, send for a doctor.

A baby who is regularly given "CARMEX" will not have any of these troubles.

DIARRHŒA.—As a rule, diarrhœa is an effort on the part of Nature to get rid of some irritating substance in the intestinal tract; its causes are generally injudicious feeding, contaminated food or various infectious fevers. Great care should be taken to be sure that Baby's food cannot be contaminated in any way, and by washing them in boiling water to secure scrupulous cleanliness of the feeding bottle, its teat and all appliances used in making the food. When the diarrhœa is of the simple type, it is generally due to the fact that the irritating substance in the intestinal tract has set up a form of putrefaction. In such a case it is obvious that the habit of giving astringents with the idea of "stopping" the diarrhœa is altogether to be deplored. Baby's need is for one or two extra doses of "CARMEX" to carry away the harmful substance, and soothe the irritated bowels. The very serious condition, known as "Summer Diarrhœa," demands prompt and skilled attention at the hands of a doctor, who must be sent for immediately.

CONSTIPATION.—Babies fed on artificial foods are usually costive, but this should not be confused with constipation. Baby should have a motion at least once every twenty-four hours. Starchy foods, or those containing flour, are very binding to a young baby. Of course, constipation may be due to some constitutional weakness of the bowels, but it is very often caused by a deficiency of fat in the food, or through Baby not receiving sufficient food. Half to one teaspoonful of "CARMEX" once or twice a day will speedily remove constipation.

from whatever cause. This procedure will not only remedy the constipation, but will also bring the disordered digestive organs into good condition. Never give baby calomel or grey powders unless a doctor orders them. Do not ever neglect an obstinate case of constipation, for if you do, the poisonous gases caused by decaying food are absorbed by the system and Baby made seriously ill. Rupture is also often brought about by constipation owing to the need for Baby to overstrain the muscles of the abdomen.

In that form of constipation which causes hard motions, sometimes stained with blood, "CARMEX" acts like magic. This is owing to the softening effect it has on the contents of the bowel and to its lubricating properties in general.

GENERAL INDIGESTION.—In all disorders, such as acidity, indigestion, vomiting, etc., "CARMEX" is superior to powders, gripe mixtures, etc., because it gets to the root of the trouble, and actually removes the cause. General Hints on Management of Baby.

THE most important factor of Baby's welfare, health and happiness is his diet, but this is a point upon which even authorities differ.

It is better, therefore, for you to follow the advice of your doctor in this respect, only remembering that there is nothing which can possibly equal a healthy mother's milk for Baby. If artificial foods are necessary, you should bear in mind what has been said regarding Baby's digestive organs, and not give Baby anything in the way of starchy foods until he is at least seven months old.

General Hints—continued.

BABY'S TOYS.—Never let Baby play with anything which has detachable parts, or which is very bright and dazzling. The simplest toys are the best for Baby, out of which he gets the most enjoyment. A great favourite with all babies is a string of a few empty cotton reels or anything of that nature. Never let Baby have painted things, or dyed things; he will put them into his mouth, and the dye or paint will probably be harmful to him, if not poisonous. Ivory or bone toys which are in no way sharp or pointed are good for Baby when he is teething, because he likes to bite on them and so soothe the irritation of his gums. Do not let Baby play with anything small enough for him to put right into his mouth.

CLOTHING.—Use flannel, or soft clinging wool material for Baby's clothing. Clothe him warmly, especially over the abdomen. Woollen clothing is the warmest in cold weather. Cover every part except the hands and face. The clothing must be loose and comfortable. Never use flannelette.

THE BATH.—Baby should be bathed in the morning and washed before going to bed at 6 p.m. At six months old he should be bathed at bed-time and washed in the morning. Do not bathe Baby before one hour after he has had his bottle, or he may be sick. The temperature in the bathroom should be 70°F. to 72°F., and the temperature of the water 95°F. to 100°F. A thermometer is necessary in the house where there is a baby, but if by chance you do not happen to have one at hand when you are going to bathe Baby, you can test the temperature of the water yourself by using your elbow as a substitute. Always have a screen round Baby when he is being bathed. A clothes-horse with a sheet or flannel pinned over it will answer the purpose. Before undressing Baby see that everything is at hand, and in the order it is required for dressing him again, otherwise Baby may easily take a chill through being kept waiting. The clothes to be put on should be warmed, and you must try to avoid turning and twisting Baby about more than can be helped. Use a pure, neutral soap.

When dry, powder Baby on the neck, behind the ears, under the arms and knees, and in the groin. Wipe away any superfluous powder, particularly in the groin where it is likely to get wet and cake.

BABY'S OUTINGS.—Baby should be taken out at least once a day, unless it is particularly bad and inclement weather. Cold alone will not hurt Baby so long as you wrap him up sufficiently, and a plentiful supply of pure, fresh air is essential to Baby's health and happiness.

Baby's Progress

THE gradual growth of a baby's intelligence and strength is a wonderful process to all who are privileged to watch it from day to day. The details given below show what progress the average child makes, but it should clearly be understood that children differ vastly in this respect, so that a baby should not be considered backward if it be not in line with the average infant. If, however, some of these signs are several months overdue a physician should be consulted.
