Also there shall be one Teacher of the highe puercheters who shall be yearly allowed for his same £ 26

Also there shall be one of defence who shall be principally experte in the Raver and dagger
the Simerle and tercat the grise of the dagger the battaile axe and the pike and
shall have publicklye tenure who shall also haue a dispensation against the Statute
of Rouges and shall yearly be allowed for the same £ 26

Also there shall be one who shall kepe a Hawking and Vanting schole and shall

Also there shall be one Teacher of Musick and to play on the flute the Banhorn

Audiutorie And also shall sett downe and charge exquisitely the office of a Justice
of peace and Sheriffe not medling with pleyns or running pointes of the law and
